## Are students making the grade with standardized test scores?

Seminole County students are considered among the best in the state.

Officials are forever showing off standardized test scores to emphasize the high calibre of students.

Yet the CTBS (California Test of Basic Skills) test scores, when looked at over the course of a five year period, show a decline at many of the schools.

For the most part, those schools which showed an increase in the scores, showed only a small rise, while those whose scores dropped showed a much more dramatic decline.

There were some exceptions, however.

On a scale of 100 points. For example, second grade reading scores at Goldsboro Elementary School rose from a low of 18 in 1995 to a high of 33 in 1996, but dropped to 28 last year.

Second grade math totals dropped from a high of 78 in 1995 to a low of 27 in 1996. They rose to a 30 during the last school year.

Fourth grade reading scores at Spring Lake Elementary School have roller coastered from a high of 61 in 1993 to a low of 46 this year.

## Sanford syndics stunned by sex club in full swing

At the same time he was castigating efforts to relocate any adult entertainment or sexually oriented businesses in the Sanford area, Mayor Larry Dale was jolted Friday by the details of the activity at a private swinger's club that thrives 7 miles from City Hall.

Midway Commerce Center, which is headquarters for the Central Florida Chapter of the Paralyzed Veterans of America and Florida District of Kiwanis International, and a number of commercial businesses, is also the site of a sex club known as Deane's Warehouse.

Lt. Sammy Gibson of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office told the *Sanford Herald* Friday that the CCB (City County Investigative Bureau) infiltrated Deane's Lodge Inc. at 5461 Bryant Ave. in November 1996.

Gibson said an undercover officer went to the place, paid the club dues and was assigned a membership number. The CCB and State Beverage Department of Florida quickly cited Deane's for alcohol violations.

In addition, Gibson said that the CCB officer discovered club members engaged in group sex on mattresses inside various rooms at the place. It was all by consenting adults, he said. We found no evidence of prostitution.

Gibson said that no arrests were made by the CCB. The activity was the same as what people are allowed to do in a

private home, he said.

In advertisements in swinger's club magazines, Deane's Warehouse is described as a place where intimacy and

discretion go together. Its features included "intimate conversation rooms," "imagination rooms," and Locker Room area with showers. 5,000 square feet specifically designed for YOL and the Lifestyle.

The club is open from 8:30 p.m. to 2 a.m. on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday, and apparently is very popular with a score of Florida residents and tourists who have heard about the place in magazines circulated world wide.

Nevertheless, until a week ago when the Board of Seminole County Commissioners began their court battle with a couple of nude bars that opened illegally in recent months, few if anyone at Midway Commerce Center knew exactly what was going on at 5461 Bryant Ave. behind a door marked Deane's Lodge Inc.

We were stunned, said John Paskowski, president of the Midway Commerce Center Property Owners Association.

There was a simple sign out front, Paskowski said. Since most of the other businesses closed at 5 or 6 p.m., few knew what happened at night. Whoever ran the club parked a motorcycle out front. That's about all we knew.

Paskowski and others from Midway Commerce Center went before the BCC on Tuesday to fight against the place being rezoned as a possible site for adult entertainment purposes. Also under consideration is an area immediately east of the See Sex, Page 5A

## Regaining custody of teen has been a frustrating effort

It has been 203 days since Dino and Tammy Vespucci lost custody of their daughter to Barbara Ross. Ross is the mother of the man who is now on probation for battering the Vespucci girl last August during a successful abduction from her place of employment.

At Wednesday's court hearing at the Juvenile Justice Center, Assistant State Attorney Laura Bosco objected again to Judge Gene Stephenson's placement of the girl in Ross's home. Bosco reminded the judge that there are procedures for custody changes and parents cannot be denied their custody rights.

You are telling me that I do not have the jurisdiction to

make this decision and I disagree," replied Stephenson.

"These parents don't have a clue as to what they need to do to get custody of their child back," said Bosco.

Stephenson said he would consider her objection but didn't mention it when, at the end of the hearing, he ruled to leave the girl in the Ross home until the next review hearing in 90 days.

After the hearing Bosco said, "This isn't a dependency proceeding. We are dealing solely with a delinquency proceeding that does not envision this type of change of custody occurring."

According to Bosco a dependency or custody proceeding is usually brought by the See Custody, Page 8A

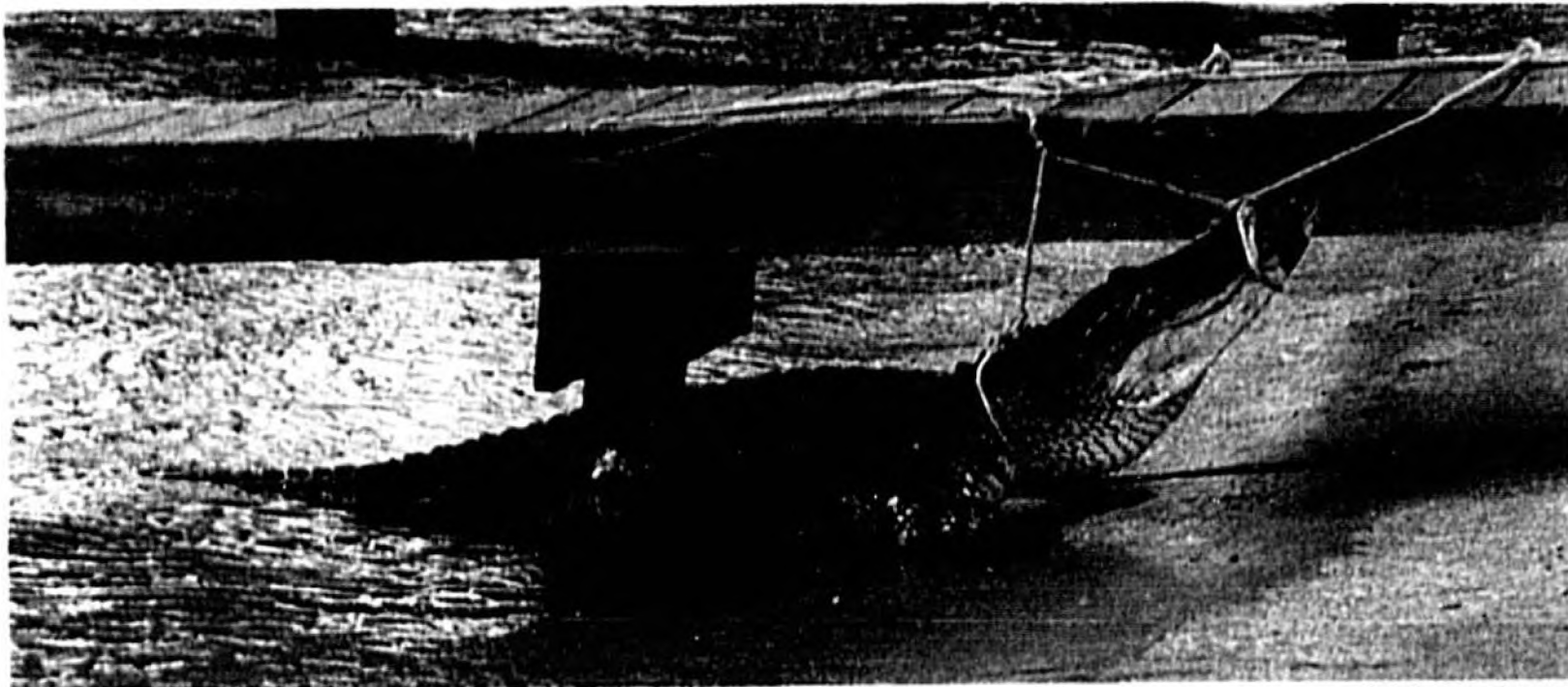

Old age is not for sissies! This is the adage Jean Williams carries around in her car as she delivers meals on her Meals on Wheels route.

