Deputies probe claim of sexual assault of inmate in jail

SANFORD - Seminole County sheriff's deputies today are investigating an inmate's claims that she was sexually assaulted by another female inmate in the Seminole County jail at about 8 p.m. Tuesday. The actions of a jail guard are also being probed in the case.

The 30-year-old victim reported that the 26-year-old suspect allegedly pulled her into a cell and took her clothes off. The victim is accusing a jail guard of leaving the door of that cell open after she was pulled in. The victim said other prisoners watched the sexual assault.

The victim said she asked a jail guard to take her out of the cell while the assault was going on. The guard allegedly said she had to take another prisoner to see a visitor, and allegedly did not assist the victim. The victim said the guard she asked for help did not return. She reported her allegations to another guard.

Seminole County Sheriff's Capt. Roy Hughey said today the allegations are under investigation, including those made against the guard, who was scheduled to be questioned today.

Jailed on stolen recorder charge

SANFORD - A man who allegedly sold a video recorder stolen from a Sanford home faces a charge of dealing in stolen property. He is scheduled to appear in court May 16.

Sanford police reported determining that a video recorder stolen Oct. 30, 1987, from a home at 2715 S. Sanford Ave., was pawned by a woman on April 1. That woman and a man allegedly told police they bought the recorder for \$80 from the suspect who has been charged.

Robert Wayne Bridges, 24, of 2655 Grandview Ave., Sonford, was arrested at the Sanford police station at 3:30 p. 1: Tuesday. He periled \$2,000 bend.

There was no report of charges against the woman who allegedly bought the recorder from the suspect and then pawned it.

Student charged with manslaughter after death of convicted murderer

SANFORD - A Sanford college student charged with manslaughter in the fight-related death of a Sanford man remains jailed today in lieu of a total bond of \$10,150.

Albert Armstrong. 20, of 1320 Williams Ave., has been charged in connection with the death of Freddle Lee Conquest, 29, of 107 McKay Blvd., Sanford. Conquest died at about 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in an Orlando hospital as a result of a head injury he reportedly received in a Saturday night fight in Sanford with Armstrong. Armstong was arrested Wed-

the Seminole County Sheriff's Department. He is a student at Seminole Community College, a sheriff's report said.

Conquest had served a portion of a 10-year-prison sentence on a charge of second-deree murder in the Jan. 10, 1984, drug related murder of Michael Mc-Cloud, 22, of Sanford. McCloud was shot to death. Conquest served that time in the Lake **Correctional Institute.**

Seminole County sheriff's investigator Janice Walthers reported that alleged threats by Conquest against two Sanford women and the punching of one of those women in the face, led nesday following questioning at to a fight with Armstrong, which resulted in Conquest's fatal inju-

FY The trouble with the women. Armstong's sister Cynthia. and his cousin Laura Knight, began when Conquest reportedly threatened them and struck Knight while the three were at Westside Recreation Center in

Sanford on Friday night. The women contacted Armstong and told him what had happened. He reportedly went with them and Alexander Wynn, another cousin of Armstong's, to the Deluxe Bar. Southwest Road, just outside of Sanford. There Armstrong confronted Conquest just outside the front door of the bar, a sheriff's report said.

Armstong allegedly struck Conquest with his fist and knocked him backward. Armstrong reportedly told Walthers that he heard Conquest's head crack when it hit the pavement.

Armstong and his companions left the area and Conquest was transported by members of his family to Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford. From there he was transported to Florida Hospital-Orlando, where he died Tuesday.

In addition to the manulaughter charge Armstrong has also been charged with failure to appear in court on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Health experts blast Supreme Court's alcoholism ruling

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Mental health experts say the Supreme Court has set back the cause of alcoholics by upholding a Veterans Administration policy defining alcoholism as "willful misconduct."

The justices ruled 4-3 Wed-nesday the VA policy does not violate Section 504 of the 1973 **Rehabilitation Act, which forbids** discrimination on the basis of handicap.

The rule under attack was used to deny two former servicemen an extension of the 10-year deadline for using educational benefits provided under the GI Bill.

Writing for a plurality of the court, Justice Byron White said "there is nothing in the Rehabilitation Act" to require the VA to give special treatment to veterans who have a disability that is partly of their own making.

"Congress is entitled to establish priorities for the allocation of the limited resources available for veterans' benefits," he wrote, "and thereby to conclude that veterans who bear some responsibility for their disabilities have no stronger claim to an extended eligibility period than do ablebodied veterans."

