Sanford Marina attracts cruise line

SANFORD — City Commissioners will decide Monday whether to allow a cruise line to dock overnight at the Sanford Marina during February and March.

The company, American Cruise Lines Inc., operates one- and two-week scenic cruises along the eastern seaboard. It wants to make Sanford the third stop on a

7-day cruise that would include St. Marys, Ga., Fernandina Beach, Green Cove Springs and St. Augustine.

The ships carry a maximum of 49 guests and rates run from \$2,520 to \$3,430 for the cruise, which includes three meals

per day. "Most of our passengers are retired, though not all of them," said Tim Beebe, marketing director of the company. "They are well traveled and usually have been on cruises before."

American Cruise Lines wants to dock at the pier on the western side of Memorial Park and is asking for a hook-up to city water and trash collection.

"The ship is self-contained, and we don't need a lot of service," Beebe said. The water hook-up would be to top off the ship's water supply, he added, and trash collection would be an added convenience.

Meals on Wheels at Christmas

More than 200 attend annual event

LONGWOOD — More than 200 senior citizens gathered Friday in St. Stephen Lutheran Church to celebrate the holidays.

The annual Meals on Wheels Etc., Christmas event attracted participants from all seven sites of the organization's Congregate Meals program. Party-goers were treated to a turkey dinner, entertainment, presents and prizes during the festivities.

"During the holidays, many of these people don't have the opportunity to go to parties," Meals on Wheels Etc. Executive Director Sherry Fincher said. "So, this is their party."

Each week, the Congregate Meals program provides free meals, transportation and other services to more than 250 senior citizens. At the numerous sites throughout the county, including St. Stephen Lutheran Church, recreational activities, informative speakers and nutritional information is provided during the noonday meal.

"Many people in the program would otherwise sit at home and not eat well if we did not provide this service,"

Fincher said. "Besides offering them meals, we take them to the grocery store and to medical centers.

"If we were not here, many would have to go to nursing homes prematurely," she said.

Meals on Wheels Etc. has provided numerous services, including the Congregate Meals program, to the area's senior citizens for the past 27

years. According to Fincher, the average age of participants in the program is 84.

Currently, there is a waiting list at many of the Congregate Meal sites. However, Fincher said there are still open spots at several of the sites and encourages people interested in participating to call Meals on Wheels Etc..

"We only have so many

vans and so much funding," she said. "Unless we have funding from the community, we do have to cut our services."

Meals on Wheels receives funding from the United Way, Seminole County and the Older Americans Act. Three area municipalities, including

County ponders mosquito program

SANFORD — County commissioners could take the first steps Tuesday in securing the first permanent mosquito control program for unincorporated Seminole residents.

With a flurry of West Nile Virus medical alerts across the state, the county contracted for approximately three months of truck spraying this year to reduce the number of pests. Eleven human cases of West Nile were reported in the state with 55 of the 67 counties on medical alert for the virus.

A county staff presentation Tuesday will furnish commissioners with several options for developing an in-house, year-round mosquito control program. The three proposed mosquito programs range in price from \$460,000 to \$900,000.

Commissioners could also decide Tuesday to establish a mosquito control Municipal Service Taxing Unit to fund the program. If approved, a public hearing could be scheduled for Jan. 8 for the special taxing district.

Of the 54 mosquito control

Commissioner says road standards for level of service don't make the grade

This is the second in a series of articles that will look at development projects in Sanford — what's coming in, where it's going and what effects it may have on the community.

SANFORD — In a motorist's utopia, the lights are always green and traffic is nonexistent. In reality, stop lights and congestion are a way of life, particularly if you drive in Central Florida.

As more development moves into Sanford along State Road 46 and Rinehart Road, city planners will be charged with ensuring traffic congestion doesn't exceed the capacity of those roads. But how much traffic is too much?

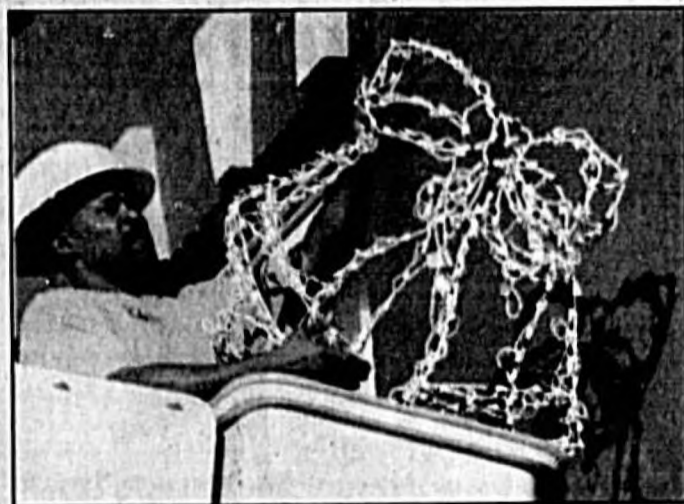
The Institute of Transportation Engineers created the Transportation and Traffic Engineering Handbook which establishes six classifications of service from 'A' to 'F'. An 'A' level of service is an ideal condition where "vehicles are completely

unimpeded." An 'F' level of service indicates traffic exceeds the road's capacity and "traffic flow has generally come to a stop but will have slight, but inconsistent movement." So what's the level of service planners aim for when designing roads?

