Minimum Wage Law Is Effective Today

By JOHN CUNIFF AP Business News Analyst - Nearly four million workers covered under federal minimum wage laws got a raise today to \$1.40 an hour from \$1.25. At that rate, their annual income is \$2,912, insufficient for many needs.

The common laborer, then, is in a poor and worsening bargaining position. Requiring this, government, universities and foundations are intensely studying the problems of this imbalance.

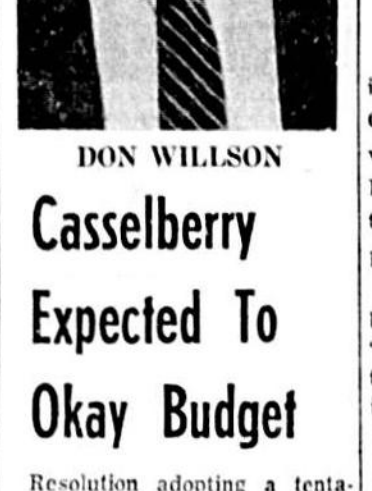

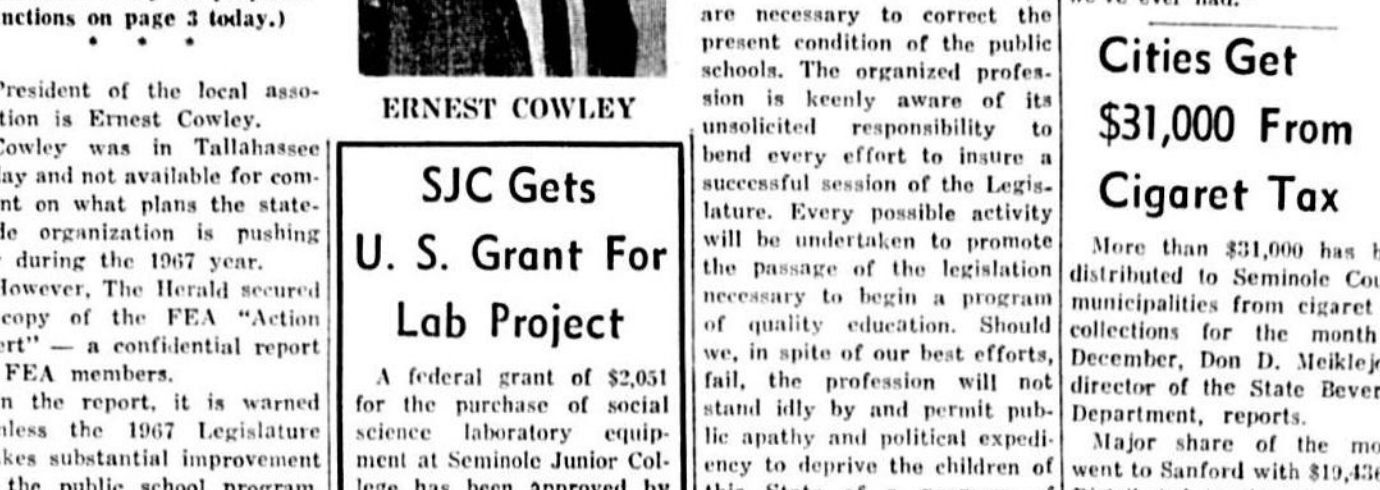

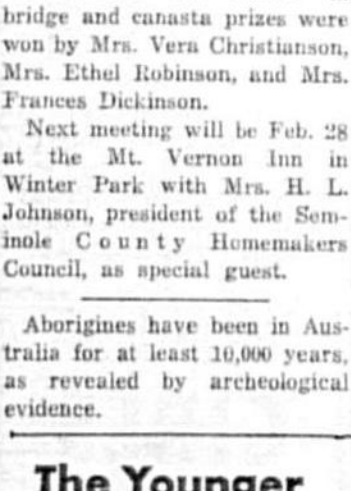

# Chicago Reels Under New Snow

Snow-stricken Chicago reels under the onslaught of a second major storm today and buyers picked market shelves clean of dwindling supplies of meat and milk.

The new four-inch coating of white in the Chicago area on this Groundhog Day brought the total accumulation on the ground to 30 inches.

