And scarcely a major store in the nation could cope with the store traffic that would be generated if any part of early Christmas shopping was postponed until after Thanksgiving. Even under present circumstances most stores are strained to capacity during the peak of the season, to maintain the

kind of store service all shoppers have learned to expect.

When you recall the extremely crowded conditions of stores the final two or three weeks before Christmas the problems become evident.

If no early Christmas shopping were done this condition would be multiplied many fold. (Actually there would not be enough room behind store counters for enough sales people to serve shoppers during this period between Thanksgiving and Christmas.)

The same condition exists in regard to the children's visits to Santa Claus. Thousands of children and their parents look forward to their annual visit with him, and unless he makes an early appearance, many hundreds would be doomed to disappointment, simply because it's physically impossible to reach him in a shorter time.

Those in the store business know that an extremely large percentage of the Christmas gifts that are selected are items that are in plentiful supply the entire year.

If you were to ask the hundreds of retail employees—and as a group they represent one of the largest employee groups in Sanford) they would tell you that much of the stress and strain of their Christmas would be relieved if the shopping public would anticipate Christmas shopping throughout the year. (Then you'd seldom hear your friends in retailing remark, "I'm simply worn down to my knees by Christmas Eve.")

Granted that the problem is not a one-sided one it should be recognized that stores are faced with the problems of convenient service to customers of maintaining helpful employee relations, of providing a place where those of the public who can not, or do not, plan ahead may select the traditional gifts for their loved ones and friends.

We are sure that if all of our storekeepers could chat with you, personally and informally, that you would be convinced of their sincerity, and that in the true spirit of Christmas they would not be criticized for their efforts to perform a helpful service to their shopping public.

State To Utilize Area For 'Future Expansion'

The Department of Agriculture has said "no" to the city for use of the Farmers Market property on West 18th Street for a proposed recreation center. The Herald learned today.

Dr. W. C. Connor, commissioner of agriculture, has written a letter telling the city "no" and that the property would be used for future market operation expansion. The Herald learned through reliable authorities.

The city had authorized Attorney William C. Hutchison to write Connor on possible free use of the property.

The city had earmarked the property which fronts 13th Street for a proposed Goldsboro community center. Estimated cost of the project is \$100,000 which the city hopes to finance under a five-year program borrowing \$20,000 per year.

When questioned today, City Manager W. E. Knowles told The Herald the city now will have to choose from five alternate sites.

They are:

Eighth Street between Oleander and Mangrove; 11th Street between Mulberry and Jessamine; the southside of W. 13th Street opposite Mulberry; Southwest Road and 13th Place by Mangrove and Olive.

Burglars Net \$12,000 From Store

Butler said the burglars, taking advantage of Halloween night with many youngsters out, got into the building through the skylight.

According to Butler they drilled two holes in the safe and made off with the money and an undetermined amount of checks.

"They were real pros and knew exactly what they were doing," Chief said.

As of now there are no leads, Butler added.

Port Plans Due 'In About One Week'

Preliminary plans for the construction of the Port of Sanford will be received from the engineers "in about a week," it was reported this morning by Administrator Francis Roumillat.

Roumillat said the engineers' report from Spartanburg, S. C. that the preliminary planning is nearly complete and will be ready for study by members of the Seminole County Port Authority before their next meeting on Nov. 13.

Women Enter Battle To Rejuvenate Downtown

Mobilization of Sanford's womanpower to back up the manpower now gathering for an effective, realistic attack on the continuing problem of a deteriorating downtown is called for by the Sanford Business and Professional Women's Club.

Invitations to 34 organized groups of women to put on "an afternoon of good deeds and good looks" to rejuvenate downtown Sanford were mailed today.

The invitation also defines the problem, suggests solutions and asks action.

Definition: "What is wanted primarily is survival... a prosperous, growing downtown is more desirable." To this the club adds "Those in Sanford who are involved in the different areas of growth are enthusiastic and optimistic."

The invitation warns against "an element of apathy among the uninvolved" and urges widespread information as the best means of countering this situation.

Such information can be spread through "the local newspaper and radio station" and use of the club's "SAFARI" letter also gives careful consideration to the need for a broad plan, the definition of long-range and short-range objectives, use of available talent and investigation of financing means.

All Quiet In Oviedo After Racial Unrest

Everything is under control at this point at Oviedo High School and classes are underway as usual. Supt. William Phillips told The Herald today, following a three-hour inspection and visit to the school.

