Pan Am 'Big Apple' bound

SANFORD — Seminole County residents looking for non-stop service to New York will no longer have to travel to Orlando to catch a flight.

Officials with Pan American Airways announced Friday that beginning June 28, the airline will provide daily service to Newark (N.J.) International Airport, located about 16 miles from Midtown

Manhattan. "This is a big flight for us," said Larry Dale, president of the Orlando Sanford International Airport. "It connects us directly with the New York market. I've had more requests for flights to New York than just about anywhere else combined." Flights will leave Sanford daily at 11:30

a.m. and arrive in Newark at 2 p.m. The return flight leaves Newark at 2:45 p.m. and arrives in Sanford at 5:25 p.m. Although flights will not begin until late June, Pan Am's reservation center began selling tickets Friday. A one-way ticket is \$105; roundtrip is \$213.80.

"We are very excited to offer the first non-stop flight from Sanford to New York," said Dave Fink, president of Pan

Sinkhole thwarts escape

Bank robber may have killed himself

LAKE MARY — Four Orlando career criminals— with more than 70 cumulative charges on their arrest records — robbed a Lake Mary bank Friday.

The bank heist will be the last for 21-year-old Michael Shackelford as police believe he shot himself as officers moved in for the arrest. The robbery could also be the final violent act for his three partners, Lorenzo White, 21, Jarvis Jacobs, 23 and Treston Hollinger, 23. The FBI is reportedly looking into the case believing the four-some is responsible for many more robberies in the five-county area.

The robbery occurred just before 9:30 a.m. at the AmSouth Bank on Lake Mary Boulevard and Rhinehart Road. It's the first robbery for the Lake Mary AmSouth and the first bank robbery for the city this year, said Lake Mary Chief Richard Beary.

"I'd say we were pretty lucky no one was injured," Beary said following the apprehension of the four suspects.

All four men reportedly entered the bank brandishing firearms. No one was injured at the bank, but a pregnant employee was taken to the hospital for precautions. The suspects fled in a white van. As they switched vehicles, Lake Mary police received their first break.

"One of our officer's mothers was the first to call 911," Beary said.

The unidentified officer's mother called because smoke appeared to be pouring out of the van as they switched vehicles. The smoke was the dye pack exploding, said Beary.

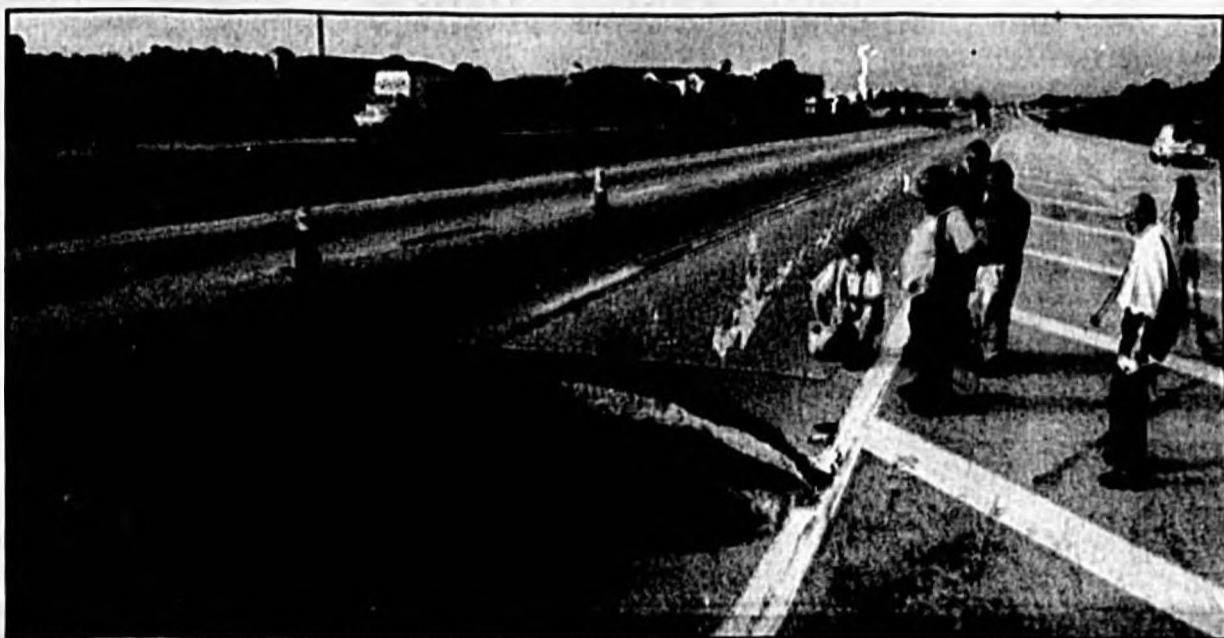
Police received their second break when the looming Interstate 4 sinkhole traffic slowed their escape. The westbound Lake Mary Boulevard entrance to westbound I-4 is closed and police believe the criminals weren't expecting the change.

"They weren't prepared for that U-turn and it slowed them down," Beary said. "Rerouting foiled their get-away plan."

Deputy Scott Van der Weide pulled up behind the criminals' vehicle about a mile past the sinkhole construction. As the deputy called for back up, the vehicle then

15 trucks of cement still haven't filled the hole

LAKE MARY — A sinkhole that emerged Wednesday morning on Interstate 4 could take about two weeks to fill, said highway officials.

The problem was first discovered when a motorist called authorities about 6 a.m. to report a "dip" in the westbound lane. Crews from the Florida Department of Transportation immediately isolated

the area, shutting down all but one lane during morning rush hour. The westbound Lake Mary Boulevard entrance to westbound I-4 was also closed.

The dip collapsed shortly after FDOT's arrival, said spokesman Steve Homan, creating a sinkhole the size of several compact cars. By Wednesday afternoon, traffic backed up past the St. Johns River Bridge into Deltona.

Crews worked around the clock

to construct two temporary lanes, which were opened just in time for the Thursday commute at 5:30 a.m. Traffic was less hectic Thursday and Friday as many motorists found alternative routes such as U.S. Highway 17-92 and State Road 417.

Construction crews were not the only ones busy working in the area. Florida Highway Troopers and

Time may be limited for Seminole's Cyber High School

SANFORD — Only time will tell if Cyber High Charter School will be open at the end of next school year.

The Seminole County School Board voted last week to give the school until October to correct various issues addressed in a recent performance audit. If the problems aren't solved by Oct. 1, the Board will not renew the school's three-

year contract, which expires next June.

The decision follows the Orange County School Board's decision last week to close Cyber High's Orlando school, which is operated by the same entity.

Following the audit conducted at Seminole's Cyber High in January, major and minor concerns were identified, including poor FCAT scores, an inconsistent enrollment rate, and the hiring of uncertified teachers. The school's

finances are also in the red, with Cyber High's independent auditor indicating the school had a negative balance of \$13,596 for the quarter ending Dec. 31.

