Teenager takes reckless joy ride

A 15-year-old girl, too young to drive, went on a joy ride Wednesday that ended with a deputy throwing out stop sticks to disable the car and another officer using a taser to subdue the resisting teenager.

Linda Pearson, of 2450 Broadway St., located in the Midway community east of Sanford, allegedly took the vehicle without permission from her older sister, who was at work at the time.

As a Seminole County Sheriff's Office deputy filed a report of the stolen white Mitsubishi Galant at about 6:30 p.m., Sanford police radioed in a similarly described vehicle refusing to stop on Mellonville Avenue. According to the arrest report, Sanford authorities ended pursuit of the car due to the suspect's reckless driving. About two minutes later, another Sanford officer located the vehicle in the area of 27th Street near State Road 600, and was able to verify it was the stolen car in question.

With the assistance of a sheriff's office helicopter, officers on the ground were able to keep track of the movement of the vehicle without directly following it. Sheriff's office Sgt. Randy Garrett stationed himself near the intersection of Celery and Mellonville avenues, as the car with no headlights on approached him, driving east-bound on Celery.

He deployed his stop sticks — a plastic bar an officer can throw across a traffic lane that contains Teflon-coated quills which break off to puncture tires slowly — hitting both passenger side tires. The car came to a halt near Summerlin Avenue at Montezuma Drive. Pearson, however, fled on foot until a Sanford officer was able to cut her off and deploy his taser — a battery-powered gun that can administer a charge of up to 50,000 volts from as far as 20 feet away, which allows an officer to subdue a suspect without using physical force.

She was charged with grand theft auto and was transported to the county juvenile assessment center.

Fire training facility draws criticism

County commissioners are scheduled to decide Tuesday if they will approve a \$2.4 million expenditure for the fire department to purchase an existing industrial site for a Fire/Rescue Emergency Training Center.

However, a sticking point for some may be a new contention voiced by the Natural Lands Committee that it's improper to put a 'business' in an area the county is actively trying to preserve. The 19-acre property is ideal for the fire department, according to public

safety officials, as it is centrally located in the county at 201 Valentine Way — near the Environmental Studies Center on State Road 419. It's that proximity to the environmental center that makes some Natural Lands Committee members balk at the idea of the training facility. In addition, it is almost totally surrounded by properties purchased to create a green belt in the Spring Hammock Preserve near Soldier's

Creek. The committee voted Monday in favor of recommending to county commissioners that they have the opportunity to purchase the land to preserve.

Beginning its 30th year of service, the county fire department is the second largest in Central Florida — after recently taking over the Altamonte Springs department — but it often travels to Daytona Beach, Lake County or Tampa to train. User fees are charged at these

training sites to pay for a portion of the building upkeep and operational costs, and local fire officials plan to do the same at the proposed Seminole County training facility.

"For the county on one hand to say we believe in the conservation of these natural lands, which they've done for 20 years now by continually buying in that area, and on the other hand we're going to create a business in the middle of it, that doesn't make sense," said Bob Goff, a Natural Lands Committee member.

Iraqi Diary: Shoulder problems

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

Some readers may be wondering about a suicide bomb that destroyed an Iraqi police station on Oct. 8. According to Sgt.

Carlson's father, the station was one Charlie III worked at.

"C3 missed the bombing by minutes," Carlson II wrote in an e-mail. "His patrol was due to drop off some weapons at the station that was bombed; however, on the way they stopped to eat breakfast at regimental headquarters."

"While eating, the suicide bomber hit the Al Jamilla Police Station in northeast Baghdad in the part called Saddam City. C3's patrol immediately responded along with elements from the 2nd Cavalry. C3's patrol was the first U.S. unit at the scene and found the top body half and head of the bomber which was used for identification. He reports that 24 were injured and 10 killed but as of this report, has noted no American soldier casualties.

"The bomb crater is about 10 to 12 feet across. He says the area is crawling with media and was very congested upon his arrival. His report is still coming in each time he gets a break to e-mail.

"He missed being at the station by about a half hour."

Seminole schools superintendent outlines future path

Seminole County School Board Superintendent Dr. Bill Vogel discussed the future of the county's education system Friday during a First 100 Days Reception in honor of his first days on the job.

Vogel, who beat out 44 other candidates, was hired in July to lead Seminole County Public Schools after Superintendent Paul J. Hagerly's retirement. Vogel is a former superintendent of St. Lucie County School District, and was highly recommended by school officials in that area.

"I'm overwhelmed by the turnout here this morning," said Vogel, who attended the breakfast with his wife, Bobbi. "This [being named Seminole County superintendent] has been a wonderful experience

and I'm enjoying it every day. I see today as an opportunity to say thank you for the warm welcome.

"It has been a smooth transition," added Vogel, who has been visible in the community since his arrival in July, visiting nearly all of the 55 district schools at least once.

Attendees of the celebration were treated to a buffet-style breakfast, complete with place mats designed by elementary school art students from throughout Seminole County.

The presentation of colors was conducted by the Winter Springs JROTC, while the national anthem was sung by Eric Furbish, Matt Habib and Joseph Hong, all of Winter Springs High School. Lyman High School Future Farmers of America contributed to

Meals on Wheels rolls to temporary home

LAKE MARY — When the Seminole County branch of Meals on Wheels, Etc., became homeless last month, Heritage Woods of Lake Mary came to the organization's rescue.

The need for a temporary location became apparent to Meals on Wheels executives when the Florida Hospital building they were leasing in Lake Mary was sold. In order to continue uninterrupted service to its customers, a temporary location was needed until a permanent site could be constructed.

"They [senior residents of

Heritage Woods at Lake Mary] are thrilled to be opening their home to a program that also serves seniors," said Samantha Hollister, executive director of Heritage Woods at Lake Mary, an assisted living facility for senior citizens located at 150 Middle St. in Lake Mary. "Our goal is to be integrated into Lake Mary and all of Seminole County. This is just another way to reach out and help seniors in our area."

Meals on Wheels, which distributes 700 meals daily to Seminole County residents, has been located in Lake Mary for nearly a decade. The group was able to make

Mother charged in son's death

Authorities contend a Winter Springs mother of two children failed as a nurturer — a mistake that could cost her freedom.

Brenda Adair was arrested by Winter Springs police Tuesday afternoon on the charge of aggravated manslaughter of a child. The child was her 15-year-old son, Jerry. He died July 12, 2002. Exactly one week after his 10-year-old brother, Terry, died of

the same reported cause, a drug overdose.

According to an arrest report, released by the State Attorney's Office 18th Judicial Circuit, Jerry had numerous narcotics in his system at the time of his death, including oxycodone and methadone. These two strong opioids are used to treat patients suffering from serious conditions such as chronic pain, terminal cancer and heroin addiction. Adair suffered from chronic headaches and was seeing two doctors at the time of the investigation and oxycodone and methadone, according to authorities, were prescribed to her.

Two prescription bottles of pills were found in Jerry's pockets when he died — one had his mother's name on it and the other had the name etched off. A bottle of pills was also found in Terry's pocket when he died.