Believe it or not it's 'D', and that concerns Sanford City Commissioner Art Woodruff, a high school physics teacher who doesn't think a 'D' is acceptable

83-year-old Sanford woman shot during home invasion

SANFORD — An 83-year-old Sanford woman was shot twice with her own gun Tuesday while trying to defend her home from a potential robber.

Minnie Dorsey of 1105 Willow Ave. was released Thursday from the Orlando Regional Medical Center with wounds to the left side of her forehead and right hand.

The incident occurred at approximately 9:30 p.m., when a black male entered through the rear porch stating "gimme your bags." In an effort to run the

intruder off, Dorsey grabbed her handgun. A struggle ensued between the two with her attacker eventually gaining control of the gun. The suspect shot several times hitting the woman once in the right thumb and again grazing her head just above the left eye.

"The constitution gives us the right to bear arms to protect ourselves," said Cleo Cohen, Sanford police spokeswoman. "People need to realize the same gun that defends you — if it ends up in the hand of perpetrator — could also be used to kill

Elderly man robs Lake Mary bank

HEATHROW — Police believe a white elderly man who used a stolen bank card at a Heathrow bank three months ago returned to the same branch Wednesday as an armed robber.

At approximately noon, a man believed to be between 55 and 65 years old robbed the CNL Bank on International Parkway and Lake Mary Boulevard. The suspect reportedly approached a bank employee, produced a handgun and demanded money. Carrying a briefcase, the man got away with an undisclosed amount of cash. Witnesses describe the suspect as approximately six feet tall, 200 pounds and sporting a mustache and ball cap.

Investigators matched bank witnesses' descriptions to an Aug. 30 armed robbery at the

Bonus Dollar Store in Fern Park. A store clerk was held up by a

striking similar elderly man who also toted a handgun. The clerk was locked in the bathroom and her purse stolen. About 40 minutes later, the suspect's image was captured at the Heathrow bank as he was using the store clerk's ATM card.

"The investigator noticed similarities between the cases right away," said Steve Olson, Seminole County Sheriff's Office

spokesman. "He showed the picture to the witnesses and they said 'My God that's him.'"

Despite a lot of "coincidences" between the two armed robberies, the sheriff's office is still seeking the elderly suspect. Anybody with information is asked to call Crime Line at 1-800-423-8477.

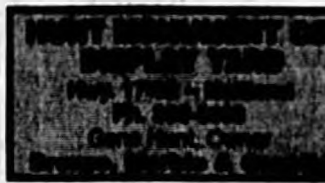

Remembering the past only makes us stronger as a nation

You would have to talk to someone over the age of 65, even much older, in order to get a first-hand report on the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. I am of that advanced age, and for the benefit of those who aren't, this is my recollection.

I remember being on the living room floor, in front of the radio, listening to who knows what, when an announcer broke in to make the announcement. Being 9 years old, I hadn't any idea of where Pearl Harbor, much less the Philippines, was located. All I knew was that the announcer said they were attacking Americans on an American Naval base.

I dove for my encyclopedia and found it right away. Just like people of today, we all remember where we were and what we were doing on Sept. 11 of this year. Likewise, most of us remember the where and what of the assassination of John F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King Jr., the death of Elvis, and perhaps a few other shocking occasions.

I can remember them all — and knowing the lump Dec. 7 left in my stomach, I knew each of the other ones were disasters history would not forget. What I would like you readers to do is find someone over the age of 65 and ask them about Pearl Harbor. The older the better — and the more they will probably remember.

A friend of mine from Orlando, Con Hilchuck, was in one of the barracks at Pearl Harbor on that terrible day. He told me he heard explosions, looked out the window and saw bombs and strafing, then ducked under his cot and stayed there for several hours before getting up and going to his duty station.

"I was never more frightened in my life," he told me. "It took several hours before I realized what had happened, then my responsibility as a military man returned and I went about my work as did my buddies."

Even though he hid under his bed, rather than rushing outside and grabbing a machine gun, I have always considered Con a hero. I believe all of us would have been frightened like he was, not expecting what was happening.

