

Humphrey Fund Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) - Jack L. Chestnut, former campaign manager for Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn, has been named in a sworn statement as the man who set up an illegal \$12,000 corporate payment for Humphrey's 1970 Senate campaign. Barry Nova, an advertising executive who worked on the campaign, said Chestnut asked him to submit \$12,000 worth of Humphrey advertising bills to Associated Milk Producers Inc., the nation's largest dairy cooperative. The co-op has admitted paying the bills illegally from corporate funds.

EPA Bans Pesticides

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Environmental Protection Agency banned manufacture of aldrin and dieldrin, two pesticides suspected of causing cancer. EPA officials also said the agency is seriously concerned about the lack of authority for EPA to test chemicals in public commerce for possible serious health effects.

Schizoid Eye Test

CHICAGO (AP) - University of Chicago researchers claim to have found an eye test that can identify persons prone to schizophrenia before they actually get sick. Schizophrenia is a severe and widespread emotional disturbance. It involves a retreat from reality with disordered thinking, delusions and hallucinations. The Chicago report claims that persons with an inherited tendency toward schizophrenia can be identified with a test involving measurement of eyeball movements while watching a swinging pendulum. The report, by Dr. Philip S. Holzman and his colleagues, appears in the August issue of the Archives of General Psychiatry, published by the American Medical Association. The ability to identify family members whose eyeball movements show the same unusual pattern found in schizophrenics means it may now be possible to treat such persons before they actually manifest the disease.

Carpenters Want Raise

CHICAGO (AP) - The nation's carpenters, trying to are going after contracts containing pay hikes of 12 to 14 per cent and maybe even more, building ndustry sources say. U.N. officials said Friday that the cease-fire ine was mostly defined with the exception of a section in the contested western Kyrenia mountains. The four parties are trying to implement a U.N. Security Council call for the 3,400 U.N. peacekeeping troops to move between the Greek Cypriot and Turkish forces.

Sampson Predicts War

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) - Nikos Sampson, who was president of Cyprus for one stormy week, warns there would be civil war if Archbishop Makarios returns to the island republic. "If Makarios loves his country he should not return," said Sampson, a former terrorist in the EOKA guerrilla movement formed in the 1950s to free the island from British rule. Sampson became president when the Greek-led national guard overthrew President Makarios in a coup July 15. He was forced to resign after

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) - The Saigon command eported fighting today near several district towns below Da Nang, and said 40 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong were killed. Government losses were listed as five wounded in the 18th straight day of fighting in the region 360 miles northeast of Saigon. On the central coast a sixmile stretch of north-south highway was reported cut by intense fighting, a Saigon communique said.







'Good' News Can't Match Funny News

The news media is always being criticized for not printing "good news."

The fact that there is very little good news to print seems to be lost on the critics; after all, you can hardly expect people to applaud someone for not mugging an old lady.

And we recall that several years ago some enterprising newspaperman on the West Coast decided to cash in on this public outcry by syndicating a column of "shorts" of "good news" from around the country; Firemen rescuing cats from trees, teenagers collecting money to help feed and clothe a destitute family, etc.

It is our recollection that the column was

something less than a howling success; it is our certain knowledge that one newspaper ran it as a daily feature — a full column of type — for several years without receiving even one letter or telephone call acknowledging its existance.

But we stray from the point. If there isn't enough "good news" there's certainly enough "funny news" to make your daily newspaper a terrific investment in these troubled times.

What, for instance, could be funnier than New York City losing and then finding \$5.4 million in because previous auditors just didn't look hard enough." That in itself is enough to make the poor New York City taxpayer, who gets short shrift from public officials from the local ward boss right up to the governor's office in Albany, to laugh because it hurts too much to cry. But the New York City story is even funnier when one considers that its mayor is one Abe Beame who had been City Controller since shortly after the white men swindled the Indians out of ownership of the place. So when Beane became mayor his successor started going over the books and found the "lost" 5.4 million. The task force found all but \$84,001 of the elusive securities and another \$114,000 no one had even mentioned as being missing in the earlier report. 

State Real Estate Warranty Writers Baffle Buyers Agency Expands

By JULIAN STENSTROM

The Florida Real Estate Commission-the agency which regulates the real estate profession in this state—finally got to the wheels in Tallahassee during the recent legislative session and for the first time in years it seems the commission will have, at last, the money to provide the personnel to do a far more effective

For example, the 1974-75 salary budget for the commission has been raised to permit an increase in staff personnel from 73

The hiring of these new employes will aid tremendously in reducing the backlog of investigations, the handling of new applications from would-be registrants, giving examinations to applicants, and in the process of licensing those who successfully

Now, before anybody jumps off the deep end, let's make it plain that none of the tax dollars paid by the people of Florida are expended for the operation of the Florida Real Estate Com-

The commission pays its own way from examination fees and license fees collected by the commission from those it regulates. As a matter of fact, the Florida Real Estate Commission does not only pay its own way but it also returns a percentage of its collections each year to the state's general fund.

