Santo Holding Out On Cubs; Gibbs Signs

One more will do it for the Chicago Cubs, but one—balking Ron Santo—could be tougher than all the rest, especially since he has fired back two unsigned contracts already.

No club in the majors operates more quickly or efficiently than Phil Wrigley's club-off the field.

Although they haven't finished in the first division since 1946, they have won the pennant prize two years in a row by being the first major league club to sign all their players.

With 26 of their 27 players already signed for 1962, the Cubs are in an excellent position to stretch their string to three, although the 21-year-old Santo may prove a stumbling block.

Santo, a third baseman and one of the club's brightest hopes for the future, has been offered a raise. He feels he deserves more in view of the fact he hit 22 homers last season, drove in 83 runs, batted .254 and generally was hailed as one of the National League's finest sophomores.

General manager John Holand indicates he doesn't expect too much difficulty from the young third baseman. Santo, significantly or not, says nothing.

Anyway, the Cubs signed three players Monday—pitchers Barney Schultz and Dave Gerard and outfielder Nelson

Mathews—so now Santo is the only dissatisfied member left. One of the clubs pressing the Cubs for the distinction of being able to announce "all present and accounted for" first is the Cleveland Indians, who have 23 players under

contract. They signed veteran catcher Harry Child and four rookies Monday.

The Los Angeles Dodgers also came up with a flock of signatures, managing to satisfy four more of their players, including Jim Gilliam.

Three rookies signed with the New York Yankees, who now have a total of 13 under contract for the coming season. The three were Jake Gibbs, Howie Kutt and George Haney.

Buckeyes Make It No. 15 In Row; Lucas A Decoy

That makes 15 in a row now for Ohio State's unseasoned Buckeyes, who are disposing of all rivals as if even one defeat would mean some kind of national basketball disgrace.

Employing All-America Jerry Lucas merely as a decoy, the top-ranked Buckeyes had no trouble at all defeating Purdue, 94-72, Monday night on the losers' court at Lafayette, Ind.

It was the 20th consecutive Big Ten victory for the blazing Buckeyes, tying a modern conference record, and their second in a week over the Boilermakers, whom they beat, 91-65, at Columbus, Ohio, on Jan. 22.

Ohio State has nine more games to go, all against Big Ten opponents, to complete its regular schedule. The Buckeyes won their first 27 games last season, then dropped their last one to Cincinnati in the NCAA final.

Purdue was in the game for the first 14 minutes Monday night when the lead changed hands twice and the score was tied six times, but the Bucks then hit for four field goals to take a 42-22 lead and remained in front the rest of the way.

The personal duel between Lucas and his fellow All-American, Purdue's Terry Dischinger, never really materialized.

Led by all the top money winners in 1961, plus all four champions crowned so far this year, the nominal golf troupe was set to tee off Wednesday in the \$50,000 Desert Classic—the world's biggest golf tournament.

This is a 90-hole event in comparison with the usual 72 holes. It is staged over five different courses.

The place where the lightning could strike is any par-3 hole where a hole-in-one rewards the lucky man with a \$50,000 jackpot on the spot.

The lightning struck Joe Campbell two years ago and last year Don January turned the trick. Lloyds of London, which insured against defeat, was so disturbed by these performances that they raised the insurance fee to \$17,500.

Already there have been five hole-in-ones on the tour since Jan. 1. But none of them have been rewarded with cash.

The four champions crowned thus far in 1962 who will be trying for a second title are: young Phil Rodgers, winner of the Los Angeles Open; Tommy Jacobs, who won at San Diego; Doug Ford, winner of the Bing Crosby; and National Open champion Gene Littler, who got the biggest check of all, one for \$9,000, for winning the Lucky International tourney in San Francisco Sunday.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The condition of former professional football star Gene Brito was listed as critical today by doctors at the Veterans Administration's Wadsworth General Hospital.

Brito, played for the Washington Redskins, Los Angeles Rams and in Canada, is suffering from a nerve inflammation of the spinal cord which has caused partial paralysis of his arms and legs.

Brito, 35, first noticed the condition last summer while in pre-season training with the Rams and was forced to drop off the squad. He was hospitalized during the fall.

