Altamonte Sued Over Annexation

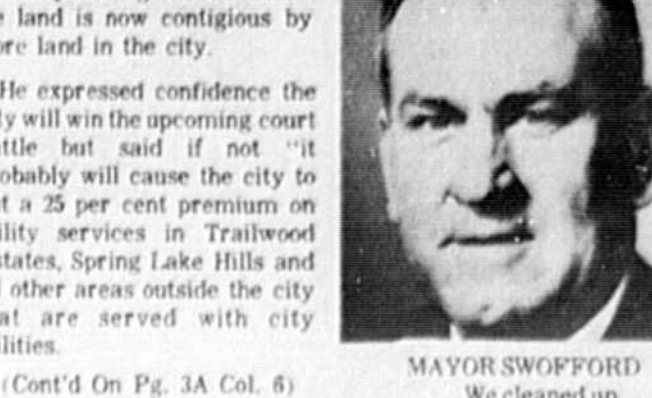

State Atty. General Robert Shubin and an Orange County circuit court have declared circuit annexation of roads to make contiguous later annexations of land illegal.

The pending lawsuit could also, in effect, slash large developments in the contested areas since pending initiatives might be hesitant to finance projects until the legality of the annexation is settled.

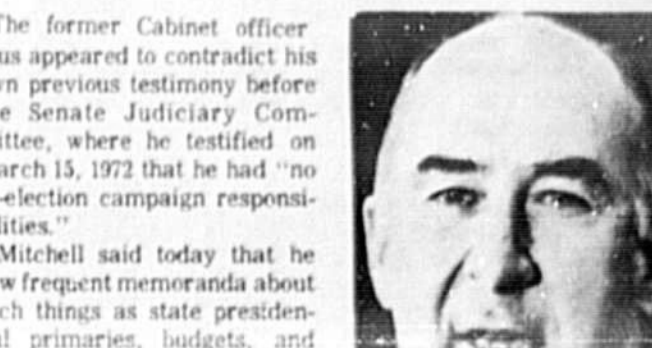

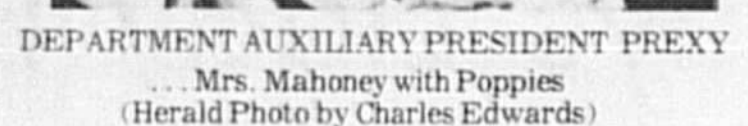

Mitchell Says Liddy First Spoke Of Bugging Demos

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell testified today that when G. Gordon Liddy first broached plans for 1972 political espionage, it was "a complete horror story" that involved wiretaps, girls and code names.

Mitchell told the Senate Watergate committee that in hindsight, he not only should have thrown Liddy "out of the window."

Testifying about a meeting on Jan. 27, 1972, Mitchell said Liddy outlined a political intelligence program that "just went beyond the pale."

Mitchell said as he recalls the meeting, "I told him, to go burn the charts," and said what

President Nixon's campaign organization was interested in was information gathering and protection against demonstrators.

Mitchell also said "I violently disagree" with the earlier testimony of former campaign deputy John S. Maguire that at a Feb. 4 meeting, the then-attorney general was involved in discussions of the Democratic National Committee as a target for electronic surveillance.

Mitchell said he made major decisions about Nixon's re-election campaign while he was still head of the Justice Department.

Mitchell, testifying under subpoena, said Nixon had asked him "to keep an eye on the campaign committee, to see that they didn't get out of line over there."

Martha Misses Opening

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell testified before the Senate Watergate committee today, but where was Martha?

"She is heaven like all the angels," Mitchell told reporters shortly before the hearings began. "They didn't have the right kind of television set for her."

That was a reference to a news story last week that quoted Senate sources as saying the Watergate committee had offered to provide Mrs. Mitchell with a color set in a private room where she could watch the hearings.

Mitchell answered each time, "She decided to stay exactly running over each other, she would have to ask her."

