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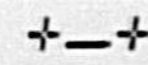

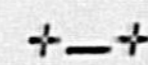

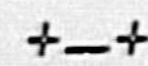

## Lake Mary Roadway Gets State Approval

Automotive traffic will have a straight shot on Lake Mary Boulevard from U.S. 17-92 to Lake Mary interchange at I-4 by the end of this fiscal year.

County Engineer William Bush said this morning that all plans are complete and approved by the State Department of Transportation for the construction of one-quarter mile of new highway in the heart of Lake Mary.

Bush said that all right-of-way has been acquired with the exception of two pieces, which have been promised gratis by the owners. Materials for the new street will cost approximately \$5,000.

Because of a sharp turn to cross the Seaboard Coastline Railroad, Bush said, crossing signals and gates will be required. There also will have to be some surface treatment in the crossing because one rail is higher than the other due to a curve.

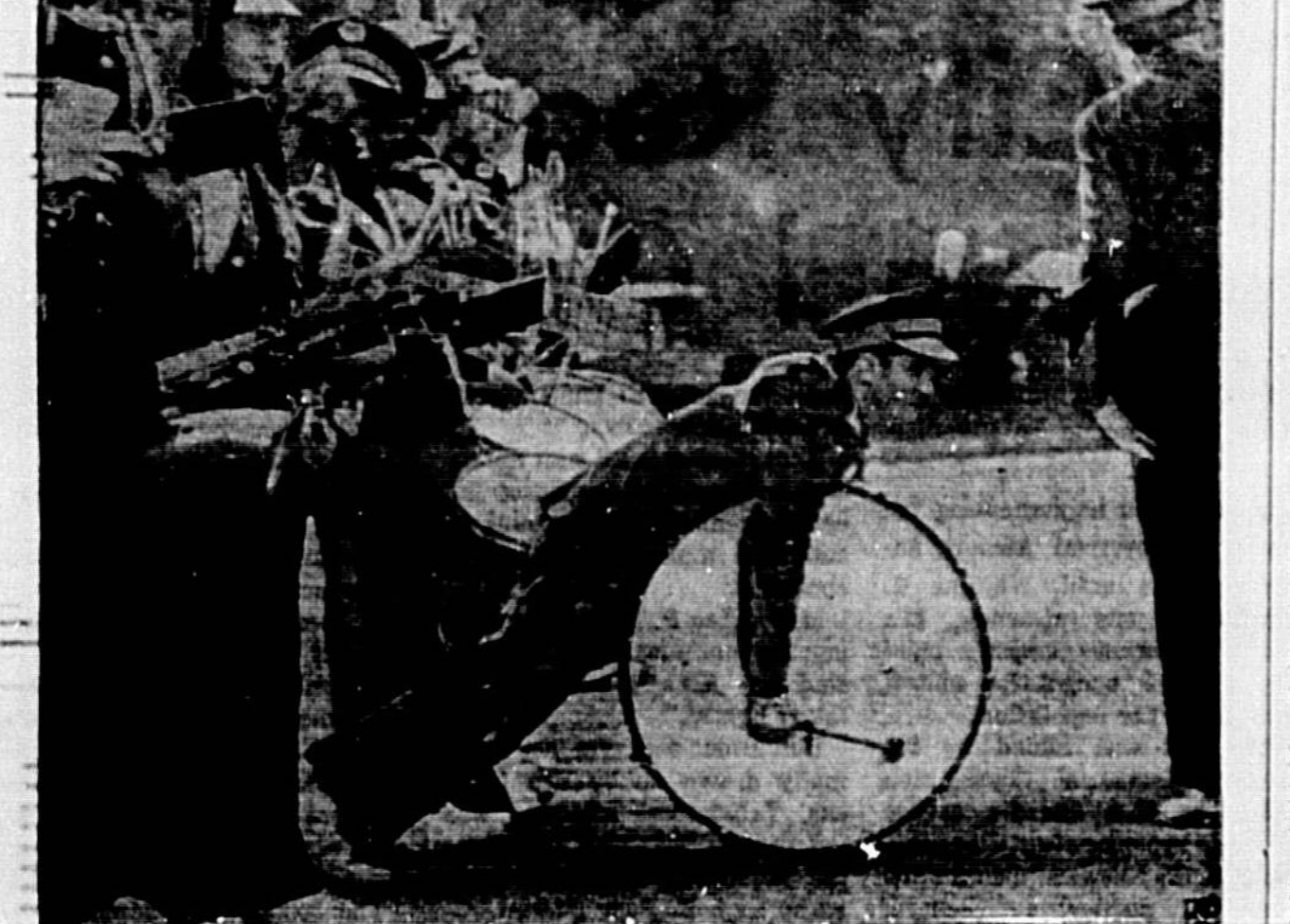

Railroads May OK Safety Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The railroad industry, under attack for an accident rate which has almost doubled in eight years, is expected to reluctantly endorse the Nixon administration's train safety bill.

The industry, labor unions and the administration, including Transportation Secretary John Volpe, were called to testify on rail safety during hearings today by a Senate Commerce subcommittee.

While the federal government can prescribe how a dangerous commodity shall be packaged for rail shipment, it cannot inspect the wheels or undercarriage of the car in which it is carried, or the rails and track over which it is carried.

And while greater amounts of dangerous commodities, including Vietnam-bound ammunition, volatile industrial chemicals and, until recently, surplus Army gas, move over the nation's railroads, more and more trains are jumping tracks with potentially disastrous consequences.

Part of the blame must be laid to decades-old rolling stock and rails forged at the turn of the century. In addition, labor unions charge the railroads with poor maintenance and failure to heed every existing safety law.

Allowing the industry to police itself — unlike such comparable industries as airlines and interstate truck lines — has produced questionable results.

## LBJ Men Still In Key Jobs

These men were professional. They developed ways to get around Civil Service regulations aimed at riveting bureaucrats in office.

The operation was carried out so swiftly that in the State Department a bitter fight developed over the employment of so many new top men without adequate security clearances and delicate affairs of government.