Brito's teammates both in college and on the pro clubs have started a "Gene Brito Appreciation Fund" to help meet some of his financial problems and to help care for his wife and two small children.

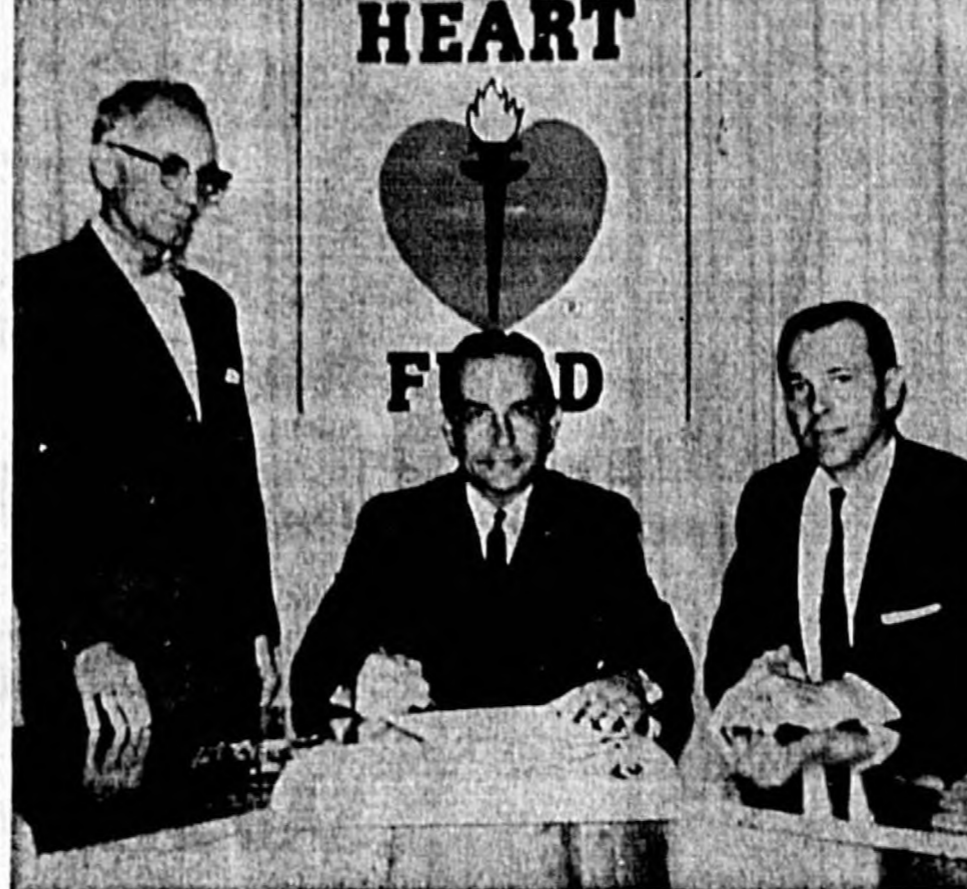

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Famed Tight-Rope Walking Team Topples Before Crowd Of 7,500

DETROIT (UPI) — Two members of the Great Wallendas aerial troupe died Tuesday night and another was critically injured when their seven-man human pyramid crumpled and they plunged to the ground before 7,500 spectators.

Two other members of the troupe were hospitalized but in fair condition.

Dieter Schepp, 23, died of head injuries at a hospital about three hours after the accident. Richard Faughnan, 29, Sarasota, Fla. died earlier of a skull fracture.

Mario Wallenda, 29, remained in critical condition. Schepp's sister, Jana, 17, was in fair condition and Karl Wallenda, 56, was held overnight after X-rays showed he had a pelvic injury.

The Wallendas were near the end of their act at the Shrine Circus when the accident happened. Schepp, the lead man, buckled, lost his footing and fell. Faughnan and Mario fell behind him. Gunther, Karl and Herman Wallenda grabbed the high wire as they flew by. Miss Schepp was sitting in a chair, balanced by a pole on their shoulders. They were able to grab her as she flew by and held her until an emergency net could be rigged.

