Garden Club Hears Soil Conservationist

Ben Wiggins, soil conservationist for Seminole County, was guest speaker at the last Thursday's meeting of the North Orlando Garden Club held at the home of Mrs. Mary Rowell with Mrs. Shirley Ryan as co-hostess.

Wiggins showed the group several aerial maps of the county and advised that his work was more directly concerned with farms in the area than in individual problems of the homeowner.

He reported on state plans for staff enlargement to assist with work on the water pollution problem and advised that an educational program also is underway on conservation of water.

A major step in the program consists of teaching the individual property owner to recognize indications pointing towards a concealed and earlier established free flowing well which drains underground water streams, the speaker said.

He added that such wells also fill the surrounding soil with minerals which prevent its being used for any planting purposes.

Wiggins told the club that the soil conservation department's programs consist of two presentations and that he would show a film of interest to the women at his next visit.

Announcement was made during the business meeting that J. A. Black received the prize electric skillet offered

through a recent fund raising project of the club and that Mrs. Asma Hage was awarded a zebra plant in appreciation for selling the most tickets for the project.

A nominating committee was appointed with Mrs. Rowell as chairman and announcement was made of County Agent Cecil Tucker's scheduled program at the Village Recreation Center next Thursday at 7 p.m.

Plans also were begun for

the annual dinner and installation banquet held in June.

Directive To Be Amended

Increased Protection Indicated

The revised franchise directive will be amended with even more protection for the public, it was decided at a meeting of two County Commissioners and the three man committee which drew up the franchise directive.

An informal meeting between the two groups, County Commission Chairman J. C. Hutchison suggested that the directive further spell out that if the commission determines at a public meeting that the majority of residents in one area don't wish the utility franchise, it would not be granted unless the State Board of Health demands it for reasons of public health.

Hutchison and Vernon Dunn were the only commissioners present at the meeting. Members of the franchise committee which took part in the informal discussion were W. E. Knowles, William Leffer and William Kratzert.

County Zoning Director Robert Brown and Attorney Harold Johnson were also present.

Hutchison said that the commission would set a date for a public hearing on the franchise at Tuesday's County Commission meeting.

With Dunn leading the discussion, pointing out "quirks," the two groups met for two hours in hopes of ironing out some of the kinks in the directive.

Hutchison said that already there was criticism to the directive especially about options to mandatory controls, within a two year period.

Knowles said that "some people would be against the directive, no matter what was included in it."

"You are going to have opposition, no matter what is in it," said Knowles. He suggested an education program to point out that the directive offers protection for the people and is also an inducement for private capital to come into the area.

"Many people think the directive protects the utility companies, quite the contrary," Knowles said. "It protects the public and a utility company must prove it can manage and give good service to an area, or the franchise would be void."

Guatemala City Seized By Army

GUATEMALA CITY (UPI)—The army today seized control of Guatemala City to halt pillaging and disorders.

An army communique said the action was taken to safeguard the citizens "in view of the events of recent days."

At least 13 persons have been killed in the past three days in what the government has classified as "Castro-Communist subversion."

The army warned it would act "with the necessary severity" to halt street rioting. It banned public assemblies, cut the speed limit within the city to 30 m.p.h., warned citizens to immediately follow army orders and forbade work stoppages.

The statement said "all measures" would be taken to halt the slaughter and property damage of recent days. It said it was exercising civil authority on orders of President Miguel Ydigoras Fuentes "to re-establish peace and tranquility."

Russia Announces Orbit Of New Craft

MOSCOW (UPI)—Premier Nikita Khrushchev made a surprise announcement today that a new Soviet space craft was in orbit. He did not reveal immediately whether it was manned.

In an impromptu statement to a huge election rally in the Kremlin Palace of Congresses, Khrushchev said the launch was made today and the craft was circling the earth.

Khrushchev broke the news in an address to 6,000 persons assembled for the rally preceding Sunday's balloting for the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet. One of the speakers preceding Khrushchev, an academician, extolled the premier's efforts in guiding the Soviet Union to various space successions, including the launch of space men.

At that point Khrushchev gesturing with a pointing forefinger, broke in and exclaimed:

"Yes, another one has been shot up today and has been circling the earth already for three hours." This was at approximately 9:30 a. m. EST. Thunderous applause greeted the premier's words in the Kremlin meeting.

