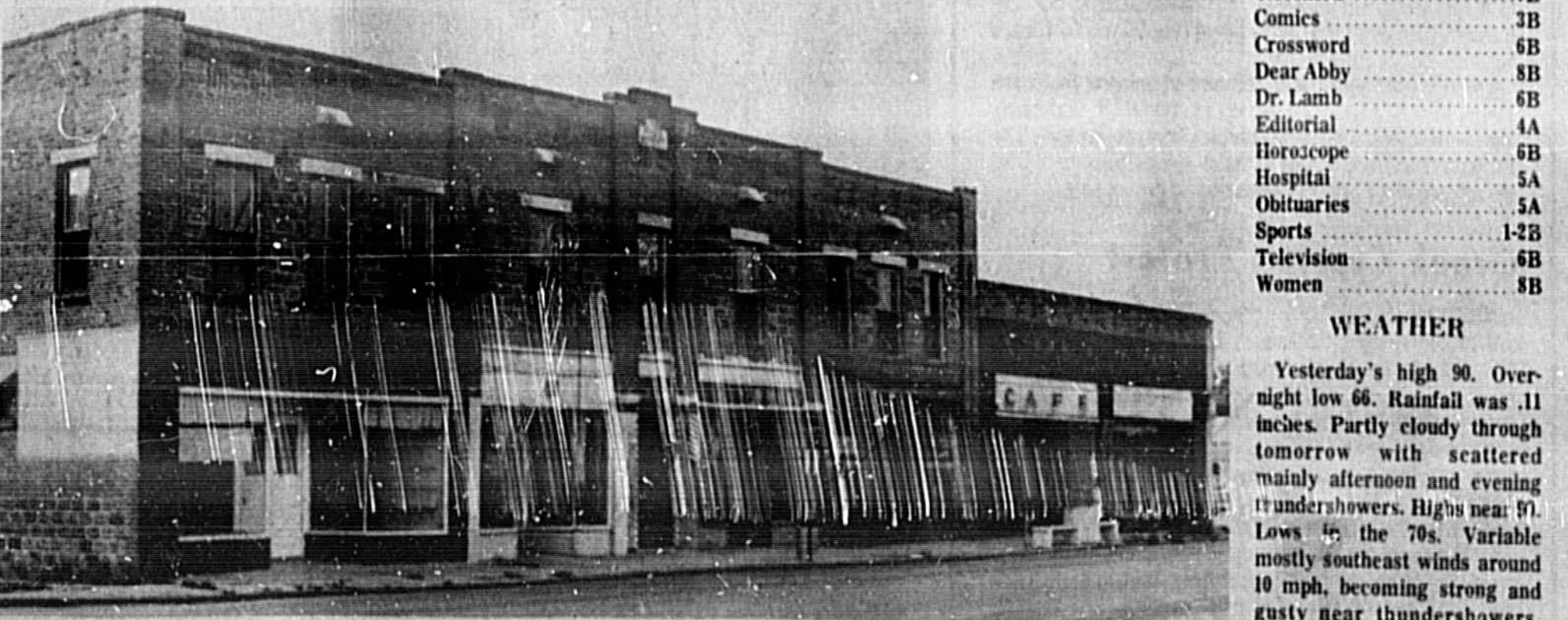

NATION IN BRIEF

Postal Union Chief Threatens Strike

WASHINGTON (AP) — A nationwide postal strike is threatened next week if union and management officials fail to agree on a new two-year contract for 600,000 postal workers.

"There will be no mail deliveries next Monday morning if we can't reach agreement within the week," warned President James H. Rademacher of the National Association of Letter Carriers.

Even though postal workers are forbidden by law from striking, Rademacher says "if we have no contract we have a right to withhold our services."

The letter carriers union is one of four unions whose contracts with the Postal Service expire at midnight Sunday. Should the parties fail to reach agreement on their own, the law authorizes fact-finding and, finally, binding arbitration as a means of resolving their dispute.