The same holds true for the World Trade Center. Not everyone was a hero in the first few minutes — but once shock wears off, we do what needs to be done no matter what the consequences may be. The number of people who were at Pearl Harbor in 1941 are dwindling in number, as are those of us who were younger but still remembering that fateful day. Find one of these people and ask them about Pearl Harbor.

Just like what the World Trade Center and Pentagon explosions did to this nation in September of this year, you will find Pearl Harbor instilled patriotism unexcelled until the present time.

The old phrase is "Remember Pearl Harbor." Those of us who do will never forget it and those of us who lived in the Sept. 11 tragedy won't forget that either. Both of them make us stronger Americans more in love with our own nation. And, if we keep the memories alive, it will make our nation and everyone in it better.

Today's profiles in courage and convictions

In the days after the signing of the Camp David Accords between Egypt and Israel in 1979, a New York lawyer asked Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, "What will happen now?"

"I foresee being killed," said Sadat, pronouncing the last word "kil-LID." The lawyer, named Mort Janklow, who handled literary work in that part of the world, flinched and Sadat smiled and repeated himself: "Yes, I will be killed. That is the price." The Egyptian, who had been an ineffective warrior, the general who led a disastrous (to his own cause) attack on Israel across the Suez Canal in 1973, pointed across the room at a shorter, heavier man, an Air Force general named Hosni Mubarak, and said, "Then it will be his turn."

Sadat, the soldier turned peacemaker, was killed in 1981 by his own people, members of a terrorist group calling itself the Muslim Brotherhood, which one day would become part of the infrastructure of al-Qaida.

He was a man of courage, a quality essential to the most real

and difficult task of political leadership, making peace when war is the full-time work and life of so many.

This is not the elegant courage defined by Ernest Hemingway as grace under pressure. It is the simpler version defined in Webster's Unabridged: "the quality of mind or spirit that enables one to face difficulty, danger, pain, etc. with firmness and without fear."

The fear is real, and the road to peace is littered with real victims, some known, some forever unknown. The best man on the Israeli side, another former general, Yitzhak Rabin, was also shot down by his own people after trying to make peace in 1995.

It is the way in that part of the world. I remember my surprise when I first saw Jerusalem and realized that the Western Wall, the sacred wailing wall of the Jews, was essentially part of the foundation of the man-made plateau of the Dome of the Rock, the Muslim holy site, and that the Via Dolorosa, the path of the crucifixion of Christ, passed close to both places. Everything, the most important sto-

ries in the world, the told and retold stories that define much of our civilization, happened over the centuries within a few hundred yards of each other in a small city in the desert.

It all reminded me of "West Side Story," a turf war with sacred music and chants.

The turf war continues. One side is led by a man I consider a thug and worse, Israel's Ariel Sharon, a man who seems to want war and has, I am sure, the courage to die for his vision. The other leader, the Palestinians' Yasser Arafat, once a terrorist by trade, perhaps still one, seems to lack the essential courage to lead. He also seems afraid he will be killed by his own worst people if peace is at hand.

So that war will continue; words will not stop it because the men in charge are unwilling or incapable to say the right words and pay the price. Most of the blame, I suppose, is deserved by Arafat, who keeps changing the words to satisfy the men who would kill him if they lost their capability to find young men willing to blow themselves up to kill an Israeli or two.

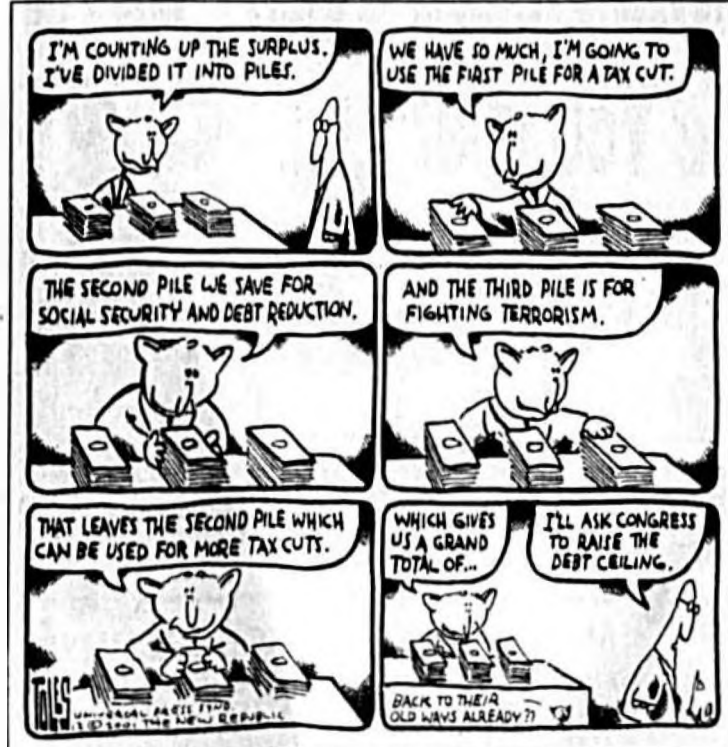
There are, in Webster and in life, lesser definitions of courage than the willingness to die. "Courage of

convictions" is another, defined in the dictionary as: "to act in accordance with one's beliefs, especially in spite of criticism." Our own history, that of the United States, tells us that such moral courage, or "integrity" or "guts," is essential to the leadership of our great democracy.

