Truman Urges Unity Of American Nations

Western Hemisphere Republics Called On To Eradicate Causes Of Conflict

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15. (AP)—President Truman has called on the nations of the western hemisphere to help eradicate the poverty and despair which breed wars. Speaking at a Pan-American Day observance in Washington, Mr. Truman declared that the American republics must stick together and fight what he called "the forces of reaction in the great and dangerous adventure of the atomic age."

That age, he said, either will be one of complete devastation, or one in which new sources of power will lighten the labors of mankind and increase living standards all over the world.

The President went on to say that he will not eliminate the deeper roots of war merely by staying ready to crack down on aggression. The two world wars, he said, were caused by more than aggression. Underneath the Nazi madness, he declared, were the material distress and spiritual starvation born of poverty and despair.

Mr. Truman addressed the governing board of the Pan-American Union.

Army Criticized For Activities In Behalf Of Merger

WASHINGTON, April 15. (AP)—Republican Senator Edward Robertson of Wyoming criticized the Army today for its activities in behalf of unification of the armed forces. Senator Robertson, a member of the Naval Affairs Committee, declared that the Army is conducting what he described as an intensive lobbying and propaganda campaign for unification.

Robertson in a Senate speech called on President Truman to extend to all branches of the armed services an order he issued to the Navy on this subject, an order which the Senator called a "muzzling order." The Senator said he felt it was unfortunate that the President made the statement he did last week—a statement that the Navy is expected to support the merger plan and discontinue expressing opposition to it.

Senator Robertson said he felt the only fair thing for the President to do is either to rescind his ban on Navy opposition to the merger or put the same ban on the Army against lobbying in favor of unification.

Remnants Of German Spy Ring Nabbed

Seven Axis Nationals Arrested Following Intensive Search Throughout Orient

SHANGHAI, Apr. 15. (AP)—The remnants of a once-powerful German directed espionage network in the Orient are in American custody today after months of intensive search by United States military and intelligence agencies. Seven Axis nationals have been arrested, all of them described as remnants of the spy network which operated in the Orient four months after Germany surrendered.

All seven—four Germans, two Italians and one Japanese—have been charged with war crimes because of their activities—allegedly hostile to the United States. The seven also are accused of violating the German surrender terms by continuing to operate until as late as last September.

American authorities in Shanghai say the arrests mark the culmination of one of the most important roundups of international figures yet concluded in the Far East.

Presumably the seven will be tried in China since American officers say there are sufficient witnesses in the Far East to testify against them.

Marine Capt. Frank E. Zell of New York City has identified German Lieut. Col. Ludwig Ehrhardt as the leader of the group. Zell says Ehrhardt was a personal friend of Adolf Hitler and had headed the fifth column sent into the Balkans in the late 1930's.

American authorities say that so far, not a single German agent in the Far East has been arrested since the war ended. They added that arrests of other minor Axis agents may be expected later.

1,000,000 Vegetable Plants Purchased For Georgia Farms

W. B. Norris and Dr. E. J. Pedrick of Quitman, Ga., who maintain truck farms of more than 2,000 acres in south Georgia, have purchased more than 1,000,000 vegetable plants from John Hill, Lake Monroe plant grower.

At the Valdes Hotel this morning, Dr. Pedrick said that the plants are being taken today to Georgia by truck, and that he was hoping for rain in the area in order to relieve the dry spell and facilitate planting.

Many types of vegetable plants are included in the order which consists mainly of peppers, eggplants and tomatoes. He highly praised the quality of Mr. Hill's plants and said that this was the third year he had been to make purchases from him. Both Dr. Pedrick and Mr. Norris are active in Masonic work they declared.

Peterson Lauded By Farm Bureau For Work On Price And Rationing Board

PRESIDENT TRUMAN LAYS WREATH ON FDR'S GRAVE



WASHINGTON, Apr. 15. (AP)—The government announced today that more wartime slaughter controls will be restored as a means of curbing black markets in meat. The announcement was made jointly by the OPA and the Agricultural Department. They said a slaughter quota system will be put into effect shortly to provide "better distribution of the country's present meat supply through established channels and at ceiling prices."

The OPA said the quota system will cut down the operations of some slaughterers who, in the words of the announcement, "have increased their slaughter greatly during recent months." This will make it possible, said the OPA, for established packers to obtain more livestock and bring their production to levels more nearly normal.

Earlier the Justice Department said the FBI has been asked to look into complaints that many packers have attempted to get government subsidies through false claims after buying cattle at black market prices.

The Senate Agriculture Committee heard an affidavit of William L. Wilson, one of the big four packers, that the trouble his firm has in getting livestock. He said the supply has become so low that his company will be unable to furnish New York and Brooklyn customers next week only about two per cent of the meat they bought from five years ago.

As to the quota system, the OPA emphasized that it will not cut down on the amount of livestock slaughtered. The sole purpose, it said, is to divide the available supply equitably. The effective date of the order was set but OPA said it would be announced in a few days.

Vandals Placed Under Arrest In Butte Disorders

BUTTE, Mont., Apr. 15. (AP)—Sheriff Al McLeod has announced that he and his ten deputies have made several arrests in connection with the violence which has kept the residents of Butte on edge for two nights.

The sheriff declined to say how many persons are being held. He described those taken into custody as all juveniles and said they had been arrested for looting. The sheriff indicated that several of the suspects are girls.

