## 3 Youths Arrested In Weekend Raid

Two persons, including a 15-year-old boy, were arrested during the weekend by Seminole County authorities and Sanford police in separate attacks on city-county narcotic offenses.

An Orange County school custodian and part-time Seminole Junior College student was charged Sunday with possession of marijuana after a raid by county and state authorities on an Altamonte Springs fraternity house.

Sheriff John Polk reported Dwight G. Schlicht, 20, of 6310 Underhill Drive, Orlando, was released from county jail yesterday afternoon after posting \$1,500 bond.

Schlicht was arrested and a quantity of marijuana confiscated after Duane Harrell, chief deputy; Lt. James Smith and Lt. Jack Walton, Florida Highway Patrol, lead a raid on the Sigma Phi Kappa fraternity house, SR-463 in Altamonte Springs.

The raid came yesterday at 1 p.m. after a search warrant was obtained from County Judge Wallace Hall.

Arthur B. Eastman, 18, of 4309 Park Lake Avenue, Orlando, was apprehended by Lieutenant Walton in the same raid after 14 stolen vehicle inspection stickers and a quantity of stolen driver's licenses were recovered.

Polk said Eastman also a SJC student, was booked for unlawful possession of motor inspection stickers and released on \$300 bond.

A 15-year-old juvenile was charged by Tom Deppen, city detective, with possession of marijuana and released to parents Saturday after police found a packet of narcotics on the youth. Deppen said the arrest occurred in the Sanford Plaza parking lot.

## Second Report Of Sex Deviate In Week Girls Frighten Off Molester

The second reported incident of school children being forced into cars by apparent sex deviates within a week occurred late Friday afternoon when two Milwee Junior High female students were forced into a car by an unidentified man who exposed himself to them.

Seminole County Sheriff John Polk said the girls, ages 13 and 14, started to scream and cry and the would-be molester became alarmed and put them out of the car, somewhere near SR 436 and Interstate 4 intersection.

According to the county report, the two girls were walking along SR 436 when a white Chevrolet drove along side and ran until they attracted attention and authorities were called.

The girls refused but the man reportedly forced the two inside the car and proceeded to expose himself to the frightened girls who began to cry and scream.

The deviate, apparently alarmed over the outcry, stopped the car and dislodged the girls, who ran until they attracted attention and authorities were called.

In the meantime, the molester drove away at high speed to make his escape.

The victims described the man as being approximately six feet in height with brown eyes and dark hair.

The two girls were on their way to school when a man drove along side and drew a pistol to force the girls into his car.

They were later released near Lake Mary School after having been fondled and one of them apparently raped.

In this incident, the abductor reportedly drove an old model red car.

Meanwhile, a Sanford woman called police and reported her eight-year-old daughter was accosted by a car filled with hippies and an effort was made by a female to get the little girl to get inside the car.

Police report said the car contained three male and two female hippies and the incident occurred near the eight-year-old's home. According to the report, the eight-year-old became frightened and ran.

## Tuition Grants Proposed

At next month's session of the State Legislature, a very important piece of legislation insofar as some Seminole County parents are concerned will be that area to provide tuition grants to students in non-public schools.

Method of payment will be to the parents or guardians and the school of those students who are residents of Florida.

The amount of the grant, per pupil, would be two thirds of the State's share of per pupil cost of educating a child in public schools in Florida (determined by dividing State's appropriations by number of children in daily membership — ADM), which amounts to slightly less than \$300 per year.

Because of the current financial crisis, it is proposed to stagger the amount over three years: 1970-71 \$100 per pupil; 1971-72 \$100 per pupil; 1972-73 and subsequent years — the fraction of the State's cost.

There are presently 12,000 non-public school pupils throughout the state, and if everyone qualified, the 1970-71 appropriations would be \$11.2 million.

According to information released by the Catholic Diocese of Orlando, there are two Catholic schools in Seminole County with a pupil enrollment of 781 students.

Based on figures from the State Department of Education (with a state average of \$623), the per pupil cost to educate in the public system for these 781 students in Seminole County amounts to \$429,572, based on an average cost set at \$552.31. The county pays for 35 per cent or \$150,850.