I always thought that John F. Kennedy talked too much — and in too macho a way — about courage and exaggerated when he said it was the most important of virtues, because all the rest were impossible without it. But I have found myself wondering about that in contemplating the extraordinary political pulling power of George W. Bush, an unimpressive potential president by most relevant standards, as compared with that of his more talented predecessor, Bill Clinton.

Looking now, though, at the kind of leadership needed abroad and at home, Americans seem to want courage above all and are concluding that whatever his other failings, President Bush is a man of courage who believes in what he is saying and is willing to face the consequences of his own uncompleted convictions.

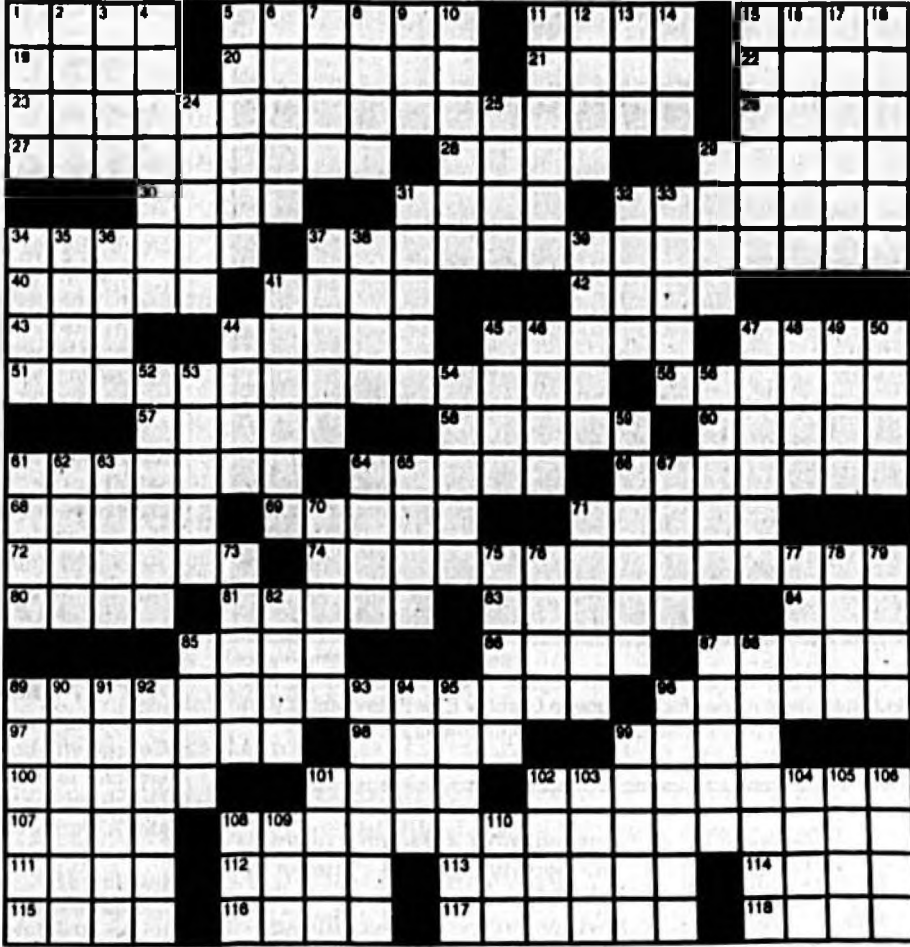

The Way We Were: Sallie Harrison DAR

Today we continue the history of Sallie Harrison Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, which was organized May 1918.

In May 1919, Brenda deVere Morrison made a motion "that a committee of four be appointed to consider a memorial for the soldiers of the recent World War." This was approved and fund raising was begun immediately. In the regent's report that year, Mrs. Starling had stated "Our treasury, like Mother Hubbard's cupboard, we gave a card party." Card parties, along with rummage sales, were the preferred money making projects for many years. By March of 1920, the chapter had decided on a Marble Arch as a War Memorial.

There is a note in the minutes of the November 1920 chapter meeting stating that the ladies planned to place an evergreen wreath on the monument in Fifth Street Park on Christmas morning in memory of the eight boys from Seminole County who had died in the war.