The Board's recent vote reverses its opinion of the school two years ago. Since charter schools are publicly funded and need local approval to open and operate, Cyber High needed the Seminole School Board to approve its contract. In April 2000, the school entered into a three-year agree-

ment with Seminole County to serve 150 at-risk students in the ninth and tenth grades.

Last year, the School Board approved expansion at Cyber High, allowing the school to add the 11th grade and serve 175 students.

When the school opened, it promised a student-to-teacher ratio of 21-1, as well as expanded instruction on the internet. Enrollment preference was given to students who scored in the

lower fourth of standardized tests, had a GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale and possessed writing scores of 2.0 or below on the Florida Writes exam. Each student was to receive modified instruction to fit individual needs, with emphasis placed on language, arts and mathematics.

According to the recent audit, only 10 percent of the 10th graders at the school passed the exams on the FCAT. Student enrollment was

Crosses memorialize two types of soldiers

SANFORD — Two hundred white crosses dot the front yard at Sanford Church of God.

The unadorned symbols of honor pay tribute to the men and women who died serving their country and for others who are now soldiers of faith.

"On Memorial Day, we wanted to honor the soldiers who gave their lives to allow us to be free," said Wes Tanksley, pastor at the church. "They paid the ultimate sacrifice for us."

"We decided to put the crosses in the yard during Memorial Day

weekend, because that is what Memorial Day is for," he said.

The unmarked crosses in the front row represent the more than 35 million soldiers who died in action since the Revolutionary War, Tanksley said. Behind them stands rows of crosses bearing names of former church members or relatives of current parishioners who are now soldiers of faith.

"The first row, I call it the front line," Tanksley said. "They are the ones who died to allow us to do what we are doing now."

The crosses were placed in the yard last weekend and will be removed this Monday following a service to honor the church's sol-

diers of faith. Last Sunday, a service was held in memory of the military soldiers.

"We didn't want to mix the two types of soldiers," Tanksley said. "We wanted to honor them separately."

The pastor said he came up with the idea for the soldiers of faith from 1 Timothy 6:12. In the book, it describes those who fought the good fight of faith and who, following their deaths, are now soldiers of faith.

It's another type of memorial day for the parishioners. Three months ago, they were asked to

Shades of Gray

Randy Jones should be commended for having the courage to switch his vote

Try as we might, not all issues are black and white. Most often, those in decision-making positions must wade through the murky gray areas to reach their conclusions. Such was the case with the Groves at Sanford, a proposed apartment complex on Airport Boulevard.

Residents of Sanora subdivision protested the project. Having lived for years next to the 20-acre wooded site, they weren't thrilled with the proposed three-story, 300-plus unit complex. City Commission, on a 3-2 vote led by District 3 Commissioner Randy Jones, originally sided with the residents to limit — not eliminate — the project. This newspaper believed — and still believes — it was the right decision.

But those hazy gray areas remained. The developers could have moved forward with their original plans, albeit with a much less attractive design. A compromise was available that would provide residents with some of what they wanted, but to reach it, Jones would have to change his mind and his vote.

He did both, to the ire of many residents. While *The Herald* continues to disagree with Jones' decision, he should be commended for acting on what he believes is in the best interests of the community.

We all have to backtrack from outspoken opinions from time to time. Our elected officials do so in the public arena. Jones could have stood by his original decision and rightfully said he did all he could do. That would have been the easy way out. Instead, he reconsidered his position, concluded it wasn't the best outcome and had the courage to change his mind. Some would call that wishy-washy. Not in this instance. Jones put his behind on the line by switching his vote and subjected himself to much more criticism than if he had done nothing at all.

He may face the wrath of his constituents when he runs for re-election. But Sanora residents should remember that while there are black-and-white choices in the voting booth, complex public issues don't always provide clear-cut answers. Sometimes the only choice is gray.

School Board should have pulled the plug on Cyber High School

The Seminole County School Board erred in waiting until October to determine the fate of Cyber High School in Sanford. Given the school's dismal past performance, a five month delay for a final decision only prolongs the problems.

- Cyber High's report card is clear:
- Ninety percent of the school's 10th-graders failed the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test.
- In two years, only 37 students of the 599 students enrolled have graduated.
- Uncertified teachers were hired to educate "at-risk" students.

• A negative balance sheet at the end of the school year with additional debt sure to pile on.

These are not problems that can be fixed in five months. In fact, any decision on whether the school will continue to operate will be based on its performance during its entire existence not, as Superintendent Paul Hagerty explained, on a "magic moment" that may or may not occur between now and October.

Should the board decide in October to close Cyber High, the students are in a no-win situation: Either finish the academic year at a school where administrators know their contract will not be renewed; or change schools during the first half of the first semester. Neither option allows the students the best chances to succeed. They enrolled in Cyber High based on promises that the school's supposedly innovative curriculum would help them excel. Those promises have been broken.

The Florida legislature created the Charter School statutes so school systems could explore alternatives to the traditional public school model. Charter schools can succeed in the right environment. Such an environment does not exist at Cyber High School, and the School Board should have pulled the plug immediately.

We trust the board's delay in making a final decision is not politically motivated. The three members who voted to delay face re-election in September. To date, all three have served honorably. A recommendation to determine Cyber High's fate before the school year begins would cement their credentials as advocates dedicated to serving the best interests of the students.

This is partly due to many of the other low-income apartment projects approved and built recently, and the plethora of horrible car lots on 17-92, as well as many more ugly projects that were not stopped.

Is it any wonder that Lake Mary continues to attract hi-tech office buildings, but immediately after you cross the line on Rinehart Road into Sanford, right next to Lake Mary tech parks, the best we in Sanford can attract are mega-car dealerships and a Wal-Mart, which are not high end uses, do not have mega spin-off effects and pay relatively little property taxes due to a small building on a mega lot. In these uncertain times! It is time for the City Commission to decide right now what direction it wants this city to go.