## Ex-Constable, Police Chief Freed

## Kelsey Charges Dismissed

Former constable and Oviedo police chief George Kelsey was freed this morning of conspiracy charges when Circuit Court Judge Tom Waddell Jr., after 90 minutes of deliberation in his chambers accepted a motion to quash Count 1 of the indictment against Kelsey and Eddie McGee.

The indictment alleged a conspiracy between Kelsey and McGee to operate a gambling house and violate state beverage laws.

Defense Attorney Gordon Frederick said in his motion to quash that "a conspiracy can take place only once and ends when the offense itself commences. The information shows that if a conspiracy took place, it was on Sept. 21, 1965, therefore the statute of limitations would bar prosecution." Mack Cleveland, McGee's attorney, adopted the same argument.

McGee, however, is still to be tried on the second count of the indictment in which he is charged with operating and keeping a gambling house in Oviedo in a restaurant known as "The Twin Pines." Frederick and Cleveland will continue McGee's defense. Kelsey is no longer party to the case.

Abbott Herring, state prosecutor, contended that the statute of limitations begins to run two years from the time the conspiracy has ended; therefore, the statute of limitations had not run out.

Three indictments against Kelsey and McGee were dismissed previously on Wednesday for lack of witnesses by the prosecution. Two of these alleged bribery and a conspiracy to operate and conduct a lottery.

Kelsey, who was the constable at the time of the alleged violations of the law, was removed from his office by Gov. Claude Kirk and was reinstated by the Florida State Senate. Recently Kelsey sought election to the office of sheriff but was defeated by John Polk.

The charges were filed on the two almost three years ago in April of 1967.

## Capital Stock Is Increased

The Sanford Atlantic National Bank today has placed in the hands of its shareholders rights to subscribe for a new common capital stock issue. Shareholders of record as of Jan. 15, have the right to subscribe to one share of stock for each six and two-thirds shares owned on that date, or 15 per cent of present stockholdings will be issued subject to the final approval of the Comptroller of the Currency. The effective date of the issue should be April 25, 1970.

The new issue will be for 7,500 additional shares (par value of \$10) and will increase capital stock from \$200,000 to \$575,000.

The warrants and right to subscribe will expire April 15, 1970.

The council also will consider taking action on the following items: New stop light for 436 near Oxford Road; City map renovation for new city hall complex; and municipal appointments.

The council will hold another work session tomorrow evening concerning the hiring of a city administrative assistant. The city also will hear a report on insurance for the police auxiliary.

