57 Die, Over 200 Hurt In Tragic Chicago Hotel Fire

Cleveland Warns Vets To Use Safe Building Material

Chief M. N. Cleveland of the city fire department today warned returning veterans and other prospective home owners that it is better to wait until good building materials are available than to attempt to build a home with questionable substitute materials even if they are available. "Selection of materials with awareness of their fire-resistant qualities is vital," Chief Cleveland said. "Prospective home owners in Sanford should be safe rather than sorry. Don't overlook fire safety when you make up that scrapbook of ideas for the new home. Untested materials should be avoided." Chief Cleveland pointed out that according to National Fire Protection Association figures that 1,000 homes burn every day in the year. The trouble with the Army of the United States, Secretary of War Patterson seems to think, is that we won the war. If we had lost it, there would have been no criticism of the armed forces as there is today.

We suppose there is some justice in the Supreme Court's decision banning segregation on common carriers in interstate commerce. However, we can see nothing but trouble for all parties concerned coming from it.

A large share of the credit for the defeat of the communists in both France and Italy during the recent elections should go to the Catholic Church.

Employment has been pretty steady around here lately. People have money, and most of them are spending it as fast as they can find something to spend it on.

The Communist Way

One thing that the communists and their sympathizers have never been able to explain to our complete satisfaction is who does the dirty work in a country such as ours under a communistic regime. It is easy to understand that there would necessarily be commissars of banks, railroads, and department stores and that they would ride in limousines and their positions would probably be filled from the ranks of the politically faithful, but who would get the meaner jobs?

It has to be admitted by even the most ardent advocate of communism that no matter how benevolent such a government might be someone would have to sweep the streets, and people to collect the garbage, scrub the floors and clean out the sewers. There would under almost any system of government you can imagine have to be coal miners.

Under the communist system everyone is supposed to be rewarded for the fact that he still breathes with an equal share of the products of the nation's productive system. Each gives to the State according to his abilities, and receives from the State according to his needs. Now we are wondering if all the people got everything they want anyway from the government, what inducement would there be in order to get objectionable work done?

It strikes us that a lot of work would have to be done under the lash or by threat of the firing squad as it is in Russia. You simply can't let the garbage pile up on the streets, the sewers overflow, and the mines remain unmined, without great danger of pestilence and starvation. And of course if some system of slave labor is devised in order to get this kind of work done, the next question is who would be the slaves?

Well, that of course would depend upon the whim of the party in power. If they happened to be Baptists they might make the Methodists do it. Or if they were Army brass hats, they might adopt the Russian policy and import a lot of slave labor from neighboring countries. If they were Democrats, they would probably make the Republicans do it, but if they were Republicans they would probably make the Democrats do it.

It might also follow that not those least able to do any other kind of work were compelled to do the dirty work, but those who had spent their lives as bankers, ministers, or clerks, regardless of their physical disabilities.

Lincoln Still Speaks

A new Lincoln letter has just been published. Written in 1860 to a Michigan farmer, it gave the facts about the various political contests which Lincoln had had with Peter Cartwright, one of the so-called "circuit riders" of itinerant preachers who once were frequent in the Middle West.

While the letter adds little or nothing to what students of Lincoln's early career already knew, it shows that, in accumulating Lincoln material, the barrel has not yet been scraped dry. Though biographers like William E. Barton, Albert J. Beveridge and Carl Sandburg have gone over the Lincoln country time and again, searching for anything they might find, new items like this letter turn up from time to time.

One important source remains untapped. Robert T. Lincoln, son of the President, deposited his papers with the Library of Congress with instructions to keep them sealed until 1947. What a rush of historians there will be to Washington when the day of opening comes! And how many of today's voices will be so much worth listening to when their time comes for remembrance?

The Savoy Rulers

Italy has voted for a republic, marking the end of the oldest reigning dynasty of Europe. While the heads of the House of Savoy have been kings of Italy only since 1861, before that they were kings of Sardinia and Piedmont, and earlier still dukes of Savoy, the little area in the French Alps which include Mount Blanc.

The name of the first ruler, Umberto, is also the name of the latest. He was called Umberto of the White Hands. He died in 1918 and the nickname may reflect an age when few washed.

For a long time the dukes of Savoy were able men who added territory by waiting till the right time, but in the last 150 years the family has rather petered out. Only King Victor Emanuel II, who reigned from 1849 to 1878, was outstanding. Most, like the recently abdicated Victor Emanuel III, were slow-witted reactionaries. The rest of the world will agree with Italy in not regarding them as worth keeping.



Over in Daytona Beach, where it remains difficult for about all the State League clubs to defeat the Dodge nine except Leesburg, the one-time Islanders counted once in the last half of the 11th frame to capture a 2 to 1 decision over the league-leading but revamped Orlando aggregation.