Other authorities said the vandals that have been terrorizing Butte and its suburbs over the weekend were mostly women and young children.

Saturday night and again last night gangs of men, women, and teenagers roamed the streets in automobiles and trucks. They were armed with axes. The crowds stopped at private dwellings to smash windows and doors, and these week-end furniture out of the homes.

Two boys have been wounded by gunfire during the disturbances. One boy was hurt when a bullet penetrated the windshield of the family automobile. The other was hit by a rifle bullet while walking on the street.

Police Chief Hart Riley says that most of the homes damaged were occupied by miners who remained on the job when 3500 workers struck at the Anaconda copper mine.

The union strike committee has declared that neither the union nor its members are responsible for the disorders. A statement issued by the committee called on both union members and the general public to help maintain order.

Officials of the Anaconda Copper Mining Company have made no comment. The strike was called last Tuesday in a dispute over retroactive pay.

Envoy Is Told To Withdraw Iranian Complaint On Reds

TEHRAN, April 15. (AP)—Iranian Propaganda Minister Amir-Abbas Mirza today announced that Iran's ambassador to Washington, Hussein Ali, has been instructed to withdraw immediately Iran's complaint on Russia now before the United Nations Security Council.

Iran previously had made an issue before the U. N. council over the continued presence of Red Army Troops in Iran. Moscow says now these troops will be withdrawn from Iran. Iran's complaint no longer exist as a result of the Russian agreement. Said the propaganda minister in a formal statement given to newsmen in Tehran.

The conditions and circumstances which dictated the giving of the complaint to the Security Council no longer arise. Yesterday afternoon the Russian ambassador categorically reiterated that complete and unconditional evacuation by the Red Army would be completed May 6. Instructions have been sent this morning by the Persian Government informing its representative in New York of the new pledge of the Soviet Government and instructing him immediately to withdraw the complaint before the Security Council.

Witness Blames Kaltenbrunner For War Crimes

MUERBERG, Apr. 15. (AP)—The United States prosecution warring from a defense witness under cross-examination today an admission that former Nazi Security Police Chief Ernst Kaltenbrunner was responsible for all orders for individual executions in German concentration camps.

The witness was the former commandant of the infamous Dachsau Concentration Camp—Rudolf Hoess. The witness told that Kaltenbrunner and his staff not only were responsible for execution orders, but also for commitments.

The testimony of the former torture camp commandant was regarded as the most damaging to date against Kaltenbrunner. The former security police chief had built his defense largely on the contention that he was being under orders and was not responsible for the crimes of which he is accused.

Recent formation of a committee to plan for better housing, sanitation, and health in rural areas is a very encouraging sign. It is to be hoped that substantial progress may be made in furthering the need in the non-distant future. This matter is one which should receive the attention of all who are interested in agriculture and rural health and living. A home without paint, an indoor bath, proper sewage facilities, screens, or without other health and safety features is not a completely satisfactory place in which to live. Paint makes the home attractive to those who visit it and to others as an index of health and safety. Screens, which carry disease and proper sanitary facilities, protect the family and its neighbors from such diseases as typhoid and typhus. There are too many homes that do not have these things and too many families not enjoying life as much as they would if they had them. Some houses are in such poor condition that they should be abandoned as soon as the family can possibly obtain or building other, more comfortable, ones. These houses can be made quite comfortable and attractive with repairs, additions, screens, or installation of plumbing. The major aim is to make people more comfortable, healthier, and more satisfied, and if this is done, the family will have a greater appeal as a vacation spot. Healthy, uncomfortable people are not a happy and prosperous one and the latter has a great deal to do with one's state of health and mind. Because of this, it may be well to have a check made on a house, not only for its physical condition, but also for its health and safety. 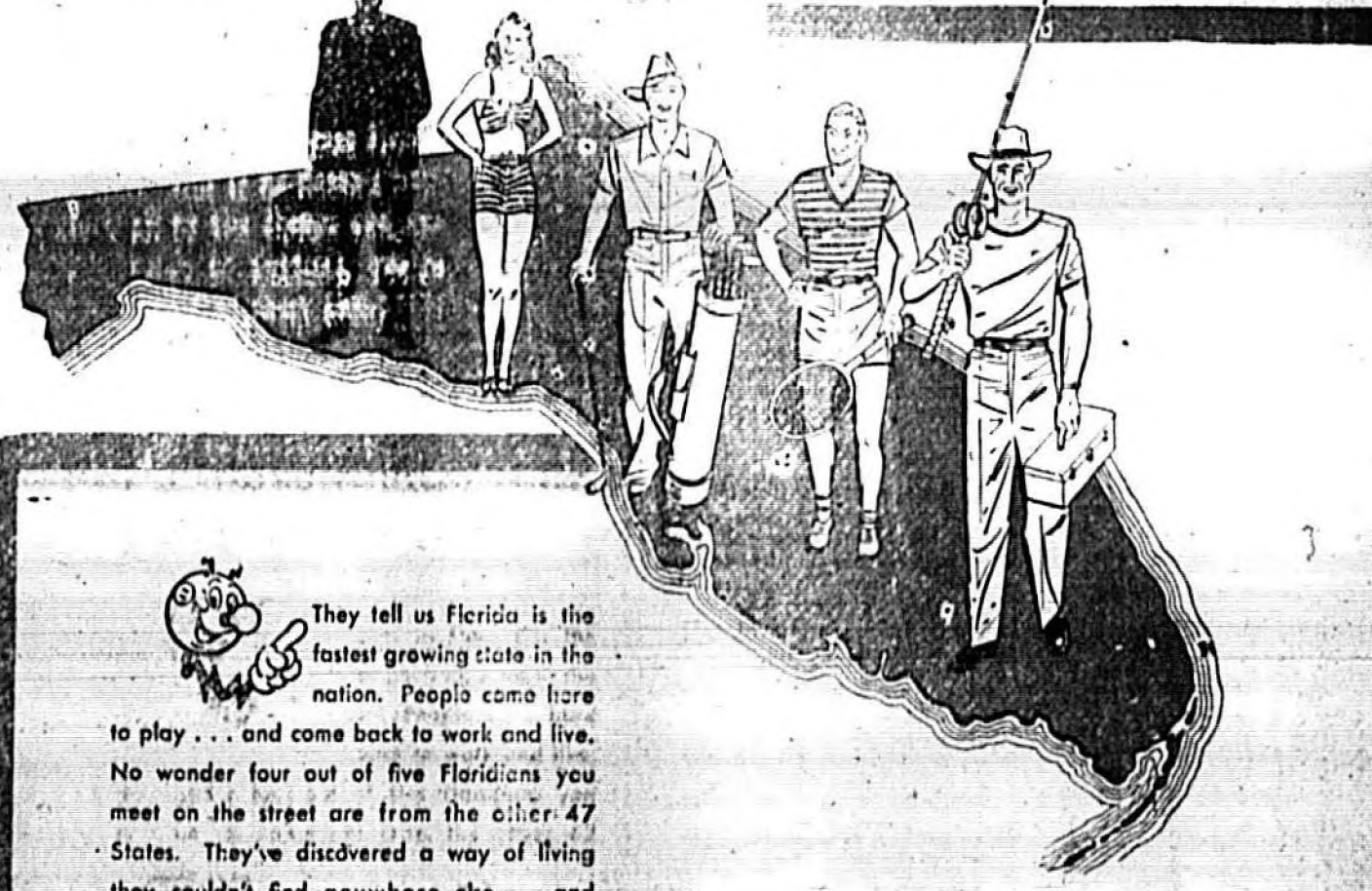