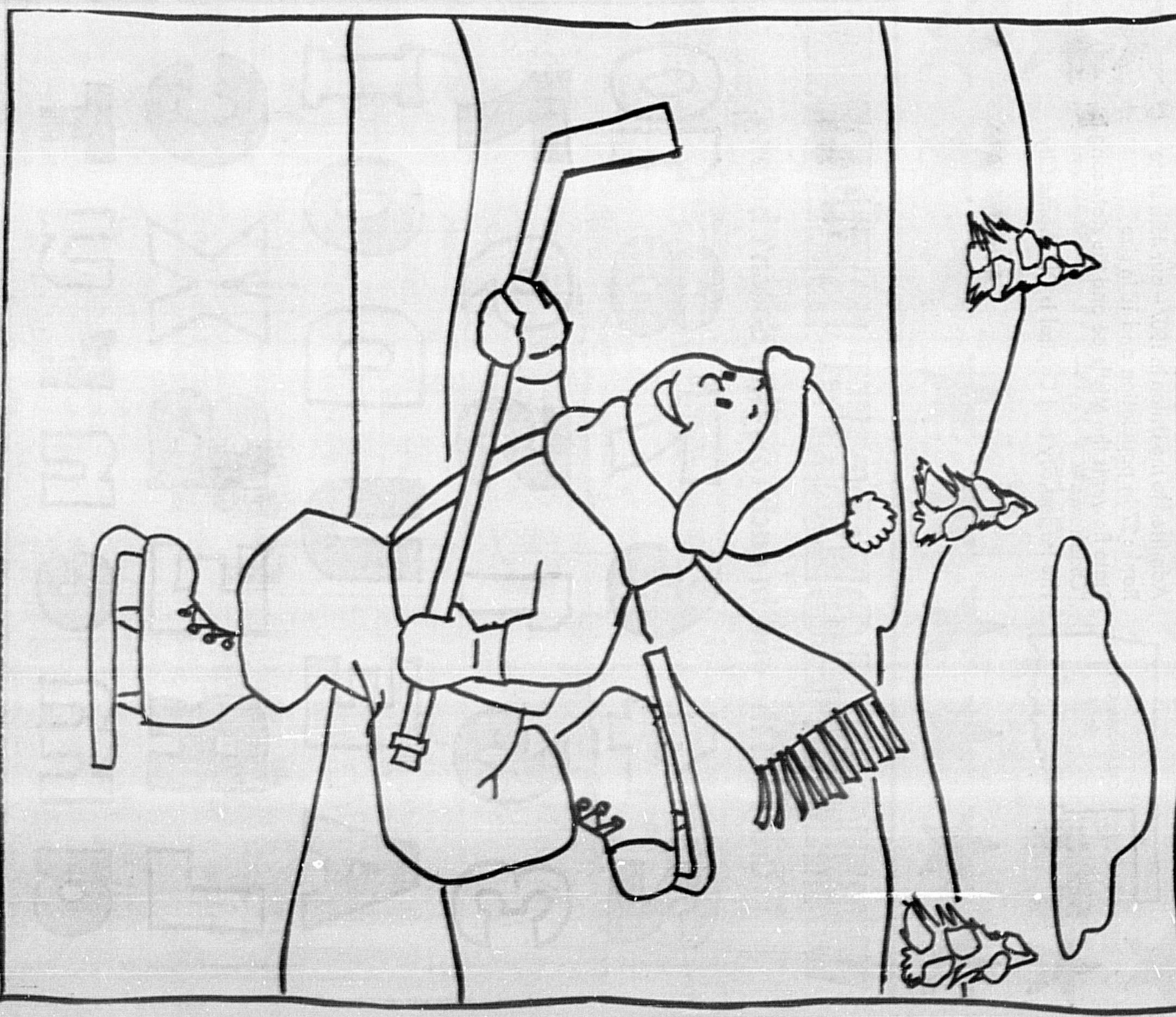

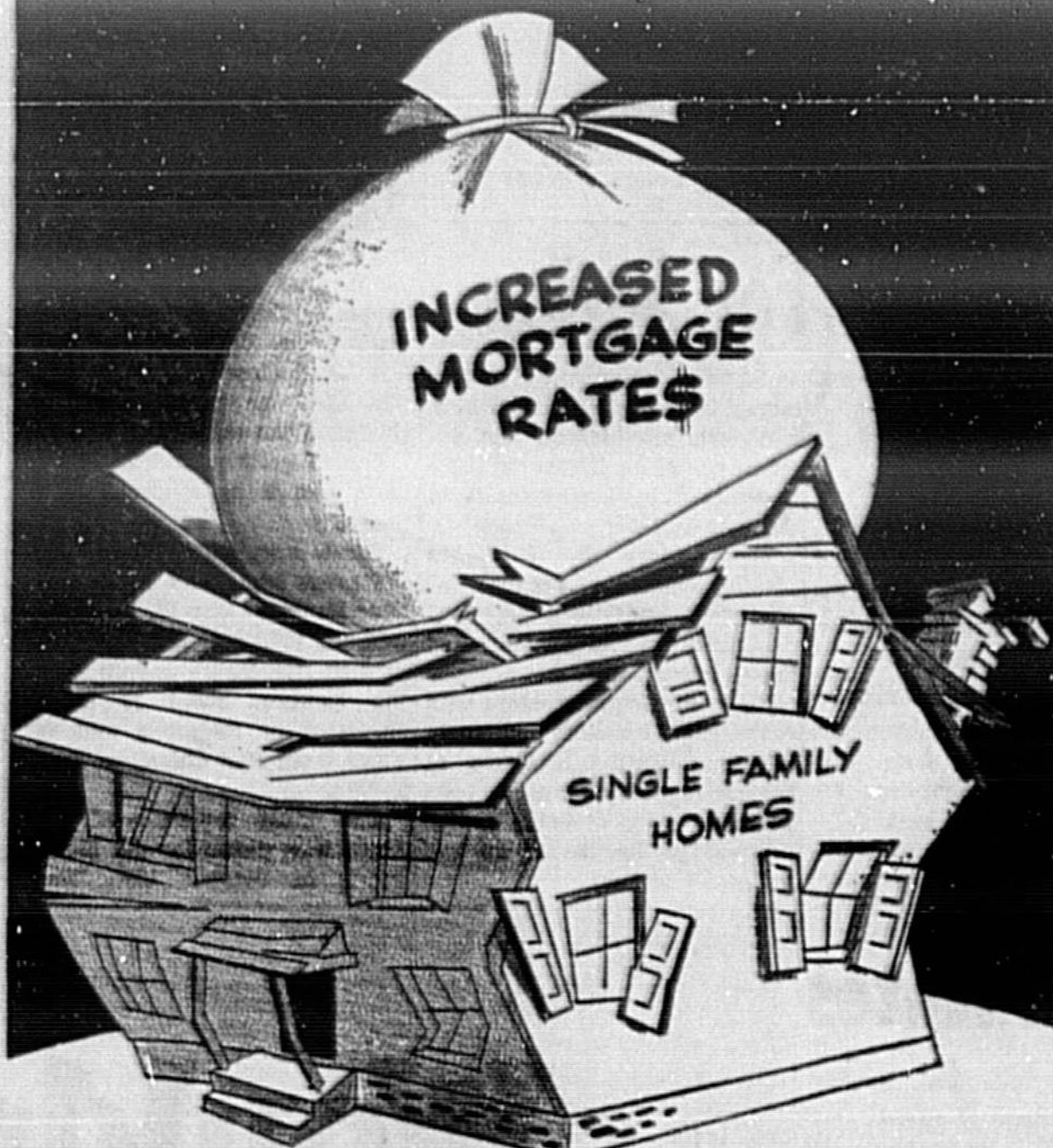
Banks are not major factors in housing — except in loaning temporary construction money to builders. It will only give them more money to loan at increasing interest rates.

Storm-Track System Improved For Season

MIAMI (AP) — A new storm-tracking system will be introduced next season in a move prompted by the tricky encounter with Hurricane Camille, the most violent ever to rage across the Western World.

For the first time Navy, Air Force and Weather Bureau hurricane hunters will fly identical missions that hopefully will reveal more of a storm's motion, according to Dr. Robert Simpson, director of the National Hurricane Center.

"If we had used this system on Camille," said Simpson, "I think we could have known more about her shifting character, forecast earlier that she was a record-buster, and she would have tracked her more accurately."

The new flight patterns, worked out in a series of conferences just ended, each pilot will probe the center and all four quadrants of a hurricane as it moves toward the coast.

"Camille taught us a lot of lessons about our reconnaissance programs. This will make an enormous difference, I think, in our ability to make quick use of reconnaissance data."

Simpson said in past years military planes measured data in accordance with their own procedures, established independently of each other.

Camille, which ravaged the coast of Mississippi with 30-foot storm tides and winds higher than 200 miles an hour, baffled forecasters for a time by howling steadily northward when computers predicted she would swing to northeast.

"I think with the new information we'll be able to tell earlier courses out in advance of the what our computer models are doing wrong," Simpson said.

Also he will fly a broad cross-section in advance of a hurricane to measure forces into which the storm is moving and which could change its intensity or direction.

"This will tell us the structure of the violent vortex—whether it is stable, is about to collapse or is a higher, more vicious storm, or is on the verge of spreading out and weakening," Simpson said.

"But," he added, "it will cause some controversy because the report will recommend greater protection agency."

"The draft does not recommend as to where it should be," he said. "The draft says what it ought to be."

Backing Nixon's Crime War

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — The alarming increase in crime during the Nixon administration has become the focus of an advertising blitz as "the new apostle of sanity in sex."