In fact, investigators found bottles of prescriptions scattered throughout the Winter Springs apartment — some in plain view they reported. Several were found in the upstairs, which authorities labeled in the report as not fit for living conditions as there was no usable furniture and a stale smell.

"The family room (downstairs) appeared to be the main room in the house," wrote Detective Matthew Tracht in the report. "Located in the family room was a bed, TV and dresser drawers. This gave me the opinion that most of the time spent inside the house was in this room. This is the room where both boys were found dead."

Girl offers assailant money to stop attack

Quick thinking by a 13-year-old girl may have saved her life. According to Oviedo police, the girl reported Thursday morning to her Jackson Heights Middle School School Resource Officer that she had been a victim of a physical attack as she walked to school.

According to the victim, she was walking to school along Franklin Street when Shawn Corey Scipio, 25, of 469 E. Franklin St., Oviedo, allegedly called out to her asking if she needed a ride. When she said no and continued walking, the man ran up to her, grabbed her around the neck and pulled her into his home.

She reportedly tried to escape, but the 5-foot tall, 300-pound man controlled her when she tried to pull away. He allegedly forced her onto a bed, but when she screamed he slapped her with an open hand, but did not continue his efforts to abuse her. The girl told him she had money and that he could have it.

The suspect took her \$28 and released her without causing any further abuse, but threatened that he knew where she lived and would harm everyone. Oviedo authorities arrested Scipio and charged him with kidnapping, false imprisonment, attempted sexual battery and strong arm robbery.

Oviedo firefighter 1 of 4 remembered at service

The State Fire Marshal's Office and the Florida Joint Council of Fire and Emergency Service Organizations will be hosting the 12th annual Florida Fallen Firefighter Memorial Service on Saturday, Oct. 11.

The service is to remember and celebrate the lives of Florida firefighters who have died while serving and protecting the communities. The memorial service will be held at the Florida State Fire College in Ocala and begins at 8:30 a.m.

The service will honor four firefighters who died last year in the line of duty. They are Dallas Begg and Lt. John Mickel of Osceola County Fire-Rescue, who died while participating in a live-fire training exercise on July 30; Rupert Fuller of Darlington-Gaskin Fire Department, who died following operations at a fire scene on Oct. 20; and Shane Kelly of the city of Oviedo Fire Department, who died while assisting at the scene of a vehicle accident on June 8.

Each family of the firefighters will be presented with a memorial medallion and a state flag that has flown over the Florida Fallen Firefighter Memorial, located on the grounds of the fire college. Also remembered at the service, fallen firefighter Robert Padgett of the Clay County Department of Public Safety who died Oct. 5, 1988. His family will be awarded a memorial medallion.

Their names will be added to a Florida Fallen Firefighter Memorial that includes the names of firefighters who died while on duty as far back as 1885.

The memorial ends Florida's activities in this year's National Fire Prevention Week.

the transition to its temporary location without a break in service.

"We're settled in and it's working out just fine," said Sherry Fincher, executive director of Meals on Wheels. Etc. "We're very grateful to the staff and residents of Heritage Woods."

According to Fincher, when searching for a temporary location the most important aspect to consider was the kitchen since the organization now produces and packages all of its breakfast and lunch meals under the direction of Executive Chef Richard Bartlett. Heritage Woods' full-size kitchen was a perfect match for Meals on Wheels' needs.

"Since we started cooking and packaging our own meals it has been so much better," said Fincher. "The meals are appetizing and the clients love it."

The organization is currently working with a limited equipment base, bringing only the packaging equip-

ment to the temporary location and leaving the remainder of equipment in a local storage facility.

The groundbreaking ceremony for the Meals on Wheels permanent location is scheduled for Nov. 6. However, the organization will remain at Heritage Woods until January when its 35 employees will relocate to the new building just off U.S. Highway 17-92 on Ronald Regan Boulevard in unincorporated Seminole County.

Meals on Wheels' administrative offices are temporarily located in a Florida Hospital office building in Altamonte Springs, but will also relocate to the new building in Lake Mary.

According to Fincher, when making a decision on a permanent office and production site, the organization took into consideration the convenience and accessibility of the location.

"Lake Mary is a great central location for us," she said.

"This room was cleaner than the other rooms upstairs," he continued. "However, the room had rodent droppings and the stale smell as well, and at one point, a rat was seen running around."

According to the report, it's the neglect of Jerry's well being and Adair's inability to provide adequate supervision that led to his death. She is not being charged in the death of her other son.

"The issue will be was she criminally negligent," said Assistant State Attorney Chris White.

During police interviews, Adair stated to investigators that she was careful to keep her strong pain medications secure by either giving them to a next door neighbor or a friend from Apopka to hold. However, both denied ever holding Adair's prescribed narcotics.

"These powerful lies that came from Brenda are consistent with a mother that does not provide adequate care and nourishment for her children," Tracht wrote. "Brenda's neglect in care and lack of adult supervision is a contributing factor in the death of Terry and Jerry Adair. If proper custody and control of these narcotics by Brenda happened, these deaths might not have happened."

Adair was released on a \$7,000 bond shortly after her 3 p.m. booking into the Seminole County Jail Tuesday. She is scheduled to appear in court Oct. 27. If convicted of the first degree felony, she could receive up to a 30-year sentence.

Carlson II added. "He was real, real, real lucky this time. He says this was one MRE breakfast he won't complain about."

18 Sept. 2003 My arm is still giving me problems. Mostly my shoulder hurts, and now I've got sciatic pain, so they keep me loaded up on 800 mg of Motrin. My shoulder has a "rotator cuff problem," whatever that is. All I know is that it hurts pretty bad at times. Sometimes I feel like a one-armed warrior with a limp, or like a plow horse trying to pull a plow until I can't pull anymore. Then I numb-up on more Motrin.

At least I have an arm to hurt, which is more than some soldiers have who lost theirs. I think the lack of regular meals has taken a toll on a lot of us. Ninety percent of my meals for six months have been MREs or T-rations,

which I compare closely to eating unheated stew out of a can. Months on limited water in extreme heat has not helped the situation. Add that to the effects of combat stress, lack of sleep, and seven days of work a week and it is no wonder so many soldiers have contracted mysterious illnesses in this country. Their immune systems are shot. I hope the Veteran's Administration has a big budget because they are going to need it for years to come to take care of everybody.

Last week we heard that we were going to be redeployed to the states Dec. 7. They even said it was written in stone this time and was official. Well, I didn't get my hopes up, but it did sound real this time. Then today we heard that we are back to the March date, or even April of next year. I heard through the

grapevine that they could not find a replacement outfit for us. Just one more case of getting our hopes up, and then jerking the rug out from under us.

There is a Florida National Guard outfit in Baghdad somewhere, I think they are from Orlando. I should say they were a Florida National Guard outfit because they are regular army now and putting up with the same mess as us.

I would like to see some green foliage, but I would gladly trade that for some real food. I'm thinking about buying a portable generator so we can have lights. The electricity has been off for sometime now in our living area. Tonight, I repaired the lieutenant's laptop computer in 45 minutes in the light of my little battery powered lantern.

