WEEK'S PROGRESS IN SOUTHLAND

HOTEL FOR SANFORD AND MANY OTHER IMPROVEMENTS IN STATE OF FLORIDA

Columbus, Ga., Jan. 28. The Industrial Index says in its issue for this week:

"Steadily increasing activities in the southeast indicate good general conditions in February.

"The first month of the year has brought business improvement that hardly seemed possible six weeks ago, and the prospects are even brighter for greater improvement. Manufacturing plants have been increasing their operations, and many which had been closed have begun operation.

"The increase in construction operations is not so easily expressed in figures, but it is large. The plans and preparations for building are such as to indicate that construction operations in the southeast will soon be nearing normal. The Industrial Index expects unusual building activities in the spring and summer.

"Cotton is selling at \$8.60 more a bale than it brought at the low level of last year. Many large plantations are making large expenditures. A number of cities and counties are making, or preparing to make large outlays for public improvements.

"A Birmingham steel company has received from a western railroad an order for 30,000 tons of steel rail. Another company of the same city, which is operating its plant day, night and Sunday has received one order for 65,000 barrels of cement. A company at Bayport, Ala., has received a large order from Jacksonville, Fla., and has placed its plant in operation.

"A company has been incorporated to establish electric light and power plants and ice plants in Florida cities and to build an electric railway.

"A Florida city has awarded contract for public improvements to cost \$215,000.

"Twenty-six corporations have been organized during the week with minimum capital stocks aggregating \$416,000. Banks have been organized at Iuka, Miss., and Monticello, Fla.

"Among the items of construction work to be done as reported this week, are:

"Apartment house, Atlanta, Ga.; church building, Anniston, Ala.; hotel building, Sanford, Fla.; school building, drainage, sewers and water-works, Hawkinsville, Ga.; garages, Augusta, Ga.; and Dunedin, Fla.; West Miami, Fla.; National building, Atlanta, Ga.; factory buildings, Jacksonville and West Tampa, Fla.; warehouses two, Augusta, Ga. and Macon, Ga.; and St. Petersburg, Fla.

"Construction contracts have been awarded as follows: Railway bridge over Alabama river in Alabama; levee and sewers, Augusta, Ga.; paving, Quitman, Ga.; railway shop building, Waycross, Ga.; sanitarium building, Chester, S. C.; school building, LaBelle, Fla.; paving, sewers and water works, Manatee, Fla.; factory building, Columbus, Ga.; warehouse, Chester, S. C.

"Industrial plants will be established as follows:

"Flour and grist mill, Blythe, Ga.; cotton mill extension, Columbus, Ga.; fertilizer factory, Midville, Ga.; ice plant, Laurel, Miss.; abattoir, Jacksonville, Fla.; cold storage plant, Macon, Ga.; electric light plant, Toccoa, Ga.; railway extension from Starje to Green Cove Springs, Fla."

FLORIDA LIVE STOCK

The meeting in Sanford next week of the Florida Live Stock Association that has been called during the Seminole County Fair Association will be full of surprises for the stranger who does not realize that Florida is rapidly forging ahead in this great development of the state's resources.

An increase in the past five years in the number of horses owned in Florida of over eleven thousand is noted in a bulletin issued by the national agricultural department for the year ending December 31, 1914.

Cows increased in number, despite heavy exportation, from one hundred and eighteen thousand to one hundred and thirty three thousand, and in value from thirty five dollars each to forty two dollars and fifty cents.

These figures give a slight insight into the animal industry of Florida, but they are only a mere indication of what could really be done if the state turned its attention, seriously, to cattle, hog and sheep raising.

GOVERNOR TRAMMELL FOR CONGRESSMAN

WILL NOT ENTER RACE FOR SENATE WHEN TERM HAS EXPIRED

The Times-Union of yesterday contained a special from Tallahassee as follows:

"Gov. Park Trammell returned to the capital late Saturday night after being absent all last week making an official tour of inspection of the drainage operations in the Everglades. Gov. Trammell was asked today regarding the reports recently published that he may be a candidate for congress from the First congressional district. In answer to this inquiry he stated:

"For several weeks past a number of citizens of the First district have from time to time expressed a desire that I become a candidate in 1916 for congress from that district and have stated that they were of the opinion that a good majority of the people of the district would like to have me represent the district in congress.

"These expressions of confidence and the repeated assurance of the desire on the part of a substantial number of the people of my congressional district to have me represent the district have caused me to give serious thought to the matter and I have recently about reached the conclusion that at the proper time I would announce my candidacy for congress from the first district. The time for the primary is still so far distant, however, that I did not deem it timely to make any public statement about the matter yet, especially as the congressman elected last November has not yet entered

upon the services of his new term. "It seems, though, that activities have already commenced as to the succession to Mr. Sparkman and that under the above stated circumstances the people of the district are entitled to know my attitude and I will therefore state that it is my intention at a later date to become a candidate for congress from the First Florida district. "Practically my entire life having been spent in the First congressional district and the good people of that district having always been exceedingly kind and generous to me, I would most naturally esteem it as a very high honor to be chosen as their representative in the halls of congress."

OTHER NOTED FAIRS HELD IN SANFORD

THIS CITY PLAYED HOST TO PRESIDENT CLEVELAND AT FAIR

The great Seminole County Fair to be held in this city next week is not the first fair to be held in Sanford. This city has the distinction of being the first city in south Florida to have a fair and President and Mrs. Grover Cleveland were the guests of honor. Other fairs were held from time to time but after the freeze the people did not have the heart or the money to enter into the fairs and for the past twenty years this city has been out of the fair class.

It is interesting to note that just 27 years ago Sanford was preparing for a fair. We are indebted to Mrs. Marshall for the information in the shape of a copy of the South Florida Argus of the date of January 19th, 1888, her father, E. W. Peabody being editor of the Argus at that time. We note the following notice about the fair:

Our City on a Boom

We learn from Secretary Huggins that our fair is on a regular boom. The demand for space for exhibits has already far exceeded the expectations of the directors, and they have decided to erect an additional building, 35x85 feet, to meet the requirements. The accounts coming in from South Florida are very encouraging, and the displays of fruits and vegetables from that quarter bids fair to be immense. The J. T. & K. W. R. R. are now giving valuable assistance to the enterprise, and the railroads of the state have kindly consented to transport all uniformed military companies competing for the prize free both ways. There is no doubt but what the oarsmen will be here and give an exhibition on the lake during the fair. Letters have been received from a great many horse owners over the state who wish to come, some of whom object

to the rules as printed in the premium list. To all such we are authorized to say, come on, the rules will be modified and varied to suit the requirements of the occasion, and a hurdle race will be added.

Stand privileges have been granted the following parties, they being the highest bidders: E. M. Faber, lunch counter, soda water, candy, etc.; L. R. & R. R. Philips, tobacco and cigars; Wm. Friend, lemonade; A. J. Phillips, news stand.

Judges of awards will be appointed later on.

Work on the grounds goes rapidly on, and the prospects of the exhibition are indeed flattering.