In past years the problem has been that the commission has not been allowed to use its own funds to provide the necessary personnel and operating expenses to keep the Commission abreast of its many activities.

Under the new setup the commission will be allowed to carry on investigations of non-registrant activities in Florida. It's been no secret that some people throughout this state "practice" real estate in one way or another without being registered. The placing of additional attorneys on the commission's legal staff will enable the regulatory agency to look into reports of these activities and institute proper procedures to curtail such illegal procedures on the part of non-registrants.

Additionally, the commission's staff of investigators will be enlarged to check on brokerage offices, particularly in the area of trust escrow accounts.

You see, anytime a broker accepts an earnest money deposit on a contract that deposit must be placed almost immediately in the broker's special trust escrow account which he is required by Let's assume that a brokerage office has 22 sales in the mill

and the total of the earnest money deposits is \$52,000.

Contracts Checked

Florida Real Estate Commission investigators are subject to walking into a real estate brokerage office and check the contracts. They will determine the amount of money that should be in the broker's trust escrow account and then go to the bank to make an actual check. Should that money not be there, the brokerage office would be

in the hottest of hot water. Of course, anytime a self-sustaining agency such as the

Florida Real Estate Commission increases a budget by these proportions it is usually necessary to increase its fees. The commission is no exception. Consequently, new fee schedules are now in effect.

For example, an individual applying for a broker's license is subject to a \$50 fee, an individual applying for a salesman's license is subject to a \$25 fee and a license renewal fee for a broker is now \$20 a year. A \$10 per year fee is charged for the renewal of a salesman's license. The Commission will charge \$5 for a non-active registration or

license renewal, \$10 for re-issuing a license when a registrant changes his office or his address, and \$20 to register a branch

To give you an idea of the workload of the commission's staff has faced, during the period July 1, 1973 through May 31, 1974, they examined 29,195 new applicants and approved the applications of 25,883. Right now the Commission has about 100,000 registrants.

Deceptive Practice

The Florida Cabinet has adopted a new rule which should perclude the possibility of a buyer of real estate from going to the closing table only to discover there are closing costs about which the buyer knew nothing.

To be sure, this has happened in the past. But it's not likely to According to the new rule, "It shall be an unfair or a deceptive

act or practice for any person who engages in the trade or commerce of selling or procuring the sale of real property to fail to disclose in writing to the buyer before the buyer signs a contract for sale the following: "(1) A warning that upon closing the sale of the real property dditional costs may be demanded from the buyer in the form of

closing cost. Such warning shall include a list of known major

closing cost items (but not the dollar amount unless known) to be charged to the buyer in the transaction such as attorney's fees, title insurance, other insurance, taxes, abstract charges, escrow fees, document stamps, recording fees, discount points, survey charges, mortgage transfer or service fee or any other major cost assumed by the buyer. "(2) A statement that the person procuring the sale of the real property is the agent of the seller of the real property, if such is

When these developers put in these new subdivisions, I would like to know who pays for the street, curbs, sewers and water lines that serve these homes?

I've been told that it is true that the air space over a parcel of real property can be separated from the rest of the property and actually be sold. Is this correct?

It is. There are three components of real property. One is the surface, the second is the ground underneath, and the third is the air space above the land. Under Florida law they can be sold together or independently. Just as mineral rights under the ground can be reserved, air rights also can be retained. However, there are limits. Air space over 1,000 feet in congested areas and 500 feet elsewhere is considered to be in the same category as

A friend of mine has advised me that I should hesitate to enter into a contractual agreement with a certain party because the party may not be legally competent. Could you tell me what

We're not attorneys so we advise you to contact your lawyer to get his counsel in such a case. However, we can tell you that competent parties are necessary to a good contractual agreement. And, we might also add that by competent parties it is meant that both of the parties to the contract, speaking generally, must be of legal age and mentally competent. In the case of age, some states permit minors to enter into legal contracts but also give them the right to disaffirm the agreement when they reach majority. In the case of mental competence, the parties to the contract must be fully capable of understanding what they are doing. But again, we suggest you discuss your case with your

We are a young couple and are planning to buy a five-ocre parcel of land for the purpose of building a home. We looked at a tract of land and were told by the person who owns it that if we bought it the deed would contain a restriction that we could not divide the land and sell half of it later. Does the owner have the right to place such a restriction on us in this case?

Yes, he does. It is obvious that the owner of the land you wish to purchase desires to keep the area in a low density status and he and his neighbors want to maintain this status indefinitely. If this restriction does not meet with your approval you, of course, do not have to purchase the property. But, if you do you will be bound by the restriction in the deed conveying title to the property to you and your husband. If you're going to contemplate such a perchase let us suggest you seek legal advice. In a situation such as this you want to be absolutely sure you know what you're doing.
