

Conservation officers arrest Sanford man twice for BUI

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) Northeast Region had an active, but relatively safe Memorial Day Weekend on the local waterways. Good weather produced heavy boating activity throughout the region, as FWC officers patroled the waterways even arresting the same Sanford man twice.

FWC officers spent 2,154 hours patrolling the waters of the 12-county region and wrote 771 citations, which included 24 arrests for boating under the influence (BUI). The remaining tickets were for other boating safety violations (577), resource violations (128), and other violations (42) which can be anything from drug-related arrests to littering. In addition, FWC officers issued 1,420 written warnings dur-

ing the holiday weekend. Seminole and Orange counties topped the region in numbers of BUI arrests this weekend, with the majority of the arrests on the St. John's

"Our goal this Memorial Day weekend was to keep the boating public safe," said FWC supervisor Lt. Jeff Hudson, whose officers made the high number of arrests. "We targeted BUI enforcement on the waterways of Orange and Seminole counties and made 10 boating under the influence arrests. That accounts for more than 40 percent of the BUI arrests that were made in this region over the weekend."

One Sanford man didn't learn his lesson the first time he was arrested for BUI.

Michael A. Green, 44, of Palmetto Avenue, was arrested on Saturday night, bonded out and was arrested again for boating under the influence on Sunday night.

Lake Mary, county dedicate Rinehart trail improvements

LAKE MARY — It took nearly four years for it to finally come together, but officials say a Friday dedication of improvements to the Rinehart Road

trail is just the beginning. "This is a tremendous start, but this is not the end of the dream," said Lake

Mary Deputy Mayor Mike McLean. This definitely is an exciting day," he added. "As a result of all this hard work in the community we have transformed this trail."

With support from Seminole County, Lake Mary, five area homeowners associations and countless businesses, the once bleak 2.3-mile stretch of trail along Rinehart Road received a \$200,000 facelift. The changes included four bricked rest stations complete with shade trees, eight exercise stations, 38 new trees, 2,800 shrubs and 6,300 square feet of sod.

The initial project was completed primarily from the support of the group known as Be A Trailblazer Inc. The notfor-profit organization was founded several years ago when the neighborhoods of Timacuan, Manderley, Woodbridge and The Hills of Lake Mary approached the city to dress up the bleak, black-topped trail on the east side of Rinehart Road. With the addition of a fifth partner, The Forest, the consortium of neighborhoods was inspired by the prospective chance of changing the landscape of the city's only trail that connects the county's Seminole Wekiva Trail and Cross Seminole Trail.

The group has raised about \$240,000 through a combination of efforts. They found private donations from businesses such Heritage United Bank and Progress Energy, and secured \$30,000 from Lake Mary and \$100,000 from Seminole County. The group also received additional \$15,000 from Sanford Airport Authority Larry Dale

during the trail dedication. However Trailblazer co-chair Allan Plank says, "a lot of it was made up of small donations" from concerned citizens that also desired a change from the "black-topped wasteland." Several other fundraisers organized by Pat Blake of Timacuan included the selling of the "A Taste of Lake Mary" recipe book for \$5 and a personalized

Murder suspect dies in custody

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating the death of a prisoner who was housed at the John E. Polk Correctional facility (Seminole County jail). The prisoner was pronounced dead at Central Florida Regional Hospital in

Thursday. The prisoner is identified Randolph Mora, 26, of Orlando. He was being held in the jail awaiting trial on a murder



charge. According to a report filed by a Seminole County Deputy, a cellmate of the prisoner called for corrections officer assistance at approximately 1:45 Thursday morning. The corrections officers summoned the medical staff.

After securing the other inmate, the personnel entered the cell and observed the prisoner in medical distress. Jail medical personnel assisted the situation and tried to render care. Shortly after 2 a.m., the fire department was called and the prisoner was transported to the hospital, where he later died.

Currently, investigators with the Major Crimes Unit are looking into the circumstances surrounding the death, but it is being investigated as a suspected suicide.

