dummy's ace of spades on West's king. Then he finessed the queen of clubs successfully, cashed his ace of clubs, ruffed a third club and played the king of hearts. We won 10 into the merit of South playing the king of hearts earlier. That didn't matter. What did matter is that when East showed out on the first heart, South conceded down one.

He didn't have to. He should have played all the high trumps and led clubs. If West didn't ruff South could throw him in with the last trump.

Whenever West gained the lead he would have to play spades. He could cash his queen then he would have to lead to dummy's jack of spades which would have become good. If he trumped the fourth club South would have a trump remaining to get back to his hand to cash his fifth club.

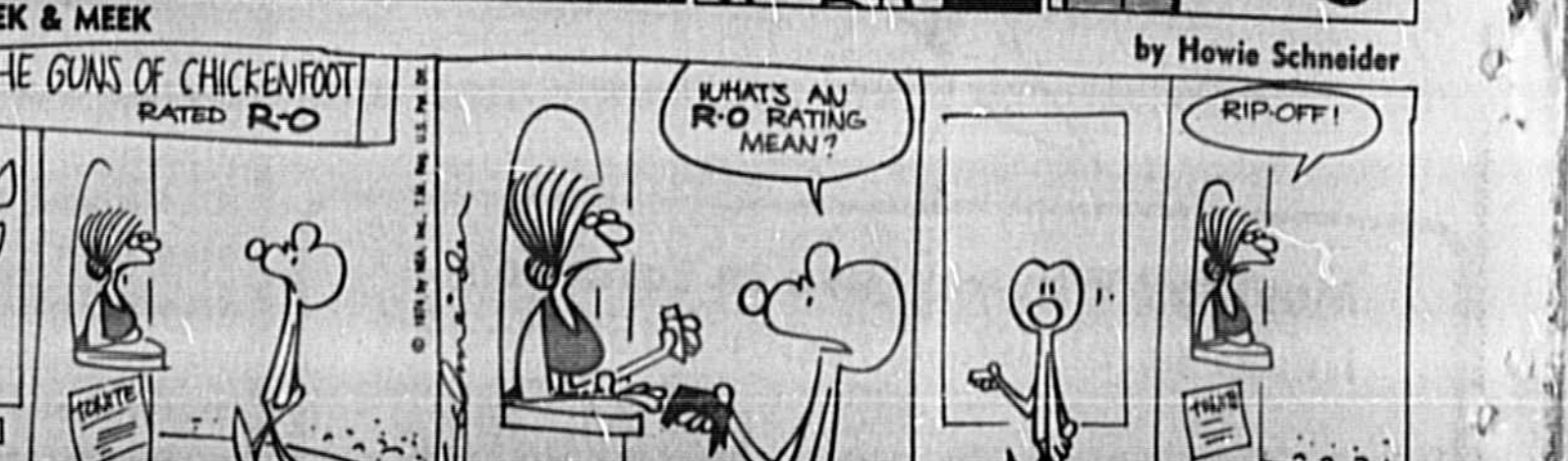

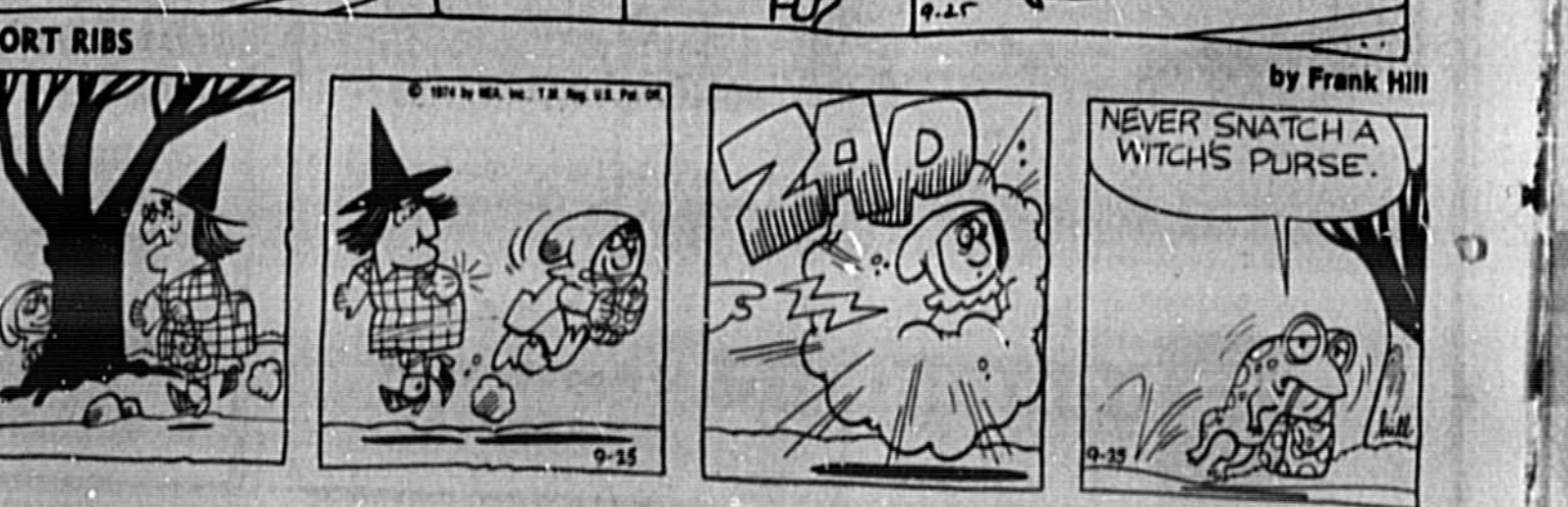

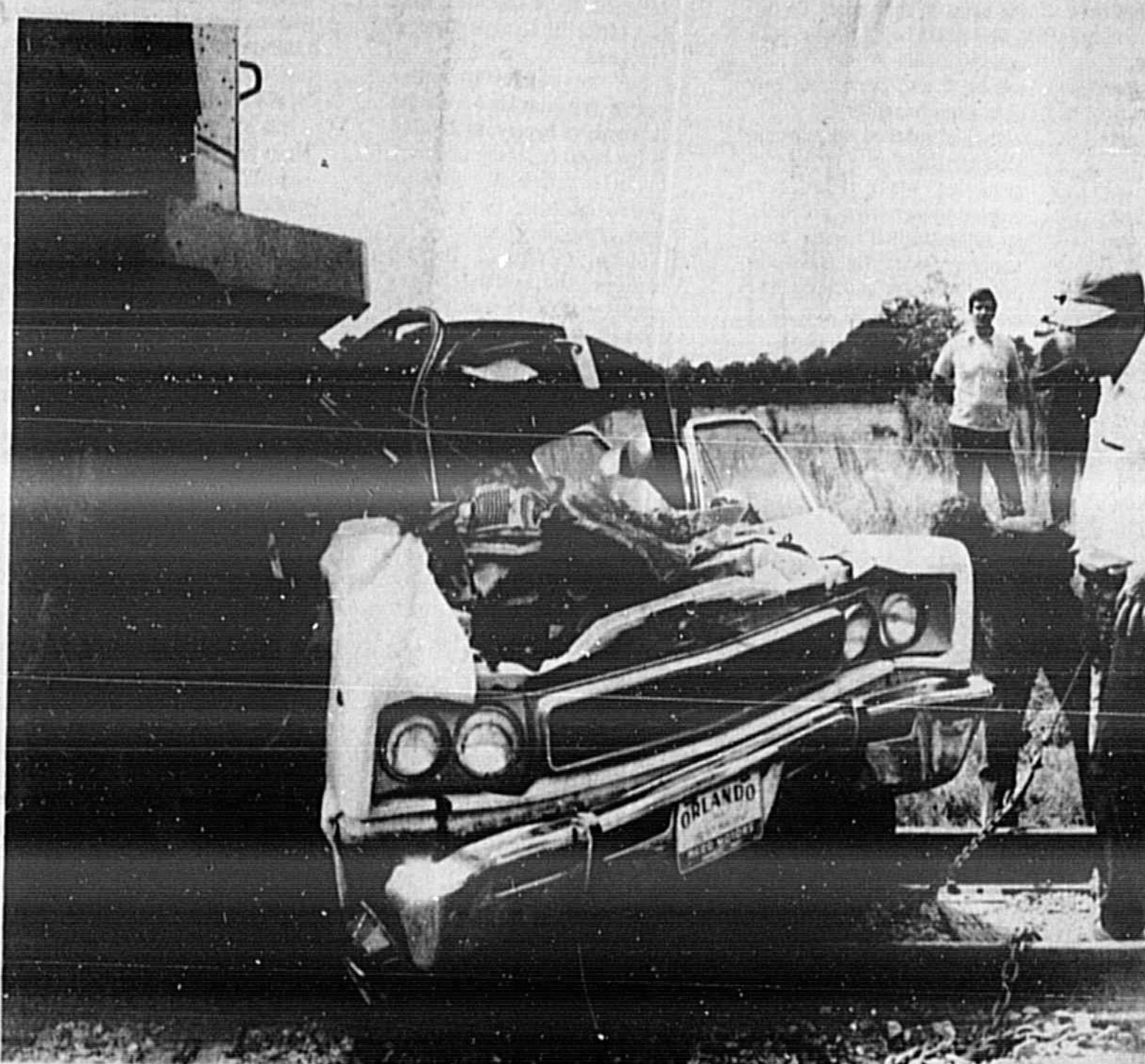

School Board Probing Sabal Point Complaints

The Woodlands parents who Monday night seemed prepared to wage all-out war on the Seminole County School Board Wednesday night seemingly accepted the board's explanations of the conditions existing at Sabal Point Elementary School and its promises to investigate the situation further.

Two issues were discussed extensively—the safety of children walking to the school, and the children's textbooks.

Bob Brunner of the Rolling Hills Civic Association, said none of the 80 students who live in the area walk to school anymore because of the absence of sidewalks and the possibility of a second run.

He was told the county is responsible for the placement of school zone flashers, which follows state guidelines. However, the board promised to discuss the situation with the county engineer and traffic department.

After surviving the onslaught of Brunner and his group, the board was confronted by Mrs. Helen Schnelker, representing parents who were sure their displaced Woodlands School children are being "short-changed" in their education.

It was explained by the administration these students are not capable of riding a bus with other children. "Your area is not the only one with the problem," said Davis Sims, board chairman. "If we correct everyone else's problem, we don't have the facilities to correct all these problems."

Administration spokesmen explained no buses are available to transport these 80 children. However, the transportation department would study the exceptional children 75 bus situation, and the possibility of a second run.

Two members of the staff of Sabal Point defended the situation stating the classes are not textbook oriented, but rather based on the students performance of experiments and techniques. This a book with a 1964 copyright is not a liability.

Superintendent William Layer told of attempts to secure books before the September session opened that were foiled because they were not catalogued properly.

Superintendent Layer announced Angel Mender, a building trades teacher at Seminole High School, had been selected as The Seminole County "Teacher of the Year."

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Prisons Closed To New Inmates

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Corrections Director Louis Wainwright today closed the prison system to new inmates because of "incredibly overcrowded prison conditions."

