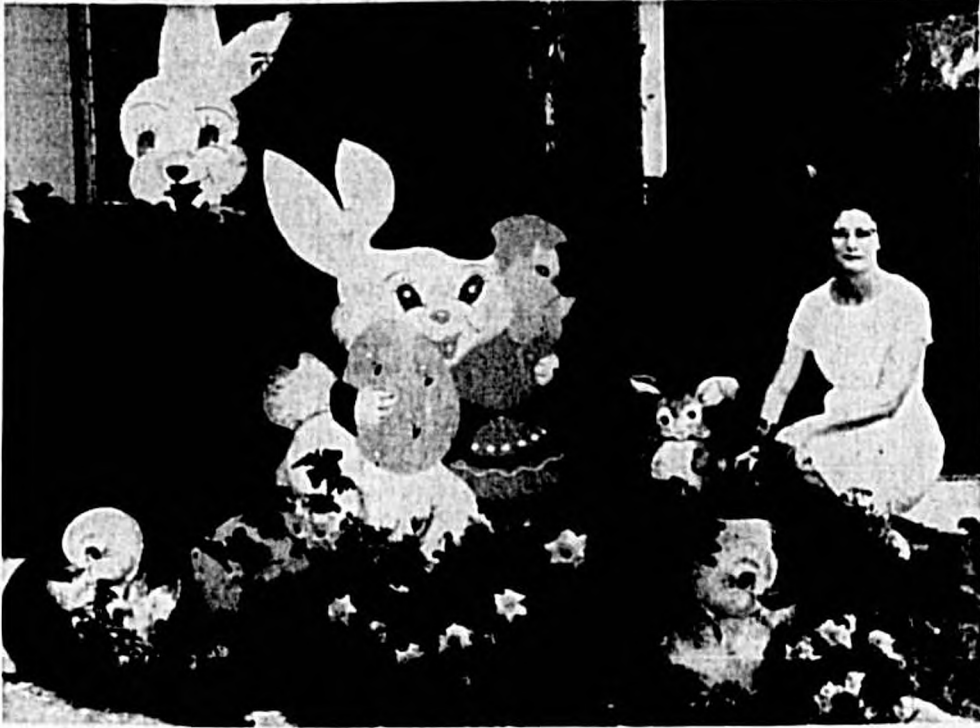

New Mississippi Bills Could Smash Republican Hopes

Senate Passes Restrictive Legislation

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)—A series of bills that could smash Republican hopes of overturning Mississippi's one-party system in state elections won Senate approval Thursday.

Some of the harshest provisions in the 22-bill package were toned down in amendments, but most of the key proposals passed with only minor changes. Several were held on a routine motion to reconsider today before being sent to the House.

The growing GOP made its strongest showing in the state since Reconstruction in last year's elections. But party leaders said the new laws, if finally adopted, would cripple their plans to end the long domination of the Democrats.

A court test is almost certain if the bills, backed by Gov. Paul Johnson, get through the House and are signed into law.

One of the major requirements provides that a candidate must get at least 10 per cent of the total vote cast in both party primaries.

In the past, the GOP usually has run only one candidate for any office, choosing its nominees in a state convention.

An effort to amend the bills to permit the party executive committee to declare an unopposed candidate as its nominee without a primary was beaten down. Sponsors said the amendment would defeat the purpose of the entire package.

Another key provision would require any party to have delegates from at least 30 of the 82 counties at its state convention, and have delegates from a majority of the precincts at county conventions.

The state GOP is centered in metropolitan areas and has little support in most rural counties.

Sen. Merle Palmer, chairman of the elections committee, denied the bills were aimed at eliminating any party. They were designed, he said, "only to make certain all political parties in the state . . . play the game by the same set of rules."

Jacksonville Biracial Group Works To End Strife

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—Rutledge Pearson, Florida head of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored Peoples, voiced approval of the new group, a chorus of harmony.

A Negro leader immediately injected a note of disapproval and cast doubts that the committee would be effective.

The committee, including three prominent Negro businessmen, is part of a biracial group suggested by Mayor Haydon Burns to find ways to end an outbreak of violence and vandalism that hit this city earlier in the week.

Members remained light-hearted about the objectives they are working on. The group held its first organizational meeting Thursday.

U. S. Eyes Importing Of Florida Farm Workers

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Florida Growers who want to continue using foreign workers to help harvest their crops will have to show the U. S. Department of Labor they are also using all available domestic laborers.

A department spokesman said the need for importing farm workers from the Bahamas and British West Indies was under review.

Authorizations to bring in foreign workers to help harvest fruit, vegetable and sugar cane crops in Florida come up for renewal on April 15, the spokesman said.

He said the department has had complaints that domestic workers were unable to find jobs because of the availability of low paid help imported into this country.

Dade County was particularly mentioned, the spokesman said, because of the large number of Cuban refugees already creating a labor surplus.

The spokesman said the number of foreign workers employed in citrus groves has dropped by about 2,300 this year because of the crop shortage brought on by the December, 1962 freeze.

He said about 200 more foreign workers than previously are being used by sugar cane growers because of an expanded crop.