It also would be possible for both sides to agree to an extension of the old contract, a step that federal mediators are likely to recommend.

FBI Burglaries Weighed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department is weighing the legality of burglaries conducted by the FBI to gain information considered necessary for national security.

Department spokesman Robert Havel said Monday that officials will review the circumstances of the break-ins. But he said any criminal charges might be barred by the statute of limitations, which prevents federal prosecutions for most offenses after five years.

Havel said it is Atty. Gen. Edward H. Levi's policy and the department's policy that burglary is a legal tactic to gather foreign intelligence in limited cases.

Gasoline Price Hike Seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford's proposal to end domestic oil price controls could increase the cost of gasoline by 7 cents a gallon and raise consumer prices by nearly 1 percent, administration spokesmen say.

The over-all impact would cost the average family \$200 a year in higher energy prices.

Administration officials say this is the price the nation must pay to increase its supplies of domestically produced oil and to conserve energy.

Race Complaint Made

KEYES, Calif. (AP) — Oliver Green and family moved here last fall to escape the "bother and commotion" of big city life. Now he says he keeps two loaded guns by his bed as protection after being insulted on the street and harassed by speeding cars.

"I got called Nigger, you know. Cars rubbed back close to me," Green says.

"I still don't believe this stuff really happened," Green, 47, said in an interview. "None of it makes sense. Sure has changed my image of this town, though."

WORLD IN BRIEF

U.S. Seeks Removal

Of Cuban Trade Ban

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) — The United States is proposing another meeting of the Organization of American States at the end of the month to speed up the removal of the remnants of the organization's 11-year-old ban on trade and diplomatic relations with Cuba.

Delegates from the 21 OAS members begin a 12-day meeting in San Jose on Wednesday to consider a proposal to require only a majority vote instead of the present two-thirds to remove the quarantine the organization voted against Fidel Castro's Communist regime in 1964.

However, the voting change could not be put into effect until ratified by the 21 signers of the organization's Mutual Defense Treaty, a process that could take years. Knowledgeable sources said the United States is putting its support behind a proposal to get around this.

Pathet Lao Troops Remain

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Pathet Lao guards continued to occupy the U.S. Information Service's warehouse today despite a government order to vacate it, an Embassy spokesman reported.

The Embassy reported Monday that an official of the Foreign Ministry informed it that the warehouse would be returned to Embassy control at 5 p.m. Monday. But the Embassy spokesman said leftist demonstrators ordered the Pathet Lao troops not to leave, and they were still there today.

"There's always a communication problem in Laos," said an American diplomat. "It is something for the Foreign Ministry and the student vigilantes to thrash out."

