School officials delay DOJ meeting

D.C. snow storm postpones talks on desegregation order

SANFORD — A snow storm in Washington, D.C., has caused Seminole County school district officials to postpone a meeting with the U. S. Department of Justice regarding efforts to come into compliance with desegregation orders.

School district officials were scheduled to meet today with Justice Department inspector Kathleen DeVine in Washington, D.C. However, six inches of

snow were expected to fall in the area on Wednesday, canceling many flights at Washington National Airport and causing difficulties on the roads. The meeting with DeVine has been tentatively rescheduled for Thursday, Jan. 27.

DeVine expressed concerns about dri-

ving from Montgomery County, Md., a suburb of Washington, D.C.

"The weather in Washington, D.C. was so bad that it was impossible to get a flight into the airport at a reasonable hour," said School Board attorney Ned Julian. "(DeVine) didn't seem to mind.

She was worried about driving, and she wanted to look after her kids."

The Seminole County school district this month responded to the Justice Department's 30-year-old desegregation order.

Seminole County school district officials believe they are in a good position to negotiate for court oversight to be removed.

Since 1970, the United States District Court has had supervisory jurisdiction over the Seminole County School Board. See DOJ, Page 2A

County cleans up blighted areas

SANFORD — A rooming house known for drug sales and criminal activity was demolished by county officials on Thursday.

The vacant 60-year-old building is located at 1801 Southwest Road on the west side of Sanford.

"It has a rich history of drug activity from the 1980s to the 1990s, when it was used as a drug house," said Steve Olson, a spokesman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Members of Seminole County's Neighborhood

Policing Coalition, including the Sheriff's Office and Seminole County Code Enforcement, contracted with a private company to have the rooming house demolished.

The two-story commercial structure has been boarded up by Seminole County Code Enforcement for eight months.

"We won't get a call on it anymore," said Greg France, project manager of Seminole County Code Enforcement.

"It was a nasty building." Ten buildings noted as havens for criminal activity within the Lockharts neighborhood have also been demolished during the count. See County, Page 6A



Judge receives poor Book review

Local minister protests Judge Eaton's nude dancing ruling

SANFORD — Evangelist John B. Book came to the county courthouse on Thursday to deliver a fire and brimstone sermon on "blind justice" to Circuit Judge O. H. Eaton, Jr.

Upset by a recent ruling by Eaton that allowed a bevy of Club Juana nude dancers to perform "Macbeth" as long as they did not dance nude, Book wanted to get the judge's ear on Thursday.

Although Book's noon arrival caused a mild stir outside the

courthouse, it had no effect on Eaton, who was not at his office according to his receptionist. Sheriff's Office Deputies on the second floor of the building recommended Book get a proper appointment with the judge.

Book said he wants Gov. George Bush or the State Ethics Board to censure Eaton for what the reverend says is a "cavalier attitude" and "misuse of public trust." Book said,

"I intend to get petitions in the hands of the governor and the ethics committee members," Book said. "How can we have confidence in our legal system when a judge finds performing at a topless bar to be bona fide art and legal?"

Book said this morning Judge Eaton could not talk to him because the Club Juana case was still active. In the meantime, Book has collected signa-

tures that he intends to send to Tallahassee.

"This is not a laughing matter," the evangelist said.

Book and others suspect that Eaton's decision could clear the way for Club Juana or any other club to stage nude theater in Casselberry or Seminole County.

"Broadway quality it's not," Eaton wrote in a 9-page opinion, but it was political satire. The performers were poking fun at an ordinance under which they were later arrested.

As political satire, Eaton said, "It was in the best of American traditions."

Book, who presides at the Northside Church of Christ and Christian School in Apopka, has led countless protests throughout Central Florida during the past two decades. He once came See Book, Page 6A

City expects intense growth along CR 46A

SANFORD — A new elementary school being considered for Sanford will serve several new housing developments and apartment complexes being planned near the County Road 46A interchange.

