Suggestions For Farm Are Given By Research Men

(Editor's Note: Information in this column comes from workers of the University of Florida College of Agriculture in Gainesville.)

To rid a dog of fleas, rub kerosene or pyrethrum powder into the hair on his back from head to tail. Washing the dog with a pyrethrum soap, leaving the lather on him for an hour or two, will also kill the fleas.

To keep fleas out of the house, keep the dog outdoors. If fleas do invade a room, close the room tight, sprinkle about five pounds of naphthalene flakes on the floor, and keep the room closed for 48 hours. Fumes from the flakes kill the fleas. If the room or porch cannot be closed tight, spraying a good pyrethrum spray into the floor cracks and corners will kill the fleas.

Lawns that need additional food usually will respond to an application of from five to 15 pounds of cottonseed meal every 1,000 square feet once a month. Heavier fertilization should be applied in late winter.

All the poultry house and nests should be infested with mites, spray thoroughly with a strong disinfectant or with a solution of kerosene and kerosene. Mites on eggs before maturity may be due to fungi that attack them in the rainy season when they begin to roil. The variety of figs for Florida is the Celeste.

Some normally molt in the fall. From eight to 12 weeks through the molting period, that start molting in early summer usually require from six to eight weeks to get back to normal.

Bankers Convene In Jacksonville

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 23—(AP)—Bankers from 10 southeastern states came here Friday night for the seventh annual presidents' conference of the regional chapters of the American Institute of Banking.

Farmers Warned Of Crocalaria Poison

GAINESVILLE, Aug. 23—(Special)—Florida farmers would do well to guard against crocalaria spectabilis poisoning of their animals from now on through this fall, suggests Dr. R. E. Becker, dairy husbandman with the Florida Experiment Station. This particular species of cover crop, widely grown, is poisonous to animals, he says, and they should not be allowed to eat it.

Crocalaria poisoning is especially apt to be noticed after a frost when green vegetation is killed and the animals are seeking something to eat. Dr. Becker says that following the early frosts more animals were lost from this of last year than ever before.

Williams told the Rotary Club today in a further discussion of the proposed St. Johns-Indian River Canal which he revealed that the report of the district engineer has now been completed and is expected to be forwarded to the division engineer in Norfolk, Va. early next month.

President R. W. Spraght announced that there would be no meeting next Monday on account of Labor Day and the usual club meeting was postponed with an exception of the illness of Charles Morrison.

Mr. Williams recalled a report in the St. Johns-Indian River Canal which was prepared in 1934 and 35 which recommended an eight foot channel width of Sanford to the Indian River connecting a short canal and carrying two locks and a dam across the St. Johns for the purpose of turning the waters south of the dam into the Indian River.

The district engineer at that time approved the project but it was turned down by the division engineer on the grounds that "what we called flood control" said Mr. Williams, "he called drainage". The project was approved by the War Relocation Authority board of engineers and a hearing was held in Washington attended by Mr. Williams and Ralph Bagwell from Sanford and a large delegation from Jacksonville.

Opposition, however, developed to the project from interests in South Broward county who held that it might flood their groves, increase the frost danger and otherwise affect their property. The matter was then referred back to the division and district engineers for further study.

At the present time, Mr. Williams said, Col. W. H. West, district engineer in Jacksonville, is said to be in favor of flood control by the upper St. Johns and the lower St. Johns and the latter is being studied for possible development.

Lower Income Tax Exemption Is Proposed

Senate Finance Committee Would Include Additional Six Million People

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—The Senate Finance Committee voted today to broaden the income tax base by lowering exemptions from \$2,000 to \$1,500 for married persons and \$800 to \$750 for single individuals.

The lower exemptions would bring an additional 6,000,000 persons under the income tax structure and would add between \$100,000,000 and \$350,000,000 to federal revenue.

Francis Biddle Nominated For New High Post

Law Freezing Government's Cotton And Wheat Given Veto

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—President Roosevelt today nominated Francis Biddle, solicitor general of the Justice Department, to be attorney general of the United States.

It was expected that Charles Fahy, assistant solicitor general, would become Biddle's successor.

President Roosevelt meanwhile vetoed legislation to freeze government stocks of wheat and cotton, declaring it to be contrary to sound governmental policy and to the long-time best interests of both farmers and consumers.

In a message to the House, Roosevelt said he was convinced that approval of the measure "would seriously and adversely affect the agricultural adjustment program and the attendant policies which have been so beneficial to our farmers during the past few years."

Advocates of the bill had contended the sale of government stocks might depress prices.