It was the first known Soviet space shot since Maj. Gherman Titov made 17 orbits of the earth last Aug. 6. Khrushchev did not specify whether there was a man aboard the new Soviet space vehicle nor did he say how large it was.

The announcement came only slightly more than three weeks after the United States sent Col. John Glenn three times around the earth to a safe landing.

Algiers Peace Hopes On Rise

ALGERS, France (UPI)—Hopes for an early end to the Algerian cease-fire negotiations rose today with the settlement of the most difficult military questions.

As usual, French officials and Algerian rebel leaders sought an end to the 7½ year-old Algerian war, but sources close to the conference said spirits in both camps had taken a dramatic turn upward.

The sources said Thursday's 9-hour negotiating session had produced some "fruitful" bargaining on tough talks. Now in their 10th day, to bog down. The sources said it was "a day of thaw, of genuine progress."

Non-Aligned Nations Ask Clarification

GENEVA (UPI)—The non-aligned nations sought today to turn the 17-nation disarmament conference into a series of informal, off-the-record meetings in which they could quiz the United States and Russia scarchingly about their rival disarmament plans.

The move was initiated by V. K. Krishna Menon, the Indian defense minister who held a rump session of the eight non-aligned members of the conference.

Informed sources said the idea was that the United States and Russia, as permanent co-chairmen, should start setting up the private sessions quickly. It was believed the conference might move into this phase early next week while all the foreign ministers still are in Geneva.

Menon was reported to have told the conference he thought little of the Soviet plan to establish nuclear-free zones in Central Europe, Asia and Africa, because he doubted any zone anywhere would be free in the event of a nuclear catastrophe.

Several nations came to his support. The foreign ministers of Italy, Ethiopia, and the United Arab Republic backed Menon, and British Foreign Secretary Lord Home said Menon had a good point.

Home added that perhaps the heads of delegations should meet without their advisers and that no formal record of the talks should be kept.

Brazil came out strongly in support of the Soviet scheme and also demanded that the United States cancel its plans for nuclear tests.

Brazil and India were the first of the non-aligned nations to speak up at the conference.

VA Backs FHA Halt In Home Building

MIAMI (UPI)—The Veterans Administration (VA) joined the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) Thursday in a temporary ban on home construction in Florida.

South Florida builders said the action "is no additional surprise."

"We knew it would be on the way after the FHA action," said Bernard Janis, president of the Home Builders Association of South Florida.

The VA announced its action in Jacksonville, but gave few details. It was presumed the VA ban would have the same provisions as the FHA action announced earlier this week.

The FHA directive halts government financing commitments on new homes unless there are qualified buyers for the homes. The ban does not apply to homes already under construction or completed with government financing commitments. The ban applies to seven Florida counties: Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, Hillsborough, Pinellas, Orange and Seminole.

The FHA said in announcing its ban that the Florida home market was "soft" and at the same time there was an oversupply of FHA - commitment homes. Builders estimated the directive would result in a 40 per cent cutback in home construction in South Florida.

"We still think that when FHA sends a competent market analyst here later in the month, as they have promised to do, he will find the situation isn't as bad as they think and the order will be eased," Janis said.

Hopes Fade For Plane

GUAM (UPI)—A mammoth search operation of planes and ships failed to find by darkness today any trace of a chartered airliner lost in the Pacific with 107 persons, including 93 Americans and three Vietnamese soldiers bound for embattled Viet Nam.

None of the more than 20 planes and half dozen ships scouring a vast expanse of sea reported hearing any signal or sighting wreckage of the missing flying Tiger Line Super-Constellation as darkness fell.

A full 24 hours had passed since the plane took off from Guam for Manila over the deepest waters in the world. The lack of word provided little hope for the 96 passengers and 11 crew members, four of them stewardesses.

The flight originated from Travis Air Force Base near San Francisco.

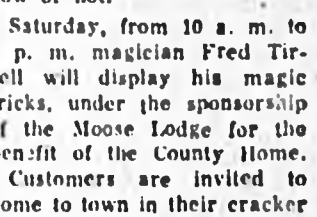

ATLANTA (UPI)—Housing construction in the Southeast took a solid upswing last year and should start in other regions in the country, the U. S. Department of Commerce said today.

In an annual report, the department said about 484,800 new homes were started in the Southeast last year — 10 per cent more than in 1960.

The total far out-distanced those from other regions. In the West, about 321,600 units were started, 387,300 in the North-Central states, and 202,500 in the Northeast.