Along the Interstate-4 corridor near the CR 46A interchange, developers are seeking rezoning for several key sites in Sanford.

If approved by the Sanford City Commission, an 800-unit Seminole Trace apartment com-

plex and a 40-unit Arbor Lakes housing development would be located on Oregon Avenue. In addition, the Plantation Lakes apartment complex on CR 46A is planning to add 285 units in the second phase of its development.

"I've said all along that if you don't like change, you'll really hate it," said Sanford Mayor Larry Dale. "You ain't seen nothing yet. You or I might not like everything, but it's a fact of life that there's a demand for those properties."

 in matters such as school site purchases, school construction, and student attendance zones.

Seminole County school district officials are hoping to convince the Department of Justice that court oversight is no longer necessary. Seminole County would be declared a "unitary" school-district once the requirements of the Justice Department are met.

The letter to the Justice Department addressed methods that the district is taking to meet the Department's concerns.

"I think the steps we're taking are very positive," said Marion Dalley, director of instructional support services for the school-district. "But, now it will be in negotiation with the Justice Department."

The steps taken by the school-district to address concerns of the Justice Department include the funding improvements at Crooms Academy in Sanford.

In an effort to provide Crooms with the only Academy of Information Technology in the school-district, officials will seek Magnet School grant funding in the spring of 2001. The magnet school funding cannot be used for construction. The school-district will also seek state historic preservation funding for the more than 70 year old school.

Under revisions to the School Board's Five Year Capital Improvement Plan, \$5 million will be spent on renovations to Crooms Academy during the 2000-2001 school year.

Representatives from the NAACP said they approve of the plans for improving Crooms Academy. "Crooms was one of our primary concerns," said Turner Clayton, president of the Seminole County branch of the NAACP. "We're very pleased with the plans that have recently been announced."

Crooms Academy, an historically black school in Sanford prior to 1970, now serves as a school for "at-risk" middle and

high school students. Details on the renovations have yet to be determined.

There are 20 portables on the Crooms campus, and the portables will not meet state portable standards that will take effect in July of 2001. The school is located at 2200 W. 13th Street.

Crooms Academy parents and graduates have been lobbying for the alternative school to add vocational and technical training courses to the current curriculum serving 400 students in grades six through 12.

In addition to improving conditions at Crooms Academy, the letter also recommended the hiring of more black teachers, and said it is concerned about low black representation in higher level academic courses at the high school and middle school levels.

Other areas of concern include a low number of black students identified as gifted and an apparent tendency at certain schools where black students appear to be disciplined more often than non-black students.

In response, the Seminole County Minority Teacher and Recruitment Plan has been revised to include additional strategies for recruiting and supporting minority teachers. The plan includes attending more career workshops to recruit minority teachers, district officials said.

Each school is reviewing procedures for placing students higher academic level classes, mentally disabled programs, and the gifted program.

School-based discipline advisory committees will develop action items within their School Improvement Plans to address trends in their schools.

Schools are also developing strategies to recruit a diverse representation of cheerleading evaluators and coaches, to increase minority participation on cheerleading squads.

The key areas inspected by the Justice Department include equitable conditions in faculty

and staff assignments, resource allocation, facilities, transportation, student assignment, and extracurricular activities.

Seminole County and other Florida school districts were sued in 1970 by the Justice Department for operating a "dual system" which separated schools for black and non-black students.

In 1970, the school district was ordered to dismantle the dual system, and to merge black and non-black students into a unitary system.

The U.S. District Court can find the district in compliance with desegregation requirements, granting "unitary status," on each key factor separately, or the court may grant complete unitary status.

If unitary status cannot be negotiated, the School Board would seek a resolution of the issue in court.

DiBona said. "People get out of the car, singing. They've courted. They don't realize how they were driving. Others are angry that you've pulled them over. They'll curse you. Try to get away or fight you. Some just cry."

And there are nearly absurd moments, too, DiBona said.