In White's opinion, the court said it was not deciding whether alcoholism is a disease, but rather whether the VA's rule treated alcoholics unfairly as compared to other veterans.

VA Administrator Thomas Turnage praised the court's ruling and tried to counter criticism of the agency's treatment of alcoholics

'We treat alcoholism in our hospitals on an ongoing basis in a number of ways. We recognize that it is a problem. The distinction here is we don't provide benefits to those people suffering from alcoholism that is a product of willful misconduct." he said

Susan Galbraith, a spokesman for the National Council on Alcoholism, said the group was 'outraged'' over the decision. "We really see the Rehabilita-

tion Act as protecting alcoholics. from discrimination." she said.

"Our plan is to definitely go to Congress to make clear that the act should cover (alcoholic) veterans ... and we will begin to do that immediately."

The case involved two Army veterans, Eugene Traynor, 46, of New York City, and James McKelvey, 42, of Rockville, Md.

Both men are recovered alcoholics who sought educational benefits after their 10-year period of eligibility expired. The **GI Bill provides for extensions** when veterans are unable to use their benefits in the required time due to "a physical or mental disability which was not the result of ... their own willful misconduct.



Folks point to a cold front on the way but face it, cold now means just a couple of degrees less than what we've got. Forget frigid until next December.

The NWS said that by 3 p.m. Wednesday the storm had dumped 1.44 inches of rain in downtown Los Angeles, which was also pelted by pea-sized hail as temperatures plunged into the low 50s.

The downtown area tied the record for the lowest maximum temperature for April 20 - set in 1957 - when the mercury rose to only 57 degrees.

A mud slide caused minor damage to one house in Santa Clarita shortly before 9 a.m. Wednesday, but county firefighters helped sandbag the area to prevent further damage, said Los Angeles County Fire Department spokeswoman Debbie Shackelford.

Both Tuesday and Wednesday nights' games between the San Diego Padres and Los Angeles Dodgers were postponed because of rain, the 13th and 14th rainouts in Dodger Stadium history and only the third consecutive rainouts.

Look to the private sector

Education Secretary Bill Bennett rolled the cholestic waters the other day by suggesting that Catholic schools enroll dropouts and the most troubled public school students, teach them, and then be recompensed by state or local governments.

Mr. Bennett is correct that parochial chools are better suited to turn many of these students around.

Unfortunately, he glossed over the constitutional prohibition against private schools receiving direct financial aid from the state. ideally, all states should provide parents with educational vouchers that could be redeemed at the schools of their choice.

Inasmuch as that sensible program has no chance of being approved by Congress, the Reagan administration should seek another way to encourage parochial schools to save problem students who, according to Mr. Bennett, "would otherwise be society's castoffs."

An alternative would be some form of financing by business or other private-sector groups that have a particular interest in transforming problem students into productive members of society.

Experience suggests it would be a good investment.

For years, parochial schools, with larger classes, lower-paid teachers and fewer resources, have been able to get more from their students than has the average public school.

This is largely because parochial schools insist upon a more orderly learning environment that emphasizes basic skills, high expectations, homework and individual attention to students.

Critics frequently contend that private schools have an unfair advantage over public schools because they cater to highly motivated, affluent students who come from devout Catholic families.

To the contrary, the student body at many inner-city Catholic schools consists primarily of poor, minority students, many of whom are Protestants.

Castro recounts Cuban side of 1962 crisis

Recently I was one of the participants in a conference on Cuban-American affairs sponsored by the Ford Foundation and Johns Hopkins University. Conducted for two days in Havana, the conference included a three-hour luncheon with Cuban leader Fidel Castro. During the lunch, Castro gave us what his aides later described as the most detailed personal account of the 1962 missile crisis that they had heard.

Castro began by expressing his belief that President John Kennedy handled his side of the episode with considerably more intelligence and skill than Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev. He said the Russians inadvertently set a trap for themselves by trying to keep the installation of the missiles secret and by permitting Kennedy to draw an artificial distinction between offensive and defensive weapons

The Soviets had as much legal right to install missiles in Cuba as the Americans did in Turkey and Italy, Castro told us. Khrushchev should have simply announced that Russia was assisting an ally by installing 42 missiles in Cuba, he

anid. There would have been no violation of international law, and if the Americans had protested, Moscow and Havana could have reminded them and the rest of the world that Washington had set the example with its own missiles.

