SANFORD - Although the official grand opening Sanford's Riverwalk is still four weeks away, about 100 people gathered Monday at Palmetto Avenue and Seminole Boulevard for some afternoon excitement.

The attraction? Jax, an injured manatee who retreated to the western basin of the Monroe Harbour Marina.

A rescue team from SeaWorld Orlando managed to captured the manatee but not before Jax put on a show by escaping three times from the halfmoon net the team used to finally ensuare him. Once captured Jax was taken to SeaWorld's manatee rehabilitation center for treatment of life-threatening injuries, including a penetrating chest wound, fractured ribs and fluid in the

U.S. Congressman John L. Mica (7th District-R) has announced that key highway and trail projects in Seminole County have cleared the first hurdle, with passage of a major highway bill in the House of Representatives.

One of the projects would involve a connector between Central Florida GreeneWay (State Road 417) and Interstate 95 in Volusia County, somewhere in the area of Port Orange or Edgewater.

"Right now, it's a big if," said Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) spokesman Steve Homan. "The money, if approved by

t h Senate, it would be only for a feasibility study to determine if the project would be viable and if it would, indeed, provide an



alternative to traffic on Highway 17-92 Interstate 4."

Lake Mary Blvd. to be shut down by CSX

LAKE MARY Weekend motorists in Lake Mary will experience a major inconvenience later this month when a portion of Lake Mary Boulevard is closed for at least two days.

City Manager John Litton announced last week at the city commission meeting that CSX would be making repairs to the railroad crossing during Easter weekend. Litton said the next day the railroad company had revised their plan of the road closure to the following weekend, April 17 and 18, because they were unable to get asphalt to the

location in time. According to Public Works Director Deamud, railroad officials feel the curve of the track is too steep at the Lake Mary Boulevard crossing near Country Club Road. He said they will knock down the curve and repave the cross-

"I don't think it's going to be done in two days," Deamud said to city commissioners.

Traffic is to be diverted away from Lake Mary Boulevard at U.S. Highway 17-92 to the east and Country Club Road to the west. Country Club Road will remain open to the south and north during the construction.

Seminole County Health Department recognized for emergency preparedness

Florida Department of Health Secretary John O. Agwunobi recognized the Seminole County Health Department for its efforts to meet the requirements of a national preparedness measurement system. The National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) has recognized Seminole County Health Department for completing the requirements of Project Public Health Ready.

"I applaud the leadership and hard work Seminole County Health Department has done to ensure Florida is ready to respond to a public health emergency," Agwunobi said. Through Gov. Bush's leadership on domestic security and projects like Public Health Ready, Florida continues to lead the way in public health readiness."

Seminole County Health Department along with 10 other public health agencies around the nation underwent reviews conducted by Project Public Health Ready, a firstof-its-kind partnership program developed by NACCHO with support from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Columbia University Center for Public

"This is the result of a team effort including NACCHO, DOH, Seminole County Emergency Management, the employees of the Seminole County Health Department, and our community partners" said Mike Napier, administrator for Seminole County Health Department.

Project Public Health Ready was established to help define local public health preparedness and develop a standard set of goals by which preparedness could be measured.

To gain recognition, Project Public Health Ready required participating communities to achieve goals in three key areas: preparedness planning; individual worker competence; and demonstration of readiness through drills and exercises. Seminole County Health Department conducted an in depth needs assessment, trained staff on core competencies of disaster preparedness and conducted exercises including opening a dispensing center. The recognition confirms that Seminole County Health Department has an emergency response plan in place, the plan is appropriately connected to other emergency response plans, agency staff members are trained, and the plan is exercised and used during public health and other community emergencies.

"This project was a tremendous benefit in helping to better prepare all of Seminole County Health Department employees to efficiently and effectively respond to our community's needs in a disaster" said Anne-Carol Castello, public health preparedness planner for Brevard, Seminole, and Volusia counties.





upon the injuries the animal suffered and the experience our veterinarians have in treating manatees."

Allen classified the injuries as "blunt force trauma" and indicated they were most likely sustained when the manatee was struck by the hull of a boat.

"The injury was not caused by a boat prop," Allen said. Crews putting the fin-

ishing touches on the Riverwalk noticed the manatee Monday morning and altered authorities after a deep gash was observed on Jax left side. The manatee rescue team arrived about 1 p.m. Jax had remained stationary for several hours, but as team's approached, he suddenly became invigorated and took off for deeper waters.