Art Calvert, regional director of the Florida Department of Agriculture, confirmed the snails were under control while Mrs. Parkhurst with a special plaque

Mrs. Parkhurst said she used to boil a bucketful of the foliage-eating snails every night, but said she seldom sees more than one a week now.

Calvert's men are continuing to saturate the area with poison pellets to kill the remainder of the large snails, which can grow to 10 inches.

The snail-fighter, originally from County Loughlin, Ireland, says she has been inundated with mail from do-it-yourself snail killers.

### Legislator Blasts Barge Canal

MIAMI (AP) — The Cross Florida Barge Canal has turned out to be "the villain in the case of the barge canal is like an octopus."

Rep. Gerald Lewis, D-Miami, Lewis is in favor of a move to halt construction on the \$160-million project being directed by the U.S. Corps of Engineers, according to an article in the upcoming issue of Florida & Tropical Sportsman Magazine.

The state legislator says degrading vegetation beneath the water in the 45 miles of already flooded river valley invites disease-carrying mosquitoes, which have caused the deaths of many people.

Lewis, who said \$45 million has been spent to complete one-fourth of the canal, added that the river was "fast moving and clear, flowing from its source in the lakes of and springs of Central Florida," before construction began on the canal.

"Now," he says, "the area is an open sewer. Lakes and rivers are supposed to be clear and open for boaters are now clogged with logs."

He blamed what he termed the "laxty in protecting the beauty of the area on poor planning, which extends from the Central Florida streams some 60 miles to the St. Johns River, south of Lake George.

"One of the tenacles is the Corps of Engineers and its blundering construction. Another tenacle is soil-eating politicians and still another is made up of special interests such as phosphate, transportation and paper industries," he said, adding, "Finally, there are the state agencies, which ignored the conservationists' warnings."

The Miami Democrat cited studies made by the late Dr. Cecil Hutto, of Orlando, who warned that the disease-causing amoeba, which he studied in the barge of the Orange County lakes, could also occur in the barge canal system.

The lawmaker proposed the creation of a committee of "nationally respected conservationists, to tell us where we are in danger, and to keep close watch on our national resources."

He said the Conservation Committee of the Florida House has consented to study the canal, and that all Floridians should fight to save the river valley.