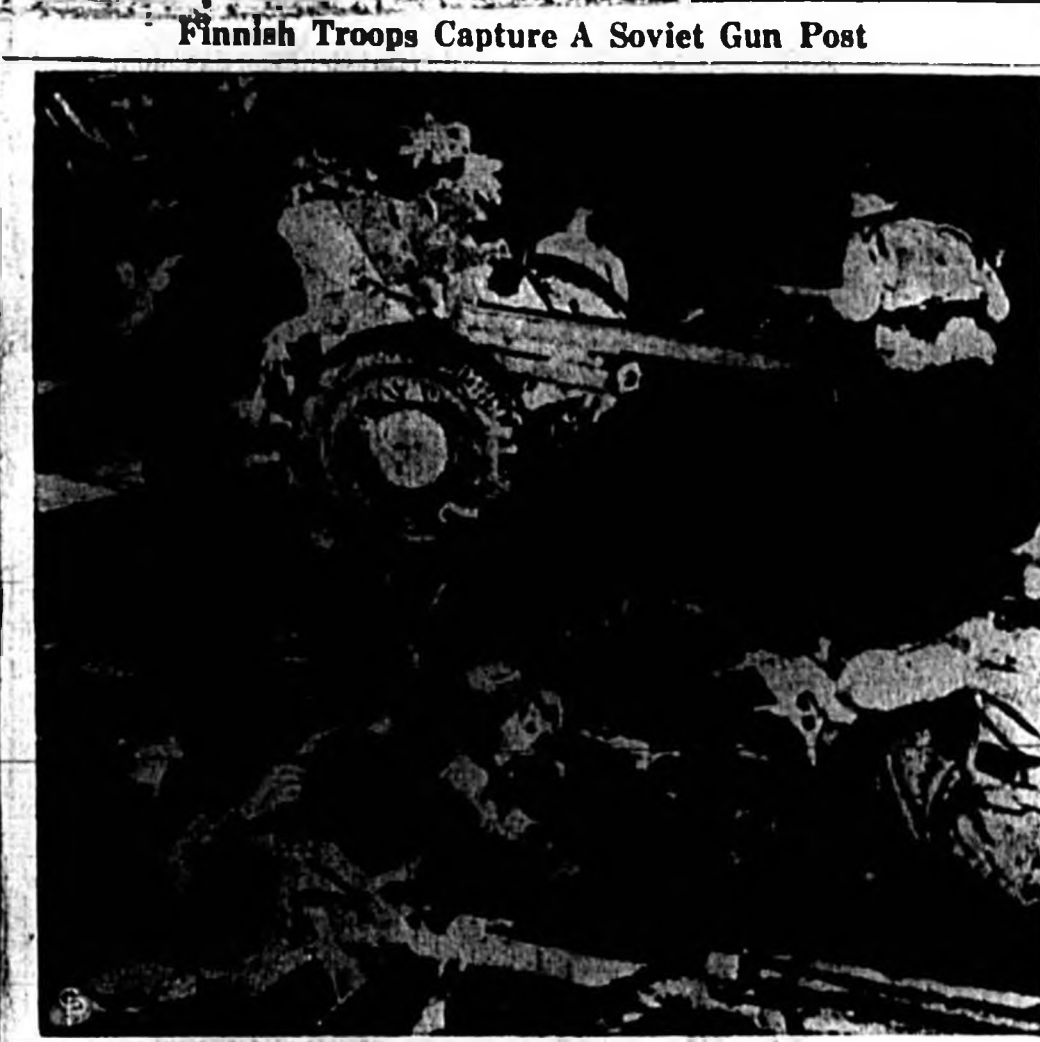

Chamber Election Ballots Will Be Mailed Tuesday

Election Committee To Tabulate Votes On September 2

Ballots for the annual election of officers and directors of the Chamber of Commerce will be mailed to members throughout the county tomorrow, Edward Higgins announced today.

The election committee, which will be appointed soon, will meet Sept. 2 to tabulate the votes.

Each membership of \$3 is entitled to one vote, and those persons or organizations having multiple memberships are allowed a corresponding number of votes, which will be indicated on the ballot, Mr. Higgins explained.

Stressing the importance of the election, the secretary declared: "This organization is the kind that requires an active directorate and the president urges every member to exercise his right in selecting directors who will give their time and attention to the affairs of the Chamber of Commerce."

The President especially makes an appeal to each member to vote. Mr. Higgins added: "Officers to be elected are president, treasurer and 22 directors. The secretary is hired by the officers. W. A. Laffer is president and H. H. Coleman treasurer of the Chamber of Commerce at present."

Directors and members will hold a luncheon meeting at the Valencia Hotel Tuesday at 12:00 o'clock noon for the purpose of reviewing a general report of the secretary's activities and the Chamber's accomplishments during the past two months. Mr. Higgins invited all directors and members to attend the meeting.