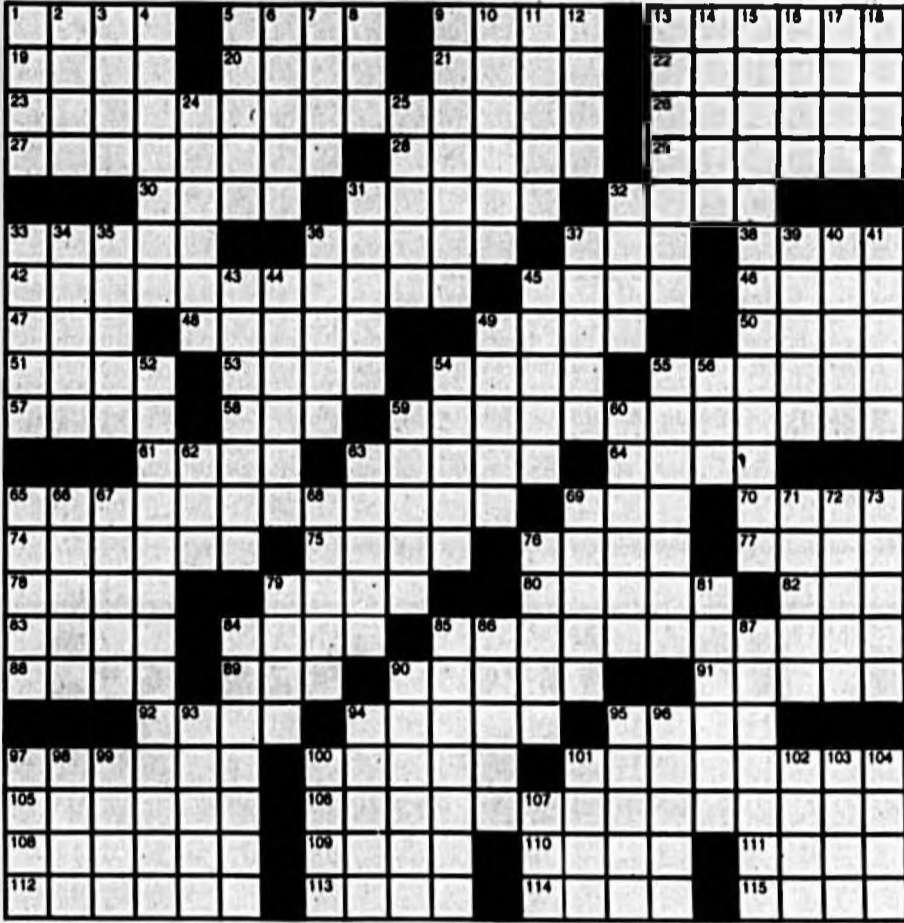

The Way We Were: Woodruffs' roots in Florida go back to 1841

The Woodruff family is one of the oldest in this area. Elias Woodruff arrived in Mellonville in 1841 and several of his descendants still live here.

The book "Early settlers in Orange County" tells of "Three Generations of Woodruffs in Orange County." Most of the following comes from that source, along with a few facts gleaned from the Sanford Museum files.

Elias Woodruff
Elias Woodruff was born in Elizabethton, N.J. in 1785. His father, Seth Woodruff, was one of three brothers who had come to the United States from England.

As a young man, Elias fought in the War of 1812. Following the war, Elias began to look the country over and finally settled

in the newly constituted Mississippi Territory. There he married Miss Ailsley Collins of Columbia, and they made their home on a farm at China Grove in Pike County. They had eight children, six daughters and two sons, Seth W. and William Wordsworth.

After his family was grown, Elias again felt the lure of adventure and traveled to Mellonville, arriving in 1841. He left his wife and children behind.

He settled on an island at the head of Lake Monroe that he named after himself — Woodruff's Island. For years he lived there as a recluse in a log cabin he built himself. He cultivated the island, which was very fertile and produced large, delicious vegetables.

Elias later purchased land at Fort Reid where he planted an orange grove. In 1848, he sent for his youngest son, William Wordsworth, who came from Mississippi to live with his father. They built a cottage on the Fort Reid Grove, but Elias continued to spend a great deal of time on his island. The house in Fort Reid was the third frame house to be built in Orange County.

The last years of his life were spent quietly at home with W.W. enjoying his beloved books and papers. Elias died in 1862 and was buried in the old cemetery near Fort Reid. The body was later moved to Lakeview Cemetery.

There is a marker in Sanford's Lakeview Cemetery which was placed there by the United States Daughters of 1812 in a special ceremony on March 12, 1959. The boy Scouts presented the colors and later played "Taps." There was an address by the Rev. A.C. McInnis, and Mrs. A.R. Key introduced the descendants.

William Wordsworth Woodruff
William Wordsworth Woodruff (W.W.) was born July 10, 1831 in China Grove, Mississippi. When his father, Elias, who had previously migrated to Florida, sent for him, he rode on horseback to Mellonville in 1848.

W.W. found the area exciting because of the nearby Seminole Indians. He entered the army and fought the Indians in 1856-57.

On April 4, 1861, he married

ESG Program: The Emergency Shelter Grants Program is intended to assist homeless shelters and to provide assistance to the homeless and to those who are at risk of becoming homeless. Each year the County allocates at least 30% of the grant to the County's Community Assistance Division to make assistance available to households to prevent homelessness. The remaining funds go to one or more homeless shelters for renovations or for operating expenses. The grant requires a dollar-for-dollar match, which is provided by the funded organizations. Staff recommends the following allocation of funds:

Seminole County Community Assistance - Homelessness Prevention	\$28,200
Rescue Outreach Mission - Shelter Operating Costs	32,900
Safe House of Seminole - Shelter Operating Costs	32,900
TOTAL	\$94,000

Miss Nancy Jane (Nannie) Galloway, who had come to Florida with her father and lived at Rutland's Ferry. They lived on the Woodruff Grove where they continuously entertained visitors. They had three children, Seth, Emma and Frank.

W.W. became interested in public affairs and was a delegate from Orange County to the Secession Convention which met in Tallahassee in 1861. He was one of seven who voted against the ordinance of secession.

Notwithstanding, while still in Tallahassee, he volunteered for the Southern Army, but failed the physical exam. He returned home, going to Gainesville on the Yulee Railroad, then the rest of the

way on muleback.

W.W. was able to join the Home Guards with Captain Watson in charge. At one time, the company came so near to being captured that they had to abandon their horses and swim the St. Johns River for safety.

After the war, W.W. served Orange County two terms in the Florida legislature. In 1869, his siblings, who were still in Mississippi, asked that he return. He sold all of his possessions and moved there, but was dissatisfied and returned to Fort Reid after only three months in Mississippi.

He started another orange grove in Fort Reid, but his health soon began to fail, and he died Feb. 14, 1872.

After his death, the making of a new home for the family depended largely on his wife.

Being well educated with lots of ability, Nannie Woodruff grew one of the finest orange groves in the state.

On Aug. 1, 1876, Nannie married Charles Hampton Beck, who had recently come here from Ocala. They continued to live at Fort Reid and had two sons — Jay Beck, born in 1878, and Barnwell (Barny) in 1881.

Barny Beck's children were Charles, Minnie (Kratzert) and Barnwell.

Charles Hampton Beck was killed in an avalanche in the Klondike on April 3, 1898, in the Chilkoot pass and buried in Dyea, Alaska.

Nannie Woodruff Beck died July 11, 1909, and is buried in Lakeview Cemetery.

Real estate company brokers sale of land to Natural Lands program

The County plans to renovate several houses and barns on the property for use as environmental education facilities. Other recreational operations will range from equestrian facilities to a canine park, Partyka said.

