Bolander executed

STARKE - A 42-year-old man who maintained his innocence was executed today in Florida's electric chair for the 1980 torture and slayings of four men in a Miami drug deal gone bad.

Electricity surged through Bernard Bolander's body and he was pronounced dead at 10:19 a.m. EDT behind the pale green walls of Florida State Prison near Starke, said Ron Suchs, the governor's chief spokesman.

"At 10:08 the switch was engaged. At 10:09 the switch was disengaged. At 10:19 he was pronounced dead." Sachs said.

His execution was the 34th since Florida reinstituted the death penalty in 1976, and the first since April 1994. Bolander was the 233rd inmate to die in the oaken electric chair handerafted by inmates in 1923.



Cities hammer out next year's budget

Lake Mary holds line on taxes

LAKE MARY - The city commission takes its first look at the fiscal 1995/96 budget this Thursday evening. City Manager John Litton is calling for no tax increase. With Litton recommending a

millage rate of 3.7648 mills, he stresses that this represents the

10th consecutive year that taxes have not increased. While the millage level is to remain the same. it is slightly higher than the roll back rate of 3.6519 recommended by the Seminole County property appraiser.

The roll back is the millage needed to raise the same amount of ad valorem taxes as the amount received by the city last year. Litton has determined that one mill for the city of Lake Mary for this next fiscal year is equal to \$528.079, compared to \$505.578 in the year now ending. The increase in money coming to the city would come from tax dollars brought about by new growth in the area. Individuals would not pay any more in ad-

Longwood may add cops, cars



LONGWOOD - Three motorcycle officers will be added to the city police force doubling the size of the traffic division under a proposal given preliminary approval by the city commissioners Monday night. The commission also approved the Parks and Recreation Department budget, electing to consider a pro-posed \$1.2 million park land purchase separately.

Chief Greg Manning noted the officers will help pay for themselves through traffic fines assessed motorists with the stepped up enforcement staff.

Manning initially asked for five additional officers and cars in his \$2.1 million budget but seemed pleased with the commission's decision.

Three additional policemen and two or three new police cars made it through the initial review by city commissioners of the proposed 1996 police budget Monday night. However, \$4,000 budgeted for the annual Halloween party by police is CSee Longwood, Page 5A

Duda featured on 'CBS Reports'

OVIEDO - A "CBS Reports" show this week will praise agribusiness giant A. Duda & Sons for providing quality housing, schooling and medical benefits for its migrant workers, a network official says.

The show's Dan Rather interviewed Ed and Ferdinand Duda of the Oviedo-based company last fall for a follow-up program to the landmark report "Harvest of Shame," presented by Edward R. Murrow 35 years ago.

The one-hour documentary called "Legacy of Shame" looks at the fate of farm workers and will examine conditions in Mexico, Texas, California, South Carolina and Florida, said CBS spokeswoman Kim Akhtar on Sunday.

Duda employs 2,600 seasonal workers at its operations across the South. The company grows vegetables, sugar cane and citrus. It owns 40,000 acres in Florida.

Ed Duda, chief executive officer, told Rather that treating workers well "is the right thing to do. It is also good business."

Festival honors Hemingway

KEY WEST - Author Peter Matthiessen collected the 1995 Conch Republic Prize for Literature at the start of the annual Hemingway Days Festival here.

Matthiessen joins James Dickey and John Updike as a winner of the prize, which carries no monetary reward.

The Monday presentation came as scholars and aficionados gathered for the weeklong salute to Ernest Hemingway, the Nobel laureate who lived here in the 1930s.

'I'm delighted and very honored to be here and part of this tradition." said Matthiessen, whose acclaimed books include "The Tree Where Man was Born," "In the Spirit of Crazy Horse" and "The Snow Leopard." which captured a National Book Award.

"It is really rare to see a lown that is truly Hemingway's town," he said.

The Hemingway festival continues through Sunday with events that include a writers' workshop, short story competition, novel contest and fishing tournament. The highlight of the week comes when some 60 participants, with white beards and big bellies, face off for a look-alike contest at Hemingway's favorite Key West watering hole, Sloppy Joe's Bar.

Trailer floor collapses; woman dead

OKEECHOBEE - A 57-year-old widow apparently died of dehydration after she fell through the floor of her dilapidated trailer and couldn't get out, police said.

A trailer park worker, suspicious of the stench of decomposing flesh, found the body of Joyce Zugehar Dornqwast on Saturday. The corpse was sticking halfway out of a hole in her floor.