Shell Forging Work Ahead Of Schedule

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The War Department reports on Sunday that shell forging operations in the Gadsden Ordnance plant at Gadsden, Ala., had begun five weeks ahead of schedule and that another of the P-40 family of fighters airplanes had been delivered to the Army for tests.

Construction of the \$7,000,000 Gadsden plant, said to be the largest air-conditioned factory built in the world, was begun May 1, 1940. It has been brought to 97 percent completion by a building force of 400 men.

Three buildings have been erected including a 150,000-sq-ft machine shop lighted by three miles of Government lights.

Construction of the P-40 family of fighters airplanes had been delivered to the Army for tests.

Government Will Begin Operating Kearny Shipyard

The United States Navy, represented by Under Secretary of Navy Forrestal and Rear Admiral Harold Bowen, took over the Federal Shipbuilding and Drydock Company last night and announced that work on \$439,000,000 in defense orders at the strike-bound plant will be resumed Tuesday.

Bowen, who was designated by President Roosevelt to operate the plant, announced after conferring with company officials and C.I.O. leaders that first steps in resuming operations will be taken this morning at a meeting of all supervisory shop and yard workers.

"It is expected," he said, "the plant will resume full operation beginning Tuesday morning."

Union officials, who had requested Roosevelt to order the Navy to take over the plant, immediately withdrew pickets from the shipyard entrance.

Immediately after the conference the union leaders left for Jacksonville to attend a mass meeting.

(When asked if naval forces would be sent to the plant, a spokesman at the Brooklyn Navy Yard said "no information" is available. However, he added, "there might be developments" later.)

The presidential seizure order, issued Saturday night, held that the company had refused to accept a peace settlement proposed by the national defense mediation board. Accordingly, Roosevelt said, the seizure was necessary since production of the yards is essential to the defense of the United States.

Rich Oil Field Said Endangered

Nearly 450,000 Red Troops Massed On Iranian Frontier

BERLIN, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The belief that British and Russian troops moved into Iran after getting an approving nod from Washington was expressed in the Berlin press today.

Newspapers held that the United States had so deeply involved in the war that it was certain to have been informed of all plans concerning Iran at the Atlantic meeting of President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill.

The arrival forces of little Iran (Persia) were reported offering resistance today as British and Russian troops simultaneously invaded the Middle East oil kingdom, marching in to enforce demands for the ouster of Nazi agents.

London reported British forces met some opposition from the Iranian army, estimated at about 100,000 men.

British and Russian troops simultaneously invaded Iran today, striking to enforce their demands for the ouster of German agents from the country.

This Moslem kingdom is the site of the world's richest single oil field.

Early reports of the invasion made no mention of fighting. The Iranian forces had withdrawn 12 miles from the Soviet frontier last week to avoid border incidents.

About 150,000 Iranian troops are based on the Iran-Soviet frontier.

London observers said the British were faced with a race against time, asserting that Nazi agents in Iran would attempt to shut a oil pipeline and work the great oil fields.

Hope for a peaceful settlement of Iran's dispute with Britain and Russia over an allied demand for expulsion of German agents was dashed by competent foreign sources here yesterday by a virtually unanimous vote.

Directly in touch with Tehran—the modern capital of the ancient kingdom linked by strategic trade routes with both Europe and Asia—Russia and British India sources said they expected British and possibly Soviet troops to invade within a week.

A Caspian Sea front was thus in prospect.

Long officers, with a defense force totaling about 150,000 men, were said to be anticipating two drives from British-occupied Iraq. One army possibly would move from Baghdad, the capital, 100 miles north along a Mosul oil field railway to the border at Khanaqin, then swing northeast for the 250-mile march across mountains and plateaus to Teheran.

A second drive was expected farther south from Basra, at the head of the Persian Gulf, where a march of 150 miles eastward over the good highways of that region would place the British in a position to intercept all of Iran's southern routes.

Whether the Russians, occupied as they are against the Germans, desire to take part in any military operation against Iran was not known here, but roads from the Caucasus into Persia are wide open and the weather is reported to be excellent.

Defense Plants Have Few Jobs For Women

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Defense industries still offer few jobs to unemployed women, State WPA Administration Wilbur E. Harkness reported Sunday.

"Several thousand skilled male WPA workers have found employment in defense industries," Harkness said "but about the same number of women awaiting WPA assignments still remain. Unless a woman has an outstanding education background or is exceptionally proficient in some craft or skill, the WPA is about her only chance of getting a job," the administrator continued.

Of the 17,548 persons who have been certified for WPA employment and for whom no assignments are available, 6,576 are women.

