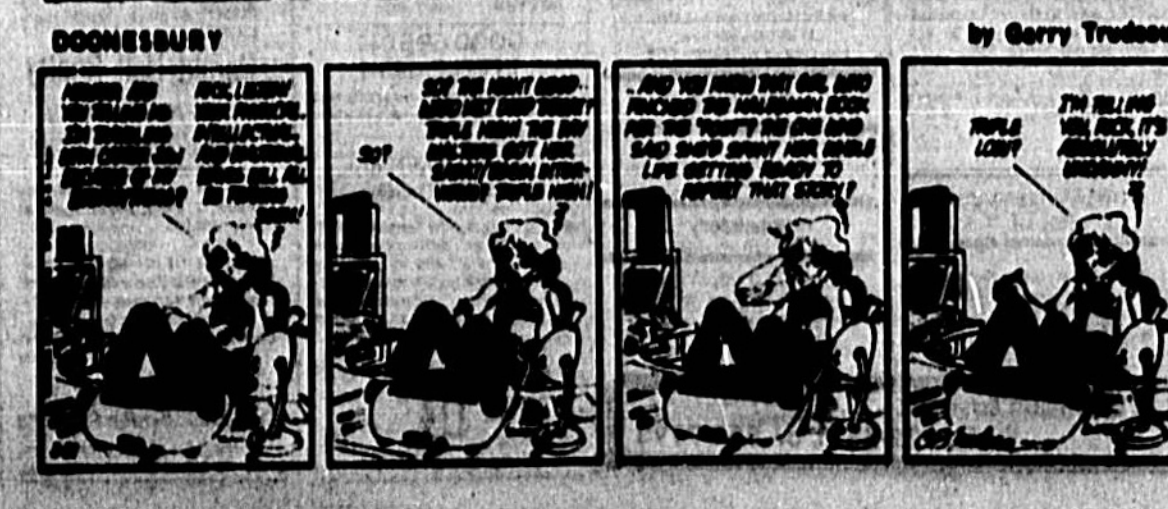

## Bacter Bugs in Baskets?

### Sears Warning Customers

CHICAGO (UPI) — All Easter baskets bought at Sears Roebuck and Co. stores recently should be returned immediately for refund because the baskets may contain insects.

Sears said Tuesday there might not be a health hazard but advised the recall of the wicker baskets and all its contents as a precaution.

A Sears spokesman said no insect larvae or a powder-puff beetle has been found in the wicker of some baskets but a number of stores across the nation. The beetle thrives on bamboo and other fibrous materials.

## Teamsters Official Slain

NEW YORK (UPI) — A New Jersey Teamsters official once suspected of involvement in the 1975 disappearance of Jimmy Hoffa was gunned down gangland-style in Manhattan's Little Italy section Tuesday night, police said.

Witnesses told police two unidentified men shot Salvatore Strano, 46, in the face and chest about 11:30 p.m. as he stood in the rain in front of a restaurant.

Strano, 46, of Westwood, N.J., business agent for Teamsters Local 606, died instantly, police said, and the two gunmen sped in a car.

## Fire Pact OK'd By Longwood

On the basis of a strong recommendation by Fire Chief Charles Chapman, and despite reservations expressed by some council members, Longwood has agreed to enter an inter-local agreement with Brevard County for fire service.

"This here is just another way for them to come in here and take over the whole city," Council Chairman J. Russell Grant said at a Monday council meeting.

Despite that, the move was unanimously approved by the council. Initial cost to the city is \$1,875, according to Chapman, who said over three years the total cost will be \$7,500.

In exchange, the city gets an estimated \$4,000 worth of equipment, Chapman said, and county firefighters will respond immediately to alarms within the city limits of Longwood.

Council members generally agreed the plan would provide needed protection to residents moving into the rapidly growing western section of the city.

The city's fire station is located on Wilma Avenue in the east section of the city.

Outside council chambers, during a break in the meeting, Grant told Chapman he doubted county firefighters would respond as quickly as city firemen, even if the county station is nearer the alarm.

"You burn down city hall next week," Chapman told Grant, "and I guarantee county firefighters will be here in an hour as it takes to drive from the station."

Funds for the inter-local agreement will be taken from \$1,000 budgeted for a fire department training program, Chapman said.

In other action the council: Agreed to install a street light at Fern Way and Jay Street for the benefit of Mylar's residents who have complained of vandalism in the area. Mylar's and Jay streets will get a new pole to conform with Mylar's street restrictions.

