Council Approves 5-Acre Purchase

Casselberry Senior Citizen Complex Eyed

Construction will begin on a new senior citizens complex in Casselberry within the

matching fund basis of \$3 for every local \$1

-The county commission wishes to cooperate in the local funding.

The Casselberry City Council taking the positive approach Monday night approved the expenditure of \$1,000 for a contractural agreement to purchase an option on a fiveacre-plus parcel fronting on Secret Way, contiguous to the St. Augustine Church

Sunset Drive near Seminola Boulevard. Thomas Binford, owner of the land, said today the option to purchase will be good until Oct. 25, 1979. Sale price of the land, subject to an appraisal, is \$75,000, Binford said. He said he has owned the property less than a year and bought it with the intent of building on it himself. He said he agreed to the option, however, because he believes there is a need for a senior complex in that area of the

In addition, the city council Monday night, noting it has already budgeted \$15,000 for a senior facility in the current fiscal year, approved the allocation of another \$15,000 from surplus revenue from its utility system. Assistant City Planner Bruce Furino told community, found during a recent citysponsored census, is senior citizens, numbering 3,000 of the city's 15,000 population. He said he has discussed with officers of the Area Agency on the Aging (AAA) of the East

He said the steering committee has not formally approved the site, but that the Binford site is its first choice. The steering committee is composed of Elizabeth Redmon, Carl Heintz, Lewis Blood and James Birkenmeyer.

Furino, saying the project has the 'blessing of the federal government so far'. said the city engineer has not checked out the topography of the parcel as yet and the purchase would be contingent upon the grant being received.

Binford said he received assurance from Dr. James Mowbray of the AAA that the chances are good for the federal funding to be

Furino said the first phase of the project is the purchase of the land and the construction of the intra-structure with additional work on the facility to be funded during the two years

ROME (UPI) - Premier Giulio Andreotti made an 11th-hour appeal to salvage his government despite the withdrawal of support by Italy's powerful Communist party.

But Andreotti's minority Christian Democratic government appeared doomed today without the support of the Communists, the nation's second largest party and the most powerful Communist Party in the West.

Teen-Aged Sniper Facing Possible Murder Charges

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — Murder charges may be filed today against a 16-year-old girl who, 'saying she "didn't like Mondays" and wanted to "cheer up the day," fired 40 shots into a crowded school yard, killing the principal and custodian and wounding nine students and a policeman.

Brenda Spencer was being detained at Juvenile Hall on two counts of murder and 10 counts of assault with intent to commit murder for the six-hour shooting spree into the yard of Cleveland Elementary School, about 100 feet away from her home where she was

Patty: A Matter Of Hours

PLEASANTON, Calif. (UPI) - For Patricia Hearst it's just a matter of hours before freedom becomes a reality and she can rebuild her life that was shattered five years ago by a small band of terrorists. She has spent 22 months as an inmate at the Federal Youth Corrections Center —serving a sevenyear term on bank robbery charges. President Carter announced an end to the agonies of imprisonment for Miss Hearst Monday, commuting her sentence and permitting her release Thursday. He said he is convinced she is "no risk to the community" and will be "a law-abidding citizen."

Rockies Spawn New Storm

United Press International Winter's latest major storm hurtled out of the Rockies and onto the Plains today. smothering central Kansas with up to 9 inches of snow and leaving a trail of powder as far south as Tucson, Ariz. A Heavy snow warning was issued for the Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo., areas and forecasters predicted the storm would travel to the Northeast today skirting snow-weary Chicago and other areas hard-hit by previous storms.

Labor Racket Trial Begins

President Carter's voluntary anti-inflation plan leans heavily for its success on the affirmative response of organized labor.

Events in Britain do little to cheer the president as the time-table on the first major labor contract to be negotiated in 1979 grows short. The Teamsters Union current contract expires

in March and the settlement on a new pact is likely to set the pace for other industries. Government efforts in Britain to limit wage

increases have set off an epidemic of crippling strikes-including a nationwide walkout by truck drivers that has paralyzed the economy for more than two weeks.

Prime Minister James Callaghan insisted that inflation required wage increases be limited to 5 percent. Settlement have been approaching 17

The Carter guidelines are less rigid. The president proposed in October that wage hikes be held to 7 percent.

The president could take some encouragement for the cautious support of his program by Teamsters Union President Frank Fitzsimmons. But we don't know what the Teamsters will be demanding when negotiations open.

The British experience argues for a reasoned response from U.S. labor. Britain, according to the Observer, a London newspaper, "faces the frightening prospect of many hospitals under siege, schools closed, rubbish piling up in the streets of cities, ambulance crews refusing to handle emergency calls, dead bodies unburied and municipal airports silenced.

Keep GSA Boss

The uncertainty over the status of Jay Solomon, administrator of the scandal-plagued General Services Administration, is illtimed to win public confidence in the continuing investigation of GSA corruption.

Under Solomon's vigorous leadership, 41 indictments have been returned against GSA officials and contractors involved in shady deals. More than two dozen have pleaded guilty to charges of defrauding the government. But Solomon has been criticized for being too frank with news

people in discussing GSA irregularities. In addition, he stirred the wrath of House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. last year when he fired the agency's No. 2 man, Robert Griffin, a personal friend of O'Neill's.

President Carter, who is dependent upon O'Neill's cooperation in getting approval of White House legislation, created a new job for Griffin, and now the White House has confirmed rumors that a talent search is under way for a successor to Solomon. Solomon has said he will determine himself when he is to leave

Until the extent of GSA corruption is revealed and resolved, the president's effort should be to persuade Solomon to stay not to seek a more malleable successor.

The Other 75% Of Budget

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The noisy guns vs. butter controversy surrounding President Carter's "austerity" budget for fiscal 1980 is all very scintillating from a political standpoint, but it needs to be put in perspective.

The dispute now raging over the relative allocation of resources to defense and social programs actually involves no more than 25 percent of the total spending called for by the president's budget.

It is, in other words, a fight over the hole in the budget donut while the real thing - the other 75 percent earmarked for "uncontrollable" costs argely escapes both congressional and public

Something, obviously, is out of whack here and the question which springs to mind is whether these so-called "uncontrollable" costs really are, as implied, beyond the reach of would-be budget trimmers in the White House and o

The answer, as it so often is in politics, is both yes and no. It all depends on which expenditures you're talking about.

After a private meeting with Teng, Senate Majority Leader tacking Taiwan had been "considerably allayed."

"He was very frank, and from his standpoint he went as far as he thought he could go," Byrd said, adding that Teng "could not agree not to use force at some point in the future, but he did not

"It seems to me that goes pretty far," Byrd said. "It doesn't close the door, as many senators would like to have heard." Even many of those who think the administration has sold out Taiwan in its zeal to recognize Peking felt Teng was "impressive" in his efforts to defuse congressional opposition. But most said they were not convinced.

Teng, barely 5 feet tall, was swallowed up by the contingent of guards that accompanied him in the Capitol. Photographers and tourists craning for shots found him invisible. But visitors applauded warmly wherever he went.

Teng and Carter were initialing a series of agreements late this afternoon setting up the governmental machinery for future contacts science, technology, trade, air and maritime travel and student exchanges.

Teng already has accepted the establishment of the first American news bureaus in China.