NAI Realvest represented Rob Yaeger, trustee for Jetta Point,

LLC. Partyka submitted a proposal to Seminole County more than a year ago. On May 16, the Seminole County Commission authorized payment of the \$4.35 million purchase price.

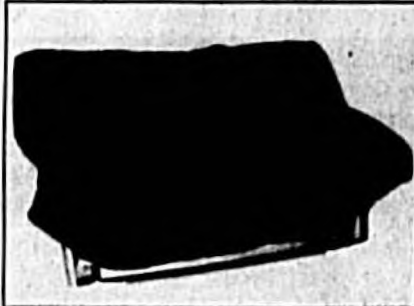

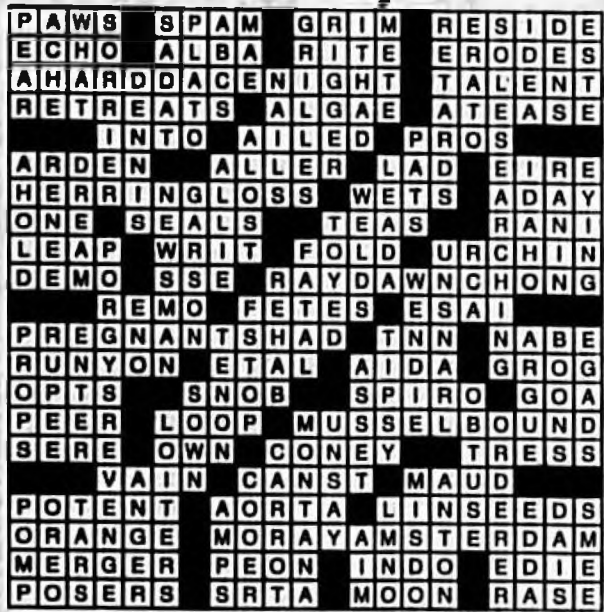

Second canker infection is found in Brevard

A second residential property has been found to have citrus trees infected with the bacterial disease citrus canker in Brevard County.

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) have begun surveying the surrounding area to determine if any additional infection is in the area.

The infected trees were found by federal inspectors during routine survey. The USDA has an ongoing sentinel survey pro-

gram which involves checking pre-selected, highly susceptible citrus trees for canker on a routine basis. The USDA was in the process of expanding the sentinel survey in that area when the four infected trees were found. Two other sentinel properties within a quarter of a mile of the infected property have been inspected three times in the past year, including in April, 2002 with negative results.

The trees are located in a residential area west of I-95, approximately 37 miles north of the previous find in Palm Bay. The clos-

est commercial citrus is a three acre grove approximately 2.5 miles southeast of the infected property. The four trees include one mandarin, two grapefruit and one lemon tree.

The property owner has signed a waiver allowing the removal of the infected trees and 21 exposed trees. Survey crews have begun inspecting citrus trees in the area starting from the find and will be working their way out approximately five square miles. An investigation into how the infection got into the area is underway.

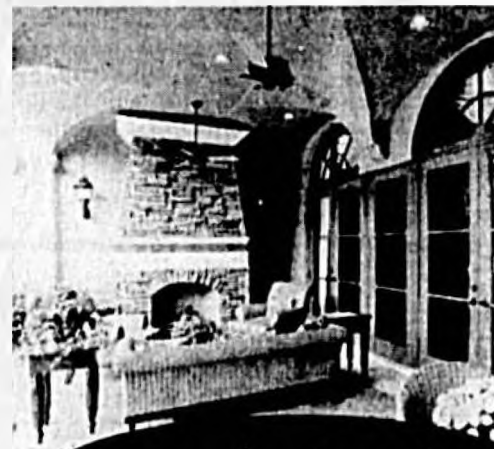

 exited the Interstate and went west on State Road 436.

The four criminals then made their last turn of the chase as they went south on State Road 434 into Orange County. A Seminole County deputy observed the four subjects bail out of the car just outside of the Omega Apartment complex on Forest City Road, just south of Riverside Park Road.

One subject was captured almost immediately, according to the sheriff's office. A second was captured as he was running near Lockhart Middle School. A third suspect was discovered after a Seminole County deputy heard a gunshot in the back yard of a home on Compass Court.

According to Orange County homicide investigators, the fatal injury is believed to be self-inflicted. The fourth

subject was found hiding in the backyard of a house next door to where the third subject was found.

With four crime scenes spread over two counties authorities from Seminole and Orange counties and Lake Mary will work together to gather evidence and build a case against the bank robbers. The three surviving suspects were booked into the Orange County jail.