There was a message written on Mora's body with some type of writing instrument. It is believed it was written by Mora himself. It listed information on who to contact. The last line of the written information stated, in essence, "There are two things that are mine by right. They're freedom and death if I can't have the first, I'll gladly have the

On Oct. 12 of this past year, 37-year old Scott Quinn was found at his residence, at 314 Placid Lake Drive in Sanford. A knife was protruding from his neck. When police investigated, they found hundreds of guns and military ordnance in Quinn's home. Quinn was a former Seminole County bail bondsman and a licensed gun dealer.

Following an intensive investigation, Mora was determined to be the suspect, and he was apprehended by Orlando police. Rather than the case connect-

ed with guns, it was believed Mora had killed Quinn because of Quinn's relationships with

Lake County fire nearly jumps into Seminole

SEMINOLE STATE FOREST — Smoke from a Lake County brush fire drifted into downtown Sanford Wednesday, but luckily for Seminole County firefighters the blaze didn't jump over the Wekiva River into Seminole. Staging at Wekiva Road off

State Road 46, Seminole County firefighters waited for what many viewed as the inevitable with dry conditions and a rapidly expanding fire. The brush fire, which officials believe was started by lightning Tuesday night, burned about 100 acres of the Seminole State Forest, said

Dave Fogler, Lake County area supervisor for the state Division of Forestry, but didn't reach Seminole County as a afternoon storm helped bring it under

Lake County firefighters also responded to the area with three brush trucks, two engines and one tanker, said Jim Dickerson, Lake County Fire Department operations chief and former Seminole County chief at the Markham Woods Road station. Paul Hartsfield, Seminole County area supervisor for the state Division of Forestry, and a helicopter equipped with a 150gallon water bucket also assist-

ed with the brush fire.

Fogler said fire-fighting units and plows began working the small two-acre blaze early Wednesday morning. With rising temperatures during the day and brisk winds, the fire continued to grow before a storm quelled its strength at about 4 p.m.

"With all these shifting winds we were concerned about it turning around and heading toward the highway (State Road

46)," Fogler said. "If it wasn't for the rain we would be still having problems with this one," he added.

With dry conditions, Central Florida remains susceptible to lightning-induced brush fires. With spotty storms increasing during the area's rainy season, sometimes lightning strikes on the outside of the edge of the storm where it doesn't rain can cause fires, Fogler said.

Mora's girlfriend. During an interview with Sanford police and members of the Florida Department Enforcement, Mora reportedly confessed to the slaying.

According to police, Mora said when he confronted Quinn about the affair at Quinn's Sanford home, an argument erupted with both men drawing guns. Mora said he shot Quinn three times, and attempted to shoot him again because he was still alive. But after the gun malfunctioned, he said he went into the kitchen and retrieved a butcher knife with which to stab Quinn in the neck.

Mora was booked into the county jail on a charge of first degree murder, and was held without bond. Authorities, at that time, suspected Mora may have been wanted in other jurisdictions, including Puerto Rico and Spain. Mora had reportedly used other names in the past, including Randolph Mora Caraballo, Omar Xavier Mora Caraballo, Albert Perez Aviles, Albert S. Perez, Albert Perez, Gio and Giorgio Stephani Volpi

An autopsy was scheduled on Mora, and the results are still pending. According to Sheriff's spokesman Steve Olson, it is believed Mora may have killed himself by ingesting a certain type of medication. "We won't know until the toxicology report is released," he added.

Initially, attempts to locate and notify relatives were not successful, but Olson said the Lake County Sheriff's Department managed to locate one relative and report on the death.



Hurricane season is here

If you have relatives living elsewhere in the nation, you've probably heard someone say, "Florida? I wouldn't live there - you have those

But look at what we have in other parts of the hemisphere. Heavy rains fell in Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma recently, flooding large areas and causing a great deal of destruction. Recent rains in the Dominican Republic killed over a thousand people from flooding. Parts of Michigan, Ohio, northern New York State and elsewhere in the northeast, were devastated by blizzards this past winter. Those tornadoes that ravaged Tennessee, Ohio, Nebraska, Missouri and other areas were real killers as this week started, and as Dorothy and her dog Toto know full well, tornadoes are frequent in Kansas

I don't know what state is the safest when it comes to weather phenomena, but I'll stay right here in Central Florida. Sure, we have our hurricanes, heavy rainfall, and blistering heat, but tornadoes, blizzards and flood-

ing can stay away.

