## CITIZENS ENDORSE LARGE BOND ISSUE FOR PUBLIC UTILITIES

### PROGRESSIVE BLOC IN HOUSE PREVENTS ELECTION SPEAKER AND ORGANIZATION CONGRESS

#### MAKE GOOD THREAT TO PREVENT ELECTION GARRET LEADS

Gillett Ahead on First Ballot—Progressive Caucus Cannot Deliver Message Until Organization is Elected

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Progressive bloc in the House carried forward their militancy today and two ballots for speaker failed to elect. Gillett received the highest number of votes on first ballot and Garrett took the lead on the second.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Republican insurgents prevented the organization yesterday of the sixty-eighth Congress. Hardly had the new house and senate convened at noon before the Progressive group in the House made good its threat to block the election of a speaker. Four ballots were taken without result, and the house adjourned until noon tomorrow when Republican organization leaders will renew their efforts to re-elect Speaker Gillett.

In contrast with the storm in the House was an uneventful forty-five minute session of the Senate. Although an organization fight is in the background, there was no effort to force it yesterday, and there were indications that it would be deferred at least until after President Coolidge has delivered his first annual message to Congress. The president cannot deliver his message, however, until the House is organized, nor can the new Congress function. Some leaders said that even the Senate would be unable to transact any business other than that of receiving and acting upon nominations and treaties, which is solely a Senate function.

While leaders of both the Republican organization and the Insurgents declared immediately after the close of yesterday's session of the House that the fight would go on today, there were signs that a break might come before another over night adjournment. The progressive bloc met last night to canvass the situation and determine their further course.

Representative Longworth, the majority leader, declared that there would be no compromise with the insurgents as a group, but that organization leaders would treat with the individual members just the same as with any others of their party.

Representative Nelson, of Wisconsin, chairman of the Progressive bloc emphasized that the fight of his organization was not against Speaker Gillett as an individual but was being waged solely with the view of forcing the "old guard" leaders to give the house opportunity to amend its rules when a vote comes on their adoption which will be as soon as the speaker and other officers are elected.

While declaring that the Democrats in the House would give solid support

#### LITTLE INTEREST BEING SHOWN IN STATE POLITICS

Sensational Developments in Gubernatorial Race Lacking—More Withdrawals Are Expected

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 4.—Special—Sensational developments in the gubernatorial race were noticeably lacking during the past week, none of the rumors of new candidates having materialized into anything definite.

The feeling that the field is made up as it stands is growing among most of the men who are best informed as to Florida politics, while there are many who look for at least two additional withdrawals within a few weeks.

Up to this time Jennings, Martin, and Catts are the only aspirants who have shown sufficient strength to make their candidacies at all serious. Haines and Spencer, both have numerous friends but are not considered as really in the running. Trammell's support is largely an unknown quantity but as yet it does not appear to be formidable.

As was naturally to be expected, in consequence of the formal announcement of his platform and the adoption of more active measures in his campaign, Jennings has been perhaps more in the public mind for the past two weeks than any of the other candidates. The fact that during this period the Jennings strength has shown greater increase than that of either of his chief opponents, does not necessarily mean that it will continue to grow with sufficient rapidity to give him the nomination.

Martin probably is the leading candidate today as regards first-choice votes but this fact does not offer any definite assurances that he will win. The Martin campaign has been active under way for a longer time than any other and it is reasonable to consider his support more nearly uncovered than is that of other candidates. It remains to be seen whether Jacksonville's former mayor can maintain the apparent lead he has assumed by early announcement and active campaigning.

Catts admittedly has failed so far to measure up to the expectations of his ardent friends as a vote-getter in the pending campaign and his equally pronounced enemies have been greatly gratified by the degree in which he has shown inability to marshal the forces that carried him to victory eight years ago. Only the most sanguine of the Catts supporters now contend that his first choice vote will be as large as that of either Jennings

#### FRANCE STILL HOPING THAT U.S. WILL AID

IMPORTANT CONFERENCE HELD THIS MORNING REMOVE OBJECTION

By Defending Powers of Export Committee to Investigate German's Ability to Pay

PARIS, Dec. 4.—At a conference between Premier Poincaré and Louis Barthou, president of the reparations commission, a revised text defining powers of expert committees to investigate Germany's condition were agreed upon.

The change was made in hope that it will overcome America's objections to participating in the inquiry. Should the United States ultimately feel it cannot take official part in the inquiry steps will be taken here to provide for unofficial American representation.

#### SANFORD WILL BE HOST TO DELEGATES ON NEXT SATURDAY

Railway and Utility Commissioners Now Meeting at Miami Will Have Breakfast Here

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 4.—Delegates to the national convention of the Association of Railway and Utility Commissioners, which opened here today, will tour a portion of the state before returning to their homes. They will leave Miami Friday night, December 7, for Sanford, on the first leg of the trip.