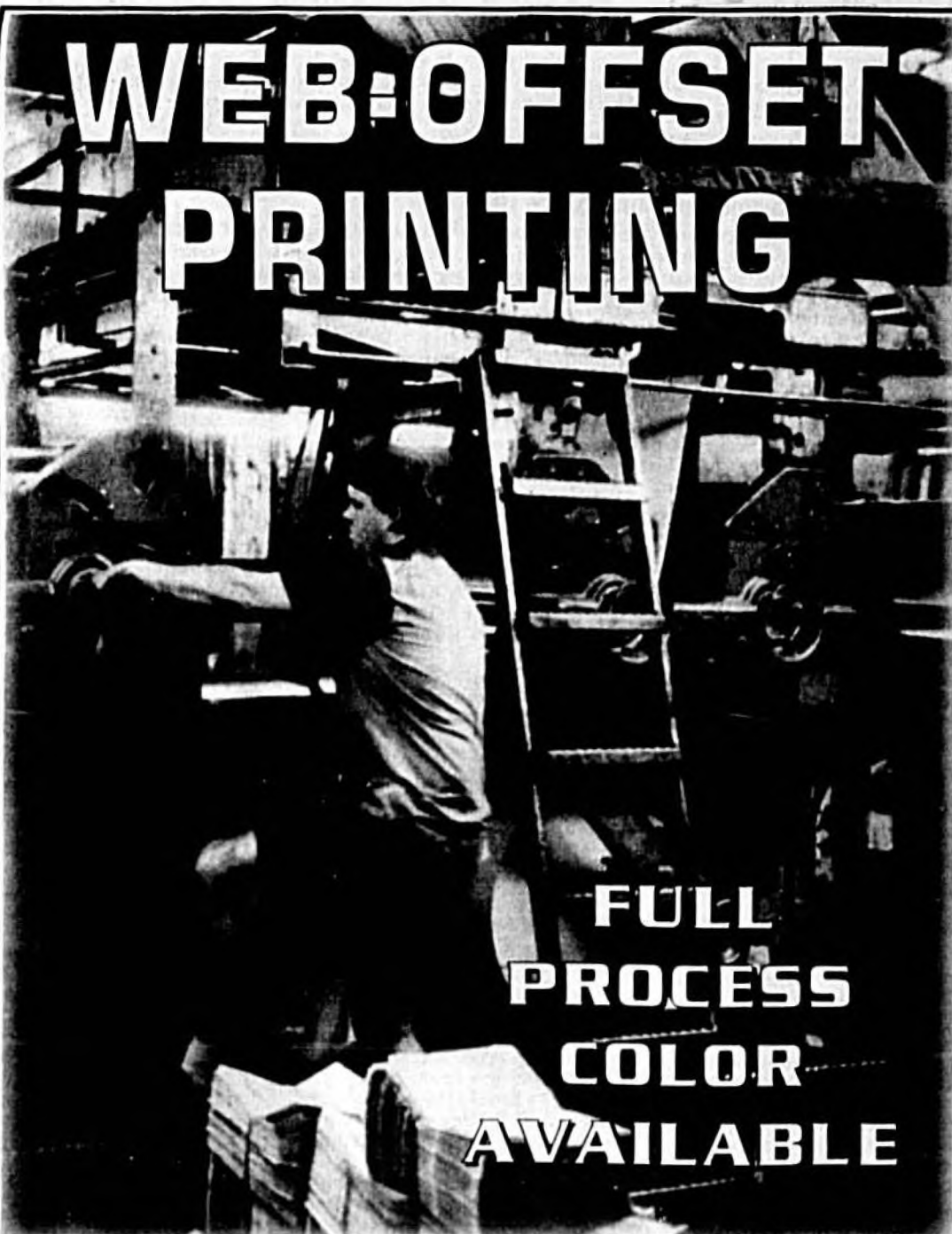

also unstable since the school opened, with only 37 of the 599 students finishing two years at the school.

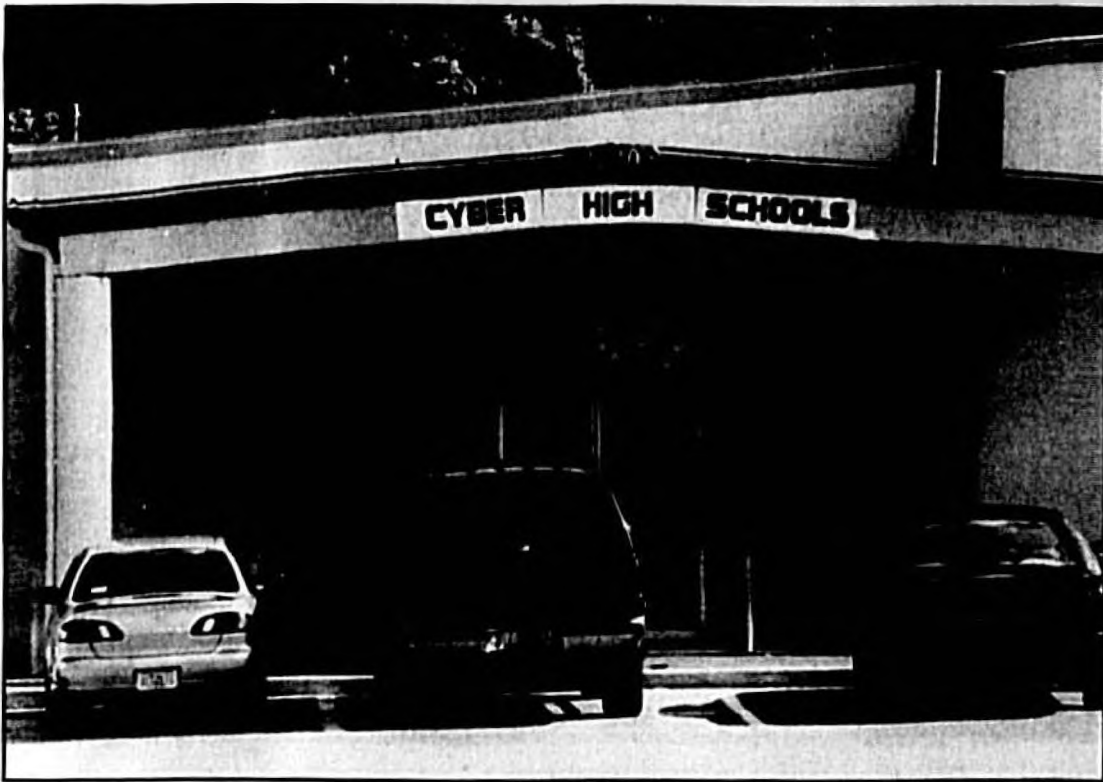
During Tuesday's School Board meeting, Superintendent Paul Hagerly asked the Board to consider several options in regard to Cyber High's contract, including terminating it at

the end of this school year, giving the school a period of time to correct the concerns or waiting to make a decision until next spring when the contract ends.

Board member Larry Furlong, who voted last year against expanding Cyber High to include the 11th grade, supported closing the school im-

mediately, indicating the sooner the school closed, the better. He was supported by fellow Board member Dede Schaffner.

The three other Board members, including Chairman Sandra Robinson, Diane Bauer and Jeanne Morris, chose to postpone the decision of closing the school until October to see if the concerns can be addressed.

Lake Mary police teamed up to crack down on impatient and aggressive motorists. Lake Mary Sgt. Ronnie Gregory estimates officers wrote about 35 tickets to motorists who used the median to turnaround or pass other vehicles. Police arrested one lady who became irate after being pulled over, Gregory said.

"Word of caution to your readers," said FHP spokesman Lt. Chuck Williams. "When these things happen, we're not going to tolerate people using the median to pass. It's against the law and a \$90 fine."

"We're trying to cut down on the road rage situation," added Gregory. "It's kind of dangerous out there as it is without people causing more problems."

Gregory urges motorists to "just use a little patience."

Patience will be the key for transportation crews as they pour thousands of dollars into the sinkhole. As of Friday, Homan said crews have already pumped 15 trucks of cement into the sinkhole. The overall cost of the project will exceed \$500,000.

"What we've put in there basically is two football fields, three foot high," he said.

Crews will also pour concrete into 15 or 20 low points surrounding the sinkhole to stabilize the area.

Concrete, however, may not be the best answer for filling a sinkhole, said a University of Central Florida professor.

Shiou-San Kuo, UCF professor of civil and environmental engineering, is one of the top researchers on sinkholes in Central Florida. From Winter Park to Apopka, Kuo has seen all sizes of sinkholes.

The weak or soft limestone bedding in Central Florida makes it a high risk for sinkholes. Limestone bedding appears at many different levels throughout the area, explained Kuo. For example, in the hills of Apopka, the limestone is only a couple dozen feet below the surface, but in Lake Mary, it could be five times deeper.

Sinkholes are created when water reacts with decaying vegetation and creates acidic water. The acidic water seeps underground and breaks down the limestone creating a subsurface cavity.

"To dissolve one inch of limestone takes hundred of years," Kuo said.

