



WASHINGTON (UPI) The House Agriculture Committee opened hearings today on how to make cigarettes safe. However, Chairman Harold D. Cooley said he wasn't convinced they are danger-

Tom, who played for Kennedy, lifted many a ball over the big rightfield scoreboard at the Asheville park. Even though he limped a little - from old football injuries - he was quite an attraction.

But here's a surprise, Ray recalled that his bathoys at Asheville during those seasons included a pair of kids nown in these parts tice and Rick Gillespie. Both were Rollins students and top athletes, and both later played baseball for Sanford clubs in the Florida State.

But back to Kennedy, he's been associated with George Weiss for many mcons. When Weiss left the Yankeesafter many years there as general manager - and took over the reins of the Mets, he asked Ray to join him with the new club as a scout.

Today Ray keeps a keen eye on high school and college talent here in Central Florida. He lives at 175 Northmore Road in Casselberry,

### **FEC Reports First Profit**

# Budget Squeeze

We are neither in war nor in depression, so it is interesting that a White House spokesman saw fit to refer to the present time as one of "severe budgetary stringencu." "severe budgetary stringency."

According to the White House, built-in budgetary increases are contained in already existing legislation and cannot be countermanded. Only repeal or amendment of the laws in question could alter this pic-

Reference here is to welfare, educational and other aid programs wherein the money involved rises as the nation's head count rises. The more people we have, the more funds are automatically committed to these

programs. The squeeze comes with efforts to hold the federal budget to the lowest possible levels and still accommodate these built-in increases.

President Johnson's assault on this dilemma is clearly vigorous and earnest. But it is not yet plain he will be more successful than his predecessors in facing down a continuing

It is a difficulty not confined to Washington. Many a state governor has been puzzling over it for years. Right now New York's Gov. Nelson Rockefeller is trying to put together a 1964-65 budget which will make room for perhaps \$150 million more in built-in outlays for schools, wel-

fare and other programs. The truth is, everybody in and out of government is alarmed in one degree or another at government's constantly rising cost. But nobody really knows what to do about it.







### Reds Return Bodies Of 3 U. S. Airmen

BERLIN (UPD-The bodies of three U. S. airmen killed when Soviet jet fighters downed their unarmed trainer plane in East Germany Tuesday will be brought to West Berlin tonight, authoritative sources said.

The wreckage of their T39 twin-jet trainer also will be brought here, the sources said.

The U. S. military laison mission to the Soviet forces in East Germany went to the crash scene from Potsdam and is transporting the bodies and the wreckage back to the

West. The East German Communist regime denounced the American flight as "provocative" and demanded anew that Western troops leave West Berlin and West Germany.

U. S. Air Force officials took up the matter with their Soviet counterparts in Berlin and demanded swift action. They stressed that the T39 trainer had strayed across the border from West Germany accidentally and that two months before President the killing of the officers was needless.
