### The Grant Of Power

There have been times during the past year or two when doubts have arisen in our mind, as they probably have in everyone's, concerning the desirability of a Democratic form of government. It has seemed to us occasionally that almost any other system could have prevented the abuses and eliminated the evils which were stifling commerce and producing widespread poverty and want. We had apparently demonstrated our utter incapacity for governing our-

ently demonstrated our utter incapacity for governing our selves.

And yet it is evident now that the very flexibility which Democracy affords, is furnishing the means by which there is every hope of emerging from this depression. The people as a whole, unable to decide specific questions for themselves, have determined to delegate to one man full authority to decide for them. Upon the shoulders of President Roosevelt they have placed the burden of shaky banks, unbalanced budgets, tariffs, war debts, money values, farm prices, unemployment, hours of labor, and a veritable myriad of other intricate problems upon which for several years it has been impossible to get concerted action.

We have, in short, by the will of the people, changed our Democracy to a dictatorship. For the time being we have decreed that the will of the people shall be subordinated to the will of one man. Because it had been impossible for the people themselves to reach an agreement on government economies, we have given to the President the power to slash at will. Unable to manage our own affairs we have asked the President to manage them for us.

The principle back of the trust which we have imposed is our President it may be well for us to consider with regard to Governor Sholts. He too was swept into office on an amazing tide of dissatisfaction over the existing order. He too had promised a "new deal". And since his election has above a sincere deal."

He too had promised a "new deal". And since his election he has shown a sincere desire to fulfill his pledges and give the people the kind of an administration they evidently

wanted when they elected him.

He has asked the Legislature for the authority to help work out the bond problems of our various cities and counties, to reduce school expenditures while at the same time providing against the complete disintegration of the schools, to control beer sales so as to guard against evils associated with the saloon days. Without power he can do little or nothing.

The question for the people now to decide is whether they want to continue to battle against the depression like a leaderless mob, helpless and disorganized, with every man for himself, under the guise of Democratic government, or whether they wish to exercise the power which they have under a Democratic government and entrust to their lead-

ers sufficient power to do something. With such power will, of course, go responsibility. Mistakes will probably be made but they will be the natural human errors of judgment. If the final objective is reached, there will be none to criticize for isolated blunders. If after a reasonable opportunity has been granted, the de-pression is overcome, everyone will be satisfied. If the powers prove ineffectual, they can be revoked.

Heretofore airplanes which cruised at 150 to 180 miles an hour were confronted with the dangerous difficulty of landing at proportionately high speed. With the invention of wing flaps, it is now possible to land at 50 miles an hour, making the maneuver comparatively free from hazard. The wing flaps are merely flanges which can be dropped down from the under side of the wings and which act as brakes with the air forming the resistance.

Strangely enough, unlike most other forms of trans-portation which become more expensive with increased speed, sirplane operation costs drop with increased speed. The time saved more than makes up for the added fuel

consumption of more powerful motors.

The diminution of schedules stands to be a big boom to airplane lines. There will be the two-fold advantage of less coat and greater patronage appeal. Consider the convenience of the service which will be operated along the Atlantic seaboard next fall. One will be able to take a plane at Miami at 8:30 o'clock in the morning and be in New York at 5:00 o'clock of the same day. You could leave Jacksonville shortly before noon, have tea in America's metropolis, attend the theater and be back in the gateway

city the next day in time for an afternoon round of golf.

With this kind of service in operation, week-end visits to Florida resorts may become quite a fad with people in the East and Middle West who might otherwise not be able to spare the time by using slower means of transportation.