To get to the point, we are now officially in our Atlantic Hurricane Season. It starts June 1 and ends Nov. 30 each year. We hardly ever have any hurricane during the first few months of the season, but come September, October and November, there will undoubtedly be some activity out in the Atlantic, the Caribbean or the Gulf of Mexico.

William Gray, of Colorado State University, is probably the most famous hurricane predictor. For Pfeifauf the 2003 hurricane season, he predicted 12 named storms. There were 14. He predicted three major storms, he was correct. This season, he has predicted 14 named storms, eight reaching hurricane strength, (75 mph and

over), and three of them considered intense. Hurricanes are named alphabetically. Once a name has been used as a major storm, it is not repeated. The letters Q. U, Y, and Z have no names. The remaining names, as they appear, are Alex, Bonnie,

Charley, Danielle, Earl, Frances, Gaston, Hermine, Ivan, Jeanne, Karl, Lisa, Matthew, Nicole, Otto, Paula, Richard, Shary, Thomas, Virginie For those who may not know - hurricanes used to have only femi-

nine names, but in the past decade, they were changed to include male names for every-other one. Something about equal rights I think. At this time of the season, practically every media will be offering "free hurricane information pamphlets". In addition, a number of companies, including insurance companies and public safety organiza-

tions, will be giving suggestions on how to safe-guard your property. For those who recently arrived in Florida, and are not familiar with hurricane preparedness, I suggest you obtain one of these pamphlets and study it carefully. Don't take it on a "if" basis - but accept it as

things that must be done for hurricane preparation. For those who have been in Florida a short while, during which time we have not suffered from a hurricane, don't become complacent. From year to year, we never know what may happen, and there is very little warning. Once a hurricane is predicted - just try to purchase plywood with which to board up the windows of your home or business. It is simply sold out. And should you purchase plywood now, a reminder - the prices have really gone up in the past year.

For those who have gone through several hurricanes - use your knowledge of what to do to help others - your friends - your neighbors. Try to convince them that holding a hurricane party when one is about to strike, isn't the smartest thing to do.

And remember to take the usual precautions yourself. Stock up on non-perishable food, drinking water, candles, and other items you should already know about.

Come the end of November, I want to write about a safe season with no hurricanes hitting this year. But if I do, I don't want to list you es being a fatality because you didn't take adequate protection and be-plan for a possible disaster. THIO AM UNTIL



Historical society learns about Sanford's first church

At the Sanford Historical Society's recent meeting, Society member Bette Skates presented a program entitled "Gertrude Sanford's Dear

Little Church." This, of course, referred to Holy Cross Episcopal Church which Mrs. Sanford took great interest in. When he was laying out this town, General Sanford gave one lot to each church, but the Episcopalians were the first to build a church

building. Mrs. Sanford solicited funds from her wealthy northern friends. With this and other donations, the church was completed in 1873. It was in the style of Carpenter Gothic and it faced Magnolia Avenue as it was believed that this would be the main street. The

Holeman. In 1875, Rev. Lyman Phelps, General Sanford's agent, became rector. He also held services in other area communities.

first rector was the Rev. F.R.

Holy Cross's first building was destroyed by a hurricane in 1880. Another church building was completed in 1882 facing Park Avenue.

The church also built other

buildings, one of which became a community center, which housed a bowling alley, billiards table and a moving

picture machine. Sadly, on Nov. 27, 1923, a fire destroyed the entire complex of buildings.

The new and present building was designed by architect Elton Moughton. It is pre-depression Spanish architecture. The church and the parish hall were completed in 1924. The present bell tower was not completed until 1957.

There is an oil painting in the church which was given by the Sanford family in the 1870s. It was rescued and survived the destruction of the two previous churches.

The program was greatly enhanced by several pictures of each church, both exterior and interior.

