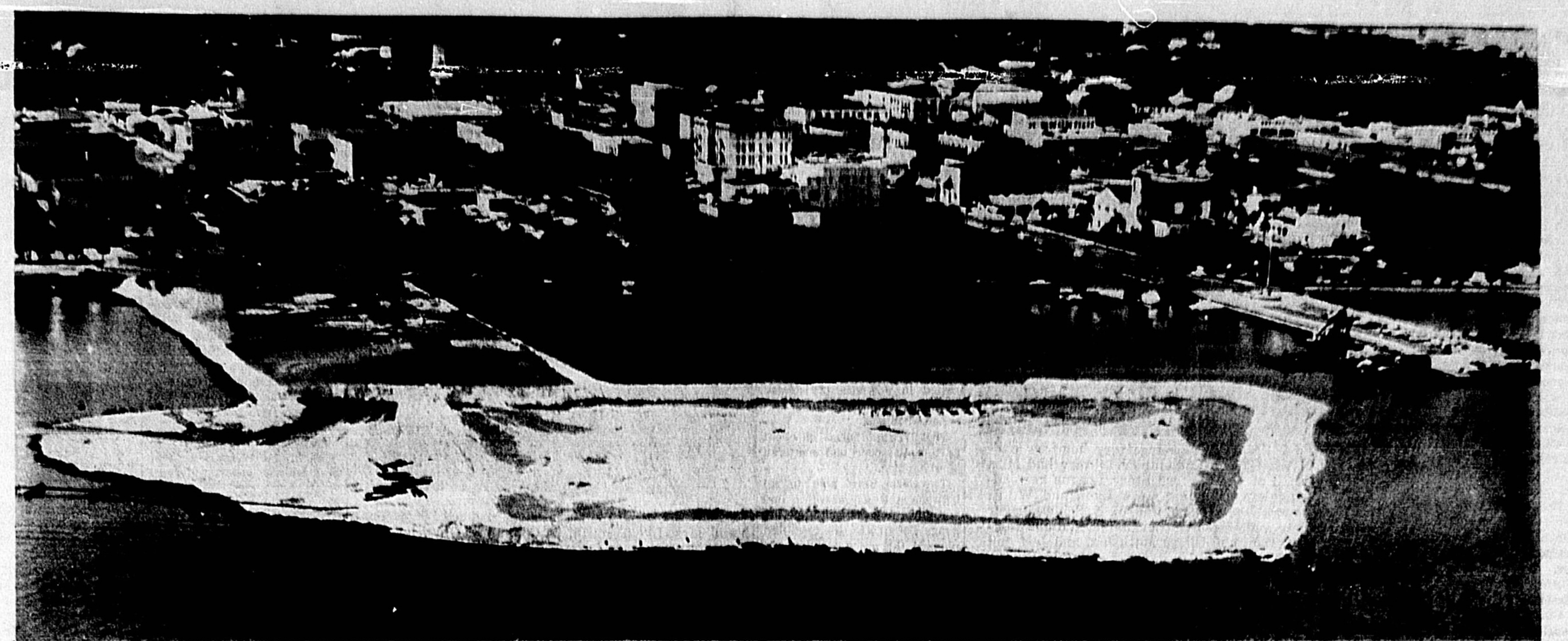

State Industrial Growth Hikes

Registration Open At Longwood

Persons who have not previously registered to vote in the city of Longwood may do so during regular office hours at city hall, Mrs. Omie R. Shorrock, city clerk, reports.

Qualification to register is that persons must have been residents of the city for six months and of the state of Florida for one year.

An estimated 1,000 were registered for last year's elections, but, according to the clerk, many persons have moved and their names will be removed from the books.

Books will remain open until late November, closing 10 days prior to the Dec. 6 municipal elections.

'Ev' Pushes For Prayer

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen tries to shake loose from the Senate judiciary committee today his constitutional amendment to permit voluntary prayers in the public schools.

"The Illinois Senator (also of DeBary, Fla.) said he was hopeful of the outcome of the hearing and cajoling will do no good."

Dirksen introduced his proposed amendment on March 22, saying it was intended to clarify the Supreme Court's interpretation of the constitutional requirement for separation of church and state.

Dirksen's amendment was referred to the judiciary committee's subcommittee on constitutional amendments. Only last week Sen. Birch Bayh (D-Ind.), the subcommittee chairman, announced eight days of hearings on it would start Aug. 1.

