13 Soviet Spies Expelled By Canada For Espionage

OTTAWA (UPI) — Canada has expelled 13 members of a Soviet spy ring it says attempted to infiltrate the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the largest espionage operation uncovered in Canada in 33 years.

Syrians, Lebanese Clash

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Syrian peace-keeping troops and Lebanese fighting militia clashed today in the fourth straight day of the worst fighting since the end of the civil war 15 months ago.

Diplomatic sources estimated that up to 70 people died and many more were wounded in the past three days of clashes between the Syrians and rightist militia units and Lebanese troops.

Life in Cuba Improved?

MONTREAL, N.C. (UPI) — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro has not restricted religious activities in the island nation since his Communist regime came to power in 1959, according to a Cuban theologian.

Sadat in N. Germany

By United Press International Egyptian President Anwar Sadat was in West Germany today as part of his eight-nation tour to gain support for his Middle East peace initiative.

Sadat, encouraged by his talks with President Carter and saying peace is possible in a week, if the Israelis soften their negotiating in the Bavarian resort town of Dierchsgaden, West Germany, for the day.

Ethiopian Troops Advance

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (UPI) — Ethiopian troops backed by warplanes are advancing steadily in a pincer movement against the Somali-held town of Jijiga in their week-old offensive to recapture the Ogaden Desert, diplomatic sources said today.

The Ethiopians have gained more than 15 miles and are now about halfway to the strategic former radar base captured by Somali troops late last year, sources said.

Ban TV Burger, Chips Ads, Consumer Group Asks

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A consumer group wants the government to ban television commercials for high-fat foods such as hamburger, pizza, french fries, and potato chips, particularly those aimed at children.

The Center for Science in the Public Interest told the Federal Trade Commission Thursday it would be a step backward to crack down on children's advertising for sugary foods — as FTC is considering — only to have these commercials replaced by ones for high-fat foods.

The risk of heart attack or the threat of stroke, the group said, is not as high as the health benefits of eating these products.

WASHINGTON — U.S. marshals are expected to subpoena jurors from outside the courtroom to appear for a trial.
The decision, some witnesses have been subpoenaed that several federal marshals seriously compromised the jurors who returned a guilty verdict against a leading New Jersey political figure. The incident raises questions about the conduct of U.S. marshals in other courts.
The secret evidence has been held before federal Judge Lawrence Wiggins in his chambers. The law issued orders to everyone involved in the incident not to talk to the press. We have been able to interview, to dig out the details.
The last juror the marshal who had been assigned to oversee the sequestered juror, Louis Harvey Jones, told the FBI that he and other marshals recommended some of the jurors during the trial.
Among jurors who had participated in an earlier trial with the marshals, he alleged in an affidavit that they "did not have Haven Green on their minds during their deliberations and could not have cared less about his guilt or innocence or the instructions of the judge."

VITAMIN FRODO: The National Cancer Institute, which has failed to establish a link of cancer-causing substances, curiously is now focusing its attention on vitamin C.
The institute has no reason to believe that a popular vitamin cancer cancer. There is not the slightest preliminary evidence that it is beneficial. However, the cancer institute is planning to spend \$200,000 on long-term cancer studies to test vitamin C.
There is such a massive public campaign to suggest that vitamin C is healthy, orange juice and other foods may be totally help prevent cancer. Nobel Laureate Dr. Linus Pauling has called the institute five times for a more \$50,000 to test this theory.
Pauling pointed to studies in which 100 to 200 cancer patients treated with vitamin C lived four times as long as those who didn't get the vitamin. Almost all of the vitamin C patients improved to some degree.
The institute approved Pauling's grant proposal in 1974, but assigned it such a low priority that it never received funding. "We were interested in learning for sure whether vitamin C does prevent cancer, and it's a question," he said. "It was not a very low level of priority."