A senior citizen herself, she has been a volunteer for the Better Living for Seniors program for a couple of years now.

The route takes 1-1/2 hours a day, and Williams donates her time one day a week.

"This is very satisfying," Williams says in describing her Meals on Wheels job. The Altamonte Springs resident is retired from a career in medical records, and from raising two children, a daughter and a son, as a single parent. She still works part-time for a doctor's office, bowls once a week and is "consistently on the go" with friends and church activities.

Williams usually arrives at the Better Living for Seniors facility on Sand Pond Road in Lake Mary around 11 a.m., checks in and checks her meals, which are delivered daily from a contract provider. Then she's off, checking up See Meals, Page 5A

## Remembering Dad's advice

SANFORD - President Clinton said that being a father is the toughest job on earth. He's right. It's hard work. Being a good father requires wisdom, patience and sacrifice.

And while the rewards are well worth the effort, we would still like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to all the hard working dads who get up each day and provide their children with patience, love and guidance.

Fathers often hold the title of counselor or advisor. From the beginning of time, dads have played a special part in teaching their children right from wrong and instilling in them the moral framework that will help them make good choices throughout their lives.

We asked several local citizens who are active in the community the following question. "What is the best advice your father ever gave you?" This is what they had to say.

"My dad taught me always to be honest," said Mayor Larry Dale. "He said be honest, tell the truth and do the right thing. He also told me that if I got in trouble, I should just admit what I had done."

Mayor Dale's father, Harold, died in 1990. Dale has five daughters of his own.

Mother Blanch Weaver, who runs the Rescue Outreach Mission on 13th Street, said her dad taught her that you have to work for an honest living.

"He also taught me to think before I speak, to make the right decision and then stick by it," she said.

Not everyone is fortunate enough to have a caring father around to provide such guidance. Connie Fishbaugh, the host of *Town Talk*, a talk show broadcast on WAMT 1060 AM, said her father was not a strong influence on her early life. She characterized their

relationship as "long distance."

Her grandfather and two of her uncles provided some guidance, but she described them as, "intolerant, religious bigots," who taught her to condemn others based on their lifestyles and beliefs. For many years she said, she followed their teachings. Then as she matured, she grew to be more tolerant of people's differences. If she had one wish concerning her upbringing, it would be to have had a more tolerant male role model.

Corporal Rick Poovey, of the Sanford Police Department, said the most important lesson his dad taught him was to respect his elders, especially his teachers.

"My dad didn't give out a lot of advice," said Mrs. Chanter, Vice Principal of Pine Crest Elementary School. Sometimes he would repeat the old adage of early to bed, early to rise making you wealthy and wise, but mostly he taught by example. He was honest and hard working. I learned by watching him."

Rev. A. G. McInnis gave the invocation at the Baccalaureate service on June 8 and Rev. H. L. Zimmerman read the scripture. Rev. L. R. Rushton preached the sermon and benediction was pronounced by Rev. W. P. Brooks, Jr. There was also congregational hymns and special music.

Graduation was held on June 9 at 8:15 pm in the SHS auditorium. The evening began with the invocation given by Rev. T. R. Horton. Visitors can access information about growth and development in the county, including facts about population and construction.

## Keep ads out

This past Tuesday, the Seminole County School Board considered a proposal to award a contract for advertising in the schools.

What?!

Yes, advertising. Joe Camel, the Budweiser frogs, \$125 tennis shoes worn by some sports icon. Officials will tell you we are exaggerating, that no way would Joe Camel EVER make it to a poster plastered in the hallways at our high schools.

Buy why should ANY advertising make it to the school halls? Is the district so hard up for money that it is now considering a contract with a company that has "no customers and no track record?" Board member Larry Furlong was correct to postpone the deal, claiming we could be "giving away the farm" to an unproven contractor. The board intends to bring the issue back after additional research.

We strongly believe in a business-school partnership: students learn a sense of the real world when business leaders offer their expertise while speaking to classes, when apprenticeships can be offered and when students can learn technical and business communication skills they can take beyond high school.

Advertising is the heartbeat of most business, a conduit for supply and demand.

But we doubt the value of it posted on our school walls. Don't parents get enough of children's demands for those \$125 sneakers, as seen on television?

Should young girls be daydreaming in class, staring at a poster, wishing they looked like Kate Moss in a Calvin Klein ad? Do overweight students who need to cut fat and cholesterol, really need to be induced to "eat more pork" or "eat beef, for real people"?

We think students have enough to consider while in school without being bombarded by advertising for those expensive sneakers. Scrap the plan. Just do it.

# System failure, abandon ship!

It's becoming more difficult with each passing day not to see the socialistic mess we're in. We have completely undermined the purpose of public service by creating programs that are ineffective and filled with fraud and waste. This includes every aspect of public service.

The problem is that I, and others, are not against programs that serve the public need.

The problem is that there are so many and, most importantly, they are operated very poorly. **SYSTEM FAILURE.**

When I refer to public service I am referring to programs supported by tax revenues.

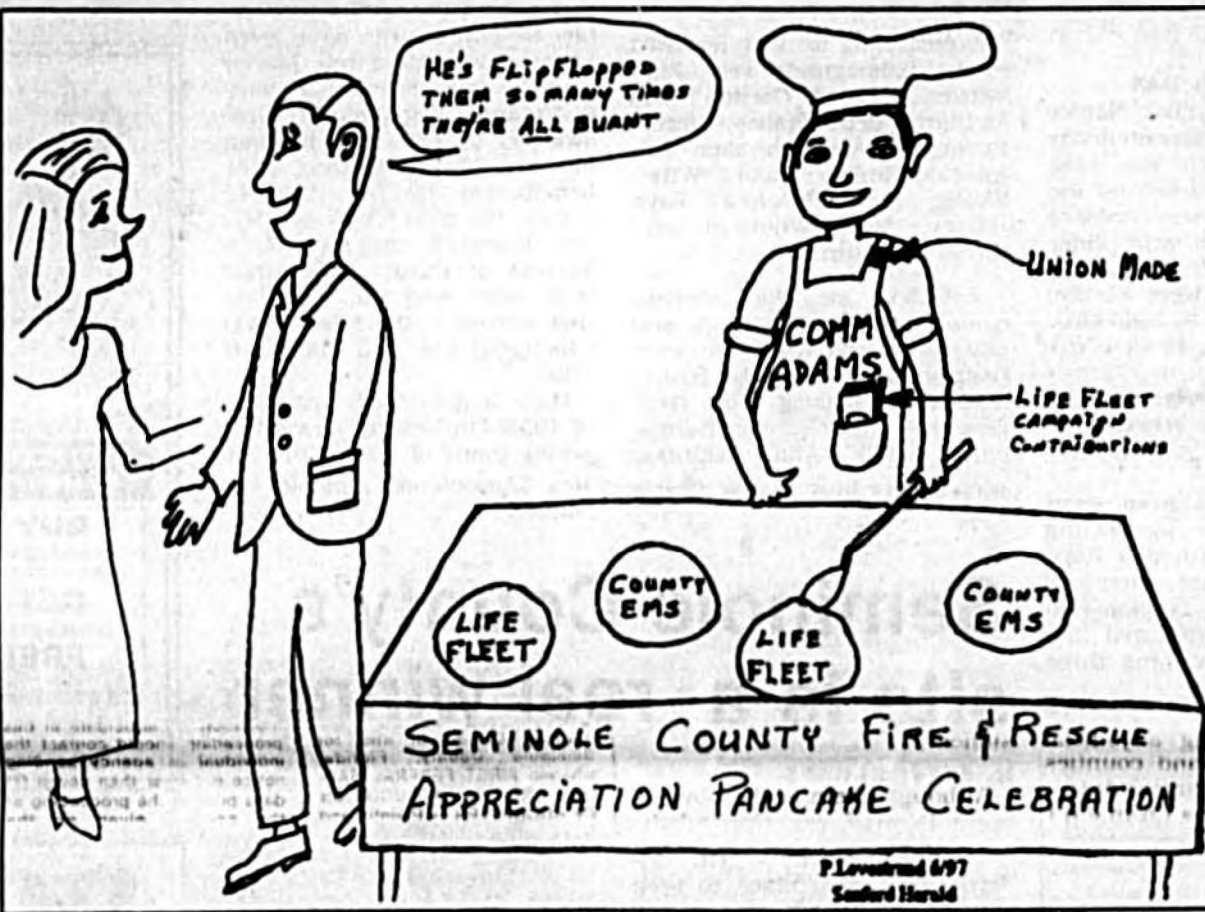

## Pet peeves

This column should have been sub-titled "Further Problems of the Disabled". It's just a collection of thoughts on some of the trials and tribulations the disabled person goes through every day in a non-disabled world.

