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PITTSBURGH TO HAVE REVIVAL OF BLUE LAWS

Bills Enacted in 1794 and
Which Have Been Dormant
For Years to be Invoked
By Public Safety Director

Playing of Football
Game Opens Question

Two Police Officers 'Fired'
For Failure to Enforce
Orders of Their Superior

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Pittsburgh's second largest city today faced the prospect of a sportless Sunday with an additional ban on Sunday sales of tobacco and confections a strong probability.

Invoking the "blue laws" of 1794, ignored for more than a century by police officials, James M. Clark, Pittsburgh's director of public safety, yesterday prohibited the playing of any Sunday sports, including football, baseball, golf, tennis and quoits, and then declared he would strictly enforce every phase of the "blue laws" which ban all Sunday activity but that necessary for life.

Talk of applying for an injunction to prevent carrying out of the director's order was heard in football circles but nothing definite along that line yet has been done.

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BYRD LEAVES IN POLAR AIRPLANE ON LONG FLIGHT

First Man to Reach North
Pole by Air to Visit All
Parts of Country in Plea
For Commercial Aviation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The airplane in which Commander Richard E. Byrd flew over the North Pole left here today on a flight which will take it to all parts of the country on a tour in the interest of commercial aviation.

With the first trans-Polar flight in history already in her log, the Byrd plane, "Miss Josephine Ford," was tuned up today for the start of another record air journey 7,000 miles roughly circular tour of the United States in which about 40 cities will be visited for the promotion of commercial aviation.

Of all sections of the country, only the extreme Pacific northwest will not have an opportunity to see the famous plane, as the itinerary calls for a hop from Salt Lake City to Nevada points and thence on to San Francisco, with the return journey to Washington traced along the southern portion of the nation.

Expenses of the expedition will be defrayed by the Daniel Guggenheim fund which is acting in cooperation with the Department of Commerce. In preparation for the start today, the plane was brought here yesterday from Miller Field, New York.

On the first leg of the journey—Washington to New York, Lieutenant Commander Richard E. Byrd, who commanded the trans-polar flight, planned to be at the controls, but thereafter the plane will be piloted by Floyd Bennett, naval aviator, who flew with Commander Byrd over the North Pole. Bennett will be in charge after the plane leaves New York City.

REX BEACH NOTED AUTHOR, STUDIES CELERY GROWING

Novelist and C. C. Rolfe of
Avon Park Come Here to
Inspect R. F. Symes Farm;
Owns a Colonization Tract

Rex Beach, famous novelist, arrived in Sanford today for a short visit at the celery farm of Roy F. Symes near here. He was accompanied by C. C. Rolfe, secretary of the Avon Park Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Beach is developing 25 acres for agricultural purposes near Avon Park and which will be divided into small farms. The little farms will be on the property. A cottage, farming implements and modern equipment are furnished to each tenant by Mr. Beach.

As the author of stories with a background in Alaska, Mr. Beach became internationally famous as a novelist. Some of his best known works are "The Spoilers"; "The Barrier"; "Pardners"; "The Nel"; and "Flowing Gold."

Mr. Rolfe on a recent visit to Sanford declared that he believed celery could be raised near Avon Park with as much success as in Seminole County. Today's visit is for the purpose of studying local methods on celery growing.

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Blue Laws In Tightened

DOVER, N. H., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Blue laws which last Sunday were invoked to prevent a baseball game and other sports was further advanced today.

A petition containing 700 names was presented asking Attorney General Jeremy Walden, that everything from golf to gasoline sales be stopped on Sundays under the laws which were the basis of the baseball complaint.

Rev. Lester Holmes, pastor of the Baptist Church, moved to end Sunday baseball by petitioning Governor Winant.

Two More Liquor Cases Remain On County Court Bill

Seven cases of possession of liquor have been disposed of in County Court which convened Tuesday, but no convictions have been obtained. In addition one case has been temporarily passed over and two more are yet to be disposed of for this term.