Dornqwast appeared to have been putting away groceries July 5 when the floor collapsed, said Okeechobee County sheriff's detective M.W. Muros. Dorngwast was in poor health and couldn't get out of the hole.

Trailers surrounding hers were vacant, meaning her calls for help probably went unheard.

NEWS FROM THE REGION AND ACROSS THE STATE Chiles' health care reform State could lose \$8 billion in federal funds

TAMPA, Fla. - Gov. Lawton Chiles. urging public support for his health care reforms, warned the state could lose \$8 billion in federal funds if lawmakers fail to pass his plan during a special session this fall.

The governor brought his campaign to the Tampa Bay arca Monday, appealing to Floridians "to ask legislators where they stand." He plans to use billboards and possibly radio, television and direct mail to take his case to the public.

Although he gave no date, Chiles said he intends to call legislators back to Tallahassee soon after Labor Day to consider his plan, which would shift billions of federal health care dollars from welfare recipients to the working poor.

Senate President Jim Scott, R-Fort Lauderdale, has warned Chiles a special acasion would be a waste of time. The Republican-led Senate has rejected Chiles' health care plan on three previous occasions.

The governor began campaigning across

the state for his plan a week after being briefly hospitalized when the blood flow to his brain was temporarily reduced in a "transient ischemic attack." That can be a warning sign a patient is at risk of a stroke. The governor said it made him more determined to win approval for his medical

insurance subsidy plan. Florida stands to lose \$8 billion in Medicald funds that would be cut under block grants being debated in Congress, Chiles said. Medicaid is a federal-state program that pays for health care for welfare recipients and many nursing home residents.

Under the congressional plan, states would get annual 5 percent increases in Medicaid funding over the next seven years. Florida's Medicaid budget would grow 12 percent annually if left uncapped.

A federal waiver of Medicaid rules Florida won last year to implement the proposed reform could exempt the state from the 5 percent cap, according to the governor.

Under his plan, welfare families would join health maintenance organizations or other forms of managed care. The money saved would be spent on subsidies for

private insurance for the working poor. "I can't guarantee that they will grandfather the walver, but I can guarantee if we don't pass it, we won't have a chance," Chiles said. "A 'yes' vote will keep the \$8

billion working in Florida; a 'no' vote will send this money back to Washington." Congressional leaders such as Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole and House

Speaker Newt Gingrich predict block grants will pass and that Florida won't get a grandfather clause for its current waiver, according to state GOP leaders. The Democratic governor blamed partisan

politics for resistance by the Senate and GOP lawmakers to his plan.

'Jim Scott has to determine: is he going to do something for Newt because if we save \$8 billion. Newt loses \$8 billion off his deficit reduction." Chiles said. "I think he needs to decide: Is it Newt that he wants to

be for or is it the people of Florida?" Responding to the governor's remarks, Scott said: "My loyalty to the people of Florida is proven and unquestioned. The governor and I have a difference of philosophy. I want to contract welfare and entitlement programs and get people back to work.

Pioneer inventor dead at 79

PENSACOLA - Businessman-inventor William R. "Bill" Williamson, a pioneer in saltwater distilling and pollution control technology, has died of a heart attack. He was 79.

Williamson's funeral was held Monday. He died Friday after being stricken while putting the finishing touches on a new water purification machine for the Coast Guard at the Pensacola Naval Air Station.

"His work was his passion," said stepdaughter Mona Braxton of nearby Pensacola Beach. "He was one of the most tenacious people I know. He once said 'It wasn't that you couldn't do it. You just haven't found a way of doing it."

The native of Patrick, Scotland, held 33 patents and was founder of Licon Inc., which manufactures machines to clean and recycle liquid industrial waste.

Former teacher still sought Courts found missing man guilty of lewd acts

SANFORD - The search for Albert McGolrick has expanded into the New England states. McGoirick is wanted in Seminole county on seven counts of lewd. lascivious and indecent assault on a child.

According to sheriff's spokesman Ed McDonough. McGolrick, a former teacher at Goldsboro Elementary School In Sanford, was arrested in 1988 for sexually molesting eight female students at the school between October, 1987 and May. 1988. The students were ages eight through 10.



Illegal immigrants

Did you see the survey results? A survey of legal immigrants show 61 percent favor issuance of a national ID card to distinguish citizens and legal residents from illegal immigrants.

