

Four-Day Record Space Flight Slated For June 3

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)- of having White open one of A record - breaking space the capsule's two hatches and one day before launch. astronauta James McDavitt nounced today.

The mission, most ambitious yet attempted by the United States, will more than triple the total space time accumulated by all six Mercury astronauta and Gemini pioneers Virgil Grissom and John

Young. The Gemini-4 capsule will fly longer, 97 hours and 50 minutes, and higher, 185 miles, than any previous U. S. manned spaceship and one of its pilots may become the first American to partially venture into the void of space.

Main goal of the flight is to prove that the 7,000-pound ship is capable of long duration flights and to see if astronauts are affected by prolonged exposure to the mysteries of weightlessness in space.

The flight plan calls for the Gemini-4 ship to use small ateering rockets to make nine orbital maneuvers-up, down, forward, backward and sideways. Perfection of such techniques is necessary for later attempts to rendezvous with other craft in space.

If the June 3 launch date is met, it will mean only a 2½-month interval between the first and second manned Gemini missions—a pace that earlier this year only the most optimistic project offi-cials hoped could be attained.



There is a measure before the Florida Legislature that is going to raise some mighty loud cries if it is passed.

Known as House Bill 1246, the proposed measure would restrict motorboat operation and water skiing beyond

HB 1246, which has been reported favorably by the Public Safety Committee, would authorize coastline counties to limit motorboat speed to six miles per hour within 100 yards of any moored, anchored or docked boat, sea wall or launching area. Motorboats would be absolutely prohibited within 100 yards of any lifeguard patrolled beach.

San Francisco at Chicago The bill also gives the countles the option of banning Pittsburgh at Cincinnati (n) water skiing within 100 feet of any shoreline, vessel or swimmer. Philadelphia at St. Louis (n)

If the proposed "distance laws" are passed by the state logislature, countless boating and water skiing enthusiasts will be discriminated against, and the Florida tourist industry will suffer the consequences.

Obviously speed boats and water skiers should not run helter-skelter through heavily used water areas, especially where swimmers and fishermen are concentrated. Florida already has a law on reckless operation which deals seversly with anybody who operates a motorboat in such wanton disregard for the safety of others.

However, it is one thing to require motorboats engaged in water skiing or erulaing at speeds of more than six miles per hour to maintain a "safe distance" from others. and to make the operator responsible for any reckless maneuvering. It is quite another to establish a specific distance in terms of feet or yards. Such exacting regulations are grossly unfair and difficult to enforce. It is extremely difficult to judge distances over the surface of the water.

Note that the bill would prevent water skiers from coming within 100 feet of shore under any circumstances. This ignores the safety of the water skiers themselves, who should be allowed to take off from and return to shoreline areas rather than being dumped more than 100 feet out in the water.

The bill is unfair in restricting skiers to deeper unprotected water where wind and wave action are rough and shoppy, even though there are long stretches of shoreline where they would not be competing with onyone for use of the water.

HB 1246, as it reads with its distance restrictions, seems just as foolish to us as it would be to pass a measure forbidding the driving of an automobile within the same distance of a school or playground area.

We do agree that the best way of regulating speed boats and water skiers with respect to other water users is to have them maintain a safe distance-not an inflex-Ible number of feet or yards.

There is one part of the proposed measure with which we do agree, however. This is the section whereby counties could make two persons in a boat towing a water skier an absolute requirement.

Under present state law an observer is not required if the ski boat is equipped with a wide-angle rear view mirror.

From the time we were first taught water skiing by an old friend who was quite a pro, we have always believed in the extra safety margin of having an observer in the boat.

This friend who taught us, who with his entire family Soured the country giving exhibitions, always used an observer. He instilled the belief in us.

It just seems common sense to us that a second person be in the boat in case an emergency should rise. There is first, of course, the possibility of the skier being injured in the water. An observer in the boat could come to the skier's rescue, without leaving the boat unmanned.

Then, there is the possibility that something could happen to the driver of the tow boat. An observer in the boat could take over the controls if necessary.

A runaway speedboat is a very dangerous thing. We have seen the results of such runaways, and it is not a pretty sight when a swimmer or skier has been struck by the churning propellor of a boat.

We are all for having observers required in the boats. But the other parts of the measure-the "safe distance" regulation-is impractical and unreasonable.

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Caladium Care **Discussed By Plant Pathologist**

By Julia Bartes

Dr. John F. Darby, plant pathologist of the Central Florida Agricultural Experiment Station in Sanford and guest speaker for the May covered dish supper meeting of the Altamonte Springs Garden Club, showed films on care of lawns, planting and care of caladiums, and how to use insecticides,

Featuring caladiums in his talk, Dr. Darby reported that there are 85 commercial growers of this plant in the state of Florida. In Sebring approximately 500 acres of caladiums are grown and in Zellwood there are some 150 acres.

There are many varieties and sizes of the plants with some leaves as large as 12 inches in width and 18 inches in length. They are beautiful when used in any background planting and are especially effective in beds of petunias.

Dr. Darby reported that the recent sale in Sanford of caladium bulbs, or tubers, for "Operation Beautify" brought \$842 in one day. Bulbs were donated for this project to the Sanford Garden Club from the Experiment Station.

'Nuclear Ned' Wins **'Hot' Frog Causing States Rift**

TONOPAH, Nev. (UPI) - "Nuclear Ned," who may have an atomic tiger in his tank, won the Nevada frog jumping contest Thursday with a lead of 18 feet, 9 inches.

Sometime between now and Sunday, "Nuclear Ned" will be spirited by car into California by a secret route to compete in the international Calaveras County frog jumping contest.

"We will not divulge the route because of implied threats of Calif. Gov. Edmond G. Brown's militia," explained Joy Hamann, who was appointed Nevada's frog commissioner by Gov. Grant Sawyer.

California officials have issued no immediate word on the frog's status. The two-pound frog from Clark County was transported here from near Las

Vagas in a lead container because it was feared that "Nuclear Ned" might be radioactive.

The frog captured near the Nevada test aite-where nuclear tests are conducted by the Atomic Energy Commission-"glowed in the dark like a firefly," said Mrs. Hamann.