The rescue team spent the next two hours pursuing lax from one end of the basin to another. Three times he did his best Houdini imitation, escaping just when rescuers were sure they had captured the manatee. After the third escape Jax left the marina basin before stopping in three feet of water just outside the marina entrance.

The rescue team circled he manatee as customers sitting on the screened deck of Wolfy's River Deck Bar n' Grill pointed out Jax's position. With four team members in the water, the team slowly tightened the net until the manatee was trapped in the net.

A group of about 50 people watched from Wolfy's and cheered when the rescue team pulled Jax into the boat, about 10 feet from the restaurant's deck.

"Some of our customers saw the people congregating around the Riverwalk and weren't sure about what was going on," said Frank Wolf, owner of Wolfy's. "When we learned it was a manatee, everybody got pretty anxious.

"It was somewhat comical watching (Jax) escape every time they threw that net out," Wolf added, "but that was tempered when they discovered the extent of his injuries when they finally got him onboard."

This is not Jax first encounter with SeaWorld's manatee rescue team. The manatee was first rescued in March 1998 near Jacksonville — thus the name Jax.

"The animal emaciated and sickly as the result of cold stress," Allen said. She explained that dramatic decreases in water temperature can threaten manatees. "Some don't handle it as well as others.

Jax was nursed back to health and released in Blue Spring State Park in August 1998.

Allen said veterinarians have given Jax antibiotics and are administering fluids to prevent dehydration. Blood tests and x-rays were scheduled Wednesday.

SeaWorld Orlando's manatee operation was created in 1976 and has rescued 250 manatees. Allen described it at the "world's largest manatee rescue and rehabilitation center." Veterinarians at Orlando center have lead the way medical procedures for manatees, including putting the first cast on an injured manatee and developing a special "baby formula for orphaned manatee calves.



A glance at the final score, 7-2 Lions, makes it appear that Oviedo (9-6) claimed an easy district win over the Bears (10-5).




The big righthander hurled a three-hitter while striking out 11 over the six innings.


Krall's dinger extended an amazing streak for the Raiders, who have hit at least one home in eight straight games.

UCF baseball moves up to No. 19 in national rankings

The UCF baseball team has moved up to No. 19 in the latest Baseball America Top 25 poll. The Golden Knights are 27-5 overall, the best start in school history, along with a 13-2 Atlantic Sun conference record.

The Golden Knights are the second highest ranked team in the state of Florida in the Baseball America poll, trailing only No. 5 Miami (24-6). Four Florida schools are ranked in the Baseball America Top 25, with Florida State (23-9) at No. 21 and Florida (25-8) at No.

In the latest Collegiate Baseball News Top 25, the Golden Knights also hold down the No. 19 ranking.

UCF also makes its first appearance of the season in the Sports Weekly/ESPN Coaches Top 25 poll at No. 23.

On Saturday, Kyle Bono of Lake Mary tallied a career-high 11 strikeouts in game one

and Dee Brown drove in six runs in game two to lead UCF to a doubleheader sweep of Jacksonville Saturday afternoon at Alexander Brest Field in Jacksonville. The Golden Knights won game one 10-4 and completed the doubleheader sweep with a 10-9 win in game two.

In game one, Bono (5-0) was dominant in allowing just two hits and one earned run en route to his fifth win of the season. In game two, Brown was 3-for-4 with the go-ahead three-run home run to propel UCF to the vic-

Kyle's twin brother and personal catcher, Ryan, also had a big game going 2-for-4, including his 10th double of the season, a career-high with four runs scored and an RBI.

Jacksonville ended Kyle's impressive streak of 25.2 innings of scoreless baseball with a solo home run off the bat of Logan James in the fifth inning to cut the lead to 8-1. The home run was also the first earned run yielded by Bono since Feb. 21 vs. Utah (38 innings). In game two, Clay Timpner led the game off with a long home run to right field for his second home run of the season. Timpner became the first UCF player to leadoff a game with a home run since Mike Myers drilled a leadoff home run at Jacksonville on May 19, 2001.

UCF has been at its best early in the game in 2004, with the Golden Knights outscoring the opposition 95-24 through the first three innings in 2004.

On Sunday, Brown was 2-for-5 with a tworun home run to propel No. 23 UCF past Jacksonville 9-7 Sunday afternoon at Alexander Brest Field in Jacksonville. Brown had two of UCF's 16 hits as the Golden Knights completed their first series win and series sweep of Jacksonville since the 2000 season. With the win, the Golden Knights improved to 27-5 overall and 13-2 in the Atlantic Sun.