The criminal docket presents interesting facts on the fate of the alleged liquor law violator in Seminole County. Two liquor law violators have been dismissed; one case temporarily passed; one found not guilty by the jury; one case nolle prossed; two cases continued for the term and one defendant freed by the granting of a writ of habeas corpus by Judge W. W. Wright.

Ten defendants were booked for trial on possession of liquor in addition to other charges resulting from the illegal use of liquor.

Way To Business Executive

 CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—Successors of their own blood are stepping into the shoes of Thomas A. Edison and Henry Ford as the age-enforced retirement of these two outstanding American mechanical wizards draws near.

But twin heirs of destiny from the blood streams that link fathers and sons, the corpulose genius are lacking.

In the case of Edison, Ford and Charles Edison, executives of the "American business man" type are inheriting control of the huge Ford and Edison industrial concerns.

The Wizards Are Gone

When the curtain of inactivity falls on the founders of these concerns it will fall simultaneously on the inventive instinct that flourishes for doing new things, or old things in a new way—that made these founders rich and famous.

Charles Edison is the second of the sons to spring into prominence. He becomes president of an assortment of industries worth upwards of \$300,000,000 and employing some 45,000 workers.

"I'm a business man and not an inventor," young Edison candidly replies.

At 38 he is affable, college-bred, and a lover of the arts. He makes a hobby of writing, and

thinks a finished education a fine thing for a youth who is starting out to make his own way.

The elder Edison cares nothing for the arts, never had a college training and is very dubious about higher education's benefits.

There is less difference between the dispositions of Henry Ford and Edsel Ford, perhaps. Yet Edsel Ford, too, primarily is a "business man and not an inventor." There is little of the mechanical wizard about him.

Charles Edison proudly tells that his new responsibilities did not come simply by inheritance.

"I didn't ask any favors from my father and I didn't receive any," he says. "I worked for what I got. He made me do it. There is no favoritism in business, because favoritism doesn't pay. Ability alone counts."

Education Is Valuable

As for education:

"If two seemingly equally capable men start from the same place, one college-trained and the other not, the race will end with the college man ahead," he observes.

And as for slumber, of which Thomas A. Edison says man needs but four hours nightly—

"Well, I admit I sleep a little more than that," says the son with a smile.

Over Lake Level

Windy City Makes Construction of Subway More Difficult But Has Fixed Itself High Over Lake Michigan

CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Chicago has lifted itself fifteen feet by its own boot straps.

In so doing, it has made the building of a subway more difficult; city engineers point out, but it has fixed itself high and dry above the level of Lake Michigan, and many of its downtown buildings stand where a little more than half a century ago were only swamps and sloughs.

Streets Higher Than Lake

Old Fort Dearborn, at the mouth of Chicago River and Lake Michigan, was built on a level with the lake and behind it was a marshy morass. When the town began to develop, the street level was made three feet higher by filling in the wastes with dirt, rock and sand. Then it was raised to seven feet, and now the street level of Michigan avenue is fifteen feet, and the levels of other loop streets and most of the close-in residential sections vary from fourteen to fifteen feet.

This increasing of its stature was not easy, and many residents can remember when State Street's sidewalks were lifted to fourteen feet, leaving the unpaved mud streets seven feet below.

Makes Subway Difficult

The raising of the street levels has been accompanied by the marking of new land and the Illinois Central track, once standing on pier along the lake front above the ground level of the business district, now are some ten feet under the street level, and with a mile of land between them and the waterline.

Chicago's whole understructure is of sand, and the surfacing of this with debris and loose dirt has added to the impossibility of ever building a subway by tunneling through under existing streets while traffic goes on. Subways must be by open cuts, filled over or surface streets after the work is done. New York's problem is easier, for the city rests largely on rock and subway builders may tunnel through the rock.

Foreigner Grows Weary In Watching Weird Chinese Play In Boston Theater

BOSTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Boston's only Chinese theatre draws steady patronage even though it is unknown to most white residents.

Only those few who chance along a dilapidated street have heard the clash of cymbals, the twang of squeaky two-string violins, the rattle and tinkle of unamped traps, and over all the falsetto of voices in the sing-song of the Chinese tongue which accompany the Chinese production.

