## Giant Steamer Leviathan All Ready For Her Big Trip

### SUCCESSFULLY FLOATED FROM BOSTON DRY DOCK YESTERDAY.

BOSTON, June 19.—The reconditioned liner Leviathan in Boston lower harbor, is in readiness to sail for southern waters on her trial trip. The first detachment of the six hundred guests who will accompany the refitted steamship on her initial voyage were taken to the lower harbor on a smaller boat last night. Others were expected to board her today.

The great ship was successfully floated from the navy dry docks in South Boston yesterday.

The mammoth liner's entrance into the dry dock a month ago to be cleaned, painted and refinished, the closing details of her \$8,000,000 reconditioning.

Commander A. J. Chanty, U. S. N., and Capt. Walter J. Bernard, representing the Shipping Board, directed the task of refloating the steamship. They were assisted by 250 men handling the huge mooring lines.

Fifteen tugs shoved the big liner about when she reached open water. When her prow pointed toward Broad Sound, the flotilla of tugs cast off, shrilling farewell, and other craft in the harbor took up the chorus. The deep throated whistle of the Leviathan responded. As she steamed down the harbor to her anchorage the new "Queen of the Seas" was cheered by hundreds on the pier, harbor island and excursion boats, holidaying in memory of Bunker Hill.

Returning from her trial run, the Leviathan is scheduled to reach New York next Sunday afternoon, sailing for Southampton July 4 on her initial voyage in the service of the United States lines.

Nothing was known here of any steps to interfere with the Leviathan's program.

The Leviathan, the world's largest liner, rebuilt and refurnished at a cost of \$8,000,000, is ready with steam up to sail on her trial trip in the neighborhood of Bermuda today. With flags flying and whistles blowing the great ship will steam down the harbor carrying the guests of the United States Shipping Board, on one of the most luxurious trips ever made.

On her return she will go into the regular trans-Atlantic trade, starting July 4 from New York to Cherbourg and Southampton. Six days will be taken for a crossing, and a round trip will be made every three weeks. Accommodations for the 3,400 passengers will cost from \$5,000 for the so-called royal suite, down to \$90 or \$100 for the third class. First class will be from \$275 up and second from \$140 up.

The liner, which lay rusting away for two years after the service as a transport, when it carried 200,000 doughboys across the Atlantic, is now furnished, in a style surpassing that of the most sumptuous hotel. Designers, interior decorators, architects, and artists have done their utmost to make the former Vaterland so delightful that passengers will forget or forgive the fact that she carries no bar.

"Opportunity to urge upon the business world the importance of adopting service as the basis of all professions and trades, is distinctly Rotary's. Rotary's peculiar formation, one representative of each profession and each line of trade, makes it pre-eminently the best organization with which to effect the purpose. It is a large order.

"The advent of Rotary marked an era when the long suppressed yearnings of business men for opportunity to share in spiritual leadership began to find realization. It has been a period of wonderful progress because business men have made idealism practicable.

"No worthy object can be gained without effort and the more seriously we view our undertaking, the more certain our accomplishment."

DRIVES—DRIVES—DRIVES.

Slowly, laboriously and painfully the baseball drive continues on its way for money enough to keep St. Petersburg's franchise in the state league and to enable the St. Petersburg team to finish the last half of the season.

Perhaps, then, it is because they haven't been driven often enough and hard enough. Yes, it must be that. So, President Harold, keep on with the baseball drive. We must have baseball, and baseball must have the money, and St. Petersburg has the money. Give the people no rest until the fund is raised. Hunt them down without mercy.

And then—if they shall have been punished enough—let us all—some time before another year shall begin—get together for the common sense method of one big drive for the whole year, and put it over.

Let St. Petersburg follow the example of bigger and more progressive cities, and make it—"One Appeal, One Campaign, Once a Year"—St. Petersburg Times.

Opening of Paved Highway From Lake City to Jacksonville

(By The Associated Press) LAKE CITY, June 20.—Plans for a gathering of road enthusiasts here July 12 to celebrate the opening of the paved highway from this city to Jacksonville, have been completed. Jacksonville and towns intermediate along the route plan to come here in whole-souled fashion while assurances of support have been received from civic organizations of towns as far west as Tallahassee and from towns to the south. A picnic of the quality and proportions that tickle the palate of the healthiest is promised. There will be speeches and other marks of enthusiasm.

There is no doubt but that the celebration will mark the formal opening of a stretch to delight the motorist's eye. It will be a shining streak all the way from here to Jacksonville, and, and about 45 miles of it. It hasn't been so very long that the route was paved to Baldwin, then it was lengthened to near MacClenny, the latter part of last year. From MacClenny to the Columbia county line has been the last undertaking and the cause of all the crowing now. It eliminates the low-gear sands of Sanderson that used to make the engines sweat. The engineers describe it as one of the prettiest stretches in the state. It is one of the heaviest travelled. The tourists coming into the state from Valdosta and headed for the east coast turn at Lake City, for the most part and go into Jacksonville to get on the east coast highway. Entering the state through Jacksonville the route is popular for those headed for Gainesville, Orlando, Tampa and all intermediate points.