Weather Bureau forecasters said the area could expect a total of 5 to 6 inches of new snow before the storm tapered off.

The new snow, expected to run its course today, was accompanied by freezing rain and high winds which caused drifts in some areas. But the bad weather failed to halt the mad pace of shoppers who scrambled to lay in supplies because of the new storm.

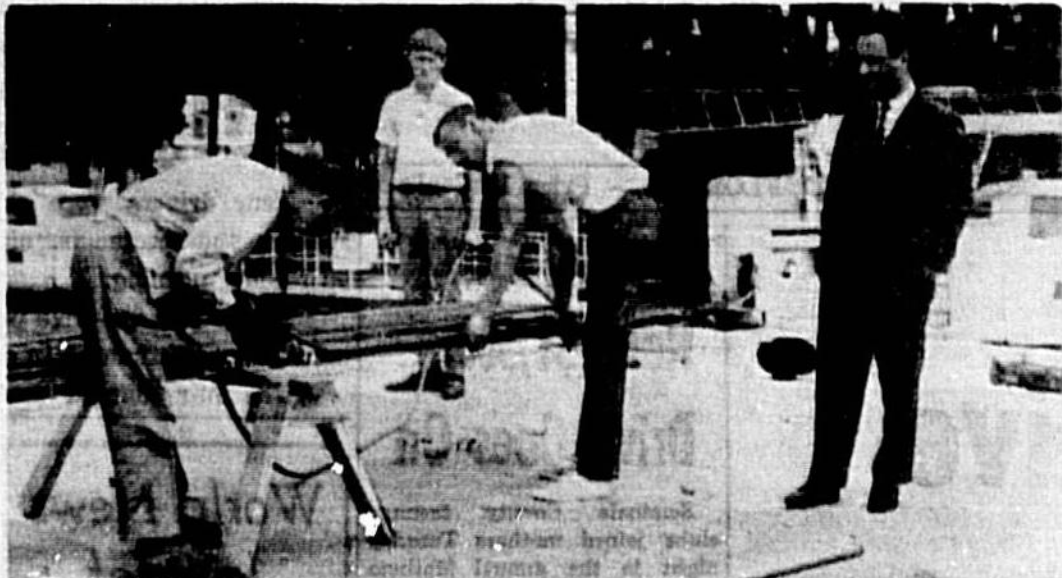
"It's panic, that's what it is," said an executive of one downtown grocery store. The executive had been pressed into service to push carts.

All around him shoppers had to get to get to diminishing supplies of milk and meat. The bread long had been gone. As the snow fell outside, reminding many of last weekend's paralyzing blizzard, shoppers shoved, ran, grabbed, cursed, pushed and knocked others out of the way to get to food supplies.

Hazardous driving conditions prevailed throughout the Chicago area and officials pleaded with residents to leave their automobiles home unless it was absolutely necessary to drive.

O'Hare International Airport maintained near normal operations and Midway Airport was closed for a short time.

Down town hotels and motels were jammed near capacity by the end of Wednesday afternoon.



SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — U. S. Marines today reported killing 62 Communist troops in the initial phases of two new drives in the northern part of South Vietnam.

Nuc Man-Tri Binh One, Vietnam is the title of a letter received by The Herald several months ago from Marine Sgt. Tommy Waters.

In the letter which the Herald published, Sergeant Waters appealed to the people of Seminole County for soap, candy and toys for the Vietnamese of the Chu Lai area. He was in charge of the civilian affairs program of the Marine Corps there.

With Waters being a local boy (he went all through school in Sanford and his parents still live here) the people of Seminole County have been able to help him in his efforts to provide the needed items arrived in abundance in Vietnam in a short time.

"People here wouldn't understand the poverty these people live in," Waters said. "To them, soap is a luxury. They are so used to living without these luxuries they are scared to use them."

"I was part of the pacification program there. We tried to teach them to help themselves in their way to make life easier for them," Waters remarked.

"Each hamlet sticks to itself. Many of the people never leave their own hamlet during their whole lifetime. The Vietnamese children never do. The Vietnamese people have no drive to better their way of life. They are content with what they have," Waters reported.

Waters' wife Virginia and son Tommy Jr. live in Panama City, Panama. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Tyre, reside

in DeBary, while his proud grandmother, Mrs. Jewel Chapman is a resident of Park Avenue.

