TALLAHASSEF, Fla., Oct. 7 .--P) Although the re-apportionneut made in the House of Repesentatives by the legislature of 1925 calls for unety-one members. there will actually be ninety-five when the lawmaking body meets for its next regular session, in April, 1927.