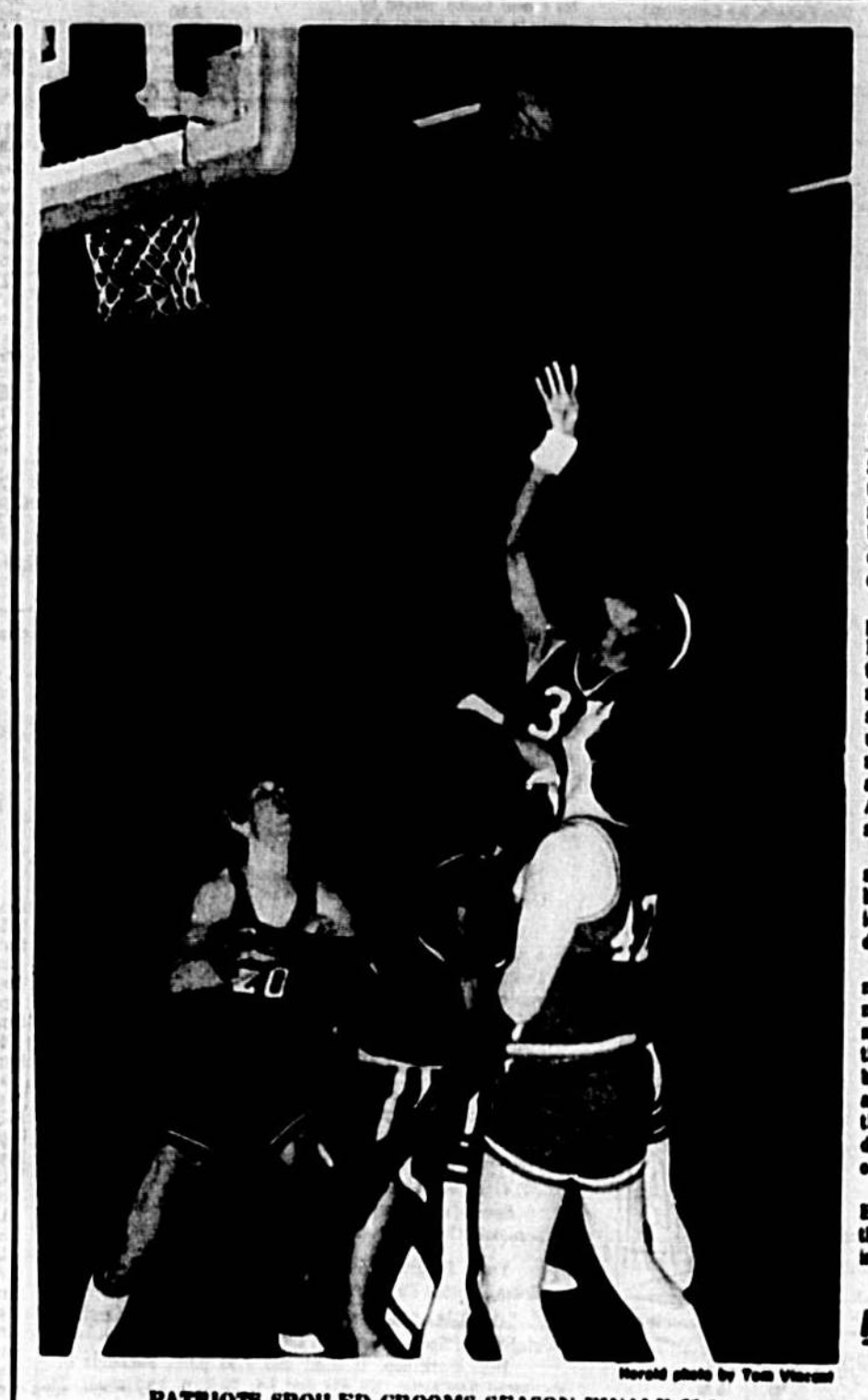

Protest Threatened Over South Africa In Davis Cup Play

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — The president of the local NAACP chapter says allowing South African players to participate in the Davis Cup tennis matches at Vanderbilt University will "aggravate a contagion of racism throughout our community."
Dr. Charles Kinbrough, president of the Nashville NAACP chapter, said Thursday the chapter's executive committee met in emergency session Wednesday night and unanimously endorsed a massive protest if the matches are held because of South Africa's policy of apartheid — separation of the races by law.
Kinbrough said 60,000 people, including some "well-known personalities" he did not identify, will participate in the demonstration.
The chapter's executive committee met with Althea Simmons, associate director of the national NAACP office to plan the demonstration, which Kinbrough said would be postponed after such "great marches" as the march on Washington during the civil rights upheaval of the 1960s.
Vanderbilt President Kenneth Fields said last week that the university has "every intention" to hear its commitment to host the Davis Cup matches March 17-18.
Vanderbilt Chancellor Alexander Heard said the university does not "sympathize in any way with the policy of apartheid," but does support internationalism.
"We would not prohibit a ball company from the Soviet Union, a ping pong team from...
We interpret the acceptance of the South African players in the Davis Cup tennis match by Vanderbilt University as an insult to the black community and indeed to all of the Nashville community who denounce the racist policies of the South African government," Kinbrough said.
Kinbrough said the acceptance into the games as a fact of infection which will serve to spread a contagion of racism throughout our community.
Kinbrough met with Vanderbilt officials earlier this week and asked that the university either not host the matches or bar the South African players from participating.
"We did not get any kind of assurance that there would be any change from their position. They only promised to study and investigate the possibility," he said.
"We have been studied to death. We don't need any further study. What we need is people to rise up and show active areas of communication where the words will be heard and where there can be a sense of pride in our community."
Kinbrough said the South African team consists of white players because blacks in that country are barred from participating.
"We will continue to plan for our demonstration until we feel there is no reason to plan."