Agreed to discuss the paving of Pasadena Avenue on the first item on next Monday's agenda.

# FLORIDA IN BRIEF

## Legislative Panel Looks For Consumer Counsel

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A legislative committee hopes to pick a new public counsel to represent consumers in utility rate cases today, but the panel might be too deeply split to get the job done.

There are four finalists for the posts and each has support from one or more of the 10 members of the Joint Legislative Management Committee and the outcome is uncertain.

Former State Rep. Jack Shreve and Iowa Commerce Solicitor Philip Malzer appear to have the most support, but still in the running are former state Banking Director George Lewis and William Moore, former counsel for the Department of Business Regulation.

## Impeach Legality Questioned

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A possible impeachment of convicted Lake City Circuit Court Judge Sam Smith could be overturned by the courts because Smith won't be able to defend himself before the Legislature, an attorney says.

But the House Impeachment Committee ignored the warnings by Tallahassee lawyer Joe Jacobs and unanimously voted Tuesday to proceed with the hearings which could lead to Smith's forfeiture of an \$18,000 to \$22,000 annual pension.

## Working Under A 'Cloud'

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — About 20 firemen in gas masks worked for an hour and a half Tuesday night before plugging a leak in a Seaboard Coastline tank car containing 25,000 gallons of highly toxic hydrochloric acid.

There were no injuries and no property damage, except to the tanker itself.

Battalion Chief J.R. Seward said about 50 gallons of the acid escaped in a vaporous cloud that hovered over the firemen as they worked near the Florida Food Mills in a remote section of west Jacksonville.

## Grand Jurors Cross-Examined

MIAMI (UPI) — An attorney for a co-defendant of Ronny Zamora in a Miami Beach murder will get what may be an unprecedented chance to question grand jurors before they decide whether to indict his client.

Circuit Judge Paul Baker ruled Tuesday that attorney Milton Grammark may question grand jury members considering the case of 19-year-old Darrell Agrella to see if they were prejudiced by reports of Zamora's trial last year.

Baker said if prejudice is established, he may ask prosecutors to seek an indictment in another county.

## Drowning Under Investigation

KEY WEST (UPI) — Sheriff's deputies say they still haven't identified a man who drowned when he was thrown into waters off a unshaded government-owned island known as Tank Farms.

The partially decomposed body was dressed in swimming trunks and sandals and was tied by a rope into a fetal position.

The body was picked up late Monday night by the U.S. Coast Guard and Monroe County deputies after an anonymous caller had tipped them to it.

## Disaster Or Bad Luck?

HOMESTEAD (UPI) — U.S. Agriculture Secretary Robert Bergland must decide what south Dade County's vegetable farmers cannot: whether last winter's weather was a disaster or just routine bad luck.

Gov. Reubin Askew, acting on the recommendation of a local disaster-planning group, has requested Bergland to declare the farm area south of Miami a disaster area. Bergland is expected to make the decision within 10 days.

## Altamonte Aids Longwood's Bid For Sewer Funds

Longwood wants federal funding to construct a city-wide sewer system and the city government of Altamonte Springs is willing to help. 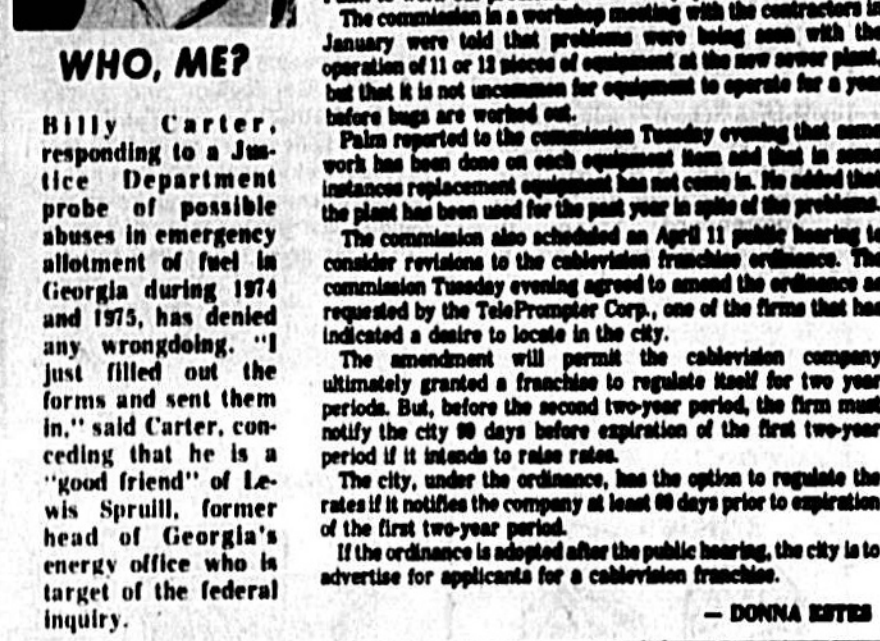