## Cutback In Planned Reductions Orlando Radar Squadron End Due?

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Pentagon cutbacks may mean the end of an Orlando-based radar reconnaissance squadron about one day off in eight years at the United States virtually untested. Florida newspapers reported today.

Reports published by the Miami Herald said the 96th Airborne Early Warning and Control Squadron, with 750 men, would be deactivated at McCoy Air Force Base and large scale reductions would be made at other bases in Florida.

The Defense Department was expected to announce details of the cutbacks in Washington Wednesday. The Pentagon said Monday it planned reductions at

307 domestic and foreign bases. In a dispatch from Washington, the Herald said congressional sources indicated two fighter squadrons involving about 1,000 men would be cut from Homestead AFB and that 500 civilians at Pensacola's naval air station and 600 civilians at the Jacksonville air station would be released.

Lower cuts were expected, the newspaper said, at Patrick and Tyndal Air Force bases, at naval air facilities in Key West.

## Apollo Units Unhurt By Strike

## State News

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The Legislature may be forced to raise taxes if the voters don't approve a bonding authority amendment on Nov. 6, Regent Pat Dodson of Pensacola said Monday.

The amendment, only state-wide issue on the ballot, would restore bonding authority left out of the 1968 Constitution. Education officials estimated they would raise \$80 million by 1978 to finance higher education construction if the amendment passes.

"If this amendment doesn't pass the Legislature may have to raise taxes," Dodson said.

He said the money, which will come from utilities tax revenue will go to the state regardless of the outcome of the election, but only a "yes" vote would insure that it goes to higher education.

Dodson and Education Commissioner Floyd Christian urged voters to support the bonding amendment.

"It's imperative that this school bond issue pass," Christian said.

He said the state's entire \$443 million six-year education program would be jeopardized by failure to pass the bond issue.

## Constitution Change Supported By Regent

Only \$80 million of the construction needs would come from the bond issues, but Christian said it would pave the way for the rest of the money to come from other sources.

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## Wekiva River Set For Scenic System

The Wekiva River will be included in a study of Florida rivers for incorporation into an overall state scenic river system, it was reported here this morning by two representatives of the State Department of Natural Resources, Lonnie Ryder and William Beckham, of Tallahassee.

Ryder and Beckham met with the projects development and waterways committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

The long range planning committee of Seminole County (appointed by the Seminole County Commission) also has recommended that the Wekiva River be included in the scenic system when and if the Little Ecochlorate River is re-routed from the "Big Eco" to carry Winter Park effluent into Lake Jessup, helping to eliminate pollution in the "Big Eco."

"The Wekiva River is one of the most beautiful in the nation," said John Kidder, Chamber manager, who said he believes that the state should have control over the development of the river insofar as it is necessary to preserve its beauty. The goal is control of development to preserve the natural beauty of the river and to eliminate pollution.

A study will be made by the state department in the near future and the Wekiva will be included in the preliminary study, Ryder said.

Organizational meeting for the study will be held in mid-November. Next step will be to set up priorities and begin the actual studies.

Twenty-eight rivers in the state have been proposed for the study by the Audubon Society.

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## Education Aid Urged

Florida's institutions of higher learning will be faced with finding new state money for construction purposes if voters veto the proposed amendment to the Florida Constitution on Tuesday's election ballot.

This was discussed during yesterday's luncheon meeting of area educational leaders at Seminole Chamber of Commerce offices.

Dr. Earl Weldon, president of Seminole Junior College and George King, executive assistant to Florida Tech president, joined SJC trustees and Seminole County vocational and educational leaders in stressing the importance of voters understanding and approving the amendment which will restore authority to issue bonds until June 30, 1975 for construction of college and vocational school facilities.

Dr. Weldon said the educational crisis is brought about because of the expanding population that will see the doubling of college enrollments in just a few years.

"If the amendment to allow bonds is passed by the voters, then there will be no additional taxes," he stated.

Weldon said there seemed to be no opposition to the amendment, but voter apathy might cause a problem.

"At 6.5 per cent interest, \$160 million for college and vocational school construction will be available for use with the amendment," he said. Weldon said he felt \$1 million of that amount would be available for SJC.

King, succeeding Weldon, outlined the projected FTU growth and advised the nearby college will be as large as the University of Florida in seven years.

