

### South Planning More Help For Mentally Ill

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W. Va. (UPI)—A report aimed at improving the South's plans for the mentally ill and retarded emphasized today the need for decentralizing treatment facilities.

It spoke of the "absolute necessity that we . . . take service to the patient rather than uproot the patient in order to take him to service."

North Carolina Gov. Terry Sanford, chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board, termed the report a "platform for progress . . . that can be of inestimable value by providing us an acute and a perspective in fast-moving times."

"It is a distillation of the thinking of the SREB's commission" that was asked by the conference to get to work on the problems of mental disorder.

The report, titled "Commitment to Health," outlined three broad goals and specific tasks to assist key elected officials and mental health leaders in the 16 member states of the SREB.

The three goals set out in the report are to prevent mental disorders before they start; to provide the best possible care for the mentally ill, with special emphasis on early, uninterrupted treatment and care close to the patient's home; and to help people strengthen the "emotional muscles" needed to overcome daily problems and occasional major crises.

Sanford said that thinking about the mentally ill and retarded has advanced considerably since the conference initiated the special regional effort in 1953. The report "reflects the big changes better than any other single document," the governor said.

Johns, who was selected by the school's board of regents described his new school as "a complex, complete university" of 4,500 students.

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

"The successful business man actually looks for people he can serve, for this is his life and his success," he pointed out.  
"Our whole economy is built on intangible belief in our fellow man and trust that he will do what he says he will do," Gov. Ginkel pointed out.

"Buying and selling are done on good faith. When you drive down the road in your car, you do so with faith that the other drivers will share the road with you," he said.  
"There was a time that man could live without his neighbor—he raised all his own food, built and furnished his own house, buried his own dead. There were few businesses and little competition."

"But now we live in an entirely different kind of economic world. If any of the switches that you turn on your lights, cook your breakfast, start your car, operate your office, turn your motors, deliver your mail and so forth, fails to operate do you then say—  
"Never mind, I'll do it myself. I don't need you," he said.  
Ginkel answered this by saying that we immediately get in touch with the person or persons or organizations who provide us with all these services.

"Never doubt the strength of the idea of brotherhood," Ginkel urged. "The power of Rotary lies in its concept of the new commandment given as a formula for success, as expressed by Jesus Christ, and that is, 'If any among you would be great let him become the servant of all,' he pointed out.

In addition, Bryant said, the leadership of governors in the development of sound financing plans for industrial development, including consideration of soundly based state development corporations, is important.

"With multiple sources for industrial development funds such as have come into exist-

ence in recent years, the reputation of a state in the field of industrial development can well hinge on the soundness of the fiscal policies it followed," he said.

