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### Chicken Mousse Flavorful

Chicken Mousse makes an excellent addition to a buffet table that is featuring baked ham. Or the mousse may be the main course at lunch or Sunday night supper.

Among the seasonings in this mousse is dry mustard — a necessary spice in any well-equipped kitchen. The mustard blends beautifully with the other seasonings and enhances them.

**CHICKEN MOUSSE**  
2 servings unflavored gelatin  
4 cup cold water  
1 1/2 teaspoons dry mustard  
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
Cayenne pepper to taste  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 cups diced cooked chicken  
1 container 8 ounces heavy cream  
Garnish  
In a cup, mix gelatin evenly over 1/4 cup cold water. In a medium saucepan stir together mustard and 1/4 teaspoon warm water; stir in broth, soap can of hot water, salt, onion powder, thyme, garlic and cayenne; heat to boiling point. Remove from heat. Add gelatin; stir until dissolved. Stir in lemon juice. Chill until as thick as unbeaten egg white. Fold in chicken.  
In a small deep bowl beat cream until it stands in soft peaks; fold into gelatin mixture. Turn into a 1 1/2-quart custard cup. Chill until firm and ready to serve.  
Unmold on serving plate. Garnish with sprigs of chervil, tomato wedges, cucumber slices and pine olives.  
Makes 10 servings.

**CHOCOLATE SAUCE**  
It's rich in chocolate flavor. 2 squares (each 1 ounce) unsweetened chocolate  
1 package (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate pieces  
1 tablespoon honey  
1 container (8 ounces) heavy cream  
Into the top of a double boiler turn both kinds of chocolate and the honey. Place over simmering water and heat, stirring often, until chocolate is melted. Gradually stir in the cream; continue to stir if necessary, especially around sides of pan, until mixture is entirely blended. Remove from heat and serve warm over vanilla ice cream. Makes about 1 1/2 cups. Refrigerate any leftover sauce and reheat over hot water.

**APPLE GREEN BEANS**  
Unusually good combination. 1 pound snap beans  
1 cup boiling water  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 or 3 tablespoons butter  
2 medium or large green apples, peeled and cored and sliced fairly thin  
Cut ends from beans; scrub in cold water; cut crosswise into about 1-inch long slanted pieces. In a covered sauté pan, boil beans, water and salt until beans are tender—about 8 to 10 minutes; drain and keep warm. Meanwhile in a 10-inch skillet, over moderate heat, melt butter; add apples and cook, stirring often, until slices are cooked through but still hold their shape—about 10 minutes. Add beans to apples and mix well. Makes 6 servings.

Some traditions go on and on. When I was a little girl an aunt let us children help her bake Thimble Cookies. Now the children of a friend of mine—a 13-year-old girl and a 10-year-old boy—always take part in this cookie-making ritual.  
Their activity? Making small holes in balls of cookie dough with a thimble. They are capable of doing the whole operation—making up the dough and filling the holes with straw-berry jam—but the fun part seems to be in using the thimble.  
These cookies are adorable! Let your youngsters enjoy some of them, of course, but they're so rich and pretty that you'll probably want to save most of them for guests. Because they freeze well, you can have them on hand for entertaining. Any one giving a large tea party? Thimble Cookies are perfect to add to the tea table.  
**THIMBLE COOKIES**  
1 cup (2 one-quarter pound sticks) butter  
1/4 cup sugar  
4 egg yolks  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 cups unsifted flour, stir to aerate before measuring  
1/4 cup (about) strawberry jam  
In a medium mixing bowl cream butter and sugar. Thoroughly beat in egg yolks and vanilla. With a wooden spoon gradually work in flour until blended. Chill if necessary before shaping.  
Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Place balls about 1/4 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets.  
Using a lightly floured thimble, press a small hole about 1/4 inch deep in the top of each cookie.  
Fill each hole with strawberry jam.  
Bake in a preheated 325-degree oven until browned on bottom but not on top—about 25 minutes. Remove to wire racks to cool. Cookies may slide on cookie sheets during baking but this will not affect their shape. Store in a tightly covered tin box. Makes about 4 dozen.

### Ecology Hearing Slated For Bridge

Ecological study of the Osteen bridge project has been completed by Winn Lindeman, of DeLand, district environmental specialist for the Florida Department of Transportation, it was reported today by Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce long range planning committee for roads and bridges.

The study is being prepared in proper form by the graphics department of the DOT district engineer's office at DeLand, Stenstrom said, and will be forwarded by the end of this month to Tallahassee.

Stenstrom added a public hearing on the environmental study will be held, probably in December at the Seminole County courthouse.

"Much remains to be done to get the Osteen bridge project in shape for a contract letting before the end of this budget year, June 30, 1972," Stenstrom stated.

A two-lane span, similar to that on Interstate 4 over the St. Johns River, is planned to replace the old bridge on SR 415 over the St. Johns River east of Sanford. South approach to the new bridge will extend from SR 46.