It was the third time in three years that the prison system has been closed to new inmates because the population greatly exceeded institutional capacity. Wainwright said there are more than 11,000 inmates jammed into a system built to house about 5,000.

"Our facilities have been overcrowded to the point where we cannot continue to jam people in and we cannot guarantee the security of inmates or staff, let alone conduct effective rehabilitative programs," he said.

Wainwright said Gov. Reubin Askew has approved his decision to refuse to accept new inmates from the county jail at the Lake Butler Prison Reception Center. He said Lake Butler was built for 726 inmates and presently houses 1,163.

Askew will appoint a blue ribbon committee to seek ways to alleviate prisons crowding, Wainwright said.

Five new prisons providing room for 1,300 inmates have been authorized or are under construction but Wainwright said the earliest completion date is December 1975 for a Brevard County institution.

He said longer sentences by judges, increased crime, Florida's standing as the No. 1 State in terms of the proportion of the population behind bars and public apathy all contribute to the crowding problem.

The overcrowding is aggravated by a large and growing number of close-custody inmates who cannot be placed in minimum security programs such as work-release, Suzie Wilson a spokesman for the division said.

Hit-Run Victim Still Suffering

The young man was pedaling his bike along Lake Mary Boulevard just before dawn when an automobile suddenly emerged from the blackness and seemed to swerve toward him. The youth steered off the road, but the car followed, knocking him from his bike, shattering his leg, breaking two fingers and fracturing his pelvis. Anni then dove off into the night.

Harold was in a cast for almost a year, and is now in a leg brace. But he's still unable to walk without the use of crutches and cannot go back to work.

"I have to wait on him like an invalid," his mother admits. "He just sits around the house. We get him in the car and go to church on Sunday, but that's all."

Robert Watson, district counselor at the state department of vocational rehabilitation in Sanford, had been working with Harold since Sept. 1970 but had stopped seeing the youth after Harold was placed successfully in a job.

"Harold's always had a real good attitude. He's an independent kid," Watson says, "and I don't think he's bitter about what's happened to him. But there's nothing we can do for him until the doctors know what his status will be. If he's able to walk we can try to place him in a job where he will have to walk as little as possible. If he can't, we'll have to re-evaluate him."

The department has paid for medical costs not covered by insurance and will continue to do so until it's determined whether or not Harold can return to work.

"We're vocational rehabilitation and our services are predicated on the idea that the person is working, or will be working. If he cannot return to work in the future, then we can no longer pay medical costs," Watson says.

That decision, Watson adds, may not be made for quite some time. Meanwhile, the departments will continue to support Harold.

But Mrs. Rousch is running into other problems. Her husband, incapacitated after a heart attack two years ago and unable to work is on a small disability income. She is trying to encourage another son who dropped out of school to support the family after the father's death. But the family's income will dwindle even farther if he does.

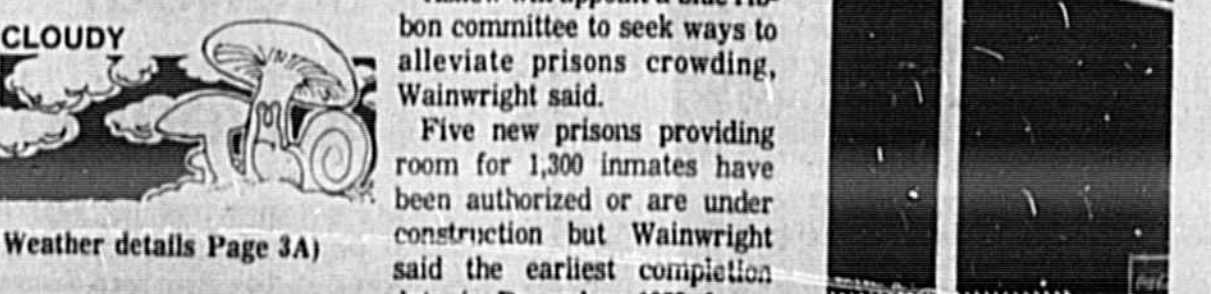

Nixon's Clot Serious, Not Critical.

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Richard M. Nixon rested quietly in a hospital today and the former president's doctor says he thinks the dim-sized blood clot in the lung can be successfully treated.

A hospital spokesman revealed the clot had passed through Nixon's heart before lodging in the lung. If it had blocked a heart artery, it could have been fatal.

Nixon's physician, Dr. John C. Langren, said on Wednesday that the clot was a "potentially dangerous situation but not critical at this time."

Nixon is expected to be hospitalized through next week, missing the Tuesday start of the

Watergate cover-up trial in Washington for which he has been subpoenaed as a witness. Lungren said Nixon took news of the clot "very calmly" and he normally takes "a long time" to get used to a "new problem."

The doctor added, "He has a ball of will to live."

Such a clot — called an embolus — kills lung tissue around it. The size of the dead lung area in Nixon's case was not disclosed.

Several specialists not attending Nixon were asked their opinion on the severity of the clot.

"It's not life-threatening," Dr. Richard Leese, past president of the Los Angeles Lung Association, said of Nixon's clot.

A knowledgeable Washington, D.C., doctor warned, however, that "even though this clot doesn't seem to be severe, it doesn't seem to be getting worse."

Lungren said stress and fatigue suffered by Nixon since he resigned the presidency "may be a factor" in Nixon's physical problems.

But he suggested other causes are possible — simple inactivity or hypercoagulability of the blood (a strong tendency to clot) or even malignancy, including leukemia. He said tests were being performed.