**• Finding a Dressing Room** - If you have ever gone into a store for this purpose, you know how difficult this can be. This can be even more stressful if you are physically disabled and had to find a dressing room with a chair or seat. Suppose you were lucky enough to find a store with a specially marked "Handicapped" dressing room. You wait and wait in the back of a long line of able bodied people. When the person finally comes out, you discover that they are not disabled. You then tell the manager, who tells you that when the store gets busy they sometimes have to open up the room to everyone. As you can tell, this has happened to me.

**• Reading Average or Small Type** - It can be frustrating enough to a sight impaired person when every magazine, newspaper or book is printed in much too small type. To add insult to injury, if you are in the business world, it's extremely impossible to find business materials big enough to read. Sure there are magnifying glasses and equipment, but sometimes all it takes is to print something, say a memo, report, etc., in a little bit bigger type.

**• Un-Kindness of Strangers** - Taking the business metaphor even further, I was talking to an engineering type planner a few years ago who planned the construction of new buildings for a major corporation. When the person proceeded to tell me how unfair it was that his company (actually the company he worked for) had to construct special handicap parking spaces in their parking lot because of the A.D.A., as he put it "We only get a few disabled people in here a day. Why should we spend all of this money for just a few people?"

**• Handicapped Parking** - This is actually the best one of all. Nothing ticks me off more than to see a non-disabled person drive into a Handicap Parking space. Sure enough, if you've ever noticed this, you will notice a disabled person who had to park far away from their destination.

Now all of the above topics may not mean much to you, but to a See Tizzio, Page 5A

## What do you expect from your schools?

What do you expect from your schools? What do you expect from the person who is responsible for your schools--the Superintendent? If you are like most people, you rarely think about those questions. The only time you ask questions in a larger sense is on that rare occasion when the topic is universal--like re-zoning or busing. Other than those times, the public usually doesn't get involved in actively questioning those who run their schools until election time--and then it's Board Members, not superintendents.

The question is--should you be questioning the school system now?

There are two important items in the news this month. One is the Board's evaluation of the Superintendent and his contract negotiations. The other is the release of the CTBS scores for each school. First, some background. These are the high and low scores in each area and grade tested. They are the school's average measured against the national median score of 50.

Of the 136 grades and subjects tested, Seminole County scores went down in 66 areas, remained the same in 5 and went up in 65--that's pretty much average. Some went up and some went down--nothing outstanding about that. If you look at other statistics, you will find the following:

schools. To look at the CTBS scores, there is no question that there are some schools whose test scores indicate that they are outstanding. In 2nd grade, Partin would seem to have the best class in the county. In 4th grade the honors go to Woodlands and Sabal Point. In the 8th grade, Rock Lake is far and away the best scoring school in both reading and math. These are outstanding schools. They have consistently been high scoring schools for the last 5 years--so there's nothing new about that either.

The lowest scoring schools are Hamilton in the 2nd grade, Goldsboro in the 4th grade and Sanford Middle in the 8th grade. They too, have been the low scoring schools for many of the past 5 years--again, there's nothing new here either. That's the best and the worst. Now look at some schools at risk. The criteria used to identify these schools, measured only by their performance on the CTBS scores, is that they have scores below the national or the local median, have continued records of low scores or who have declining test scores. These schools would include Altamonte, Casselberry, English Estates, Geneva, Goldsboro, Hamilton, Highlands, Midway, Pine Crest, and Sterling Park in the 2nd grade. In the 4th grade, schools in trouble include Altamonte, Goldsboro, Hamilton, Heathrow, Highlands, Lake Orienta, Longwood, Midway, Pine Crest, Spring Lake, and Wilson. Low scoring schools in the 8th grade include Lakeview, Sanford Middle, South Seminole, and Tuskawilla.

What's the point of all this? It's simple. The test scores recently publicized cover a period of years which matches the length of time the current Superintendent has held his office. If your school is on the list of schools at risk--do you expect the Superintendent to see those trends and do something about it? Are you happy with the management of the schools if your school has the same low scores year after year? Is there accountability in the schools to the Office of the Superintendent? Is there accountability in the office of the

Superintendent to you and your child?

What has happened at your school in the last 5 years? Have there been new programs? Have programs instituted at your school made a change or just been ineffective, half-hearted efforts? Has the staff been added to, reduced or changed? Has there been a reduction in class sizes? Has your child told you about a difference in the classroom over the past few years? Or has there just been a maintenance of the status quo? In some states, where schools have repeatedly failed to educate children, the State has removed every staff member, down to the janitors, and replaced them with new staff members. This is a most draconian method of getting the attention of both the entire school system staff as well as the parents and children who live in the neighborhood and attend the school. Are the problems in your school being dealt with until they are solved, or are they re-occurring every year--year after year? Is the only thing that changes in your school the parents and children as they move through the system?

The forthcoming Consent Decree changes in the Sanford area are happening because numerous superintendents have failed to break the mold of poor performing schools over the past 27 years. The Justice Department recognizes that the same schools who are failing to educate children now are the same ones who didn't educate children in 1970. The main thing that will happen under this plan is that the school population is going to be scrambled like an omelet. Schools who have a long history of failing to educate children because of a lack of resources or concern by the administration of the school system, or because of the lack of leadership in identifying the cause and correcting it, will be mixed with higher performing schools and test scores will be blended. The test scores will no longer be identifiable as long standing patterns and therefore, you will not be able to hold the system accountable. If you take 50% of Hamilton and put them in Partin--the Partin scores will go down and the Hamilton scores will go up. Will everyone now test at 50%, or will you still have the same kids getting the same scores--some at 17 and some at 83? The average is 50, but the shape of the Bell curve is flatter than a pancake.

So now let's revisit the questions asked at the beginning of this column. What do you expect from the school system and your School Superintendent? Is maintaining the status quo for five years good enough for a pay raise? If performance based pay is to become the norm for teachers this year, and installed as the policy for administrators next year--what do you suggest is appropriate for the Superintendent? Are test scores enough to judge him by? Should more emphasis be

on the clients who receive one hot meal a day and cold breakfast items.

"All of my people are just dolls," she says. Williams greets each client with genuine concern, and follows up on conversations and questions that were asked of her the week before.

"They're our daily contact with our clients," says Jackey Jacobahagen, program services coordinator for BLS. There are 23 Meals on Wheels routes throughout the county and some 330 volunteers deliver the meals. On Williams' route, which is seven stops with eight people total, the clients are seen by a different volunteer each day. Most of the volunteers are individuals, but three area corporations also provide volunteers for the program. These companies are AAA, Sprint and Briar Corporation, with AAA being the largest, with a list of 60 people who donate their time.

While this might seem like a lot of help, Jacobahagen is always in need of more volunteers, especially in the form of substitute drivers for routes in Sanford and Casselberry. The only requirement for volunteers is that they own their own transportation, have proof of insurance and a Florida driver's license. Volunteers receive on the job training.

Meals on Wheels is just one of several programs available through BLS, whose mission is "to provide nutritional assistance and other supportive services to older adult residents of Seminole County which help them to live independently."