The report indicated that 96 per cent of the new homes going up in the South were off the farms and that 93 per cent were private housing accommodations.

The department said construction of new homes in the South started with a low of 28,300 in January and increased during the year, reaching a high of 44,100 in October.

'Road To East Closed,' Nikita

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said today that "the road to the East is closed . . . forever" to the Western powers through Berlin.

Khrushchev, speaking at an election rally, declared the German problem must be settled and a German peace treaty must be concluded.

History Of Mail Service Is Traced

Postmaster Guy Allen, speaking to Sanford Jaycees Thursday, traced the history of the mail service back to around 3,000 B.C. and brought it up to the present day.

Allen said that records show the first mail carriers were couriers or runners who memorized messages and ran from one point to another to deliver the messages for the early Romans.

Augustus Caesar built a lot of roads, later for the easier sending of message carriers, and Marco Polo, in his travels reported in the East a messenger service that served over 10,000 people.

Edward IV was the first in England to set up a post system, but it was mainly for the collection of taxes, and later Henry VIII organized a better system. Charles I started the London penny post, where messages could be sent for a penny, and in 1836, envelopes, stamps and a standard postal rate came into being in England.

In American colonies, however, the first postoffice was a tavern, Allen reported, and the old famous Boston Post Road was built for just that purpose. In 1775 Benjamin Franklin, a postmaster, was appointed the first Postmaster General of the U. S. and his birthday is still celebrated as Postmaster's Day.

One of the greatest changes in postal service came about when gold was discovered in California, Allen said, and the overland stage and post riders, had competition in the form of the colorful and famous Pony Express.

The Express riders, with a series of fresh horses, made the trip from St. Joe, Mo., to Sacramento, Calif., in seven days and 17 hours, for a record time.

Later the movement of railroads to the west knocked out the stage and pony express and the railway postal clerk came into being, and remains an integral part of the service to this day, although train transportation of mail is fast giving way to trucks.

Allen cited figures showing that in the U. S. Postal Service handles over 60 million pieces of mail a year, more than all other postal systems in the world.

Annual receipts from the Sanford postoffice average over \$200,000 per year and it employs 43 persons.

The biggest year ever recorded by the Sanford postoffice, Allen reported, was in 1950 when receipts amounted to \$1,300,616, the astronomical figure causing postal inspectors to arrive in town to scrutinize the books.

All was in order, Allen said, and the jump in receipts was found to be due to the Florida Fashioning mail order factory which was located here at that time.

In spite of these high-sounding figures, the post office always operates on a deficit, Allen said, but the whole system of commercial economics depends on postal communication.