We have a BMW here that

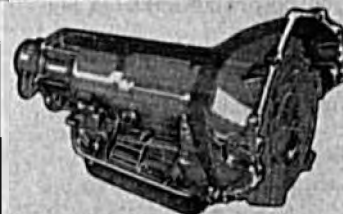
our platoon confiscated. It was wired to be used as a car bomb when we found it. It is now parked outside our living area. Sgt. Coe and SPC Johnson wanted to drive it to what we call the "Hilton," one of the palace compounds where we go for certain things like using a computer if ours is down. They were told they could not use the BMW, and they looked like two rejected teenagers whose father just took the keys away.

19 Sept. 2003 I was the tower SOG [Sgt. of the guard] last night and heard a loud explosion in the direction of an area that we don't cover. We currently are out of the police stations monitoring Zone 21 in Saddam City. My tower guard called me and said that he also heard the explosion but did not see anything. Later in the day, I learned there was a big

explosion in central Baghdad near the Tigris River that left a huge crater. I understand that it was a probably a car bomb that went off prematurely before they could reach their target. I don't know if that is what we heard last night or not.

Anyway that is one car bomb that we don't have to worry about. Well, actually two since we confiscated that BMW. Now we just have to worry about where the next one is. It could be any one of thousands of vehicles in this big city.

The Fighting Lady

Pride prominent aboard ship

As mentioned last weekend, my wife and I have recently returned from a lengthy camping trip in the Eastern portion of the country. Among our many stops was Charleston, S. C., where, as in most cases, we played "tourist."

An excursion in Charleston I will long remember is a visit to the now mothballed aircraft carrier USS Yorktown, CV-10, known as the Fighting Lady. The ship, decommissioned almost 20 years ago, sits in Charleston Harbor. Like the aircraft now sitting on display in honor of the U.S. Navy at the entrance to the Orlando-Sanford International Airport, the Yorktown was put in place through private donations. Not only citizens of that city, but former Navy and Marine Corps personnel who were stationed aboard the Fighting Lady donated and still donate to the ship's upkeep and maintenance.

It cost a few bucks to tour the ship, but was worth every penny. On the carrier deck, as well as up on the flight deck, were rebuilt aircraft, the type of which were used on the ship during World War II. With each was a list of the squadron they flew for as well as a listing of all the squadron personnel who gave their lives, through wartime activities or accidents aboard ship.

Not counting the flying personnel, the ship itself was home to approximately 3,000 service personnel at any one time.

Depending on which area of the ship one inspected, you could travel from well below deck to the control tower. Everything has been very well restored. In addition to the military aspects of the ship, we saw the dentist chairs, where the personnel ate, where the food was cooked or baked, recreation rooms with the traditional acey ducy positions, and much more. Being a former Navy man, I was extremely pleased to have this opportunity, not having been stationed aboard any particular ship. I enjoyed the aircraft display, especially the Corsair (which was my favorite WW II plane). There were demonstrations as well where one could reenact the recovery of a space shuttle near the last years of the ship. You could sit in one of the planes and have your photo taken with the others. Included in the hangar deck is the Aviation National Memorial Hall of Fame, which will bring remembrance to any veteran of WW II, and, if they are like me, bring a feeling of pride for the accomplishments, not only of the Yorktown, but all personnel of the U.S. Navy and Marines.

The next time I return to Charleston, I'll be taking another tour of this great ship. Perhaps several tours over the years to come. It was well worth it — and I highly recommend all former service personnel especially those who served on board her, as well as their families and others, to pay the Fighting Lady a visit.

End of U.S. empire?

I was booted by some in an audience in Sarasota, Fla., last March for saying that history might judge the invasion of Iraq as the beginning of the end of

American empire. But, for better or worse, that is what is happening: We are pouring out our power, credibility, good intentions and blood into the sands of Arabia.

The embarrassment (or humiliation) of Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld this week is the noisy echo of the quiet desperation in the White House about what to try next in our domination and occupation of a country farther away than we thought. After taking down Secretary of State Colin Powell for arguing that the job was tougher than it looked, and taking down the military for saying more troops were needed to occupy, President Bush is taking down Rumsfeld for his arrogant unilateralism within the administration. Now it is Condoleezza Rice's turn. The torch, burning nearer to our fingers, has been passed to the national security adviser, the new boss of the new Iraq Stabilization Group. How did it come to this? History may find other reasons, but so far some of our mistakes are obvious:

- We misjudged the terrain. I don't mean the geography. We ignored the history of Iraq and its neighbors. We ignored the history of Arab and Kurdish nationalism, Sunni and Shiite Islam, and British and Turkish colonialism there.
- We misjudged our own military strength and capabilities. It is beyond belief now that Rumsfeld and others believed, or at least said, that the United States could fight three wars like this at the same time. It is astounding that after a spectacular military victory, American military credibility has been diminished because the whole world knows we are not about to fight on the ground again unless we are directly attacked.
- We misunderstood our enemies. We still think Iraqis want to be Americans, when they only want to be Iraqis with more freedom and better prospects.
- We misunderstood our friends. We wrote off "Old Europe" — silly, but fine — then believed Turkey and Israel could resist the temptation to use our sacrifice to further their own interests and agendas.

- We bribed the wrong people. Our money can be a clean weapon used to do dirty things — in the right hands. But as we should have learned in the Iran-contra scandals and a hundred others, the most critical intelligence is the weeding out of the exiled hustlers and thieves waiting at every world border.
- We misjudged the United Nations. Mocking the U.N. for two decades and more, we have helped create a body that can be mobilized as a temporary superpower to thwart the world's only superpower.

Those are mistakes that the nation must share. Yes, there were people who understood the misunderstandings, but they were too few or too timid to make a difference — they could not muster the strength and will to, in William F. Buckley's phrase, stand athwart history yelling "Stop!"

Then there are the mistakes of the president and the others we hired to represent us and run the country. These are things that went wrong at the heart of power in Washington:

- The president misunderstood and misinformed Congress. Declarations and all that take time, patience and verifiable information, and the Bush White House was in a rush to war. Now Congress will come back to bite him.
- Congress misunderstood the president and evaded its constitutional duty. The cowards on a hill chose to believe what could not be shown in the hope they could escape responsibility and blame.

- The president did not know what was needed to win (or maintain) the peace. No matter how many troops we deploy, we cannot control the terrain if those men and women lack the necessary intelligence, policing and linguistic skills. We need, for instance, our own Arabic speakers, rather than depending on the kindness of strangers.
- We, the people, were not told the truth. Another truth is this: If the American people knew then what they know now — information that was available then — there would not be Americans out there being shot at by people they don't know or understand.

That last is the real lesson, not of Iraq, but of America. For this wonderful thing we have to work, we have to trust our leaders, particularly the elected elite. And for us to trust them, they have to trust us to deal with real truth.

To the editor: To those who have written negative opinions of my letters and account of events of my time here in Baghdad, Iraq, always remember that I, just like all the other soldiers here, have earned the right to complain. I will gladly trade places with anyone back home who don't like the fact that I complain too much. It is almost a G.I. tradition. We live with the bare basics, and when it comes down to becoming ecstatic over a meal that is not an MRE or T-ration or having enough drinking water, there is a good reason to be ecstatic. You take the luxuries of home for granted, but I can tell you what it is like being here without such daily luxuries.