Earl Merrill, president of the DeBary Republican Club, advises DeBary voters who have expressed intention to change their registration to do so immediately to insure they may vote in Republican primaries.

Those wishing to make a change must apply in person at the supervisor's office, time for changing registration since the Florida Election Laws state any change can be made only between the November general election and 30 days prior to the first primary election.

Requirements for registration are one year of residency in the state and six months in the county. Those in DeBary who are qualified to register but lack transportation may contact the DeBary Republican Club or the Republican committeemen or committeewomen.

# The Key To Success

Labor problems, rising production costs, and changing consumer demands make Seminoles' multi-million dollar citrus picture rather gloomy.

It poses a challenge not only to this county but to the state that has been accepted from the governor right down to the individual grove owner.

Out of the concentrated effort being made these days, a good situation is bound to develop.

Some experts feel the increase in the current state citrus crop over last season by some 40 million boxes may be a blessing in disguise.

The situation seems to be forcing the industry to become more organized and work harder toward the goal of marketing an ever-increasing crop at a profit.

Several state officials have made the observation that the problem is largely one of under-consumption rather than over-production.

With the anti-fertilizer program, the majority of families in this country who do not consume any frozen concentrate orange juice. Once these people are reached — and sold — demand will out-distance supply.

Labor problems may be solved largely through development of a successful harvester, as one county official told us this week. A number of machines are being tested, and once an economical mechanical device is found, chronic labor problems may be gone.

At the same time production costs will come down within the realm of reason.

The citrus industry is a challenging field these days, and an exciting one with better quality juice and more efficient ways of merchandising as the key to success.

# Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — About 50 people in a few offices at one end of the 12th floor of a Washington office building are busy pulling together the pieces of the 12th and newest government department, called DOT for short.

Although Congress created the Department of Transportation last October, it isn't now scheduled to be in business before March 31. When it is, it will have 31 government agencies and 90,000 employees.

This makes it a very big department, but because of the year Congress set it up, it will be a long way from being one of the strongest arms of the government.

DOT will be mainly a coordinator, a persuader, and a moral force in the scramble and tangled fields of air, rail and road transportation.

The various agencies and business making up DOT will be ones dealing with highways, airlines, buses, and all types of transportation except some on water because Congress did not include the Maritime Administration.

Among the agencies that are included are the Bureau of Public Roads, the Coast Guard and the Federal Aviation Agency.

But Congress didn't turn over to DOT the rate-making and regulatory powers that belong to the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Civil Aeronautics Board, the Federal Power Commission or the Maritime Commission.

1 pie shell pasty

4 strips bacon, partially cooked  
2 cups heavy cream  
4 eggs  
finely chopped tarragon  
finely chopped chives

Line deep pie shell with pastry. Sauté onions in butter. Sprinkle over pie shell with cheese. Add bacon pieces, blend eggs with remaining ingredients and pour mixture into shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 200 degrees until custard is set, about 30 minutes. Serve hot or cold. 16 servings.

SKILLET POTATO SALAD

1 1/2 lb. pkg. frozen French Fries  
1 1/2-cup can luncheon meat, cut in 2 by 1/4 inch strips

1/2 cup French dressing  
1/2 lb. (1/4 cups) American cheese, diced  
Heat oil in skillet or electric frypan, add potatoes and heat until browned. Add luncheon meat, onions and green peppers; cook until onion and green pepper are tender. Lower heat and pour French dressing over meat and potatoes. Stir lightly. Add cheese and heat until it melts slightly. Serve at once. Serves 6.