Arriving at Sanford on the morning of the 8th they will be the guests of the people of Sanford at breakfast, after which the citizens of that place will take the visitors for an automobile trip through Seminole county, thence through Lake and Orange counties, and back to Orlando.

The itinerary has been so arranged that Orlando will be reached in time for luncheon as the guests of that city.

After lunch the trip through Orange county will be continued on southward to Haines City where the night will be spent. Entertainment features have been planned for the visitors at that place.

On Sunday morning, the people of Polk county will take the commissioners, many of whom will be accompanied by their wives, in tow for an automobile trip down the Scenic Highlands. The return trip will be made by way of Bartow, Winter Haven, Florence Villa, Auburndale and Lakeland with the schedule calling for their reaching Tampa by Sunday night.

They will be accompanied on the trip by many prominent Floridians, headed by the Railroad Commission of the state.

Sanford Prepares to Entertain. Sanford is officially planning to entertain the 80 odd delegates of the National Association of Railway and Utility officials, who will arrive here early Saturday morning in a special train from Miami where the annual convention is now being held.

#### Monthly Report of Sheriff Hand Shows Activity of Office

### UNQUALIFIED APPROVAL GIVEN PLAN TO CALL BOND ELECTION FOR PUBLIC UTILITY PLANTS

#### AWARD CONTRACT FOR DRILLING OF FOUR 6-INCH WELLS

Mahoney-Walker of Sanford Successful Bidders—Work Will Begin Soon

The city commission held a special meeting yesterday afternoon in the offices of the city hall to open bids for the drilling of four 6-inch wells in the business section of Sanford on first and second streets.

There were four bids submitted. They were: Mahoney-Walker of Sanford, \$3.40 per foot, including cost of 6-inch casing; Dibble & Ernest, of Eastis, \$2.50 per foot exclusive of cost of casing; Layne South-eastern Co., of St. Petersburg, \$5.50 per foot including the cost of the casing and Joseph Raehn, of Orlando, \$3.50 per foot, including 6-inch piping instead of casing.

The commission referred the matter to the city manager. Later in the evening it was learned that the firm of Mahoney-Walker, of Sanford was awarded the contract. The work on these wells will begin within the next few days.

Appearing before the meeting yesterday was H. R. Rosebro, local manager of the Southern Utilities, Mr. Rosebro told the commission that he understood that he was to appear before that body to give a verbal statement concerning the failure to secure water during a recent fire. In answer to this Mr. Rosebro was given until next Monday to prepare a written statement on the matter.

#### LARGE CROWDS ATTEND MASS MEETING FORSTER SPEAKS

Banker Predicts Great Prosperity for City and Declares That the City Must Lose No Time in Calling Election

Unqualified approval of the plan to call a bond issue providing funds for the acquisition by the city of the water, gas and electric light plants, was given last night at a large mass meeting held at the county court house.

This will mean that the City Commission will proceed at once with their plans to call an election authorizing the issuance of \$800,000 in bonds and the construction of an up-to-date water works system just as soon as possible, after the floating of the issue.

The question as to the building of electric light and gas plants or buying the present plants of the Southern Utilities Company was left to a later date, although this issue will provide funds for same.

The proposed water system will cost \$350,000. It will furnish soft water and in quantities sufficient for all purposes including adequate fire protection for years to come. Plans and specifications have been worked out by Consulting Engineer Jos. E. Craig, who was retained by the City Commission some time ago for that purpose.

The meeting opened with a few preliminary remarks by Hon. Forest Lake, chairman of the City Commission regarding the purpose of the gathering, who expressed himself in behalf of his colleagues as desiring an expression of the wishes of the Sanford citizens regarding the municipal ownership of public utilities.

Mr. Lake further pointed out the needs of the city, the danger it is in, resulting from a lack of adequate fire protection. He said that the time had arrived when citizens of this city should rise up to action and assert themselves.

"We are only a big corporation—the citizens are the stockholders and the city commission is the board of directors," said Mr. Lake. "As the board of directors, we wish to know just what the people want in regard to the present question."

Following Mr. Lake's opening talk, Jos. E. Craig, consulting engineer for the city of Sanford, was called upon for a report of the situation. He stated in reply to a question asked that the valuation put on the Southern Utilities plant of Sanford is \$107,000. He added, however, that personally he didn't believe that to the city of Sanford it was actually worth quite half as much as that sum.

Mr. Craig further gave conditions as they now exist as compared with conditions as they would exist under a system now under consideration. According to his statement last night and according to a lengthy report recently made to the city commission, the Southern Utilities at present affords fire protection to approximately 706 houses of the 1781 houses in this

tive action designed to make that agency more efficient and to better the lot of the disabled former service man.

As regards the railroad situation, one element in Congress is expected to oppose any effort to amend the transportation act, which in the opinion of most railway executives, should stand as it is.