"I once was testing a man's sobriety by demonstrating how I wanted him to walk and turn. The fellow

laughed and said he could do what I had demonstrated by walking on his hands — and he did."

On another occasion, DiBona asked a female DUI suspect if she was concealing drugs, weapons or contraband on herself or in her vehicle.

"She proudly lifted her blouse to show me her breast implants," DiBona said.

Nice try, he said, cuffing her.

Florida Helpline assists those in crisis

Central Florida now has more people trained to handle a crisis.

The Central Florida Helpline, "How Can I Help," 13-week training course announced its graduates on Jan. 18, which brings the number of people completing the course to 1,500.

The course trains Christian lay people to minister to the emotional and spiritual needs of those in crisis. The Helpline operates a free telephone service to anyone with problems.

Topics for the course include grief, loneliness and depression, HIV/AIDS, addiction and many others. Topic sections are presented by area mental health professionals and religious affiliates.

Kim Ferraro, administrative director

for Central Florida Helpline, said the course is designed to teach basic counseling skills.

"Students learn enough about the crisis topics to walk away with empathy and some practical suggestions about that subject," she said.

However, the goal is to channel the person in crisis toward a proper resource, she added.

The helpline draws its resources from a referral directory of about 300 agencies in the community that can serve a person's unique needs. Ferraro said for a donation, a graduate could acquire a directory if they wanted to implement

the ideas learned in training away from the helpline. Eighty percent of the course's graduates use at other agencies the skills they learned.

The other 20 percent of graduates volunteer at the Helpline.

The service operates from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily with one volunteer working during the day and two in the evening. Seventy volunteers staff the Helpline and another 40 are active in other aspects of its operation.

Helpline volunteers deal with issues of faith in away that is non-offensive, Ferraro said.

"We train them to listen for things in

a conversation that may be spiritual issues. The volunteer may ask at the end of a call if he or she would like to pray with them, but we wouldn't force that," she said.

"It's a subtle way to show God's love," she said, "but the focus is finding a resource that meets the needs of the caller and putting them in touch with that."

The Helpline answers an average of 10,500 calls a year.

The most frequent request is for prayer—around 3000 calls a year—followed closely by issues concerning depression/loneliness—around 2,300 calls a year. More than 1,000 calls each year concern information or referrals. The Central Florida Helpline has been operating since 1987.

The Helpline receives all of its funding through donations from the com-

munity. Many of the "How Can I Help" graduates make donations to the Helpline.

Monthly support from churches and foundations, such as Rotary, also contribute to its funding. Fund-raising activities, such as golf tournaments, garage sales, silent auctions and tea parties also help contribute to the organization's operating expenses.

Their largest fund-raiser, a golf tournament, collected \$10,000 for the Helpline.