By assuring Kennedy that it had no missiles in Cuba — indeed, no offensive weapons at all — Khrushchev's envoy Andrei Gromyko was not only lying, but creating an embarrassing position for the Russians when U.S. photo intelligence exposed the lie.

Castro was so fearful of this prospect that he sent Che Guevara on a special mission to Moncow to plead with the Russians to carry out the missile transfer publicly and un-apologetically. These warnings from Havana to Moscow were ignored, enabling Kennedy to seize the political high ground.

The idea for the missile transfer to Cuba grew out of a concern expressed by Khrushchev after his talks with Kennedy in Vienna in late 1961. The Russian leader told Castro that Kennedy had implied the possibility of an American move

against Cubs. despite the earlier failure at the Bay of Pigs in April 1981.

A Soviet general was sent to Cuba to discuss this danger with the Cultana and what might be done to counter it. The Russian general raised the possibility of furnishing the Cubans with enough missiles to deter a U.S. sttack. Castro said he "coincidentially" had been thinking about the same possibility.

We asked Castro whether he believed Khrushchev placed missiles in Cubs to help the Cubans or to strengthen the Soviets' missile balance against the United States. He said he was inclined to accept Khrushchev's claim that it was done to assist Cubs, because he had asked several high-ranking Soviet officials privately at various times over the years and they each confirmed this explanation.

The Cuban leader made one observation that I found chilling. During the height of the crisis, Castro recalled, he learned that desire for survival is not as strong as pride in nation and the passion of international conflict.

HAVRE DE GRACE, Md. (NEA) -A dozen weekend anglers fish patiently at the edge of the pier here. near the confluence of the Susquehanna River and the Chesspeake Bay, but nobody boasts of much of a catch.

The buckets at the feet of some fishermen contain a few scrawny catfish or perch, but others have nothing to show. When saled how he's faring, one angler shrugs and observes that "it's a good way to pass the time."

It wasn't always this way. In earlier times, the Susquehanna was a bountiful spawning ground for striped bass, shad, herring and other species. Both the river and the bay teemed with thriving schools of fish, vast oyster beds and the blue crabs for which the Chesapeake is nationally famous.

In recent decades, however, the bay and the rivers that empty into it have suffered from being used as a dumping ground for toxic chemicals, heavy metals, other industrial wastes, municipal sewage and agricultural runoff laden with pesticides, herbicides and fertilizers.

The commercial catch of striped bass (also known as rockfish) plummeted from 6 million pounds in 1970 to 600.000 pounds in 1983. The yearly shad catch, which peaked at 50 million pounds in the 1890s, has averaged 3 million pounds in the 1980s.

The agreement recently signed in Geneva, providing for the withdrawal of Soviet forces from Afghanistan, affords almost limitless food for thought.

On its face, it is unique. Nowhere else, so far as I am aware, has the Soviet Union publicly agreed to back down from a previously adopted political and military position in a foreign region of the globe. The closest analogy that comes to mind is Moscow's agreement to end its military occupation of eastern Austria in 1955. But that was part of a quadripartite solution of the r Austrian problem under

Carter administration persuaded his boss to initiate the program of supplying arms to the freedom fighters: to President Mohammad Zia ul-Haq of Pakistan, who risked Moscow's wrath to permit shipment of arms to them through his country, and sheltered millions of Afghan refugees as well; and, last but not least, to Ronald Reagan. who across the more than seven years of his administration to date has kept the vital arms flowing to the rebels.

One wonders, incidentally, why so many congressional Democrats are willing to authorize military aid to

SCIENCE WORLD Medicine joins with the media By Larry Doyle UPI Beleace Writer

CHICAGO (UPI) - Dr. William DeVries spends more than eight hours a day doing his job, and sometimes, it seems, longer than that taiking about it.

"I have a lot of demands on my time." the famed cardiac surgeon says. "First and foremost, I've got my patients, and they need me, and I have to take care of them.

"And then," DeVries adds. addressing the reporter. "There's you duvs.

DeVries' tone is neither derogatory nor particularly friendly. Dealing with the media has become a part of his life, a task that whether pleasant or unpleasant, has to be done. This is simply the way it is now for physicians involved in what DeVries calls "the spectacular case."