The Stage and Orchestra

At the front of the hall is the square platform of the stage. In the alcove at the rear of the stage is an eight piece orchestra. One of its members wears an eyeshade. Another musician smokes a cigarette. All the while weird sounds issue from the instruments, blended in a sort of monotonous rhythm, but jarred acutely by unexpected twangings, clankings and thumping on a dry wooden box.

An especially loud clamor, and an actor brushes aside the curtain and walks in with the classical stilted gait and slow moving hands of the ancient drama. His robe and headpiece are ornate in the rigidly prescribed manner; his make-up is conspicuous. He begins to sing.

Mostly Long Monologue

The Occidental gets little from what follows. Actors and actresses, all in elaborate costume, succeed each other at short intervals, singly or in groups. A scene shifts or sidles behind the classical players to shift a chair to meet the new requirements of the play. He crests a throne, takes out a curtained bed, lays out fresh fans and performs a constant succession of tasks. In no manner does he disturb the continued singing and playing of the orchestra.

Some pantomime accompany the play, but for the most part it is long monologue in singing of a speaking voice, with occasional dialogue and rare bits of dramatic action.

Toward midnight the spectator purchase from a vendor tidbits of dried pork, Lichee nuts, candied fruits or other confection. The Chinese come and go throughout the evening. They smoke and eat, converse and sleep. They never applaud, but they do laugh appreciatively when a bit of buffoonery enlivens the scene.

Few Occidentals see an evening's performance out. It lasts for seven hours and then resumes next evening where it broke off.

University Of Florida Has Many Honorary Fraternities In All Lines Of Endeavor

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA, Gainesville, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The University of Florida has many honorary fraternities which represent the highest honor in each of the several lines of endeavor.

Alpha Eta, honorary agricultural fraternity, elects upperclassmen in that college who have distinguished themselves in their college work. It requires a certain scholastic standing for membership.

Alpha Kappa Psi is the professional fraternity of the School of Business Administration. It elects men above the Sophomore class to membership who are leaders in that school. Alpha Phi chapter was established here in 1925.

Alpha Phi Epsilon, honorary forensic fraternity, is open to all who participate in inter-collegiate debates and are deemed worthy to receive invitations by the organization. It fosters and encourages debates on the campus. Beta is the only forensic fraternity that does not require inter-collegiate competition for membership.

Blue Key is an honor society that originated at the University of Florida in 1924 under the leadership of Major B. C. Riley, director of the General Extension Division. Its object is to serve the University and the state along similar lines to the rotary and alumni organizations, and its members are selected from students who show ability in leadership and service to others. Blue Key societies have been established in leading universities since its organization here.

Black and White is a senior honor society composed of members elected annually from leaders in all forms of sports and campus activities. Members must have secured letters or honor mention in at least two different activities as a qualification for election.

Phi Sigma is an honor society for advanced students in biological research. The chapter here was established last year. It is one of the strongest honorary fraternities on the campus.

Embard and Blad is a national military fraternity. The Florida chapter was established in 1920 and is labelled Company H, Second Regiment. Members are elected from the Junior and Senior students in the R. O. T. C.

Gamma Sigma Epsilon is the honorary chemical fraternity. Its members are those taking several chemistry courses, who have shown excellence in their work. Membership is limited to upperclassmen.

Kappa Delta Pi is an honorary teachers' fraternity. It has a standard in regard to scholarship among the Juniors and seniors of the Teachers' College.

Sigma Delta, honorary journalistic fraternity, has 200 members those men on the campus who have distinguished themselves in the field of writing. It has recently granted a charter of the Pi Delta Epsilon, a strong national journalistic fraternity. The installation will take place some time this year.

Sigma Delta Psi, athletic fraternity, is limited to those men who can pass certain physical tests. The requirements are very strict and the membership very small.

Sigma Tau, the honorary engineering fraternity, elects annually upperclassmen from that college to membership. A strict scholarship standard is maintained.