I have not seen my wife and kids in nearly a year. So anyone who doesn't like my "complaining" just remember this, you get to see your families on a daily basis and have no idea what it is like being in Iraq without even knowing if you will ever see them again or when, or even if, you will ever go home alive. Your time at your workplace ends each day, your lives are not at great risk, and you are pretty much guaranteed of your trip home to eat supper each day. We have no guarantees of such things. Put yourselves in my boots, or any soldier's boots who is over there, and see what life is really like.

Being a veteran of several wars, I have probably racked-up more combat-time than my critics will ever experience in a lifetime. But isn't it strange that those who criticize the "Iraqi Diary" make no comment in regard to dozens of us who are killed or wounded each week over here.

As you can see I'm not anonymous, I do not hide to

write my letters, and have willingly signed this response because expressing opinions and observations is one guarantee that we all have, and it is protected by the U.S. Constitution. The last time I checked, we still live in a democracy, and that is why you can read *The Seminole Herald*, pro or con, without fear of censorship.

To all those who have expressed appreciation and interest in my accounts of war-life, and to Dan Ping of *The Seminole Herald*, I send a big thank you. I do it for you because you have a right to know my observations of how things are over here.

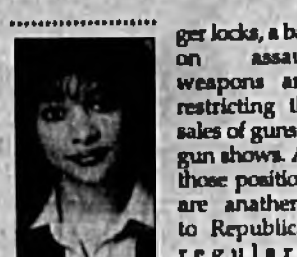

Arnold's win sends mixed news to GOP

Claiming that Arnold Schwarzenegger's broad appeal gives a fresh edge to the GOP, Republican politicians across the country are celebrating the action hero's strong win in California. The state is a Democratic stronghold, but Schwarzenegger drew many Democratic voters — including substantial numbers of Latinos — into his muscular fold. These days, the GOP needs a little good news. President Bush's poll ratings are sinking like a stone as voters gripe about the jobless recovery and recoil at the \$87 billion bill the president has submitted for Iraq. Then there's that pesky investigation of a serious national security leak, which points to high-ranking administration officials.

Given the GOP's relief over the California victory, I'm a little reluctant to point out that they poured the champagne too soon. But here it is: Schwarzenegger's win means little to the Republican Party. Under that taut skin, the Terminator is a moderate Democrat. He supports abortion rights; he backs domestic partnerships for gay couples; he supports several gun control measures, including trig-

ger locks, a ban on assault weapons and restricting the sales of guns at gun shows. All those positions are anathema to Republican regulars, whose party has shifted to the far right during the past two decades. (Republicans might also reconsider their glee over the economic crisis that fueled the recall of Gray Davis, who was unlucky enough to preside over both the California energy crisis and the dot-com bust. The state's gaping budget hole — somewhere between \$8 billion and \$20 billion — awaits the new "governor," who will find it very difficult to mend.)

Had the actor chosen to run in a regular election, he would not have received the Republican nomination. His politics are too liberal for the voters who regularly participate in GOP primaries. Indeed, Davis might have been defeated for re-election last

year had he been challenged by a moderate Republican — say, former Los Angeles Mayor Richard Riordan. But Riordan lost in the GOP primary to the steadfastly conservative Bill Simon Jr.

Schwarzenegger has drawn the fire of hard-core conservatives. Rush Limbaugh criticized him in a posting on his Web site: "I know that (R) next to Schwarzenegger's name excites the White House, but his own words prove he's not a conservative." (Limbaugh later gave Schwarzenegger grudging approval.)

Commentator George Neumayr, writing in the conservative opinion journal *The American Spectator*, described Schwarzenegger as a "middle-of-the-road Democrat." And conservative columnist George Will recently fulminated: "These Schwarzenegger conservatives — now there is an oxymoron for these times — have embraced a man who is, politically, Hollywood's culture leavened by a few paragraphs of Milton Friedman."

The recall was tailor-made for Schwarzenegger because it allowed him to leap-frog the tra-

ditional process of a party primary and appeal directly to the general electorate, which is always more moderate than the extremes of either the Republican or Democratic Party. And the short campaign season allowed him to make maximum use of his celebrity — his greatest asset. Not only did he skip over a party primary, but he also ignored the traditional media, going through celebrity talk-show hosts such as Jay Leno and Oprah Winfrey. Very few candidates, conservative or liberal, could pull that off.

The nation remains deadlocked by a bitter culture war that was papered over, but hardly resolved, by the terrorist attacks of 9/11. And California remains among the states that the Democratic nominee can count on in next year's presidential election. Schwarzenegger's "Total Recall" doesn't change that.

"The visual change is remarkable. The new market and landscaping transform what was previously a very stark, and unappealing space into a green space where the community can meet, relax and enjoy the pleasures of the farmers' market and purchase fresh Florida produce," said Don Coker, bureau chief, FDACS.

the festivities by donating foliage centerpieces.

During the celebration, Vogel also presented attendees, which included business leaders, elected officials and school board officials, with a first annual State of the Seminole County Public Schools Address. The speech was designed to inform the public on the status of Seminole County schools and what to expect in the future.

One of the main focuses of the morning was the growth of Seminole County's education system. According to Vogel, in the past 10 years more than \$450 million have been spent in renovations and new buildings. In addition to the new schools outlined in the school board's 10-year plan, nine more elementary schools, two more middle schools and one more high school will be needed. The additional funding is estimated at \$170 million.

"Growth needs are being met, with several new schools being planned and others being remodeled," said Vogel, who began his career as a teacher and has worked as a school-based and district level administrator.

In the same vein as overcrowded schools, Seminole County, like other districts throughout Florida, are concerned about class size. In an effort to reduce the student-teacher ratio, the district hired 199 new teachers this year.

To date, Seminole County schools have already met the 2010 standards with an average of 19.5 elementary-aged students, 21.6 middle school students and 22.9 high school students to every one teacher.

According to school officials, these smaller class sizes contributed to the recent rise in test scores. According to reports, 75 percent of Seminole County schools received an 'A' rating on the FCAT, while 21 percent and 4 percent were 'B' and 'C' schools, respectively. Seminole County did not have any schools ranked in the 'D' or 'F' categories. This also contributes to Seminole County being home to 33 five-star schools.

Vogel believes, in order to meet upcoming challenges, schools must focus on students

and the work given to them, keeping an open outlook to the future, maintaining a results-oriented direction and thinking and planning strategically.

"Our work is unfinished and to guarantee every student achieves is a continuous process," said Vogel, who received the Medallion of Excellence from Senator Ken Pruitt. "The success of Seminole County Public Schools didn't happen overnight. It began 10 years ago with a new mission statement. High expectations were not only talked about, but implemented.

"The accomplishments of Seminole County Public Schools are remarkable," he added.

Vogel has a proven record which includes accreditations such as Florida's Superintendent of the Year Award in 2001 and the Lamp of Knowledge Award from the Florida Association of School Administrators in 2002.