Several days of racial unrest erupted yesterday as white parents — many of whom kept their children out of school — looted and drinking fountain was moved outside the school building. He asked the students to help "make this the best school in the county."

The disturbances started last Friday from an argument between two girl students, one white and one Negro. The union just grew from there," it was said.

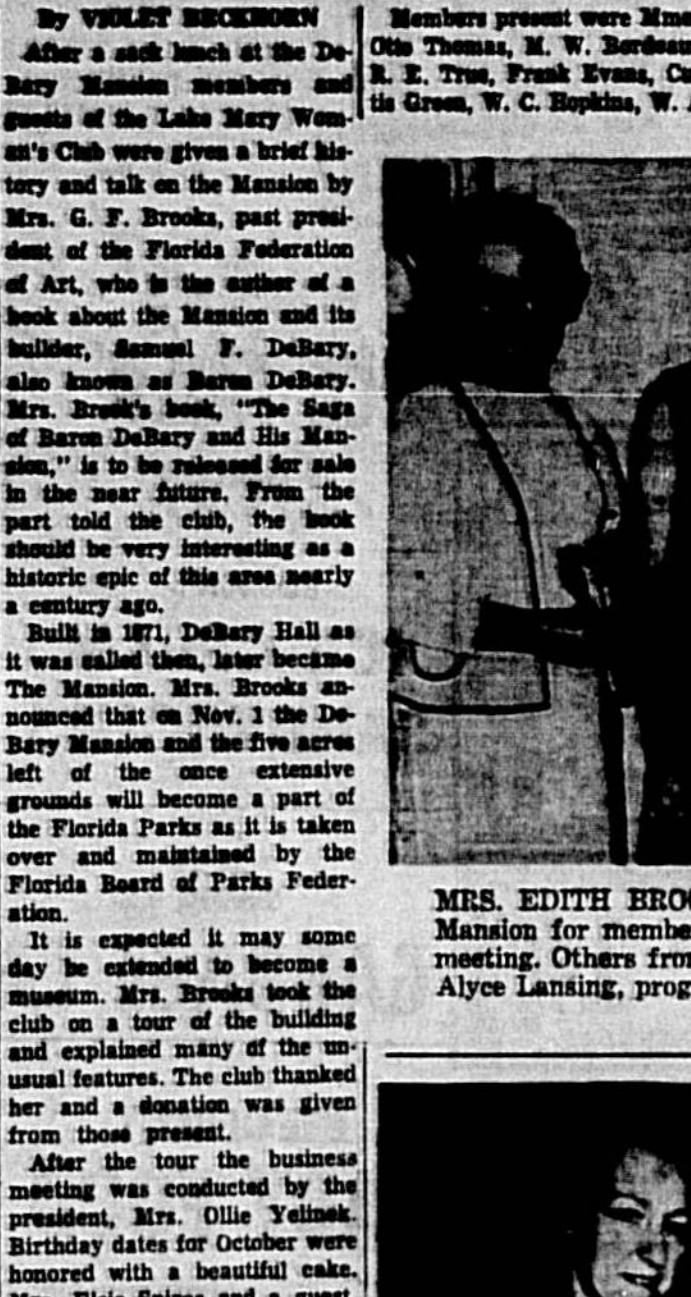

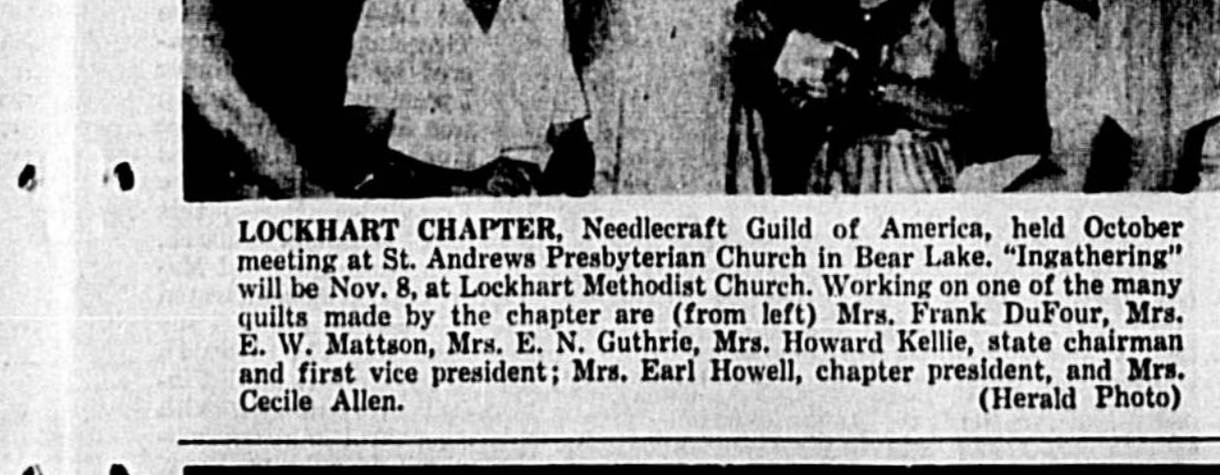

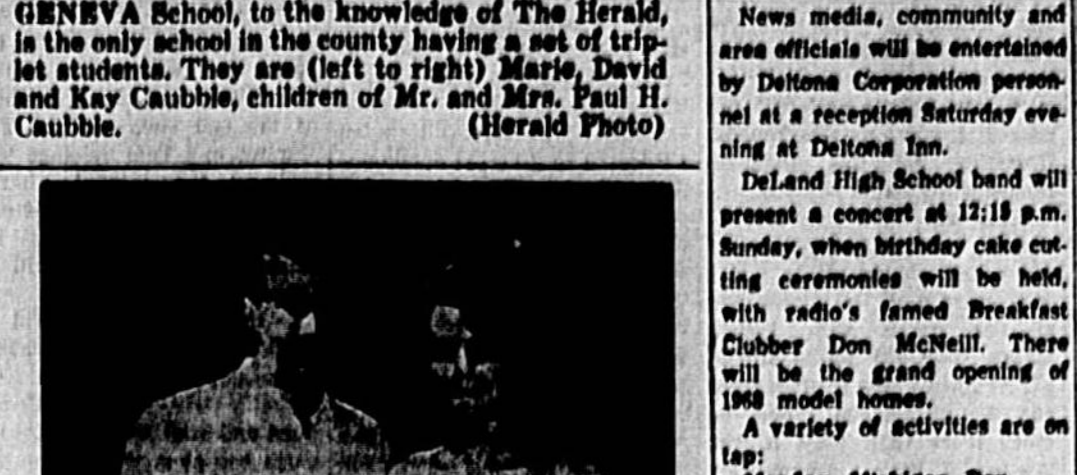

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Tax Installments Now In Effect

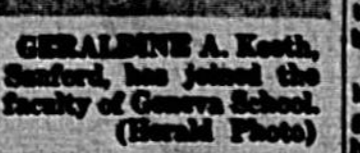
TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Florida taxpayers will be able to pay their property taxes on installment basis under a new law which became effective today.

State Comptroller Fred Dickson, in announcing the effectiveness of the law, said that despite the change, all values taxes still must be paid in full by March 31.

Dickson said that taxpayers using the installment plan will not get the normal discounts for early payment. The installment system was collected by the 1957 legislature.

"It's not as much tax relief as some feel it would be," said Billy Brown, head of the county trustee's County Finance Department.

Provisions to put the law into effect require a taxpayer to bring his tax bill to the county tax collector's office within 30 days after the bills are mailed to be eligible for the installment plan. Then, the bill will be divided into equal installments and the first payment will be made.