President of the United States.

Since our recent comments on
the City Cemetery we have heard
a good deal more about condi-
tions out there where Sanford
honors its dead. We believe it
more necessary than ever that
something be done as soon as
possible to enlarge the cemetery,
beautify it, and maintain it.

We hope that City authorities
are realizing the increasing con-
ditions of Sanford streets even
as they are planning to build a
new one. It is a shame that you
can't see anything better than
what you have to drive on. We
hope to see some action on this
subject and also about the
cemetery.

Attracting Tourists

If Sanford is to capture its fair share of the rapidly
expanding tourist trade in the next few years, the public
should consider what civic improvements should be under-
taken so as to make Sanford as attractive as possible to
tourists. Travellers naturally gravitate to those places
which appeal to them most.

Beautification should probably be number one on the
agenda, for the first thing a person notices about a town,
as with a woman, is whether it is, good looking. Shade
trees, flowering shrubs, annuals and roses, planted along a
city's streets and in its gardens are as likely to appeal to
a stranger as a good complexion, a trim figure and a well
groomed appearance in a woman.

Good accommodations are probably next in importance.
Once a person is satisfied with the looks of a town, he
seeks a place to stay. Hotels and apartment houses with
modern up-to-date facilities are a first essential to any re-
sort. But more than that, houses are needed. Sanford
is particularly lacking in this respect. We will need houses
not only for veterans who expect to live here, but also for
winter visitors three or four months out of the year.

But no matter how good the accommodations, tourists
will not stay long in a community which does not provide
recreational facilities. Sanford is making some progress
in this connection. The golf course is being put into first
class condition. Dog racing is available throughout the
winter at Longwood. The Zoo is immensely entertaining
to children and many older people. The shuffleboard courts
have their fans.

But there is still much to be done in providing re-
creation for all. It is encouraging to learn that boats may
soon be available on Lake Monroe. Tennis courts and a
swimming pool should be constructed as soon as possible.
A gun club with a good skeet shoot would be popular with
many visitors. So would bowling alleys, skating rinks, and
many similar enterprises.

Of course, among the most important factors in appeal-
ing to a certain class of visitors, as in attracting permanent
residents, are the school and hospital facilities available.
The two or three weeks' tourist may not consider such
things, but those who come down to spend three or four
months, and there are many like that, do. They bring
their children and put them in school and want to know in
advance what kind of schools they are. Just as they want
to know what kind of hospital facilities are available if
they or their children get sick.

Sanford owes much to its agricultural interests which
have been the backbone of this community for fifty years,
but if it is going to grow and prosper with a more stable
economy, we are going to have to develop some new field.
If not tourists, then new industries. The tourists are
coming to Florida, whether new industries do or not, and
Sanford should get its share.

Doubt and the Draft

The nine month's extension of the army draft after its
present expiration date of May 15, as voted by the House
military affairs committee at Washington, seems offhand
to be a good thing. By the present plan this would con-
tinue selective service until February 15, 1947.