A graduate of Rollins College in Winter Park, he earned his specialist and doctorate degrees from Florida Atlantic University and continues learning through professional organizations that include the Bell South Superintendents Network and the Urban Superintendents Association of America.

The Natural Lands Committee has, in the past, tried to purchase a portion of the property when it was a working industrial site.

"There's a high-tech building on the site that was the David M. Company, and then there is a large portion of the property that is undeveloped and wooded," said Colleen Rotella, Seminole County community resources manager. "That is what we tried to buy in the past. We don't buy large facilities like that. We tried to buy the undeveloped portion of the property."

With the purchase of the property that includes an existing structure, the county fire department hopes to save about \$38,000 worth of storage space. Fire officials estimate by

moving all of its stored equipment and apparatus to one location, they will free up more than 6,600 square feet of storage space, which could be available to other departments.

According to Lt. Mike Hammond, of the county fire department, a variety of disciplines could be taught at the site, including search and rescue, fire fighting, vehicle extraction and emergency medical training.

With recent events such as the Sanford city worker being trapped in a hole, a 300-foot rescue at a Florida Power smokestack in Volusia County and a teetering vehicle on the Interstate 4 bridge above State Road 46, "we have recognized there is a need to be prepared for any and all kinds of emer-

gencies," said Hammond to commissioners in August.

Natural Lands Committee members fear that these type of activities are not appropriate for the surrounding environmentally sensitive area — especially with the Environmental Studies Center near.

According to Pat Burkett, a member of the Natural Lands Committee and environmental education specialist at the Environmental Studies Center, up to seven or eight school classes visit the center each day. Through a partnership with Seminole County Schools, students receive a hands-on learning experience as they view the displays and live wildlife specimens located at the center. One of the more legendary activities at the center is the

"mud walk" where students can explore a wetland habitat.

"It was kind of presented to us that this is what is going to happen, what is your concern, not is there some way we can keep this from happening," Burkett said. "This is a no-brainer. This is something we don't put in Spring Hammock. They say there will be little or no smoke, what does that mean," she added.

If approved, the training facility would be a partnership with Seminole Community College. According to Dr. Dave Harrison, vice president of the college, SCC's fire and emergency medical training classes have doubled in enrollment since Sept. 11, 2001.

"This will provide us, with the county and other agencies,

an opportunity to meet the demands," he said in August.

The college is set to fund \$900,000 for a burn building that wouldn't actually burn or set smoke into the air. But, it would be equipped with propane burners to emulate the high heat in a fire and would produce a 'fake' smoke that dissipates quickly. The burn building is scheduled to be constructed on the portion of undeveloped land the committee tried to purchase in the past, which fronts State Road 419.

"I can't tell them there will be zero to no smoke what so ever, but that's the whole idea behind this propane building is it doesn't generate smoke," said Fire Chief Terry Schenk. "The smoke we do generate to train fire fighters so their visibility is

cut off is a theater-type smoke, which is nontoxic, which really doesn't exit the building and if it does it dissipates in a foot or two.

"The answer to this thing is no, we're not generating big volumes of smoke; no, we're not putting kids at risk; and no, we're not burning hazardous materials," he added. "You can't even see this facility from the center."

According to Schenk, a good portion of the training planned for the facility will be inside, and the 100-foot buffer of trees between the Environmental Studies Center and the industrial site will remain.

"Basically, we're giving the county commission two choices: Do they want to be green or red," Golf said. "Do they want to be green then let us buy it. Or, do they want to be red, which is burn or embarrassed. This is an environmental issue, we have a lot of concerns of what kind of training will be going on."

"There probably could be a lot worse neighbors than this," Schenk said. "It could be a noisy, industrial thing. When something is zoned industrial there could be all kinds of worse possibilities."

In fact, the previous industrial use had several hazardous tanks that have been cleaned out and sanitized.

"We want them to leave these things in place so our people can get up on them and mess with the piping," Schenk said. "We can simulate there is a leak with these things. That's ideally better than having another industrial facility coming in there and filling these tanks back up with some hazardous chemical."

The Way We Were: Society celebrates city b-day

The Sanford Historical Society held its regular meeting at the Sanford Museum Sept. 25. In recognition of the city's 126th birthday, a birthday cake, which pictured General Sanford,

was enjoyed by the attendees. Also, each person received an aerial map of Sanford in 1884 as a gift. The program titled "A Circus History of Sanford" was presented by society member Charlie Carlson. Carlson, who is known for his various books on area history, has also been a circus and carnival historian for many years. He enhanced his presentation with slides of photographs and circus advertisements.

The group was informed that Sanford was once a well-known cultural center. During the 1840s, entertainers came to Sanford by steamboat, later by horse and wagon and then by railroad. Coming here were circuses, fairs, operas and minstrels.

The Frank Huffman Circus came to Sanford January 1886; it was advertised as the greatest \$25 show in the East. They set up at Magnolia Avenue and Second Street. It was more of an athletic show with acrobats, tumblers and the like.

The Barnum and Bailey Circus came to Sanford in 1879 on a circus train. Carlson informed the audience that Bailey had never really existed as James McGinnis changed his name to Bailey.

Other early circuses to come here were the Son Brothers, Walter L. Main, John Robinson, and John H. Sparks. There were sometimes as many as 10 circuses here in one year. The John Robinson and Walter Main Circuses came to Sanford often.

Another regular was the Rhoda Royal United 3 Ring Hippodrome, Menagerie and Old Buffalo Wild West Show.

The sites for the circuses varied, but were not far from the railroad siding. The sites included Palmetto Avenue and Second Street, the lakefront, Mellonville Avenue and First Street, behind the armory, and Sanford Avenue and Eighth Street. The 1883 Orange County Fair was at French Avenue and First Street.

The John Robinson Circus and others would send an advance man in an advertising railroad car, which would be parked in a prominent place such as near the railroad siding. Inside the car was a printing shop, which produced posters and fliers. The advance man would make all the arrangements for the coming circus, and his helpers would plaster the area with posters and fliers. At times, they would use artwork from previous circus advertisements, just placing their information on top. Those who allowed posters on their property would be given free tickets.

To alert the citizens as to how the circus helped Sanford's economy, the 1920 Sparks Circus produced a flier that told what was purchased during their stay. This included hay and grain for 600 horses; 200 pounds of meat, fish and bones for other animals; 500 gallons of fuel; groceries for 800 workers; loads of sawdust; and 50 hotel rooms. Some of these circuses

The girls, who hadn't been in a cemetery before, admit they were a little nervous, but overcame their fears to accomplish their goal of cleaning the land. In fact, Layton, while cleaning off a headstone noticed the gentleman had died during World War II. She brushed off the stone and said "more power to ya, man."

"If you are buried in a cemetery you don't want to be buried in one your relatives can't get through," she said. "It's rude to have people litter on the ground, these are people's graves. It's not right to have people using cemeteries as a dumpster."

Hultin says, the Girl Scout Troop will assist the city in other projects beginning next year.