The farm bloc is expected to make a determined effort to provide relief for the farmer, and a wide range of solutions for the country's agricultural ills undoubtedly will be put forward.

Expiration of the present immigration law will make action on that question imperative. The House Immigration Committee has begun work on a proposed new law.

It is expected that during the session the international situation will come to the fore on more than one occasion, especially in the Senate, which was asked by the late President Harding to sanction participation by the United States in the World Court.

Domestic issues that are expected to engage much attention include prohibition, proposals to limit the powers of the Supreme Court reformation and the question of embracing more blanks in the Federal Reserve system.

An element of uncertainty is injected because of the scant majorities of the Republicans in the Senate and House. Party leaders admit the danger that Republicans who are members of the Progressive bloc will swerve from the administration on various propositions, thus, perhaps, jeopardizing the majority's program.

Under no statutory requirement to adjourn March 4, the session, Senators and Representatives generally predict, will continue well into next summer.

A determined effort will be made to obtain adjournment before the Presidential conventions in June, but some leaders think it more likely that the end will not come until just before the November election.

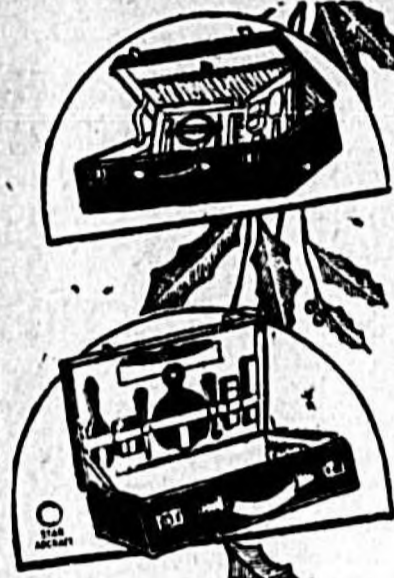

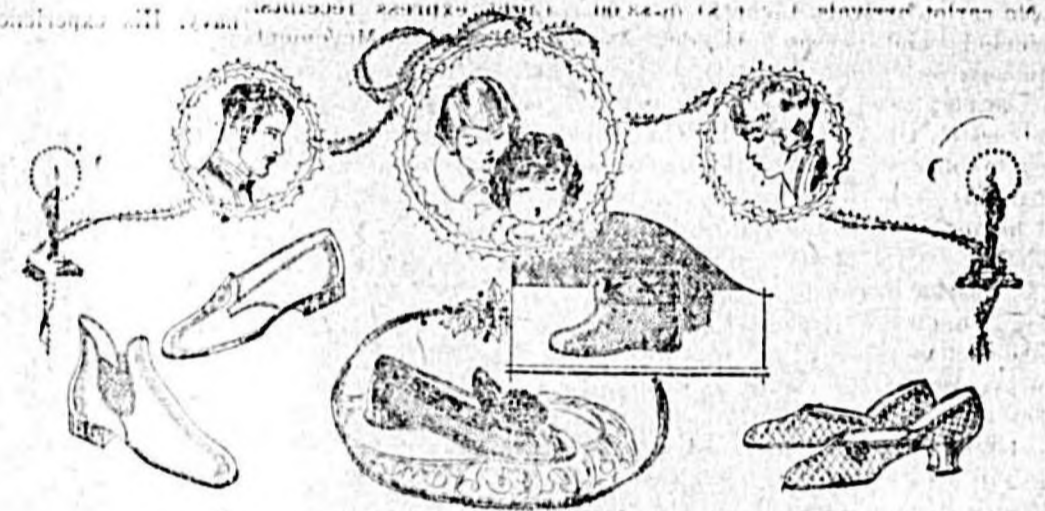

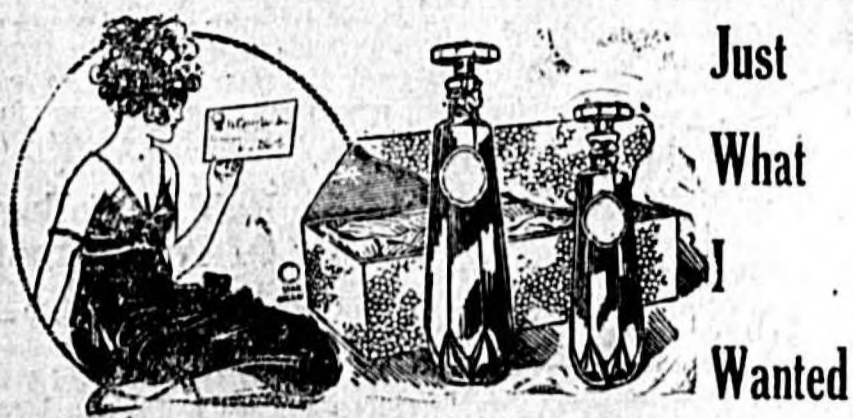