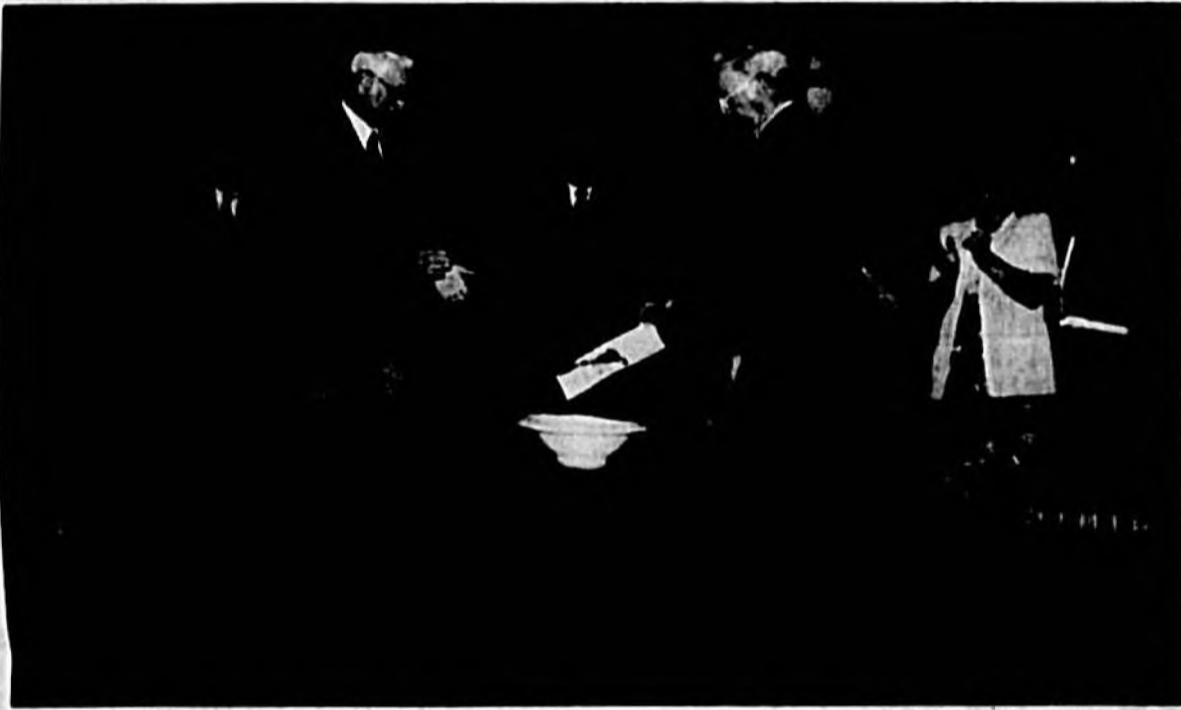
Although volunteers are discouraged from developing a relationship with the caller, some have called back to relay how much they were helped and to express appreciation.

Coming together Sunday morning

In what surely must be the irony of ironies, religion may be America's most racially segregated institution. Although blacks and whites work together, go to school together, date and sometimes marry, there's a significant difference when it comes to worshipping together.

Though driven by the Rev. Martin Luther King and religion, the civil rights movement of the 1950s and '60s has had but minimal effect on religious life.

Government cannot force churches to desegregate, and only a few have done so on their own. White worshippers go to predominately white churches; blacks go to traditional black churches.

Compounding this separation, some black pastors feel their churches are being threatened by large white churches, who are trying to evangelize blacks.

Other pastors say that black worshippers come to church to

be in their second home. They don't come to church for an hour and leave. They are prepared to spend half a day. If white churchgoers did the same

they would have a far better sense of brotherhood or sisterhood said a white pastor.

"We have much to learn," he said. I recall the Rev. Ron Kimble, pastor at Mount Carmel Baptist Church in Eatonville, once agonizing at the way blacks and whites kept going

their separate ways—blacks worshipping with blacks, whites worshipping with whites.

"I don't think God is pleased with us," the Rev. Kimble said. "We definitely have a culture gap that only the Holy Spirit can break down."

Whatever it is—pride, past hurts, guilt, apprehension—pastors and churchgoers are optimistic that black and white churches are soon going to be one. Some say that by 2050, the religious culture gap will be

gone. That 11 o'clock on Sunday will cease being called the most segregated hour in America.

Some people will never realize the emotion, pathos and spontaneity that black Christians exercise in their churches. The Catholic Church has tried—and frequently succeeded—in uniting with black churches, mindful that white and blacks interface without either losing their identity.

The nation's oldest black Christian denomination—the African Methodist Episcopal Church—began in 1797 when former slave Richard Allen and his friends walked out of predominantly white St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church in Philadelphia.

Allen, complaining that blacks could not worship side by side with whites but were forced to the back of the church or to a balcony, formed a church of his own.

If blacks and whites never do get together at church on Sunday, how likely is it that they will be together to praise God for the first time in the next world?

Gasoline prices down, but only for the moment

HEATHROW — AAA, Auto Club South, in Heathrow, says prices for self-serve regular unleaded gasoline have dropped in Florida by 1.2 cents since the record pre-holiday price of \$1.333 per gallon set last month. They warn however, that the drop will be very brief.