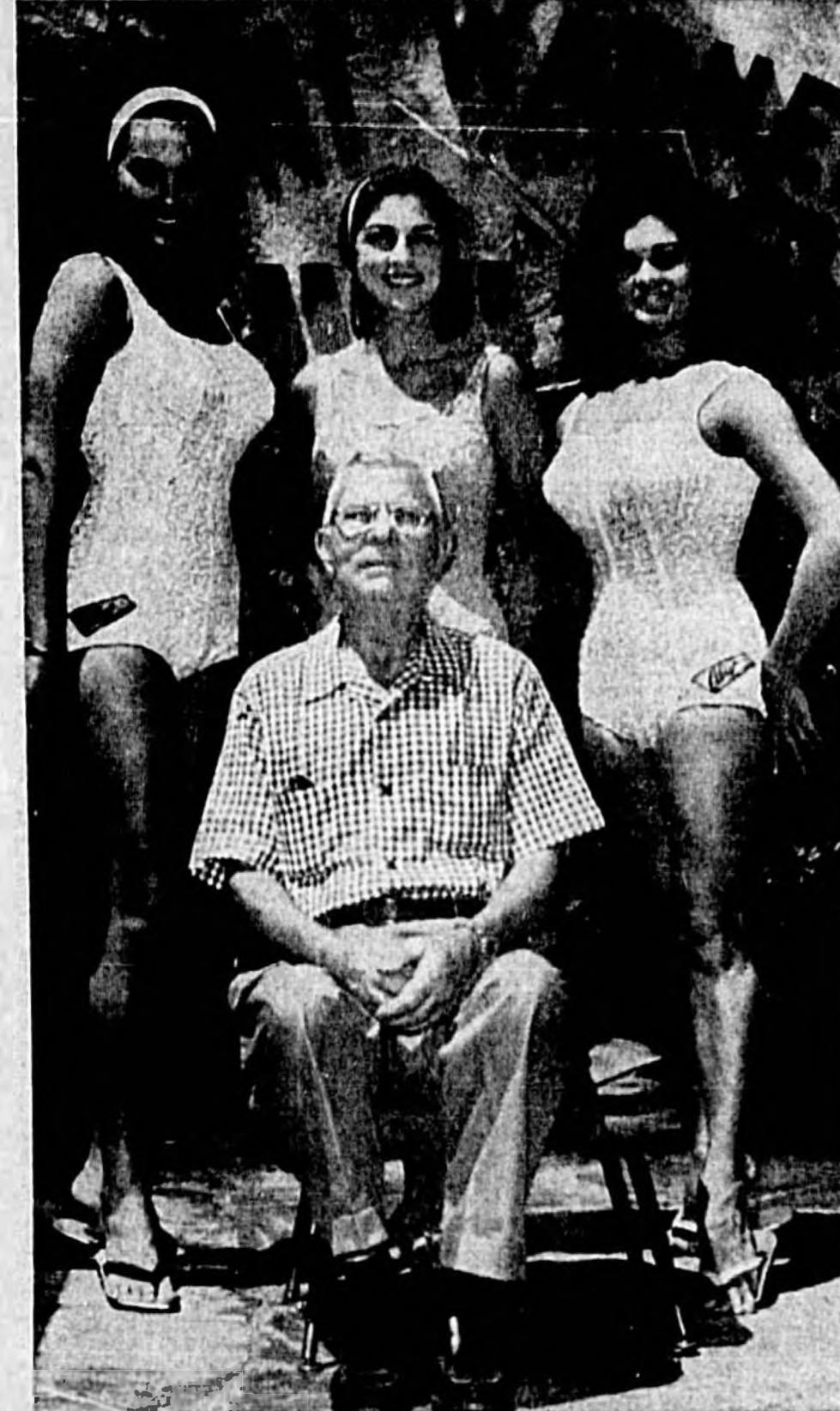

## Storm Area Spotted In Atlantic

### Conditions For Development Are 'Favorable'

MIAMI (UPI) — A low pressure area that appeared to have the makings of the season's second tropical storm popped up in the Atlantic today near where Hurricane Arlene was found Aug. 2.

A hurricane hunter plane sped from Puerto Rico to give weathermen an accurate picture of the disturbance.

The San Juan Weather Bureau labeled the disturbance a "tropical depression" on the basis of ship reports from the area and estimated its center to be about 600 miles east of the French island of Guadeloupe or about 900 miles east-southeast of San Juan.

Highest winds reported by the ships were 30 to 35 miles per hour. The disturbance was estimated to be moving westward at about 12 miles per hour.

"Conditions remain favorable for further development and some increase in size and intensity is likely in the next 12 to 24 hours," the Weather Bureau said.

The second tropical storm of 1963 will be named Bula, Arlene, an ongoing off-nominal storm, blew itself out at sea after breaching Bermuda with 98 m.p.h. wind gusts.

## Troops Storm Pagodas, Seize 100 Buddhists

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — President Ngo Dinh Diem declared martial law throughout South Viet Nam today and sent his heavily-armed troops storming through pagoda headquarters of the Buddhist opposition.

At least 100 Buddhist monks were arrested in raids carried out under a state of siege decreed by Diem amid reports that a coup d'etat was imminent.

In a massive crackdown on anti-government elements, the president appointed a new military governor of Saigon and a new chief of staff. He also imposed press censorship.

The long-simmering religious-political crisis in this Southeast Asian country exploded suddenly early today when thousands of soldiers and policemen swept into the main Xa Loi pagoda and rounded up more than 100 monks.

The government forces fired pistol shots and used tear gas bombs and hand grenades as they searched into the center of Buddhist opposition to Diem's authoritarian regime.