Phi Alpha Delta, a professional legal fraternity. The Florida chapter was named for United States Senator D. U. Fletcher.

Phi Delta Phi, legal fraternity's chapter here is labelled Cockrell in honor of Judge Cockrell of the Law College faculty.

Phi Kappa Phi is the highest honor fraternity that a man can attain at the University in the line of scholarship. It is a scholastic fraternity of national fame for all departments of University work and pledges only one fifth of the students with the highest average in the senior class of each college yearly.

Tau Kappa Alpha, honorary public speaking and debating fraternity, was installed here last year. Its requirements are very strict and the membership limited to those who have participated in at least one inter-collegiate forensics contest as a speaker.

The Pirates, Cotillon Club, Apache, Serpent and Theta Rho Societies are inter-fraternity social organizations which elect their members from the socially active members of the campus.

Storm Refugees Get \$5,800 in Seminole

Approximately \$5,800 in cash is the total in contributions to the relief funds for the victims of the hurricane and high waters in South Florida, according to reports furnished by the treasurers of the funds. This is for both Sanford and Seminole County.

The Red Cross chapter leads with a total of \$3,000. The American Legion post of Sanford, which solicited funds last week, was given \$2,000. The Moore Haven relief fund totaled \$1,800.

ROCKWOOD, Tenn., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Removal of three more bodies during the night brought to 12 the total number of dead in the explosion in the Rogers entry of Ross Iron Company mine here Monday.

The last two bodies brought to the surface were identified by articles of clothing as those of Jess Dale, C. B. Dixon and Walter Cunningham. The mangled condition of the bodies made positive identification impossible. Identification of one of the three bodies recovered late yesterday as Hector Smith was established last night. The other two were Frank Bowles and J. A. Treels.

Rescue workers pressed on today toward the scene of the explosion where it is believed 15 more victims remain and it was expected additional bodies would be removed from the mine today.

Sesqui-Centennial Is Flat Failure Asserts Mayor of Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The Sesqui-Centennial exposition is a financial failure, Mayor Kendrick said today.

It opened June 1, in celebration of the 150th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence and less than five million persons have passed through the gates, leaving the city to shoulder a big deficit.

"The financial failure of the exposition," said the mayor, "has been due, not to the management, but to the failure of the people to go there. While we should have had 25,000,000 people in attendance, we have had less than 5,000,000."

Et. L. Austin, director general, says that the exposition is running behind between \$25,000 and \$40,000 a week in operating expenses alone. Unpaid claims of contractors for construction and other work aggregate more than \$3,000,000.

95 HAVE SEATS IN LEGISLATURE FOR NEXT MEET

Re-apportionment Plan Calls For Only Ninety-One But New Counties Are Created

TALLHASSEE, Fla., Oct. 7.—(A) Although the re-apportionment made in the House of Representatives by the legislature of 1925 calls for ninety-one members, there will actually be ninety-five when the lawmaking body meets for its next regular session, in April, 1927.

This was disclosed here by H. Clay Crawford, secretary of state, who, after a recapitulation of the re-apportionment and added leg-islators, found that there will be four more members next year than the law calls for.

Mr. Crawford's discovery was made when he began the assign-ment of seats for members of the lower branch. After setting aside ninety-one desks for representa-tives included in the legislature's re-apportionment, he found that he had no seating facilities for those from Gulf, Marion, Indian River and Gilchrist counties.

During the last regular session, in addition to passing the reap-portionment measure, the lawmak-ers also adopted bills calling for the creation of Gulf, Indian River and Marion counties, with refer-ence to the legislature's re-apportionment. The bills were sub-sequently made legal when the people approved them at special elections.

It came the extraordinary ses-sion of the legislature last Novem-ber, and the creation of Gilchrist county.

Naturally, Mr. Crawford ex-plained, the four new counties did not get into the re-apportionment, because they were not actually created at the time.

