



Made Possible by Act Passed at Last Session of Legislature

TAMPA, June 20,—This city's po-lice department may retire after 20 years of continuous service with half pay. The system was made possible by the passage of an act by the recent salary for the three years preceding department and their widows.

A fund for the operation of the plan

will be rearranged in the light of needs at that time. The system will be administered by a board of trustees composed of the mayor-commissioner, tax collector and comptroller. In addition to being eligible for a pension after 20 years service a member will also receive one upon reaching the age of 65 years. Pensioners will not be prevented from accepting other employment but if their income from this source together with the pension totals more than \$150 per month, the