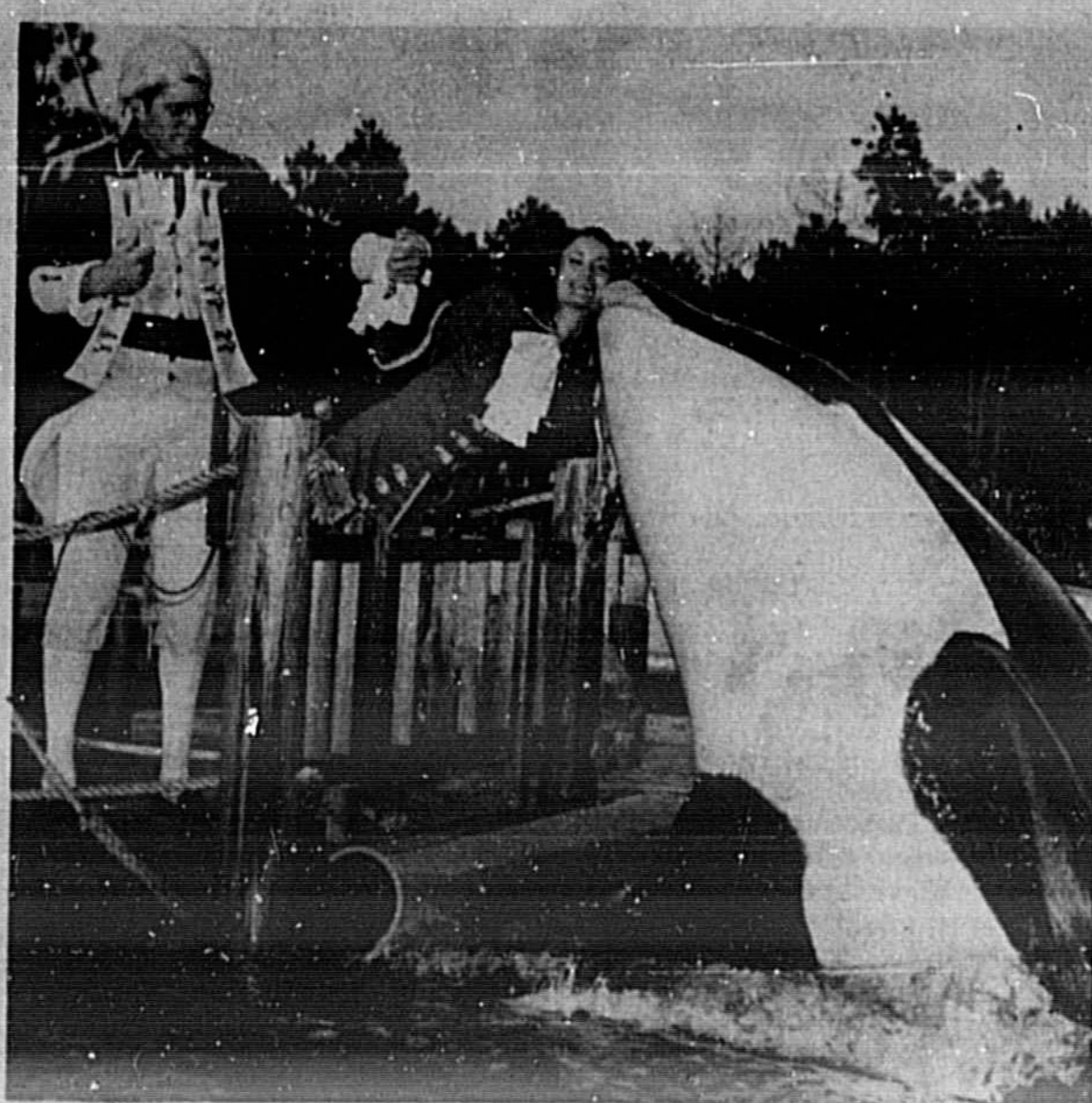
The demonstrators and the armed guards from the Communist Pathet Lao occupied two U.S. Embassy warehouses and a housing complex two weeks ago. The Embassy has been unable to make any arrangements for the release of the other warehouse and the housing.

Greek Cypriots Protest

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Greek Orthodox church bells toll at dawn today to launch a week of protests and demonstrations in the Greek-Cypriot part of Cyprus marking the overthrow of President Makarios a year ago today and the Turkish invasion five days later.

A one-day general strike was called today and rallies were scheduled in all towns to express support for Makarios, denounce his foes in the EOKA-B underground and call for the withdrawal of the Turkish army.

Makarios was speared from the back of his head in his presidential palace in Nicosia from which the Greek Army officers of the national guard drove him on July 15, 1974, when they launched their short-lived coup to unite Cyprus with Greece.

Councilman Balks At Insurance Cost

Bond Issue May Be Illegal, Zacco Says

CASSELBERRY — Councilman John Zacco last night said the City Council's okay to float a \$2 million bond issue "may be illegal" and is a matter for an investigation by the state attorney's office.

"I don't know if it's illegal, but it possibly could be. Other sources have indicated it is," Zacco said.

The \$2 million is earmarked for purchase of General Waterworks Corp., a Winter Park based utility which operates in Seminole County.

"Are you aware of what you're saying?" Council Chairman Edith Duerr asked.