Better Living for Seniors began with a Meals on Wheels and a transportation program, in 1973. BLS programs are funded by grants from local and federal governments, the United Way, civic organizations, businesses, foundations, client contributions and individual donations.

Meals on Wheels is offered to homebound persons 60 years or older or to disabled individuals. A case manager assesses the needs of the client, which may also include other BLS programs. Depending on the client's financial situation, there is a small fee for the Meals on Wheels service.

Other BLS services include transportation, congregate meal sites, homemaking, legal services, health and wellness, Emergency Alert Response and the HOME program.

HOME stands for "Help your senior neighbors remain safe in their homes; Organize a volunteer group to repair a home; Make a difference in the life of a senior; Energy and endurance provided by you will make a difference." The program is headed up by Kathy Phillips, who was on the site of the

"Senior Independence Week" project last week. Phillips says The HOME program has two focuses: weatherization and repair. BLS received a grant from the Florida Fix program, to help weatherize the homes of older adults, keeping down the costs of heating and cooling, so that the resident can afford to stay in his or her home. The grant was for \$35,000, which must be spent on work on 20 homes. Because the grant is a matching grant, "it's important for us to use volunteers" for as much of the labor as possible, says Phillips. During "Senior Independence Week," volunteers from RSVP worked on the homes of several BLS clients, doing drywall, installing ceiling fans and insulation on a hot water heater, building a wheelchair ramp and scraping and painting a home.

As with Meals on Wheels, clients must qualify for the assistance and Phillips says the parameters are set so that "borderline" homes are made safe and weatherized. She said that in some cases, they must bypass the worst, referring these homes to other agencies for more help than BLS can provide.

The HOME program began in August of last year and Phillips says they have worked on close to 30 homes, with miscellaneous repairs. They have completed 18 of the 20 homes under the Florida Fix grant and have a waiting list of 20 clients whose homes needs moderate rehabilitation.

One of the RSVP (RSVP stands for Retired Senior Volunteer Program) volunteers who worked on the "Senior Independence Week" program was Dave Blackwell. Blackwell says that he volunteers "whenever (RSVP) calls and when my schedule can accommodate." Blackwell is also a Meals on Wheels driver and gives some assistance to Habitat For Humanity. "Those three keep me busy," he says, but adds that he always finds time for a few rounds of golf, to work around his own home, and to travel. His wife is also an RSVP and Habitat volunteer.

Why do they donate their time? Blackwell and Williams have good answers. Blackwell, who climbed a ladder and scraped paint on a client's home, says "because I have the ability." For Williams, it is the "hands on" aspect of helping and it is her way of giving back. Williams says she is thankful for the help she has received in her life and as a volunteer "I give, through the community, back to God."

Orlando/Sanford Airport.

"Neither site is acceptable," said Daryl McLain, the Seminole County commissioner from District 5 and whose family has lived in the Sanford area since 1906.

"I don't like it," McLain said. "I am vehemently opposed to adult entertainment of any kind in the community. I support Mayor Dale 100 percent in this issue. I was stunned to learn about Deanie's Warehouse. I

have a hard time believing this could happen or will ever happen in this community."

The BCC may have no other choice but to approve one of the two sites the county's Planning and Development Department proposed to have rezoned for the purpose of meeting a judicial decree that cities and counties "reasonably accommodate" adult entertainment establishments.

Deputy County Attorney Lonnie Groot said Friday that "there are not enough hours in the day" for him to address the complexities of drawing up the county's new ordinances on adult entertainment and public nudity.

When he arrived at his office Friday, County Commission

Chairman Randy Morris discovered a dozen angry messages from those who oppose the restrictions on public nudity.

"These callers were irate, hostile, incensed," said Diane Merkt, an aide to the commissioner.

Although there is the obvious opposition from the adult-entertainment industry and patrons of the existing clubs, most citizens support the county leaders who want to toughen the rules.

"We're supposed to find a somewhere to put these businesses but no one had any idea of where that somewhere should be," Groot said. Attempts are being made to rid the Fern Park-Casselberry area along 17-92 of the existing clubs - relocating them somewhere less obtrusive. McLain suggested an area near Oviedo, whose residents immediately objected.

Ultimately, county staff made the two choices - both in the Sanford area.

"It appears likely that one or both of the (Sanford) locations probably will be selected," Chairman Morris said, dejectedly. The BCC makes its decision on June 24 at a 7 p.m. public meeting that may last until eternity.

Said Sanford Mayor Dale, "If they have to come to Sanford, I'd rather turn over my ranch than the other places."

John Brocco, one of the Paralyzed Veterans whose office is at Midway Commerce Center, begged the commissioners and county leaders at Tuesday's hearing to do what they could to keep away all sex clubs.

"Please," Brocco said, "We've been forgotten before. Do not forget us again."

# Megastores are coming to town

Seminole County is quickly becoming the hub of some of the most widely recognized megastores in the country. During the summer, a car store, a book and music store, and a home decorating store, will open shop bringing into the county jobs, added revenue and a wide selection of products for the consumer.

The first of the giants, AutoNation USA, located off I-4 and across from Seminole Towne Center, is almost complete and will be open for business in early August, according to company spokesman Mark Cannon.

AutoNation USA is similar in concept to a number of used car superstores which have been appearing in metropolitan areas around the country in the past few years.

A typical facility features a 24,000 square-foot showroom, a 26,000 square-foot automotive service center with 24 bays, an autocode where customers may browse through inventory by computer, a 1,200 square-foot child play center, an accessory shop and a restaurant. The lot inventory is typically 1,000 used cars and trucks. Cars are listed at a no-haggle price and every vehicle comes with a comprehensive warranty and a 7-day 300-mile money-back guarantee. Free 24-hour roadside service is offered for one year. In addition, sales people are salaried and do not work on commission.

Based in Florida, the company was founded in 1995 and has 13 stores in Michigan, Texas, and Arizona with projected store openings of 25 by the end of the year.

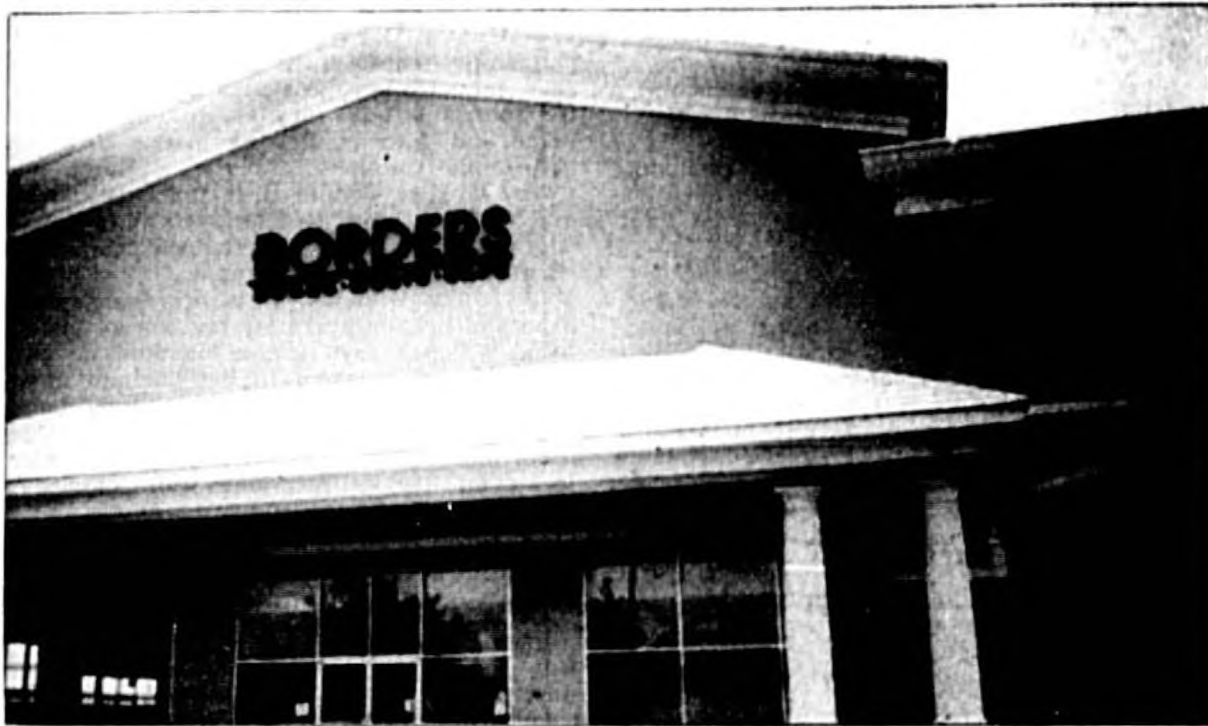
The Sanford location, on 29 acres and with more than 61,000 square feet of improvements, including inventory, cost the company close to \$18 million. The facility, Cannon said, will provide jobs for about 125 people, and hiring is currently underway. Payroll is projected to be in excess of \$3 million. Those interested should call 1-800-AUTOUSA.

