The Florida Public Service Commission agreed to a settlement with a telecommunications company accused of violating PSC rules. Under the agreement Coral Communications, Inc. will make a \$150,000 contribution to the state's General Revenue Fund as part of a settlement for selling telecommunications services without a certificate. In its settlement Coral also agreed to make refunds to customers in the amount of \$32,888.37 for unauthorized charges on their telecommunications bills, a practice otherwise known as "cramming", and to ensure that all marketing materials are withdrawn from Florida.

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County will review trash service, contracts

SEMINOLE COUNTY - County commissioners on Tuesday are expected to authorize the county's solid waste residential hauling contracts.

Four haulers - BFI, DisposAll, Sure Sanitation and Waste Management - made approximately 11,200,000 curb visits

this year and logged 2,884 complaints. The ratio of complaints to visits being 0.02 percent.

Although that rate is extremely low, Commissioner Grant Maloy said he has received a number of recent complaints about one of the haulers. "People are telling me their haulers are missing garbage or hitting posts and showing a lack of concern," Maloy said.

There were complaints, too, that haulers didn't observe speed limits, did not clean up spills and failed to return receptacles. A Chase Groves resident said that he watched a trash collector sit on the curb for 10 minutes reading magazines from his recycling bin.

The good news is that the majority of residents are not only pleased with their service but appreciative that collection

rates have decreased and will be decreasing even further.

Before 1990, residents were paying \$13.30 a month for trash collection rates, but now pay \$12.85. With the implementation of the currently proposed rate reduction, the average rate for the 2000 service year will be \$12.19.

The tip fees at the county dump were reduced and the county commission negotiated a

five percent reduction in hauler collection rates beginning in the year 2000. County staff has recommended the commission enter a 5-year extension with the current haulers through 2004. Over this haul, contract extension savings to residents will be \$2.1 million.

Staff gave each hauler a draft contract, which included a number of revisions in per-

Airport loses charter carrier

SANFORD - The Orlando Sanford Airport was taken by surprise this week when Britannia Airways announced the signing of a five-year contract with Orlando International Airport.

The initial reaction to the news was total surprise, according to Victor White, executive director at the Sanford Airport Authority. "We had no warning this was coming," White said, adding that the move could also be viewed as positive.

"We would have liked to have been given a chance to compete," he said, but this also could be looked at as a motivating factor for us," he said. "We are not mad at Britannia because they made a business decision, but we are horribly disappointed."

The quick growth of the airport in Sanford, which served more than one million passengers in 1997, has put a strain on the existing physical capabilities. The departure of Britannia may buy the airport the time it needs to fine tune customer service and other areas, he said.

"We want to make sure we keep who we have," White said.

White said his staff has already started talks with the remaining carriers in an effort to address concerns and to also make sure the customer is get-

ness in February 1999 to Orlando International Airport. Britannia accounts for about 20 percent of the more than one million passengers each year.



nounced Friday.


The Sanford Trust is sponsoring a residential holiday decorating contest, that will also be announced on Friday.

Audubon's works featured in DeLand

DELAND - John James Audubon has returned to Central Florida.

A major exhibit of the works of the great American artist and naturalist has been housed at the DeLand Museum of Art since October. The two-part exhibit, Audubon in Florida and Audubon Treasures, features engravings selected from a collection of Audubon's Florida work, and personal artifacts.

Audubon spent only about six months recording the birds of Florida. His travels took him to the interior of Florida, along the St. Johns River, and to the Florida Keys. He came near DeLand, spending two days at the plantation of Colonel Orlando Rees, at Spring Garden, now DeLeon Springs. While unimpressed with the river and the town of St. Augustine, Audubon wrote of his experience at Spring Garden. "I here shot a pair of curious ibises which you will find described in my fourth volume and landed on a small island covered with wild orange trees, the luxuriance and freshness of which were not less pleasing to the sight, than the perfume of their flowers was to the smell. The group seemed to me like a rich bouquet formed by nature to afford consolation to the weary traveler, cast down by the dismal scenery of swamps, and pools and rank grass, around him."

The majority of the 52 birds Audubon discovered in Florida were found in the Florida Keys.

From Charleston, on the second leg of his Florida trip, Audubon sailed aboard the U.S.S. Marion, Nearing Indian Key. Audubon wrote, "my

Key. Audubon wrote, "my heart swelled with uncontrollable delight." Audubon and found the Florida he was looking for. The birds that we saw were almost all new to us, their lovely forms appeared to be arrayed in more brilliant apparel than I had ever before seen...we longed to form a more intimate acquaintance with them."