On Homosexuals
Jews Join Debate

The debate on homosexuality that has engaged many Protestant denominations over the past year is spreading to the Jewish community. Rabbi Hirschel J. Matt, acting director of the Great Jewish Foundation at Princeton University, writing in the current issue of Judaism, the monthly journal of the American Jewish Congress and the World Jewish Congress, raises many of the same issues Protestants have been discussing.

Can a Jewish homosexual be a rabbi? Does Jewish law permit homosexual marriage? What role should the biblical injunctions against homosexuality play in a contemporary understanding of the laws? Matt reviews the biblical and post-biblical sources on the subject and finds that every angle decision, pro or con, takes for granted that a homosexual act is a moral wrong, an act that is degrading and, a serious violation of the Torah's command, and therefore, a grave sin. Matt said to end the discussion of the issue at such a point is premature for there may be changed circumstances in the light of which the

Torah's stand today... might possibly involve changed positions and different conclusions. "It is only in our own generation that homosexual behavior has been found to involve not merely a single, overt act, or a series of such acts," he said, "but often to reflect a profound inner condition and basic psychic orientation, involving the deepest levels of personality." He said that despite the differences among contemporary experts on homosexuality, "On one aspect there seems to be near unanimity: that for very many homosexuals the prospect of change to heterosexuality are slim." If such is the case, what should be the Jewish community's response? It has an obligation, Matt said, to "allow indirectly homosexuals to be what they are, would not want homosexuals to be denied the only possible freedom, namely, to live as deeply a human life as we are capable of." Matt has by no means resolved the debate in the Jewish community. Instead, it is only just beginning and it is certain to be as intense as that currently raging in Protestant circles.

St-Ups Don't Harm Organs

DEAR DR. LAMB - My husband and I are taking a physical fitness course at a local high school. The course is taught by a high school coach. He has all of us doing sit-ups as part of our routine.

I have heard from an exercise station on TV that women should not do sit-ups the same way men do, that the legs should be bent. Could you please give me some information on this, as it was said that improperly doing this is harmful to the female organs? I'm trying to lose weight - 30 pounds - any hints or advice?

modified leg lifts for this action. And, of course, just strongly contracting and relaxing the abdominal muscles repeatedly with the stomach and lying position will help.

Sit-ups should be only part of a total exercise program. To lose weight you need to use calories. To use calories effectively with exercise, you need to be able to sustain the exercise for long periods of time. That means the body is hard to heat waiting for this purpose.

A combination of exercise and proper diet is the best approach to lose 30 pounds. I am sending you The Health Letter number 6-7, Weight Losing Diet, to give you some additional tips and information that you can follow. Also, I am sending you number 3-7, Girl's Control: Avoiding the Big Middle. You still need a large amount of patience. You should not plan on losing more than two pounds a week and should be prepared to be satisfied to lose one pound of actual fat a week. If you lose faster, you will be losing muscle as well as fat and that may not be good. An exercise program will also help prevent muscle loss.

DEAR READER - You are not likely to harm your female organs by sit-ups regardless of how you do them. That is just so much nonsense.

It is more effective for both men and women to do sit-ups with the knees bent. Why? Because then you must do the entire lift of the upper body with your abdominal muscles. Also, you come to bend the abdominal muscles once you have reached the level of getting the shoulders well off the floor. If you hold that position for a few seconds with the abdominal muscles tensed you will get your best results.

When the legs are left straight during sit-ups a lot of the action is done with the muscles from the thighs to the pelvis and back that are important in bending the thighs, while the abdominal muscles may not be used very much. That is why people are often advised to do sit-ups with the knees bent. I would also recommend that you do sit-ups lightening the abdominal muscles each time you sit up. Sit-ups are good only for the upper abdominal muscles. They will not tone up the lower abdomen. You need to do

Heat Pump Cools, Heats And Saves Energy Too

In these days we need to do everything possible to conserve the amount of energy we use, yet still live comfortably, such as having adequate heating and cooling in the home.

There is one device — the heat pump — that accomplishes both these requirements — providing maximum heating comfort in the winter and cooling in the summer and at the same time saving energy, according to the Edison Electric Institute.