She fell into the net but was injured when the impact of her fall jerked the net out of the hands of the men holding it. She struck her head on the concrete floor, cushioned by four inches of dirt and a layer of sawdust. Gunther Wallenda, 34, Herman's son, said, "It was hard to tell what happened. I was carrying a balancing pole and all of a sudden we began falling. It was like slow motion—the bar just sailed over my shoulder and fell to the ground."

Karl Wallenda, who headed the troupe, said he had been performing in circuses since 1924, and this was his first serious accident.

Gunther kept his footing on the high wire, which was about 50 to 60 feet above the floor and quickly swung down and helped grasp Miss Sharp. The first victim of the

accident, Faughnan, was the husband of the former Jennie Wallenda, Karl's daughter. Mrs. Faughnan, 32, was on the aerial platform at the time of the accident but was not a part of the immediate act.

The other victim, Schepp, had been a member of the troupe for only a year. He and his sister, Herman Wallenda's niece and nephew, were born in Germany. They escaped the Iron Curtain and joined the circus in America.

Republicans Yell 'Foul' On Cabinet Post Selection

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The odor and smudge of the Negro ghettos attaches to the maneuver to place a Negro in the presidential Cabinet.

This odor began to offend the more delicate nostrils during the 1960 presidential campaign when Henry Cabot Lodge seemed to promise that there would be a Negro Cabinet member if Richard M. Nixon were elected president of the United States. Lodge was Nixon's ticket mate.

Lodge's statement and subsequent clarification accomplished not much but temporary confusion. Not the least confused and—surprised, perhaps, was Nixon. American Negroes generally voted for John F. Kennedy, who would not have been elected but for their votes.

Republican now are yelling "foul" at President Kennedy because he has said he plans to name a Negro to a Cabinet position as head of a department of urban affairs, yet to be created. The Republican party has been put in a position of opposing creating of this new department. This was accomplished by a vote in the House Rules Committee in which five Republicans and four Democrats made up a majority against sending the project to the House of Representatives for a vote.

Kennedy has submitted the same proposition now in the form of a proposal for reorganization of government.

These will be a vote on that proposal. More than a vote for or against creation of the new department, any congressional roll call will be interpreted politically as a vote for or against a Negro in the Cabinet. There is much more of importance to the nation in the proposal than whether a Negro attains Cabinet rank.

The racial aspect of the proposal will be dominant, however, so that Congress will not be voting on the merits of establishing a new department. That is a bad break for the people of the United States. The urban affairs proposal raises some basic questions of good or bad government and it is on those considerations that congress should make its decision. That, of course, would be too much to expect under U. S. Political procedures.

The Republican yells of "foul" against Kennedy will not impress anyone. A Republican president would do the same provided, of course, that the Republican president had a Boston Irishman's political savvy.

The Republicans would have made more sense if they had been yelling "foul" in December 1960, when President-elect Kennedy went through the properly suspect motions of inviting U. S. Rep. William W. Dawson, a Chicago Negro, to join his Cabinet as postmaster general.

U. S. Job Picture Shows Big Gain

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The government was expected to report today that the nation's job picture showed marked improvement this month.

Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg was scheduled to disclose the first 1962 employment figures in testimony before the Senate House Economic Committee.

In a separate report today, the Labor Department said the long-term unemployed in the 1960-61 recession mainly were family breadwinners in their prime working years.

Goldberg said the survey of 80,000 persons who had exhausted their state-paid jobless benefits and were receiving additional federal payments was the most comprehensive examination of the long-term unemployed ever made.

He said it showed that to a large extent the beneficiaries of the recession-inspired program were "workers who were the prime source of support for themselves and their families, largely employed in manufacturing industries and in the prime years of their working lives."

About 2.5 million persons received additional jobless benefits totaling \$900 million during the first nine months of the program.

The Labor Department also reported Tuesday that 61 major industrial centers suffered "substantial" unemployment in January, but predicted job gains in the coming months.

This total represented an addition of one area—New Brunswick-Peth Amboy, N.J.—to the list of leading production centers with joblessness of 6 per cent or more. It compared to the all-time high of 101 set last spring. Job conditions got worse for two areas on the list—Fall River and New Bedford, Mass. The prospects for job seekers improved slightly in Wilkes-Barre-Hazleton, Pa., but not enough to remove this area from the distressed list.