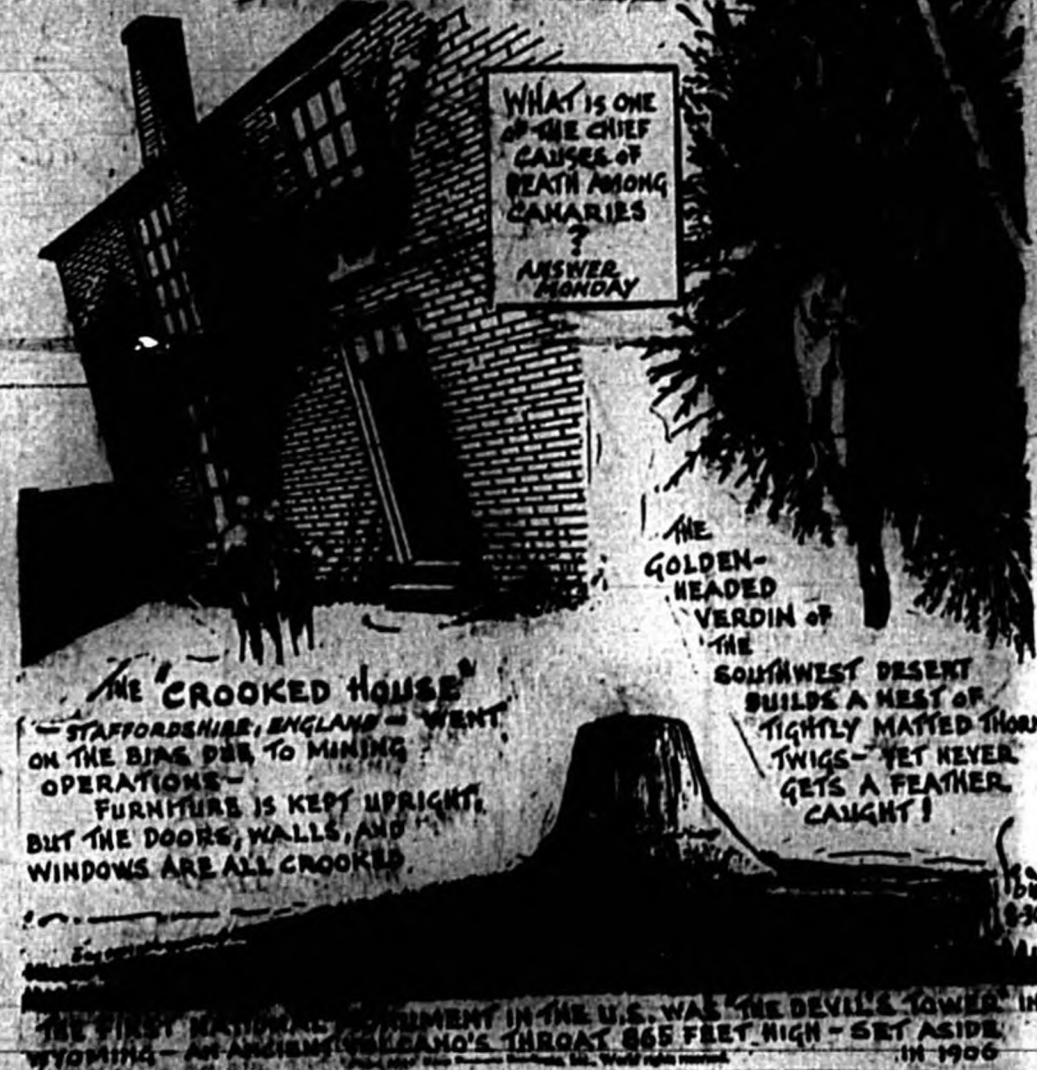
Speedsters Arrested To Conserve Gasoline

More Women Drunks Are Found By FBI

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—A sharp increase during the first half of 1941 in arrests of women for crimes of alcoholism was reported Sunday by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

An analysis of 23,450 arrests of women in 410 cities over 25,000 population showed, the FBI said, arrests of 25 percent over 1940 for drunkenness and 33 percent for drunken driving. Arrests of women for all crimes increased 18 percent.

Arrests of women for criminal offenses increased 17 percent, for assault 28 percent, for burglary 20 percent, and for larceny 23 percent.

Britishers May Run American Vessels

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 25.—(AP)—An executive order which White House officials said Sunday would have the effect of allowing British shippers and crews to run ships operating under jurisdiction of the federal Maritime Commission, has been

issued by President Roosevelt. The order provides for the waiver of compliance with provisions of existing law relating to masters, officers, crew members and passengers of such vessels.