"After voter approval of the amendment, 1 1/2 years, legislators must still pass implementation act to divide up the funds among the colleges," he advised.

He foresaw \$30.6 million for FTU construction by 1974 and declared, "I would hate like hell to have to tell SJC students we have no room for them at FTU."

The new constitution adopted last year prohibits issuance of new bonds after June 30, 1969 and the public is being asked to restore bonding right at Tuesday's polls, he concluded.

## Angel Supports State Order

### Teacher Work 'Jazz' Blasted

School Supt. John Angel today said he had not been approached by any county teacher threatening to leave the profession because of the "behavioral objectives" they are required to write in addition to regular teaching chores.

The superintendent said any teacher who is concerned is not content to become static and understands that the work is necessary.

Dean Bryant, School Board member, took issue with Angel over the objectives and the time teachers are required to devote to the concepts during last Thursday night's board meeting at Lyman High School.

Mrs. Bryant objected to the "straddling of teachers with behavioral objectives" and said teachers were being driven to other occupations because of the time they spend writing the concepts.

The board member said she wanted teachers in the classrooms with children and not involved in useless paper work.

Angel admitted today "it is a lot of work and all county teachers and principals are involved in one way or another."

Angel commented the work is required by the state to evaluate the teaching methods and determine the level that students should reach in regard to any subject.

The superintendent said a state Sept. 15 deadline for the objectives has been extended to 1972 but schools must submit a progress report by Jan. 1, 1970.

"The main problem of our schools is the improvement of the instructional program in curriculum and teaching skills," he added.

Regarding the contention by a Pine Crest teacher aide that a shortage of textbooks exists in the schools, Angel commented that the county's situation with textbooks is the same today as it has been for the past two or three years.

He said that a textbook is not the only tool used by teachers in class and noted it is but one of several being, including film strips, that is available for teaching a given subject.

The superintendent said another teacher would be placed at Pine Crest School since the board last week voted to keep a West Side teacher in her classroom rather than adhere to administration requests to move her.

## Airport Zoning Studied

Proposed zoning of Sanford Airport will be considered Thursday by the Sanford Zoning and Planning Commission at 8 p. m.

The airport zoning is required under the long range plan submitted by J. S. (Red) Cleveland, airport manager, to the Federal Aviation Agency (FAA), shortly after the 1,500-acre former Navy base was released to the city by the General Services Administration (GSA).

At first it was thought that a special zoning board composed of members of both city and county zoning boards would be formed to supervise the zoning problems at the airport but various members of both boards expressed belief that zoning of the facility could be handled by the individual boards.

Other agenda items expected to be considered Thursday include:

Appointment to fill two vacancies left by resignations of Philip Logan and John Daniels.

Consideration of a request made to the City Commission through the Scenic Improvement Board for a review of present M-1 zoning of the area from French Avenue to Mangostine Avenue, north of First Street for the possibility of making it into a C-2 commercial zone. (This is in keeping with the proposed Lake Monroe Park development as proposed to the county by the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Joint Planning Council.)

Consideration of appointing or assigning a member of the city zoning board to attend meetings of the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Planning Commission or appointment of a city zoning member to the tri-county policy making board.

Development of all of the human resources in our county was seen as the basic need of our community by Rev. Ann Jones, executive director, Seminole County Action, Inc. Educational pressures in the '70s will force a wide enlargement of educational facilities and a new program in both the building and teaching fields according to Mrs. Jean Bryant, member of the Seminole County School Board.

When Dr. Frank Leone, director of the Seminole County Health Department, took his four-minute spot he put mental health needs in the spotlight and cited statistics at some length to drive home the seriousness of this challenge.

George Touhy, president of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, took a hard look at the county and prescribed an end of division and a drive towards unity as the way in which the coming decade can best be encountered.

Duane Harrell, chief deputy, Seminole County Sheriff's Department, spoke from hard experience and warned of the two threats to the county from organized crime and the use of drugs.

Stafford Derby, editor of the editorial page of The Sanford Herald, saw the challenge of the '70s best countered by an informed public and advised careful reading of all news and personal involvement of all voters in attending commission meetings and letting their views be known.

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