The wheels on the car go slap, dent, bounce

I can't believe that I have been writing this column as long as I have and never 'bumped' into this topic before. It surely is one all Geneva residents can relate to. Lucky me — local writer K. M. Phillips sent this to me to run in Stetson's Corner. Unlucky Karen — I can't afford to give her my paycheck this week because I have to get my front end aligned — again!

Slow down for a smoother ride. Washboard. Rattletrap. A dirt road at its worst. Waves of hard ridges jar axles and spines out of alignment. Shouldn't someone do something?

You can. Slow down! The reason for the washboard effect is simple. Instead of rotating in a perfect circle, a tire rotates like an oval or an egg at speeds above 25 to 30 mph. This distorted shape slaps the road surface, dents it, and then bounces. Slap, dent, bounce. Slap, dent, bounce.

Multiply this by four bouncing tires and the unsprung weight of a vehicle. It doesn't take long for the washboard-like ridges to form on your dirt road.

Many dirt roads are composed of

dirt and crushed shell making the ridges even harder. The more you speed above 25 or 30 mph — the more ridges. The speed limit was determined for this very reason. Imagine! Not to annoy the impatient driver, but to preserve the texture and safety of the roadbed.

To make matters worse, weekend road engineers' borrow the metal drag and in the driest conditions, drag the road to eliminate the ridges. They mean well. At first, the road feels smoother. But the truth is that the drag has only shaved off the tips of the ridges. They still exist deep in the roadbed. That's why in a few hours the washboard is back.

Professional road services grade the roads after a good rain when the road texture is the most compact. Heavy equipment digs under the ridges and eliminates them from the bottom up, forming a crown down

the middle of the road. Why is a crown important? Especially in wet summer months, the crown provides drainage so standing water doesn't puddle in the middle of the road. Instead, it gently drains into the ditches.

Consider this Rural Road Maintenance 101.

Then there's the safety factor. How much control do you really have when the tires and your 3,000-pound vehicle is bouncing all over the place. We share the road with horses, dogs, deer, pedestrians, ATVs and more. What would you do if you had to suddenly react to avoid hitting someone or something?

So the next time you feel the urge to accelerate down your dirt road, think about the washboard you are creating. Slap, dent, bounce.

Why aren't the roads paved? Some people like living on a dirt road. Many of the dirt roads are private, in the hands of homeowners associations. It's hard to get people to pay the yearly HOA fees, which are minimal, much less to chip in thousands of dollars to pave dozens of miles of roadways. The easier

solution is SLOW DOWN! One resident I knew complained constantly about her dirt road and its less than smooth condition — and "why didn't the county pave it over already?"

Turns out it was one of those private roads mentioned earlier. Whenever she whined (bad person that I am) I always thought; "Wasn't that dirt road there when you came to view that home before you bought it?" It's kind of like marrying someone with the hope that you will change them. Doesn't work. (She ended up moving...)

So if you are looking for a home here in rural Geneva, don't expect that bumpy dirt road to change once you move in! Just give in to the country atmosphere and 'slow down!'

Startling facts presented in corrections report

Mothers of Incarcerated Sons, Inc. (MIS), say the facts and statistics from the 2001-2002 annual report of the Florida Department of Corrections on inmate population reflect that the majority of inmates in prison on June 30, 2002, were male (94 percent) and black (53 percent).

This is an epidemic of black men and juveniles being "warehoused," as one of our incarcerated sons described in a letter. We Mothers of Incarcerated Sons, Inc., states Sherry Grace, executive director, are fearful that if it continues as is, a black man with-

out a record and with civil rights will become extinct! How this statistic affects us from this point will be determined by our own course of action.

Attention is called to parents, community and churches. Here are some things that we must do immediately to address this important issue:

- Educate our children on the reality of the system. They must not even look at a gun, if you have one get rid of it.

- Stay abreast and attentive to law enforcement and the judicial system and demand a just and equal process.

- Be prepared to question, stand firm and take an effective and appropriate course of action when necessary with children, as well as anyone else involved in this epidemic.

- Churches have to stop sleeping! There are some exceptions, however, many of our churches are like the five virgins without oil in their lamps! Every single church should have an effective and efficient preventive and

restorative program in place, or be actively participating in a program.

- We all must stop looking the other way at the first sign of our children's involvement with drugs. The Federal Bureau of Prisons statistics, as of June 2003, shows that more than 54 percent of the incarcerations are drug offenses.

- When all else fails and our loved ones fall prey to the system, we must have effective programs in place to embrace them when they are released and return home to us.

were large and boasted up to 11,000 seats. To fill these seats, excursion trains would run from other areas in Florida, which sometimes included a night's stay there.

These early circuses always had a parade, sometimes a mile long. These were free and were to promote the circus. The last, real circus parade was held in 1939, as they had become too costly.

Probably the strangest circus to come to Sanford was one sponsored by the Klu Klux Klan in 1926. The parade included the Klan marching down First Street. It was a two-ring circus located on the lakefront with several sideshows. Proceeds went to charity.

During the late 1920s, the city tried to limit the number of circuses coming to Sanford by raising the fees. They were seen as competi-

tion by theaters and other amusement places that had begun to operate in the city. The Milane Theatre had opened in 1923.

An interesting note was that Emmett Kelley once performed in Sanford as a trapeze artist. He later realized that he wasn't very good on the trapeze and became a clown. He performed as a much loved hobo clown with Ringling Brothers for many years.

In 1960, the city was excited to learn that an attraction called Circus Land would be built in Sanford. In anticipation of this, Christiana Brothers Circus set up temporary headquarters at Airport Boulevard and U.S. Highway 17-92. The Sanford Jaycees sponsored a circus parade, which began at the Municipal Zoo, wound through First Street to Mellonville Avenue and pro-

ceeded to Celery Avenue. An NBC television station filmed the parade and it was said to be one of the last circus parades in the United States.

Although it was a very rainy evening, 30 members and guests of the historical society were present at the meeting. Guests introduced by president Jay Jacobs were Rick Walker, Jackie Rumbley and Waunetta Whitaker.

During the business meeting, the society's 2004 calendar was presented with several members checking some out to sell.

The society sponsored book "Images of America: Sanford" was also shown to the group for the first time although it has been on sale for several weeks. This book is soft bound and contains 128 pages and 215 photographs, maps and drawings. It covers the history of the city from the Timucua to the

1960s. There are detailed captions on the photos, which are primarily from the museum owned Vincent collection. Of interest to the society was that all the photo scanning and layout was completed at the museum on the society's new computer.

Curator Alicia Clarke drew the group's attention to the Baghdad Exhibit in the lobby. Charlie Carlson, III, whose diaries are being printed in *The Seminole Herald*, has sent all these items here from Iraq.

The membership voted for a dues increase for the coming year, realizing that the dues structure had not changed since 1986 and that expenses had increased.

Connie Williams, Gladys Stentstrom and Alicia Clarke were thanked for the delicious refreshments that were enjoyed by all.

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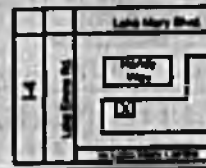

Rev. Robert Curry, Jr. of The Curry Ministries, Inc. is on a mission and it's more difficult than those he fulfilled during his U.S. military career.