It is not to be forgotten, however, that the world, in-
cluding Uncle Sam, seems to be in some doubt about various
things lately assumed as settled. The Russian situation
especially has seemed at times to be moving about and
changing its point of view in unexpected ways, and there
are some other international matters that don't exactly
stay put.

There are so many problems in this present world
seeking solution, sometimes experimentally and sometimes
with a club, that nobody need be surprised at changing
views and plans. Sooner or later things may really settle
down. Meanwhile it remains a very big world with a sur-
prising amount of question marks, and with some nations
seemingly to require more attention than others.

The cure for a dull or grimy look on furniture may be a simple soap-and-water wash. Soil from handling or from use of a vacuum cleaner may accumulate gradually, necessitating a good expert of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Almost all finishes on wood may be washed safely, except shellac and on-up varnish which water turns white in washing any furniture care must be taken to get the furniture dripping wet or allow moisture to reach glued joints.

Using a soft cloth or chambray of warm soap-suds, rub the surface until clean, then wipe dry with a dry cloth. After washing varnished or oil-finished furniture, polish with good furniture polish. Paint or enamel furniture also may be washed in this way but does not need polishing.

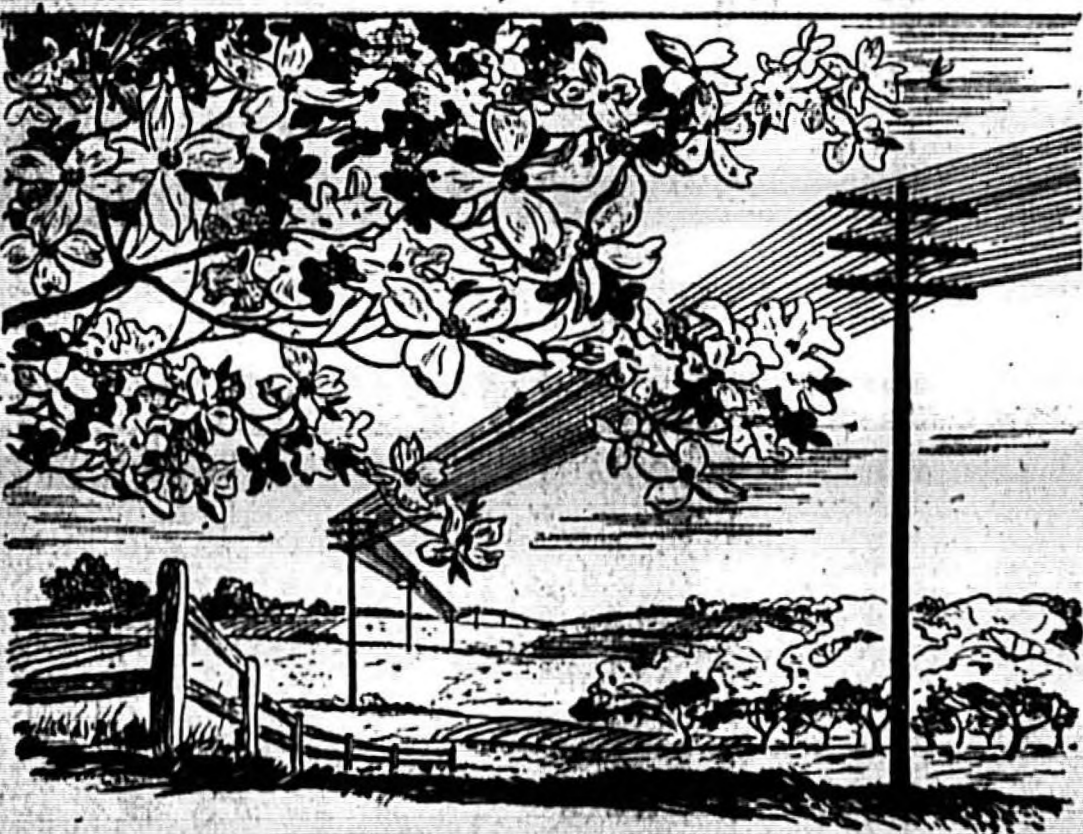

The committee on soil improvement reported that the Bureau is almost ready to start offering all Seminole County farmers river muck or stable manure at cost. As soon as estimates of costs are made, growers will be advised, and will be signed for their requirements. C. R. Dawson, county agent and chairman of this committee, pointed out that Seminole County products are noted for their extra fine quality.

Further plans to control floods were reported by the Bureau's drainage committee. County Commissioner J. F. McClelland talked on the water supply. As irrigation is of major importance to Seminole growers, grave concern was expressed over reports of lowered water tables and further study of these problems was decided upon.

Mr. Cullum reported that the Florida Farm Bureau, co-operating with the American Farm Bureau, had set up a service for all Florida growers to advertise and help dispose of Florida products during periods of overproduction.

A committee, for Seminole County was set up to report on the 25th of each month, probable crop productions for the following month. When it is judged that supplies will be heavy, the Florida Farm Bureau, said Mr. Cullum, will contact the American Farm Bureau Federation, which will in turn, urge \$11 retail outlets to feature such products, and in this way partly, if not wholly, avert a glut on the market and low prices.

This program, he pointed out, was carried out this season on celery when the market became evidence that it was very oversupplied, and there is good reason to believe that the country has used an unusual quantity of celery this season at generally better prices than would ordinarily be expected. Shipments to date have run nearly 25 per cent heavier than during last year.