Witness this statement by a young offender involved in a brutal homicide: "Momentarily, I started thinking about it inside; I have my mind made up I'm not going to be in no gang. Then I go on inside. Something comes up. Then here all my friends come up. I don't want to go, but when they start talkin' about what they gonna do, I say, 'Yo, he ain't gonna take me my rap. I ain't gonna let him be know no more than me.' And I go ahead, just for selfishness..."

Or listen to what another youth involved in a gang killing told a sociology professor: "If I would of got the knife, I would have stabbed him. There's no way to go me more of a built-up. People would have respected me for what I've done and things like that. They would say, 'There goes a cold killer.'"

What Nixon can give the local money-pinked police forces (Congress willing) is training, technical equipment, a communications network and a data bank.

What he can't give them is what they need most of all—public support.

Many local police forces are not equipped to get the degree and breadth of evidence now required for conviction in numerous cases before the courts.

Few local police units are equipped by training and experience to operate within the stringent procedure courts have decreed must now be followed in dealing with suspects and criminals when caught.

As a result, shrewd attorneys use technicians to make a mockery of justice.

Conventional police methods (for prevention and detection) as used in many American communities cannot cope with the growing number of amateur criminals who murder, beat or kill for "kicks."

These law-breakers don't follow textbook crime patterns.

The reports indicate that glorification of well-known gangs of hoodlums has encouraged a host of young initiators who want to "prove" themselves and "be somebody" as evidenced in epidemic of "senseless" crimes nationally.

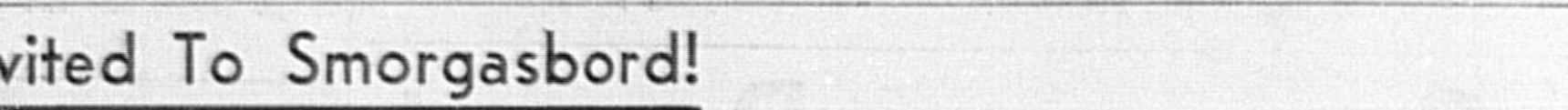

F. Darby, head of the Experiment Station, has scheduled the program to start promptly at 1:30 in the afternoon.

Topics on the program will include insect and disease problems on cabbage, corn, celery and other crops. There will be information given on new crop introductions and results of variety trials, as well as a discussion of water quality studies and artificial well water study. After the discussion period, there will be a tour of the experimental plots.

This Field Day should be of primary interest to commercial vegetable growers and others concerned with the vegetable industry.

# Red Weapons Positions, Base Camps Hit By B52s

**SANFORD (UPI)** — American B52s followed up a day of raids in Laos with a series of strikes Sunday night and early today against the A Shau Valley, where the Ho Chi Minh Trail enters South Vietnam from Laotian territory.

The Stratofortresses dropped more than 750 tons of bombs on what were described as guerrilla bunkers, base camps and storage areas in the valley in South Vietnam's far northwest corner.

Another B52 mission hit base camps and weapons positions 130 miles from the Cambodian frontier and 89 miles north of Saigon, military spokesmen said.

Allied communications reported 129 ground fighting in Vietnam.

In the only large-scale engagement involving American troops, units of the U.S. 199th Light Infantry Brigade clashed with guerrillas in the jungle 63 miles northeast of Saigon Sunday.

Helicopter gunships, artillery and fighter-bomber strikes backed the Americans in the hour of fighting. Military spokesmen said the Americans lost two killed and 11 wounded. Guerrilla losses were unknown.

In the Mekong Delta, South Vietnamese millitaries reported killing 29 guerrillas. Military spokesmen said five South Vietnamese were wounded in the fighting near Kien Binh district town, 103 miles southwest of Saigon.

Government spokesmen said three soldiers and 12 civilians were wounded in a guerrilla mortar attack Sunday on the village of Hoan My, 334 miles northeast of Saigon.

# Perry Is Profiting By Solar Eclipse

The phenomenon of the moon moving between the sun and earth once struck terror into the hearts of those who have been told that Saturday's solar eclipse with the greatest éclat—the scientists or the sandwich peddlers.

It shapes up as the biggest socio-economic scientific event in the South since the United States began shooting its rockets off from a lonely patch of sand at what is now Cape Kennedy, Fla.