Mary Prentice, a hospital spokeswoman, said the clot was small enough to easily pass through one of the two main pulmonary arteries that connect the heart to the lungs. If it

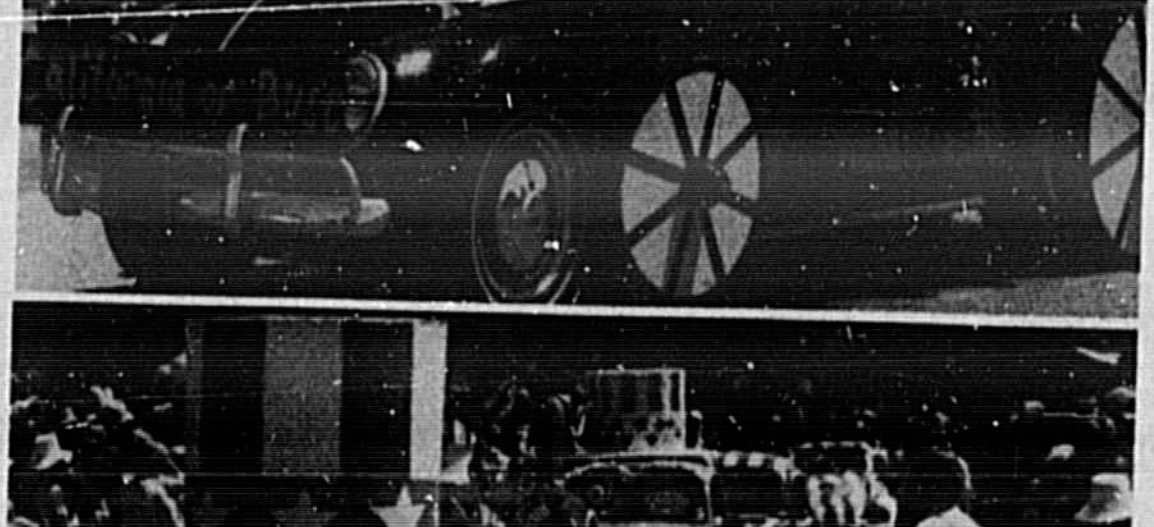
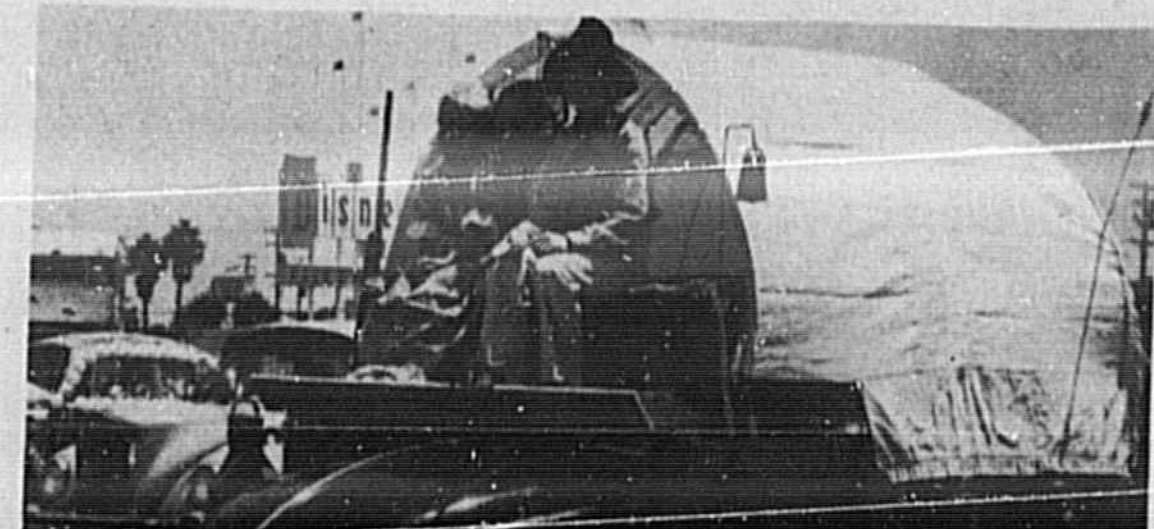
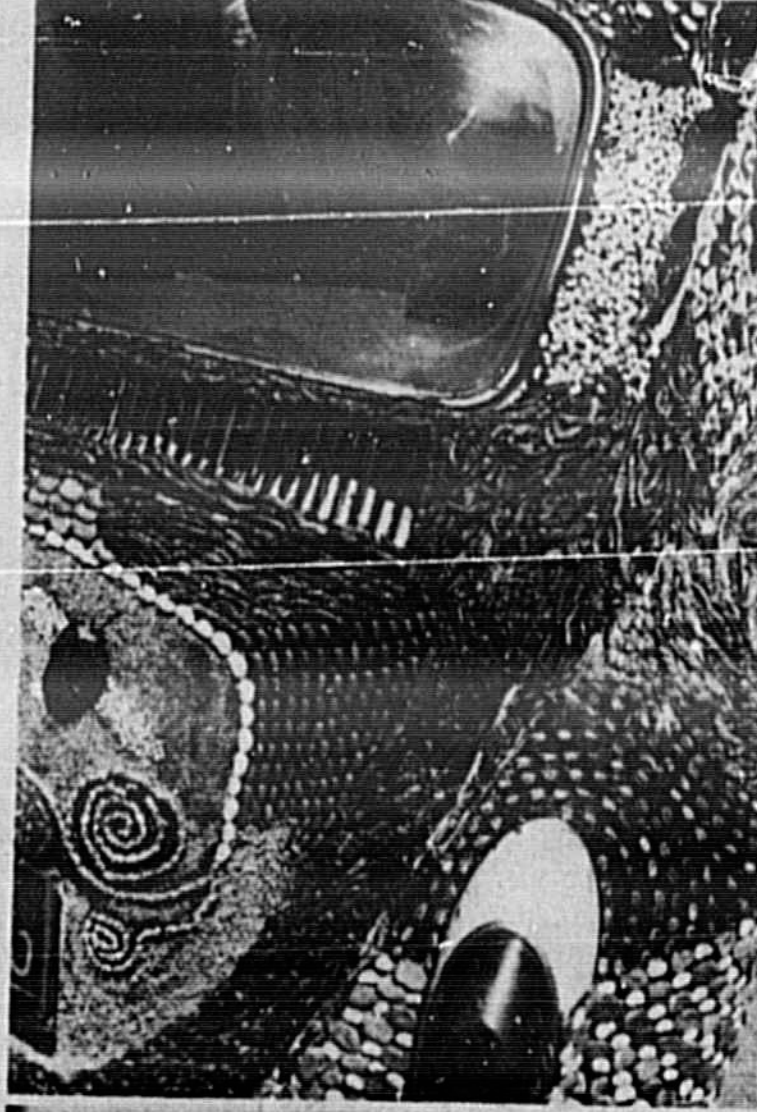
had been large enough and lodged in the artery, death would have occurred in a few minutes or a few hours.