To find out more about this monument, since it is not in the park, Mrs. Boyd referred to Peter Schaal's book "Sanford as I Knew It" where she found that a marble shaft, donated by Frank Miller, had been erected in the Fifth Street Park as a memorial for the men who had fought in World War I. More than 1,600 people were on hand when it was unveiled on Feb. 16, 1919. It was the first such monument erected in Florida.

A conversation with George Mayberry, commander of Campbell Lossing Post # 53 of the American Legion, revealed that the monument had at one time stood near the Legion Hut on the lakefront, had been moved to the Legion building on U.S. Highway 17/92 and now stands in front of the present Legion Hall at 2870 Sanford Avenue.

Back to Sallie Harrison Chapter's project of a marble arch. In October 1919, the organization asked Mr. Forrest Lake to be chairman of the Men's Committee to raise funds. Mr. Lake accepted the appointment and "very graciously announced that the men would obtain the money, giving the Daughters the unusual privilege of staying at home."

As time went on, conversations with the "Legion Boys," as the minutes refer to them, indicated that they would greatly prefer the building of a home or recreation house for the Post rather than a marble arch.

A resolution was passed by the chapter stating: Resolved: To help build a genuine home which will last during the lifetime of each and every member, and which the Daughters hope may be used in the same way by their sons after them; Resolved further: That the Daughters wish to emphasize that this gift is as free as air, that they reserve no rights or interests; that they make no claims and ask no privileges.

Over the next several years, fundraising for the Memorial

Fund included a ball on June 14, 1921; subscription bridge in 1924; a "Society Vaudeville" starring actors who were wintering in Florida, and a bridge luncheon which included an exhibit of antiques at the Forrest Lake Hotel (Tickets \$2).

The chapter was greatly concerned when the Legion Boys built a log cabin on the lakefront in 1924, stating that a stately handsome home preferably of lasting stone had been their intent, and they feared the log building would not endure. That log cabin is still there!

Other philanthropic activities included donations to the School Board to help pay for school lunches, sewing layettes for European and Chinese babies and hemming dresses and tray scarves for the Sanford Hospital. These sewing projects were often completed during chapter meetings.

While contributing to the needs of Seminole County citizens, the chapter did not forget that its members were first members of the National Society, and with this in mind, they spent considerable time and money in support of National and State goals.

One of the goals of the National Society has always been the marking of historic spots. On the national level, the hope in 1922 was for a modern road crossing the United States following the pioneer trails, with a statue of a pioneer mother and her children erected in each state through which the highway passed. This was finally accom-

plished in April 1929.

In Florida, the goal was to mark the site of Jean Ribault's landing on the Atlantic Coast between St. Augustine and Jacksonville. This is the location of the first settlement of French Huguenots in America, in 1562. Sallie Harrison contributed its share toward the project. They involved the entire community, including school children who donated their pennies.

Mrs. J.N. Whitner was the chapter's first chairman of the Old Trails Committee. In 1920, she reported that a search was underway to locate the deed to the cemetery at Fort Reed. However, the earliest marker placed by the chapter was the one at Mellonville Avenue and Second Street, commemorating the site of Fort Mellon. The plot of land where it is located was donated by Harry Bodwell, developer of the Mayfair subdivision. He and Forrest Lake agreed to donate the bronze tablet, but the boulder was to be provided by the Sallie Harrison chapter. It was hoped that a Florida rock could be used, but none was found to be suitable.

A granite stone was ordered in March 1925 at a cost of \$115. It was finally in place by April and the unveiling was set for May 15, 1925. The ceremony was impressive. The municipal band played martial music; invocation was by Dr. E.D. Brownlee, pastor of First Presbyterian; an historical sketch of Fort Mellon, written by Mrs. Whitner, was read by G.W.

