Class History

CROOMS HIGH SCHOOL 1965-66

The 1965-66 school year has been one of the most rewarding educational experiences in the history of Crooms High School, as cording to Principal E. L. Blacksheare.

"With the acquisition of full accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and the performances of students on national, state, and local standardized tests, the year's success has been more than gratifying and has stimulated new and improved approaches to the teaching and learning processes at Crooms." said Blacksheare.

"New physical facilities added to enhance and complete the curriculum during this term were the industrial arts and vocational agriculture shops and classrooms. These facilities have been fully equipped and are functioning excellently.

"Library books and materials are constantly being received to maintain the standards of the Southern Association and the State Department of Education. The library hours have been extended in the morning and afternoon so as to provide more opportunities for literary progress.

"Many new materials and equipments provided this year by the federal aid to education programs have greatly aided in making the progress that has been realized. "apping the full potential of the pupils, thereby, enabling them to perform effectively in a society has been the object of these efforts. Approximately \$80,000 in materials and equipments were purchased this year.

"Various recognitions have been bestowed upon Crooms High Students during the past year through their participation in a variety of activities. The chorus achieved superior ratings in the district and state festivals, the band was rated excellent; athletic players were accorded state and county honors; students connected with club activities were selected for state offices. The Tri-Hi-Y placed two members of its club as state officials in the Youth Legislature held in Tallahassee at the Capitol.

"Academically, the superior performance of students on standardized tests has gained them scholarships and admittance to the country's foremost institutions.

"Approximately 1,400 students will be enrolled at Crooms for the 1966-67 school term. This anticipated increase in enrollment will permit more large class instruction, and will thereby expand the learning opportunities for pupils of Crooms. A higher course in mathematics, an expanded program in vocational business, additional teachers and several teachers' aides are a few of the features that will broaden the curriculum for a functional program," Blacksheare concluded.






The Oviedo High School graduating class will consist of 40 graduates this year. "Our graduating seniors have turned in a fine academic record

during their four years here," said Principal Clyde Holder. "On the senior placement test, 25 per cent of our graduates scored over 400 points, 60 per cent scored over 300 points and 33 of the 40 have indicated they plan to attend college," he added "We have one athletic scholarship, which has been awarded to William (Billy) Mikler, our all-state football halfback, who will attend Georgia Tech.

"Mikler also will receive the SAC award given for scholarship activities and citizenship "Brett Thompson has received an appointment to the U.S. Coast Guard Academy and will leave June 27 for New Haven, Conn.

"Recipients of the Haydon Burns Scholarship Awards are Joy Wainright, Larry Strickland and Allan Jepson. We have an unusual situation this year, in that five or our six top students are boys," Mikler noted. "They include Robert Steward, Allan Jepson, Brett Thompson, Tim Colbert, Joy Wainright and Billy Dann," he said.

In addition to an excellent academic record for four years, the Oviedo High School athletic program has produced a winning season in every sport.

"We went to the finals in the regional basketball tournament and lost only to the state champions. We enjoyed the best record in Oviedo history with a 21 win-four loss season," Holder declared. "For the fourth time in a row, we won the all-county basketball championship," he added.

"In football, we compiled a 7-3 record and for the first time gained an all-state player, Billy Mikler. Billy was also named to the all-county team," he noted.

"Billy is undoubtedly the most outstanding football player in Oviedo's short history and ranks with the greatest in Seminole County history," the principal stated.

"In baseball, once again, Oviedo advanced to the regional tournament, losing to the state champions at Avon Park. "Winning has become a tradition at Oviedo High School, due to the quality of our athletes, the high standards that all athletes meet and also to the quality of the coaches we have been fortunate in having with us," he declared.

"As to the future, Oviedo is looking forward to the opening of a new high school in 1968. New courses will be added next year and enrollment is expected to be approximately 850 students in grades one through 12," he predicted.

"We have spent approximately \$30,000 on new equipment and materials which we feel sure will benefit our students in the coming year. More teachers aides will be added as well as assisting teachers. We feel sure our academic program will grow each year," he concluded.



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


