Landfill fluff issue no trivial matter in Highlands

SEMINOLE COUNTY - There's a crisis brewing this summer that has Highlands County officials down in the dumps.

They want to know why so much of what they believe is their fluff - 31,878 tons of shredded automobile fluff - has ended up at the Seminole County landfill.

Fluff is big stuff says Jeri Canale, Highland

County Commission chairwoman. The commission has called for a grand jury investigation into the matter.

"What?" say Seminole County officials. Warren Wagner, the director of Seminole's Public Works Division, said that the county has accepted some 31,000 tons of fluff from outside in the last year and a half. There are records and receipts. The county gets \$3 per ton of fluff which is used as a daily cover at the landfill.

"There's no problem, no mystery," said Semi-

nole County Deputy Manager Cindy Coto today. "We don't understand why it is such a big deal. But reporters keep calling from the Highlands.

"Do we take fluff from the outside? - yes, we do," Coto said.

"Do we charge? - yes, \$3 a ton," she said.

"Do we keep receipts? - yes, we do."

Coto said she was asked if there were any 'shenanigans' in the Solid Waste Division in Seminole and she said there were not. It was true that two Solid Waste managers - Fred

Blakely and Rex Rerode - recently left the division for reasons of philosophical differences.

Coto also said that the vendor relationships were good with no improprieties.

Highlands County officials became upset when an independent truck driver told them he and two other drivers were taking 5 to 10 loads every workday for a year and a half to Seminole County.

"There are no records of the deliveries," Coto said. Please See Page 2A

Names approved

LAKE MARY - The Lake Mary City Commission approved three names suggested for appointment to the Sanford Airport Authority. The appointments are made by the Sanford City Commission, and following a four to one vote, the names are being forwarded to Sanford for consideration.

Lake Mary Commissioner Thom Greene originated the matter, saying that the appointment of a Lake Mary resident to the authority would give the city a better voice in decisions that effect his city.

The three names submitted were Richard Weir, Cecil Thompson and Brenda Williams. It was not immediately known whether or not Sanford would go along with Lake Mary's recommendation. There will be one vacancy on the authority prior to the end of the year.

Juvenile Grants

CENTRAL FLORIDA - The District 7 office of the Department of Juvenile Justice has announced awards to 26 agencies of over \$945,000 in General Revenue and Partnership Grants for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1998. The grants enable local agencies to provide services to at-risk and delinquent youth in the district which is comprised of Seminole, Brevard, Orange and Osceola Counties.

The district has also received an additional \$423,979 in federal funds from the Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grant which will begin Jan. 1, 1999.

Dead intruder was a criminal, may have made phone sex calls

SANFORD - Police say a man shot to death when he broke into a Sanford home has a long criminal record and is 40-years-old rather than a teenager as originally believed. The identity of the man had remained a mystery as he had no identification at the time.

Sanford Police Investigator Pat Smith said the man has been identified through fingerprints, and he expects to reveal the man's name today, but was having a difficult time verifying it because the person is believed to have been using a number of aliases. He is also believed to have had an extensive criminal background.

"We have notified some of the man's family members," Smith said this morning, "but appar-

ently they don't want to bother coming down here from Tallahassee to make a positive identification." At latest word, Smith said he believed at least one person may have been convinced to come to Sanford for that purpose.

Smith would verify that the victim was born in 1958, but until specific identification is made, would not give a name or residence. The man was believed to have been a transient, not a local resident, although he may have been employed locally through some type of temporary job placement program.

The shooting occurred Tuesday afternoon at 433 West 18th Street in Sanford. Alexander Serwick, 75, of Eustis, was entering a home he had recently purchased, and was reportedly

Winter Springs hammers out next year's budget

WINTER SPRINGS - City Manager Ron McLemore recently presented the Winter Springs preliminary budget for the fiscal year ending in 1999. It should be noted that many items listed here are proposed and could be altered before final adoption.

McLemore began his presentation by stating, "The City begins with the highest surplus on record, and department spending requests for 1999 is 2.1 percent below that of 1998. Now a sampling of the proposed budget:

Now Personnel - Three full time position and one part-

time position have been requested: one part-time secretary, one code enforcement officer, giving the city a total of two. "This comes from a request from the commission," said McLemore, "that this be beefed up."