Mitchell would not say whether Mrs. Mitchell was in Washington when she was watching the hearings on television.

Mitchell bantered with newsmen when he arrived at the hearing room 10 minutes before the committee's session began.

Asked if he was nervous, Mitchell shook his hands and said mockingly, "Oh, yes. A nervous man pointed out that his hands were shaking so as to make it difficult for him to light his pipe. 'I didn't notice,' Mitchell said.

Recreation Repairs Draw County's Ire

 The Seminole County School Board today was asked whether it will live up to its agreement to maintain county-financed school recreation sites, or "pass the buck" for \$5,000 in needed repairs to the county commission.

Commissioners acted after school board representative Hugh Carlton said, "If we are going to maintain facilities to your specifications, we will need help... if we maintain them to our specifications, we can do it ourselves."

Carlton said the school board lacked both funds and manpower to carry out routine maintenance on 22 school sites as recommended by the county maintenance supervisor, Henderson Ferguson.

Ferguson presented commissioners with a report itemizing such repairs as cleaning, painting, fence repair, and replacing of basketball nets.

The school board representative, in addition to asking for help, also questioned the existence of the original agreement, saying he could find no record of it.

However, Chairman Sid Vihlen who raised the matter several weeks ago, said he personally knew the agreement was made.

Carlton then said the school board had, in fact, made "considerable effort" to maintain the facilities, citing what he called "replacement of a fence just four months ago," which Ferguson's report listed as damaged and in need of replacement.

When pressed by Ferguson and the board, Carlton conceded the fence had had only partial repairs done in one section.

While praising the efforts in cooperation, Commissioner Dick Williams warned of possible duplication of money, time and effort if the county approves a currently pending recreational program to be run by the YMCA.

First proposed after Vihlen blasted school board maintenance of the facilities as "deplorable," the YMCA program could receive up to \$35,000 to build five major regional recreational facilities on school board property.

Prior to the debate over school facilities, Carlton and the board hammered out a tentative agreement to seek cooperation on coordinating school site selection and engineering problems before actual purchase and construction.

Commissioner Greg Drummond, pointing to what he called the "good example" of a proposed site on Palm Springs Road, said, "I must confess I know nothing since school authorities have not seen fit to meet with the district commissioner."

Increased Supply Would Ease Costs

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—The failure of food production to keep pace with consumer demands leaves little hope that food prices will drop or even remain at their current level in the near future, says the director of the federal cost of living council.

"Given the fundamental facts of our economy, some food prices may even rise," Dr. John T. Dunlop told an Atlanta news conference Monday.

"In the first six months this year," he said, "the amount of food produced in the U. S. was less than that produced in the first half year—and that in the last year demand."

Dunlop was in Atlanta to hear suggestions from businessmen on what course of action President Nixon should take when the present price freeze ends in mid-August.

"He said the next phase—Phase 4—probably will place strong controls on food prices as he is reluctant to raise oil prices," he said.

"Controls are a two-headed sword," Dunlop explained. "They hold down prices but they also threaten supplies. There is no choice but to allow price boosts on some products."

He said that Phase 4 controls would be a matter of choices. "We want low prices but we also want supplies. What we're trying to decide now is how to do that."

Dunlop also said that tighter and more mandatory controls may be placed on gasoline, although he said no definite decisions have been made.

Eye On Cuba

Was Castro Behind Plot Against JFK?

Did Cuban dictator Fidel Castro know in advance that an attempt would be made to assassinate U.S. President John F. Kennedy?

The question has arisen as the result of an article in The Atlantic Monthly which stated that the late President Lyndon Johnson believed Kennedy was killed in retaliation for a thwarted attempt to assassinate Castro.

According to the author of the article, Leo Janos, Johnson on one occasion stated bluntly "I never believed that (Lee Harvey) Oswald acted alone, although I can accept that he pulled the trigger."