Borders, a combination bookstore, music store and cafe, is scheduled to open July 5 in Altamonte Springs at 880 West State Road 436. The 25,000 square-foot store will contain more than 200,000 books, music, periodical and video titles, as well as a Cafe Espresso.

The literary megastore, which has been compared to a library for its diverse selection of titles,

Established in 1971 in Ann Arbor, Mich., Borders offers listening stations, where customers can preview compact discs and cassettes, and a computerized book and title search system with capabilities extending around the world.

Borders will host special in-store events beginning with grand opening festivities planned for July 18-20, including book signings, book discussion groups, poetry workshops, author lectures, and children's

events. Attached to the Borders building will be HomePlace, a 55,000 square-foot home furnishings superstore featuring housewares and home textiles.

Scheduled to open July 18, the Ohio-based fashion retailer currently operates 77 stores in 24 of the county's top 50 metropolitan markets. HomePlace also has a store in Sanford in the Gateway Plaza which opened earlier this year.

As part of the store's grand opening, television personality Curtis Aikens, food expert on *Good Morning America*, host of

*Food in a Flash, Meals Without Meat, and From My Garden*, will offer a produce demonstration July 18, 19 from noon to 4 p.m., July 20 from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Enhanced home fashion categories include a bath and body shop area, specialty foods and gourmet gifts, a children's department with bedding, bath merchandise and toys. There will also be a department dedicated to environmentally safe products for the home.

HomePlace will hire up 100 people and is currently conducting on-site interviews, company officials said.

# Corporate genius begins at home

It's an appropriate theme for Seminole County's first Home-Based Business Expo to be held Friday, June 20, in Altamonte Springs at the Eastmonte Civic Center.

Presented by Bobby Thomas of B & B Enterprises, an event planning specialist, of Casselberry, the event will feature seminar speakers from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. with the exhibits open from noon until 6 p.m. Admission is free. Speakers will represent the University of Central Florida's Small Business Development Center, Central Florida's most popular web site, Orlando Online, Sprint Communications and the State of Florida's Department of Revenue.

According to Thomas about 40 percent of the 40 exhibitors are from the newly-formed National HomeBased Business Chamber of Commerce and he is expecting 300 to 400 attendees.

"Entrepreneurs and those who have been downsized come to these events to see what type of niches home-based businesses are filling and for information on how to start their own home-based business," said Thomas.

A member of the chamber for three months, Thomas recently spoke to the group on how to use trade shows as a way to increase business. Besides an opportunity to get business from other members, Thomas said, the chamber is a network of other home-based business owners who understand your growing pains and problems. It also gives you a vehicle to establish not only a little credibility, but to get some leads as well.

Andrea Tolbert of Sanford agrees.

"It has really helped me to have a sounding board as far as ideas and advice on how to handle certain business situations," she said. "At the round table meetings, you can bring up any topic and get four or five different helpful viewpoints."

Tolbert owns Coral Designs and sells advertising specialties. She said that although she wanted to join a local chamber as a home-based business she just could not justify the large fees required by local chambers for membership. She now gets most all the same benefits with the NHBCC.

Sanford resident and home-based business owner Colleen Olsen of Foll Print and Graphics Inc. said she has gotten quite a number of jobs from chamber members.

"It didn't happen right away," said Olsen who has been a chamber member since February. "As you attend the meetings and people begin to know you, they will begin doing business with you. People who just have their name on a list without attending don't know what they are missing."

"The chamber gives me the opportunity to get out of the house," said John Flacable, an independent insurance agent, who co-founded the chamber with Lorraine Powell. "Sometimes as a home-based business you find you are hanging around the house too much and you are not out making the business contacts that you have to make."

Powell, who met Flacable at one of the local city chamber meetings, said like any organization, they have experienced growing pains.

"We have to crawl before we

can walk and before we can run," said Powell of Orlando who sells a pre-paid legal service. While the group started with only five members there are now more than 50 and most all came by word of mouth.

"Lorraine and I were thinking about starting a networking group," said Flacable of Altamonte Springs, "but we didn't want to impose the restrictions, such as attendance or bringing leads, that those groups require. We just wanted to allow people to enjoy meeting and socializing together without pressure and at an affordable price."

The group which charges an annual fee of \$35 is well below the \$200 range of most chambers. It meets in Seminole County every Thursday at 8 a.m. at the Patio Grill on Highway 434 in Longwood. The

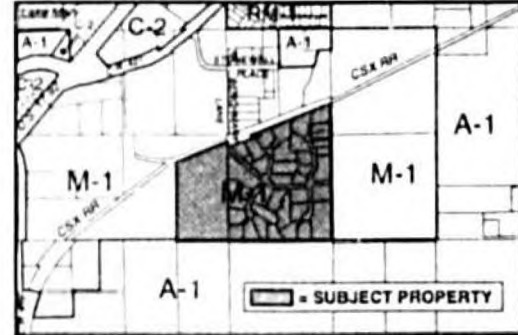

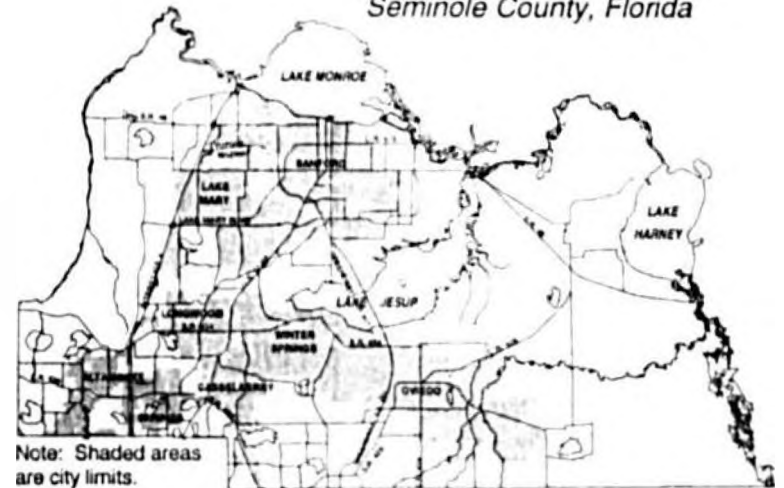

Department of Children and Families (formerly HRS) when it has been alleged that a child has been abandoned, abused or neglected. When the child is removed and placed in a shelter or in the custody of another person, there are due process rights afforded to the parents which include consulting with an attorney and a speedy hearing -- usually within 21 days. These cases are usually brought before the dependency judge, Judge Newman Brock.