Audubon in Florida comes to the DeLand Museum of Art from the Historical Museum of Southern Florida in Miami.

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

formance standards. Trash collectors shall not use obscene or offensive language or gestures. This is the long-awaited no trash talk rule. All vehicles must be washed on the inside, sanitized with a suitable disinfectant and deodorant. This is the good scent rule.

Recycling collection must be provided as one of the same

days of regularly scheduled pick-up. This is the all-in-one rule.

Reserve equipment in the event of failure must be in place within 2 hours. The previous requirement was 24 hours. This is the no-alibi rule.

The Elephant Folio engravings, more than sixty, are based on the original watercolors and drawings created by Audubon between November 1831 and May 1832. They were selected from the museum's collections and are displayed in the Lower Gallery at DeLand.

Included in the exhibit at the DeLand museum are engravings of the greenheron, captured on Sand Key, the white pelican, the whip-poor-will, the Key West quail dove, and the caracara eagle.

Audubon Treasures, featured in the Upper Gallery, were selected from the collection of the John James Audubon Museum in Henderson, Kentucky.

The Henderson collection includes rare original oil paintings by the artist and a collection of personal artifact which include letters, stuffed specimens, a life mask and an additional selection of fifty Robert Havell hand-colored engravings from the famed "The Birds of America" Elephant Folio. Additional artworks and historical items including rare books are on loan from the Library of Congress, The National Archives, The Smithsonian Institute and the White House Historical Society.

Congressman John L. Mica and his wife, Pat, hosted an Opening Preview Gala. The Micas instrumental in bringing

the exhibit to the DeLand Museum of Art, said Executive Director Alexander. At the opening, Mica said, "Pat and I just delighted to have played a small part in working with the community." Mica called the exhibit "an opportunity...to share part of the history of this area, and the rich contribution that John James Audubon made to Central Florida...and to the world of art and culture."

Audubon in Florida and Audubon Treasures will remain at the DeLand Museum of Art until Feb. 28. The exhibit hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Sunday, 1 p.m. to 4 p.m., and by appointment. Admission is \$6 for adults, \$5 for Senior Adults (Over 60), \$4 for Students. Children under 6 are free.

Dinner is on the table, the family is just ready to sit down to eat, and the phone rings! "Hi, I'm with the organization of 'blank' and this is the time of the year when we are making our local calls for fund-raising for the activities this group does in your community. How much can we put you down for?" We hear words like firefighters, police, abused children, and we usually have the feeling that this is a worthy cause and we agree to donate.

Indeed most of these solicitations are legitimate and do the things they say they are going to do. However, in some cases, the firm that has been hired to do the calling and soliciting may be taking in more of the money than the actual organization. Also, in some cases, the money may not be going to the local community.

One aftermath of a disaster is the people that appear on the scene to take advantage of the situation. We need to be reminded to be aware of scams that may occur. With the national coverage that the Florida fires received and the appreciation expressed to firefighters from throughout the country, one potential scam is solicitation for donations for a particular cause that would include the term firefighters.

When called for solicitations, we should verify a couple of items with the caller, 1) what percent of the donation goes to the group, and 2) does the donation stay in the local area or the state.

Organizations that solicit funds in the state of Florida must be registered with the department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. DACS has this list available on the web site address: <http://dacs.state.fl.us/gift-givers/contents.html>.

Hard copies are available also and can be requested by calling DACS at 1-800-HELPFLA (1-800-435-7352). People can also call the number if they

have questions about a particular organization. The information contained in the Gift Givers Guide also includes the amount of funds raised and how they were distributed.

Consumers who think that a call may be a scam, should report the information to DACS.

Our daughter recently tried to kill herself by overdosing on tranquilizers. While she was being treated for the overdose, we found out that she's also addicted to crack. It still amazes me how much she had us bamboozled. We would yell at her when she got in after her curfew and she'd cry and apologize and give us excuses about why it wasn't her fault because the car broke down or other kids had to be taken home first, etc. We'd let it go and tell her not to let it happen again, but it always did. We thought maybe she was acting this way because she didn't feel loved and accepted. (My husband is her stepdad.) But we never dreamed she was taking drugs.