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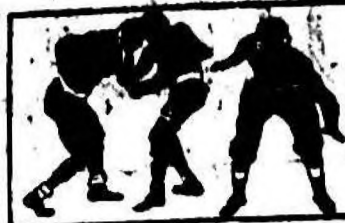

Cardinal Board Of Strategy Wants To Curb Ruth's Hitting

Fennock Will Occupy Mound for Yankees Today With Sherdel Due to Oppose Him

Alexander May Get The Call

Babe Breaks Many Records in Attack On Card Pitchers

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The Cardinals today were in conference to devise ways and means, if any, to curb the home run activities of George Herman Ruth. As preparations went forward for the fifth and last game of the World's Series in St. Louis, the big bat of the slugging Ruth was regarded as a distinct menace to St. Louis' supremacy in baseball.

The home run situation was entirely out of control in the fourth game of the series when Ruth thrice hit for the circuit and so inspired his mates that a 10 to 5 Yankee victory made the series all over again.

Ruth's record-breaking series of long distance blows drew unstinted applause from the greatest crowd ever assembled in St. Louis baseball park. The paid attendance was 38,825. Many of the spectators came to scoff and remained to cheer. The player with baseball's greatest punch was formally inducted into the Order of the Ritzberry before the game but the crowd paid tribute to the greatness when he swung how far the science of home run hitting can be developed and lauded at Hallinan when he walked the Babe on four straight balls in the eighth.

The crowd had properly reached a conclusion that the game was lost to the Cardinals anyway and since one home run more, meant nothing in an affair like yesterday, seemed to hope that Ruth would give future generations something to shoot for by lifting another pitch out of the park. The fifth game was promised fair weather and rising temperature. The winning of yesterday's game and the fair weather gave confidence to the Yankees and also put much faith in the predictions of the Weather Bureau.

Hafey and Douthit, who did a tumbling act in the fourth inning, completed a recovery that was begun soon after their collision for both distinguished themselves later in a game which developed few Cardinal features. Each hit safely and Douthit threw out a runner at the plate.

For pitching chores today Manager Hornsby and Manager Hugobins were expected to turn back to the page of the scorebook showing the opening game of the series when Herb Pennock downed Wilie Sherdel, 2 to 1. There was a possibility that Hornsby at the last minute might call on Grover Alexander but Sherdel was regarded as the more likely nominee with Alexander saved for service at the Yankee Stadium Saturday.

Sherdel has a slow curve and one a bit slower. And while experts agree his curves can be hit into the rightfield stands, they said such a feat is not easy. Pennock is rated among the best of American League pitchers and held the Cardinals to three hits in the opening game of the series.

Yesterday's result drew the loudest cheers from representatives of railroads under tentative contract to transport both ball clubs and others interested in the current play back New York to close the baseball file for the year. Special trains were scheduled to leave immediately after today's game to reach New York early evening.

The fourth game resulted in merit badges for Babe Ruth and demerits for the Cardinal pitchers. St. Louis introduced five tenants in the pitcher's box for brief periods and four of them distributed ten bases on balls.

Wainhart was generous. He went into the game in the fifth inning after Rhem had retired under fire, although technically moving out to make room for a pinch batsman to hit a sacrifice fly. The left-hander passed Combs, and permitted Combs to drop a two-run home run, converted into a two-run hit by way of an unintentional kick from Hornsby and a mud puddle.

High Schools Must Turn In Eligibility Lists Before Games

Eligibility lists of High School football players must be exchanged before every game, the Florida High School Athletic Association has ruled, according to a communication received by the Sanford High School authorities. The game will not be officiated unless the lists are not exchanged the association's executive committee declared.

Any school found guilty of allowing a teacher or a coach to change or pad a list will, upon conviction, be dropped from membership in the association until the offender is removed from the faculty, according to the regulation on eligibility lists.

"The primary purpose of high school athletics is not to win the game," the communication said, "but to foster a better school spirit, to create higher ideals of good sportsmanship and fair dealing in organized business, and to promote moral courage and character."

Influences outside of the school must not be permitted to dictate policy, the executive committee has ruled, "or in any way to interfere with the management of athletics of any high school belonging to the association."