The subsurface cavities will gradually migrate toward the surface. Groundwater moving through the subsurface often creates openings in the cavity. As cavities reach closer to the top, sandy soils move into fissures and close openings to the cavities. These soils are referred to as "bridging soil."

Three factors will cause the collapse of the cavity, Kuo said. When the water table is low during dry seasons, the Boyant Pressure, or hydro static pressure, reduces, causing the overlying ground to push more onto the cavity.

A second factor in creating sinkholes occurs as water is pumped from the aquifer, which reverses the pressure causing a cavity to collapse.

"If you have a cavity next to a well then it will trigger it," Kuo said.

The third factor that can cause a cavity collapse is extremely heavy rains. Heavy rains will flow through the bridging soil

causing less friction. Vibrations can also cause the bridging soils to move.

Vibrations from cars moving over I-4 could be the cause of the "new" sinkhole in the area, Kuo said. One of the misconceptions about the sinkhole on I-4 is newer sinkholes appeared after workers attempted to fill the first hole.

The reason "new sinkholes" appeared was because of the tons of cement being poured into the hole. The weight of cement is about 150 pounds per cubic foot, but loose soils around a sinkhole are generally 90 pounds per cubic foot, Kuo said.

"It's not another sinkhole forming," Kuo said responding to media reports of other sinkholes forming next to the original one. "It's due to the soil being compacted (from the cement). The chance of two cavities being close together is very slim."

Another negative of filling sinkholes with cement is the chance that it will seep into the aquifer and contaminate the water supply, Kuo said.

Highway officials maintain there is no way to detect sinkholes. Homan said it would be costly and inaccurate to drill in hopes of finding other subsurface cavities along I-4, Kuo agrees.

Drilling can often cause the collapse of a cavity disturbing the bridging soils. Kuo and several other scientists created ground-penetrating radar about 15 years ago. It can detect subsurface cavities to about 40 to 50 feet in the ground. Using the technology, Kuo can also detect a cavity profile that may be several 100 feet underground.

As has become a regular happening in Sanford, the standings in the six Spring Leagues are about as tight as it can get, with only one league having a leader with as much as a two-game advantage.

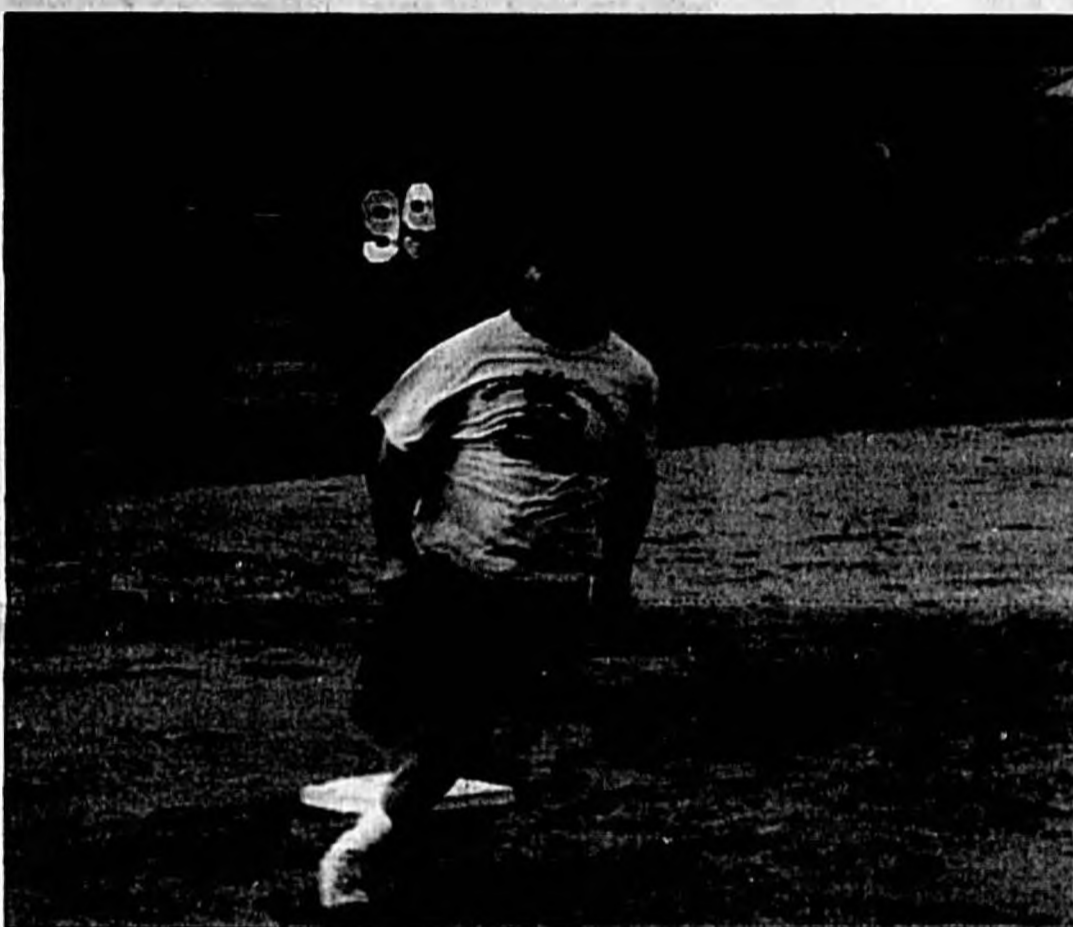
In fact, 19 of the 33 teams in the six leagues still have a legitimate shot at the trophy, with four or five more still not eliminated from contention.

Quota hunt applications due soon

OCALA — Today (June 1) marks the beginning of quota hunt application time for sportsmen who hunt on state Type I wildlife management areas (WMAs).

Two kinds of quota hunt applications are available from Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) offices, tax collectors' offices and tax collectors' subagents.

Regular quota hunt applications are for hunters who seek permits to hunt during the first nine days of the general gun hunting season (and other periods in some cases) on WMAs.

Special quota hunt applications are for permits to take part in exclusive archery or muzzleloader hunts.

Applications and permits are free, but applicants must have a valid WMA permit to apply for a quota hunt permit and be included in the random selection process, unless they qualify for permit exemptions.

The FWC uses the quota hunt system to control the distribution and number of hunters using public lands during peak hunting periods and limit the amount of game hunters take from WMAs.

Eddie White, the FWC's quota hunt coordinator, said some changes are necessary this year to help verify purchase of WMA permits. Some WMA permits do not include proof of purchase tabs. In the past, applicants have written in the permit number on their quota hunt application.

"This is difficult to verify," White said. "To remedy this situation, we are asking applicants to make a photocopy of their WMA permit and send it in with their application in addition to writing their permit number on the application."

WMA permits that do not include proof of purchase tabs include those sold on-line via the internet and those that are computer-generated and printed out like a receipt.