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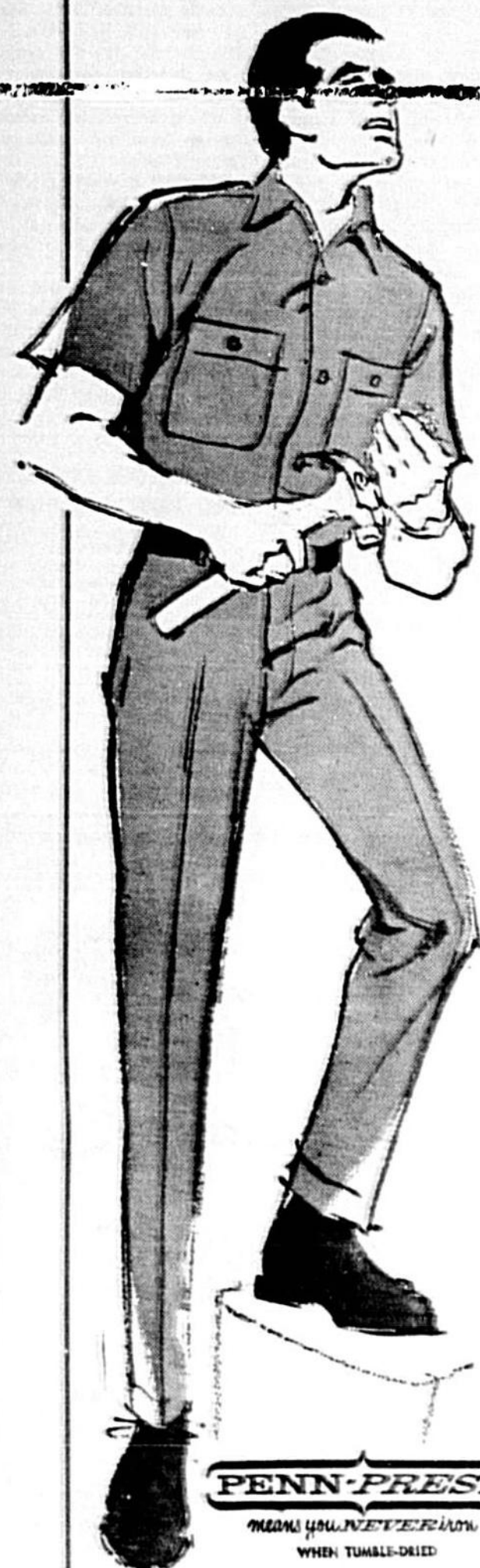