Please tell parents not to blame themselves when their kids get in trouble. When we give our kids the benefit of the

doubt time after time, we are not doing our kids or ourselves any favors. In fact, we are keeping them from the help they must have to save their lives. We nearly lost our daughter because of our denial. I want other parents to wake up before it's too late for them.

Accurate history can help save life

DEAR ABBY: I work in a hospital emergency department in a suburb of Cleveland. Because your column is printed in newspapers across the country and beyond, I thought it would be the best way to get an important message out to the public.

Many patients come to the ER because they're in pain, confused, unresponsive, or have been subject to serious injury. Sometimes patients come to the ER because of what they feel is a minor problem. Then, after testing and examination, we find a more complicated problem that requires hospitalization. Many times finding the cause of the patient's situation can be difficult because of inadequate information.

The three most common areas of misinformation are medications and dosages the patient takes, medication allergies and past medical history. Occasionally no identification can cause a problem. Taking medications like Coumadin, Lanoxin, Dilantin, Depakote, digoxin, theophylline, phenobarbital and others requires blood samples to check the amount of the drug in the bloodstream. These medications, among others, can be responsible for anything from severe bleeding to seizures, severe lethargy, weakness, fatigue, abnormal heart rhythm and blurred vision. Unfortunately, these can also be symptoms of problems like gastrointestinal bleeding, epilepsy, meningitis, strokes and lethal arrhythmias.

Patients will say, "You have my records here." However, hospital records are not a reliable source of the patient's current medications, because the medications and/or dosages often change.

The bottom line is: Know your past medical history (i.e., appendix removed, heart attack, high blood

pressure, diabetes, etc.). Know what medicines you are allergic to. Know what medications you take and the dosages. Think of it as "H.A.M.D." - History, Allergies, Medications, Dosages. And last, but not least, write your name, medical history,

drug allergies, medications and dosages on two pieces of paper. Put one in your wallet or purse, and one on your refrigerator, kitchen counter or bathroom medicine cabinet. This way, you will have them with you - or someone a paramedic can find them - in the worst situation. It's for your benefit.

DEAR RICK: Thank you for the potentially lifesaving reminder. For most of us, making such a list will take only a few minutes. Readers, do it now - don't procrastinate!

DEAR ABBY: My daughter is being married next year. We are planning an elegant evening reception. Her fiancé insists that we invite his divorced sister's four young children to the reception. The children are extremely active, with short attention spans. We do not want children running around and annoying our guests. His mother

and sister have put pressure on him, and he is in the middle.

These people do not seem to fully comprehend the type of affair we are planning and that children do not belong everywhere. I think it's very rude and in poor taste to press this issue. How should we handle this?

DEAR MOM: You are the host and hostess, and you control the guest list. Be firm in relaying the message, that the reception is for adults only.

DEAR ABBY: I'm a 25-year-old married woman who has a lot of free time on my hands while my husband works. The weekends are the worst.

Abby, my problem is that I shop to fill my time. This is very expensive, and I think I'm becoming addicted to shopping. How can I control my shopping binges?

Is there such a thing as a shopaholic?

DEAR MALL-HAPPY: Yes, there is. And people who binge-shop to suppress feelings of boredom or sadness frequently wind up with significant credit problems.

Volunteer work is a far more fulfilling way to utilize your free time than shopping. One way to control the binges is to concentrate on giving to others instead of to yourself. More volunteer opportunities exist than I can name in one column, but a few that come to mind are:

nursing homes, hospitals, Meals on Wheels, schools, libraries, mentoring, charities and political campaigns. Not only will they provide fulfillment, you'll also meet new people and make friends.

Another constructive way to fill your time would be to join a special-interest club or take classes at a local college.

If none of these are effective, ask your doctor to refer you to a specialist who can help you understand the underlying causes of compulsive behavior, because there is help for it. There is even a 12-step support group, based on the principles of AA, called Debtors Anonymous, which offers mutual help in recovering from compulsive spending. NEW YORK (NEA) — Four peat? It rings true.

The Lady Vols of Tennessee, going after their fourth consecutive NCAA women's college basketball crown, have created a legendary upsur.

Their home games regularly attract some 15,000 cheering fans.

After an unbeaten campaign, UT is now set for more of the same — despite the distant fanfare surrounding Louisiana Tech, Connecticut and UCLA.