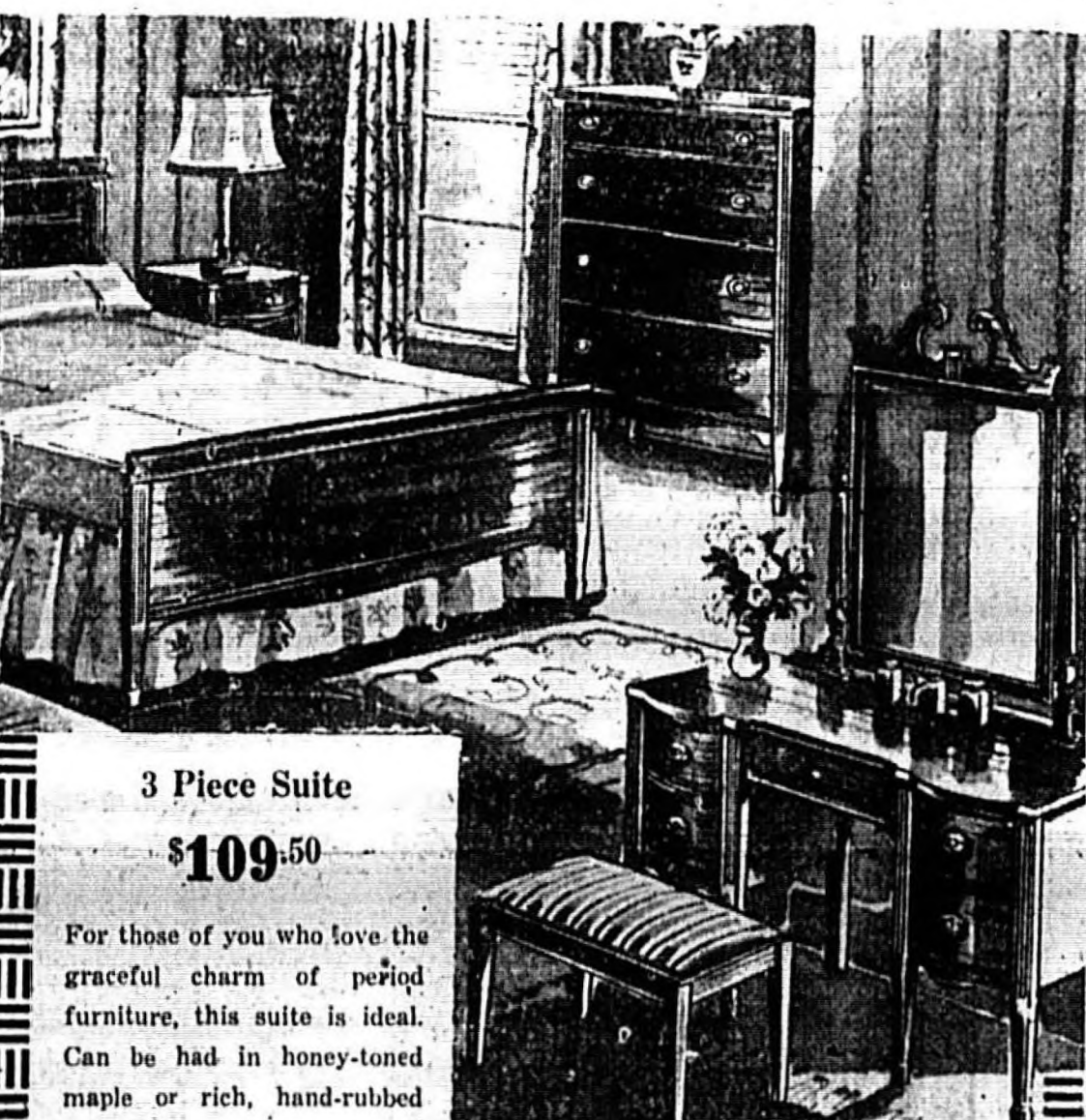

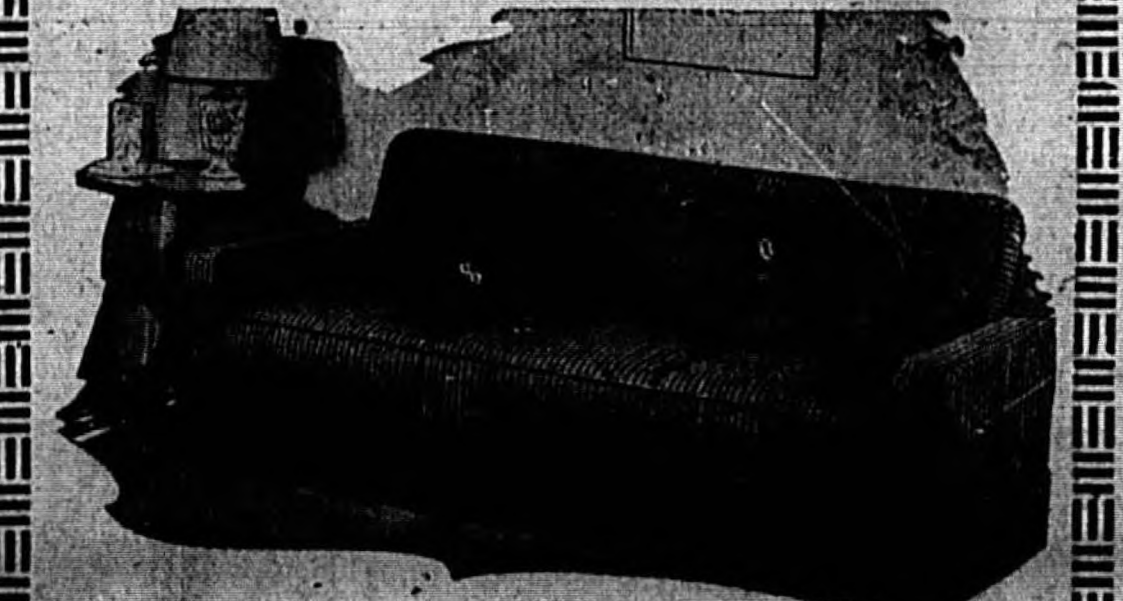

G.I. Prisoner Says Soldiers Badly Beaten

Soldier Takes Stand During Court Martial Of Litchfield Detention Site NCO

LITCHFIELD, England—Five G.I. prisoners refused to testify last week in the Litchfield detention camp brutality trial for fear of retaliation, but one of them took the witness stand today.

The soldier, Otto Holt, asserted that Americans in the camp were beaten viciously. Holt declared that Theater Judge Advocate Brigadier General Edward Betts, assured him that he will not be mistreated for giving evidence.

Holt and four other prisoners previously refused to testify unless they have assurance from War Secretary Patterson or some other high Washington official that they would not be mistreated for what they might say.

Holt, who is from Glens, Ill., took the stand this morning in the court martial of Staff Sergeant James Jones, of Muskogee, Okla. Holt testified that he saw Jones force another prisoner against a courtyard wall at Litchfield and beat him in the stomach with his fists for twenty minutes.

Holt said further that Jones and other guards beat a prisoner until he foamed and bled at the mouth. He said this prisoner was later taken to the hospital.

Grammar School Pupils Write On Movie Production

Dry Weather Causes Alarm To Growers

Irrigation Of Groves Reported Underway By County Farm Bureau President

Citrus and vegetable growers of Central Florida are becoming alarmed over drought conditions, according to M. L. Cullum, president of the Seminole County Farm Bureau, who reported that irrigation of groves has been under way for several days, and that reports have been coming in of wells getting too low for proper irrigation. There is danger from salt when wells get too low.

Vegetable crops have been affected by weather which was too hot and which took the moisture from the ground. The past week of cool, dry weather has been welcome, he added, but has not helped much as further loss of moisture has resulted.

Celery has been affected in some degree and reports from Oviedo and Zellwood state that while there is some celery of fair quality, seeders and black heart have affected other portions of the crop. Reports from Belle Glade and Sarasota are of similar adverse effects. The Sanford sand land celery deal is about over, and the Weirsdale crop will be harvested starting about May 1.

Cabbage, the harvesting of which is nearing its end in this section, seems to have come along in fine shape, said Mr. Cullum. Phenomenal yields of from 16 to 27 tons per acre, such as have never been known before, have been reported, and quality is said to be excellent. Shipments are expected to continue for about 10 days.