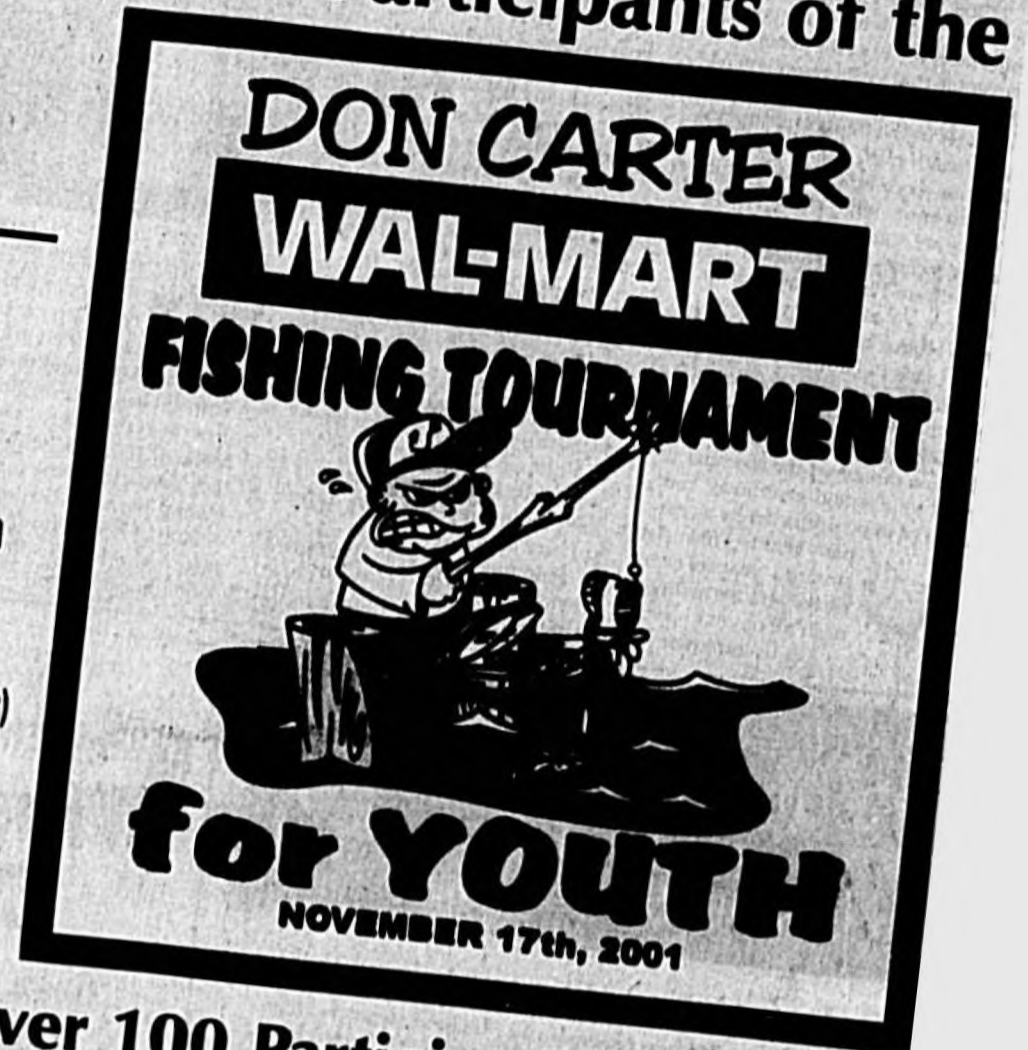

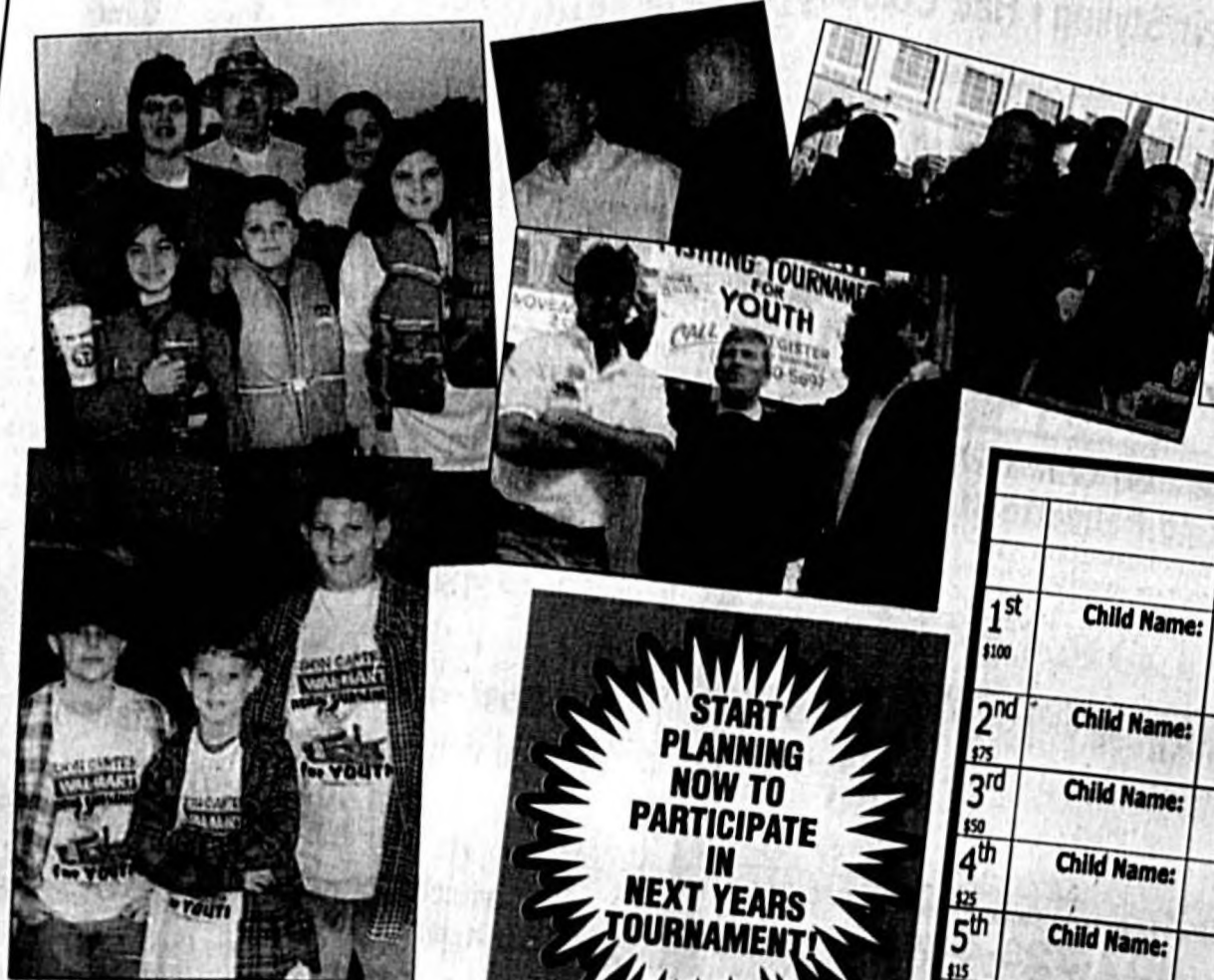
DON CARTER

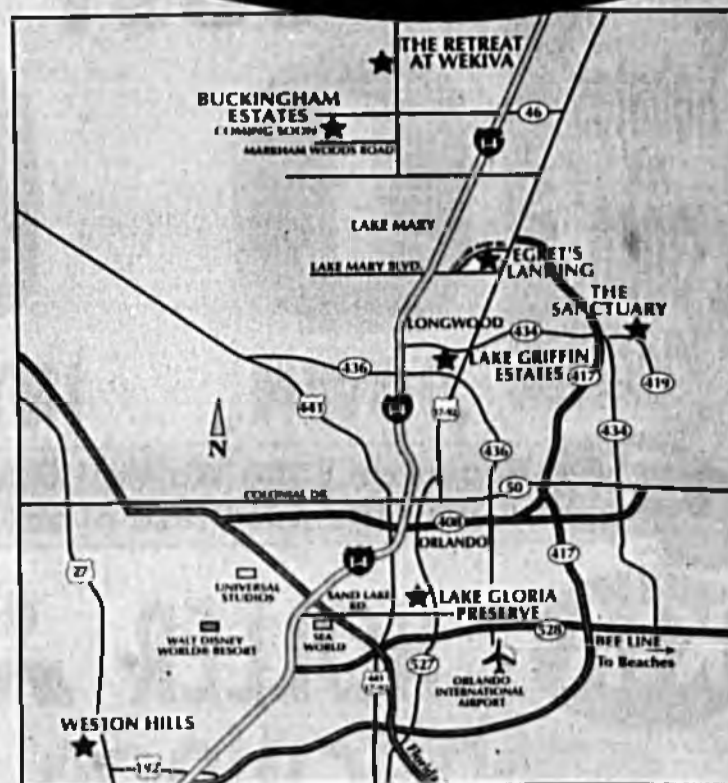

Although education is a huge priority, Collier said many Crimean students do not have the advantages of their American counterparts. Textbooks are hard to come by, and there are only six computers in the entire Bakhchisarai school.

"Can you imagine teaching chemistry without a lab? They don't have a lab," Collier said. "They have gym class, but they don't have a gym."

Nevertheless, the Crimean government and school officials are trying to change things, she said. Principal Polupan helps by writing and publishing English textbooks for his students.

"He spends every waking hour writing textbooks," Collier said. Collier and her American students also want to help.

When the geography teacher returned to Millennium Middle School, she brought with her more than 100 letters from the

Bakhchisarai students. The Sanford students are responding to the letters, and they have already sent one package to the Ukrainian school.

In the next few weeks, the class plans to make friendship bags full of various items, including pencils, stickers and pens, to give to every student at the Bakhchisarai school.

Collier also plans to add a few items to the package, including crayons, dustless chalk and Ziploc bags.

"Alexandra, the teacher of English, loved Ziploc bags," Collier said. "She visited the states once, but she could only afford to buy one box of Ziploc bags. So, I thought it would be neat to send her some."

Asked if she would go back to Crimea, Collier doesn't hesitate with her answer.

"I can't imagine not going back," she said. "I'm a geography teacher, and that's what it's all about."

