





KCIA Head: Death Sentence For Killing Korea's Park

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) - South Korea's former spy chief and six other men were sentenced to death by a military court today for the assassination of President Park Chung-hee.

Six of the convicted men, who are civilians, could be hanged. The seventh, a military officer, could be shot by a firing squad, according to South Korean law. The presiding judge who handed down the sentences said it was "detestable" that former KCIA Director Kim Jae-kyu showed no repentance for his crime and for betraying the confidence of the late president. "His act is so inhumane and unconscientious he cannot deserve a bit of sympathy," the judge said as the defendants rose to hear the court's verdict.

Cuban-Americans Face Fines

NASSAU, Bahamas (UPI) - Two Bahamas government magistrates levied fines ranging from \$1,000 to \$8,000 Wednesday against 14 Cuban-Americans rounded up with their 10 lobster boats last week on charges of illegal fishing in Bahamian waters. Four of the Florida-based fishermen pleaded innocent and bails ordered ranged from \$1,000 to \$8,000 each. Trial dates were set for next March and April. Jail terms of 3 to 15 months were ordered for those fishermen who pleaded guilty and are unable to pay their fines. However, both magistrates said each would be allowed to reclaim his boat as soon as the terms of the sentences were met. Boats belonging to the four who pleaded innocent will remain impounded.

TEL AVIV. Israel (UPI) - A rabbinical court has handed down a landmark judgment ordering a 32-yearold man to perform his conjugal duties or pay 36 grains of silver a week until he does so, an Israeli news report

Ruling the "bellious" against religious law for refusing to he intions with his wife, the three rabbis decreed the countdown start with the handing down of the judgment Tuesday, the Maariv newspaper

If the husband disobeys the rabbinical court, the woman will be eligible for a divorce with the silver accruing over the period added to the alimony set-tlement. there are 43.5 grains of silver in an ounce.

TORONTO (UPI) - Six Toronto men face possible maximum sentences of life imprisonment after being convicted of rape, gross indecency and attempted buggery of two women last summer.

A jury in the men's seven-week gang-rape trial returned guilty verdicts Wednesday after deliberating for two days. Sentencing was set for Jan. 31.



Dignity Of Court Shaken, Not Record

The people of the United States, who have been given proof of the nation's durability by its survival of Watergate and the several "inside" stories of the scandal, are not likely to panic over the current "expose" of the Supreme Court. The pre-publication hype being given "The Brethren," a through-the-keyhole peek at relationships of Chief Justice Warren Burger and his eight associates by Watergate reporters Bob Woodward and Scott Armstrong, is provocative.

It will sell books. But the court will survive as an institution and the justices themselves will suffer no real wounds other than those to their dignity.

Despite the revelations of intra-court intrigue, rivalries, jealousies and very human personal foibles, it seems apparent that the court works limited government, limited resources afhard and seriously to reach decisions that are just and reasonable fecting virtually all policy decisions and limited voter confidence in the nation's and reasonable. Burger is target for most of the unflattering

commentary, presumably carried to the authors shed years, separating four decades of ungleefully by former clerks. He is portrayed as precedented growth in the size, power and pompous, overbearing and unqualified. Nor do his colleagues escape unscathed.



Cancer Breakthrough Found

BOSTON (UPI) - Cancer researchers have found a method of predicting relapses in patients suffering from a deadly form of leukemia, a study published today reported, but it was not known if the earlier cancer, accounts for about 25 percent of all leukemias and is most commonly found in adults. Even with the best possible treatment, it can be fatal in less than two But a study appearing in the New England Journal of

Medicine today describes a test to detect leukemia cells in the bone marrow of patients with the deadly disease while it is in remission - months before outward signs of a relapse appear.



State To Appeal Case Affecting Use Of Land

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) - Attorney General Jim Smith will ask the Florida Supreme Court to overturn a 1st District Court of Appeal decision he believes seriously jeopardizes state efforts to protect

environmentally valuable lands.

Smith said Wednesday he will appeal the ruling requiring the state to allow the development of privately-owned land or buy it.

"The decision, if allowed to stand, would establish a legal precedent that could require the state to pay millions of dollars to private landowners in order to carry out its policy of preserving critical areas."