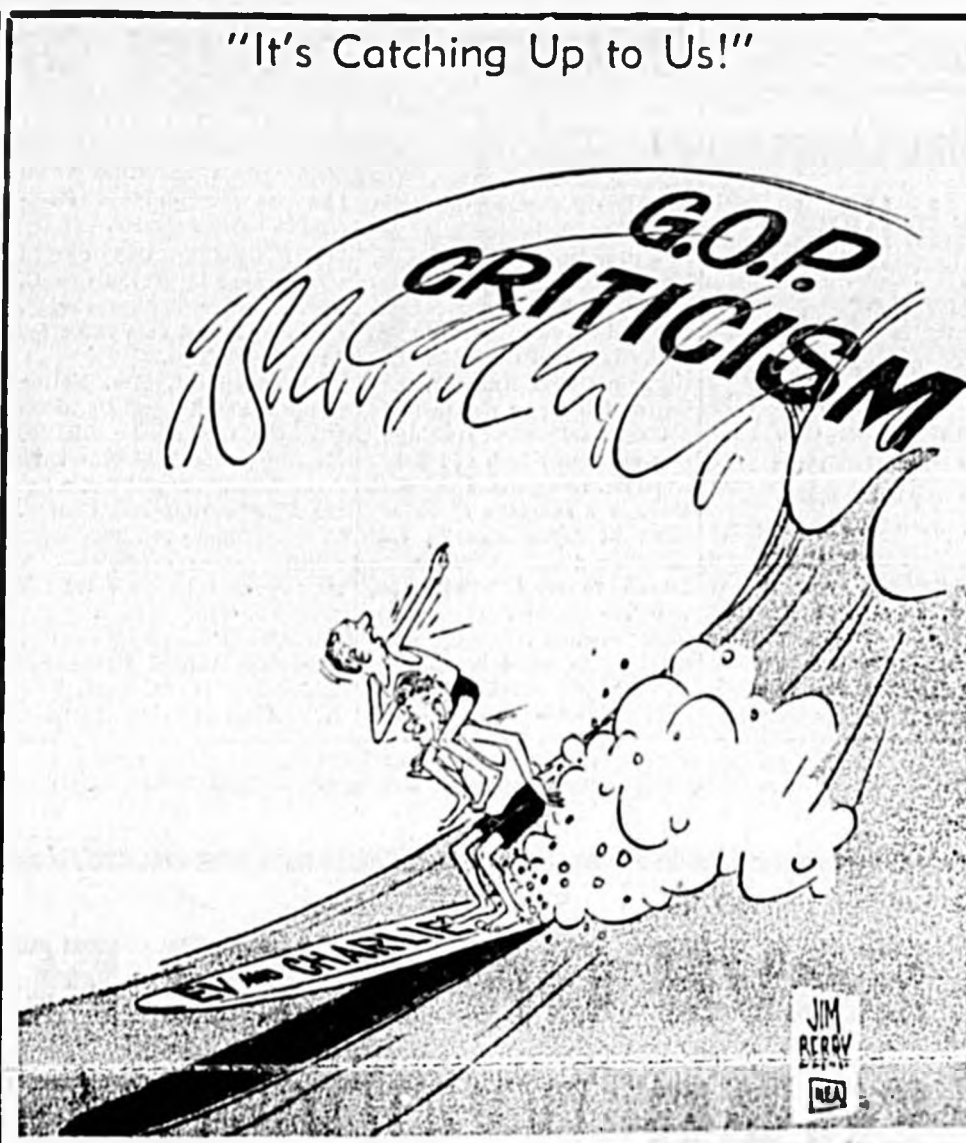

Phil Newsom Says: Chemical Warfare

(UPI)—From time to time the United States is bombarded by the propaganda of special opinion groups holding strong opinions on this or that, ranging from religion, to United States policy toward the Congo, to atomic testing.

Many have their basis in man's inhumanity to man. A late example is the considerable difference of opinion generated by the conditional United States decision to resume atmospheric tests of nuclear weapons.

What follows here will be mostly quotes from an article appearing recently in a small publication called "War-Peace Report."

"A small dose of LSD 35... causes a person to become so confused mentally that he cannot carry out his normal functions. Other drugs can cause temporary paralysis, sleepiness, blindness, deafness, loss of balance, crying, diarrhea, vomiting and convulsions. . . . Biological agents exist which can be used strategically to cause casualties in an area the width of a continent. . . . Many germs are suitable . . . among those are dengue fever, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, yellow fever, Q fever, anthrax, undulant fever, rabbit fever. . . .

"We do not know the intentions of the Soviets. From all the information we can get, they have the capabilities to wage both germ and chemical war."

General Rothchild says that the preparation of chemical and biological weapons would defy any known inspection system.

Peter Edson Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA) — President Kennedy's foreign aid message will go to Congress soon and then begins the annual battle to see how much or little it can be cut.

There is criticism from Latin America that the Alliance for Progress is doing nothing, and mounting criticism at home that it is trying to do too much without adequate guarantees of needed reforms south of the border. This tops the usual spring clamor in many parts of the country that all foreign aid ought to be abolished.

So new Agency for International Development Director Fowler Hamilton has a big selling job. He is going to have to ask Congress to take on faith promises for a lot of reforms now under way.

Hamilton is still holding up most of the allocations of this year's funds until he gets assurances that the programs in recipient countries are sound and will be run right. This is an auspicious start.

But it will be three or four months before he completes re-organization of his Agency. And he doesn't expect anyone on the outside to see much improvement in his operations before next fall.

If this seems like a slow start for the 14-month-old Kennedy administration, it must be remembered Hamilton has been on the job only four months.

In this time he has streamlined his top command and reduced the overhead for his 17,000 employees—2,300 in the U. S. and 14,700 in 80 countries around the globe.

He has reduced his deputies to two; one for plans and one for operations. Under them he has set up four regional bureaus for Europe, Asia, Africa, Latin America. Twelve big functional offices have been cut to four men each, and there have been some resignations of those bumped.

The aid hierarchy has been cut to 12 appointive and 51 supergrade civil service jobs. In addition, 11 new regional directors and 69 country mission chiefs are being recruited for three-year service, to cut down turnover.