DeVries' case was, to indulge in some media hyperbole, superspectacular. On Dec. 2, 1982, the surgeon from Salt Lake City became the first to implant a permanent artificial heart into a human--Barney Clark, a 61-year-old retired Seattle-area dentist

Hundreds of reporters and dozens of camera crews converged on the University of Utah Medical Center, and for the 112 days Clark survived on the Jarvik-7, all aspects of his nersonal life and hiological function. were duly noted. But while Clark was the star, he was not generally available for interviews, so DeVries fell into the media spotlight-by necessity.

in fact, some students are public school rejects who thrive in a more structured school setting.

Those students who function better in a private school environment should be accorded that opportunity.

Conversely, it's irrational for unmotivated students to be confined to public schools when there is little likelihood they will get an education, much less graduate.

which the United States, Britain and France agreed to withdraw their forces as well, leaving the nation free and politically neutral.

In Afghanistan, it is Russia alone that has soldiers in the country, and it is therefore only Russia that is withdrawing them. To be sure, both Russia's puppet Afghan regime and the implacable mujahedeen freedom fighters will remain on the ground. fighting on for ultimate control: and both Moscow and Washington are at liberty, under the Geneva agreement, to continue to supply arms to the respective sides. But Russia's consent to the withdrawal of its own troops is, in all the circumstances. something new under the sun.

The lion's share of the credit for this outcome must go to the Afghan freedom fighters themselves, a proud and ferocious people who did not permit the slaughter of a million of their fellow citizens, or the forced exile of 3 million more, or even such Soviet barbarities as booby-trapped toys for children, to deter them from the struggle to cleanse their land of the Soviet presence. There cannot be, anywhere on earth, much better fighters than these.

But credit must go, too, to Zbigniew Brzezinski, Jimmy Carter's national security director, who in the waning days of the

the Afghan freedom fighters, yet would deny it to the forces of Jonas. Savimbl, who are battling Moscow's unelected and tyrannical puppets in Angola on the Atlantic coast of Africa. And why on earth, if the Democrats are willing to send aid to brave rebels 8,000 miles away on the border of the Soviet Union, did they refuse it to the contras of Nicaragua, who were battling a communist regime less than 1,000 miles from Miami?

Another point: As Abe Rosenthal and others have reminded us. It is wise to remain highly skeptical, for the present, as to just how seriously Moscow intends to follow through on its pledge to pull out of Afghanistan. It is a move so uncharacteristic, and no doubt so unpopular among large sectors of the Soviet leadership, that we must be prepared for waffling, deception and even outright repudiation of the Soviet agreement.

But, when all is said and done, even Moscow's bare promise to leave Afghanistan represents an unprecedented admission of weakness-not only military, but moral and psychological. It is, in that respect, strikingly equivalent to the blow sustained by the United States when it decided to pull out of Vietnam without insisting upon victory.

"I've found it's best to give them what they want," he says. "Because they can go out and get it anyway: and it may not turn out the way you. would like it."

DeVries also recognizes dealing with media appropriately can yield some important benefits.

"The public benefits indirectly when it becomes more educated about health matters." he says-"Reports about that artificial heart informed vast numbers of scientifically unsophisticated persons about the workings of the heart and the threats posed by poor dietary habits, cigarette smoking, insufficient exercise and certain inherited factors."

From his experience, now spanning five permanent heart implants with another one planned. DeVries sums up his advice to other physiclans simply: Protect your patient but tell the truth.

"Concern for the patient and the family is paramount." he wrote his colleagues recently in the Journal of the American Medical Association. "It takes precedence over the public's right to know."

Government hops on rabbit farmers

Jeseph Spear WASHINGTON - Ed and Sandra Bennett spent 10 years building their dream home and dream business on an 80-acre tract in the hills outside San Luis Obispo, Calif. A mistake by the Farmers Home Adminstration squashed the dream.

The Bennetts' business is raising rabbits for gourmet dishes. With the help of FmHA loans, by 1986, the Bennetts were halfway to their goal of 230 breeding does. The rabbit market was bullish and the Bennetts knew they would turn big profits and pay back their \$200,000 in loans.

Then, in February 1986, the letter arrived. It was a "Notice of Intent to Take Adverse Action" from their FmHA loan officer. The notice is the first step in the FmHA's foreclosure process.

What the Bennetts didn't know

was that the notice was a mistake. Such a letter is supposed to arrive when a borrower is a year behind on payments. The Bennetts were only about one month late.