One maintenance worker in public works, one maintenance worker in the recreation department were also requested. These are in anticipation to all the parks activities that will happen. The proposed personnel changes will increase the total of full-time employees to 223 position.

Expenditures - Non-Personnel Costs: \$31,353, consisting of operating sup-

Despite rain, water restrictions remain

SEMINOLE COUNTY - It is still advisable to allow rain to wash one's car rather than doing it in the yard or driveway. Water restrictions are still in place in Seminole County and various municipalities.

"We've been in contact with Lake Mary, Altamonte Springs and Seminole County and they are all continuing the restrictions we put into effect several weeks ago," said Sanford's Utilities Department Project Coordinator Bill Marcous.

The heavy rains in recent days have not, however, been sufficient to have the watering

restrictions lifted. "After three months of drought, two weeks of rain just haven't replenished the underground water supply," Marcous said.

Even though the various entities approved similar water restrictions over a period of time, Marcous said there may be an attempt to lift the restrictions for the entire area all at once. He said he expects the matter to be brought back to the Sanford City Commission at the next meeting, which would be July 27.

According to present restrictions however, which are in effect until further notice, citizens living in homes which are Please See Water, Page 2A

Lethal Weapon: Number 4 with lots and lots of bullets

Lethal Weapon 4 The Lethal Weapon series has been fairly reliable and durable until now. It seems that the writing virus which has stricken many of the 1998 summer films has diseased this third sequel to the 1987 original. Assuming that this new film marks the end of the series, then all the better.

LW4 starts with long-standing partners Martin Riggs (Mel Gibson) and Roger Murtaugh (Danny Glover) trying to subdue a fire-wielding tin man. During the exchange of bullets, Riggs finds out he is going to be a father, and Murtaugh finds out that he is going to be a grandfather. By the way, the opening sequence of this Lethal Weapon film is characteristic of the opening for all the films in the series in that the filmmakers want to hook you in the first few frames. This film does that, but it gradually lets you down.

After a fiery prologue, LW4 cuts to nine months in the future. Riggs and Murtaugh are on the trail of an Asian crime organization responsible for transporting Chinese aliens and then, basically, turning them into slaves.

Meanwhile, Riggs is juggling the idea of marriage to the mother of his child Rene Russo reprising her role from LW3. He is still rather apprehensive and reserved to the idea due to the memory of his dead wife.

Murtaugh takes on an abolitionist attitude as he tries to protect a Chinese family from not only the crime ring and a life in servitude. He is also clueless to the fact that his daughter is secretly married to a cop who is the father of Murtaugh's grandchild. And Riggs thinks that Murtaugh is on the take because of the elder cops increased financial state. In addition to all this,

both cops feel their time is almost up as age creeps up on them.

LW4 has a total of 4 credited writers. Channing Gibson, who has written mostly television dramas, is the screenwriter. Jonathan Lemkin (The Devil's Advocate), Alfred Gough and Miles Millar (both wrote Double Tap) come up with the story. It doesn't really matter, however, how many people collaborated on the script. The film is still poorly written.

The story doesn't seem to flow. It is choppy and disjointed without a definite rhythm. The tone floats in and out of action, comedy and drama. Director and co-producer Richard Donner, who has directed all the Lethal Weapon movies to date, has no difficulty in staging scenes, but the schematic he has to work with takes the story he is trying to tell in all sorts of directions. And the ending ties up plot points too conveniently. Roger on the take? Never. His wife turns out to be some pulp crime novelist working under a pseudonym, and you find that out within the last 15 to 20 minutes of the film.

Gibson and Glover still have great chemistry that pops off

the screen. These guys love working with each other and cutting up. That playfulness carries over into the scenes with Joe Pesci, whose character is good for a few laughs in this movie as he was in the last 2. Russo doesn't get much screen time, but she, as usual, conveys the strong presence that makes her indehibly sexy in whatever she plays. Comedian Chris Rock makes an appearance as a gung ho detective who is ambitious and very attentive to Murtaugh. And Jet Li, who has starred in a number of Chinese action films, plays an intense villain. Li is another part of the Chinese foreign exchange program that is the current craze in cinema.

Sadly, Lethal Weapon 4 turns out to be an epitaph for the series instead of its swan song. And, even though I claim to be no meteorologist, I can predict a continually dry summer at the movie theaters

with no relief of better writing in sight - at least not yet, anyway.

nale told the *Highlands Today*. "No receipts were given out."