When heating a home the heat pump takes the heat from the outside air and pumps it into the house. For cooling the unit does just the reverse — it removes the heat from the inside air and pumps it outside, just like any air conditioner.

At the same time it filters the air of impurities, thereby reducing your cleaning chores. During the summer, mosquitoes, even on the most humid days, is eliminated, and since windows can be kept closed, summer dirt, dust and noise are greatly reduced.

Because windows and doors can be kept closed, pollen is kept out of the house — welcome news for allergy sufferers.

The same compressor, fans and refrigerant coils that provide cooling also provide heating. This means lower installed cost for you compared to using two separate systems — one for heating and one for cooling.

The air, whether warmed or cooled, is distributed by a

central system and circulated through ductwork into every room.

Electric duct heaters are usually added to provide supplemental heat in very cold weather and are automatically controlled.

A separately mounted, low-voltage heating-cooling thermostat controls the operation of the heat pump. This thermostat senses the need for heating or cooling and switches back and forth automatically, according to the temperature inside your home.

When it comes to saving energy this comfort-conditioning system uses energy so efficiently that on the heating cycle it supplies 1 1/2 to 3 times as much heat as ordinary electric heaters. That is, the unit produces more units of heat for each unit of electricity needed to operate it, thus saving both money and energy.

What you buy, and pay for, are kilowatt-hours of electricity. So the more heat you get for each kilowatt-hour the less it costs you to warm your home.

And because it delivers more units of heat for each unit of electricity, the heat pump helps to conserve critical fuels.

An electric heat pump saves space too. Some units are completely self-contained.

Others, which are called split-systems, have part of the equipment indoors and part outdoors. The part of the system inside the house includes a cabinet, coil and blower and can be located about anywhere — in a basement, attic, or closet, or even hung in a crawl space.

The outdoor unit, including a compressor and a coil, is located next to the house and can blend inconspicuously with your landscaping.

The idea behind the heat pump goes back to 1852 when Lord Kelvin, (a Scottish physicist and inventor best known for his work in the

applied field of electricity) used a compressor as a "warming engine," and as a means of heating buildings to replace equipment for direct burning of fuels.

Several working models were built but the heat pump remained primarily an idea until production of pilot models in the 1920's.

These pilot models led to field testing of experimental models in the 1940's and then to the introduction of the heat pump to certain areas of the country in the early 1950's.

In recent years the use of the heat pump in homes and commercial buildings has grown rapidly — from some 4,500 residential units in 1966 to 125,000 installed last year.

The increase in the commercial market has also been large.

Properly installed and maintained, an electric heat pump will provide all the comfort you need all through the year, and will help to conserve natural resources.

Take Time Choosing A Remodeler

Many homeowners ask, "How do I find a reputable remodeler?" Do not walk your fingers through the Yellow Pages of the telephone directory. The best way to start your search is to call the local NAHB-affiliated builders association in Orlando at 885-7001.

They are in touch with most of the firms in your area who are engaged in construction-related activities and will be able to supply you with a list of qualified remodelers on whom work you can rely. Members of the local association and its remodelers council are expert professionals with proven track records.

The question then is which one to choose. Don't hurry; take your time making a selection. Most problems in the remodeling business occur when consumers fail to investigate remodelers properly before hiring them.

The time spent checking over your selection may seem unproductive, especially since you have decided to remodel and are anxious to see the end result. However, you should make certain that the work is done to your satisfaction and within your budget.

Try to speak to someone who has used the remodeler you are considering. Comments and recommendations from that person will give you an insight into the remodeler's capabilities. Most competent remodelers obtain the majority of their business from referrals. Satisfied customers serve as continual advertisements.

If you do not know of anyone who has worked with a remodeler, ask the local chamber of commerce or local leading institutions for suggestions. Check their recommendations with the local Better Business Bureau and consumer affairs office.

If your proposed selection receives support from these various agencies, he is most likely capable of doing a good job for you. Do not make a random selection and be careful to avoid any firm that:

- Makes advertisements by offering goods and services at ridiculously low prices.
- Uses the "used house" play in which subcontractors say that your home has been selected for a neighborhood demonstration project, which entitles you to a discount.
- Engages in hard sell by phone.
- Uses untrained door-to-door salesmen.

Many homeowners ask how to judge a remodeler's work. Be certain, ask to see your friend's remodeling job. Find out how long the work took, how much their remodeler charged, and whether the remodeler was amenable to change. Check the quality of the work closely. Reputable remodelers have a permanent business location, a good reputation with banks and suppliers, adequate tools and equipment, an efficient front office, and signs of activity.