What followed was a communications breakdown, according to the FmHA. The Bennetts say it was a concerted effort to shut them down. Whatever the case, the Bennetts panicked.

They stopped construction and breeding work. They didn't want to continue pouring money into a business that was going to be repossessed anyway.

After seven months of trying to get a straight story, the Bennetts finally got an acknowledgement from the FmHA that the notice was in error. Six months later the Department of Agriculture apologized and suspended proceedings at the direction of the White House.

Sandra Bennett estimates the error cost her and her husband as

much as \$300,000 and, because of lost momentum, set their operation back five years. They didn't need an apology. They needed to have their loan rescheduled or the interest on the late bill reduced.

The FmHA thinks the Bennetts are just using a little mistake to shirk their debts. "The only key thing worth telling about their story is that they have not made payment in years." said Richard Mallory, director of the California office of FmHA. (The Bennetts had stopped payments when they received the first foreclosure notice.)

Last month the Department of Agriculture responded to the Bennetts' complaints by launching an investigation into whether "FmHA personnel illegally conspired against" the Bennetts in the handling of their loans.

Mallory says if the Bennetts think they have a gripe, they should file a tort claim against the FmHA in

federal court. But for farmers, filing tort claims against the government is as practical as planting corn in asphalt. No farmer has won a tort claim against the FmHA in the past eight years, according to James Massey, director of the Farmers Legal Action Group based in Minnesola.

Massey told our associate Jim Lynch that it doesn't pay to take the government to court. Government cases are complex, and lawyers can collect almost twice the share of damage settlements in private lawsuits as opposed to federal tort claims, Massey said.

The Bennetts have taken their cause to more than a dozen lawyers. One expressed interest, but indicated it would cost them \$70,000. Sandra wrote 113 letters to members of Congress asking for help. "They have no ability to do anything," she said. "They sent us condolences."

Gore expected to guit today after New York results

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Democrat Albert Gore Jr. often mid as he set out for the White House that voters would have a chance to repeat history by replacing the nation's oldest president with its youngest as they did in 1980.

America yet may have that opportunity, but apparently not this year. Gore, the Tennessee senator even younger at age 40 than John Kennedy was back then, is no longer expecting to succeed Ronald Reagan, the president even older at age 77 than Dwight Eisenhower was when he turned the White House over.

Gore, whose presidential candidacy crumbled with his poor third-place finish in the big New York primary, called a news conference today to announce what was widely expected to be a withdrawal or suspension of his 1988 campaign.

Reagan gearing up for summit

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The White House, signaling fading hopes for a new treaty by next month's superpower summit, urged the Senate to ratify the stalled INF pact or jeopardize progress on arms control when President Reagan goes to Moscow.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater, indicating Wednesday that the amount of progress made in the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks will likely be the highlight of the May 29-June 2 summit, conceded chances of Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev signing a treaty on reducing strategic arms are somewhat remote.

Bakker supporters rally for PTL federal hearing

COLUMBIA. S.C. (UPI) - Sup- Bukker. porters of disgraced PTL founder Jim Bakker headed to a court hearing Wednesday on a quest to convince a federal bankruptcy judge that only their man can save the debt-ridden television ministry.

Deeply in debt - up to \$125 million, according to U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Rufus Reynolds - PTL has struggled to survive ever since Bakker was deposed last year in a sex scandal.


Bakker, in a letter to the judge Tuesday, offered to return to raise funds to pay off the debt that is siphoning off PTL's lifeblood.

Gunmen hold 50 hostages after shootout at Mexican bank

LOS MOCHIS. Mexico (UPI) - Gunmen whose aborted bank robbery triggered a gun battle that killed five people. and wounded at least 12 said today the police tried to drug them by sending in bread drenched in chloroform to end the slear.

"We are all at the point of hysteria here," Yazmin-Maldonado, one of 15 women hostages and a mother of four, said in a telephone interview with United Press International. "We ask the nation to help us. We've had very little to eat."

More than 400 police and soldiers surrounded the Los Mochis Banamex bank as the would-be robbers, armed with guns and explosives, held bank employees and customers hostage through the night, threatening to blow up the bank unless they were allowed to escape, police said.

Today, three hostages were released by the gunmen who said 40 hostages remained. Police had said the gummenoriginally took about 50 hostages following the gun battle.

