

\$12 Million Medicaid Cut Supported By GOP

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A move to cut a proposed \$12 million allocation for Florida's participation in the Medicaid program drew strong Republican support at a special caucus here today.

The caucus was called as GOP members could go over items the proposed \$1 billion budget which comes up for debate in the House Tuesday.

The Florida Legislature, reconvening today, was scheduled to take up the matter of annual state appropriations. Both houses have bills on this on their calendars.

GOP members also indicated they'd take a sharp look at several other items—particularly a \$15 million appropriation for the Cross-Florida Barge Canal.

Lauderdale, said he'd introduce an amendment to the appropriations bill which would delete the section providing for Florida's participation in the Medicaid program.

He said members don't know all the implications, and future costs of such a program and it needs further study.

The House is expected to take up the bill Wednesday. The Senate is expected to take up the bill Tuesday.

Nixon: Excuse Poor From Taxes

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon's new Congress today an eight-fold package of tax reforms including a "low-income allowance" to excuse two million poor people from income taxation.

He also recommended repeal of the economic surcharge imposed last year.

The new "minimum income tax" would set a 50 per cent limit on the use of the major tax preferences that are subject to change by law.

Nixon's message said it would be a major step toward the elimination of the economic surcharge on June 30, 1970.

The practical effect in Florida probably will be to lower the state's welfare budget.