## In Casselberry Area Residents Complain Of Mosquito Plague

A petition is being circulated in Casselberry requesting the city to designate a mosquito control program as emergency priority. McIntosh said that Group Seven is claiming that it added the city in obtaining a federal grant for the cost of doing studies on the feasibility of connecting to the proposed line.

## Altamonte: Machine Woe

The Altamonte Springs City Commission has set a deadline of June 30 for construction contractors, Tuttle-White of Altamonte Springs and Lee Construction of Sanford, to work out bids in the equipment at the regional sewer plant on Keller Road. In the interim period, Mayor Norman Floyd said he will work with the contractors, sewer plant operator Dave Sawyer, Public Service Director Don Newman and consulting engineer Bill Palm to work out problems with the equipment. The commission in a workshop meeting with the contractors in January were told that problems were being seen with the operation of 11 or 12 pieces of equipment at the new sewer plant, but that it is not uncommon for equipment to operate for a year before bugs are worked out. Palm reported to the commission Tuesday evening that some work has been done on each equipment item and that in some instances replacement equipment has not come in. He added that the plant has been used for the past year in spite of the problems. The commission also scheduled an April 11 public hearing to consider revisions to the collection franchise ordinance. The commission Tuesday evening agreed to amend the ordinance as requested by the Tuttle-White Corp., one of the firms that has indicated a desire to locate in the city. The amendment will permit the collection company ultimately granted a franchise to regulate itself for two year periods. But, before the second two-year period, the firm must notify the city 90 days before expiration of the first two-year period. If it intends to raise rates. The city, under the ordinance, has the option to regulate the rates if it notifies the company at least 90 days prior to expiration of the first two-year period. If the ordinance is adopted after the public hearing, the city is to advertise for applicants for a collection franchise. — DONNA RYTER

## More Phones Due For Courthouse

Your chances of getting a call through to county officials will improve next month when four additional telephone lines are installed in the Seminole County Courthouse telephone system. The county commission voted unanimously to install the new trunk lines at a cost of \$84,000 and \$25,000 per month. A feasibility study was conducted at the courthouse from Jan. 9 through Jan. 11 by Southern Bell Telephone Co. That study showed that four to 17 percent of all calls being placed to the courthouse were not being answered due to the lack of enough lines. In other commission action, a proposal to provide two clinic nurses for the county health department's maternity clinics was approved. Another nurse for the department's "baby" clinics was also approved. Total cost for the new nurses, equipment and a back-up physician for the clinics will be \$7,700, according to Troy Todd, director of Human Services. The cost would be paid through additional federal funds, according to Todd. However, before these funds can be approved, the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services must approve the project, he added. The back-up physician would be used to serve the clinics in the absence of the health director, Todd explained. The hiring of the nurses will free full-time public health nurses to work on "preventive health areas," according to Todd. Such areas would include home and school visits.

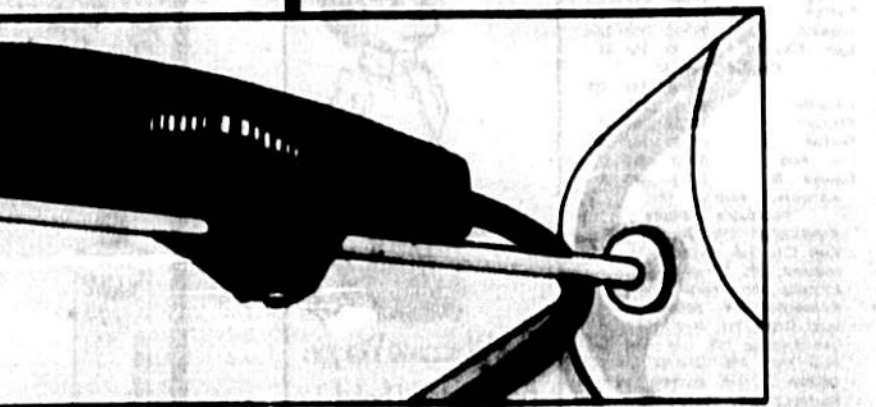