The Sanford resident says it's time to stop domestic violence and the devastating effects it has on families every day.

"Something needs to be done," he said. "We have women dying, we have homes being broken into. We need a stronger deterrent to prevent this behavior."

As he eyes support from several political officials, including U.S. Rep. Corrine Brown, and the backing of religious institutions, such as the National Baptist Convention, Curry is determined to change the laws that punish domestic abusers. He is circulating a petition to alert state politicians and citizens, alike, for the need of harsher sentences.

"I'm trying to get changes," he said.

Among his supporters is Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley who wrote Curry a letter stating, "Thank you for your attention and involvement in the effort to reduce the number of

victims of domestic violence. You have the Sanford Police Department's support in your endeavor."

The need to raise awareness about the harmful behavior struck Curry when he noticed statistics from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement. Since 1998, more than 650 people have died in Florida as a result of domestic violence. About 320,000 domestic abuse arrests have been made since 1998, but almost twice as many cases have been reported.

It's a cause he is determined to

start in Florida and carry across the nation. Along with his push to have legislators create a "cry for help" bill to establish guidelines to combat domestic violence, Curry is developing an informational book for battered women.

"A lot of women out there have experienced this," he said.

Curry, however, is no stranger to responding to a greater cause. He has actively pushed for minority churches, schools and housing communities to encourage their members to vote.

"We have a problem of not getting involved in the voting process," he said. "It's important that their voices be heard, and voting is taking part in that democracy."

As he rounds up support and signatures for his drive to end domestic violence, Curry also needs volunteers and financial support. An award winning poet, Curry offers churches a donation of 25 percent of the profits for those that purchase plaques of his poems at www.awardwinningpoetry.com.

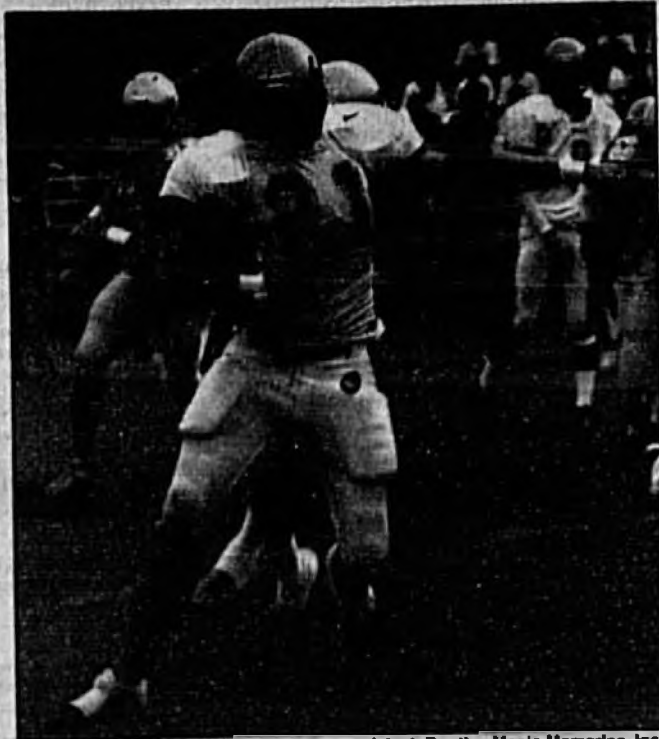

Public meeting set for Lake Tohopekaliga Project

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is holding a public meeting on Tuesday, October 14 at the Kissimmee Civic Center from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., to discuss details of the upcoming 2003-2004 Lake Tohopekaliga Extreme Drawdown and Habitat Enhancement Project.

The focus of the meeting is to inform the general public on the status of the project, provide information as to its necessity and long-term benefits, discuss the need for additional upland disposal sites, and present a forum for individuals to express their concerns and/or support for the project.

Agency personnel will be on hand to answer questions and provide a synopsis of the proposed work. Anyone interested in obtaining first-hand information regarding the project should not miss this opportunity.

Those who attend the meeting will also have a chance to discuss two proposed bass regulations, one of which could be implemented during the course of drawdown project. One proposal calls for a temporary "catch and release" regulation that would protect trophy largemouth bass throughout the project.

A second proposal would allow anglers to harvest one bass over 26 inches per day during the project. This second option would allow an angler to keep that catch of a lifetime and/or certify a new state or world record bass if it is caught during the project. A survey form will be available at the meeting to vote on which regulation anglers would like to see implemented, as well as an open discussion covering the two regulation options.

If either proposal is approved, the short-term rule is tentatively scheduled to be in effect from Jan. 1 through Sept. 30, 2004. The

public will be notified of the finalized dates and temporary regulations in future Kissimmee Chain Highlights newsletters, and through FWC news releases. In addition, signage regarding the regulation will be placed at all areas with public access to the lake.