Zacco said a bonding plan proposed by Harvey Henann, a private investment banker, increases expenses to the city by adding on a \$5,000 to \$61,000 insurance charge.

"This one-time expense (insurance) puts the entire proposition in a more favorable light."

Suit Settlement Offer Approved

WINTER SPRINGS — An offer to settle a false arrest suit was authorized by the City Council last night and a substitute city judge and prosecutor were approved to hear a separate case involving the city's ordinance against keeping a vicious dog.

The Council authorized City Attorney Newman Brock to make a settlement offer of \$1,250 with no implication of guilt in the civil action suit against the city by Donald Clark Albritton on the false arrest charge. The arrest occurred in 1974 and several law enforcement officers have been named as co-defendants with the city.

Brock told the Council the plaintiff's attorney is demanding \$2,500, but he doesn't feel the case has a settlement value above \$1,250.

Because the city judge and prosecutor switched jobs, a temporary attorney and judge will be hired for the case.

At the time of Albritton's arrest the city did not have a false arrest ordinance.

Brock withdrew as city prosecutor and Ned Woolfolk as municipal judge in another case, the city vs. Walter H. Bergen. The Council authorized hiring of Casselberry Attorney John Jones to prosecute the case and Wallace F. Stalnaker Jr., also of Casselberry, to conduct court on the night which the case will come up.

The ordinance against keeping a vicious dog was invoked against Brock Nov. 18. At the time, Brock was serving as city judge and Woolfolk as city prosecutor, but when the roles were later reversed, the case was transferred to county courts at the request of the defense attorney.

It was sent back to the city recently because the state does not have a comparable law. The case, expected to be on the July 31 court docket, is the first involving the animal control ordinance.

Woolfolk told the Council the number of pleas coming before municipal court no longer justifies holding two plea nights a month. Effective Aug. 1, plea night will be on the first Thursday and trial night on the third Thursday each month, saving the city \$100 per month in salary.

The judge explained the number of pleas has been cut in half since Jan. 1, because of the new state law decriminalizing

Commission Rescinds Deduction Decision

Seminole County Commissioners yesterday rescinded a decision to stop payroll deductions from county employees paychecks for cancer insurance premiums, pending further study.

In June, the Commission passed a motion to halt deductions on Aug. 1 from employees who were signed by individual cancer policies with National Savings Life Insurance Company of Casselberry. Yesterday, in an insurance work session, the Commission decided to compile more information on the insurance deductions since the decision would affect approximately 160 employees.

The Board instructed County Insurance Coordinator Betty Neuman to "get some more information," according to Commissioner John Kimbrough. He said the service is "an employee convenience."

Mrs. Neuman made the original recommendation to the Commission for the county to stop "selling insurance" and Commissioner Mike Hattaway made a motion to the board on Mrs. Neuman's recommendation.

Following the June Commission action, National Life Insurance, effective Jan. 1, employees are covered for cancer. She says, however, that some employees may not understand they are covered under the group policy.

"There's no reason in the world why that recommendation to stop payroll deductions should have been made," McElmurry said yesterday. He said, "I don't intend to forget the employees."

Burglars Have Big Weekend

Officers said the door to the north side of the trailer had been forced by use of a pry tool. Jesse Oglesby, 23, 1701 West First St., reported the theft of a stereo and tape player valued at \$234 from his home between 11:30 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. Sunday.

Police said the front door of the residence was forced open.

Police in Casselberry reported household goods valued at \$1,270 was taken from a home at 1076 Crystal Blvd. Circle.

Six guns, a watch and cash were taken from the residence which was entered by breaking the window pane of the front door.

The Casselberry burglary, coupled with a theft in Altamonte Springs and south Seminole, brought the total to over \$5,000 in one day, according to police records.

SEA, School Board Teams Debate Grievance Procedure

The question of whether principals may file grievances against teachers was taken up by Seminole Education Association (SEA) and school board negotiators this morning.

Talks resumed today after a two-week vacation requested by SEA. The grievance section of SEA's 75-page contract proposal was tabled after the two factions failed to agree earlier this year.