Sanford is now riding three and a half games behind the Senators and maintains a full

two game lead over the ancient city nine.

One Killed And 2 Injured In Union Pacific Collision

Streamliner, "City of Portland" Involved In Wreck Near Hot Lake, Ore.

A GRANDE, Ore., June 6. (AP)—A brakeman has died and 50 persons have been injured slightly in the head-on crash of two passenger trains today on the Union Pacific Railroad at Hot Lake in Oregon.

The wreck involved the streamliner "City of Portland" traveling west from Chicago, and an eastbound Union Pacific standard passenger train. The eastbound train failed to take a siding and crashed into the streamliner, which was halted on the main line. Apparently the standard train continued through the switch and rammed the streamliner after the engineer had jammed on the emergency brakes.

The brakeman who lost his life was identified only by his last name, Unger, who lived at Bend, Ore., was crushed to death. Of the 50 injured, only one passenger was hurt badly enough to require hospital treatment. He is the Rev. J. Ward, a Catholic priest from St. Louis, who took Hot Lake where the wreck took place 12 miles east of La Grande.

Charles F. Robbins Of Lake Mary Gets Navy Discharge

Charles F. Robbins, 29, motor machinist's mate third class, of Lake Mary, crew member of the aircraft carrier Cabot during major invasions in the Pacific, was honorably discharged at the Jacksonville Naval Personnel Separation Center yesterday.

Robbins was sent overseas on the Cabot in December, 1944, and later participated in the invasions of Luzon, Iwo Jima and Okinawa. After the war his ship patrolled the Yellow Sea for two months and then returned to the United States in December.

Transferred to the heavy cruiser Augusta, Robbins completed his Naval tour of duty aboard it at Philadelphia. He wears four ribbons, the American theater, the Asiatic-Pacific theater, the Philippine Liberation Expedition with one star, and the Victory.

Formerly employed by the Lee Hendrick poultry farm, he left his job in May, 1944, to enter the navy. He plans to take an apprentice training in painting and carpentry under the G. I. Bill of Rights.

Governor Dewey Before New York State Trade Meet

NEW YORK, June 6. (AP)—Governor Thomas Dewey of New York has stated that the basic issue now confronting the United States is the conflict between individual initiative and government control. Dewey told the New York State Chamber of Commerce that the time has come for those who believe in freedom of enterprise to stand up and be counted.

The governor declared that no nation ever has been known to pull back once it started down the slippery road to totalitarianism. He warned that it is time for this country to make up its mind as to whether it will continue forward in freedom or surrender to those who would lead it to totalitarianism through government rule of the nation's economy. Dewey asserted that New York state has realized all progress in the war as a means of establishing state controls over the business or private lives of its citizens.

Dewey further stated that business can exist only if it makes a good profit. He said that labor can be paid real wages in terms of purchasing power only if it produces more goods and shares in that production.

PROMISER MADE

RICHMOND, Va., June 6. (AP)—One of the prominent ministers who rallied at the White House yesterday said today that President Truman promised to recall Myron C. Taylor as his personal envoy to the Vatican. According to the Rev. John A. MacLean, the President assured the Protestant clergymen that Mr. Taylor would be recalled by the time the peace treaties are signed—at the latest, Dr. MacLean is pastor of the Winter Park Presbyterian Church of Richmond.

Orlando May Be Candidate For Italian Office

Politician Likely To Become Republic's President

ROME, June 6. (AP)—A veteran Italian politician, 66-year-old Vittorio Emanuele Orlando—is winning wide mention today as a likely compromise candidate for president of Italy's new republic. The nation is awaiting public proclamation of the end of the monarchy and of the reign of the House of Savoy.

By more than 2,000,000 votes, Italians have decided to oust King Umberto in office less than six weeks in favor of a republic. Umberto recently took over from his father, King Vittorio Emanuele, who abdicated and now is living in exile in Egypt.

Now, Italian political observers say Orlando is being proposed as first president of the new republic because he is a Sicilian, because he is, Orlando is expected to be able to repair the schism shown at the polls, between north and south Italy. The north voted against and the south voted for the monarchy.

However, it appears likely Orlando will face strong opposition from the Italian Communist party which came out in third place in the weekend elections for members of the constituent assembly. A communist spokesman declared during a pre-election speech that the communists never would collaborate with Orlando.

QUAKE SHOCK

NEW YORK, June 6. (AP)—A mild earthquake was recorded today by the Fordham University seismograph in New York City. The University seismologist, the Rev. Joseph Lynch, estimated that the quake was centered about 400 miles from New York. Two shocks were recorded—one shortly after 7:48 A. M. Eastern Daylight Time, and the second about eight and one-half minutes later.