At the beginning of the meeting, president Patty Swann presented Irma Copper with a gift certificate from the Society in appreciation for all she has done for them. She is retiring June 30 after 10 years

as a museum assistant. During the business meeting, it was announced that the executive board had authorized funds for the restoration of Carola Dow's gravestone in Derby, Conn. She is the person

responsible for the city of Sanford having Henry Sanford's artifacts for placement in the museum. The curator of the Derby Museum will oversee the project and plans a ceremony when it is completed. She will send the Society a video tape.

Another project of the Society is the purchase of an ad in a school planner which will help enable students of Idyllwilde and Bentley elementary schools to have a free planner. The ad will encourage students to visit the museum and also make use of its reference materials.

Hugh Fisher is continuing to photograph headstones in Lakeview Cemetery and Millard Hunt has volunteered to help him record the data this summer.

Sanford educator passes

Juanita Graham Harold, Seminole County educator, touched the lives of thousands of students during her career in the field of teaching. She died

Wednesday, June 2, 2004. Harold would always say that a gentle breeze blew her into a window at Fernald Laughton Memorial Hospital, into the arms of her loving parents, Frank and Josephine, on a sunny morning, Feb. 17, 1928, in Sanford, and she was affectionately named Juanita.

Having been raised in a strict educational environment as her mother was a teacher in the Seminole County schools, she began attending school at the early age of three.

Entering the Hopper Academy (known as the Colored School No. 2, by the time she entered sixth





Local nurses add unique service to Sanford church

SANFORD — The First Presbyterian Church of Sanford can not only treat parishioners holistically, but recently added a new program to help them physically.

Sanford resident Peggy Stickney is leading the initiative known as parish nursing.

"Our goal is to empower people to take better care of themselves," she said.

Stickney and fellow nurses that attend the church do not perform any evasive surgeries, but rather give out health information, check parishioners' blood pressures and

register them to receive flu vaccines through the county health department.

former Seminole Community College professor for 19 years, Stickney began teaching nursing at the University of Central Florida last August. She said she first heard about parish nursing from another Seminole County church in Winter Springs.

The volunteer program primarily reaches out to the older population of the church teaching them about the dangers of high cholesterol, skin cancer and other health concerns. They also are planning future visits to parishioners in assisted living facilities.

While the parish nurses do not make medical diagnoses, they offer supportive information to answer parishioners' concerns.

"They probably have talked to their physicians about these things, but sometimes it's good to get another viewpoint," Stickney said. "We are available to listen and offer resources that might be avail-

The parish-nursing program includes Stickney, registered nurse Linda Schaeffer, her daughter Elizabeth Schaeffer, a critical care nurse at Central Florida Regional Hospital, and Sarah Scott, a UCF nursing student.

The big beetle bug that got away in the house

Geneva, as is true with all places, has its positive points and its negative as well. One of the few negatives to living in a rural way is that the insect population is easily in a position to take over at any point they choose to do so. People in the suburbs think they have bugs, but they know not of what they speak. We have bugs.

We thought this would be an advantage, however, as our high school daughter embarked on an extra credit expedition into the world of entomology. The assignment: collect, classify and display at least 50 such pests by the end of the school year. The reality: bugs don't want to be caught; bugs fall apart when you catch them; bugs

escape.

The adventure began a few weeks ago with the appearance of glass canning jars in several rooms of the house - each containing some sort of catch. After a bit of prodding, I convinced my daughter that the jars needed to be kept in her room and not on my kitchen counter. You see, her efforts to catch and preserve her prey were dominated by the capture and suffocate method, so that the poor trapped creatures were left to die slowly and sometimes loudly. (One tiny beetle type thingee actually let out such a pathetic cry we almost let him go free. Had he been obtained earlier in the project he might have enjoyed

such an outcome, but, alas he was number 48 or so and at that point the project deadline was coming up on us like a giant insect net.) One day, while

cleaning in my daughter's room, I spotted an ant crawling near a jar already containing a beetle, which was long since dead. I decided to pop the lid on the beetle and handily scoop

the ant up and place him into the same quarters. Sort of a "killing two bugs with one jar" approach. Unfortunately, when said lid was removed from said jar, a stink bigger than ANY stink I have ever encountered emanated from said jar to the point of almost creating a semi-digested food col-lection to match the bug collection on the floor of her room. I got the ant though, good mother that I am, and immediately sprayed the entire house (as now the entire house did indeed stink of that stink) with the 5-for-\$5 citrus spray my husband brought home from the bulk warehouse store, which I swore I would never use, but which was the only thing that would eradicate the overpowering stink.