The survey, made public in Arlington, Virginia, was conducted by USA Today and Gallup Poll. Among other things, it showed 35 percent want to bar illegal immigrants from public schools and hospitals.

The study was conducted by telephone. nationwide, especially in border states. Only 732 persons were contacted however. While it gives interesting results, it cannot be considered as a major representation of all persons in those states.

It was also conducted with only people who speak English, again diluting the survey's findings considerably.

But let us assume the findings were in keeping with the feelings of many people. How does that affect local people and Florida residents?

Public assistance, free clinics, education, and other give-aways, are often financed by our tax dollars. These agencies already have a financial crunch. With the ever-growing influx of illegals, their spending needs climb higher and higher. As a result, they are being forced to reduce the amount of assistance they can offer to everyone, including our own citizens who are in dire need.

It would be interesting to know how many people illegally in this country, right here in Sanford, are taking advantage of benefits offered to citizens without being one. We believe some type of proof of citizenship must be provided.

Is it possible however? Even if it is, would people be willing to carry such identification?

Social cuts may spur GOP moderates

and helped pass practically all the items in the GOP "Contract With Americs," but they may finally balk at the 17 percent cuts in education and social spending their leaders have mandated for next year.

Of the \$22.6 billion in discretionary spending cuts that leaders plan to impose in fiscal 1996. nearly half are slated for programs overseen by the House Appropriations Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education subcommittee, which has scheduled a meeting to parcel out the pain in what one staffer termed "the markup from hell."

Meantime, under allocations issued by House Appropriations Chairman Bob Livingston, R-La., Agriculture Department spending will be cut by Just 1 percent; Energy, 8 percent; Interior, 6 percent; and Treasury and Postal Service, 2 percent. Defense appropriations will increase slightly, and military construction will increase a massive 27 percent.

Next to Labor-HHS, the biggest cuts are to come in Housing and Urban Development and veterans' programs, 14 percent; Transportation, 10.8 percent; and foreign aid, 10.5 percent.

As a result of these disproportionate cuts, the House's 202 Democrats are expected to oppose almost unanimously the Labor-HHS appropria-

"right wing" leaders, including Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, and Majority Whip Tom DeLay, R-Texas, "try to be too cute" in using rules to block open debate, especially on abortion.

Shays charged that "moderates were burned badly" in the debate over budget rescissions when leaders used parliamentary procedures and time limits to prevent amendments.

Earlier this year, no fewer than 105 Republicans opposed tax cuts for families with incomes over \$100,000, but were talked into backing down by leaders. "The contract is over now," said Shays.

"Moderates and conservatives from moderate districts make up 20 to 25 percent of the Republican Conference. Forty to 50 is not a side group, but one of the legs that the party has to stand on. We're getting more interested in speaking with one voice."

Shays said he thinks that Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., "wants moderates to control the right wing." But DeLay and Armey, he charged. 'want to march straight through a minefield into the enemy machine guns," referring to Democratic charges of GOP callousness.

'The speaker understands that the best way past a minefield is sometimes around it." Shays said



DONNA BRITT It's Dole's job to perform

WASHINGTON - News flash: Hugh Grant, Hollywood's "new Cary Grant." famed for his hair falling into his face and bumbling British charm, picked up a Sunset Boulevard hooker last month because he'd been unduly influenced by having seen "Pretty Woman" on videotape earlier that day.

What else but a movie - specifically one in which a man who seems to have it all finds true love with a spunky L.A. prostitute could goad an emerging superstar romantically linked to a gorgeous cosmetics company spokesmodel to do the inexplicable: invite a streetwalker into his car, perform an unspecified "lewd act" with her and be arrested by the LAPD?

Now fans who asked each other over water coolers everywhere, "Why would he do that?" have an answer:

· Hollywood made him do it.

OK. OK - so I'm kidding. Actually, I haven't a clue as to why Grant would risk so much for so little. But recent events suggest that when people's actions defy comprehension, there's nothing better to blame than Hollywood.

In fact, Sen. Bob Dole should momentarily be citing Grant's act from the Senate floor.

A month ago, presidential candidate Dole made headlines for attacking the "nightmares of depravity" produced by the entertainment Industry.

Because the message played well, sparking heated discussion and tons of free publicity, Dole is at it again.

When Boston-area newspapers reported a few weeks ago that one of three small-town young men who allegedly stabbed to death a 65-year-old man cited a controvenial movie as possible motivation, Dole saw his chance.