Specialist Prepares Latest Type Foods

Mrs. Sue Camp, state nutrition food specialist from Tallahassee, presented a demonstration Wednesday on the new type freeze-dried foods for food chainmen and members of the county Home Demonstration Clubs and for the interested public.

The cottage cheese was made by putting the canned cheese in a bowl containing 1 1/2 cups cool water. This stood for five minutes with an occasional stirring. The can, weighing 2 1/2 ounces, will make four to six servings. The finished dish was garnished with minced carrots, chives and parsley.

The four-ounce can of fish, which will serve five, was added to boiling water and simmered for one minute. Removed from water, the patties were garnished with parsley.

Ham patties were prepared by the same method. The crab meat was placed in a small bowl containing one quart of cool water. The can, weighing 2 1/2 ounces, after draining the sauce was added. Contents of the instant pumpkin pie mix were put in a sauce pan with two cups of hot water, 1/2 stick of margarine and two beaten eggs. This was turned into a nine-inch pie shell and baked for 15 minutes at 400 degrees and another 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

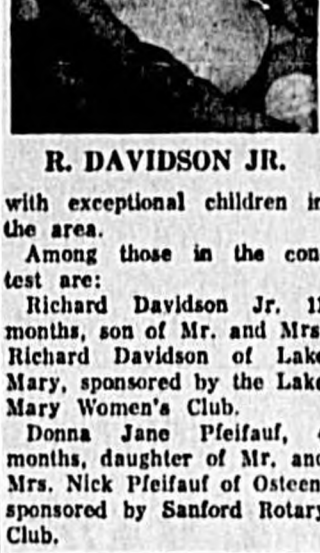

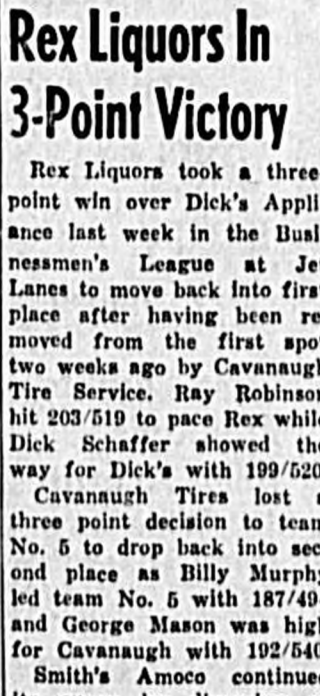

Celebration of Passover To Begin Tonight

For 12 million Jews throughout the world, tonight is "the night that differs from all others."

Sundown marks the beginning of Passover, the religious festival that commemorates the mighty acts of God by which the children of Israel were delivered from bondage in Egypt some 3,200 years ago. The Passover season is celebrated for eight days by Orthodox and Conservative Jews, and for seven days by Reform Jews. Its highlight is the Seder, a family worship service built around a ritual meal in which every detail is prescribed by ancient tradition.

Although the Seder may be conducted at a synagogue, the usual setting is in the home. The mother spreads the Seder table with her finest linens and best silver. At sundown, the lights candles on the table, and all members of the family gather around. The father opens the service with a blessing: "Praised art thou, O Lord our God, ruler of the universe, who has chosen us from all people and singled us out from among men... for Thy service."

The climax of the service comes when the youngest child faces the head of the family and asks: "Why is tonight different from all other nights?" The father replies by telling the story of the Exodus as it is recorded in the Bible. In his own words, he makes the point that the annual celebration of the Passover is a continual reminder to the Jewish people of the covenant which was sealed when they were led forth from bondage. "You shall be my people... and I shall be your God."

Good Friday Tour In Morocco Is Recalled

It was a warm, balmy afternoon. One of those nice lazy Spring days conducive to a catnap. The scene was an airbase outside Casablanca, in (then French) Morocco. The year was 1943.

The GIs had had noon chow and returned to the line. The first sergeant dozed in the orderly room. It was then the squadron commander, a captain, entered and said, "Sergeant, roll out a jeep—I want to take a ride."

The jeep rolled along and the sergeant noted the captain was quiet, meditating, and so the sergeant said nothing. Just drove in and around Casablanca, past the Sultan's palace, through the market place.

Suddenly, the captain ordered a halt. The sergeant looked around and discovered they were stopped in front of a French cemetery. There was no grass, only sand, and the grave markers were of fancy wrought iron instead of the familiar marble.

The captain walked through the French cemetery and on beyond an arched gate. The sergeant followed—and into an American military cemetery, covered with lush green grass and straight rows of crosses, with an occasional Star of David.