Nixon has had trouble with his leg and phlebitis for many years, and the lung clot indicates the circulatory ailment will continue to plague him.

"He's going to be bothered with this 'rest of his life,'" one New York lung specialist said.

The 61-year-old Nixon has no chest pain from the clot, Lungren said. Nixon entered Memorial Hospital Medical Center of Long Beach on Monday for a stay then expected to last seven days.

Nixon's wife, Pat, has been visiting her husband daily, driving to the hospital from their seaside villa.

Amnesty Has Catch For Some, Citizenship Will Be Key Factor

WASHINGTON (AP) — Justice Department officials say President Ford's amnesty program may exclude Vietnam-era draft evaders and deserters who have become citizens of Canada or some other country.

"The Justice Department now feels that these people would not be eligible for the program and that if they came across the border they would run the risk of immediate arrest," a department spokesman said on Wednesday.

But the spokesman, John Russell, added that because of past court challenges and a lack of clear, specific legal precedents on loss of U.S. citizenship, "it's still arguable both ways."

In his proclamation on Sept. 16 putting the conditional amnesty program into effect, the President declared that "this program will not apply to an individual who is precluded from re-entering under 8 U.S.C. 1182 (a) (2) or other law."

The statute cited bars from re-entering the United States any alien who has left or remained outside the country in order to evade military service during wartime or national emergency.

At issue is whether U.S. citizens who have fled to Canada or abroad and taken out foreign citizenship become aliens, without formally renouncing their U.S. citizenship.

Jack Colboun, coeditor of the exile magazine AMEX-Canada, said he estimates about 1,500 of them are war resisters.

However, he noted that Canada requires that persons obtain official "landed immigrant" status and remain in the country at least five years before they can apply for citizenship.

Because the major surge of exiles occurred as the Vietnam war was heating up in the late 1960s, "we're now moving into a period when there are a number of others who are eligible and are making their decisions" on whether to opt for citizenship, Colboun said in a telephone interview.

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He said the 14 regular employees would be supplemented temporarily by some on loan from other government agencies and by volunteers.

Montoya also questioned whether the government should be expected to pay the salaries of Nixon's maid and butler as part of the transition expenses.

Legality Of DeLand Sewer Fee Said Questionable

DeLand property owners connecting to the city's water and sewer system for the first time after Dec. 31 will now have to pay a \$400 impact fee as a result of an ordinance passed by the city council this week.

But City Attorney John Mattingly, concerned over the constitutionality of the ordinance, has already recommended that the ordinance be rescinded.

The ordinance, requiring a fee from all single family

dwellings and apartments units, had its first reading in August. But substantive changes in the ordinance since then may require that it be read again for the "first" time.

The ordinance was passed Monday despite protests from residents who challenged the constitutionality and asked the council to table adoption until a Circuit Court ruling is made next month in a similar suit involving the city of Dunedin.

Also under the ordinance, commercial units will pay bigger fees, based on the level which their gallon output into the city sewers surpasses a single family base point of 262.5 a day.

Anticipated income from the fee will go into a revenue producing trust account used for expansion and development of the water and sewer system in the city.

Property owners will be required to pay the fee in addition to the regular, recently revised, water and sewer rates.

CASE B-452: Mike R., aged 29, teaches high school chemistry. "Dr. Crane," he began, "you told our teachers' convention that women cigarette addicts are often sexually frustrated wives. Well, what about the men who also smoke like fiends? Are such men unusually virile or are they below par in their libido?"
Smoking is a standard method of tranquilizing your inner hungers. That's one reason why a cigarette addict must watch his diet when he quits tobacco. Otherwise, he will eat excessively and put on extra weight. Moreover, smoking seems to dull not only his gastric appetite, but it will render the cigarette addict partially platonist. Indeed, among men past the age of 45, we find that the totally impotent males are more likely to be heavy tobacco addicts. Various medical theories are cited to explain why, such as: (1) Smoking causes a chilling of the dependent parts of the body. For example, the tobacco addict's hands and feet grow many degrees colder when he sucks on his cigarette. Jaques Signs Election Decree

LONGWOOD—Speculation that Mayor Eugene Jaques might refuse to sign a decree mandating that city election was apparently a disservice to the mayor.