According to police, the accused men "on occasion" watched Oliver Stone's 1994 film "Natural Born Killers." Police say one defendant - asked by a girlfriend about his bloody clothes, repeplied, "Haven't you ever seen 'Natural Born Killers' before?" Said a state trooper: "My understanding was that they were drawing a comparison between the characters in the movie and themselves."

That same day. Dole remarked on the Senate floor: "Of course no movie 'caused' this brutal killing. ... We are all responsible for our own actions, period. But ... those who deny that cultural messages can bore deep into the hearts and minds of our young people are deceiving themselves. ... Perhaps some serious soul-searching is in order in the corporate suites of the entertainment industry.

Since it's too early to issue judgments about a just-opened murder case and an anonymous witness' unproven statements, Dole's remarks seem nakedly self-serving.

I admit that when the Kansas Republican first tongue-lashed Hollywood, my visceral reaction was gratitude that a top lawmaker questioned that which concerns millions of parents.

Then I heard that Dole cited "True Lies" the hit film depicting more than 80 killings -as "family friendly." I remembered his passionate support of assault weapons. Then there's Dole's opposition to a Senate proposal that would have forced TV broadcasters to

either rate their own programs for vioence or have a government-appointed panel do it, and would have made manufacturers equip TVs with technology that would allow parents to block ob-jectionable programs.

Clearly, Dole's anger is political. Said Sen. Kent Con-rad, D-N.D., sponsor of the proposal, "When (Dole) had a chance to do something he took a walk."

Even Rush Limbaugh - who early this month admir

ingly pronounced "Natural Born Killers" a satire ... that made a mockery of everything" — has questioned Dole's sincerity on the issue. Like many politicians, Dole is a lip-service

kinda guy. Deploring media violence, a problem that some 70 percent of Americans acknowledge, is easy; taking action against it entails risks. Putting teeth into the effort to get TV mogula to monitor themselves, and helping parents to monitor the TVs they can't keep constant watch over, ion't censorship. But Doie wouldn't endorse such efforts.

Blame is easier, and so cost-efficient.

Poor Hugh Grant isn't as hip. Rather than wisely blame "Pretty Woman." he admitted that his actions were "completely insane. ... I have hurt people I love. ... I am more sorry than I can ever say." His pained. LAPD mug shot is a study in shame. How old fashioned and unnecessary - of him. Clearly, both Grant and Dole have useful

leasons to teach us.

If you're still wondering how one of them fooled you so completely, managing to seem so sensitive and yet behave so crassly, I'd remind you that his profession is all about performing. The better he is at convincing us that he feels things that he doesn't, the more, he's rewarded.



Meat inspection plans

WASHINGTON — Warning against more outbreaks of deadly food poisoning, consumer and food safety groups are mobilizing against a Republican congressman's plan to derail the government's new meat inspection program.

"We're doing meat and poultry inspections with scientific methods that haven't been updated since 1906," said Donna Rosenbaum, a founder of the California-based Safe Tables Our Priority.

Rep. James Walsh, R-N.Y., agrees the Agriculture Department's inspection procedures are outdated and should be replaced. But he contends the new proposals would be an unfair and expensive burden to the industry, especially small businesses.

"All parties agree the proposed higher standards of meat and poultry inspections are needed," Walsh wrote in a guest editorial published Monday in USA Today.

"I believe my amendment will put new standards in place sooner than the administration's mandate — without delay due to litigation." he said.

Walsh's amendment is a single paragraph inserted into a 150-page report on an agriculture funding bill scheduled for House debate later this week.

USDA earlier this year proposed new regulations that would replace the current carcass-bycarcass meat and poultry inspections with a more scientific approach. The rules would require bacterial testing, improved sanitation practices and changes in the way meat is handled and stored.

Much of the meat industry is united against the proposals, maintaining they're unneeded, ineffective and too expensive.

Talks with enemy proposed

SARAJEVO. Bosnia-Herzegovina — Fearing the imminent collapse of the U.N. "safe area" of Zepa, Bosnia's president has proposed talks with enemy Serbs on the evacuation of elderly and wounded Muslims. President Alija Izcibegovic's move, just three days after the government refused a Serb ultimatum for government troops to surrender in return for civilians' safe passage, highlighted the desperate plight of the mountainous enclave.

It also appeared to be an effort to avert a repeat of the atrocities said to have been committed by Serbs after they seized the "safe area" of Srebrenica last week.