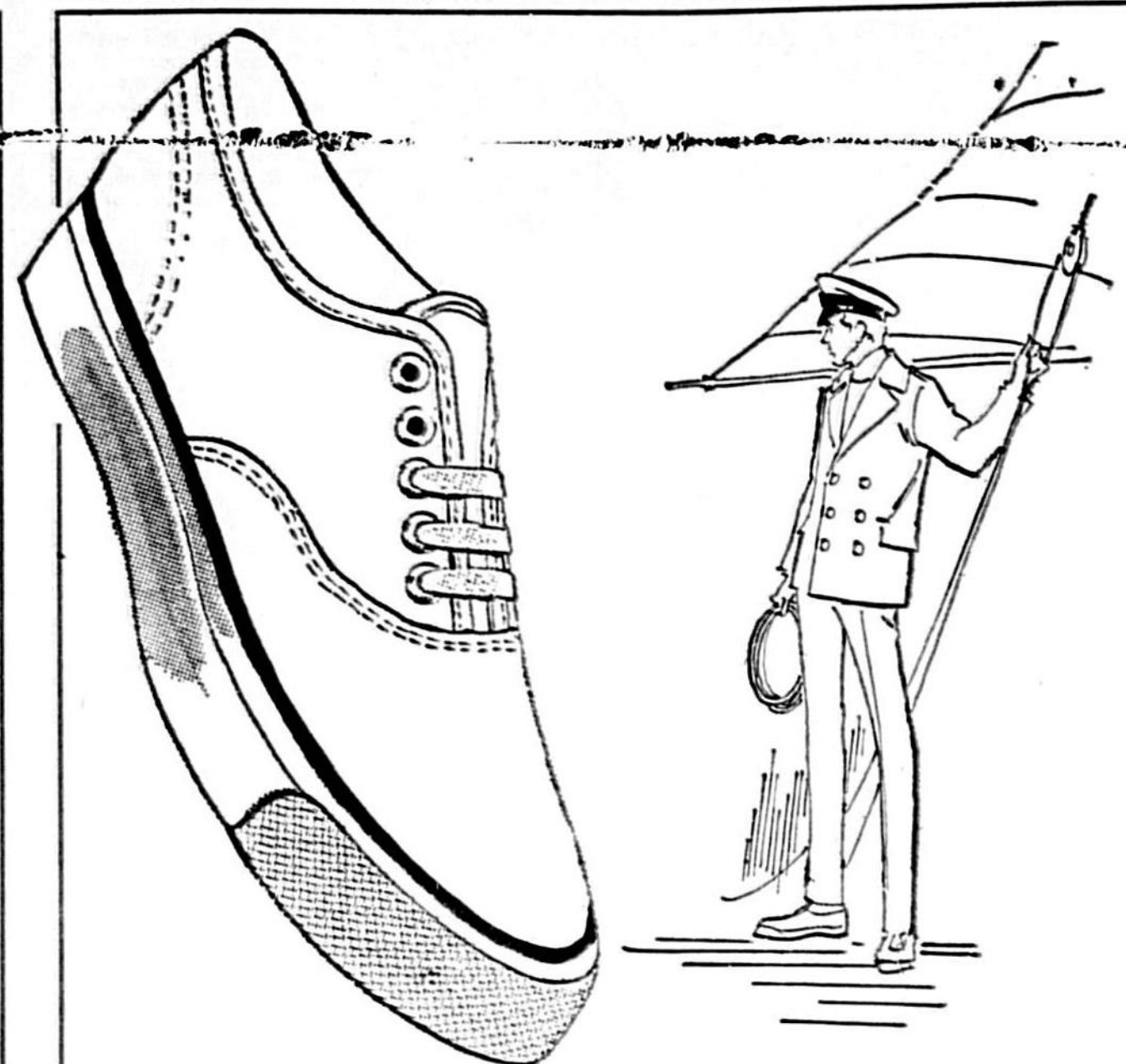

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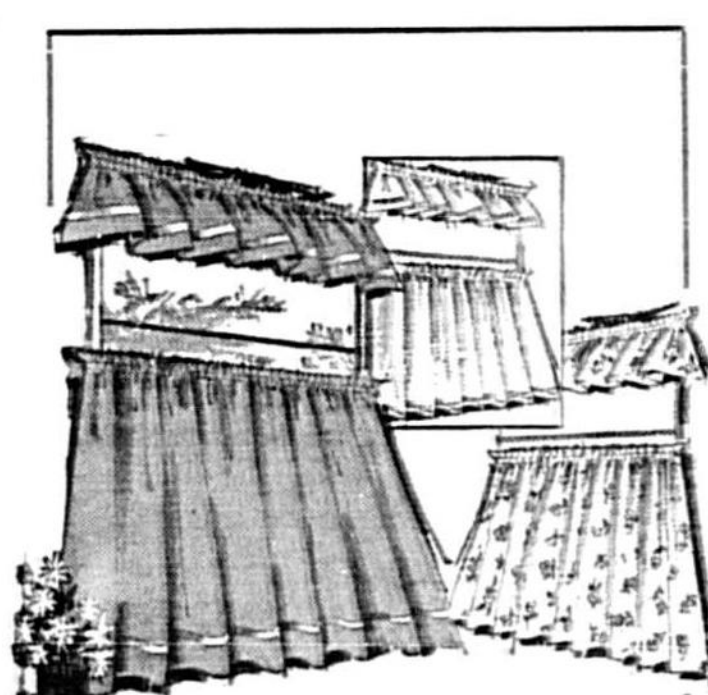

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# Watercress A Top Seminole Product

By LARRY NEELY  
Unknown to most of its residents, Seminole County produces nearly 40 per cent of the nation's supply of watercress and is the winter home of Weaver's Watercress, the nation's second largest watercress producer.

Located one mile north of Oviado, Weaver's Watercress farm is owned by Donald Weaver and his sister, Rita McClain. Weaver, himself, runs the Florida and Pennsylvania farms, both of which cultivate 25 acres of watercress during their respective growing seasons.

The operation of watercress is an exception of harvesting, which is all done by hand. Some of the machinery Weaver uses in his operation has developed himself. For instance, he has developed a machine which produces crushed ice and is mounted on top of his precooler to eliminate any moving of the ice which would be an added cost. The use of this machine has cut the cost of the crushed ice to one-quarter of the original cost.

Because of the lack of a dormant period in Florida which would allow the watercress plants to go to seed, the young cress plants must be trucked south from the Pennsylvania seed beds. Once set in the shallow water filled ditches, the watercress plants do not have to be reset until the next year and yield an average of seven crops per year.

