The official reports from Nanking thus far show the following:

50 Americans were evacuated yesterday.

20 Americans are reported missing, and are believed to have been massacred.

Admiral Hough's latest report states that 120 Americans are missing and are believed to have been massacred.

The International Service dispatches sent six days ago that there were more than 100 American dead in Nanking.

An official report stated that American General Davis is dead, but it did not clear up reports that Davis had been rescued.

The official advice stated that few American sailors were wounded, but did not state how many received their wounds.

Official confirmation has been received from the U. S. Consulate at Shanghai, Ohio, a U. S. States missionary.

...of bombardment of Nanking is believed here to indicate that the Chinese mobs there again became unruly and are asking foreigners to leave. The earlier had been to bombard the Chinese headquarters until orders were made for the surrender of the foreigners now in Nanking.

NEW YORK STATE IN FINISH FIGHT WITH CRIMINALS

Legislature Provides Sum Of \$50,000 For Further Study Of Crime; Believe Thugs Are In Fear Of Law

ALBANY, N. Y., Mar. 23—(INS)—New York State is in a fight to the finish with crime.

The Legislature has just appropriated \$50,000 so the State Crime Commission can continue its study of the cause and prevention of crime. This is the second \$50,000 appropriation for this commission in the last two years.

Senator Caleb H. Baumes, chairman of the crime commission, thinks the state is getting the upper hand on the criminal. He said: "New York State is slowly but surely winning the battle with organized crime. We know for a fact that many desperate criminals are leaving the state for fear of the drastic anti-crime laws enacted by the last Legislature. And the State has only just begun to fight."

U.S. AGRICULTURE LOOKS FORWARD TO POOR SEASON

Situation Discouraging In Production Of All Big Crops; Market Conditions Reviewed

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23—(INS)—Aristo, the threshold of a planting season. American agriculture today looks forward to even less promising prospects for 1927 than greeted the general farm industry a year ago, according to a survey by the Department of Agriculture's bureau of economics.

"The situation is clearly such as to discourage any general expansion of agriculture production," the bureau said in summarizing the national survey. "With an average season, a continuation of relatively low returns from most crops is probable, unless acreage is reduced."

Reviewing general marketing conditions during 1926, the report pointed out that the gross value of the principal crops, based on prices of Dec. 1, 1926, was \$7,802,000,000 compared with \$8,780,000,000 for the same crop the year before. A billion dollar loss sustained by the farmers.

"In consequence," the report continues, "conditions in certain important producing regions have shown no improvement within a year. The disparity between prices of farm products and the cost of industrial goods and services is greater than a year ago."

The general level of farm prices declined 12 per cent during 1926. Producers of livestock, wool, dairy products and sugar will operate in generally fair markets, the bureau forecasts, but profits or losses in other commodities will carry with the average, particularly in the case of cotton.

Wheat growers "can scarcely expect to receive returns for 1927 crop similar to those which have prevailed for the 1926 crop, especially if production should be materially increased."

Corn farmers "are faced with the prospect of lower prices unless acreage is substantially reduced."

"A favorable year for livestock producers is in prospect. Hog prices are likely to be maintained near the 1926 level. On the whole cattle prices are expected to continue the upward price swing begun in 1925. The whole market appears to be firm, with no marked change in price in sight."

Potato growers are admonished in guard against over-planting.

"The dairy industry is on a stronger basis than a year ago. Dairymen are likely to have a moderately favorable acreage between the price of feed and the price of dairy products."

Mrs. Harding Of Ohio, Democrat, Has Been Elected Twice As Republican

COLUMBUS, O., Mar. 23—(INS)—Mrs. Virginia Barker Harding, distant relative by marriage to former President Warren G. Harding, and representative from Gallia County in the Ohio legislature, holds the distinction of smashing many precedents.

In the first place, she is a Democrat. Her husband is an ardent Republican, and was twice elected county treasurer on the Republican ticket.

A negative candidate, who was pushed into the race for the legislature last year won the Democratic nomination in the primary election, and then defeated in the general election, a Republican male opponent who had served two terms.

Gallia County has a normal Republican plurality of about 2,000 votes, and has sent only one Democrat to the state legislature, besides Mrs. Harding in 1926. Yet, in spite of the fact she conducted no campaign, made only one speech, and her opponents campaigned with the experience of a seasoned politician, Mrs. Harding's majority was almost 2,000 votes.

Incidentally, the man she defeated is a neighbor, and one of her warmest personal friends.

"I believe legislators expect too many votes, and I am in favor of the government more extensively taking less, and expressing their opinions by their votes," she said, summing up her political philosophy.

Gar Wood's Boat Sets Unofficial Record At Miami For Mile Dash

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Mar. 23—(INS)—A new unofficial salt water speed record was set on the books today as the result of the mile dash of the Miss America V. holder of the previous record, at a speed of 80.72 miles per hour.

With Paul Wood, brother of the famous pilot, Gar Wood, at the wheel and Orin Johnson, chief mechanic for Wood, at the controls, the fast-stepping hydroplane traveled the mile in still water twelve miles an hour faster than its time made in competition during the recent regatta held here.

The fastest time made during the meet, around a two mile rectangular course, was 68.05 miles per hour.

Wood's average for six dashes up and down the straightway

course was 78.87 miles an hour.

The Miss America II in 1926, another member of the famous speed boat family, holds the record of the fastest time ever made in fresh water 80.57 miles.