"To prevent the suffering of civilians in Zepa, our side has proposed direct military talks with the enemy," said a statement issued by lzetbegovie's office late Monday.

Żepa, a remote area about 30 miles from Sarajevo, is home to between 10,000 and 16,000 people. It has been under attack from Serb mortars, artillery and infantry since last week.

Serbs have broken through the edge of the enclave and advanced to within a mile of the town itself.

But, after a strong attack reported by the United Nations on Sunday, U.N. spokesmen said no advances were made on Monday.

The United Nations has admitted it is powerless to defend its "safe area." There are just 79 Ukrainian peacekeepers in Zepa, many of them disarmed by government defenders trying to augment their own arsenal.

Military commitment in Bosnia

WASHINGTON — The Clinton administration is weighing a request that it broaden its military commitment in Bosnia by using U.S. transport and attack helicopters to move European U.N. troop reinforcements into the war zone, officials said.

The White House said President Clinton had made no decisions on what role, if any, the United States would play in strengthening the U.N. peacekeeping mission in Bosnia, which has failed utterly to protect civilians in eastern Bosnia.

Mike McCurry, the White House press secretary, said Monday "some very sensitive military planning" was under way, including consideration of whether to provide U.S. helicopters to transport European troop reinforcements to halt the Bosnian rebel Serb assaults on U.N. "safe areas."

"The president's made no decision to provide that type of assistance," McCurry told reporters, "but there are active discussions under way about how they will proceed."

McCurry said this would be addressed in more detail Friday at a meeting in London of allied

defense and foreign ministers. Secretary of State Warren Christopher and Defense Secretary William Perry plan to attend that meeting, along with their counterparts from Britain. France, Germany and Russia, administration officials said.

Smith prayed before confession

UNION, S.C. — A sobbing Susan Smith knelt on floor, prayed with a sheriff and asked for a gun to kill herself before telling suspicious officials the truth: she had killed her boys.

During a hearing Monday to determine the admissibility of statements Ms. Smith made to authorities, Union County Sheriff Howard Wells detailed how Ms. Smith broke down Nov. 3 in a room at the First Baptist Church and admitted drowning 3-year-old Michael and 14-month-old Alex.

"She said, 'You don't understand. My children are not all right," Wells said. "That was the first incriminating statement Susan made in my presence."

Circuit Judge William Howard ruled the statements were all admissible.

Opening statements begin today in Ms. Smith's double murder trial.

Also Monday. Howard dismissed juror Gall Beam and ordered her jailed for contempt after discovering she had failed to disclose a checkkiting conviction.

Casting suspicion

WASHINGTON — Summoning Secret Service guards, police and a high Justice Department official to new Whitewater hearings. Senate Republicans are trying to cast suspicion on the Clinton White House's actions following the death of presidential lawyer Vincent Foster.

Listed as the leadoff witness at today's session was former Associate Attorney General Webster Hubbell, who was to describe the discomfort his Justice Department colleagues felt when White House aides refused to allow immediate access to documents in Foster's office.

Deputy Attorney General Philip Heymann and others at the Justice Department "thought they had an understanding" with White House counsel Bernard Nussbaum to review Foster's documents, Hubbell told Senate investigators in preparation for the hearing by the special committee.

But "when they got there, it was a much more, I guess he would say, aggressive litigator's position that was being taken by Bernie," Hubbell was quoted as saying. He said that Heymann said "other people were upset" and that "he had to talk to Bernie about it."

White House sides have acknowledged they removed files on the Whitewater real estate venture and other documents — 24 folders in all — involving President Clinton and his wife. Hillary, from Foster's office two days after the deputy White House counsel committed suicide in a Virginia park on July 20, 1993.

O.J. and his exercise video

LOS ANGELES — For a few minutes, he was the O.J. Simpson the way the world knew him before the murders — a handsome, smiling celebrity telling the camera in his exercise video, "I'm feeling so good now I want to dance."

The video footage that went into "O.J. Simpson Minimum Maintenance Fitness for Men" contrasted with a doctor's description of Simpson as a broken-down ex-jock so hobbled by football injuries that "I wouldn't hire him to back me up in a bar fight."

During his searing cross-examination of the doctor on Monday, prosecutor Brian Kelberg showed the jury the video outtakes to illustrate that Simpson was physically capable of killing Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman.

More images of a marching, bending, squatting, stretching Simpson are to be played today during the third day of testimony from Simpson's physician, Dr. Robert Huizenga.