Hiring an NAHB remodeler member who is a general contractor gives you the following advantages over subcontracting work yourself:

- One person is responsible for all phases of the job from start to finish — the supplies, the labor, and material, along with scheduling and coordinating the work of various trades. (Usually the general contractor will hire subcontractors to do part of the job.)
- An NAHB remodeler member carries that the work will be done according to specifications. He has experience in obtaining quality vendors and subcontractors.
- He may obtain materials at lower prices than you can.

- He can often get better prices than you can from subcontractors.
- He obtains all permits, is responsible for arranging the inspections required by law, and pays all the bills relieving you of those chores.
- Being your own contractor has numerous disadvantages. To ensure your remodeling is done properly you must:
 - Be responsible for all items listed above for general contractors.
 - Be thoroughly familiar with the capabilities of the subcontractors.
 - Have sufficient time to plan the phasing in of each trade and provide day-to-day supervision of the project.
 - Be acutely aware of the limitations of your knowledge of building and remodeling.
 - Have a thorough knowledge of local and state regulations concerning home improvements to be sure that none are violated and be familiar with the regulations that have been adopted to protect the consumer.
 - Understand that any saving resulting from serving as your own general contractor are often offset by the difference in prices mentioned above and by other unforeseen expenses.
- A wise consumer shops for a reputable remodeler who works with him and understands his needs. Getting competitive bids is customary as it will help you the consumer make the best transaction. You must be sure to seek bids only from reputable remodelers. Irresponsible remodelers sometimes present a bid that is unusually low, then claim it does not cover part of the work. If you use competitive bidding, you must have a complete set of plans and specifications prepared by a professional designer-remodeler or architect.
- Having these as the basis for the bid will assure the work is done according to the results you are seeking and also act as a basis against which work progress and materials used may be checked.
- A written contract is important. It should be well-written and cover by both parties. It should cover the quality and quantity of materials to be used as well as types and brand names. Descriptions of job divisions and clear payment schedules should also be included. Read every word before signing the contract so that you will have no surprises later.
- Having drawn up a fair payment schedule, stick with it. Some remodelers insert a "negative clause" in a contract, stating clearly what will not be done on the job, such as painting new work or building light fixtures. Doing this can save a misunderstanding which might arise as the work nears completion.
- To avoid unnecessary problems, you must establish good communications with the remodeler and the workers or subcontractors. You must talk directly to the remodeler if a problem arises, not to the subcontractor or the crew. You should designate one person as the family spokesman to avoid confusion. Regular meetings between you and the crew will discuss the progress of the work will help avoid misunderstandings and will insure that the work proceeds on schedule to a satisfactory completion.

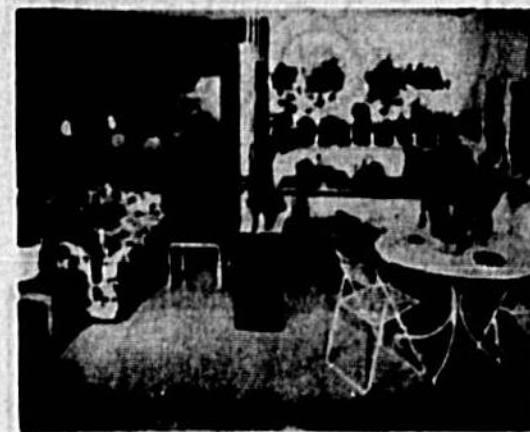

So, you want to redecorate with wallcoverings this year? Your first concern is of course in price. Wallcoverings today average around \$8.00 a single roll, although there is much to be found on other side of this.

Prepared wallcoverings will sometimes not adhere to wall surfaces, especially newly painted dry wall, if not properly sealed. Staining costs about \$1.00 for an average bedroom.

Wallpaper kits with tools required for the "do-it-yourself" cost about \$8.00. Adhesive which will normally hang five to six rolls start at \$1.25. Also, women are fast becoming the "do-it-yourself" applicators of wallcovering today.

Remodeling? Check For Those Crawling Things

Our calendar tells us that winter is almost over and it's time to start thinking about all the odd jobs we need to line up for the first warm weekends. Before going too far with the painting, plastering and remodeling, maybe you need professional advice.

Have you noticed "moth" spots, bluish-gray spots or any suspicious areas in the wood portions of your home such as baseboards, window frames or in the crawl space underneath? 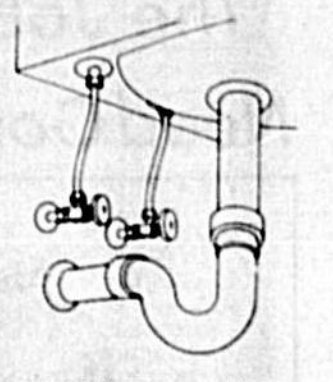

Tools: To Do The Job, They Need Good Care

The tools you use in the care and maintenance of your home will function safely and reliably if you give them proper care.