The driver said that all the fluff dumped in Highlands was accounted for. "Whatever the ticket says on the computer, that's what went in - we kept careful track of what was dumped there."

The driver said he personally hauled two loads of fluff to Seminole County for eight months.

"That's where the missing fluff is," he said. "It's not in Highland's County."

An independent auditor said that a total of 90,281 tons of fluff were contracted to come to the county but that 54,165 was what was re-

ceived. Another 3,441 went to Charlotte County. The auditor did not know of the Seminole County fluff. It was at the time unaccounted for.

Wagner said that Seminole County takes fluff and records what it takes. "We can use it for daily cover and we get \$3 a ton for it. We're not sure where it all comes from. But everything is weighed and received."

"Obviously, this should all be recorded," said Seminole County Commission Chairman Randy Morris. "I knew we took fluff from Matland and Winter Park."

Morris facetiously suggested a meeting somewhere between Highlands County and Seminole for county officials to get to the bottom of the fluff controversy. "We would call it the Fluff Summit at Celebration," he said.

confronted by a man who had broken into the house. The intruder was apparently in the process of committing a burglary.

Berwick had gone to his car when he suspected an intruder and was in possession of a .32 caliber pistol when he was attacked. Police said he fired five shots at the intruder, striking him four times. The man was dead when police arrived.

"It goes to show you what type of person this was when his own family won't bother identifying him," Berwick said this morning.

Berwick said he was looking into the situation on his own, separate from what police are doing. While police had said there were no other persons

involved, Berwick said he suspected otherwise. He said the rear of the house he was refurbishing for a residence was strewn with items which had been apparently removed over several days time. "I still don't know exactly what was taken from the house but I'm conducting an inventory," he said.

Berwick said the person had undoubtedly been occupying the house for a considerable length of time. "We have received word from AT&T that they were disconnecting the long distance phone lines to our Sanford house because of what was suspected as unauthorized use. There have been calls made to the Solomon Islands and other places in the South Pacific," he said.

According to a phone bill

Berwick has just received, there were \$970 in long distance calls made from his house, and according to the numbers called, he said most of them were for phone sex calls.

The case had been turned over to the State Attorney's office for investigation, but no charges are expected to be filed against Berwick.

evenly numbered are only allowed to water their lawns on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Odd numbered home residents may water on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. In all cases, watering is only allowed between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m.

No car washing is allowed at private residences at any time. "The only exception is watering new plantings," Marcous added.

The use of reclaimed water, in both Sanford and Altamonte Springs, is the same as other water restrictions. Marcous said with the lack of water from normal well sources, there is also a lack of water which is run through reclamation cycles.



Following resumption of play, Kevin Melillo (Lake Brantley High School) laced the first for a triple into the rightfield corner to score Hollimon. Two pitches later, Richie blasted an 0-1 pitch deep into leftfield to give the USA a comfortable 6-2 lead.

Richie, Hollimon and Melillo combined for 10 of the USA's 18 hits. Each also had three RBI. Hollimon scored four times, while Richie tallied

three times and Melillo crossed the plate twice.

After the pivotal fourth inning, the USA Youth scored twice in the fifth inning and then added seven runs in the sixth inning, highlighted by a two-run home run by Landon Powell.

Carmen Pignatiello earned the win, hurling the final four innings in relief of starter Joe Torres (Kissimmee). Pignatiello allowed just two hits while striking out three. He also drove in three runs at the plate with a double and a triple.

Melillo finished the game 3-for-5 with a triple and a double, scored two runs and drove in three. The Longwood resident is now hitting .500 (13-for-26) with two doubles and two triples, nine runs scored, three stolen bases and six RBI in the six games.

The 17-run output marked the third time in six games that the USA has notched 17 runs. The USA has now outscored opponents 74-8 while batting .449 in six tournament games. USA pitchers have allowed only five earned runs in 46 innings for an 0.98 ERA.

"I'd be lying if I said I didn't feel the pressure to win this game - especially after last year," said USA head coach Mark McKenzie, referring to a USA loss to Korea in last year's World Youth Championships played in Taipei, Taiwan. McKenzie was an assistant on the inaugural USA Baseball Youth National Team that finished fifth in the 1997 World Championships.

"I think we will be ready for Saturday's semifinal. We know that now we'll be playing for a medal (on Sunday)."