White said the FWC has added seven new See Outdoors, Page 2B

They include: the Big Bend WMA Snipe Island Unit (formerly part of the Aucilla WMA in Taylor County), Picayune Strand (Collier County), Pine Log (Bay County), Devil's Hammock (Levy County), Oklawaha River WMA Gore's Landing Unit (Marion County), Seminole Forest WMA Lake Tracy Unit (Lake County) and John C. and Mariana Jones Wildlife and Environmental Area (Palm Beach and Martin counties). Applications that arrive at the FWC's Tallahassee office before June 11 will be eligible for the random selection process that will fill the quota for many of the hunts. Leftover permits will go out on a first-come, first-served basis to

hunters whose applications arrive in the Tallahassee office after June 11. "Roughly half the regular hunts and three quarters of the special hunts will fill up during the random selection," White said. The FWC will not accept applications unless they arrive at the Tallahassee office via U.S. Mail or a licensed delivery service before the deadline. Some quota hunts offer a limited number of antlerless deer permits for hunters who check the appropriate box on the applications. Quota hunt applications for the Blackwater WMA Hutton Unit quail hunt, and for airboat, tracked vehicle, supervised youth and mobility-impaired persons hunts will be available from FWC offices June 28, White said.

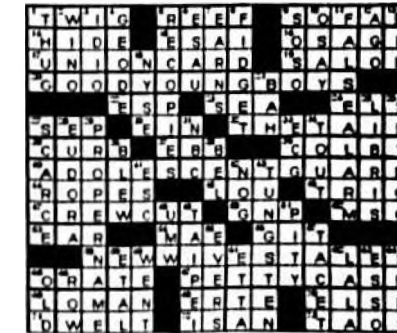

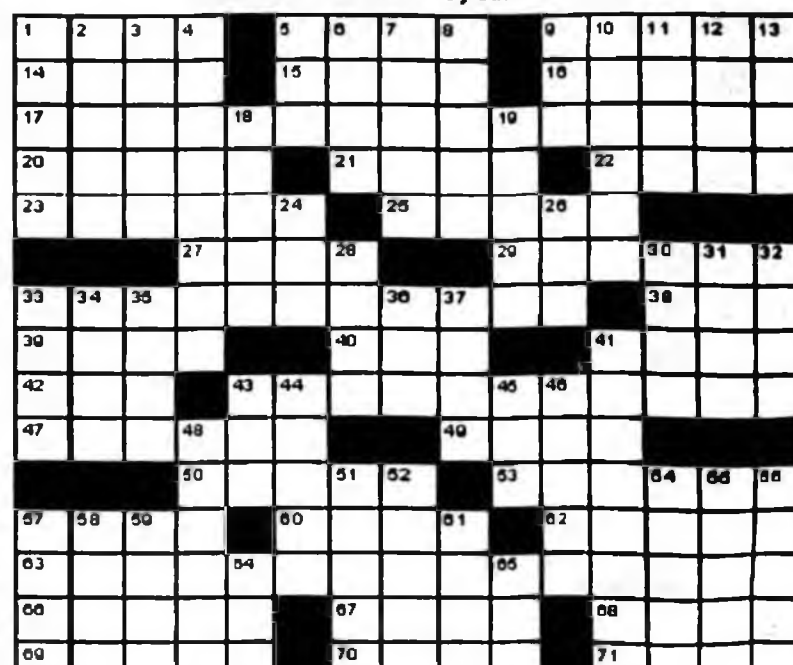

Show highlights new ideas in food industry

CHICAGO — The National Restaurant Show took place from May 18 to May 21 in the Windy City. (Boy, was it windy!) More than 70,000 attendees, 2,000 exhibitors and miles of aisles filled McCormick Place for the latest in food trends and equipment. Industry professionals from more than 100 countries flocked to the largest food related show in America to eat, drink and drink. (More about that later.)

Traveling from Central Florida, I wanted to see the new cutting edge influences and trends that are shaping the restaurant and food industry's futures — and bring them to you. (While I was expecting gorgeous Spring weather on the sunny shores of Lake Michigan, when I arrived the temperature went down to a bone chilling 33 degrees — so much for the "cooling" spring breeze coming off the lake). It was downright cold — even for the natives up here. However, there was so much to do, so much to see, and so much to eat (well it is a food show) that after a while you barely noticed the frostbite setting in as you made it back to your hotel. (Ok, maybe I exaggerate a bit, but I grew up in Sunny Florida).

What's coming soon to a restaurant near you?

- How about French fries made of stone ground corn? There are purse hooks that will keep your purse from sit-

ting on the floor of the restaurant. Instead, the hook is attached to the table.

- Having a party?

Get some glowing drink cups. A company based right in Casselberry makes these non-toxic drink receptacles. Squeeze them and they light up for nearly eight hours.

- Rowe

International, Inc. is trying to make your wait to get into your favorite restaurant more pleasant. They have purchased the

rights to "Who Wants to be a Millionaire?" and are putting kiosks in restaurants around the country. Customers can play the game while they wait. If they get to certain levels, they can win a discount on their meal or a T-shirt. (Are you reading this, Outback?)

- If you ever go to the Restaurant Show be careful of the drink peddlers. There are many, many new alcoholic beverages out there and they all want you to try theirs. New rum based malt beverages are the rage in cranberry, spice and citrus flavors. Flavored vodkas, imported straight from Russia are reaching a new level. In bilberry and cranberry, they are ultra-distilled for smoothness. Be careful! You can't even taste the vodka in there. The bottles are becoming collectors items, coming in different shapes and even hand-painted versions.

- Like to try sushi, but

don't think the idea of raw fish is for you? No problem. You can now have Zushi — looks like sushi, but is prepared with cooked ingredients and then frozen. After thawing, it tastes like the traditional sushi, with no worries for the uninitiated.

- Look for even more bottled water. Everyone knows you are supposed to drink eight glasses a day, but after a while, well, it gets a bit boring. Snapple recently introduced four flavored waters, like berry and lime, that are packed with B vitamins and ginseng. Saratoga offers flavored waters from strawberry to watermelon kiwi.

- Chipotles are coming. In the past few years, it seemed as if we would drown in a sea of spicy chili sauces, each hotter than the ones before. Well chill makers, realizing that not everyone wants to have their taste buds seared off with every meal, are coming out with chipotle flavored sauces. Chipotles, smoked jalapeno peppers, have a unique smoky-spicy taste that gives your cooking the true essence of Mexico. Sara Lee is now marketing their chipotle sauce as a mainstream condiment for meat dishes. Even McIlhenny, the king of Tabasco sauces (If you have ever seen those little red bottles of Tabasco sauce, odds are they made it), is coming out with a five ounce bot-

tle for you to use. (Chefs are trying to get it in half gallon containers, since they can use it to baste or marinade, so get ready for plenty of Chipotle flavored entrees on a menu near you, soon).