"Gasoline prices may be down in January, but the future outlook can be described as gloomy," said Yoll Buss, director of traffic safety for AAA. "Oil ministers from the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) met last Friday in Vienna and signaled their intent to continue restricting world oil supplies well into 2000."

"Their original output agreement was to expire in March, at which time we had hoped to see a rise in oil supply levels followed by a decrease in gas prices." Apparently, this will not occur.

According to AAA's Florida

Fuel Gauge 2000, in the Orlando-Sanford area, the average price for regular unleaded as of Jan. 18, is \$1.306 per gallon, down from \$1.329 in December. For mid-grade unleaded, the current price averages \$1.412 and for premium unleaded, it's now at 1.497. Prices naturally vary from service station to service station.

Highest prices in the state were reported in Delray Beach, where self-serve regular was \$1.423. The lowest price was in Port Richey, at \$1.227 per gallon.

Orlando-Sanford prices were 15th highest in the 27 reporting areas, but slightly lower in all grades than the state averages.

AAA has also prepared a listing of prices in a five year study, indicating the prices in January, 1996 for self-serve regular were \$1.113, going up to \$1.321 in January 2000. The lowest January figure was in 1999, where the price was 0.987 per gallon, followed by a price of 0.968 in February, 1999.

ment rezonings must be approved by both the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Commission.

Not everyone in Sanford is pleased with the proposed developments. When developers appear before the Planning and Zoning Commission or the City Commission, homeowners near Oregon Avenue consistently say that their way of life is in danger of being lost.

City planners expect that new developments will increase the city's tax base.

"That's a good bit of housing," said Jay Marder, director of engineering and planning for the city. "We're looking at creating a nice, attractive new community right where it should be, considering that there is a nearby regional mall, millions of square feet of office space, new interchanges, and other transportation improvements."

In addition, the Seminole County Board of Commissioners has approved a 29-acre office complex to be located on the northeast corner of CR 46A and Orange Boulevard. It has not yet received final approval from the state.

To serve the incoming developments, the Seminole County school-district is considering building a new elementary school on a 17-acre site at the corner of Oregon Avenue and Huey Avenue in Sanford, near Derby Park.

Sanford's new elementary school will be designed for 900 students, patterned after the same two-story brick design of Highlands Elementary School in Winter Springs.

If approved by the School Board, it will open in August of 2001. The Board will consider approval of the school site on Feb. 22. By then, officials plan to have environmental evaluations and local government approvals in place to build a school on the \$1.4 million property.

Tonight, the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission will consider rezoning a 43-acre site located at 2200 Oregon Avenue from agricultural to planned development for the Arbor Lakes housing development.

Uses adjacent to the Arbor Lakes site, which would include 40 total lots, include the city-owned Derby Park and the Kaywood subdivision to the south of the development. Seminole Trace planned development, a proposed 800-unit multiple family development, is located east of the site.

The maximum proposed building height is 35 feet. The developer will be required to pay for a share of Oregon Avenue improvements, including paving. There are also planned improvements to the intersections of Oregon Avenue with Rinehart Road and CR 46A.

The site will have access to two major interchanges with the Central Florida GreenWay and

with Interstate-4 via the CR 46-A interchange. The site is less than one mile from I-4, and near the Seminole Towne Center.

On Monday, the Sanford City Commission will consider approval of rezoning of the Plantation Lakes Phase II apartment complex, located at 4750 CR 46A.

There are already 362 apartments under construction for the first phase of the complex. The second phase would include the construction of an additional 285 units.

In addition, the Seminole Trace apartment complex located at 2215 Oregon Avenue is seeking approval from the Planning and Zoning Commission for an 800 unit complex. The project would be constructed in two phases on 85 acres. The proposed density is 9.5 units per acre.

No rezoning would be required for the new elementary school, currently known as Elementary School H. Parents in the Northwest cluster of Seminole County would be able to choose whether their children attend the new school, Wilson, Wicklow, or Idyllwilde elementary schools.