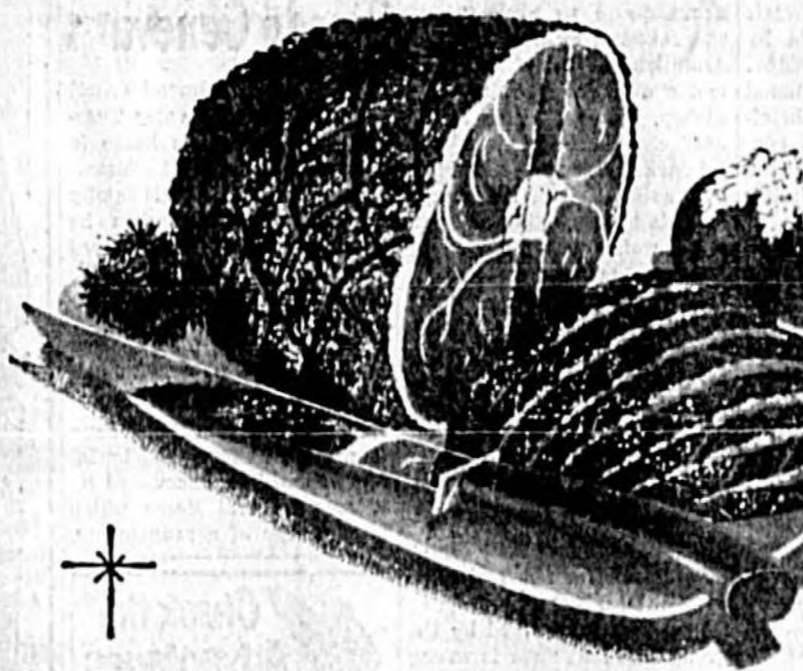

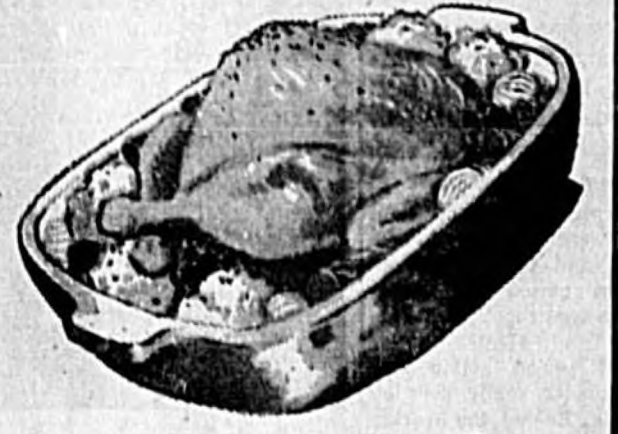

Richest Golf Play Opens; Littler Looms As Favorite

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (UPI)—The world's leading professionals tee off today in a marathon pursuit of financial rewards in golf's richest and longest tournament—the third annual Palm Springs Golf Classic.

This is a 90-hole affair—instead of the usual 72—and is played on five courses in this area.

Prize money totals \$50,000 for the pros and another \$50,000 for the lucky one who may hit a hole-in-one. The pros play four rounds with different sets of amateurs until Sunday when they go it alone.

All the leading money-winners of this year and most of them from last year were on hand to take their shots.

These included defending champion Bill Maxwell, Dallas, Tex.; Sam Snead, who seldom strays this far from his West Virginia home; and Arnold Palmer, the leading money-winner of 1960 who hasn't really gotten started this year. Palmer won the classic in 1960.

Top money-winners of 1962 here and hopeful of continuing their winning ways were: Gene Littler, who hoisted his winnings to \$11,250 with a victory in the Lucky International last Sunday at San Francisco; Phil Rodgers, the San Diego youngster who coped the Los Angeles Open and has won \$9,700; Tommy Jacobs, Whittier, Calif., with \$7,510 and a victory in the San Diego Open; and the veteran Doug Ford, Crystal River, Fla., who took top money in the Bing Crosby pro-am at Pebble Beach and has collected a total of \$5,025.

Snead, a real money player, makes his first big 1962 effort and got here last Saturday to try out the five courses.


"What it boils down to is who can drive the straightest and who can put the best," said Slammin' Sammy. "There is a premium on accuracy off the tee on these courses. I had to get here early because I hadn't played three of the courses before. But after a round on each I think the Tamarrisk course is the toughest of the five."