PATIS (UPI) — More than 500 Americans filed petitions at the U. S. Embassy here today in a demonstration of support for the civil rights march in Washington Aug. 28.

The motion to nominate and elect Bryant and Carvel was seconded by Gov. Ross B. Barnett of Mississippi.

## 61 Arrested In Demonstration

PLAQUEMINE, La. (UPI) — Police arrested 61 Negroes in 24 hours in this riverfront town, the South's new arena of racial conflict. But singing, clapping demonstrators planned another march today along with an economic boycott.

More than 400 Negroes attended a rally Tuesday night and sang and shouted their approval of another mass march today.

Mayor Charles B. Schnebelen said the city would ask U. S. Dist. Judge E. Gordon West of Baton Rouge to issue a temporary restraining order against further demonstrations.

The Negroes sat in doorways of segregated cafeterias in demonstrating for civil rights and equal job opportunities.

## Red Terrorists Kill Policeman

CARACAS (UPI) — Castro Communist terrorists, active here for the first time in nearly a month, killed a policeman Tuesday, wounded a civilian and tried to sabotage the city's only power plant.

The terrorist gunmen wore Castro-style fatigues with armbands bearing the initials of the Red "Armed Forces of National Liberation (FALN)."

Witnesses said the two men were shot when three FALN members, carrying submachineguns, entered the government-owned Vargas Hospital and released a 28-year-old journalism student who had been arrested for terrorist activities.

The student, Rafael Tedeschi, had been taken to the hospital for a physical examination.

## Airline Struck By Two Crews

NEW YORK (UPI) — Mechanics and ground crew personnel of United Air Lines struck in major cities across the country early today. The airline said no flights have been curtailed.

Members of the International Association of Machinists, which has locals in 31 cities, walked off their jobs in New York, Newark, N. J.; Los Angeles, Cleveland, Philadelphia, Seattle and Portland, Ore.

A company spokesman said supervisory employees were "filling in" and that there have been no interruptions in service.

The union, which has about 12,000 members, has been without a contract since June 1962, when the old pact expired.

## \$5 Million Contract Let

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers awarded a contract worth nearly \$5 million today for construction of a causeway between the Florida mainland and the government's industrial complex on Merritt Island.

Col. G. A. Finley, Canaveral district engineer, said the contract went to the Boudelle-Duval Co., of Jacksonville.

The project, the Indian River-Oraiso Causeway, will form the western portion of a 13-mile long, restricted use road. It will link the industrial area of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Moonport with U. S. 1 to the west and Cape Canaveral to the east.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy says it would be a mistake to assign job quotas to Negroes or to any group of citizens on the basis of religion, race or nationality.

One eyewitness, Sunny Voorhees, a city employe, said it looked like the main landing gear was only part way out of its fuselage compartment when the plane touched down.

Voorhees said the plane skidded the length of the main runway, more than a mile and a half, and finally halted on grass at the end of the strip.

## U. S. Protests To Viet Nam

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States today officially deplored what it called "serious repressive measures" by the government of South Viet Nam against Buddhists.

A statement issued by State Department spokesman Robert McLeskey said:

"On the basis of information from Saigon it appears that the government of the Republic of Viet Nam has instituted serious repressive measures against Vietnamese Buddhist leaders.

"The action represents a direct violation by the Vietnamese government of assurances that it was pursuing a policy of reconciliation with the Buddhists. The United States deplores repressive action of this nature."

U. S. officials said they were not yet drawing any conclusions by way of assessing the situation in Viet Nam, including whether an effort to overthrow the government might be imminent.

## Fruit Juice To Replace Milk

OCALA, Fla. (UPI) — Marion County schools will provide fruit juices for school lunches rather than pay higher prices for fresh milk, schools superintendent John Seay said today.

"The prices being asked for fresh milk now would put up the cost of school lunches by about 5 cents," Seay said, "and many parents with several children could not afford it."

The county school board rejected fresh milk bids Tuesday night and said they would reconsider the matter in a month.

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## Castro Protests

MIAMI (UPI) — Radio Havana broadcast a Castroite communique Tuesday night accusing the United States of pursuing a "policy of perfidy" and saying that refugee attacks on Cuban installations "endanger world peace."
