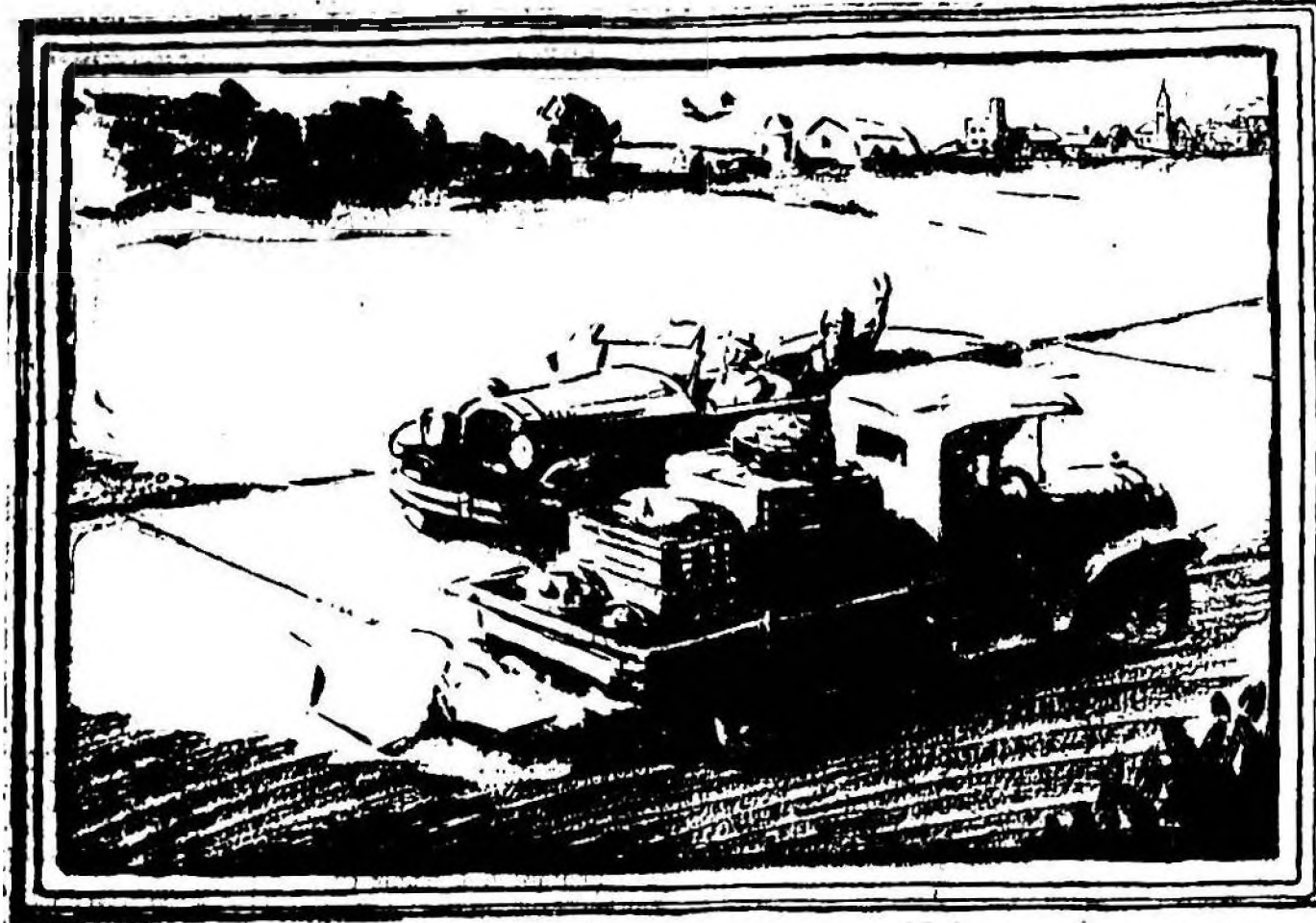

MEXICAN CLERGY SUBJECT TO LAW CALLES ASSERTS

Catholic Episcopate Declares President's Latest Statement Is Contrary To Assurances He Gave on Saturday

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 24. (AP)—Although a deadlock again has been reached in the controversy between the Roman Catholic church and the Mexican government over the religious situation, the hope is more or less based on a statement issued by the Catholic Episcopate as a supplement to its declaration yesterday that the situation has reverted to the same status as before the conference Saturday night between President Calles, Archbishop Leopold Ruiz y Flores, and Bishop Diaz of Tlaxcala.