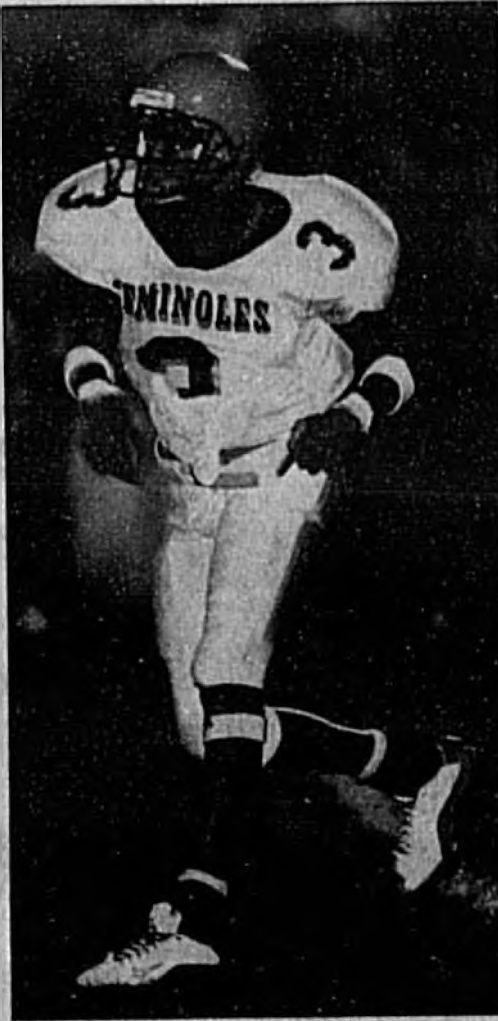
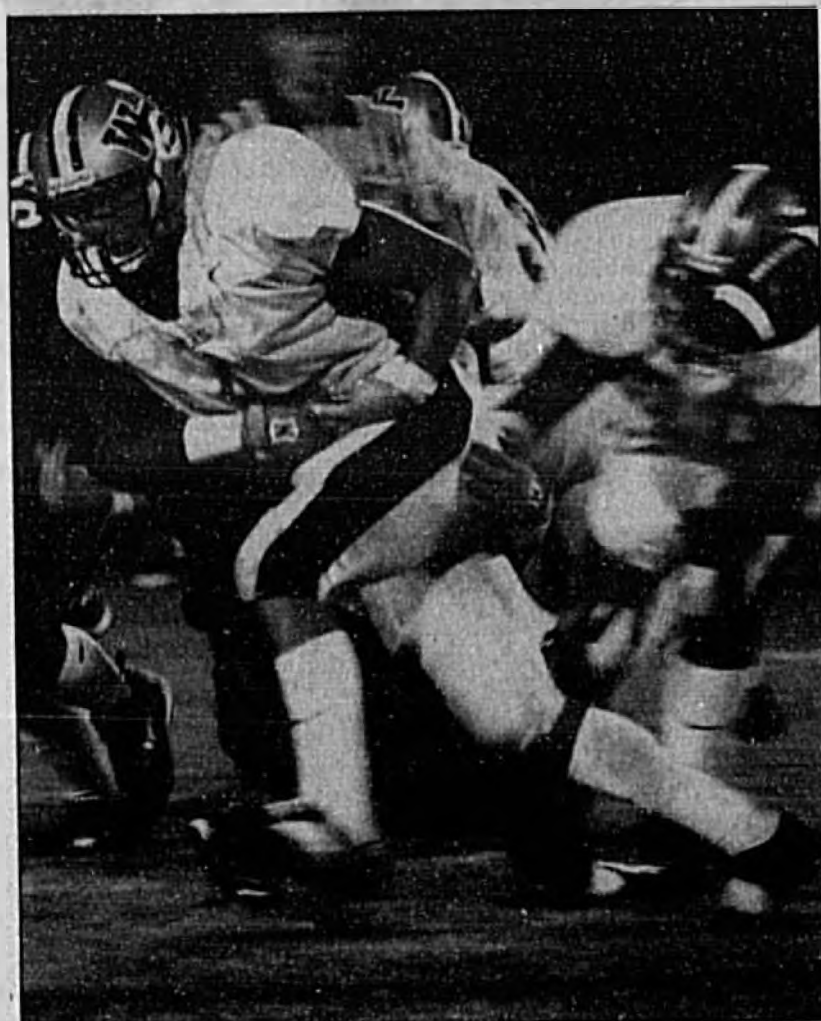

Coming off their first Mid-American Conference win of the season, the UCF Golden Knights (2-3, 1-1 MAC) travel to Athens, Ohio to take on the Ohio Bobcats (1-4, 0-2 MAC). Today's (Saturday) game-time is set for 2 p.m. and will be televised on ESPN Gameplan and locally on BrightHouse cable.

Head coach Mike Kruczek had to change what he likes to do on offense last week against Buffalo. With the absence of long-time starter Ryan Schneider due to injury, Kruczek turned to junior Jon Rivera to run the offense. Rivera, starting for the first time in his career at UCF, responded with a steady game, combining 59 passing yards with 89 rushing yards. The star of the game, however, was tailback Alex Haynes. Haynes enjoyed a career day against Buffalo, gaining 165 yards on 30 carries, both career bests. The receiving unit is led by Tavaris Capers, who as a punt returner last week returned a kick 52 yards for a touchdown and was named MAC Special Teams Player-of-the-Week for his efforts.

Defensively, the Golden Knights turn to linebacker Antoine Poe for plays. Poe, a

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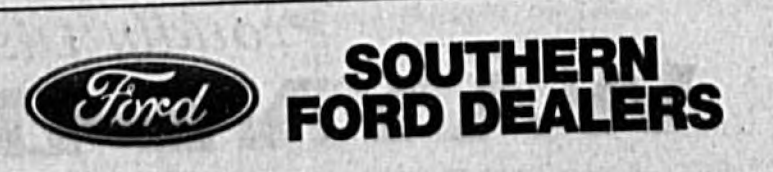

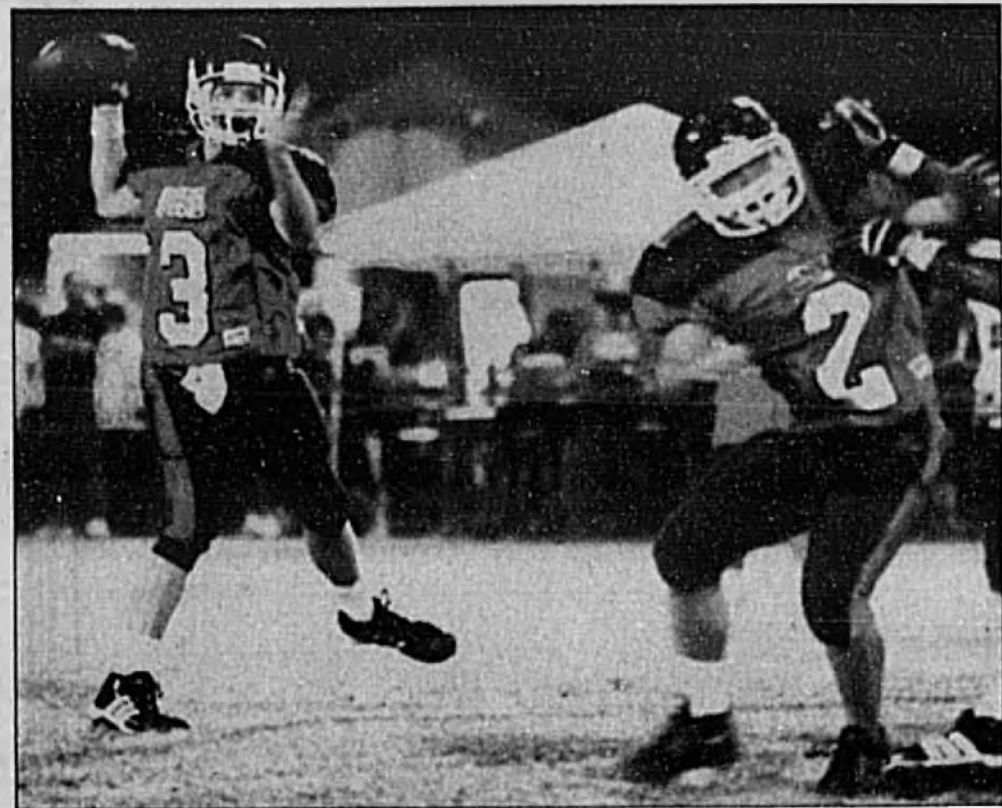

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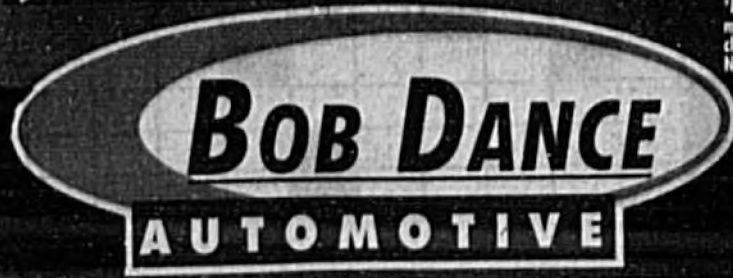


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