### Chaplin's Brother Appears in "The Pilgrim"

Sydney Chaplin will be seen in a role of importance in "The Pilgrim," the latest First National comedy production of his inimitable brother, Charlie Chaplin, at the Princess today and tomorrow.

Sydney plays the part of a husband and father, who takes his wife and mischievous young son to the home in the Texas town where welcoming festivities for the new parson are under way.

This family man has no more suspicion of the fact that the "parson" is actually a fugitive from justice than many of the others, and so he proceeds to get in solid with the new "minister" by letting his young son generally mistreat everyone, including the man of the cloth.

Things come to a climax, however, when this ordinarily docile parent discovers that his missing hat has in some manner gotten mixed up with the plum pudding and that the "parson" is eating it.

### ANOTHER ATTEMPT MADE TO SAVE LIFE OF DELAND RAPIST

(By The Associated Press) TALLAHASSEE, June 20.—The supreme court yesterday heard oral argument on the extraordinary procedure taken in an effort to save the life of Aubrey Lee Nichols, the youngster who more than a year ago pleaded guilty to attacking a woman in DeLand, and was sentenced to hang by Circuit Judge Perkins. Nichols has twice been taken from the shadows of the noose by respites.

Nichols confessed to having entered the woman's home one afternoon under the guise of a plumber and mistreated her. He was arrested several weeks afterwards in Jacksonville on another charge but made known that he was wanted in DeLand for the attack. When taken there for trial, he insisted on pleading guilty. Under state law the court had to sentence him to death.

Subsequently certain Jacksonville citizens became interested in his case, while he was held there for safe keeping, and through their efforts, Governor Hardee had him examined for his sanity. When he was declared sane and after the court had once more denied him a new trial, his counsel invoked an ancient proceeding, writ or noram cobic, which was argued yesterday.

Attorney Hunch agreed that the boy was prompted to plead guilty through fear of mob violence and set forth that new evidence had been discovered which would greatly entitle him to a new trial.

State's Attorney DeCottes contested such a proceeding at this late day, after which he said, that the boy had repeatedly confessed the crime and because the new evidence was unsubstantiated. He denied that there was any atmosphere of mob violence during Nichols' brief trial, but in answer to questions from the bench, stated that he had requested that Nichols be held in Jacksonville after his arrest and following his sentence merely as a precaution.

### SEVEN DIE FROM HEAT IN CHICAGO

MANY PROSTRATED IN THE SIZZLING SECTIONS OF THE COUNTRY

CHICAGO, June 20.—Scant relief was in prospect today from the hot weather in many southwestern, east central and gulf states. Official forecasts as a whole predicted generally unsettled weather with little change in temperature. The heat wave descended early Monday, taking a toll of death and prostrations. It had been forming for some time, the weather bureau reported, over the Central and Southern part of the United States, and is here to stay for a while.

In Chicago, seven deaths were attributed indirectly to the heat. Numbers of persons were prostrated and thousands were driven to the bathing beaches by a record 91 degree temperature. Violent thunderstorms in Minnesota and Wisconsin failed to minimize the sizzling heat. One man was killed during a thunderstorm at Madison, Wis. The maximum temperature at St. Paul, Minn., was 84. At St. Louis there was one death from the heat.

The hottest points in the United States were El Paso, Texas, and Prescott, Ariz., both of which reported high temperatures of 96. Temperatures of 90 degrees and above were common and there were few cities which escaped without experiencing 80 and higher. The east also got its portion of hot weather, Parkersburg, W. Va., Philadelphia and Pittsburgh and Raleigh, N. C., recording 90 degrees or more. The Pacific coast and mountain section experienced no discomfort.

### CRAZED WOMAN KILLS CHILDREN WITH RAZOR

OWNESBORO, Ky., June 20.—After having attacked and seriously wounded her husband, Mrs. Cleveland Daugherty killed her two daughters, three and five years, with a razor and drank poison at her home near Glendale, in Breckinridge county, according to reports received here. She will recover.

Mrs. Daugherty, apparently having become suddenly crazed, first attacked her husband with a razor. He was slashed in the neck but succeeded in disarming his wife and then went to the home of a neighbor for help, according to details of the tragedy received here.

The woman obtained a second razor, killed the children and when her husband returned was found to be suffering from effects of poison.

Mrs. Daugherty, who was 25 years old and had been married for six years, was unconscious at her home last night and without medical attention, it was said. Daugherty is a farmer and the home is in an isolated section.