Basicly, controversy centers on whether the board and its representatives may file grievances against teachers—the same as teachers would be allowed to file against administrators.

“Administrators have always had the right to grieve against teachers. We still object to that right being a part of the contract,” SEA Executive Director Gene Grooms said.

But Harry Pelley, the board's chief negotiator, still maintains it's a “two-way street. It takes two parties to make an agreement.”

“There are details which we are still checking,” Fulewider said.

Jay Raymond Perkins, 30, 801 Thomas Barber Drive, Melbourne, is scheduled to go to jail on charges of resisting an officer with violence to his person after his arrest during the investigation of an accident involving a school zone sign.

Perkins filed a complaint with Casseberry Police Chief George Karcher and Mayor Bill Grier that he was beaten about the face, kicked in the legs and ribs, maced and jailed for several hours without being allowed a telephone call or prompt medical attention.

Conditional Zoning Ordinance Vetoed

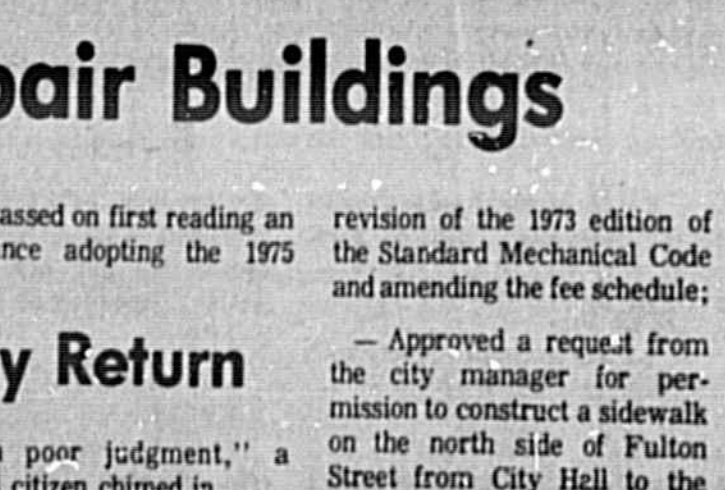

LONGWOOD—An ordinance designed to halt zoning speculation in the city, adopted five weeks ago by the City Council, was vetoed by Mayor James R. Lormann last night.

Although, according to the city charter, the veto could be overridden by a simple majority vote, City Council members last night indicated Lormann's veto will stand.

Lormann, in his first veto since assuming office six months ago, issued a lengthy message saying the ordinance would create instability in the city's zoning and lead to poor planning practices. He also stated that it is unconstitutional and directly contrary to a recent opinion issued by Florida Attorney General Robert Shevin.

The ordinance, recommended by the Zoning Commission, was sponsored through a Council bill ranging over a two month period by Councilman Gerard Connell. It called for all rezoning to be conditional, reverting to original designations after one year if development had not begun.

“I recall the last time the American League won one I was the starting pitcher,” said the Oakland A's lefthander. “I don't see Jiminy Gask in the crowd here, but maybe that gives us a little advantage. There is no Greek here in my mind the American League is just as good as the National.”

The American League, led by seven players from the world champion A's, will try to back up Blue's boast in baseball's 46th midsummer showcase at Milwaukee County Stadium tonight (8:30 p.m. EDT).

The American League's only victory in the last 12 All-Star games was by a 5-4 score in Detroit in 1971.

Now, Brown wasn't describing Jim Brown, the veteran coach's superstar in the 1950s, but one of the other 25 NFL clubs can claim him.

“Lessez has ... and knee for all normal life purposes, but not for playing football,” said Brown. “If he continues to play, he puts himself in jeopardy. I can't play him under these circumstances and I must go along with the opinions of our doctors.”

Johnson, one of the many pro players to come out of Grambling University in Louisiana, doesn't agree with the three Bengal team physicians who say there is a strong risk factor of permanent injury if the 5-foot-10, 200-pounder continues to play. Johnson had knee surgery twice in the past 18 months.