But Dirksen, who wanted quicker, shorter hearings, said he would ask the full judiciary committee at its meeting today to take his amendment away from Bayh's subcommittee and act on it.

He said he wanted to get it on the Senate's calendar of pending legislation even if it were reported out of committee without recommendation.

"The senate is entitled to vote on it," he said.

Approval by a two-thirds majority of the Senate and the House is required to submit a constitutional amendment to the states. Then, to become effective, it must be ratified by three-fourths of the state legislatures.

Dirksen has said that, if necessary, he will offer his amendment as a substitute for a minor bill already on the Senate calendar. He used this tactic before in trying to get approval of a constitutional amendment on legislative re-appointment.

Altamonte GI In Vet Hospital

Pfc. William H. Buell, former Altamonte Springs resident wounded in action on July 4 in Viet Nam, has been returned to the United States for treatment at Chelsea Veterans Hospital, Chelsea, Mass., where he will be for the next three months.

He was on patrol when his company (part of the 133rd "Screaming Eagles") was ambushed by the Viet Cong. He was hit five times by 30 caliber automatic rifle bullets. Seconds before he was hit he killed four Viet Cong and wounded a fifth. Later in the same engagement the VC lieutenant who shot him was himself killed.

In a coincidence, young Buell's father, Howard Buell, who is working as a civilian in Viet Nam with the RMK Construction Company, was at a job site less than a mile from the base hospital where his son was taken. He was able to be with his son for six days before he was airlifted stateside.

William's mother, Mrs. Robert Viesch, resides in Casselberry.

Bringing Home Records Bundle

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—One of man's most exciting and significant space adventures reaches a blazing climax today when the Gemini 10 astronauts make a high-speed dive back through the atmosphere, bringing home a bundle of records.

Command pilot John W. Young, a Navy Commander, and space-walker Michael Collins, an Air Force major, planned to trigger the retro-rockets on their fuel-spoor spacecraft at 3:31 p.m. EST to start a fiery descent. The landing in the Atlantic about 550 miles east southeast of Cape Kennedy was timed for 4:07 p.m.

Terrors In Viet Nam Described

"The war in Viet Nam is an unbelievably terrible kind of war and the suffering of civilians is unbearable," Dr. Joseph O'Malley, Orlando, and ex-Marine, told members of the Sanford Kiwanis Club Wednesday.

Dr. O'Malley, who recently returned from a trip to Viet Nam to do plastic surgery on hundreds of mutilated people, showed Kiwanians shocking color slides of tortured, mutilated and napalm-burned Vietnamese, many of them children.

"The tortures and mutilations were inflicted, mainly on children, by the Viet Cong, to force parents to join the Communist forces," Dr. O'Malley explained.

Some of the tortures consisted of cutting off the lips, slitting of the face from mouth to ear with bayonets and gouging out of eyes.

Other patients on whom Dr. O'Malley did plastic surgery were those hideously burned by U. S. napalm-bombing attacks.

"Even if, and when, we win this war, it will take 50 years to put these people back together. These people have lived in terror and horror for 22 years," Dr. O'Malley declared.

Lack of medical facilities, instruments and beds is critical, according to Dr. O'Malley, who has gathered and shipped some 2,000 pounds of sheets, pillows and cases, instruments, drugs and supplies to Viet Nam since his return.

He suggested that the U. S. government send plastic surgeons to Viet Nam to work on mutilation cases on a rotation basis. He also advocated the blockading of Ho Phong harbor to stop British, Russian and Danish ships from delivering supplies to the Communists and more bombing of depots and oil supply dumps, as is now being done.

During his stay there, Dr. O'Malley adopted an orphaned Vietnamese child, who was later killed before she could be gotten out of the war-torn country.

He said there are thousands of orphaned children in the

3 More AF Jets Downed

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — North Viet Nam's anti-aircraft defenses shot down three more U.S. Air Force planes — one a radar ship packed with electronic detection and jamming gear — as American pilots ran through another barrage of missiles and sighted more Communist MIGs, the U.S. military command announced today.

The twin-engine RB66 reconnaissance plane with a crew of six was the second of its type reported lost in the war. The other planes brought down in raids Wednesday were both single-seat F105 Thunderchief fighter bombers, bringing the announced total of American aircraft over the Communist North to 298.

All eight airmen were listed as missing.

The North Vietnamese fired off the Soviet-built surface-to-air missiles and American pilots sighted six Communist jet fighters, the U.S. command said. There was no report of any clashes with the enemy planes.