In the Vespucci case, abuse charges were investigated and reported to be unfounded by the Department of Children and Families, but Stephenson chose to ignore the findings. Instead he chose to believe the report of Dr. Stephen Jordan, a psychologist in Orange County that suggested (but could not document) that the girl's behavior was "characteristic of other children who have been exposed to extreme physical and emotional abuse at home."

There was no mention in the report of the emotional trauma to the girl, inflicted by Ross's son, Robert Reynolds, who abducted the girl in front of several witnesses who said he threatened to kill the girl and her family. Nor was there any mention of the emotional upheaval caused by the girl's pregnancy by Reynolds and abortion at age 15. Nor any mention of the coercion by Ross that the girl have the abortion. The girl had previously come to school crying and stated to her school counselor that Reynolds' mother, Ross, "was forcing her to have the abortion." The Vespuccis were unaware of either the pregnancy or abortion until after the events.

Since the abuse charges against the Vespuccis were unfounded, the case never went to Judge Brock. Charges against Reynolds, however, were founded and he pleaded "no contest" to charges of battery against the girl and is now serving one year of probation as well as taking anger management classes. The 20-year-old man is also facing a charge of lewdness against the girl for engaging in sexual relations with her when she was under age 16.

In an earlier interview, Reynolds told the *Sanford Herald* that he and the girl were engaged, and would marry when the court proceedings end. He said the girl's parents at one time approved of her relationship with him and began causing problems for him only after deciding they did not want him dating her. "We love each other and they're jealous," he said.

The girl should be placed in a neutral setting, said Bosco. The Ross home is not neutral. The Vespuccis have successfully pressed criminal charges against Ross's son and according to a Seminole County deputy, Ross and Reynolds have reported false abuse charges against the Vespuccis. With Stephenson ignoring the unfounded abuse findings and with no money for an attorney, the Vespuccis, a working class family with five children, have no way to get their child back.

The Vespuccis don't agree with Dr. Jordan's findings and had wondered why their family had to traipse all the way down to Orange County for a psychological evaluation when all the legal proceeding are in

Seminole County.

"Aren't there any psychologists in Seminole County or is this the one who just gives the Guardian Ad Litem the evaluations they want?" said Dino Vespucci.

According to Bosco, "Jordan is the hired gun for the Guardian Ad Litem program" and these abuse allegations should be answered.

"If these parents are being accused of child abuse, they should have a right to have somebody prove the allegations against them with witnesses," said Bosco. Bosco also told the judge during the hearing that she was not getting copies of court documents on time. Jordan's report was received at the courthouse on May 27, a full 16 days before the hearing and the Guardian Ad Litem report was submitted to the court on June 9, three days before the hearing.

"I got copies of these reports minutes after the hearing

started today," said Bosco.

The Guardian Ad Litem's report written by Norma Ragdale concurred with Jordan's recommendation the girl remain in the custody of Ross until the age of 18. Jordan's May 23 report stated the girl, who has recently turned 17, has the emotional maturity equal to that of a 14- or 15-year-old. He recommends the girl have limited direct contact with her boyfriend, Reynolds.

Judge Stephenson ruled that the girl can communicate with the man by phone or letter, but no direct contact.

"You may be somewhat emotionally immature and that tells me that your perception of who you may be in love with, whether or not it's a real love, may not exactly ring true, may not be accurate," said Stephenson to the girl during the hearing.

Mr. Vespucci was not happy with the judge's decision to allow his daughter's contact with

Reynolds. He asked the judge if he remembered that Reynolds was on probation for battery against his daughter.

"Yes, Mr. Vespucci," the judge said in an exasperated tone. "You have reminded me of that every time. Yes, I remember that."

"He remembers, but he ignores the facts," said Vespucci after the court hearing. "He says he is helping us, but he denies us our rights as parents."

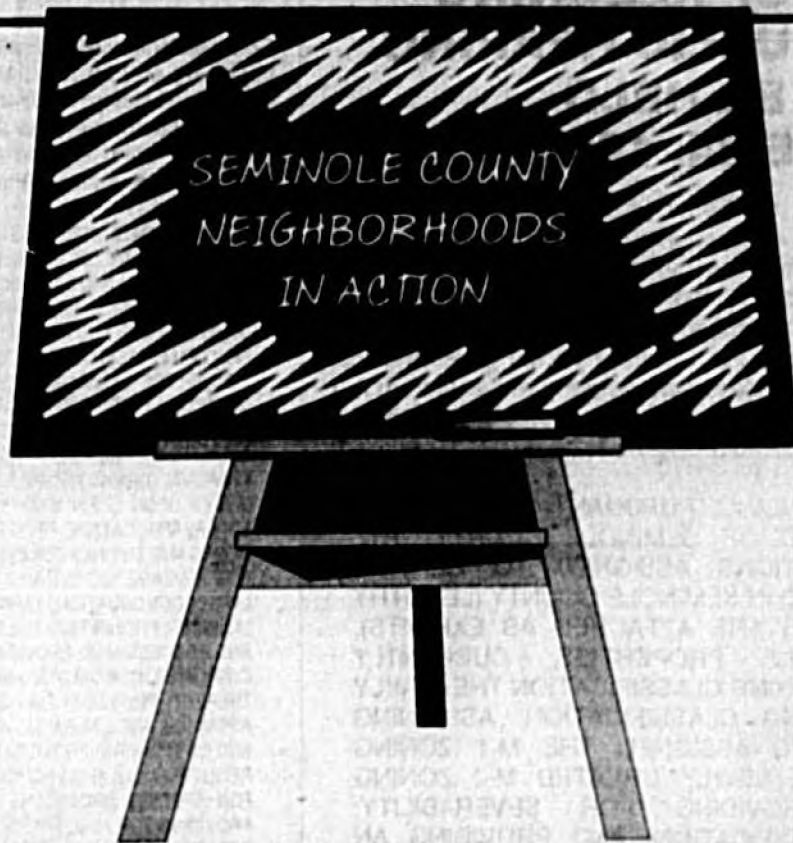
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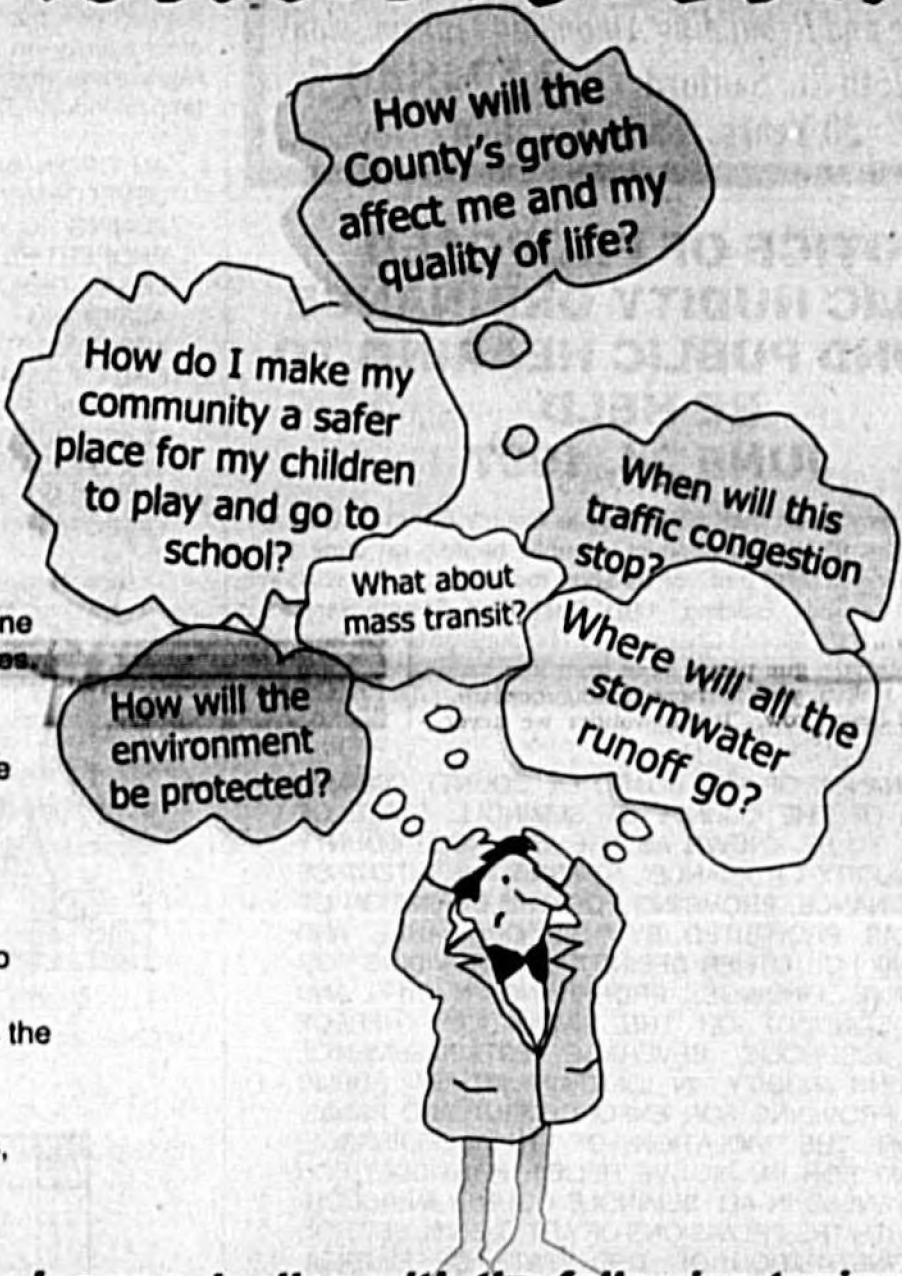

