Proceed With Caution

When a school bus stops at a crossover on a divided highway. should traffic flowing in the opposite direction stop?

"No," says the Florida Highway Patrol.

This question has arisen in the minds of many motorists who have hestitated. Some have stopped, some have continued, not knowing exactly whether they should have stop-

ped or if they had violated a law. Add to this the danger of one motorist in one lane not knowing the law and stopping abruptly on a busy highway, such as U.S. 17-92, and another motorist in another lane proceeding in the same direction also stopping and you have trouble.

This happens every now and then and traffic approaching the stopped vehicles generally has to take to the dividing strip or to the outside shoulders of the highway. To clarify this point, The Herald

asked the Florida Highway Patrol for its interpretation.

The law says that traffic flowing

in the opposite direction from that of a stopped school bus need not stop if the highways are divided by an "intervening, unpaved space of five feet or by a physical barrier."

The crossover, a paved area permitting motorists to turn, is an unprotected area. The interpretation of the Highway Patrol is:

Even though the buses stop at the crossover, the divided highway is still considered as divided. Signs instructing motorists to stop when buses are "in this roadway" mean that, even at crossovers.

Some thought was given to having school buses stop away from the crossover, the FHP says, but this was discounted as some children would have had to cross both roadways. By stopping at the crossover, the bus would halt motorists appearing at a right angle to the direction of the bus.

So, if you travel north on a divided highway and a bus stops in the southbound lane you can continue, using caution, of course, the FHP **5**8V5.





Cigarette Sales

Make Comeback

By United Press International Jittery cigarette smokers may be puffing pipes in public and chewing more gum lately, but the great cancer scare appears to be wearing

Cigarette sales, which dropped as much as 30 per cent after the surgeon general's committee drew a link between cigarettes and cancer last Jan. 11, are starting to come back. United Press International

checked state tax officials and major tobacco wholesalers and retailers throughout the nation to determine what happened to cigarettes in the two and a half months since the government report threw a scare into the country's smokers.

Sales are still down in many a reas. But authoritative sources in at least 12 states reported that elgarettes were starting to come back in March.

In some big cities, retailers said cigarcite sales were just like old times. And there were indications in other states that the drop in sales had reached the bottom and an upswing was in the making.