Under the U.S. command's reporting policy, there was no announcement whether the planes were lost to missiles or conventional ground fire.

The RB66 was hit about 70 miles north-northwest of Hanoi, while one of the Thunderchiefs went down on a strike 60 miles north-northeast of Hanoi, a U.S. spokesman said.

The location of the other loss was not immediately announced.

Seven American planes have been reported shot down in North Viet Nam this week. On Tuesday, a missile knocked down one U.S. plane and a MIG-17 got another. American jets encountered a record barrage of SAMs.

U.S. casualties declined sharply last week, a military spokesman announced. He said 65 Americans were killed, missing in action in the week of July 16-22, compared with 110 killed, 620 wounded and seven missing the previous seven days.

The casualties brought the number of Americans killed this year to an unofficial total of 2,456 and 18,404 since the beginning of U.S. involvement in the war on Jan. 1, 1961.

U.S. Marines combing the jungled mountains just south of the demilitarized zone killed 49 more North Vietnamese troops Wednesday to raise the enemy toll to 425 since 7,000 Leathernecks and 1,000 South Vietnamese soldiers began Operation Hastings last Friday. 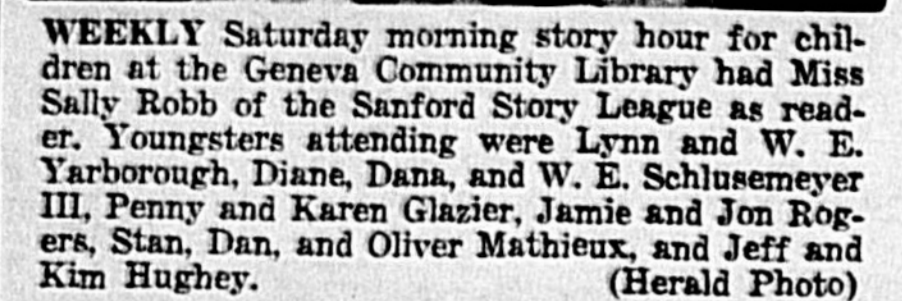

LBJ: Americans To 'React Accordingly'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson, while carefully avoiding retaliation threats, says the American people would "react accordingly" should Hanoi try to down U.S. planes on the occasion of the 1966 congressional election season, Johnson said in a news conference Wednesday by saying: "I think the people of this country and the peaceful people of the world would find this action very disturbing and repulsive, and would react accordingly."

Johnson twice skirted questions about possible American retaliation against any trials of the American prisoners.

A standing-room-only crowd of newsmen gathered in the brightly lit East Room of the White House for the 35-minute conference, aired by television and radio networks.

Some other highlights:

Johnson reiterated, "our desire to engage in unconditional discussions" at the earliest possible date in an effort to end the war.

Johnson said, "I have not the slightest indication that the other side is willing to make any concession to take any action that would lead to the peace table."

Until there is such a sign, he said "we, of course, would expect to tie the hands of our men in Viet Nam."

Store At Jax Dynamited In Racial Disorder

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — A white-owned small business store was ripped by a dynamite blast in a Negro section Wednesday night in Jacksonville's third night of racial disorder, police said.

Twenty-five persons were arrested in a series of isolated incidents. Property damage was reported minor.

The dynamite blast blew out part of the door and scattered merchandise.

Travelers were able to go between the expressways and downtown without encountering gangs of rock tossers that plagued the areas Monday and Tuesday nights.

Meanwhile, talks seeking to solve a series of Negro grievances continued between members of the city commission and a delegation of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Mayor Louis H. Ritter told Ruelledge Pearson, NACP state and local president, and a group of white and Negro ministers that progress is being made in the program to improve housing conditions and housing conditions for Negroes.

Pearson said his NACP group will decide after a progress report Friday whether to resume a direct action program, including protest marches such as the one last Monday which marked the beginning of the current wave of trouble.

Officials hope to have quiet relations before the weekend.

"Every 7 a.m. disturbance we've had in the past has been on a Friday or Saturday," the mayor said. He issued an appeal on the television for parents to keep their children out of trouble areas.

City Judge John E. Santora invoked a tough policy against vandals — consisting of six to twelve months in jail and a fine of \$1,000 — for charges of vandalism. He sent all of them to jail for terms from 15 to 90 days.

He said teen-agers will get 60 days and adults 90 days for rock throwing and similar actions.