Stenstrom also quotes the DOT district engineer, C. A. (Bill) Benedict, it is expected the low bid of \$50,600 will be accepted shortly for the improvements to SR 46 between Interstate 4 and the Wekiva River. The bid was offered by J. W. Conner and Sons, Tampa. Benedict was quoted construction could start within 30 days.

### Longwood Losing Mayor, 2 Others

LONGWOOD — The first distasteful councilman to be elected to the City Council in the municipality's history — Mrs. Sandra Thompson — has announced she will not seek re-election.

Elected by a substantial margin in 1969, Mrs. Thompson said in a statement to The Herald Wednesday evening she said her reasons for the decision are many, but one "is that I just no longer have the time." She added that a councilman has to be dedicated and cannot be effective if time is spent elsewhere.

Mrs. Thompson said by making the announcement early "possibly others can plan on seeking election."

Three seats are up for election on the City Council this year and a special election is expected to be scheduled as well in December for the office of mayor.

Mayor Robert Kallunki, the youngest chief executive in Seminole County, is expected to resign within the next few weeks to accept a position in the Carolinas.

Councilman B. L. Helms, whose post on the Council is also up for election this year, said earlier this week he will not seek return to the seat.

## Hurricane Edith Whips Louisiana; Main Force Is Aimed At Cameron

CAMERON, La. (AP) — Hurricane Edith's advance winds whipped this virtually deserted coastal town today as the storm aimed its fury at the lowlands of Louisiana's western coast. Nearly all residents of the area had fled. But a small crew of Civil Defense workers stayed on to ride out the storm in a boarded-up City Hall.

The main force of Edith was aimed at Cameron, some 25 miles east of the Texas line, and it was carrying sustained winds of 100 miles an hour with highest gusts near the center.

At 8 a.m. the National Hurricane Center located the storm's eye east 23.5 west longitude and 93.5 north longitude — about 25 miles southwest of Cameron moving northeast at 15 to 18 miles an hour.

It was coming ashore at high tide, with water levels approaching 18 to 12 feet higher than normal. A few tornadoes were expected along the coast.

Heavy rain was falling in Cameron, where winds early in the day were hitting 80 miles an hour.

Roland Trusclet, Civil Defense Director for Cameron who was among the officials remaining, said, "Rain is blowing heavy into us, but it is nothing alarming yet."

Contacted by shortwave radio, reported, "We got some water in the street, maybe ankle deep. Most of that is from the rain, however, not tides."

He reported power was out in the area and telephone communications no longer working in Cameron Parish (county), which has about 5,000 residents.

Thousands from the coastal area between Cameron and Morgan City, La., were evacuated to the coast.

Tornado conditions extending up to 80 miles inland were forecast along the breadth of the hurricane warning area.

Except for Cameron, the evacuation pace was slower than civil defense officials feared in some areas. Inland water backed up by the rising sea flowed shallowly over highways in some areas when evacuation got under way.

### Hi-Speed Trains Seen For Disney

A State Department of Transportation study released today recommended establishment of service between Tampa International Airport and Orlando, via Walt Disney World.

The three-volume study by Strategy Research Corporation, of Miami, said, "The market potential is sufficient to warrant the initiation" of high speed rail service in the Tampa-Orlando corridor.

The study findings were announced by Secretary of Transportation Edward A. Mueller, during a Transportation Forum sponsored by the Greater Sanford Chambers of Commerce at the Civic Center.

Attending the forum were officials from Tallahassee and DeLand (DOT district headquarters) and from counties and cities along the Daytona Beach-St. Petersburg corridor of Interstate 4. (Related photographs on page 3A.)

The report emphasized that the key to successful train service depends on three main innovations, all of which were incorporated in its proposed "Optimum rail system":

- Use of the sleek, 160-mile-an-hour TurboTrain utilizing service with eight round trips a day providing service between Tampa Airport and the Orlando central business district with direct service to Walt Disney World and McCoy Jetport with stops at Ybor City, Auburndale, and Lakeland. Such service will enable the passenger to traverse the distance between Tampa Airport and Walt Disney World in one hour and 35 minutes, making it the most rapid form of ground transit available, as well as the most convenient.

### Court Denies Reduction In Clark Bond

### Slaying Suspect Arrested

COLUMBIA, Miss. (AP) — A 30-year-old New York state man, wanted in connection for slayings in Florida and Georgia, was held here today pending extradition proceedings against him by state officials.

David Mack Hicks of Elmira, N.Y., was arrested at a farm near Sanford by state and local officials, and transferred to the Marion County jail here Wednesday.

Hicks is wanted in connection with the execution-style slaying of an Orlando Fla., man, the Mississippi Highway Patrol said. He was indicted by an Orlando grand jury for the alleged slaying of Clayton Eugene Walker, 22, last Aug. 17.

An Orlando gun dealer was also indicted in connection with the killing.

Hicks, described by state officers as "one of the most dangerous men in the southeastern United States," was also sought on a federal charge of interstate flight to avoid prosecution.

He was also known under the alias of Paul Burgess, the patrol said. Hicks had been living on the Mississippi farm since mid-August, officers said.