### PLANNING TO FIGHT BOOZE-RUNNERS FORMATION OF BIG AIR FLEET LIKELY AFTER JULY FIRST

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Mobilization of a big fleet of seaplanes to battle rum smugglers of the Atlantic coast will be the government's next step in the war on rum, it was learned officially Tuesday.

The president and his cabinet, it is known, favor such an expedient as less expensive and perhaps more effective than other means which have been suggested in recent parleys over the smuggling problem.

The plan may be put into practical operation soon after the new fiscal year begins July 1. At that time Commissioner Roy A. Haynes, head of the government's rum fighting forces, will have a large lump sum appropriation upon which to draw for "emergency" purposes. If this is not sufficient, officials are in favor of doing everything needed to equip a powerful air fleet, and let congress later make up any deficiency incurred.

Balked at use of the U. S. navy, and disappointed over the inability of the coast guard to cope with the smugglers, prohibition officials said the air fleet scheme was the "best bet." It was at first considered as a means of dealing only with the situation in New York and New Jersey waters. But as the merits of the scheme were further weighed it was considered most feasible of any suggestion yet made to drive liquor smugglers off their bases all along the entire Atlantic coast line.

### FEDERATION FLORIDA GROWERS

By W. E. BOLLES, of Oldsmar

Efforts are being made to form a federation of all the associations of growers and farmers in Florida, except the citrus growers, who already have their strong Florida Citrus Exchange. If the vegetable and strawberry and watermelon growers of Plant City, Sanford, Manatee county, Hastings, Wauchula, Center Hill, Webster, Miami, Fort Lauderdale, Ft. Myers, Oldsmar, Sumter, West Palm Beach, Moore Haven and other districts can be united in one strong federation, it seems certain that mutual benefits would be secured.

I returned from the mass meeting held by the Plant City Growers' Association at Hopewell June 14th, with the impression that the thing can be done, provided the federation does not attempt too much at the start. Each of the local or county associations has arrived a titts present efficiency through long periods of struggles and overcoming difficulties, and the success which they have achieved will not be surrendered. Their marketing organizations have been built up by hard work and hard knocks, and they have gradually found out where to ship to get the prices and get the money.

No one is asking any of them to give up anything. Each town, city or county growers' association can go right along as it is going now, taking care of its grades and packs and sales. It is recognized that the local associations can do things for their members which the state federation of associations could not do.

The first thing is to organize the federation, with a board of directors chosen by the local organizations on the basis of representation of one director for every fifty members. Any association with fifty members, or less, would be entitled to only one director, while the large associations would have correspondingly more voting power in the state federation. This would be fair and square for all.

If the Florida growers can get together in some such manner as this, and organize a federatio anywhere near as strong as the Florida Cattle Raisers' Association, we also will have an opportunity to get helpful legislation at Tallahassee, get railroad rates adjusted, get proper refrigerator car service, get a standard for all kinds of packs, and help make the name of Florida synonymous for good goods. A central information bureau could distribute information about the market conditions and prices, and save the duplication of this work by all the local associations, and save big sums of money, besides doing the work better. It is proposed to put experienced men in charge of this bureau, like the men who have done this sort of work so successfully for the locals.

As long as each district is competing with the other districts, blindly and ferociously, each district is helping to defeat the other district, beat down prices, glut one or more markets, and bring lower prices or losses at times on account of the lack of co-operation between the various shipping centers, when the same goods would have brought handsome profits, if they had been intelligently distributed.

We all can get reports that a certain big city up north needs cukes or peppers or tomatoes. Then if two or three Florida shipping centers hop to it and each shoots a carload or half a dozen carloads to that market, then the supply exceeds the demand, and what was a bare market with a chance for high prices is immediately changed to a glutted market with prices all shot to pieces by the Florida shippers themselves. This comes from a lack of intelligent distribution of our crops. I am glad to say it does not happen often, but it comes frequently enough to cause troubles and losses which should have been handsome profits.

The men who know most about this business are the men who have been at it for years, who have fought through the difficulties, and have achieved success. It seems to me, if they can get together, a few men from each association, and talk the general situation

will be rearranged in the light of needs at that time. The system will be administered by a board of trustees composed of the mayor-commissioner, tax collector and comptroller. In addition to being eligible for a pension after 20 years service a member will also receive one upon reaching the age of 65 years. Pensioners will not be prevented from accepting other employment but if their income from this source together with the pension totals more than \$150 per month, the pension will be discontinued.

Widows and dependents of members of the department will receive one-half of what the member would have received upon retirement, but in case of a widow if she has any children under 16 years of age, she will receive the full amount of the pension, the whole to be discontinued upon her remarriage. Her children, however, in this event or in the event of her death would receive \$15 a month until they became 16 years old. Other provisions of the measure call for compulsory retirement of an officer disabled or incapacitated in line of duty.

Four members of the department are now approaching the length of service to entitle them to benefits under the act. None is eligible at present.