Terrorists threaten hostage

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - The captors of U.S. Marine Lt. Col. William Higgins said today they will put him on trial repeated charges that he had carried out spyin missions in southern Lebanon while commanding a U.N. neacekeeping force. The "Oppressed on Earth Organization," which claimed responsibility for Higgins' kidnapping, made the threat in an Arabic-language statement that was sent to the office of a Western news agency in Mostern west Beirut. Attached to the statement was a black-and-white photograph showing a bearded Higgins staring at the ground

Sign company sues for rent

SANFORD - Patrick Media Group, Inc., has filed suit in Seminole County Circuit court against the Hobby Box, Inc. and the Hobby Box I, Inc., of Altamonte Springs, charging that the defendants owe the plaintiff 89,250 plus interest in sign rental from 1987.

Patrick Media Group states in the complaint it purchased the assets of Arbor Advertising Corporation, an outdoor sign company. in December 1986, and then entered into two contracts with The Hobby Box. Inc. for sign rentals. Under one contract, the Hobby box was to pay \$650 per moth rent, and under the second contract the defendant would pay \$1,200 monthly for the sign, the complaint says.

The plaintiff charges the defendants with breach of contract for refusing to pay rent between January and May, 1987.

The complaint also states that

on a date unknown to the to the complaint. plaintiff The Hobby Box. Inc., transferred its business. merchandise, inventory, and equipment to The Hobby Box 1. Inc. In doing so, the defendant did not give a full account of its property at least 10 days before the sale, and did not supply The Hobby Box I. Inc., with a list of its creditors and the amounts owed creditors, the complaint states.

The plaintiff charges the transfer was ineffective and demmands that the court award \$9,250 plus interest and court costs.

Other civil suits filed in Seminole County Circuit Court Include:

Douglas Gerard, a Seminole county resident filed a complaint against Amitesh, Inc.; Kishor Joshi, president of the firm; and Bakul Kamani, an employee. Joshi and Bakul are believed to reside in the county, according

Gerard charges the defendants with refusing to make payments on a promissory note, and states in the complaint that they owe him \$28,688.41 plus interest. The plaintiff and defendants had entered into an agreement for a \$35,000 note on Oct. 30, 1986. the complaint states.

•Kimberly Fleck filed suit against Donald J. McGowan, and is asking in excess of \$5,000 in damages for medical expenses and loss of income as the result of injuries sustained in an auto accident on First Street in Sanford on March 29, 1986. McGowan was the driver of the other vehicle.

Fleck states in the complaint that she suffered loss of income as the result of the accident.

The plaintiff is demanding a jury trial in the case



The spotted seatrout is one of Florida's most popular gamefish. and spring is the magic time to catch these fish in good numbers. Traditionally some of the year's largest trout are taken in April and May.

Anglers who reside in the Sanford area have some of the world's best trout fishing at their doorsteps. In fact, the Banans/Indian River area around Merritt Island has often been billed as the "Seatrout Capital of the World." This is no idle boast, as the grass flats in these rivers attract trout by the thousands each spring as they search the shallows in search of finger mullet and other baitfish.

Topwater plugs such as the Devil's Home or Mirrorlure are fun to fish in the spring as trout attack these lures with a vengeance. One trick for more strikes is to remove the front prop of the plug. This allows the rear portion of the plug to ride down slightly, and the action from the rear prop is more than sufficient to attract trout.

When fishing topwater plugs. anglers must keep a cool head. as trout have the aggrevating habit of knocking the plug out of the water without really taking it. The fisherman must keep working the lure until the trout really grabe it.

Few anglers realize that silver spoons are deadly for seatrout. The Johnson Sprite is one of the best, and fishermen prefer the smaller sizes as they are easier to retrieve over the grass beds. Gold spoons are best for reds. but remember that the season is still closed.

Plastic tailed grubs are also excellent for trout, but you must contend with the hordes of blowfish that nip off the tails with alarming regularity. It is for this reason that I do not use this type of lure for trout.

The old standby, the Mirroriure, is hard to beat for trout in deeper water. The M 52/21 is an all-time favorite as it resembles a finger mullet.

Best of all, the trout is a family fish and can be caught by every family member without too much difficulty. Be advised to watch out for flying hooks when fishing several people out of one boat for trout. More than one trip has been ruined when a hook was buried in the fisherman instead of the lish.