Brown had a huge week for the Golden

Knights as he finished 7-for-12 with three home runs and 12 RBI in four games. Brown, who hit three home runs as a freshman in 2002, failed to hit a homer in 2003.

UCF starter Matt Fox (8-0), who missed practice time this week due to illness, gutted out a strong six-inning performance for the Golden Knights. Despite not having his best fastball, Fox limited Jacksonville to just three runs on seven hits with five strikeouts. Fox leads the conference with his perfect 8-0 record.

Lake Mary's Drew Butera (Bishop Moore) also had a big hand in the win, going 2-for-5 and driving in three runs.

The Golden Knights were to have played Bethune-Cookman again on Tuesday and will then head to Boca Raton for a big conference weekend with Florida Atlantic.

The first game will be Friday night at 7 p.m. and the three-game series will wrapup with a doubleheader starting at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Gordon not a fan of aero changes

Justin, Texas ers, NASCAR still hasn't gotten the package right, Jeff Gordon said Sunday. He had an enjoyable ride in Sunday's Samsung Radio Shack 500 at Texas Motor Speedway, but only when he was leading twice for 47 laps. A failing battery cost him the lead late in the race and he finished third in the No. 24 Chevrolet.

Otherwise, it was a struggle. "The aero push here is absolutely horri-ble," Gordon said. "That's why we don't see the type of racing that we'd really like to see here. . . . Every time I'd get my car good, I'd start catching other cars. I'd get 10-15 car lengths from them and the car would just absolutely stop.

"We all know they haven't gone far enough on the aero and they haven't gone far enough on the tires. And you can't go any further on the tires without going more on the aero. I think we have just as much downforce now as we did last year. I don't understand why the cars aren't in the wind tunnel. If their goal is to get these cars where the zero push lan't as bad, we've got to slow them down through

Elliott knocked out

Bill Elliott started second but finished 36th when a tire blow on his No. 91 Dodge on lap 273. The car spun into the wall at turn 3, knocking him out of the race.

Elliott had led twice for 26 laps.

"We just cut a tire down, plain and simple," Elliott said. "I tried to get to pit road. It was just one of them days."

Labonte's streak ends

Terry Labonte's series leading streak of finishing races ended after 48 races when his No. 5 Chevrolet broke a camshaft on lap 119. He finished 41st.

His last DNF (did not finish) was also an engine failure.

"The engine blew up on the caution lap," Labonte said. "We weren't running the way we wanted to, anyway Sometimes it happens — things break."

"I had a really pushing car all day, I'm surprised we won it," said Kenseth, who took a Cup race at Texas two years ago. "It's always cool to win in Texas." Kenseth, in his third Busch race this season, is the defending Nextel Cup champion and has two wins in racing's top circuit this year. He finished 16th Sunday in

the Samsung/RadioShack 500. Busch, the 18-year-old brother of Nextel Cup points leader Kurt Busch, led 147 laps in his third runner-up finish in

13 career starts. Robby Gordon was third. Two of Kyle Busch's runner-up



SCSO citizens academy begins April 21

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Community Law Enforcement Academy's next session is set to begin Wednesday, April 21, with expanded offerings, with traffic and DUI enforcement added to the course outline.



Goldsboro is example of school diversity

SANFORD — The stars paraded for hours last Tuesday night at Goldsboro Elementary School. Class by class, students of the county's only elementary-age magnet school dazzled the standing-room-only crowds with songs, instruments, science and technology.

After each grade performed, families and friends toured the child's classroom and the school's NASA Space Lab for an out-of-space simulated experience.

It was the awesome Space Lab where the simulated space voyage made a striking resemblance to the school's skyrocketing ride to the top as one of the district's premier elementary schools.

It is this small but glowing of Goldsboro portion Elementary School that demonstrates the district's commitment to diversity. Last week, the district and the U.S. Justice Department submitted a unitary status report to a federal judge detailing compliance to and release from a 34year-old federal court consent decree ordering the district to desegregate its "dual system based on race" and implement long-standing practices and procedures that ensure equity.

As part of the 1996 consent decree order, the district developed Goldsboro into a magnet school, In 1998-99, Goldsboro became a district-wide magnet school without any mandatory attendance zones.

Goldsboro, a historically allblack elementary school, currently enrolls students from 32 of the 34 elementary school districts in Seminole County, as well as students who previously attended private schools in the area. The school's 1997-