Principals should advise coaches of their responsibility as to the conduct of players, the committee said. "They should be urged to make their conduct at all times a credit to the school and to the sport." The letter said.

HANKOW, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The rescue launches and several lighters have succeeded in bringing 12,000 women and children to this city from the neighboring city of Wuchang where northern and southern Chinese troops are at death grips. The rescue was effected Sunday and Monday after a previous attempt had failed when the ships were fired on and forced to return, although opposing forces had previously agreed to the rescue.

The northern troops who are holding Wuchang against the besieging Cantonese have permitted the fleeing Chinese to leave the city in a rush, holding the better classes in their city.

Some charitable organizations are caring for the rescued who relate appealing stories of conditions caused by Wu Chang. Tree roots and leaves had already been eaten along with cats, dogs, and rats.

Bucky Harris Gets Married



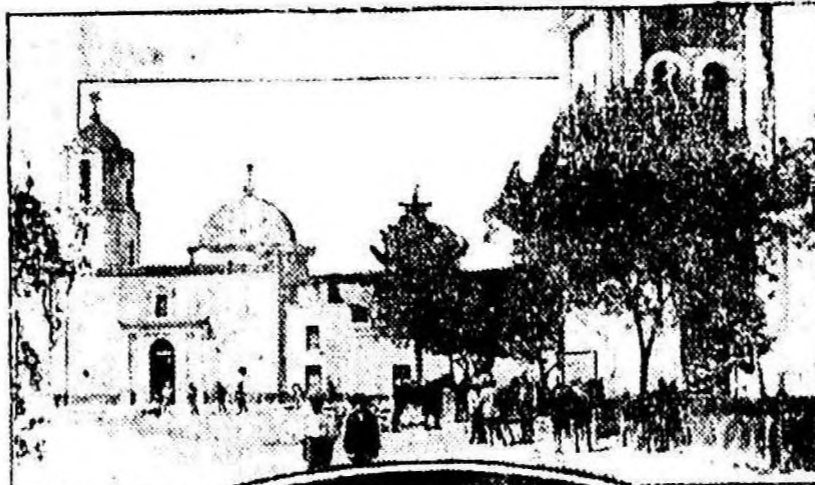

It'll Wave



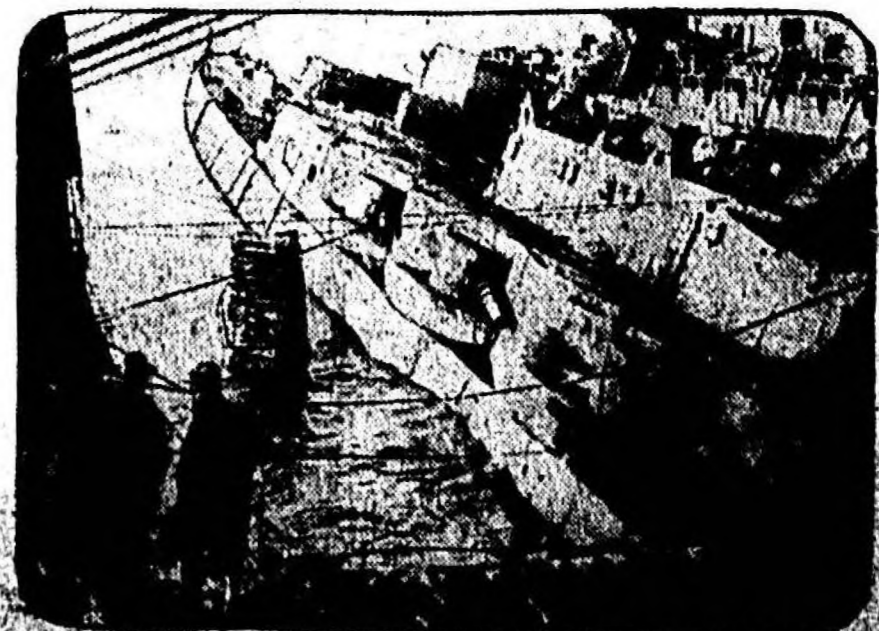