There are additional facts, not mentioned by Janos, that tend to support the possibility Castro knew in advance that an attempt was to be made on Kennedy's life.

Oswald traveled to Mexico City on Sept. 27, 1963, and remained there until Oct. 2, 1963. During that time he made several visits to the Cuban and Soviet embassies.

The Warren Report states that "an important source of information" regarding Oswald's trips to the Cuban Embassy was Mrs. Silvia Tiraado de Duran, a Mexican national employed in the visa section of the Cuban Embassy.

Realistically, Mrs. Duran could hardly have been expected to provide anything but the Cuban government's explanation as to why Oswald visited the Cuban Embassy.

Latin American Scene Area U.S. Weak In Diplomacy

NEW YORK—To Latin Americans, "observed former U.S. ambassador to the Organization of American States, Sol M. Linowitz, "President Nixon is the first U.S. president in this century who has prided himself on the mastery of world affairs, yet has had literally no policy for Latin America."

The trouble with such statements as the above is that it's true and then again false. During his recent May trip to Latin America, Secretary of State William Rogers did enunciate a clear policy for Latin America.

In fact, since the policy of "Alliance for Progress" was launched by the late President John F. Kennedy over a decade ago, U.S. policy toward Latin America has been consistent in that each succeeding administration has favored a similar hemispheric-wide economic development scheme that runs counter to the enormous diversity found south of the border.

Some progress has been made in this direction, but it has usually been tried through U.S. aid to governments which squander it by an endless bureaucratic system. American big business, which has contributed much to making Latin America ready to take off economically has come more and more under fire from the political Left.

Once Upon A Time Argentina On Brink Of Civil War

BOGOTA—There once was a great country called Argentina. It was a land of abundance with soil so rich it could feed a nation of beekeepers and have enough left over for all the rest of South America.

Today, Argentina is on the brink of civil war. The soil still is the richest in the hemisphere, but the people have lost their way. Sacrifice, compromise, common sense—these are concepts the Argentines seemingly no longer understand.

Even Juan Domingo Peron, Argentina's legendary dictator, admits the situation is "gravely serious." The country's problem must be "solved" by all the Argentines because it is not, no one else can solve it.

As political scenarios go in Latin America, Peron's return is a mastery piece of Machiavellianism.

During 18 long years, the Argentines have convinced themselves that the key to trouble in Argentina is Peron. The dictator's followers claim that nothing can be resolved without Peron.

Peron, of course, always has been a better politician than the younger generals who ruled more recently. The guerrilla warfare did not end with Campora's election, as Peron undoubtedly expected.

But I believe that any person who blatantly and cold-bloodedly takes someone else's life should pay with his own. It's inconceivable to me how the black community can be the scene of horrifying violence and at the same time allow the so-called liberal while politicians and out worn worthless black ones to continue.

EDITORIAL Should we care about Burundi?

Burundi is an East African nation of about 3.5 million people. That is about 100,000 fewer people than live here in Florida. The other 100,000 are dead, massacred in a vicious, ghastly, intertribal conflict that has recently spilled still more fresh blood.

Most Americans have been unaware of those deaths and probably unaware there were such a place as Burundi. We have had, after all, our own more immediate problems. And when we get through thinking about them, it is easier to worry about how Liza Minnelli and Peter Sellers are getting along, or whether the Cubs can hold on to their lead this time.

Burundi is a long way away, geographically, culturally, ethnically and politically. (It is unlikely that the ancestors of many American blacks came from Burundi, since most slave trading with the United States was carried on from the west coast of Africa.)

The structure of Burundian society is, superficially at least, alien to us. The government and economy is ruled by the Tutsi tribe (the once-famous pseudo-Africanized, the Hutus, was named after them). Most of the work is done by the Hutus. And the fact that the Tutsi make up only about 10 to 15 per cent of the country's population to the Hutu's 85 per cent is the source of most of the friction.