The supplemental statement referred to the "cordiality and frankness" prevailing at Saturday night's conference and declared that the interview gave "hope to all the world that when future serious difficulties are encountered they can be resolved with much benefit to the national through easy understanding between the government and the prelates."

In its earlier statement yesterday, the Episcopate reiterated its stand for the abrogation of the religious laws which it regards as destructive to religious liberty. Bishop Diaz said that this statement, which also stated that the religious services would not be resumed for the present, was considerably influenced by one attributed to President Calles to the effect that if the priests returned to their churches they must do so subject to the law.

The interpretation placed upon the developments of the last few days by those in close touch with both church and government leaders is that statement issued by the Episcopate after Saturday night's conference, were made by those who had four that the church might be placed on an attitude of yielding or resuming services with out adequate or sufficient promises by the government.

Nevertheless, the supplemental statement referring to the possibility of a future settlement is construed as intended to leave the way open for conference with President Calles if developments should justify them.

Meanwhile, the Episcopate is considering plans for a campaign to bring about amendment of the religious clause of the constitution by congressional action. The League for the Defense of Religious Liberty has taken the position that it will not lift the economic boycott until these amendments have been effected or until the religious regulations have been modified or abrogated.

"FREE SPEECH" IS TO COME BEFORE SUPREME COURT

Decisions That Are Likely To Make History In Law Will Be Handed Down When Tribunal Convenes

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23. (AP)—Decisions which may be epoch-making in their definition of the terms "free speech" and "free assembly" are expected shortly after the Supreme Court re-convenes in October. They will construe the criminal syndicalism laws of California, Michigan and Kansas, raised in appeals by Charlotte Anita Whitney, Charles E. Ruthenberg and Harold B. Fiske, respectively, who contended that in attempting to regulate radical propaganda the States had overstepped the constitutional prohibition against restriction of the inalienable rights of freedom of speech and of assembly.

Communist Question. The constitution and political activities of the Communist Labor party of America, which Miss Whitney and Ruthenberg were charged with promoting, and of the Industrial Workers of the World, which Fiske was promoting, may receive more than passing notice in the opinions. Miss Whitney was convicted for participating in the organization of Oakland of the California branch of the Communist Labor Party, Ruthenberg for having participated in the secret convention of the party held in the sand dunes near Bradenton, Michigan and Fiske for working as an organizer of the I. W. W. in Kansas, recruiting new members.

Miss Whitney contended that her influence had been exerted to prevent unlawful acts, although she remained in attendance upon the convention after it had adopted the radical Chicago communist platform; Ruthenberg that the secret convention had been hastily dissolved on the eve of raid by State and federal agents, before any unlawful acts had been committed and Fiske, that the principle of the I. W. W. constitution, which he was distributing, was not seditions.

State Courts Agree. The state courts of all three states, in upholding the syndicalism laws, sustained the contentions advanced by the prosecution that membership in and participation at meetings of organizations advocating sabotage, physical violence, or some destruction of property and other unlawful acts to bring about a change in the form of government by the use of force could be punished without abridging any constitutional right. The defendants contended unsuccessfully that overt acts, and not mere membership in organizations must be the measure in determining guilt.

TOLEDO LEADING CLOVER MARKET OF THIS COUNTRY

Ohio City Lies In Middle of Great Clover-Growing Area in Mid-West and Has Long Controlled Prices Of Clover

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 24. (AP)—Toledo is in clover, deeper than any city of the world. Toledo plunged into clover 60 years ago, and there she has remained. Living in the midst of the great clover-growing area of the mid-west, where, this time of year, the air over the farm lands is heavy with the fragrance of clover blossoms, Toledo has become the international clover center.

Market Long Established. Wallace Applegate, president of the Toledo Produce Exchange, traced Toledo's rise to its pinnacle as a clover seed market. Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin are the great clover growing states of the country. Applegate said, and it is because Toledo is situated in the midst of these that it became the center of the trade. Trading in clover seed began in Toledo in the early 60s, 60 years ago, the Toledo Produce Exchange was established. The present exchange was incorporated 50 years ago. Clover is raised in many parts of the world, in England, France, and Germany, in Canada and in Chile, but all these look to Toledo as the center of the trade.

Scientific Service. Many services to dealers have been developed with the growth of the trade. The Exchange maintains an efficient inspection department, a seed laboratory where seed is tested for germination and purity, and a committee of experts which attends to the interests of the market. Trading in clover seed is done in bushels, 60 pound to the bushel. The seed is put up in bags, two and a half bushels to the bag. Future contracts on seed are in lots of 50 bushels, or multiples of 50, with a minimum carload of 300 bushels. The practice of dealing in fu-