The total cost of building the new school is estimated at \$10 million, including a construction cost of \$8.5 million.

The School Board has approved using \$14 million in available funding to construct a new elementary school and a primary learning center in time for the 2001 school year to meet ris-

ing elementary capacity needs in the Northwest portion of the county.

The primary learning center is mini elementary school which houses kindergarten and first-grade students. The center will contain 14 classrooms, cost \$3.1 million to construct, and will be located at Lawton Elementary School.

In the elementary schools clustered in the Northwest portion of the county, there is a ratio of 20 students per teacher in kindergarten through second grade, and 25 students per teacher in grades three through five.

By constructing the new elementary school, the school-district hopes to maintain low class sizes.

The district also expects to be able to fund a second elementary school during the next five years.

According to Department of Education estimates, the district needs 3,000 additional student stations. There are also 210 portables in the district.

The growth rate for middle and high school students is expected to accelerate during the next five years, while the growth rate for elementary school students will decline.

Seminole County's population has grown 8.4 percent over the last five years, from 324,130 in 1995 to 354,148 in 1999, according to county records. Sanford's population has grown from 32,000 in 1990 to 37,000 in 1998, according to U.S. Census Bureau estimates.

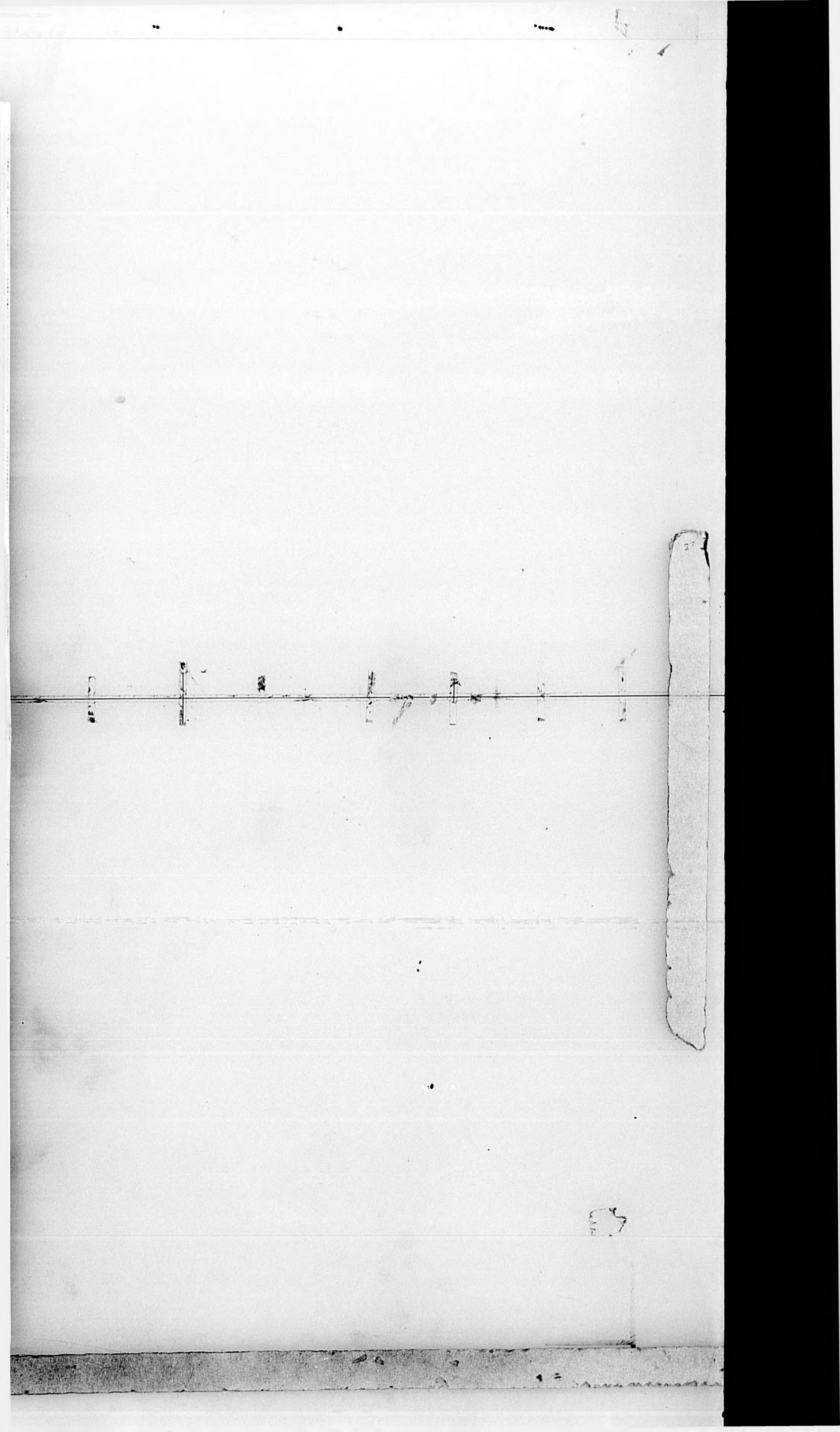

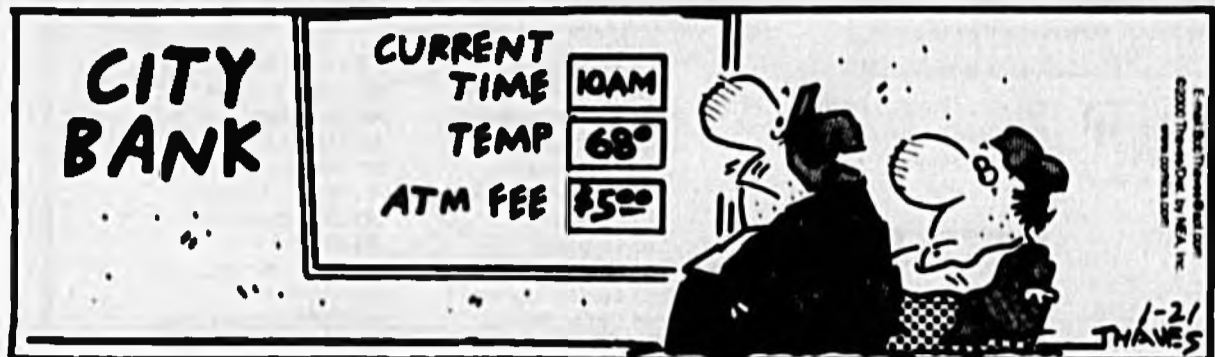

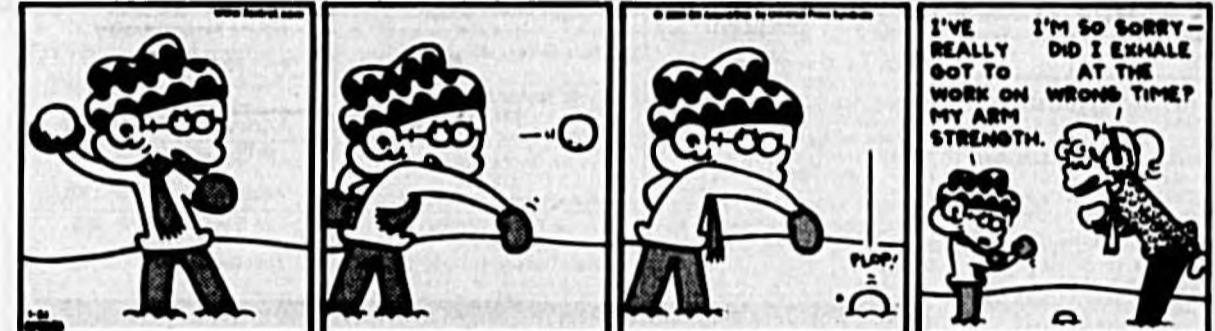

Finally, a new continent

 Over the last four days, we have learned that the countries with the highest percentage of Internet surfers are Iceland (320 users per 1,000 people), Finland (305), Norway (304) and Sweden (290). In fifth place, we find a country that is not in Europe. Which do you think it is? Here are a few hints. It's about half the size of Russia, its lowest