Elementary School's fourth grade went from a high of 83 in 1993 to a low of 68 in 1995.

"You have to see the numbers in proper perspective," Dave Winger, director of testing for the district, said. "You have to understand that it doesn't show the same students being tested year after year so that the scores don't really reflect any sort of continuity."

Overall, however, the scores show little change over the last five years and are higher than the state and national average.

The county average for fourth graders in math, for example, has gone from a low of 65 in 1993 to a high of 68 during the last school year.

Second grade reading scores for the whole county went from 50 (equivalent to the national average) in 1993 to a high of 54 in 1997.

"I think that is the important way of looking at the scores," Winger said. "You need to see how the schools are improving overall."

Winger explained that the scores are "not as bad as they have been interpreted."

School officials are, for the most part, pleased with the scores.

**LAKE MARY** - They say that behind every great man there is a woman.

That might be true. It is definitely true, however, that behind many great ball players there is a dad.

Lake Mary High School pitcher, Matt Groninger, is a prime example.

"My dad was my little league coach," Matt explained. "At the time I thought he was extra hard on me because he expected a lot from me. When I was little I thought that was too much, but now I realize that I wouldn't want it any other way."

Part of what has brought Matt to this realization is the fact that he will be attending Emory University in the fall and has achieved a position on their baseball team.

Matt said that although his dad never pushed too hard, he was always willing to practice pitches in the back yard and offer that great piece of extra advice.

Gary Groninger wasn't always able to spend as much time as he did with Matt.

Before moving to Florida around 1991, Gary had a job in California that required him to travel extensively, moving his family to Florida allowed him to have more time with them and

travel less.

"I missed so many of Matt's firsts," Gary recalled. "I missed his first steps, his first words, the whole thing. He started playing baseball when he was six or seven and I barely made it to any of his games. When we moved to Florida I took a job that was non-traveling. That's when I found the time to not only help Matt, but coach little league as well."

Matt worked very hard throughout his little league years before landing a position of the Lake Mary High School team. His father had always told him that making the team in high school would be a turning point in his career because those who didn't make it on the first try usually didn't get another chance.

Once on the team, hard work again paid off for Matt and by his Senior year he had earned not only a starting job, but also one of the best arms in Central Florida.

However, his senior year was a disappointing one for Matt. He just didn't feel that his mechanics were smooth.

Then in the last game of the season, Matt's shoulder began to ache. He stayed in the game longer than he probably should have, but eventually had to ask to be removed. The soreness did not subside before the district tournament started, and the game against Boone would

## Albano taking on the U.S.

She's only eight-years-old but Erin Albano knew what she needed to do.

Erin was competing in the Florida state gymnastics competition at the Disney Wide World of Sports Complex last month and needed to nail the balance beam exercise to guarantee first place overall to guarantee a spot in the national championships later this month.

A lot of nine-year-olds would have been nervous. Erin just sat there, head in her hands, concentrating on her vault.

Finally, it was her turn and all of her practice and concentration paid off.

She nailed the beam which had her coach beaming.

"I realized I had finally gotten through to her," said Jerilyn Stricker, Erin's coach at Brown's Gymnastics in Altamonte Springs.

Erin said she wasn't nervous at all.

"I just blocked out everything," said Erin, mature beyond her eight years. "I just focused on the beam and

nothing else."

Because of her strong performance on the beam, Erin earned the right to represent Florida in the nine-and-under national competition, also to be held at Disney this weekend.

When Erin isn't competing at Disney or on ESPN, she is a fourth-grader from Lake Mary who practices three times a week after school and has the modesty not to take the whole thing too seriously.

She performs all four gymnastics events - the floor, vault, bars and beam - and the floor is her favorite. At least she said that while her floors coach was sitting right next to her.

"The floor is my favorite because it's easy to do and you can't fall like you do on the beam," Erin said. "Jeri is a great coach and she encourages me and she always says she's proud of me no matter what happens."

Her mother, Kyle, is also proud no matter what. Erin admits that, when she watches video tapes of her performances, she can hear her mother shouting in the

background, but Kyle has been there all along.

"Talent-wise, we knew she would do well in gymnastics," Kyle said. "We encouraged her to do gymnastics because she spent more time on her hands than on her feet. She never stopped moving, but I never push her. I want to her have gymnastics as something she can learn discipline in."