City Clerk Onnie R. Shomate told council that the mayor signed the proclamation earlier this week and candidate qualifications will thus begin Oct. 18.

Mrs. Shomate said today four races will be on the Dec. 3 ballot including two city council seats—districts 3 and 4 held this year by B.H. Ferrill and former councilman B.L. Helms.

Also on the ballot will be the mayor's office and the city clerk's post. Longwood is the only city in Seminole County with an elected city clerk. Mrs. Shomate will be seeking her ninth two-year term in office.

Candidates must be registered voters and submit petitions of endorsement signed by 10 registered voters. In addition, state law requires that a campaign fund be opened at a

bank and that regular reports of contributions and expenditures be filed. The candidates' qualifications will close Nov. 1.

Although voter registration books have closed for the November general election, Seminole Elections Supervisor Camilla Bruce said today city registration books will remain open until Oct. 18.

It's true that you need help to plan diets that are low in fat, low in cholesterol and designed to prevent heart and vascular disease. It is well and good to tell a patient he needs to do these things, but you can do it very well without some guidelines. To limit the fat calories in the diet to 35 per cent of the calories consumed you need to be able to know how much fat in calories, not grams, is in the food you eat. Salary Hikes Aid War On Inflation?

NEW YORK (AP) — The sting of inflation was greatly relieved last year for the top executives of America's largest companies through the application of raises, bonuses and other contractual amounts of cash or stock.

A survey by a management consultant firm shows that the chief executives of 581 of the largest U.S. corporations received total compensation averaging 8.5 per cent higher than the previous year.

No less than 78 per cent of the 504 chief executives in office during both 1972 and 1973 received pay increases, said McKinsey & Co., which has conducted the survey for 20 years. Fourteen per cent took pay cuts. Ten per cent received the same pay.

McKinsey attributed the glittering figures to the highest profit increases in more than 20 years. "Profits of the 581 companies soared 29.1 per cent and sales rose 20.7 per cent over the previous year."

But the survey revealed profit declines were reluctant to lower the compensation of their chief executives. Among 82 showing lower profits, only 31 reduced the top man's compensation, and 37 awarded increases.

The highest average salaries for the biggest companies—those with more than \$1 billion in sales—were in the pharmaceutical industry, where to-

Economists Warned, People Act Humanly

NEW YORK (AP) — A consumer psychologist has a suggestion for some of those statistic-minded economists who now are pursuing their presidentially encouraged talks of reviewing the causes and solutions of inflation.

Don't assume that consumers respond like automatons. If you admit they act like human beings rather than numbers you won't have to keep repeating that lame excuse: "People didn't act as anticipated."

Prof. George Katona, who for years headed the Survey Research Center at the University of Michigan, challenges some of the bedrock assumptions on which economic thinking rests.

To illustrate, many economists believe that in times of inflation people must be encouraged to save and administered not to spend. But, Katona says in effect, people already are motivated to do so. They need no encouragement.

Not that they always do save when inflation rages. When the dollar's value is added to the equation, people might act the very opposite. They rush to buy while they can.

Katona, widely regarded as the founder of consumer surveys as they exist today, related some of his views and findings in a paper prepared for an American Psychological Association meeting in New Orleans last Sunday.

Consumers and others do not always react in the predicted manner because of the presence of optimistic or pessimistic attitudes which have their origins in past experience, trust in government, financial condition and the like.

"You're nothing but a dumb dirt farmer from Nebraska," Bozo sneers at a man intent upon dropping him. The madder they get, the more money is plunked down.

Bombing Deaths Grow

TOKYO (AP) — Fear is growing that Japan's elusive underground radicals may be ready to resume a terror-bombing campaign, with Japan's biggest companies their main targets.

The bomb explosion which killed eight people and injured more than 300 on Aug. 30 in Tokyo was the first overt indication the radicals again may be going on the offensive here.

The Japanese gunnery's takeover of the French Embassy in the Hague last week intensified these fears and further demonstrated the skill and dedication of the Japanese radicals such as the Red Army members.

Police say Japanese leftists have even published a textbook on how to make bombs, entitled "Poem of Rose."

The nation has a long history of political violence, its present crop of terrorists has baffled police, and probably are causing concern for officials planning President Gerald Ford's scheduled visit to Tokyo in November.

"No one is laughing now," he declared after last month's blast at the Mitsubishi Heavy Industries building, Japan's largest defense contractor.

The explosion "did not come as an utter surprise," declared an executive for one of Japan's major companies. "We had received a warning that some big corporations may be bombed."

The motive behind most of the terrorist acts in Japan seems to be to strike at symbols of authority and power, such as police, railroads and the nation's business elite.

Radicals used bamboo staves for weapons in the late 1960s. But as they were driven underground by the usually efficient Japanese police, many have taken up other weapons, particularly bombs.

The first balloon flight was by Jacques and Joseph Montgolfier of Annonay, France, in 1782. They sent up a small smoke-filled balloon.

Harold Harris was the first man to join the Caterpillar Club, on Oct. 20, 1922 — those whose lives have been saved by parachute.

21 Economists OK Inflation Plan

NEW YORK (AP) — Twenty-one economists have endorsed a package of 22 proposed legislative items aimed at eliminating some government quotas and stimulating competition within certain industries.

With a few reservations and exceptions duly noted, the economists signed a resolution supporting the legislative package at a day-long conference on Monday in preparation for President Ford's economic summit conference in Washington on Friday and Saturday.

The action was the nearest thing to a consensus on anti-inflation measures discussed at the pre-summit meeting. But

two other economists in attendance, J. Kenneth Galbraith of Harvard University and Nat Goldfinger of the AFL-CIO, refused to sign the resolution. They said the proposals were "irrelevant" to fighting inflation.