Hang up your tools instead of dumping them willy nilly into a tool box where they will be hard to find and subject to casual damage.

Keep tools clean and free of rust. Wipe them after use and apply a coat of light oil to the

metal to prevent oxidation. The only exception to this rule are hammers, files and wrench handles.

Hammers, when slick, can glance off nailheads, files will not cut properly, and wrench handles can slip from your grip.

Metal that has rusted slightly from humidity or condensation can be restored with fine steel wool and

brass. Turpentine is an excellent solvent for removing wood pitch from saw blades and other metal surfaces.

Keep tools sharp. You can renew the edges of plane cutters and chisels yourself. However, most saw blades, because of their compound bevels, need the special tools and techniques available only from professionals. Do do all

drill and router bits. Because of their electric motors, power tools need special care.

Lubricate them regularly. Keep them clear of cobwebs; it can clog the vents in the motor housing and hinder the movement of a circular saw's safety guard.

Protect power cords from oil and solvent. Cut them neatly for storage.

While not absolutely necessary, metal door trim or reducer strips, available at lumber or hardware stores, can be used for exposed edges in doorways.

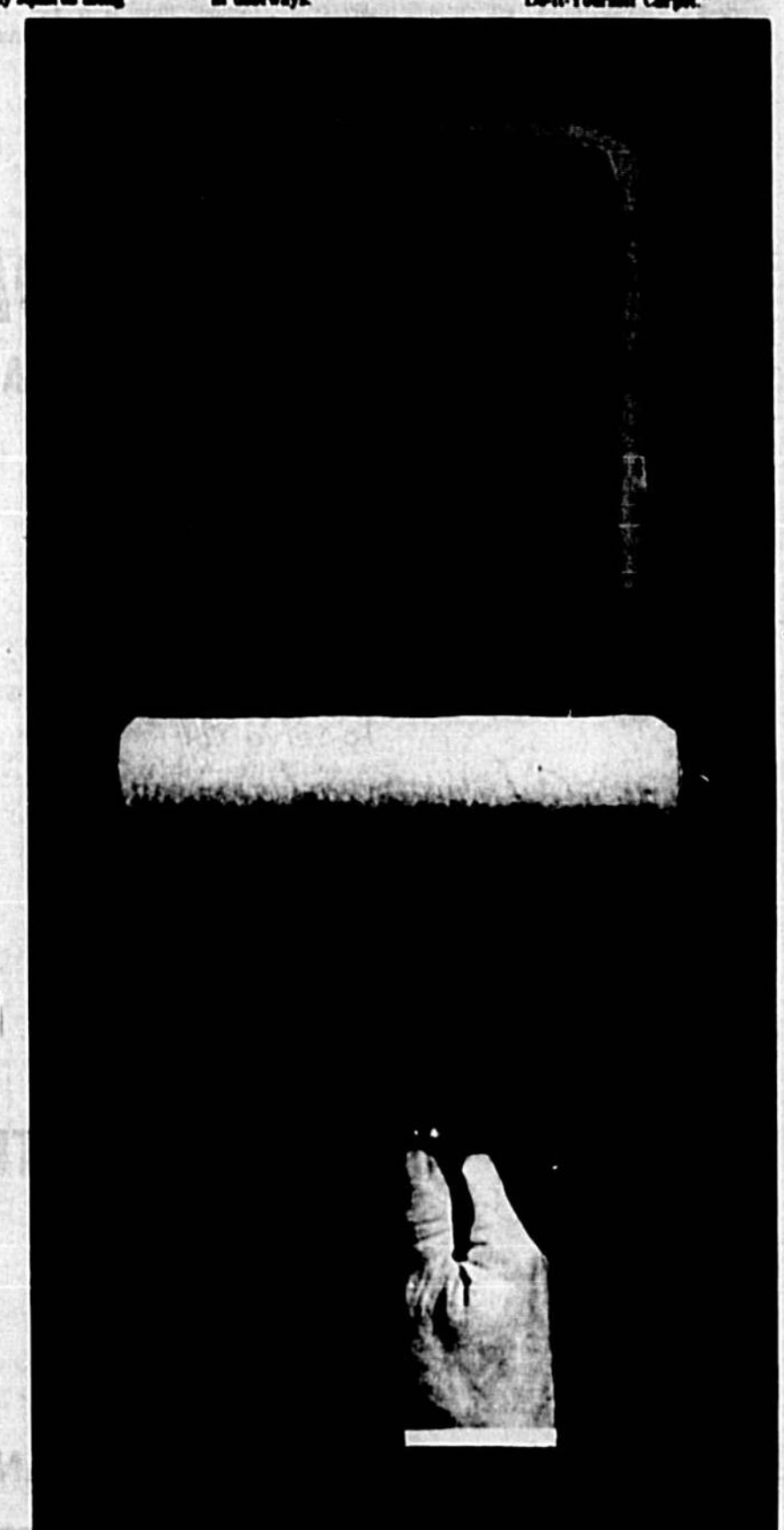

On Medicare Fraud

Altamonte Business Couple To Federal Prison

After exhausting legal appeals, the co-owners of an Altamonte Springs company that rents respirators to Medicare patients have begun serving federal prison terms for Medicare fraud.

The two are Lois and Boyd Evans, owners of Complete Breathing Care Inc., 794 State Road 54, Mr. and Mrs. Evans were indicted by an Orlando grand jury in August 1976 for making false statements to the Federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare and Social Security Administration on requests for Medicare payments submitted to Blue Shield of Florida, according to federal court records.

The grand jury charged that Mr. and Mrs. Evans falsely stated that Evans Respiratory Centers Inc. (now known as Complete Breathing Care) had delivered medical equipment to various persons when the equipment had not been delivered.

Lois Evans, jailed Jan. 31, was taken last Monday to Lexington, Ky., Federal Correctional Institution. Boyd Evans turned himself into the federal prison camp at Camp Eglin Air Force Base, Florida on Jan. 31.



The Respirator

Mrs. Evans was convicted on 13 counts of fraud on Mar. 20, 1978. Boyd Evans was convicted of three counts of fraud on May 13, 1978. Each was fined \$10,000 and given sentence of three years, with at least four months to be served in federal prison.

Mr. and Mrs. Evans were sentenced by Federal District Court Judge John A. Reed Jr. Complete Breathing Care has sued 19 senior citizens, who live all over Florida, requesting the Circuit Court, located in Sanford, to order they pay the company for respirators the company says they loaned, circuit court records show.