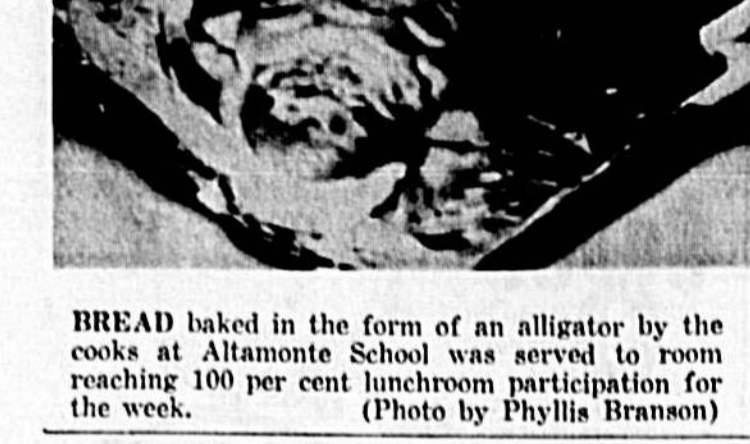

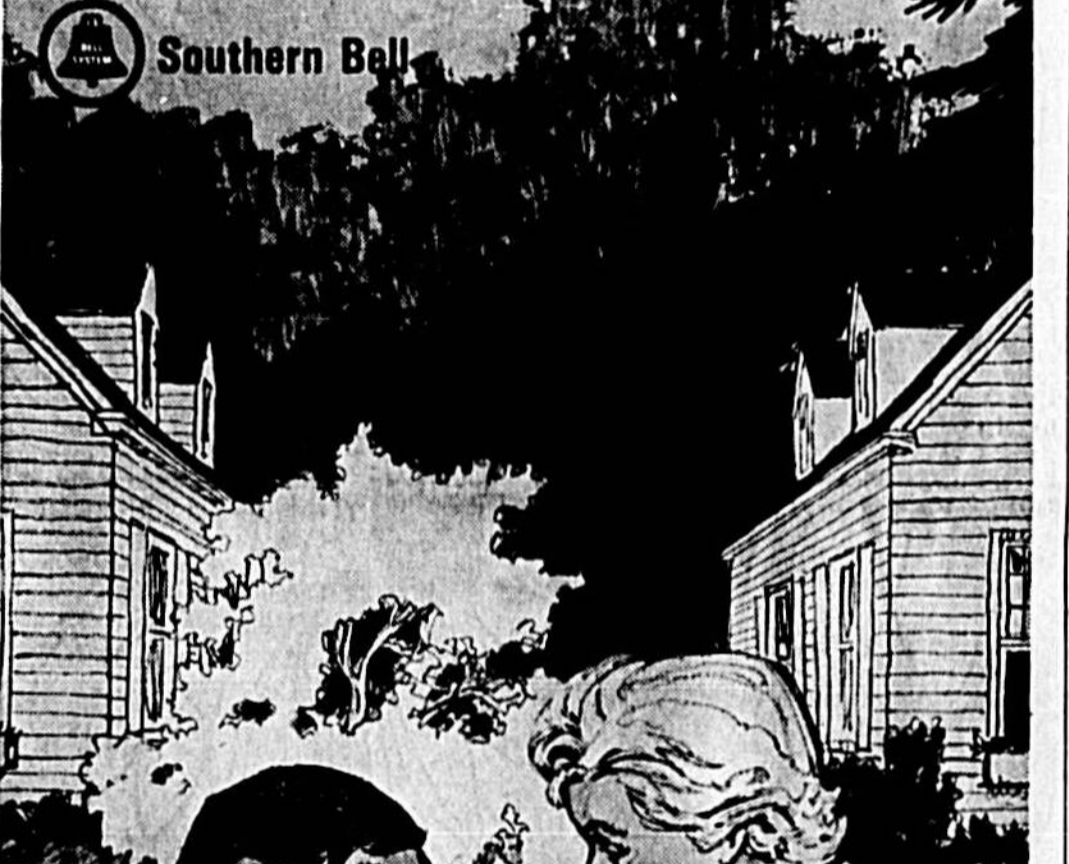

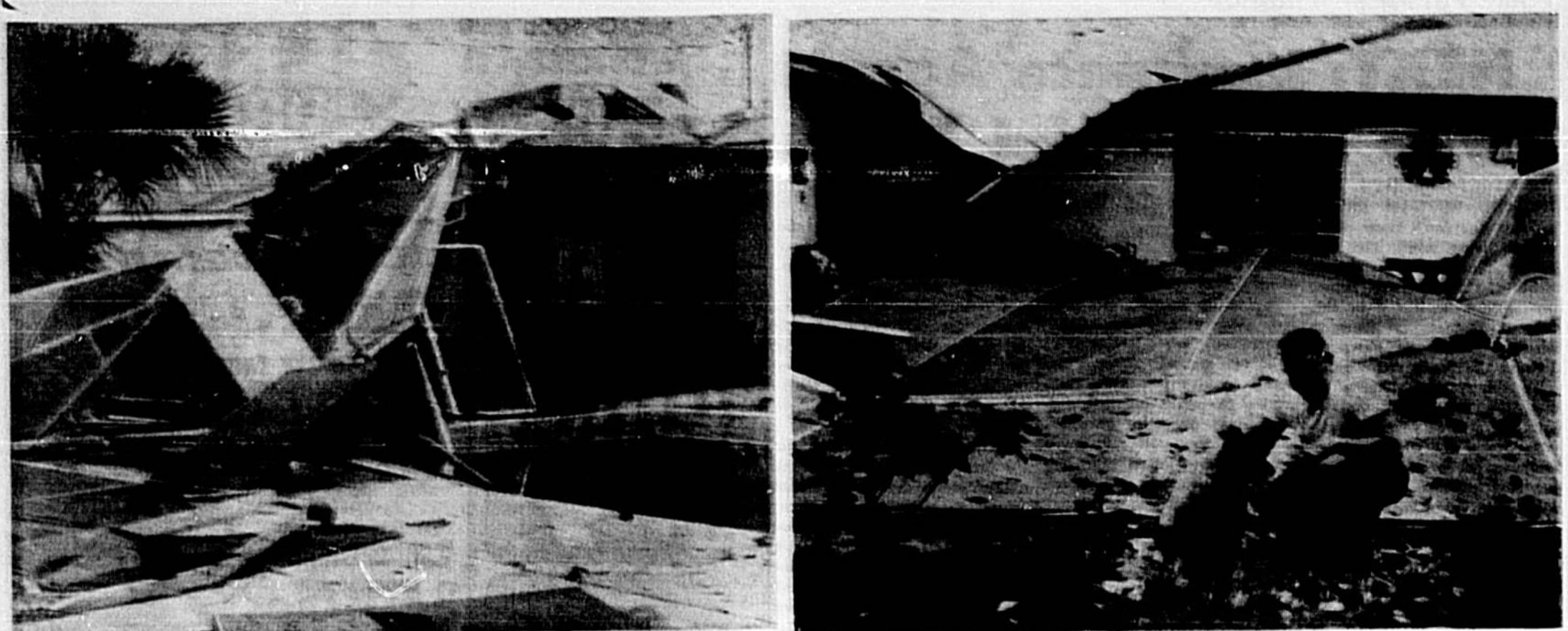

New England, South Threatened By Flood

 Swifly rising rivers, swollen by heavy rains, posed new threats to New England and the South today while flood control workers along the rampaging Mississippi held their breaths, hoping newly built levees would hold.

In northern New England, some rivers began rising above flood stage over the weekend after a heavy rainfall.

The U.S. Weather Bureau in Hartford, Conn., issued a warning of flooding later "on many major rivers in New England."

Roads were closed by flooding in Vermont. Telephone in Westminister, Vt., were knocked out when water damaged a cable under a bridge over the Connecticut River.

The Connecticut was reported to have risen five feet in 24 hours at White River Junction. A flood watch was set up throughout the state.

In the South, flooding was predicted today along the Savannah River at Augusta, Ga. Along the Chattahoochee River in Marietta, Fla., waters rose two feet above the 15-foot flood stage. The flood was expected to crest in 20 feet three days.

The situation was for the most part, under control along the Mississippi, which began its rampage last week.

With the precautionary warnings out of the way and levee construction virtually completed, Wisconsin settled down to a week of high-water watch in confidence.

James Granetzki, deputy administrator of the state's Division of Emergency Government, said the levees should hold, unless unexpectedly heavy rain upsets the high-water forecasts.

More than 60 Wisconsin residents have been moved from dwellings along the Mississippi banks with as many as 100 more ready to move if necessary.

The Sours River, locally called the Mouse, continued to batter Minot, N.D., in lion-like fashion.

The Sours swelled to the highest level in 65 years at Minot Sunday with the worst still to come.