Ambassador to CRIMEA

Collier selected to participate in international teaching program

Millennium Middle School teacher Margaret Collier's classroom is filled with maps and posters of various countries throughout the world. They are learning tools for her sixth-grade geography students.

In a few weeks, Collier's students will begin learning about the countries of the former Soviet Union, including the Ukraine. It will be a time when the geography teacher can close her textbook and teach from first-hand experience.

Collier traveled to the Ukraine in October as a participant in the U.S. Department of Education's Teacher of Excellence program. She was one of 29 teachers nationwide selected to travel to various destinations in eastern Europe and Central Asia.

"I got to visit places teachers teach about but never see," Collier said. "Being a geography teacher, seeing and learning about other cultures and then

teaching students about it, that's a great experience."

Collier received an application for the international program as a result of her selection last year to the USA Today's third Annual All-USA Teacher Team. In January, she applied for the program; and, in June, she found out she had been selected to travel abroad.

"I was shocked, but so happy, to be selected," she said.

After the tragedy of Sept. 11, the teachers in the international program weren't sure whether they could still travel to their destinations. Several countries were closed to travelers, and several school systems prohibited international travel.

"It was real touch and go after September," Collier said. "Of the 29 teachers selected, only 17 traveled to their destinations."

On Oct. 14, Collier traveled to Washington, D.C., to be briefed by the U.S. State Department. The next day, she left for the Ukraine.

For two weeks, Collier was immersed in the Ukrainian cul-

ture, living with a host family, visiting and teaching various classes and traveling to numerous destinations in the Crimean Peninsula. She became a part-time ambassador to the area, representing Seminole County and the United States.

"It was like being an ambassador," Collier said. "But, I actually felt like a politician. I met so many wonderful people on the trip."

Collier met several high-ranking officials, including Crimea Prime Minister Vladimir Tuterov and Minister of Education Galina Pekhar, during her time in the Ukraine. Nevertheless, the students, teachers and other residents of Bakhchisarai — the city where she lived during her stay — are her fondest memories.

Collier stayed with Vladimir and Alexandra Polupan while in Bakhchisarai. Vladimir is the principal and Alexandra is a teacher of English at the city's school, which enrolls 250 students.

New York firefighters visit Lake Mary

After the devastating attacks on Sept. 11, school counselors at schools all over the United States were dealing with the aftermath. Children were scared, but they were also concerned.

There was an urgent need in many of these children to do something to help. At Lake Mary Elementary, Guidance Counselor Joan Toro talked with Lake Mary Elementary's Student Council. They decided to ask all the children in the school to write letters of encouragement and support to the firefighters, police and pilots affected by the tragedy.

The children at Lake Mary sent hundreds of cards and letters to New York. Some of the pilots, firefighters and police officers were so touched by the letters that many responded personally. For the Student Council, the letters were just a start. They wanted to do something more, something permanent. They decided to plant a tree in memory of all those who lost their lives.

The Student Council members began working on various ways to raise the

The pilots, police officers, and firemen were so touched that they decided they would like to be part of the ceremony. Representatives from United Airlines, the Port Authority Police and the fire department arrived in Lake Mary on Nov. 30 to participate in the services. Due to the constraints on their time, there were no representatives from the Police Department who could attend. But former New York Police Officer and current Seminole County Sheriff's Deputy Arnie Amorus attended in their place. Arnie was one of the many officers from Central Florida who went to New York to help out after the tragedy.

The ceremony started off with words of welcome from Principal Gloria Flanagan. Counselor Joan Toro told the attendees the story behind the ceremony and then Student Council Ariel Brent offered her thanks. Counselor Linda Hoffman from Woodlands Elementary School was one of the many counselors from all over the country who went to New York in the aftermath to help the survivors deal with the grief. She told the students at the ceremony that their letters of support and condolences meant more than they could ever imag-

ine. The visitors from New York each got a chance to talk and tell the students how much their letters meant. One of the firefighters said that every firehouse in the city has cards and letters from children all over the United States and the world. These letters tell the firefighters that they are not alone in their grief.

Assistant Teacher Tina Walker sang "In Harms Way" to thank the people who worked so hard in the aftermath of the tragedy. The Student Council presented the visitors from New York with medals and Lake Mary Elementary T-shirts. The medals had the school's mascot, a dolphin, on the front and the words "You are our heroes" on the back. The visitors from New York also had some very special plaques for the school. The tree was then planted and members of the student council laid flowers and flags around the base of the tree.

Lake Mary students, led by music teacher Amy Gonzalez, then sang and signed, "This is My Country" and "America the Beautiful." After the ceremony, the children went up to meet and hug their new heroes. Then, they were invited to a lunch of hero sandwiches. The visitors attending from New York included United Airlines Capt. Freddy