Two live in Altamonte Springs, and several live in Orlando. A 78-year-old Lake County woman has argued, in documents filed with circuit court, that the company falsely

advertised its services in signing her to a lease for a respirator and that the company wouldn't remove the respirator from her home after three months as she requested.

The woman, Gerie Chaudoin of rural Berwick, also charges in her Feb. 3 counterclaim and answer to Complete Breathing Care's November 1977 suit demanding \$5,150 plus interest from her, that the company violated Florida's Deceptive and Unfair Trade Practices Act, the state's commercial code and federal Medicare regulations.

Mrs. Chaudoin asks circuit court to order Complete Breathing Care to pay her a total of \$5,150 in punitive and general damages, court costs, attorney's fees and rent for storing the machine at her home after she requested the company to remove the machine.

Mrs. Chaudoin is represented by Thomas E. Fitch, staff attorney for the Sanford office of Central Florida Legal Services, which provides legal assistance in non-criminal matters to those who can't afford an attorney.

Though Complete Breathing Care advertised the respirator would be paid for by Medicare,

Crowds Dwindle, But 'They Still Come'

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI) — The little boy gripped his father's knuckles, walked waddling toward the artificial grass and dropped a rosebud which would freeze and turn brown in hours. Only a temporary marker distinguished the grave of Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, who died of cancer at his lake front home in Waverly, Minn., a month ago Monday.

The huge crowds that passed his grave at Lakewood Cemetery in the early days have dwindled to a trickle. Traffic control no longer is necessary.

"But they still come by," said David Halstead, executive secretary of the Lakewood Cemetery Association. "A few drop flowers, like the child with the rosebud. The flowers die quickly, but we remove them regularly."

Humphrey's death created a vacuum — and led to, perhaps, the most tumultuous period in Minnesota's political history. Muriel Humphrey was named to take her husband's place in the Senate, supposedly as a "caretaker." But she threw the political scene into deeper chaos, hinting she may run for the four unexpired years of his term.

Others who long had coveted the seat were thrown into disarray.

"No one can run against the Humphrey name in Minnesota."

"We've sold out three shipments already," said Brenda Bergquist, book buyer for Powers in Minneapolis. "It's selling steadily all the time."

Halstead said there had been a number of inquiries from people wanting to know about buying a cemetery lot in the area where Humphrey is buried.

The Rev. Calvin Dicker, 34, pastor of the House of Love Presbyterian Church who conducted Humphrey's funeral service,

has become a minor clerical celebrity.

"We've received hundreds of letters, well over a thousand," Kathleen Bovey, Dicker's secretary, said. "They were very complimentary. Many asked for a transcript of the service. Many said they had been away from the church for a long time, and said they thought it might be time to try it again."