Now, at this point I must mention that my husband had also created a display case for these doomed dragonflies, dung beetles and diddlywhoppers that would rival any case displayed in a castle of royal heritage. It had an intricate frame, foam backing, and Plexiglas frontage and took several days to make - creating a garage full of sawdust in the process. It was stained, mitered, and leveled. It was a daddy-daughter effort that daddy completely obsessed over and eventually took over, which was probably for the best. Daughter was okay with that. She was busy hunting the elusive walking stick, which usually hangs around our front porch, but for some unknown reason disappeared as soon as his friends began to

disappear into jars. I also must mention at this point, that I had asked my daughter to consider switching from jars to Ziploc bags for containment, as the latter was much less space consuming, and seemed as though it would accomplish the same end result - a dead bug contained. She obliged, and Baggies now adorned her room along with the Kerr glassware.

One day soon after, the girls (highschool daughter had at this point buddied up to much less squeamish middle-school daughter to enlist her aid in meeting our buggage goal) found a whopper of a bug in our mulch pile. A pride and joy kind of bug. A beetle whose size and beauty compared to none. At least three-and-one-half inches long, with a classically ribbed hard (shell) body, he was not unattractive as some creepy beetle types are. They immediately proclaimed him "Hercules."

About this same time the project moved from her room to the dining table where the process of placing the bugs into the mighty case added to the mix a level of frustration not encountered by our girl in her 10 years of school assignment-dom. Asphyxiating a six-legged beast was nothing, she found, in comparison to trying to pin him to a foam board without those legs falling off, or his wings disintegrating, or his antennae crumpling. Our solution to this was to begin spraying each donor with hair spray prior to beginning the impaling process. (Oh, the sacrifices a mother makes!) 

Record-setting night for Vlad, Eckstein

Vladimir Guerrero got it done, David Eckstein got it done, and for the second night in a row, the Angels got it done.

Guerrero hit two home runs and drove in a career-high nine runs, setting a new Angels record, and Eckstein rapped out a career-high five hits, leading the Angels to a 10-7 come-frombehind victory Wednesday night over the Boston Red Sox before a sellout crowd of 43,205 in Angel Stadium.

Guerrero hit a two-run homer off Boston starter Pedro Martinez in the first inning, drove in two with a double in the third and punched another across with a sacrifice fly in the fourth before his most dramatic moment in the sixth.

With the Angels trailing, 7-5,

Guerrero drives in nine, Seminole grad has first career five-hit game

Guerrero came up to the plate with runners on first and second and was greeted by Red Sox reliever Mike

Guerrero greeted Timlin with a low laser to the gap in left-center field that kept carrying until it disappeared over the wall for his second homer of the game, his career-high eighth RBI in a game, and his 14th long ball of the season, giving the Angels an 8-7 lead they wouldn't relinquish.

After the fireworks went off in the rockpile beyond center field and the fans lingered in a standing ovation,

Guerrero popped out of the dugout and tipped his helmet to his fans. It was his first curtain call as an Angel.

He then added an RBI single in the seventh and gave another toast to the crowd when he went out to right field in the eighth.

The Major League record for most RBIs in a nine-inning game is 12, shared by a pair of Cardinals - Iim Bottomley (Sept. 16, 1924 vs. the Brooklyn Robins) and Mark Whiten (Sept. 7, 1993 vs. the Cincinnati Reds). The American League record is 11, set by the Yankees' Tony Lazzeri on May

24, 1936 vs. the Philadelphia Athletics. Meanwhile, Eckstein was feeling the good vibes, too.

The diminutive leadoff man entered Wednesday's game with a respectable .279 batting average and a career-high 16-game hitting streak, which he added to immediately, singling off Martinez to left field in the first inning.