Segregationist Warren E. H. Polk, who tried to give what he called a "Klan warning" to Pearson during Monday's march and was arrested, went back to jail this time on a county charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Goodbye To Celia

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Weather Bureau said Hurricane Celia would move across the shipping lanes this morning and over the coastal waters of Nova Scotia.

The bureau, in a 4 a.m. advisory, said Celia had been located about 180 miles south of Halifax, Nova Scotia, moving toward the north at about 45 miles an hour.

"The highest winds are 80 m.p.h. in squalls in the eastern semicircle near the center," the advisory said. "Gales extend out ward 100 miles in the western and 250 miles in the eastern semicircle."

The Weather Bureau said the highest winds will diminish to about 60 knots within 12 hours but the area of gales should remain the same or possibly increase some within 12 to 24 hours.

It said fishing vessels and small craft in the Nova Scotia area should exercise caution during the morning.

Presidential Election Changes Asked In Suit

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Delaware has asked the U. S. Supreme Court to "open the door" to reorganization of the present system for choosing American presidents.

State Atty. Gen. David P. Buckson, Republican, filed suit directly in the Supreme Court against the 48 other states to effect a change in the way votes are counted in the Electoral College.

He told reporters earlier he expects some other small states to join in his complaint. The complaint said the strategic importance of large states has generally prevented both major parties from nominating presidential and vice presidential candidates from small states. Delaware and eight of the other 13 original states have never had one of their citizens elected president, it noted.

It asked the court, pursuant to its "one man, one vote" ruling, to declare unconstitutional state laws which provide for each voter to vote for all of the state's electors on a general ticket.

Core of Earth Will Be Probed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Ocean scientists will drill thousands of feet and millions of years into the earth's past under a program announced today by the National Science Foundation.

The program calls for bringing up core samples of seabottom sediments beneath the Atlantic and Pacific. These sediments constitute a record of what the world was like long ago when its climate, life, and surface features presumably were far different from those of today.

The foundation said it had awarded a \$4 million contract to the Scripps Institution of Oceanography of the University of California for a two-year, two-ocean drilling and research program to start in 1967.

Election Slated By ASC Service Among Farmers

A call for the "best man available" to serve on the ASC county committee was issued today by R. R. Smithwick, county office manager, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The committee is to be made up of members on the committee soon will be established at the ASCS county office.

"The committee system is the backbone of farm programs," Smithwick declared. "Its responsibilities include the conservation of natural resources, the stabilization of agricultural commodities, and price-support activities which protect and improve farm income. We need the best possible cross-section of farmers to insure effective administration of the various measures."

In Seminole County, Smithwick explained, 70 farmers took part last year in one or more programs administered by the ASC committee. These programs deal generally in the field of price support, production adjustment and conservation assistance.

Any local resident who is eligible to take part in an ASCS farm program may vote, and may hold office as a committeeman regardless of race, color, creed, or national origin. Further information regarding qualifications of committeemen is available at the ASCS county office.

Farmers who are eligible to vote in the elections also have the right to nominate as a candidate for county office. Any farmer who is eligible and willing to serve. Such positions, each nominating one member and signed by six more eligible voters, may be filed at the county office any time before Aug. 1. Eligible voters may sign on petitions as they wish. Additional nominations may be made by the incumbent ASC county committee.

The committee, in its selection of nominees, will make every effort to see to it that their list of candidates represents the various types of farming and the racial composition of farmers of the county.

The election of ASC committeemen in Seminole County will be held by mailing balloting Aug. 16-26.

Under a change in ASC election procedures made in 1965 one county committee member was elected for a one-year term, and the third member for a three-year term. Therefore, in 1966 and succeeding years, only one regular member will be elected annually for a term of three years. Each year, however, first and second alternate committeemen will be elected for one-year terms.

Incumbent county committeemen are Fred A. Dyson, Sanford; William G. Kilbee, Geneva; and Edward H. Parker, Maitland.