The 22-item package, proposed by Thomas Moore of the Hoover Institution, included:

- Repeal of the meat import act.
- Repeal of import quotas on dairy and other farm products.
- Reduction or elimination of entry barriers into trucking.
- Allowing licensed airlines to operate in any market and permitting them to withdraw from unprofitable or undesired markets.
- Prohibiting resale price maintenance to encourage competition at the retail level.
- Alan Greenspan, President Ford's chief economic adviser, said the participants in the conference had been chosen because of their varying opinions and a consensus was not expected to result from the discussions.
- Greenspan, the conference moderator, said the discussions had helped narrow the areas from which specific monetary and fiscal decisions would be made.

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

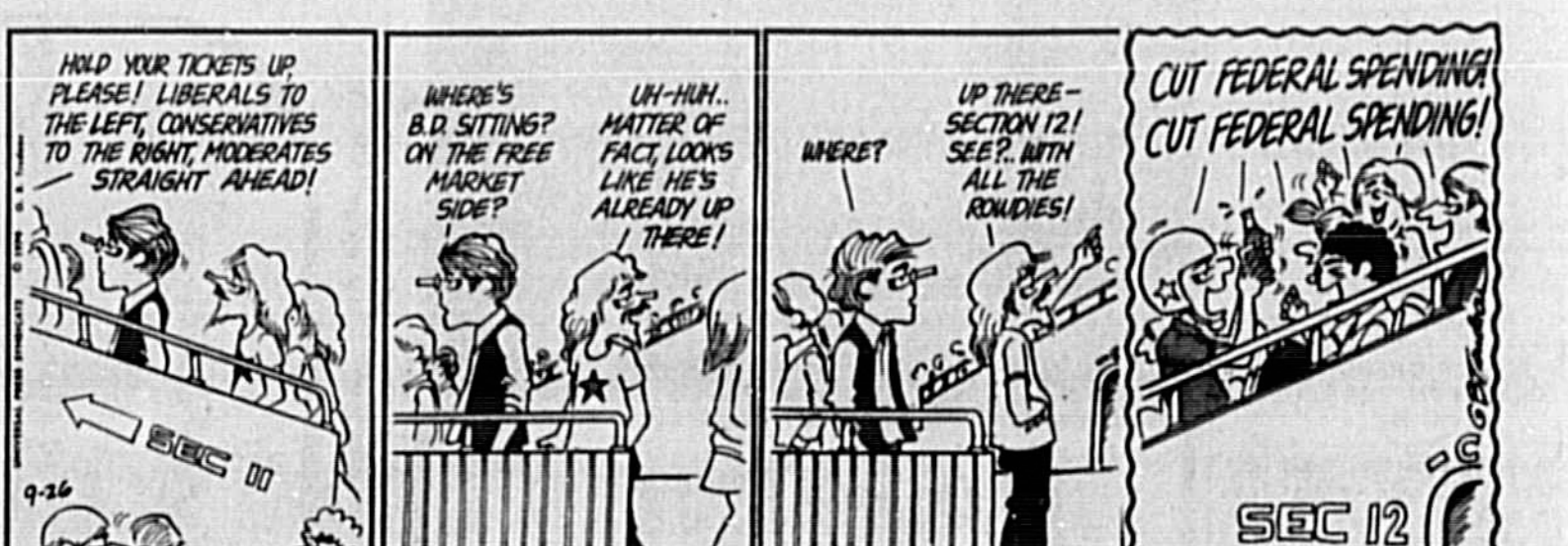

Ford Vows Equality In Inflation War

WASHINGTON (AP) — Declaring that no miracle cure is in sight, President Ford convened his economic summit today and quickly found his administration's anti-inflation policies under attack from congressional Democrats. Ford predicted in his opening remarks that "we as Americans can and will win" the fight against inflation, and hinted at tax cuts for the poor so no group is "called upon to carry an unfair share of the load." House Speaker Carl Albert, who followed Ford to the microphone, complained that some congressional recommendations for economic action had been overlooked in presummit conferences. "The administration in effect has spoken of the old-time religion" of tax incentives for business and rollback of programs for the poor, Albert said. In his opening remarks, Ford indicated he was

moving toward tax cuts for the poor, who he said had been hit hardest by inflation. "This administration will seek to ensure that burdens are distributed equally," he said. Noting the presence of observers from other nations, Ford also said inflation is an international problem and the United States will "consult with friends abroad as we move to combat an international threat." The President confirmed what many observers had expected — that he made a significant start in preparing an anti-inflation program even in advance of the summit. "We are already narrowing some of the options to those which would appear most effective and command widest support," he said. Ford said the summit, like a dozen preliminary conferences this month, "is wide open." He continued: "All views and opinions are invited. This administration's commitment to visible and responsive government remains intact. I might not like everything I hear. But it is my solemn duty as President of the United States to give fair consideration to all views and to carefully weigh the possible courses of action." Restating a caution against expectation of "quick or easy solutions," Ford said: "No miracle cure has emerged from the pre-conference meetings. Inflation is a problem which we must deal with patiently and persistently... It will require sacrifice and common effort. It will require discipline, but we will win." Ford said the summit was "in the tradition of the American town hall" and represented a joint executive-legislative initiative undertaken in response to a bipartisan congressional recommendation.