The church is crowded with visitors, especially on Sunday, Miss Bovey said.

One visitor during the funeral period stole an antique cross made in Germany more than 150 years ago. It hasn't been returned, Miss Bovey said.

Humphrey's favorite granddaughter was Vicki Solomonson, a retarded child of 17, suffering from Down's Syndrome. Humphrey had explained his terminal cancer to her and told her he was going to die.

Vicki lives at the Louise Whitbeck Frazer School for the Retarded in Richfield and, according to the director, is doing well. "She talks about her grandfather's death and has kept a scrapbook of everything she can lay her hands on about him," Robert Kowalczyk, the school's director, said. "At times she gets sad, but we're really proud of her."

Wife Trouble? An Answer

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — George and Yvonne Williams were on their way to see their lawyer about a reconciliation Friday when, witnesses said, Williams suddenly stopped his car on a 50-foot-high bridge spanning the icy Wolf River.

Motorists, who had to stop on the bridge behind Williams' car, said he got out, marched around to the passenger side, opened the door, came out with his wife's purse and threw it over the bridge.

Then, they said, he reached back into the car, came up this time with his wife and heaved her after her purse.

"He dashed his hands off, got in his car and drove off," a witness told police. Patrolman Ed Fedrick, summoned by the witnesses, rescued Mrs. Williams from the river. She was not seriously hurt.

Other officers went to the office where Williams worked as an engineer and arrested him on a charge of assault on a woman.

Police said they had no idea exactly why Williams suddenly decided to heave his wife over the bridge.

CPers Get A Chance

Courage. That's what it's all about. Michael Wesley has a big-sized helping of it. So does Wilma DeBusk.

Both are 19 years old. Both are students at Crooms High School. Both have cerebral palsy.

Michael and Wilma are getting the chance to find out just how far they can go. Apparently that's going to be a very long distance.

Wilma, her eyes studiously close to the hoop in her hands, does delicately detailed embroidery in brilliant colors, and shyly allows it to be seen and praised by teachers and visitors at the school.

Michael spends a lot of time at a loom, weaving, making hangings to sell to faculty and students.

Both participate in the vocational-educational program at Crooms, and both have regular contact with the CP clinic in Orlando.

All the CP literature and personnel take care to point out that, despite the handicaps CP can cause, it does not necessarily result in damage to intelligence.

A few minutes with either Wilma or Michael affirms that fact. While Wilma is shy and Michael aggressive, both are able to communicate their thoughts and needs.

But such abilities are not always recognized, even by attending physicians.

"Michael was a patient at Sunland in Gainesville before he came to us," says John Dinty, work-study coordinator for exceptional children at Crooms.

But Sunland was providing little, if anything, beyond institutionalized apathy for Michael, and one day, "his mother went and picked him up and brought him here to us, and said, 'I want him to go to school,'" Dinty remembers.

Dinty's program, which includes Michael, Wilma, two other CP victims and 120 other students, provides job training in a variety of areas for handicapped students.

"We have body repair, industrial arts, carpentry, painting, automobile repair, business education including use of bookbinding, printing and other electric equipment," Dinty points out with pride.

"We also have a complete institutional kitchen and the students have received two contracts in the past to provide hot meals to the elderly in Sanford. We hope to

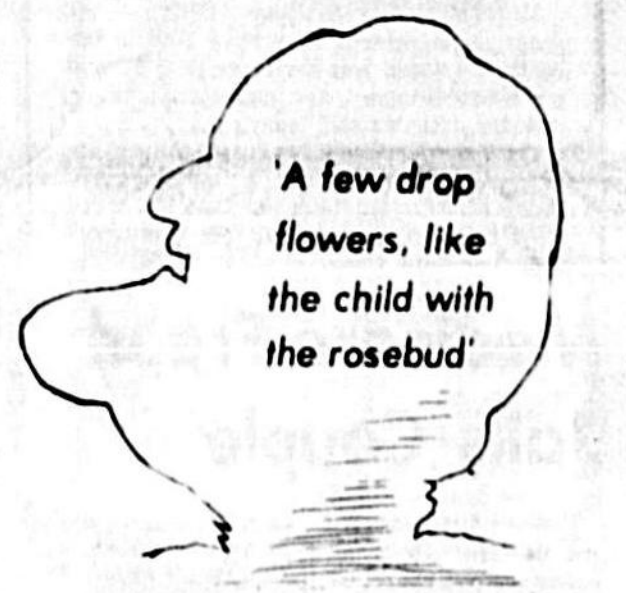