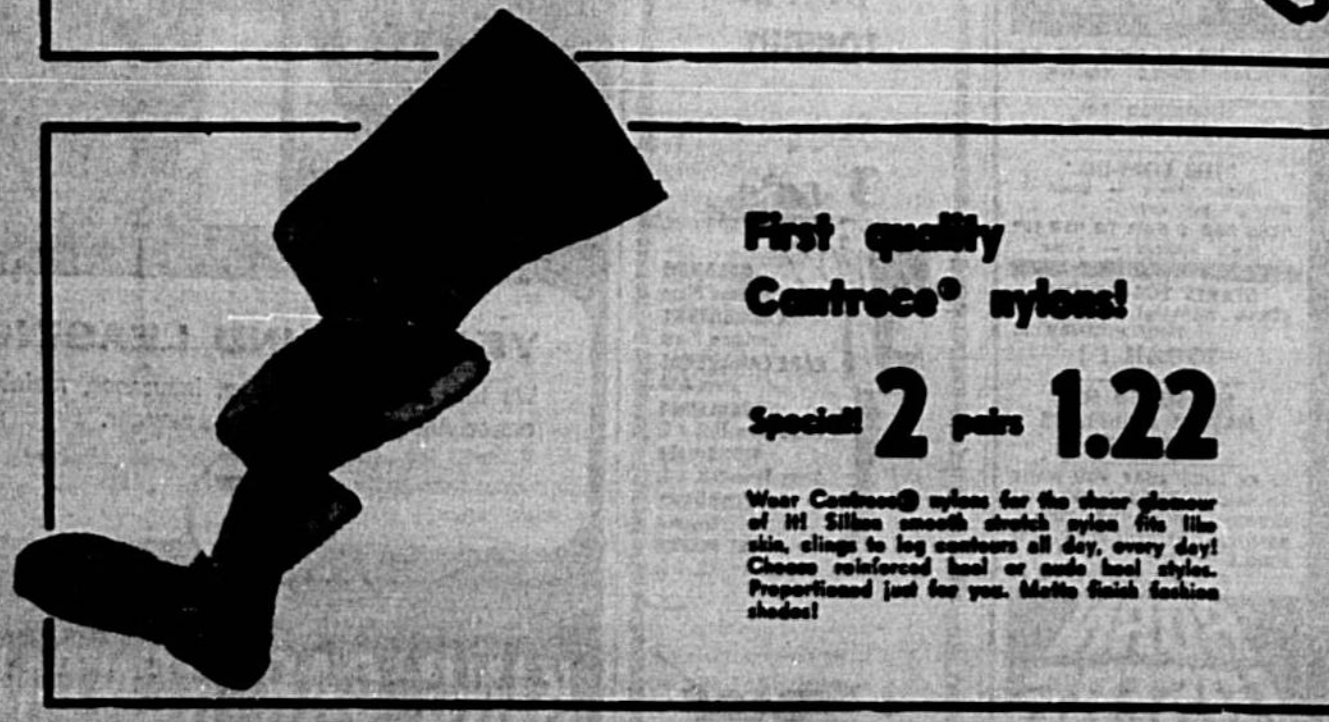

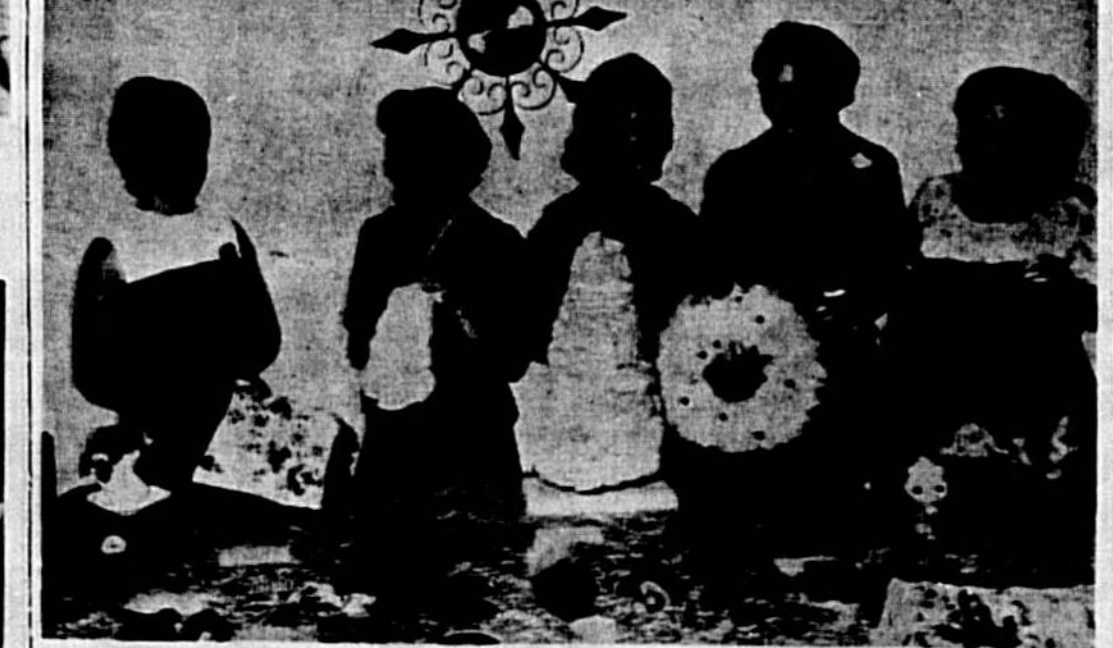

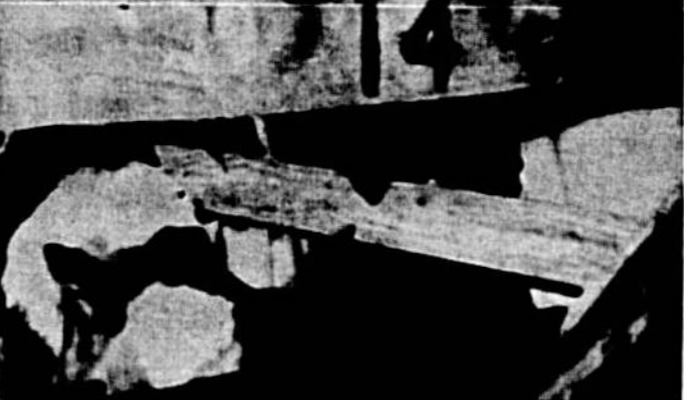

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Jap Dressing Popular For Lettuce Salad

Take a cue from one of the Japanese steak houses that have recently become so popular. Serve a salad with a special dressing that's full of surprise.

What goes into the salad? Iceberg lettuce, sliced tomatoes and bean sprouts. The dressing has a base of oil and vinegar emulsified with such interesting seasonings as tomato paste and soy sauce. Celery and onion go in, too, though the vegetables aren't recognizable because the dressing is mixed to the electric blender.

One tip: We keep tomato paste (from a 6-ounce can) in a small jar in our freezer so that it is on hand when it's needed in small amounts—as it is in this dressing. You may find it convenient to follow suit.

ICEBERG LETTUCE SALAD WITH JAPANESE DRESSING
 2 large or 3 small tomatoes, sliced
 1 cup drained canned bean sprouts
 Japanese Dressing (see recipe)
 With a small sharp knife, cut out the core from the lettuce; rinse in cold water and drain. Cover with plastic wrap (or put in a plastic bag) and refrigerate to keep crisp. At serving time, cut the head of lettuce in half lengthwise.

Coarsely shred the lettuce crosswise to make 5 cups. In a salad bowl, arrange the lettuce, tomatoes and bean sprouts. At the table, toss the vegetables together and pass the Japanese Dressing; or spoon some of the dressing over the center of the salad and toss with the vegetables. Store any leftover dressing covered in refrigerator. Serves 4 to 6 servings.

Note: You may want to core the lettuce by whacking the head—core side down—on a cutting board, then lifting or twisting out the core with your fingers.

JAPANESE DRESSING
 1/4 cup corn oil
 1/4 cup cider vinegar
 2 tablespoons tomato paste
 1 tablespoon soy sauce
 1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 cup sliced celery