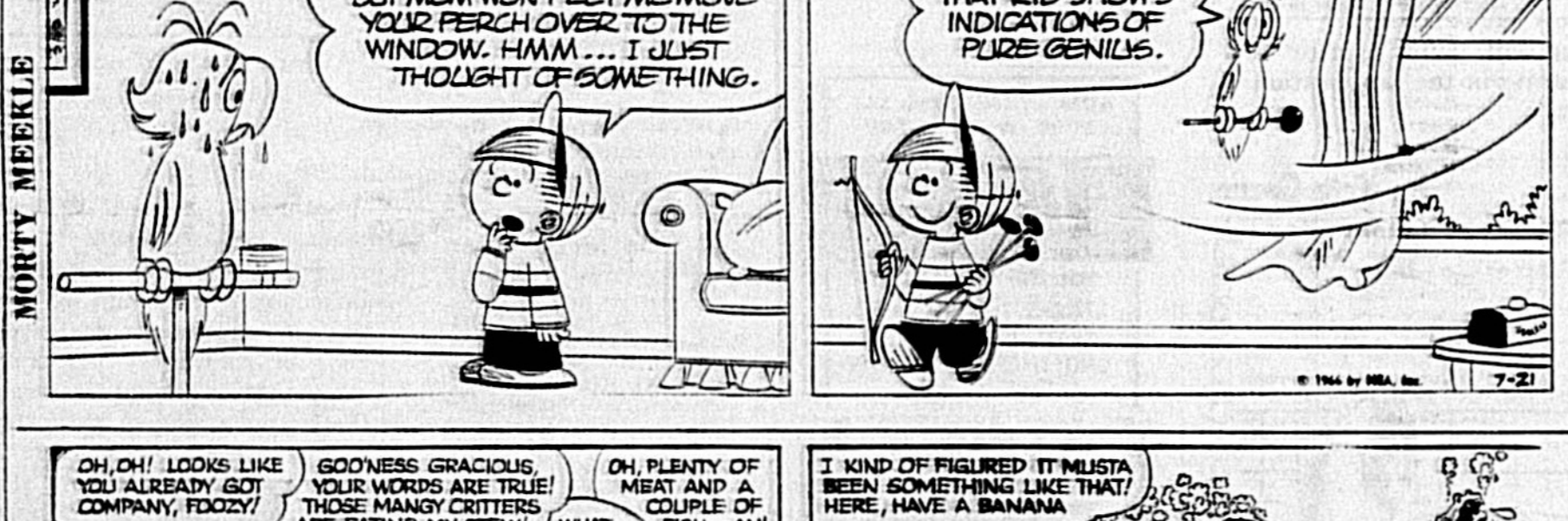
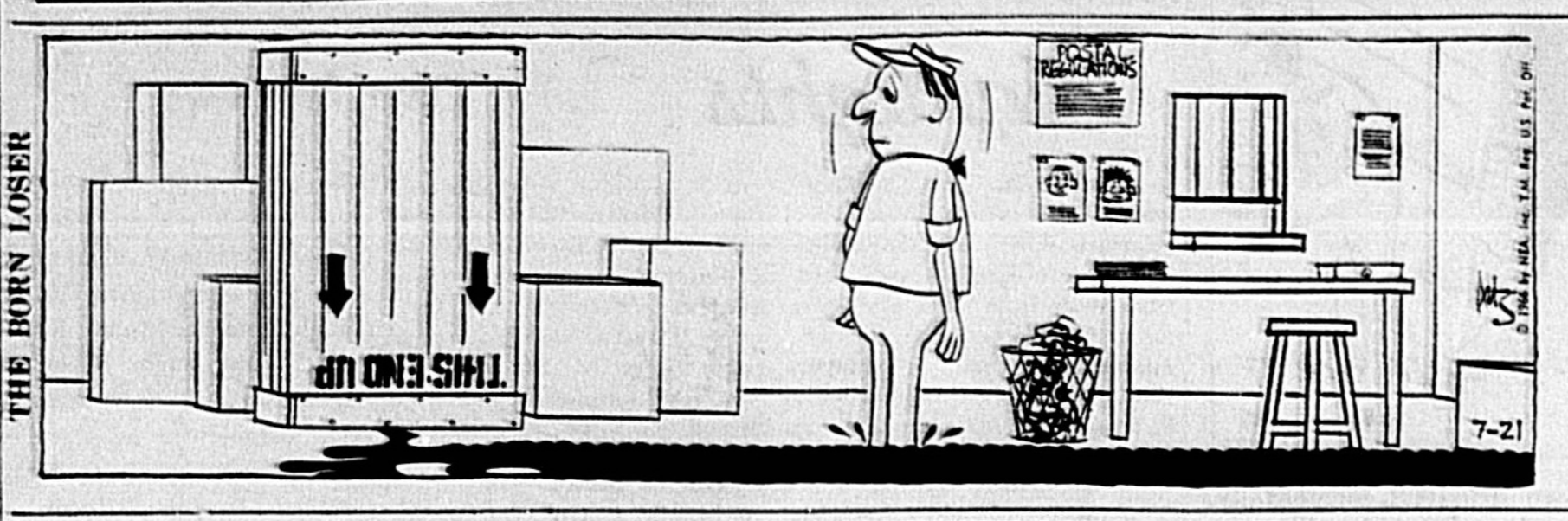

Benefits For Veterans — 11

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Veterans who need hospitalization because of an injury or disease incurred or aggravated in line of duty in active service have top priority for admission to Veterans Administration hospitals for treatment.