But then in April 1972 the Hutus mounted a large-scale attempt to overthrow the government of President Michel Micombero, a Tutsi and former army officer who had overthrown the king in 1966.

Heart Ails Delay Trial of Lansky

MIAMI (AP)—The federal income tax evasion trial of aging underworld figure Meyer Lansky has been delayed after a court-appointed heart specialist said Lansky could not withstand the rigors of a trial.

U. S. District Judge Joe Eaton postponed the trial, scheduled to have started Monday, and set a hearing for Wednesday at which time testimony will be taken from doctors.

Dr. Edward St. Mary told the court in a letter Monday that the 71-year-old Lansky needs at least six more months to recuperate from open heart surgery performed in March.

St. Mary, a court-appointed specialist, said Lansky is in "precarious cardiovascular condition" and is suffering from pain, fatigue, dizziness, memory lapses and a slurring of speech.

Both government and defense attorneys suggested that if Lansky's doctors agree, the racketeer figure could be tried under special conditions including short court sessions, regular recesses and nap sessions.

The government is concerned that the day may come when Lansky can never be tried," said Jim Dowd, an attorney with the U.S. Justice Department in Washington.

New Skylab Crew Tests Spaceship

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Three astronauts who will be the second crew to live America's Skylab space station spent several hours Monday checking the Apollo spaceship that will take them to their cabin in the sky.

It was the last time Commander Alan Bean, Dr. Owen Garriott and Jack Lousma were scheduled to enter the spacecraft before climbing aboard for their ride into orbit at 7:08 a.m. EDT July 28.

They were to return today to the Johnson Space Center at Houston, Tex., where they will continue to train for the 56-day mission in the orbiting scientific laboratory.

After checking out the systems of the spacecraft atop a Saturn rocket, the astronauts had dinner in their crew quarters at Cape Kennedy and reviewed equipment they will carry with them into space.

Bean, 38, is a Navy captain who walked on the moon during the flight of Apollo 12. Garriott, 41, is a civilian with a doctorate in electrical engineering, and Lousma, 35, is a Marine Corps major.

'New Team' Gets Call State Agency Slots To Be Filled

BY KEN GEFFERT Associated Press Writer TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A legislative select committee will be called in today to beef up a state General Services Department weakened by resignations.

The cabinet is expected to appoint Jack D. Kane to succeed Chester Blakemore as director of the vast state bookkeeping, construction and purchasing agency.

Blakemore, who had held the \$12,000-a-year job since the department was created in 1969, resigned last month after complaining he was "tired and worn out."

Kane, 45, was nominated to succeed Blakemore by his present boss, Insurance Commissioner Tom O'Malley. He quickly attracted the support of Gov. Reubin Askew and Atty. Gen. Robert Shubin, discouraging any cabinet members from submitting their own nominations.

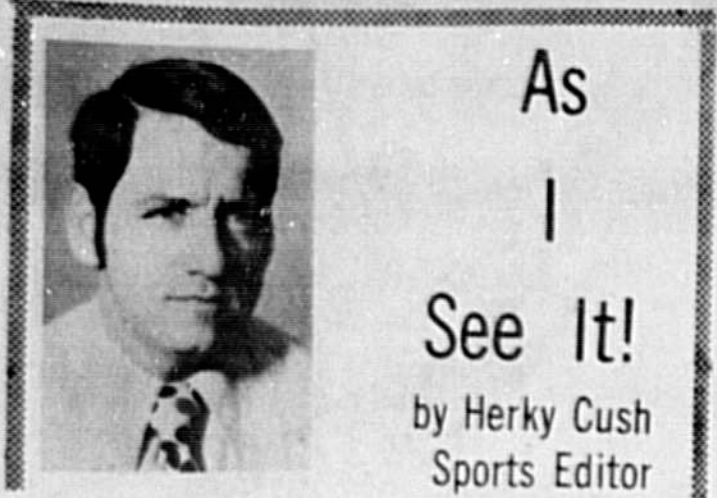
