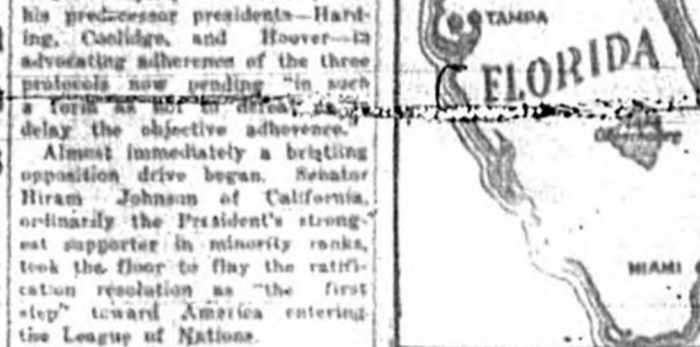
East Coast Canal Declared Completed