The swirling waters forced 11,894 residents from 2,344 homes in the city of 22,000.

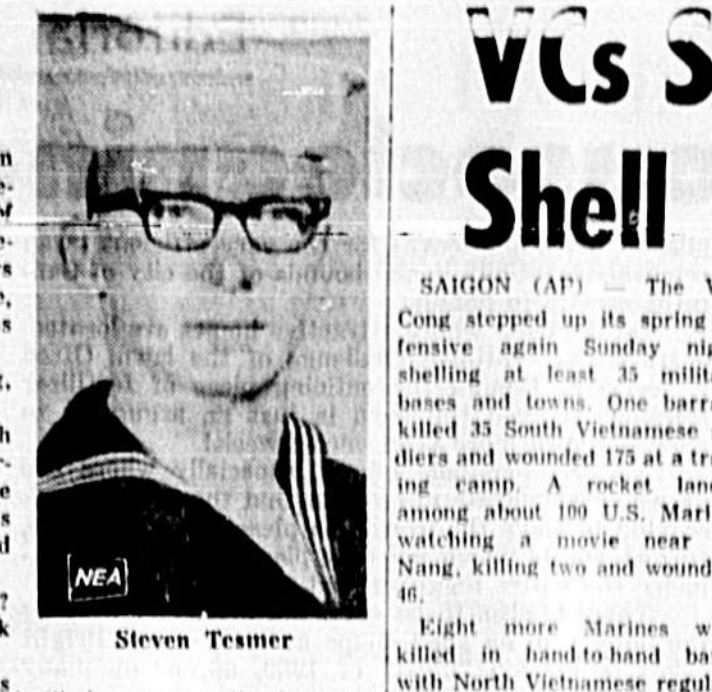

VCs Step Up Offensive; Shell 35 Bases, Towns

SIGON (AP) — The Viet Cong stepped up its spring offensive again Sunday night, shelling at least 35 military bases and towns. One barrage killed 23 South Vietnamese soldiers and wounded 123 at a training camp. A rocket landed among about 100 U.S. Marines watching a movie near Da Nang, killing two and wounding 16.

Eight more Marines were killed in hand-to-hand battle with North Vietnamese regulars just below the demilitarized zone. And in Vietnam's south, Communist guerrillas in the Mekong Delta. Authorities said damage was light and apparently only one aircraft was hit.

Other barrages hit the highland city of Pleiku, a district military headquarters about 50 miles southwest of Saigon, the headquarters of the American Green Beret force in Vietnam at Nha Trang and the U.S. 9th Infantry Division base camp at Dong Tam, 40 miles below Saigon.

South Vietnamese regulars fell upon a night camp of U.S. Marines less than half a mile below the demilitarized zone. For two hours the attack.

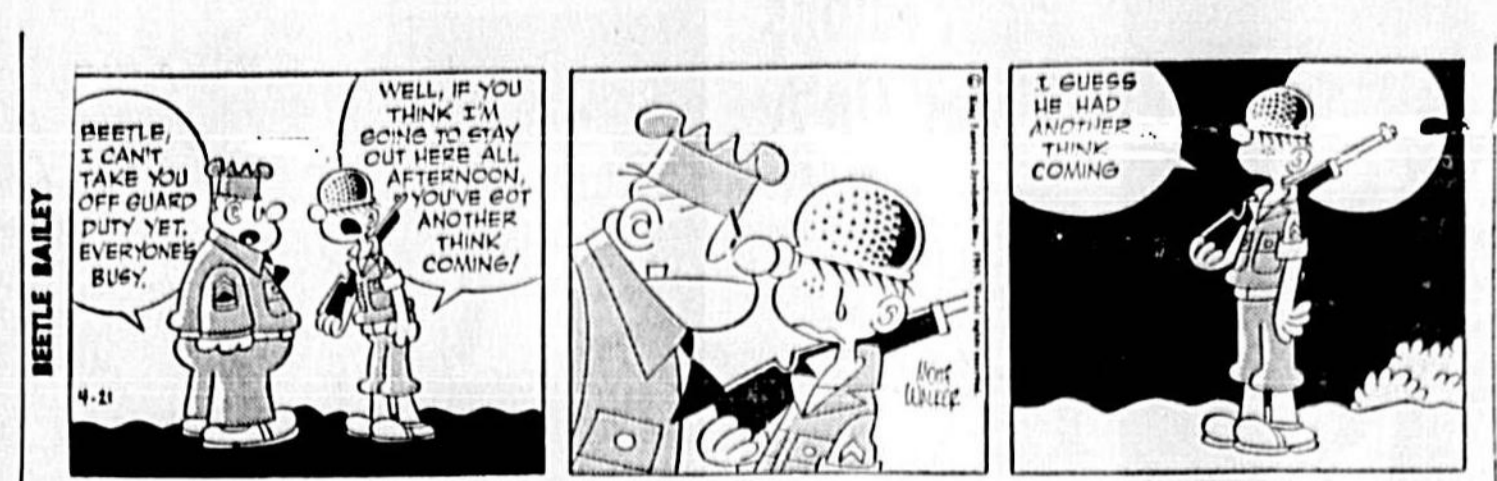