The west bank of the Banana River from SR 528 to the NASA Causeway offers excellent trout fishing. The spoil mounds in this area of the river have deep dropoffs that also attract good numbers of trout. Anglers also catch many trout around the spoil mounds in the Indian River between SR 528 and the NASA Causeway.

If you have never fished this spot before, one of the best guides in the area is Troy Perez.



You can reach him in Cocoa at 452-1607. Troy was born and raised in Cocos and he specializes in putting his clients on gator trout.

SHUPS'S SCOOP

One trick to catching more seatrout is to tie a 12" length of 20 pound test monofilament to the rear hook eye of a surface lure and then attach a small jig or fly to the other end of the 20 pound line. Trout will often hit this trailer instead of the lure.

Umphrey is a member of the U.S. senior development team and a leading contender for the Seoul Olympics. Wood is on the U.S. junior elite squad and is preparing for the 1992 Olympics.

Market moderate, stocks up

NEW YORK (UPI) - Prices opened higher today in moderate trading of New York Stock Exchange issues.

The Dow Jones industrial average, which fell 14.09 Wednesday, was up 11.61 to 1997.02 abortly after the market opened.

Advances led declines 463-277 among the 1.128 inques crossing the New York Stock Exchange tape. Early turnover amounted to about 8.400,000

shares.

Stock prices retreated Wednesday in light trading as worries over inflation and the previous session's sharp reversal sent investors to the sidelines to await a change in the negative sentiment.

Since the Dow reached its post-collapse high of 2110.06 last Tuesday, it has fallen 125 points, with most of the decline coming in last Thursday's 102-point plunge on a worse-thanexpected merchandise trade deficit report.

"Tuesday's revensal points to the leebleness of the recent rally attempt." said Edward Nicoski, a technical analyst with Piper, Jaffray & Hopwood Inc. in Minneapolis.

Dollar edges upward as gold, silver slip down

The dollar edged higher in light trading today on major foreign currency markets. Gold caged lower.

In the Far East, the dollar rose alightly against the Japanese yen in light trading, closing at 124.30 yen, up 0.40 from 123.90 yen on Wednesday.

In Zurich, the dollar began the day at 1.378 Swiss francs, up from 1.3737, and opened in Amsterdam at 1.871 Dutch guilders, up from 1.864.



Oral surgeons better than ouches

DEAR ABBY: This is in response to "Disgusted in Virginia," who was upset because his dentist had sent him to an oral surgeon to have a tooth pulled. "Disgusted" doesn't know how lucky he was.

Thirty years ago I went through two hours of torture in a dentist's chair while he at-tempted to pull an impacted wisdom tooth. Abby, that primitive practitioner was sweating from the effort, and he had to inject Novocain three times to help me endure the agony. I was a petite 22-year-old at the time and had recently given birth to my first child. When I got home, the Novocain had worn off and the pain was worse than going through childbirth!

Although he had "repaired" the broken molar, it had to be removed because an abacess had formed.



DEAR DR. GOTT: Like a previous reader. I also can feel warmth and tingling in the area being X-rayed, so maybe some of us are more sensitive than

DEAR READER: Some people are certainly more sensitive than others. However, I do not believe this fact explains why an occasional patient feels warmth and tingling during routine X-ray examinations. These X-rays do not produce enough energy to stimulate skin receptors.

Here is an alternative explanation, one that I think is more plausible: When heat is applied to the skin, tiny capillaries (blood vessels) dilate in order to radiate more body temperature back into the environment, thereby keeping our body heat more or less constant. In addition to the heat itself, this dilation will stimulate the perception of warmth. As you know, heat is not the only stimulus that causes capillary dilation: internally produced chemicals, notably epinephrine (adrenaline), also open the skin's blood vessels, causing sensations of warmth and tingling even when no external heat is present. This is the reason we flush during exercise and blush when we are stressed or embar-

apprehensive during X-ray examinations. You are asked to remove some or all of your clothing, and stand or lie in an awkward position while a total stranger operating a strange machine attempts to discover something wrong inside you. Then this person says, "Don't breathe"; you wall, hear a short buzzing sound (which you know is the X-ray machine) and feel tingly. The sensation is not caused by the X-rays. It comes from your internal chemistry that is telling you, "Get out of here!'' Under these circumstances. I'm surprised that more patients do not feel weird sensations. However, most of us don't. I think that X-rayassociated tingling and warmth is more likely due to a stress