- Fresh fish from Hawaii. With today's technology, even smaller companies compete worldwide. Restaurants can have the freshest tasting fish sent straight to them, packed in high tech, plastic and gel filled frozen containers. It arrives faster than going through the traditional distributor method and the selections are great. Sanford restaurants can have Ono (wahoo), Opah (moonfish), Opakapaka (crimson snapper) Nairagi (striped marlin) and more, shipped straight to them. I tried the Opah, and can tell you that it was moist, tender and tasted like the most tender, fresh mahi I have ever had.

There was more to see than just food and food trends. There was every high tech restaurant gadget and machine on the planet. Your servers will soon take your order at your table with a computer pad that will automatically transmit your order to the kitchen and cashier. Your food order will be faster, more accurate and your server can run your credit card and print your check with a push of a button on his or her Palm-pilot like pad.

Welcome to the future.

Then there was the competition, everything from ice carving to pastry. With chainsaws (yes...chainsaws), chisels, knives and hammers in hand, competitors attack huge blocks of crystal clear ice. Seriously, not just any ice will do for carving. This ice manufactured with no bubbles is specially prepared for carving to reduce the possibility of cracking. In a matter of hours, these artists form intricate clear and frosted sculptures that seem to defy gravity. The winning sculpture, "Pearl Diver" showed a scuba diver diving between seahorses as bubbles trailed to the surface.

All in all, it was an amazing experience. From the throngs of international visitors, to the massive amounts of food, I wouldn't have missed it for the world.

Be sure to read next week when I detail my visit to James Beard Award Winning, Charlie Trotter's restaurant in Chicago. Not only was the food a philosophical experience, but he also happens to be a great guy.

Inn at Mystic offers New England comfort with modern-day luxury

Off Interstate 95, past the Carolina beaches and the skyscrapers of New York, there's a quaint New England inn where weary travelers can find a bit of luxury along the Long Island Sound.

Nestled in the center of the historic seaport town of Mystic, Conn., the Inn at Mystic caters to the most discriminating guest. Whether looking for a taste of fine New England dining or searching for a few days of rest and relaxation, the 15-acre coastal resort provides an array of amenities to suit anybody's taste.

The Inn at Mystic — Connecticut's only inn overlooking Mystic Harbor and Long Island Sound — is a collection of five unique buildings. The Haley Mansion, the original inn, was built in 1904 by Katherine Haley, the widow of one of the founders of the Fulton Fish Market. The property was purchased in 1943 for \$25,000 by Richard Nixon's political campaign manager, Frederick Moud.

Moud lived with his sister, Annie, in the mansion until his sibling grew tired of the financier's late-night parties. No longer able to live under the same roof as her brother, Annie moved into the Gate House, which was built by Moud to appease his sister. The Gate House still stands and was the 1945 honeymoon getaway for Humphrey Bogart and Lauren Bacall. Guests wanting to see where Bogart and Bacall spent their first few days after saying "I do," can ask for room No. 8.

Today, the inn, which is listed on the National Register of Historical Places, is owned by the Dyer/Grey family and operated by the grand dame of Mystic, Jody Dyer. Along with the mansion and Gate House, the resort's accommodations include the Motor Inn, the East Wing and the Flood Tide Restaurant, which houses six guest rooms featuring colonial charm with modern amenities.

Something For Everyone

Guests desiring outdoor recreation just need to step outside to find a variety of activities at the resort. Besides offering peaceful strolls through the inn's formal gardens or the apple and pear orchard, the Inn at Mystic provides tennis on its outdoor court, golf practice on one of two putting greens, swimming or sunbathing at the heated pool, along with hiking, kayaking, canoeing and sailing on the inlet.

For those searching for a bit of New England history, the Mystic Seaport, the world's largest maritime museum, is less than one mile from the Inn. The facility also houses the largest collection of boats and nautical photography in the world and features 17 river-front acres with tall ships, a New England coastal living village, steamboat cruises and daily demonstrations. Two years ago, the craftsmen of Mystic Seaport launched a replica of the slave ship *Amistad*, which they built on-site.

Just a few miles from Mystic is Stonington Borough, the location of numerous historic New England buildings, the Old Lighthouse Museum and the Nathaniel B. Palmer House. Palmer is known in history books as the explorer who discovered Antarctica on Nov. 17, 1820. The land he sighted from his 47-foot sloop "Herc," is now known as Palmer Land on the icy continent.

Seashore Paspalum: A new kind of grass

Seashore paspalum is a warm-season grass and grows naturally in coastal environments. It also grows well in areas that receive heavy rains and low light intensity.

It grows best during warm temperatures and long day conditions. This grass does not produce viable seed and therefore must be planted as sod, plugs, or sprigs. It looks similar in appearance to hybrid bermudagrass, producing a high quality, prostrate and dense turf.

are only 3 varieties available for use in your home lawn.

Sea Isle 1, released by the University of Georgia in 1999, is a dense growing selection from Argentina, which has fine leaves. It has a good tolerance to drought and wear that under moderate fertility rates produces an excellent lawn that can be used in commercial, residential landscapes and even athletic fields.

Salam and ET are two other varieties of seashore paspalum released by private companies.

Mowing

Seashore paspalum used in home lawns should be mowed at 0.75 to 1.5 inches in height. Higher mowing heights will reduce turfgrass density and increase weed problems.

Mower blades should be kept sharp to avoid tearing leaf tissue. Never remove more than 1/3 of the leaf blade at any one time. If the lawn is under stress from drought, shade, nutrient deficiencies, insects, or diseases, it is best to maintain a higher cutting height until the stress situation is over.

Do not mow when the grass is wet or the soil soggy. Grass clippings can be left on the lawn.

Weed Control

Current herbicides are generally not labeled for seashore paspalum. Herbicides that do not injure this grass include pendimethalin, halosulfuron, and mixtures of 2,4-D, dicamba, and MCPP.

Pests and Diseases

When conditions are favorable for their activity, web worms and brown patch can sometimes do some damage to this grass.

Advantages

This grass has an excellent tolerance to saline or recycled water, to the point that it can be watered with seawater. It has a good drought tolerance under proper management and will tolerate low levels of fertility. It will grow in a wide range of soil pH, from a very acid 4 to a highly alkaline 9. It requires little or no pesticide applications and produces minimal quantities of seed-heads.

Disadvantages

This grass produces moderate amounts of thatch during periods of active growth and does not grow well under shade.

Varieties

At the present time, there

Establishment

The best time for establishment of this grass is during periods of most active growth, which occurs when temperatures exceed 70 degrees. Optimal soil pH is 5.5 to 8.0 for best growth.

It is recommended 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1000 square feet be used in two applications during a three to four week period to stimulate growth.

To encourage root development, phosphorous should be applied at rates equal to or greater than the nitrogen.

Potassium needs are also greater during the establishment period. Use a 1:2:3 fertilizer ratio of N:P:K in biweekly applications to provide good fertility levels.