Swinging budget-cutting scythe

WASHINGTON --- Republicans are swinging their budget-cutting scythe at the White House liseli as the House rushes through a pile of spending bills that take bites out of scores of federal programs.

The House planned to debate a \$23.2 billion measure today that would finance the Treasury, Postal Service and several smaller agencies next year, paring them by \$323 million from 1995 levels. Among its reductions was \$41 million from the amount President Clinton requested for his executive office, including elimination of the president's Council of Economic Advisers. The legislation also prohibits federal employee health insurance plans from covering abortions — one of many policy changes Republicans have inserted into spending bills this year.



Include bike safety check on back-to-school list

Most everybody's busy getting ready to go back to school. This past Sunday night, the

busiest department at the Target store in Lake Mary was the aisle where the school supplies were displayed. Mothers and children waded in while father-powered carts circled in a holding pattern.


Pencils and pens. wire-bound notebooks and looseleaf paper, glue and scissors, backpacks and book bags, lunch boxes and thermos bottles ... then it was on to the clothing department.

Did you stop by the sporting goods department?

Many Seminole County children depend on their bicycles to get them to and from school. Yet just as many adults take their cars for granted until it's too late, kids generally don't think any more about their wheels expect jumping on and riding away

But there's no AAA for blcyclists. And unlike passengers in an automobile, who have the protection of bumpers, doors, a roof, and scat belts (if they're smart enough to use them) to protect them in case something goes wrong, bicyclists have only a helmet lif they're smart enough to wear one).

Before your child makes his or her



two-wheeled way to school, here's a quick safety check:

 Make sure they have a helmet. that fits. Make sure they have a helmet that fits.

Got the idea? It's impossible to overstress this. A great percentage of the fatalities that occur in accidents involving bleycles are the result of head injuries, injuries that could be prevented or the severity substantially lessened by wearing a helmet.

If they don't have one, invest in a mirror. I use one that attaches to my helmet. Other models attach to handlebars or the arms of glasses. A mirror is invaluable in detecting traffic coming from the rear. especially if the route requires any

riding on the road.

 Are all the reflectors in place? A good headlight and rearlights are a plus. The primary objective is to be seen by others on the road.

· Inspect the brakes (cables, levers, and calipers) and tires (including the tube, rim, and spokes).

With pull brakes, make sure the action is quick and sure. Are the pads worn? Do they need to be replaced or can they be adjusted? Are the callpers clean and free of rust? Are the ends of the cable secure? If recently had the end of brake cable snap loose; luckily, there was no traffic in the intersection)

Do the tires have enough tread? (Would you want to drive your car in the rain on slick tires?) Are the valves seated property? Is there any fraying or chaffing? Are the spokes tightened to the appropriate tension? (This is how bleycle tires are balanced.)

 Make sure everything fits. You wouldn't send your child to school in clothes that are too small or ridiculously too large. A bicycle that doesn't fit its rider - the seat and/or handlebars are too high or too low or the frame is just too big - is

good idea. The one I carry on my blke includes a spare tube, a small patch kit, an adjustable wrench. and a Phillips screwdriver. I also have an air pump attached to the frame below the seat. If your child has an emergency kit, make sure they know how to use it.

· Going to school means homework. A backpack - again, fit is the primary concern - is a best bet to transport paper and books. Baskets aren't fashionable, but are a practical alternative.

 Once at school, does your child had a way to secure their ride? A chain (woven through both tires, the frame, and a rack) and a lock will deter all but the most determined of thieves. For practicality, a combination lock beats a keyed lock.


· Make sure children know the rules of the road, including the appropriate hand signals.

By making sure their bicycles are up to snuff and educating them about the rules governing riding bicycles on public ways, you greatly increase the chances of children making the commute to and from school safely.

Certainly that's as important as a few new notebooks.

for your symptom, and the lai haan't overlooked it. Rather your doctor may not have tester you thoroughly enough. Fo example, you should, at the very least, undergo a galibladder u trasound (to check for gallatones and an upper gastrointestina X-ray study (to check you stomach and part of the small intestine). Ask your doctor t consider ordering these tests or, if you wish, request a referra to a gastroenterologist.

Finally, there are metaboli causes for nausea; in particula liver and kidney diseases as often associated with an upse stomach. So, at the time of you X-rays, you might also hav some blood tests performed t make sure that your interna organs are functionin satisfactorily.