Next priority goes to veterans with service-connected disabilities who need hospitalization for treatment of those disabilities.

Eligible veterans are entitled to complete care both in VA hospitals and in other federal hospitals. Care in non-federal hospitals may be O.K. for service-connected disabilities.

Outpatient medical care is available to veterans with service-connected disabilities at VA field stations. This includes handgrips and medicine as well as treatment. The VA also may authorize a veteran to be treated by an approved private physician in his own home community.

For outpatient medical treatment, all disabilities of the Indian campaign, Spanish American War, Philippine Insurrection and Boxer Relief, are considered as service-connected. Application for service-connected disability should be made in advance.

This outpatient service is also available for the non-service-connected disabilities of disabled veterans being trained under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, if treatment is necessary to prevent interruption of their training or to enable them to return to training.

RESIDENCE CARE — If you have had war service and have a disability that prevents you from earning a living, you may be eligible for residence in a veterans administration residence.

This care is generally for veterans whose disability is not so severe as to require hospitalization. Once admitted, you are entitled to full care, including medical treatment.

As a rule, transportation to a residence at government expense is provided only for the initial admission.

A veteran should not be taken to a residence until approval for his admission has been received.

To be eligible for residence, a veteran with peacetime service only must be permanently disabled. Veterans discharged for a disability incurred in line of duty, receiving compensation for a service-incurred or service-aggravated disability or have been awarded the Medal of Honor. He must have no adequate means of support and be incapacitated from earning a living and meet certain other requirements.

War veterans whose disabilities are non-service-connected must execute an affidavit of inability to pay for their care.

OUTPATIENT DENTAL TREATMENT — Veterans receiving payment for service-connected dental problems may apply at any time and receive as many dental treatments as are needed.

This same privilege is accorded those other veterans not receiving compensation for dental disabilities:

- Those whose dental problems result from combat wounds or service injuries.
- Former prisoners of war with service-connected dental disabilities.
- Veterans whose non-service-connected dental problems are aggravating a service-connected disability.
- Disabled veterans receiving training under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act and who need dental treatment to prevent interruption of their training or to return to training.

In addition, some veterans are entitled only to one-time treatment or one series of treatments, if they apply within one year after discharge or release. These are veterans whose dental problems are service-connected and existed at the time of separation from service, but were not considered serious enough to entitle the veteran to compensation in degree.

PROSTHETIC APPLIANCES — The Veterans Administration may provide a veteran with a prosthetic appliance needed for a service-connected disability or for a disease or disability that is aggravating a service-connected disability.

Prosthetic appliances may also be provided for other disabilities or injuries for which VA hospitalization has been authorized or for a condition which is aggravating such a disability.

Veterans living in VA residences may be provided with prosthetic appliances for other disabilities.

To be eligible for any of these medical benefits the veteran must not have a dishonorable type of discharge.

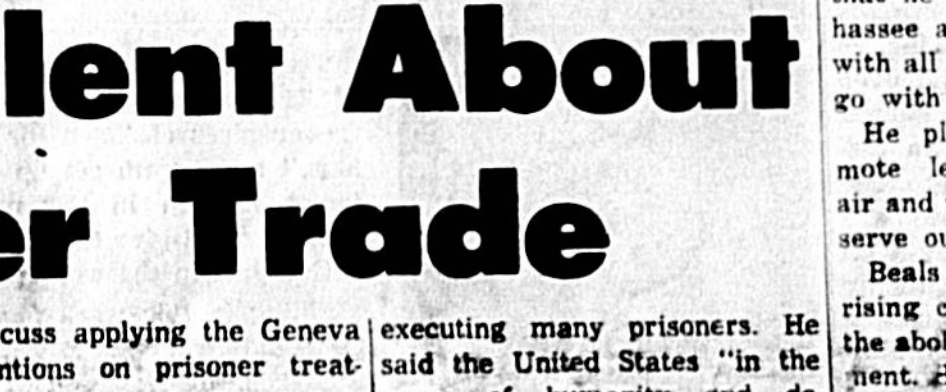