“I feel as if the knee can withstand anything,” said Johnson after returning to his Shreveport, La., home from the Cincinnati training camp. “I was figuring on playing one or two more years.”

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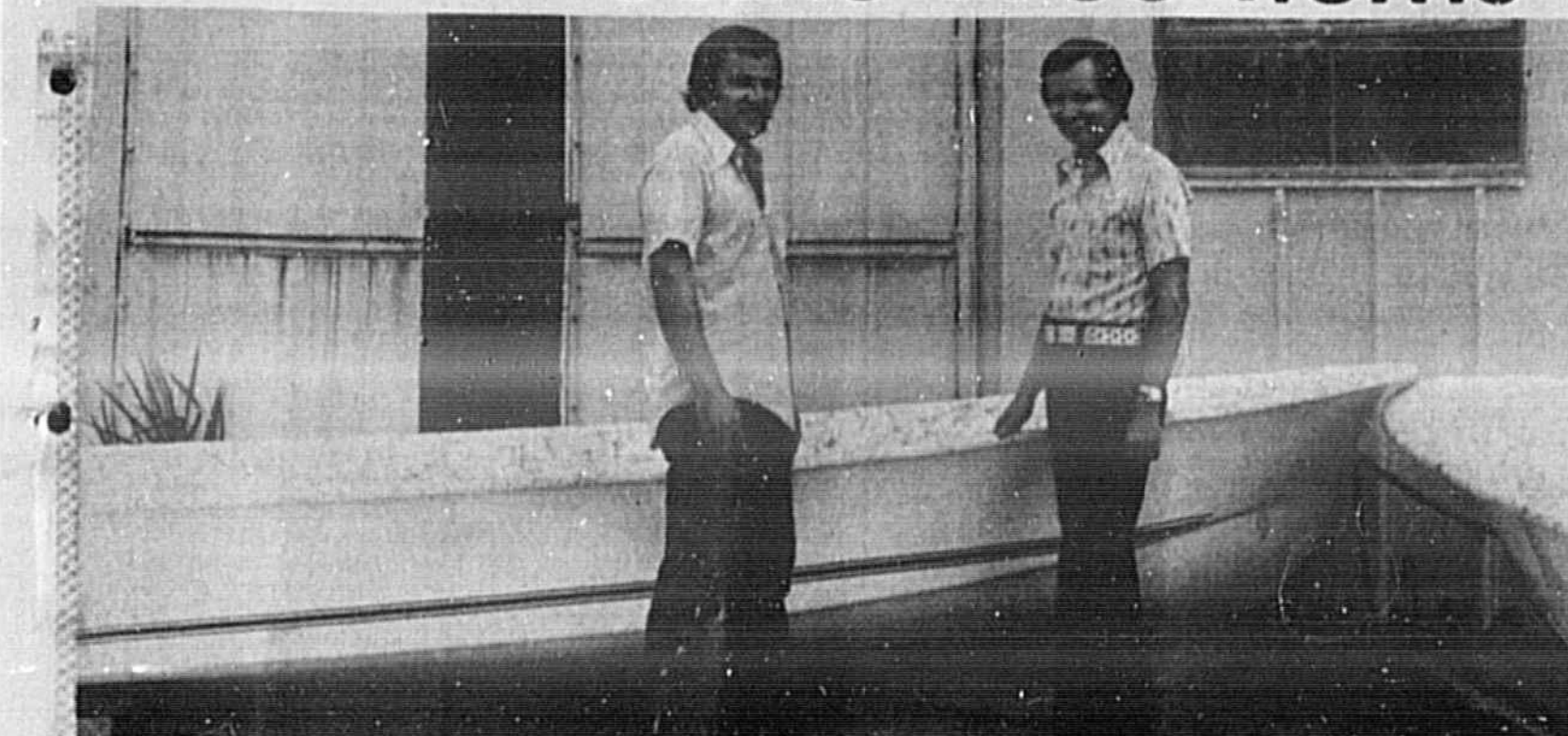