Men selected for these jobs, and their wives, will be given four weeks' training in Washington, including language refreshing if needed, before going to the field. These are men recommended by In 4 u s t r y, hand-picked as having experience in the countries to which they will be assigned. It has been dubbed "Operation Tycoon."

As for checking up on what these men do that they should or should not do and what they don't do that they should, Hamilton will also have a new approach.

He will have an Inspector general, as Congress has insisted. But he will place more reliance on having better desk officers in Washington responsible for each country mission and better mission heads to work as teams.

Also, he will ask Congress for an additional \$750,000 for travel to send desk men abroad or bring mission chiefs back to Washington for closer co-operation.

Those are regarded as hopeful signs for tighter administration, the lack of which has been the foreign aid program's worst fault.

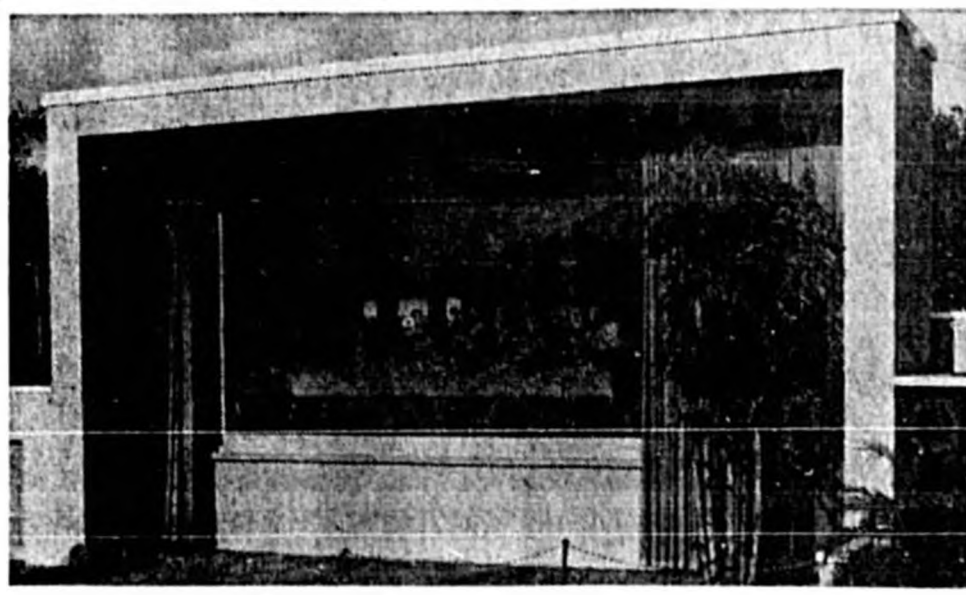

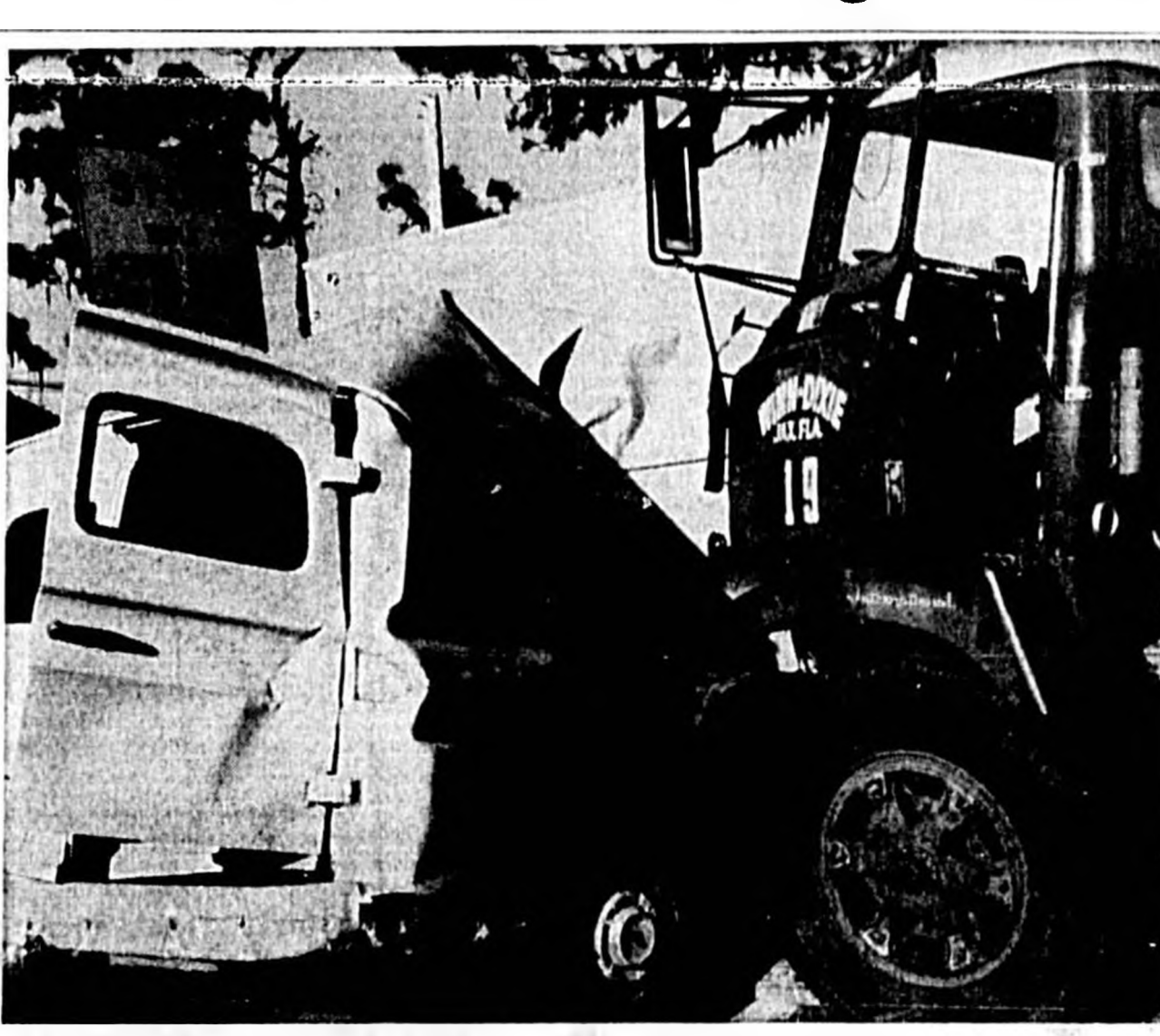

Big 3 Agree To Try Again

GENEVA (UPI)—The Big Three nuclear powers today agreed on an intensified new effort to end the test ban stalemate.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian Zorin accepted a long-standing Western suggestion for a three-nation subcommittee within the general disarmament conference to try to resolve the deadlock.

British and American official spokesmen immediately welcomed the Soviet move.

Zorin told a news conference Russia would like to have France on the subcommittee.

But he said the Kremlin was willing to go ahead without her if President Charles de Gaulle persists in his refusal to send delegates here.