Cepeda Turns Down First Giant Pact

United Press International Roger Maris isn't the only home run hitter who is passing up the first 1962 salary pitch offered him.

Orlando Cepeda, who led the National League with 46 home runs and 142 runs batted in last season, thinks the San Francisco Giants ought to do a lot better than their first try at signing him.

"We offered him a 33 1/3 per cent raise and he rejected it," revealed Giants vice president Charles (Chubb) Feeney on Tuesday. "But we are continuing negotiations in a very friendly fashion."

A 33 1/3 per cent raise over his estimated \$27,500 salary of 1961 would raise Cepeda to about \$37,000. Neither the club nor the player revealed how far they are apart but some sources say Cepeda may be trying for a \$55,000 pact.

Cepeda, who is even more popular with San Francisco fans than Willie Mays, batted .311 last season. Some experts predict that he'll break Hack Wilson's league mark of 56 homers this year and perhaps reach the 60-mark.

Gi Hodges, a long-time favorite in New York, agreed to terms with the New York Mets. Hodges played only part-time and hit only 242 last season but the Mets think the return to the Polo Grounds and Casey Stengel's platooning will enable him to make a comeback. Hodges, 37, will be starting his 16th season with a lifetime total of 361 homers.

The Mets also announced the signing of catcher Joe Ginsberg and former National League home run king Ralph Kiner. Kiner was added to the club's broadcasting team which already featured Lindsey Nelson and Bob Murphy.

Pitcher Larry Jackson of the St. Louis Cardinals and outfielder Bill Pruton of the Detroit Tigers were the other "name players" to agree to terms.

Jackson, who had a 14-11 record last season, is believed to have signed for \$32,000 while Pruton, who hit .237, signed for about \$27,000. The Tigers also signed Don Wert, American Association batting champion with a .328 average, and pitcher Jerry Casale.

Jackson, 30, said the Cardinals have a "better chance" for the penant than any other team except "maybe Cincinnati" and added that the Milwaukee Braves "look like they're beginning to come apart at the seams."

Catcher Hank Foiles and outfielders Earl Robinson and Russ Snyder signed with the Baltimore Orioles; pitcher Joe McClain and outfielder Chuck Hinton agreed to terms with the Washington Senators and pitcher Ted Wills and shortstop Eddie Bresoud signed with the Boston Red Sox.

This is the second game with the same team and the second victory. The score in the first game was 55 to 29. In this game Boniface set a record for Sanford Junior High by scoring 33 points.

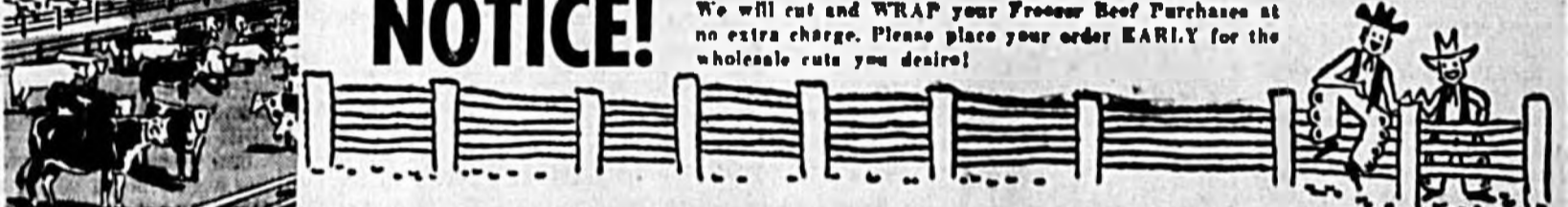

Church Leader

HAVANA (UPI)—A Catholic Action leader, Braulio Amador Quesada, 47, was executed Tuesday by a Castro firing squad on counter-revolutionary charges.

Amador was shot at dawn after having "admitted" the torture-slaying of two Castro supporters, an official release said. He was identified as a member of the Catholic anti-Communist movement.

The statement said Amador rose in arms against the government last April 17, the same day his exiled countrymen landed at Pig's Bay in a futile effort to topple the Castro regime. He was said to have organized an armed band of rebels.