Harvesting time for watercress comes nearly once a month throughout the entire growing season which begins in late October and lasts until early June.

To harvest watercress the plants are topped just above the waterline and tied into bunches about five inches in

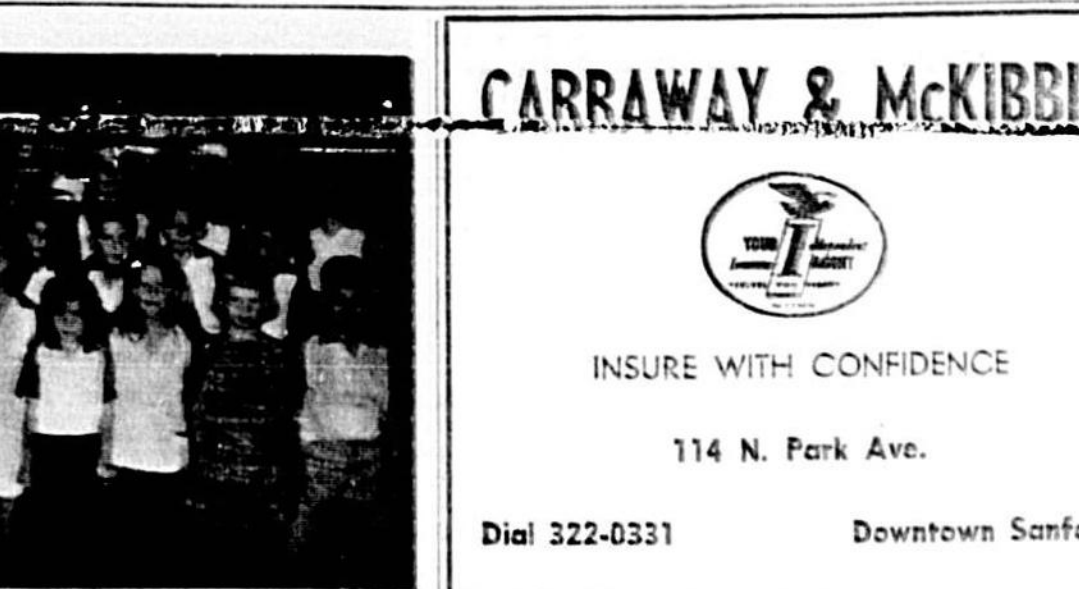

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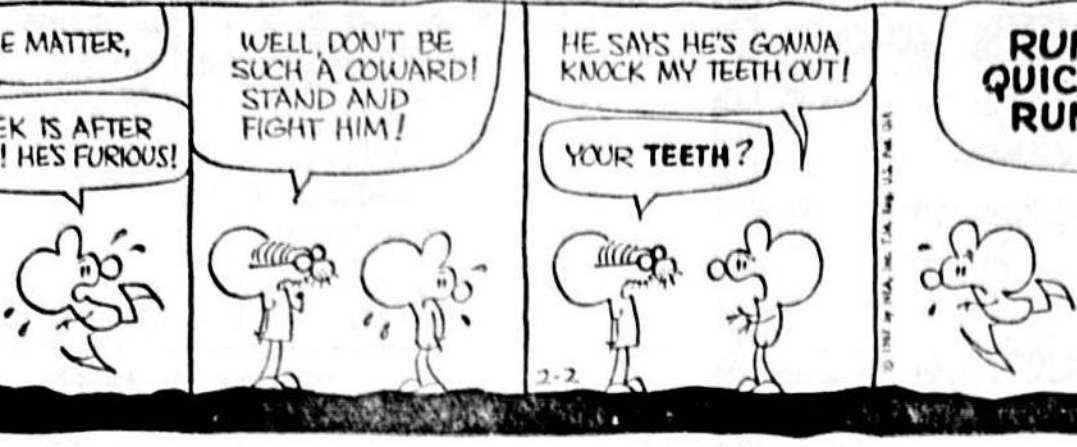
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### Teachers To Give Program For PTA

# What 'Disney World' Means To County

"Wonderful—more than we ever dreamed of." Sanford Mayor Joe B. Baker summed up the opinion expressed today by local civic and business leaders of the plans for "Disney World" between Orlando and Kissimmee, as announced Thursday by Roy Disney and Gov. Claude Kirk at Orlando.