point is some 280 feet below sea level, and its highest point is some 20,130 feet above sea level. The average life expectancy of babies born this year is about 73 years for a boy and almost 80 years for a girl. One of this country's more colorful players, who died in 1978, was Johnny Crawford. He defended today's deal perfectly in an international match against Great Britain. Crawford's jump to four hearts was

brave, but presumably he assumed his partner had something in hearts after the opponents had found a spade fit.
 West cashed the heart ace, then continued with another heart. South ruffing. It looks as though the contract must make, doesn't it? How can declarer do worse than lose one trick in each side suit? Well, when things are desperate, defenders do desperate things. At trick three, declarer immediately played a diamond to dummy's eight. It won the trick! Suitably duped, South drew trumps ending in hand, then led another diamond, covering West's jack with dummy's queen. However, Crawford fished the king out of his hand and switched to a club. Lou Gehrig's disease in lay language

DEAR DR. GOTT: My friend has Lou Gehrig's disease. The medical writings are too technical for me to understand. Please explain the disorder in simple language.
 DEAR READER: Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) is often called Lou Gehrig's disease, in honor of the great baseball player who died of the illness and thereby attracted much public attention. A neurological disorder of unknown cause, ALS is characterized by progressive and untreatable degeneration of the nervous system. It causes weakness and wasting of the muscles of the hands, arms and legs. Cramps, difficulty swallowing and disordered speech are common. The disease typically begins in middle-age and rapidly progresses, with death occurring within two to five years of the diagnosis. Although there is no cure, ALS patients can usually be helped to maintain independence by nursing care, physical therapy and occupational therapy.
 DEAR DR. GOTT: Does carrot juice

help vision?