State, County Seeking Jail Space Solutions

Gov. Reubin Askew today appointed a committee of state officials to propose by Monday preliminary, short-range solutions to overcrowded prisons, telling the panel to submit a final report by next Friday. The action came in the wake of State Corrections Director Louis Wainwright's order Thursday halting for an indefinite period the transfer of new prisoners to state facilities due to overcrowding. Seminole County Commissioners and sheriff's department officials locally, were trying to meet their own overcrowded jail problem today, attempting to find solutions before the traditionally high jail population winter months arrive. George Proudfoot, Seminole jail administrator, said today the 84 bed capacity county jail at Sanford currently has a population of 89 and five additional female prisoners are being held in the Orange County jail. Five prisoners were to have been transferred to the state prison system reception center at Lake Butler next week, but that plan now has been cancelled due to Wainwright's order. He said 10 to 15 additional prisoners could possibly be housed in the jail's drunk tank. But, this is strictly against state regulations, Proudfoot said because of the lack of beds and shower facilities there. "After that I don't know what we would do if other counties refuse our excess prisoners," Proudfoot said, noting that the Lake County jail which has been used by Seminole is now overcrowded itself and Orange County's facilities are almost to capacity. In light of the state situation, Proudfoot said, Volusia and Brevard counties would be reluctant to overtax their facilities with Seminole prisoners, too. Even approval by Seminole voters in the November general election of the proposed \$3.5 million bond issue for a new county jail would not solve the immediate problem, Proudfoot said, noting construction time would be two to three years. A near perfect solution, which would have handled Seminole's jail population until 1980, was the lease of Building 310 (which housed 300 sailors when the Sanford Naval Air Station was

open) from the Sanford Airport Authority, Proudfoot said. Airport Authority Director J. S. (Red) Cleveland said today, however, the possibility of the county leasing Building 310 is "a dead issue." The airport authority must be able to control activities at the airport and thus wished to retain the option of cancelling the lease at two-year intervals. The county on the other hand felt it had to be able to assure automatic lease renewal for a period of 10 years to justify the expense of converting the building into a jail facility. County Commissioner Sid Viblen, in charge of the jail project, in a letter to Askew Thursday, said Wainwright's action "severely endangers our ability to maintain a functional orderly jail operation," asking that specific state-county arrangements be made to accommodate overcrowded conditions that will arise because of the state order. Viblen slammed state and federal jail guidelines, saying they leaned too much toward requiring "motel-like" conditions for prisoners.

Two Senators To Visit Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sens. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., and Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., will visit Cuba this weekend, signaling what is widely believed to be the beginning of a normalization of relations between Cuba and the United States. The two senators, both members of the Foreign Relations Committee, are keeping their travel plans under wraps, fearing they may be subject to reprisals from Cuban exiles who adamantly oppose any U.S.-Cuban reconciliation. Javits and Pell will be the first members of Congress to visit the island since relations were broken in the waning days of the Eisenhower administration in 1961. It was understood they will have a meeting with Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro. Speculation over a changing Cuban attitude toward the United States has been fueled by a Cuban decision to allow more than 20 representatives of the American news media to cover the activities of the two senators. Over the past several years, only a handful of American newsmen have been allowed to visit the island. The visit by Javits and Pell is a follow-up to a July visit to Cuba by Pat M. Holt, the chief of staff of the Foreign Relations Committee. Holt issued a report on his return recommending that the United States take initiatives to end the 13-year U.S.-Cuban estrangement. He described the U.S.-supported hemispheric blockade of the island as a failure. With the resignation last August of President Richard M. Nixon, an avowed anti-Castroite, Cuban attitudes toward the United States seemed to undergo a marked change. Declaring that the Nixon years in the White House were a period of "intransigence and hatred" toward Cuba, Castro expressed optimism over the prospects for an improved relationship. President Ford, meanwhile, told a news conference a month ago that his administration still sticks by the Organization of American States embargo of the island. But last week, the United States threw its support behind a proposal in the OAS to call a November meeting of hemispheric foreign ministers to review the sanctions. The ministers are expected to vote to lift the embargo, and Ford has said that the United States will go along with whatever collective decisions the OAS arrives at. The lifting of the embargo would free all OAS members to legally establish the kind of relations they desire with Cuba. Seven nations now have ties with Cuba in violation of the embargo. Diplomats predict there will be continuing friendly gestures between Washington and Havana as part of a process that ultimately will lead to diplomatic relations.

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State Reviews Three Rivers Plan

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A new aspect of environment protection will come before the Cabinet next Wednesday when state planners challenge a developer over plans for a new Lake County town with a projected population of 50,000. After months of wrestling with ways to control development along beaches and with buying endangered lands, the Cabinet will hear its first appeal on a development of regional impact. The landmark Land and Water Management Act of July 1, 1973, gives the Cabinet final say in developments that would affect more than one county. The first one in which regional and state planners could not agree with local government is the Three Rivers Development, planned by Major Realty Co. of Orlando. The Lake County Commission approved plans to build 18,000 homes over 20 years on a 5,800-acre site near Volusia, Seminole and Orange Counties. The East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, Seminole County and the state Planning Division appealed, saying the area is unsuitable for such development. A state hearing officer recommended that the Cabinet send the project back for more information on what the developer will do to provide water, get rid of sewage and storm water, and handle traffic. Charles Wells, representing Major Realty, told Cabinet officials Thursday that his firm was offering a compromise to "accomplish the same things the hearing examiner said should be done." He asked that approval be given to Lake County's action changing the zoning from agricultural, with the assurance that no structures would be built until the plans were submitted to the Cabinet. He said the firm did not want to go to the expense of developing the plans without assurance that construction would not be blocked by zoning. Louis Hubener, Planning Division counsel, said approving the zoning would endorse the entire project and allow further review only in stages. The entire project should be examined as a package, he said. "I don't believe the concept will work," Hubener said. "The traffic problems boggle the mind."