He added singles in the third, fourth and sixth innings before doubling to the gap in right-center in the seventh to complete the first five-hit game of his career and turn that .279 into a .298







Time is running short for sportsmen who plan to take part in the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC's) quota hunts this fall. Applications have to arrive at the FWC's quota hunt office, by mail, no later than June 11.

The good news is the quota of hunters for the Tate's Hell Wildlife Management Area (WMA) still hunt area will be 150 rather than 100, since the... state purchased the 13,000-acre Crooked River Tract and added it to the WMA.

The Tate's Hell spring turkey hunter quota also increased from 25 to 35. Spring turkey quota applications will be

available Oct. 25. WILDLIFE OFFICERS AND MARINE PATROL ARE HISTORY

Wildlife officers and Marine Patrol officers no longer exist in Florida. There is no such thing as a game warden (actually, there never was such a thing in Florida). Henceforth, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) will refer to its officers as "FWC officers" in all news releases, publications and other materials.

Since the former Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission merged with the former Marine Patrol in July 1999, the FWC and the public have struggled to find an appropriate title for its officers. Suggestions such as "conservation officers" and "law enforcement officers of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission" simply didn't work. OCALA MEN ARRESTED FOR

"MONKEY FISHING" IN PUTNAM Two Ocala brothers were arrested by FWC officers Thursday for "monkey fishing" in Bear Creek off of the Ocklawaha River in Putnam County.

Leo Gerald Bright, 60, (DOB 7/24/45), and his brother, Luther George Bright, 50, (DOB 4/14/54), both of 6491 NW 65th Place, Ocala, were each charged with taking freshwater fish by an illegal method - electric shocking device; and possession of illegal gear on freshwaters of the state. Both charges are 2nd degree misdemeanors which each carry a maximum penalty of a \$500 fine and 60 days

Monkey fishing is an illegal method of fishing that was popular years ago in which the fishermen use a homemade device to send an electrical charge into the water which causes the fish to swim to the surface to escape the charge. The fishermen then use long-handled dip nets to scoop the slightly stunned fish out of the water.

"The charge produced by this device only affects catfish; it is not strong enough to affect scaled fish like bass or sunfish," said Lt. Bob Lee, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's law enforcement supervisor in Putnam County.

Lee knows about monkey fishing since it was quite popular when he started his career in wildlife law enforcement. In fact, 25 years ago he arrested the same two brothers for the same violations in the same area of the Ocklawaha River.

"Two men who know what their doing can catch 400 to 600 pounds of catfish in four hours of monkey fishing," said Lee, who noted that the unusual name for this type of fishing probably originated because the first monkey machines were operated by turning a hand crank, similar to the organ grinder on the street corner with his monkey.

In Thursday's case, the men had only caught about 40 pounds of catfish and were just beginning their fishing expedition when they were surprised by FWC Officer Chad Albritton and FWC Investigator Ben Allen posing as fishermen.

Allen began investigating the situation on Monday after the FWC received a tip about the men monkey fishing. By Wednesday he and Albritton had found the suspects but weren't able to catch them in the act or with

the illegal equipment.

That changed on Thursday when they followed them by boat from the Johnson's Field boat ramp off of Highway 19 to Bear Creek. As the undercover FWC officers rounded a curve in the creek they came upon the two men with the monkey machine in their boat, long-handled dip nets, and the 24 cattish they

had just shocked up. "It is extremely difficult to catch monkey fishermen because they do not bring their equipment back to the ramp. They usually hide it in a swamp behind a large tree or at the junction of several creeks. This makes it imperative that the officers who desire to make this case go after them by boat," said

"If it is a marked boat, the bad guys will very often see the officers coming and toss the device overboard. That's why Ben and Chad's strategy of approaching them as fishermen in an unmarked boat was so effective,"

After finding the Bright brothers, the officers asked them to follow them back to the boat ramp, equipment and fish intact, which they did without incident. In days past though, things may have gone a bit differently.