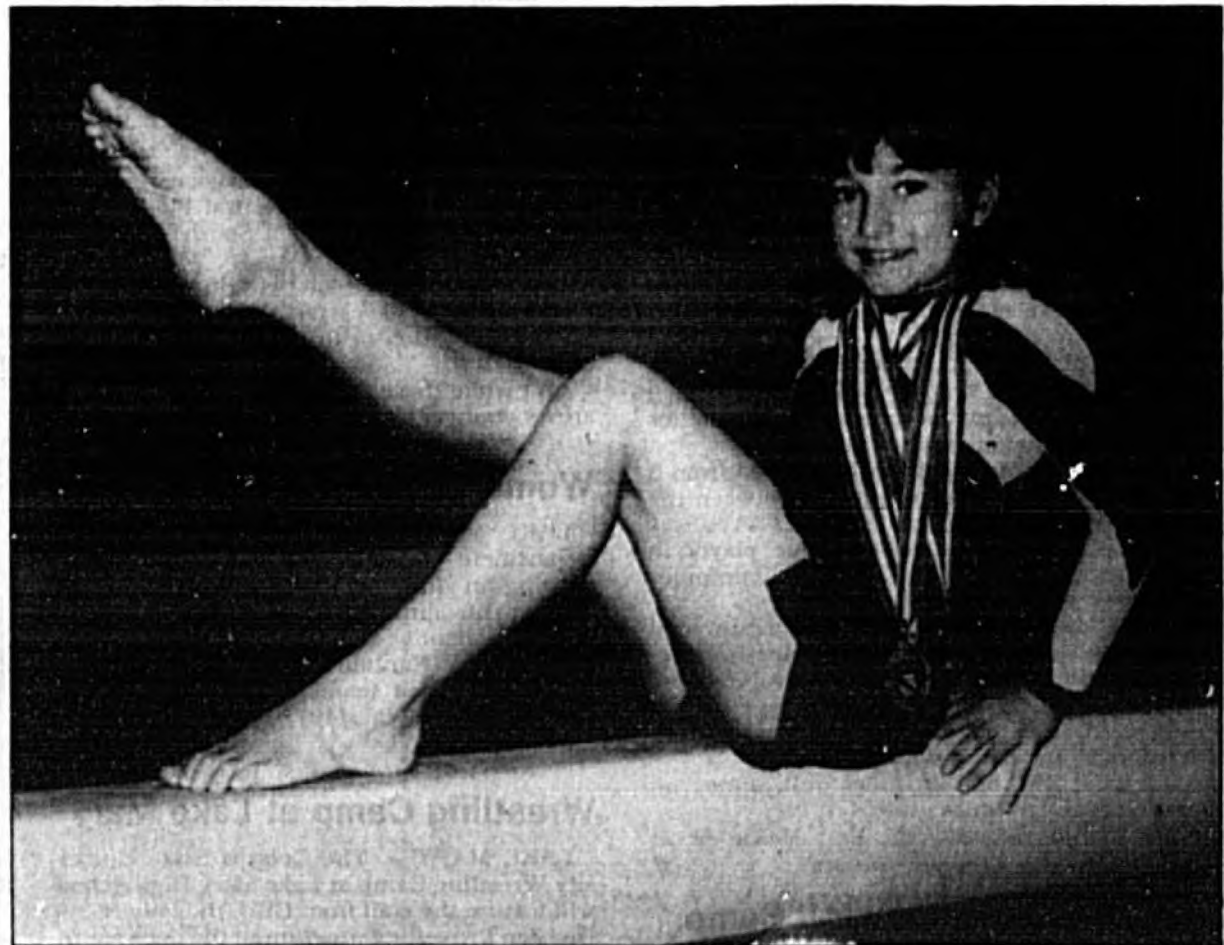

# Mustangs take AAU title, Quicksilver finishes third

The Mustangs secured the top seed for the elimination tournament by defeating Quicksilver of Winter Springs 6-1. The Blacksburg (Va.) Indians then eliminated the Florida Cougars by doubling the score on the Apopka squad 8-4.

With round robin play completed, the top four teams were seeded for tournament play.

In the No. 1 versus No. 4

semifinal matchup, the top-seeded Mustangs crushed the Indians 15-0.

In the other semifinal, which matched No. 2 against No. 3, the Nighthawks took a 7-0 lead into the seventh, and final, inning, but Quicksilver refused to give up, falling just short in a 7-6 loss.

Quicksilver then came back to whitewash the Indians 11-0 in the consolation game and finishing third in the tournament. Caitlin Mahoney went two-for-three with a pair of doubles and three RBI at the plate, while winning pitcher Tracy Reinke yielded just one hit and struck out eight.

The final standings, and records, in the tournament were: the Tampa Mustangs (8-0), the Nashville (Tn.) Nighthawks (4-2), the Winter Springs Quicksilver (3-3), the Blacksburg (Va.) Indians (1-5) and the Florida Cougars of Apopka (0-4).

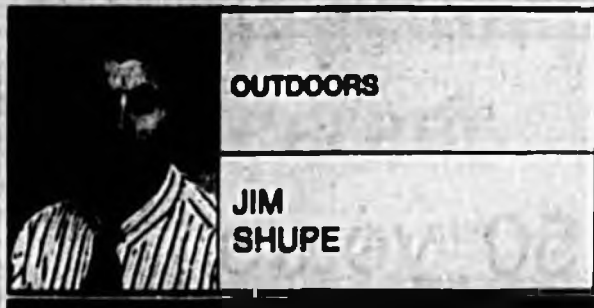
# Hiring a guide may not be a bad idea

**SANFORD** - Fishing with a guide can make the difference between a fishing trip that is memorable rather than memory-less. Guides have the local knowledge necessary to find and catch fish. Fifty years ago just about anywhere you wet a line you could catch a fish. Fishing conditions are different now—mainly, there are fewer fish and more anglers. There are still plenty of fish to be caught, but you have to know where and when they are biting.

Sometimes you'll want the extra knowledge a guide has from being on the water on a regular basis.

Finding a guide is easy. Virtually every large marina and many smaller ones have or know where you can hire a guide. Hotels and motels keep lists of local guides or display their brochures and business cards. Some communities have guide associations that you can contact. If all else fails, look in the local telephone directory.

How do you find the right guide? Call several guides and ask if they specialize in a particular type of fishing. If their specialty is fly fishing the flats for bonefish and you want to go

grouper fishing, don't let them talk you into an outing because they have an open day when you want to go. Look for a guide that will do the kind of fishing you want to do.

Also find out if the guide is a licensed and insured captain. Be wary of those who are not. Ask how many years the person has fished the area. Remember, local experience is what you're looking for. Check to make sure the guide can supply the bait and tackle.

Finally, ask for the price. Most backwater and freshwater guides in an area charge the same

price for a half or whole day of fishing. Be wary of those who charge substantially below the going rate. For open water fishing trips the price will vary depending on the size of the boat. Bigger, well-appointed yachts can cost hundreds of dollars more. The difference in cost does not necessarily reflect a difference in the quality of the trip or your chances of catching fish. It may, however, reflect your comfort level when on the water.

## FISHING FORECAST

Cooler temperatures and low water levels have kept bass active in Puzzle Lake, where they are hitting plastic worms and tiny lures. Bream and catfish are biting worms and

mussels in the deep bends. Bass action will slowly taper off, but bream and catfish will continue to bite all summer long.

Snook season is closed at Sebastian Inlet, and the crowds are definitely thinner. Expect small snapper, a few flounder, and a scattered trout to hit large live shrimp. Snook and tarpon are hitting back in the Sebastian River.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that high seas have kept boats in Port for the past week. Once seas subside, expect king mackerel, cobia and a few dolphin to be prowling the reefs. Dolphin are scattered offshore, but tripletail are in the buoy line. Sheepshead and flounder are plentiful in the Port, while trout and redfish are rated as good on the flats of the Banana and Indian Rivers.

Medium-sized sheepshead and small bluefish are the main attraction at Ponce Inlet. Drum, redfish and a few jack crevalle round out the action. Live or dead shrimp is the top bait. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

**Origin of Father's Day is this daughter's love**

DEAR IRENE: Father's Day was the brainchild of Sonora Louise Smart Dodd (1882-1978), a resident of Spokane, Wash. When Sonora was 18, her mother passed away, leaving Sonora's father, William Jackson Smart, with the responsibility of raising their six children.

After listening to a sermon on Mother's Day in 1910, she mentioned to the speaker that she liked everything he had said about motherhood, but somehow fatherhood seemed something apart. "Do you not think it would be fair and fine to give fathers a place in the sun?" she asked.

The speaker, Dr. Henry Rasmus, agreed. At the next meeting of local ministers at Spokane's YMCA building on June 8, 1910, Mrs. Dodd presented a petition requesting that the third Sunday in June be set aside as a national "Father's Day." It was endorsed by the ministers, and came to the attention of such national figures as William Jennings Bryan and Woodrow Wilson. Both heartily supported it.

In 1914, Congress endorsed Father's Day, and in 1971 a proclamation by President Richard M. Nixon established Father's Day as a national observance.

trumps but one, hoping West would throw a diamond. It was not to be, so the declarer went one down.

How could South have succeeded with this layout?

He wasted dummy's third trump. The winning play is the spade jack at trick two, giving up a trump trick. (Yes, there is a case for leading the diamond queen from hand at trick three.) Here, suppose West wins with the king and returns a heart. South ruffs, plays a spade to dummy's queen, continues with a diamond to his queen, and cashes the diamond ace. When the king drops, South can claim, pointing out that he will ruff his last diamond in the dummy.