 DEAR READER: Carrots contain vitamin A, which is necessary for proper metabolism and helps form some of the eyes' light-sensitive pigments. Thus, a vitamin A deficiency can lead to night blindness. Liver is a rich source of the vitamin. The Recommended Dietary Allowance is 5,000 international units. Excessive amounts can cause vitamin A poisoning: weight loss, anemia, bleeding, visual disturbances, itching, rash, bone pain, mouth ulcers, headache and liver failure. For this reason, experts advise people to be cautious about taking high doses of vitamin A (above 25,000 units a day), because the vitamin is readily retained in the body and can easily build up to dangerous levels. Go easy on the carrot juice.
 DEAR DR. GOTT: I had severe rheumatoid arthritis. About three years ago, I stumbled into a bee's nest and sustained scores of stings. After I had self-treated with cold baths, I was astounded to discover that my arthritis had disappeared. I am now symptom-free. Is there a medical explanation for this phenomenon?
 DEAR READER: Before answering your question, let me digress. Certain forms of inflammatory arthritis, such as rheumatoid arthritis and the joint pain of psoriasis, are marked by what doctors term "spontaneous remission." In other words, people sometimes get well for unknown reasons without therapy. Therefore, doctors have difficulty, in these instances, knowing if the patients improved on their own or from some other factor. This could be the explanation for your improvement, albeit implausible. But I think it's more likely that the bee stings cured you. The relation between bee venom and arthritis cure has been confirmed so often that there is probably some truth to it. But, as yet, there have not been any scientifically verifiable studies proving this reaction. Nonetheless, some rheumatologists (as well as alternative medicine practitioners) have started injecting bee venom into arthritis patients. Evidently, the venom stimulates the immune system in some way that blocks the antibodies that cause some types of arthritis. In my opinion, this whole issue deserves more study and recognition.
