and sale, unless taxes are paid thereon thus incurring additional penalties, or by law or regulation.

The blank also lists the following under the heading "Instructions":

"There shall be exempted from all taxation, other than special assessments for roads, to every head of a family who is a citizen of and resides in the State of Florida the homestead as defined in Article 10 of the Constitution of the State of Florida up to the valuation of \$5000; provided, however, that the title to said homestead may be vested in such head of a family or in his lawful wife residing upon such homestead or in both."

A homestead as referred to in this section may consist of 160 acres of land, or less, contiguously situated, outside the corporate limits of a city or town, or one-half of one acre of land, or less, contiguously situated, within the corporate limits of a city or town, and improvements thereon, the title to which shall be vested in the head of the family, his wife, or both, prior to Jan. 1 of the year for which exemption is sought and upon which such family resides as their home.

The head of a family is one with whom one or more persons live and look to for their support and personal supervision."

The application proper contains upwards of 50 questions, including a description of the property, the number of children or other dependents, the type of house, the number of years the residence has been in Florida, amount of life insurance carried, amount of indebtedness on the property, and the age of the applicant.

oosevelt Launches Attack On Evils Of Modern Existence

gress Tendered 5 Point Program Aim At Protection, Social Securities

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (AP)—Making its long attack on the problem of "social security," Roosevelt's Administration before Congress to-day presented what it terms the "bill of modern existence."

That Florida celery will have little or no competition from Southern California is an observation released today in a bulletin bearing the signature of W. M. Scott, manager of the Sanford division of the American Fruit Growers, Inc.

The bulletin, mailed to many growers and shippers in this country, in the form of a letter report issued by the American Fruit Growers' Los Angeles office. It covers the celery situation in California to Jan. 1, and it includes a survey of future conditions.

The report, with Mr. Scott's observations contained in the last paragraph is as follows:

"Delta district in northern California's season will probably extend in a small way as late as Jan. 30, but shipments will be largely out of the way by the 15 to 20 of this month. There are approximately 550 cars remaining unshipped. It ran up there yesterday. The quality of the celery is about unchanged from thirty days ago; it is still very good and sizes are holding up well, although certain areas are becoming expect sizes to be quite small, probably heavy to 4 and smaller in the regular half crate.

"Almost without exception, every car of Delta celery being shipped is individually trimmed and washed. Much of it is being moved in crates as short as 18 inches tall, some in 20 inch crates and occasionally, some in 22 inch crates. We are selling small sized Delta celery today for as high as \$2.15 per half crate, f. o. b.

"The Chula Vista district is in southern California, located 14 miles south of San Diego. The normal season is Dec. 20 to Mar. 20; there are 800 acres in this district is individually trimmed and washed, most of it being shipped in the rough, crates having off.

New Social Legislation Idea Outlined By Experts

Program Includes Only One Feature That Is Characteristic Of Townsend Old-Age Plan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Questions arising under the new program of social legislation offered in Congress yesterday by the Administration and the opinion of experts thereon follow:

Q. Does the plan embrace both the manual and white collar workers who reaches the age of 65 years?

A. Yes.

Q. Does it have any of the characteristics of the Townsend Plan for paying all persons 65 or over \$200 a month?

A. Only that it carries provisions for old age pensions.

Q. What happens to the man or

woman now 65 or over who cannot be brought under the compulsory contribution pension plan?

A. The government joins with the state in giving each dependent of this nature a total maximum of \$1 a month.

Q. How will the compulsory an-

uity plan work?

A. A payroll tax will be imposed. The employee will contribute the same amount as the employer. The money will go into a trust fund in the treasury.

Q. What employee will be eligible for these pensions?

A. Any employee 17 when he

Reciprocal Pact Will Be Similar To Ones Used Elsewhere

ATLANTA, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Chairman Paul Doyal, of the State Revenue Commission, announced yesterday Gov. Eugene Talmadge had approved a reciprocal arrangement between Florida and Georgia, regulating operation of motor vehicles of one state in the territory of the other.

Chairman Doyal said the bill provided for a 30-mile "free zone" in each state for operation of passenger motor vehicles by persons living in such areas in each state.

He said similar arrangements had been made by Georgia with the states of Tennessee, Alabama, North Carolina and South Carolina.

The agreement also provides for operation of trucks and trailers by owners of regularly established businesses within 30 mile zones in each state, without the necessity of buying a license of the other state.

Trucks and trailers operated by their owners and agents, transporting goods and merchandise of the owners of the vehicle, may

enter into any part of either state four times monthly, without buying a license of the other state.

Operation of trucks and trailers by owners or their agents, for transport of dairy, farm, grove or orchard products, or for transportation of fish, where such products are the actual property of the owner of the vehicle, also is permitted under the agreement.