 1/4 cup coarsely chopped onion

Turn all the ingredients, in the order given, into an electric blender at medium speed, blend 2 to 3 seconds or until celery is finely grated. Cover tightly and refrigerate until serving time. Makes 1 1/2 cups. Serve with Iceberg Lettuce Salad.

Here they are, those utterly delicious shortbread cookies for which cooks always want recipes.

The basic ingredients for shortbread cookies stay much the same—flour, cornstarch, sugar and butter. It's their pure rich flavor that makes shortbread cookies so popular. But once in awhile you can find an ingredient to add to the shortbread cookie formula that gives it delectable variation. And that's just what we've done. In the following recipe, we've used blanched almonds enhance the richness and flavor.

ALMOND SHORTBREAD COOKIES
 1 cup sifted regular flour
 1/2 cup cornstarch
 1/2 cup unflavored confectioners' sugar
 1 cup finely ground blanched almonds
 1/2 cup (1 1/2 sticks) butter, soft
 In a medium mixing bowl, sift together the flour, cornstarch and confectioners' sugar; stir in almonds.
 Add soft butter. With a wooden spoon, blend in the butter until a soft dough forms. Dough should be firm enough to handle without chilling.
 Using a "wet" tablespoon for each, shape dough into balls. Place a few inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets.
 With a lightly floured fork, flatten each ball so it is rigid. Bake in a 300-degree oven until edges are only lightly browned—20 to 25 minutes. With a wide spatula, remove to wire racks to cool.
 Store in tightly covered tin container.
 Makes about 32.

Notes:
 Allow the butter to stand at room temperature until it is quite soft, but do not melt it.
 We used an electric blender for grinding the almonds, lightly spooning the ground nuts into the measuring cup without packing down. A half cup of the whole blanched almonds ground in this way yields about 1/2 cup.
