Gators Practise "Razzle-Dazzle" Plays For Game

GAINESVILLE, Nov. 20. (Special)—Dipper-dipper and razzle-dazzle—now you see it—now you don't.

As apt as such play themselves the University of Florida Gators will this week have to use much of their practice trying to stop the razzle-dazzle by the opposition Georgia Tech, their opponents Saturday in Florida's 1942 football finale, is one of the nation's leaders in wide open play.

They made the most of their scoring chances against us and we passed up three opportunities. But our boys came out of the Miami battle in good shape and we should be ready by Saturday to give Tech an entertaining afternoon."

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Army's pass defense against Notre Dame was the finest these eyes have ever seen.

Rice in games that may further shakeup the Southwest race. The Bears' defeat by Hardin-Simmons didn't count in the conference competition and neither did the Tulsa game.

It's a team of opportunists. The Bears were called upon to stop Texas A. and M. and Texas Christian 12 times inside the 20-yard line. They failed only once. But that's not the story of Baylor's greatness. Just give them an inch and they'll take the ball game. They play rock-and-roll football and they turn any kind of break into a score.

Little Bill Coleman was the spark that carried the team along after the loss to Hardin-Simmons. He was the guy Texas Christian was watching. Well, Little Bill went out with an injury, and Dick Kitzell took over to run the Frog. ragged.

They call Baylor the boys with the Sunday punch. That's all they need. Just one opening. They'll score then camp down on their one-yard line and hurl insults at you.

There's A Reason Why Best Punters Come From South

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 20.—There's something about the south, son, that makes a fellow want to kick a football out of this world. There never will be a satisfactory answer to the question: what section produces the finest football teams? But there's no doubt but that the south, at least in recent years, has come up with the finest punters.

And down here, where sectional pride biases like a fire detached with gasoline, the fans proclaim it's the south-west that emphasizes the foot in football.

Sammy Haugh, Jack Jacobs, Owen Price, Glenn Dobbs peerless punters, all southwesterners.

The American football statistical bureau backs up this southern supremacy in punting. This season the southeast kickers are setting the most distances. Last year, it was the southwest, and year before that, the southeast.

But individually, ah, that is where the southwest sparkles. Long, lean Glenn Dobbs, a goal to goal punter, has kicked so well his University of Tulsa is the No. 1 punting team in the nation.

Last year's top punter was Owen Price of Texas Mines. In 1940, it was this Price person again with a 47-yard average. The University of Oklahoma's celebrated Indian, Jack Jacobs, was only a few inches behind.

But here's the test. In the National Football League this fall, where the best in the business operate, Jacobs was the leading punter until he flew away to join the Air Corps. And when he left, Haugh took over first place, and Sam, generally conceded to be the best kicker in pro ball today, is from Texas Christian University.

In there any reason why southwestern kickers should be superior? Coaches at Oklahoma's three major schools—Dewal Luster of the University of Oklahoma, Jim Lookabaugh of Oklahoma A. and M., and Henry Frank of Tulsa—have a variety of answers, including one so novel the typewriter blanches to repeat it.

It could be the wind, they declare. That's right, the wind. It blows almost constantly across these southwest plains, putting a premium on punting. A team with a grade A punter often finds to victory on that quasi-eternal breeze. In the southwest, it pays to have a god kicker. Consequently kicking is stressed.

Other explanations are wild enough to permit lots of ball handling. Warm fingers make for good passing and kicking.

Lookabaugh, the bull of these southwesterners has something to do with it. Most of them are built to the moon. A long legged leg can get a lot of power into a kick.

Frank—Too many coaches think of punting purely as a defensive weapon. These punts of pure defense, it's a waste of considerable time in every practice working on them.

But say you look at it. These southwesterners are getting a lot of kick into, and out of, their football.

R. A. F. Planes Hit German Aviation, Electrical Center

Stuttgart Attacked In First Night Raid On Country Since November 9

A strong force of British bombers made a night raid on Stuttgart, in southwest Germany, and nothing was announced as to the size of the raid but 10 planes failed to return. Stuttgart is the center of aviation and electrical industries. It was the first night raid on Germany by the R. A. F. since Nov. 9. In the Pacific, United States airplanes of the China command sank a big Japanese ship, transport or maybe an aircraft carrier, off French Indo China to cap the series of devastating Allied raids upon the Japs. Earlier today a report said British four-engine bombers were believed to have struck last night for the tenth time in a month at Northern Italy, where the air ministry announced that the RAF already has knocked out Genoa harbor temporarily as an effective Axis supply port. Six dispatches told of four-hour raids on Basle and Zurich beginning shortly before 9:30 P. M. Sunday. The RAF also has been attacking Axis cities in the past month and Milan and Turin twice each. The raid Friday night on Turin, site of the Royal Italian Air Corps headquarters, was the heaviest of the war on Italy. An estimated 200 to 300 bombers participated. A propaganda acknowledged yesterday that Italy, under bombardment from the air, and with her troops in Africa still failing, is "in a battle on her own doorstep for the assurance of her national safety." Thousands of bombed-out refugees were being moved out of Northern Italy by every available means of transportation, according to the British Broadcasting Company and heard in New York by the Columbia Broadcasting System.

"Delenda Est"

Bizerte is the goal of the Allied drive in Tunisia. It is the all-important point on the North African coast. It has a fine harbor, with a depth of 85 feet, which is connected with the sea by a canal. It has a naval station, fortifications and arsenals and was of great value to France—when France was France. Strategically it is a key-point for the further progress of our new front. Historically, Bizerte was a part of the site of ancient Carthage, whence moved Hamilcar and his son Hannibal for the conquest of Rome. So intense was the enmity between the two great powers that old Cato repeated in every speech his "Carthago delenda est," or "Carthage must be destroyed." Destroyed it finally was, when, having lost Spain, it fell easy victim to the Romans in the Third Punic War, 146-149 B. C., and its name was effaced and its site declared unholy—but potius unholy, as to prevent the establishment there of a Roman colony which long provided Rome with grain. In this Tunisia, where our soldiers now fight, fought Scipio, Charlemagne, Charles V. and Don Juan of Austria, and there the Moors massed to attack Europe. As Hamilcar and Hannibal moved from the old Carthage to take the Roman Empire, so will our Eisenhower and Montgomery move to take Italy, the deflated Roman Empire of today. The Carthaginians were unsuccessful in their expeditions, because Rome then was invincible, but the United Nations will be successful—they will take Italy and beyond the Alps, the nation which has spawned the arch tyrant of modern times. Our cry is not "Carthago delenda est," but "Hitler delenda est"—and we will repeat it, as did old Cato, until it is fully accomplished.—Tampa Tribune.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20. (W. P. A.)—The horn of plenty isn't running over any more. Recently, certain agricultural experts were being told the possibility of a shortage of milk and dairy products in 1943. To say those same men will tell us that at existing prices with the so-called "normal" conditions now being maintained, farm labor and the operation of processing machinery will be insufficient to produce the needed quantities is a little like saying that the government will be unable to buy the needed quantities of steel and other materials now being produced.