The first picking of Sanford's large plantings of golden corn took place at the farm of E. M. Galloway this week, and was a second in northern markets by track. Quality is reported to be excellent and by next week the crop should be in full swing.

Warm damage to corn, the bane of other seasons, is reported to be almost nil, due to the fact that the Central Florida Experiment Station of Sanford worked out very effective methods of worm control which were used by the growers. Despite limitations to the crop due to dry weather, shipments are expected to exceed 300 cars from this district in the next six weeks. The corn is packed in 4-5 bushel bags, sized three to six dozen.

Coccoloba squash are coming to an early end due to the dry weather, it is reported. Shipments from this section have been unusually heavy this spring. Tender green beans are moving in volume now, but unless there is rain, the deal will probably be quickly closed. Many acres have already yielded so light that it amounts practically to abandonment. Quality is good but the vines are producing very few beans and are drying up before a second picking can be made.

There is a big crop of peppers in Seminole County this spring, and so far they are reported to be looking fine. Harvesting is expected to start in about two weeks time.

The cauliflower deal would open this week after a most successful season and quality was of the best, bringing many compliments of the trade to local growers. It is expected that this will become an important crop here.

Digging of red bliss potatoes started this week in Seminole County. However, very few were grown here and sales will be confined mostly to trucks and mixed cars.

Inmates of Prison In Manitoba Grab Control Of Jail

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, Manitoba, April 16 (AP)—The 45 inmates in this Manitoba jail for women have undisturbed possession of the prison after more than 24 hours of rioting.

The trouble began at supper time Sunday when the women began a food protest that got out of control.

Baffled police have been unable to break through furniture barricades and have been unsuccessful in an attempt to halt the demonstrations with tear gas. Early this morning, they had entered the prison yard with rifles and pointed them at the women with guarding the prison to prevent any escapes.

Peterson Calls On Citizens To Cast Ballots

Jack Ratigan, W. G. Kilbee Are Other Speakers At Rally

"It is the duty of every man and woman in this county to take the responsibility of their franchise seriously and to go to the polls on election day and vote according to the dictates of their convictions," A. H. Peterson, former defense council co-ordinator and head of the War Price and Rationing Board, told a group of 50 citizens, mostly women, who met last evening at a voting rally at the Court House.