The execution was the fifth the government has admitted this year. It is the 92nd since Castro seized power in January 1959.

Building Sets All-Time U. S. Record In 1961

NEW YORK — A surging wave of construction contracts in December helped to boost the total for 1961 to an all-time record for the United States, F. W. Dodge Corporation reported Friday.

Although December contracts at \$2,712,000,000 were just a fraction below December 1960, on a seasonally adjusted basis they reached the second highest peak ever reported for any month. The December 1961 index stood at 301; the all-time high index of 302 had been recorded in December 1960. This was the fourth successive month of increase in the index, from 261 in September to 280 in October, 293 in November, and 301 in December.

Dr. Gordon W. McKinley, Dodge vice president and chief economist, commenting on 1961 as a whole, declared that "its strength was concentrated in the residential building sector," increasing 7 per cent, they totaled \$16,123,430,000.

"Apartment building soared far above previous record levels, with contracts rising 32 per cent above 1960," he said. "Single-family houses, which began the year slowly, finished ahead of 1960 and contributed substantially to the total gain," McKinley added.

Thurmond Blasts 'No Win Policy'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Strom Thurmond (D-S. C.), has charged that censorship of military speeches showed the State Department "sold our leaders on the idea that we do not want to win the cold war."

Thurmond, whose charges of military "muzzling" triggered the current Senate inquiry, said Sunday night that speech changes brought out in the hearings reflected what he called "a no win policy."

The Senate armed services subcommittee is scheduled to resume the censorship hearings Tuesday with testimony from the chiefs of staff of the Army, Navy and Air Force. Gen. Lyman Lemnitzer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and retired officers testified last week.

Sinatra's Bride Still To Dance

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Dancer Juliet Prowse says she "definitely" will continue her career after she marries Frank Sinatra.

"I have no idea of retiring," the 25-year-old performer told United Press International before leaving during the weekend to visit her family in Johannesburg, South Africa.

Nine days ago, Miss Prowse told a columnist that Sinatra, 46, "wants me to give up the business" and that she probably would. What changed her mind?

"Just thinking about it," she said. "The idea of not performing any more."

"It's been a part of my life for many years, and I don't feel I can put my feet up on the desk and never dance again."

Moody Waives Extradition

MIAMI (UPI)—Charles Addison Moody, 35, has waived extradition to California, and was held in lieu of \$10,000 bond.

Moody, former resident of San Diego, Calif., was charged with "committing a crime on government property — embezzlement."

He was alleged to have embezzled more than \$12,000 earlier this month from the Chief Petty Officers' Club at the Naval Air Station at Miramar, Calif.

He surrendered to FBI agents here Sunday, and appeared before U. S. Commissioner Roger Edward Davis Monday.

Next Move Seminole's, Says HHFA

Seminole County must submit evidence to assure the financing of a \$9 million water management program before the House and Home Finance Agency will reconsider its application for a planning grant, the Herald learned today.

Walter Keys, regional administrator for the HHFA reported that the evidence must be submitted "in a reasonable length of time" or "there is nothing we can do."

Wednesday Sen. George Smathers reported he was asking the HHFA to reconsider the county's planning grant to get the project underway.

In a letter to Congressman Syd Herlong which was made public today, Keys said "we appreciate very much your continued effort regarding the application of the planning grant that was recently disappeared."

Keys said that the administration was well aware of the need for an adequate long range water control plan for "this section of Florida."

"However," the letter continued, "the application submitted did not meet the criteria established for the administration of the program of advances for public works planning."

"We therefore have no choice but to disapprove them."

Keys said that an HHFA engineer made a site evaluation on this project in October and discussed the application with Chairman J. C. Hutchison and County Engineer Carlton Bliss and "it was determined that there was very little prospect the county would provide funds to construct these projects in the near future."

The estimated cost of the project, according to Keys, would run about \$9 million and Keys wrote in the letter to Herlong that "it was indicated in the application that the financing would be accomplished by the issuance of general obligation bonds."

Keys said that the administration is interested in the welfare of the county stressing the significant losses in recent years because of inadequate control of surface water.

"We would like to assure you of our desired efforts to cooperate with you and county officials in your efforts to correct the situation," Keys said.