"Influence on this community," said Mayor Baker, "should be tremendous. Many of the tourists en route to and from 'Disney World' are bound to stop off in Sanford and Seminole County.

"The new motel and marina on the lakefront will entice many of the tourists to stop off here, and it should be a tremendous help to the business people of this area."

Baker concluded: "We must get busy now and get ready for them. 'This points up just what we said last week, about getting ready to work with a super peripheral year-round attraction in the Sanford area,' said Chester E. Merrill Jr. and A. J. Thomas, builders of the new Holiday Inn on the lakefront fill.

"It is not enough," they stated. "To sit back and wait for the tourists to come to us. We must offer some entertainment—some attraction that will take them off the super highways other than 'Disney World.'"

"We repeat, Sanford should expedite its plans to move its five new into new, modern and attractive quarters. Even enlarge it."

The business partners repeated their offer to "pick up the tab" for one quarter of the cost of a professional survey of the area to determine what type of attraction would bring tourists here.

"Worldwide interest in Central Florida is being focused because of 'Disney World,'" said John Alexander, chairman of the Seminole County Commission, "and it's bound to benefit the entire area, including Seminole County, economically. In new residents, in new invest-

ment money, in new business... 'Seminole County will develop according, and more and more with the impact of the new complex.'"

Alexander, who attended the briefing Thursday at Winter Park, said he was "tremendously overwhelmed with the plans for 'Epcot,' the city of tomorrow."

"Seminole County Chamber of Commerce has always reflected the viewpoint that Seminole County and Central Florida eventually would be recognized as the greatest place in the world to live and play," said President DeWitt Mathews.

"This has come to light with the tremendous plans for 'Disney World.' Seminole County will directly benefit by the millions of tourists who will come through our area. We in Seminole County welcome the opportunity to be partners in progress."

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# Sanford Gets Court Approval To Enter Courthouse Fight

The City of Sanford was permitted to intervene as a party defendant in the courthouse-injunction suit against the county by Circuit Court Judge Roger Dykes in hearings held in chambers Thursday.

Motions to dismiss the suit which were made by Harold Johnson, county attorney, however, were taken under advisement by Judge Dykes. The court indicated ruling on the motion can be expected within the next two weeks.

It is now expected Sanford City Attorney William Hutchison will seek affirmative relief from the court and request the judge give a declaratory decree as to whether or not Sanford is the county seat.

Attorneys for the complainants in the suit (three South Seminole residents) and the county were requested by Judge Dykes to submit a list of citations of precedent cases and applicable Florida laws concerning the suit.

Arguments presented by Johnson to support his motion for dismissal included his contention the court has no jurisdiction over the actions of constituents of local officials unless fraud can be proved and that adequate relief in the suit have complete relief at large (the ballot box) for their complaint.

Harlan Tuck, attorney for the complainants, cited laws requiring public notice be published 30 days before the county commission takes action to build a courthouse.

Statutes were not presented requiring a public hearing on such a matter.

## Church Attendance Down

Do people go to church today more than they did 10 years ago? Sanford ministers, in most cases, say no.

A survey of churches around the county and in Sanford by The Herald today revealed that, in general, it is felt the individual is not attending services or participating in church activities as regularly as those of a decade ago. Reasons given range from pressures of the economic world to the increased trend toward spending the weekend camping or fishing.

Another opinion was that although perhaps people are not attending as many meetings or services, they are remaining identified with their individual churches but are not allowing themselves to be recruited because they already are so busy with civic, community or school activities of comparative value.

"Some are rebelling against the church as an institution and don't see the ideology of what the churches are doing," one minister pointed out. A minister of education in a Sanford church said, "I hate to say this, but as I see it, fewer people realize the importance of church in their lives today than those of 10 years ago. In my department, I find a lack of enthusiasm of anyone being willing to accept responsibility. Outside demands on the individual make him want freedom from something so he'll have time of his own and when he gets it, he doesn't know what to do with it."

Exceptions were found, locally, in the Episcopal and Catholic churches, where, not only has membership shown a marked increase but active participation and attendance is regular.

In the county, also, ministers interviewed were enthusiastic, reporting growth and interest which, it is felt, is due