Other speakers introduced by Mrs. Maynoe Hodgkin, chairman of the meeting, were: W. G. Kilbee, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, and Jack Ratigan, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

"If all of our citizens do this," continued Mr. Peterson, "we need have no fear of rule by a despotic minority or by those who are influenced to run for office purely for personal ambition, personal or organized. The vital need of this nation today is for serious, intelligent voters. The words of the great Churchill come to mind. 'Too little and too late.' Must we too be awakened by a national calamity, because of a nation that realized the power of their votes and the just vote too late."

He urged his hearers to recall the price paid for liberty at Concord Bridge, Valley Forge, the Alamo, Gettysburg, San Juan Hill, Chateau Thierry and Iwo Jima, and pointed out that those whose personal agrandissement is an issue at the polls will not be able to carry out their duty as citizens while the voters are absent. He added that it will not be the organized effort of grasping political ventures which may destroy our government, but the lassitude and indifference of citizens, the right thinking majority, that will allow an unworthy cause to gain control.

Mrs. Hodgkin in welcoming the group, said that women particularly were invited to attend the meeting because they are comparatively new in the political world, and pointed out that the management job done by the women of this country and other countries during the war has brought them a keener knowledge of the conduct of government.

"We intend to register, and we intend to vote intelligently when that time comes," she declared.

Mr. Kilbee, in a brief talk, stated that there were 1,000,000 people in the county who had not yet registered and should do so. "It is up to us to educate the people to do this," he declared. "We expect to maintain our leadership, and power, we must vote and vote intelligently."

Jack Ratigan declared that every right citizen has an obligation, one of which is to vote. He defined Democracy as the rule of the people and told of the ancient assemblies at Athens, Greece where representatives were elected. He told how party machines were dominated by Tammany Hall in New York, and Pendergrass in Kansas City, took advantage of the laxity of citizens. Voters should watch the conduct of people in office, he declared.

Expedition Tipped Off That Mexico Plans To Seize Gold Of Santa Rosa

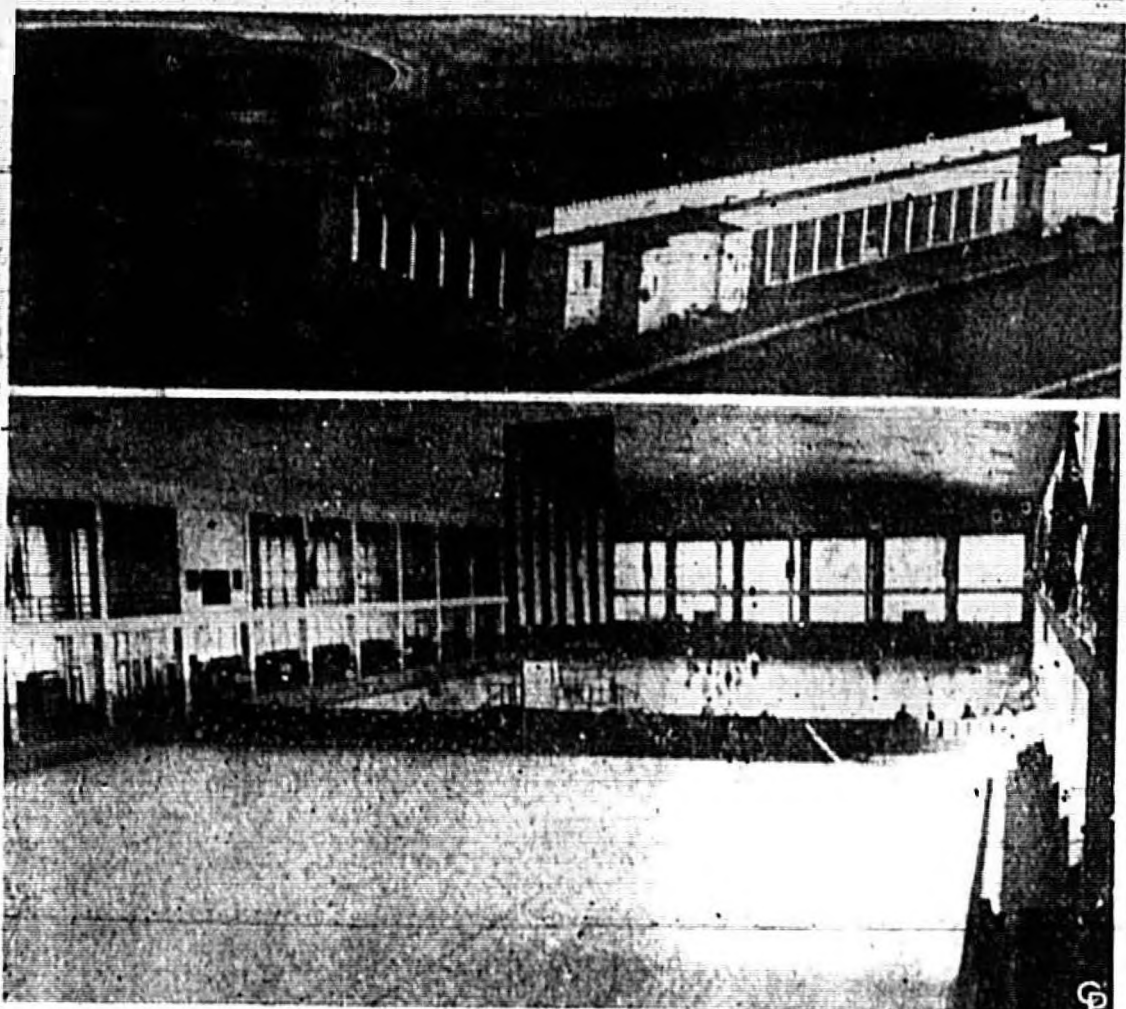
MIAMI, April 16 (AP)—It looks like deep sea diver Irvin Williamson faces another difficulty before he finishes his hunt for the treasure believed above the sunken Santa Rosa. In Miami today, Williamson said he had been "tipped off" that the Mexican Government plans to seize the \$30,000,000 in pure gold reputedly hoarded aboard the Spanish galleon if the gold is found. The long lost wreck of the vessel has been rediscovered by Williamson's crew of explorers between Key West and Cuba. They haven't been able to search the ship's interior to determine whether the gold is still aboard.