Scientists say the eclipse will indeed be the grandest on view since 1878 and there won't be a comparable one until 2042. Hence the scientists are flocking from around the world to the narrow band of totality passing through Florida, Va. and N.C., a more scholarly attitude prevails. But the financial angle is there. East Carolina University plans a 9 a.m. breakfast for 200 guests, including several visiting scientists. At the breakfast a "friend" who must remain anonymous until then will make a "substantial gift" to the school.

At Old Dominion University in Norfolk, a large white cover will be spread over the football so onlookers can see the shadow of the sun and "Bulley beads"—reflections of moon craters—during the 189 seconds of total eclipse there. A Norfolk eye surgeon will make a speech before hand on the dangers of looking at the sun.

# Gas For Schools Studied

A presentation was made by Tim Counts, representing Florida Gas Company, to the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction for installation of natural gas in a franchise area encompassing eight schools. To be included are Milver Junior High, Altamonte, Casaberry, English Estates, Bear Lake, South Seminole Junior High, Lyman High and Rosenwald.

The facilities will be available on a trial basis of one year, following which, if approval is granted, the facilities will be leased to the school board for five years at a cost not to exceed \$25 monthly. At the end of five years the facilities become the property of the school board. Maintenance will be provided during the five years at no extra cost and Florida Gas Company will provide the labor.

Repair parts will be the responsibility of the school board. Counts further stated that it is the policy of his concern to furnish gas appliances to school home economics rooms, in which the company is serving with gas, at no cost to the school board. However, the service is limited to ranges and dryers.

# SIC Approves Series Of Leases At Airport

**SANFORD INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION (SIC)** has approved leases amounting to \$14,433 including some renewals of present tenants at the Sanford Airport.

With the latest additions the amount of airport leases now total \$158,000, an all time high since the former Sanford Navy Air Station was released to the city a year ago.

Jungle Laboratories renewed for two years, leases of building 332 and 246 along with two Quarter huts for total \$4,480 per year. Jungle Labs is a manufacturer of aquarium supplies.

Approved leases also included the renting of Hummer Cabinet Shop of building 42 for a two-year period at \$2,535 first year and \$3,892 rent for second year.

**GRAND CANYON, Ariz.** (UPI)—Snow plows cleared the main highway into the Grand Canyon early today where nearly 600 tourists were snow-bound by a massive storm which blanketed the area up to three feet deep.

Authorities said snow continued to fall and chains were required to pass on the highway. None of the tourists attempted to leave immediately.

According to a park ranger: "We'll have plows moving throughout the night and we'll make sweeps in the morning of the roadways" said Dick Raymer, management assistant for the Grand Canyon National Park.

Most of the stranded tourists were taken to the Bright Angel Lodge which has quickly filled to capacity. The El Tovar Hotel normally closed in the winter was opened and 10 parties spent the night at the visitors' center, which houses historical exhibits on the canyon.

"We've got people in places where they can stay reasonably comfortable" said Chief Ranger George Vonderlippe.

"We've brought campers out of the camping areas got people who were stuck along the east rim drive and rounded up those in travel trailers."

Vonderlippe said the only major road out of the national park, State Route 64 was impassable but state plows had been called in to attempt to clear it.

# AP Poll Favors Judge Carswell

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — President Nixon's nomination of G. Harold Carswell to the Supreme Court seems well on the road to Senate confirmation, although opponents still hold hope of blocking the appointment.

A poll of the Senate by The Associated Press shows 37 firm votes at this time for confirmation with eight more leaning in favor.

In opposition were 18 senators; three members tending toward a no vote. The remaining 31 senators said they were uncommitted, declined comment or could not be reached.

The 21 margin reflected in the poll follows an earlier prediction by Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., a major supporter of Carswell, a Tallahassee, Fla., Federal appeals court judge.

Even Edward M. Kennedy, a stated opponent of the nomination and the Senate's No. 2 Democratic leader, indicated he expected only 25 votes against Carswell, says another critic, New York Sen. Charles F. Goodell, one of only 14 Democrats expected to vote against the nomination.

Some senators and civil rights leaders charge Carswell with insensitivity, at the very least, to blacks, citing among other things a white supremacy forever speech he gave during a 1948 political campaign.