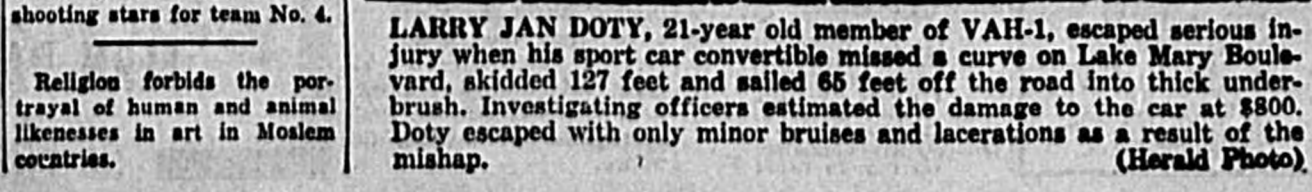

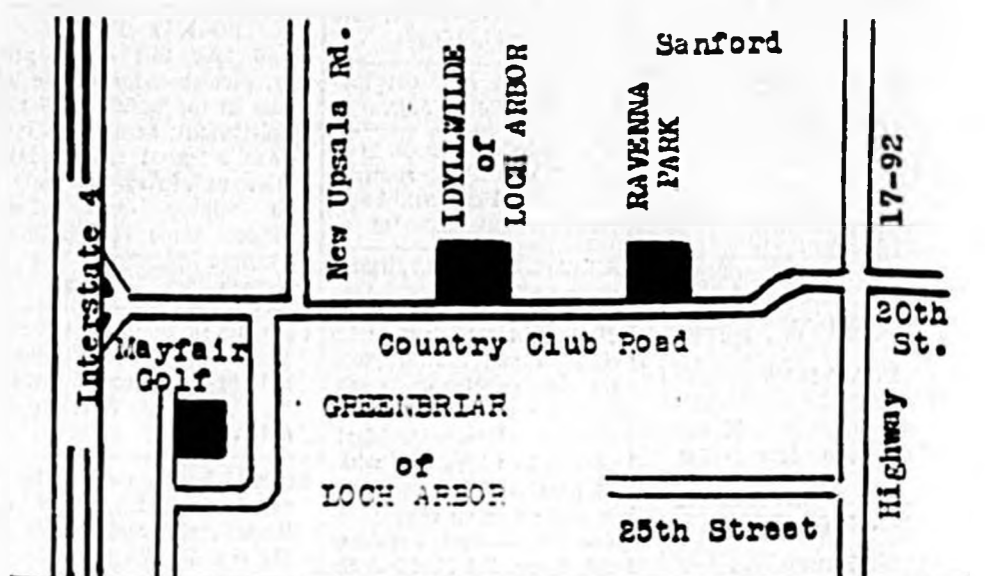

As the term implies, this type of structure resembles an "A" from a front view. Unlike conventional buildings, the outer walls and roof are one and the same which greatly simplifies construction.

The basic supports of the A-Frame are wood beams which rise diagonally from both sides of the building to converge at the roof apex.

In the case of a two or three story building, or a large enclosure, such as a church, glued laminated wood beams may be used. Otherwise, the beams are of solid lumber.

The arrangement eliminates the need for separate wall and roof framing. The beams are covered with wood roof decking, which may be beautifully finished on its un-

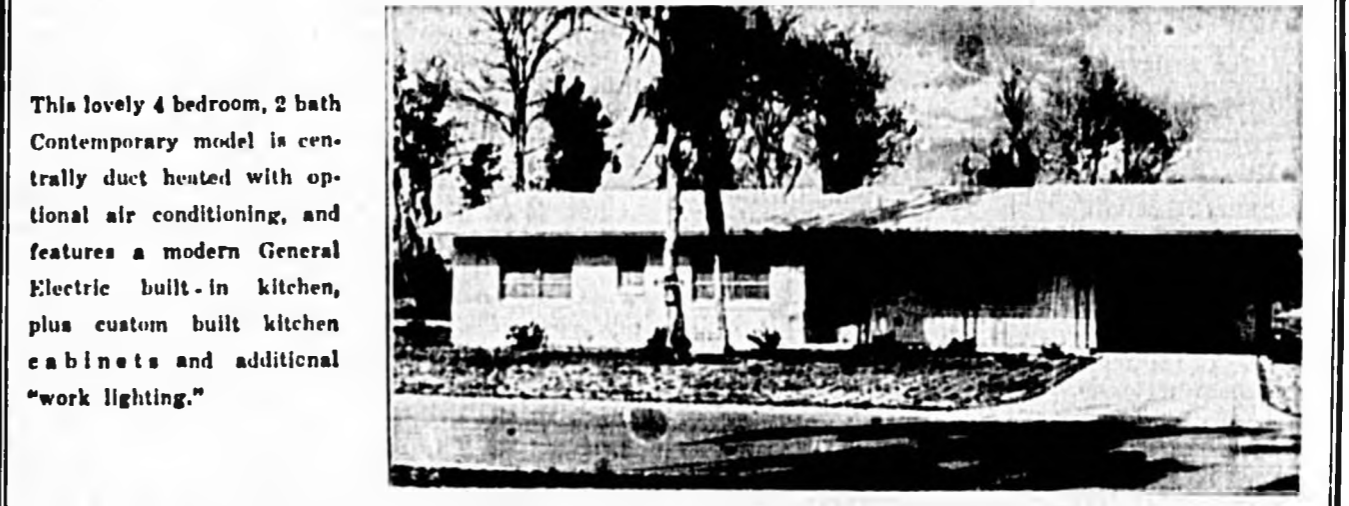