One representative of the expedition—Joseph Summers—says "we have received word that the Mexican Government intends to slap an attachment on the gold on the grounds that it was stolen from Mexico by the Spanish conqueror Cortez in 1520."

To that, Williamson is quoted as saying, "I'm not going to bring the gold into the United States if there is going to be any litigation over it. I've already put too much of my own money into the search."

Summers says Williamson has spent more than \$100,000 on the quest for the treasure, which according to legend, carries with it the curse of the ancient king of the Aztecs, Montezuma.

Rosenberg Says He Put Religion On Legal Basis

Tribunal Hears Nazi Say He Reinstated Religious Freedom

STUTTGART, April 16 (AP)—The International Military Tribunal heard Nazi physicist Alfred Rosenberg testify today that the German Reichmacht "reinstated religious freedom" in the conquered areas of the Soviet Union.

Rosenberg said that as Reich minister for occupied Eastern territories, he put religious freedom on a legal basis toward the end of 1941.

Rosenberg brushed aside charges that he actively persecuted religion. He told the tribunal that the National Socialist state gave 7,000,000 marks to churches. He claimed that Nazi laws compared favorably to those in France and Russia.

Rosenberg said his principal job was to give ideas to Adolf Hitler. He denied that he ever used the SS to suppress his spiritual opponents, but conceded that some of his co-workers were in touch with the police.

The Nazi philosopher said his written judgments of christian churches have been severe and critical, and added that his books have not been without error.

Rosenberg maintained that a deep enmity existed between him and Hitler's official shadow, Martin Bormann.

Admiral Asserts Atom Bomb Tests Will Not Cost Over \$110,900,000

Commander Of Joint Operation Declares Estimated Figure Of \$525,000,000 Is Gross Exaggeration

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—The United States Navy today declared that the cost of atomic bomb tests will not exceed \$110,900,000, a figure which it said is a gross exaggeration of the \$525,000,000 estimated by the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

The commander for the first Army-Navy operation—Vice Admiral W. H. P. Blandy—declared that what he termed "uninformed persons" had estimated the cost of the tests at \$525 million for laboratory and another \$110,900,000 for expenses.

"Such figures are gross exaggerations," Blandy said, "and are based on a number of assumptions which are not realistic. The cost of the tests will be much less than the \$525 million figure."

Six More Germans Jailed As Members Of Nazi Spy Ring

SHANGHAI, Apr. 16 (AP)—American intelligence officers jailed six more Nazis today. The Germans were arrested in connection with the Nazi espionage network that is reported to have operated in China long after VE Day in violation of the surrender terms.

It also has been announced in Shanghai that seven other persons have been held in Canton since last October. They are either suspected of playing a role in the espionage ring, or are material witnesses. Three are German consular officials.

Seven men believed to have been connected with the Nazi spy ring were arrested yesterday.

Eight Delegates For Keeping Matter On Agenda As France Offers Compromise

NEW YORK, Apr. 16 (AP)—The United Nations Security Council has postponed action on a Russian request that the case of Iran be dropped. Eight delegates lined up against removing the Soviet-Iranian matter from the agenda. Poland blocked the Russian move, and the 11th member of the UN Security Council, France, presented a compromise proposal.

The French delegate suggested that information be obtained for a report which would be submitted to the general assembly which meets on Sept. 3. The French move would have the effect of taking the case off of the council's docket.

Before the council adjourned until 10 p. m. (EST) tomorrow, France, Russia and Poland joined in asking immediate consideration of the Spanish problem. Poland has charged that the regime of Generalissimo Franco is endangering world peace and that Spain is a source of long-range war. However, the chairman of the committee, Dr. Quinlan, did not state the council should take up when the council meets tomorrow.

The American delegate Edward Steiwer declared that his government still does not think it wise to drop the Iranian case immediately. Steiwer at one point said he wanted to make it clear that the United States was not intending to question the integrity of Russia.

The Chinese delegate, Dr. Quo, said he would be replaced by the Russian delegate, Dr. Hefezoff. Dr. Hefezoff is chairman of the committee and is a member of the Soviet Foreign Ministry.

Holland Against Centralization Of Federal Functions