"When I first started my career on the St. Johns River we had at least one monkey fishing complaint a day during the warmer months," said Lee. "When a monkey fishermen was 'jumped,' there was usually a boat chase and all parties involved thought it was very sporting. That of course was until 1988, when it became a felony to flee on the water."

Although some people do continue to monkey fish, it's not as popular as it once was. Allen said he's only made one other case and that was three years ago in the same general

The Bright brothers' court date is scheduled for June 12 in the Putnam County Courthouse.

Longwood mom indicted for slaying 3 kids

The Seminole County Grand Jury issued a threecount first-degree premeditated murder indictment Tuesday against Andrea Noel Williams, 32, for the deaths of her three children in early

The indictment charges that Williams planned to kill Ilona, age 9; lan, age 6; and Ivey, age 5, and carried out her plan between May 7 and May 10 at the family's home at 890 Georgia Ave., in Longwood. The exact cause of the death remains open pending final

autopsy results.
Investigators suspect Williams red the children stolen prescription pills sometime Mother's Day and watched them die about two hours later.

After the children died she moved them into one bedroom and placed them under a trundle bed. No trauma was found on their bodies.

Assistant State Attorney Pat Whitaker presented testimony to the Grand Jury from a Longwood Police Department detective and a medical examiner. Ms.

Williams remains in the Seminole County Jail where she is being held without

SANFORD — A speeding motorist is pulled over by a Lake Mary police officer on County Road 46A. How much does the citation cost?

Depending on what side of the street and where the infraction took place the driver could slide away with absolutely nothing. It's a loophole in a state law that the of Council Local Governments of Seminole County (CALNO) is looking to close with any luck of gaining support from the legislature and law enforcement associations.

CALNO, which has a representative from all seven cities, the county, school board and Seminole Community College, unanimously approved a resolution last week that would encourage the state to amend the statute to slightly increase law jurisdictional enforcement boundaries.


Currently, municipal police officers are only allowed to provide mutual aid outside its boundaries for a felony or misdemeanor involving the breach of peace. A civil traffic infraction is another issue.

According to Lake Mary Commissioner Gary Brender, several cases have been recently dismissed Seminole County because the officer writing the ticket was outside its municipal boundaries - by only one lane of traffic. Around many of the cities in Seminole County the yellow line painted on the roadway is all that separates two municipal jurisdictions.



Venus transit is a passing lesson

SANFORD — To conduct a science lesson sometimes a teacher doesn't need a classroom — or students for that matter.

Lawton Chiles Middle School teacher Joe Laughlin set up a video camera Tuesday morning on the banks of Lake Monroe to catch the spectacle of "Venus Transit 2004."

Unlike other astronomers in the eastern hemisphere, the planet crossing the sun was only visible in Florida for less than an hour, and for those Seminole County observers even less as clouds shaded the view for somètime.

a convex-lens With equipped telescope projecting the image of the passing Venus into a homemade shadow box, Laughlin spoke to a recording

teaching class. Looking directly into the focused sunlight of the Venus transit can burn the retina of the eye, he said.

"Since it's occurs only every 120 years, I decided I'd put some package together," he said. "We just have to get a cooperative sun here." About 15 minutes after sun-

rise, a large cumulus cloud lifted to the east, and the show began. It would be Laughlin's next to last chance to catch the celestial wonder. Venus Transit will occur again in 2012 but then won't return for another 120 years.

Laughlin started the astronomy lesson with a history about Capt. James Cook.

Sponsored by England's Royal Academy in 1768, Cook's mission was to cross the Atlantic to reach the island of Tahiti before June 1769 to

video camera as if he were observe the transit of Venus. Using trigonometry, Cook and 76 observers around the globe were to use the passing of Venus to calculate the size of the solar system.

"Can you imagine if it was cloudy that day after all that,"

Laughlin quipped.

According to historical records, Tahiti's weather wasn't the problem for Cook, but rather his inability to determine when the transit exactly started or ended.

"Imagine running a race without a definite start or finish," Laughlin said.

In one of his "in-box updates" where Laughlin crawled into the shadow box in the back of his Plymouth Voyager, he pointed out how the planet becomes fuzzy when it reaches the end