A British spokesman said: "We welcome today's statement by Mr. Zorin. Both we and the United States have made it clear to the Russians that we would welcome their participation in such a committee."

137 Million Russians Vote

MOSCOW (UPI)—An estimated 137 million voters Sunday cast ballots for a single slate of Communist-approved candidates for the Soviet parliament.

Army Acts To Void Election Of Peronists

BUENOS AIRES (UPI)—The cabinet of President Arturo Frondizi resigned today less than 12 hours after a sweeping Peronist victory at the polls.

BUENOS AIRES (UPI)—Argentina's military leaders moved today to nullify elections in 10 provinces where supporters of former dictator Juan D. Peron were elected Sunday.

Informal sources said the secretaries of the Argentine army, navy and air force decided at an emergency meeting to tell President Arturo Frondizi to proclaim federal intervention where the Peronists won power.

Under the Argentine Constitution, intervention would nullify the results of the elections and prevent the Peronists from taking office.

Peron had urged from his exile in Spain that Argentinians demonstrate their loyalty for him by voting for his supporters—also backed by the Communists—against candidates running in congressional and provincial elections with Frondizi's backing. The dictator was ousted by a military coup in 1955.

The Peronists scored thumping victories in 10 provinces. Military leaders adamantly opposed to any sort of Peronist control went into emergency session when the election trend became evident.

The meeting, attended by the three secretaries and their aides, broke up just before dawn.

The Peronist victory did not affect Frondizi's tenure as president, which has two more years to run, but it indicated a popular dissatisfaction with his government's austerity program.