Going into the 1998-99 women's season, these are the major contenders (ranked in their approximate order of strength):

1. **TENNESSEE** Coach Pat Summitt has every starter back. That includes the "Three Meeks" Chamique Holdclaw, Tamika Catchings and Semeka Randall. Holdclaw is the best woman ever to play the sport. Last season, she had 23.5 points per game, 8.4 rebounds per game and 3.0 assists per game. Centers Sharon Flallow and Michelle Snow are the top first-year players.

2. **LOUISIANA TECH** Four starters return from the Lady Techsters squad

Super soph Shea Ralph, who sat out last season, is back from a knee injury.

WINTER SPRINGS - The Rev. Philip Walsanen and members of the Lord of Life Church of God in Winter Springs are excited about their upcoming guest speaker, the Rev. Owen C. Carr. He will address the congregation on Sunday at 10:30 a.m.

"Our minister, Pastor Phil is new here, but he has known Rev. Carr for a number of years," said Ann Detwiler, Church Secretary. "We're looking forward to hearing his message."

Carr began his ministry as a pastor in 1942 in the State of Kansas. Later he served as Youth and Christian Education Director for the Assemblies of God in that state.

After returning to a pastorate in Topeka, Kan., he was invited to be director of the National Youth Department for his denomination.

In 1970 Carr became pastor of The Stone Church of Chicago. During his tenure there he pioneered a Christian Television Station in Downtown Chicago, and served as its first president. This five million-watt station is the most powerful Christian Television station in America with a potential listening audience of 10 million. During his time in Chicago, he also served as Assistant Superintendent of the Illinois District, and was a member of the General Presbytery.

In 1979, he was invited to be president of Valley Forge Christian College near Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. VFCC is the Northeast regional ministerial training

school for the Assemblies of God.

For 12 years he traveled across America, communicating the burden for the great cities of the Northeast Region of the country and developed a program called "Northeast Urban Church Planting," raising funds and recruiting workers to plant new churches in cities from Boston to Washington, D.C. Through this program 11 churches and a Bible training center were established.

From 1995 to 1998 he pastored Oak Brook Christian Center near Chicago.

He resigned that church to once again communicate his burden for the cities of America. His research showed that one half of the population of America lives in only 39 metropolitan areas. Carr felt that with a program like "Urban Challenge" he hopes to raise funds to establish churches in these areas.

Carr has authored two books, "The Battle is the Lord's," the story of putting Channel 38 on the air in Chicago, and "Faith in Focus," a series of messages on faith which he shared on TV-38. Carr has traveled in all 50 states and 30 foreign countries preaching the gospel. He frequently speaks at colleges, camps, conventions and councils.

Paul urged the Philippians not to be anxious or uptight about things, then gave the secret to appropriating Christ's peace-- "by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6,7, NIV).

Although many of us have

memorized these verses and have heard many sermons on them, we tend to focus on the peace we can have but fail to pay attention to how we appropriate it. This kind of peace is not predicated upon a salvation experience. Certainly there is a degree of peace and comfort that comes to those who receive Christ initially; but on a day-by-day, year-by-year basis, the peace we need for life's challenges comes through prayer and petition. And that's not all. Paul tucked

an ingredient into the formula for peace that is sometimes overlooked--thanksgiving. This ingredient, along with prayer and petition, is the antidote to worry.

Thanksgiving is important in prayer because it reflects our attitude. We sometimes pray and petition and wonder why nothing changes. Perhaps it is due to a lack of thankfulness to God for who He is, for His love and care, for His willingness to hear us when we pray.



How important is sleep?

DEAR DR. GOTT: Can a person survive without sleeping? What are the common consequences of sleep deprivation?

DEAR READER: Living creatures — humans included — cannot survive without sleep. Sleep deprivation causes brain malfunction, poor judgment, hallucinations and altered behavior, as well as just plain exhaustion. Although there appears to be no hard and fast rule about how much sleep a person needs, most people require an average of six to eight hours per day in order to function normally.

Some individuals who sleep poorly at night can catch up with catnaps during the day. Other people will make up for lost sleep by "crashing" for 12 hours or more. But the total sleep requirement remains surprisingly constant.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Your recent column about the 6-year-old boy who insisted on removing his pants and exposing himself disturbed me. Although your advice (to discourage the practice) made sense, I wonder how the child learned this behavior. Could the source have been an older person, parent or baby sitter? With all the publicity about child abuse, I'm concerned that the issue may be more complex than it seems.

DEAR READER: Point taken. In my experience, many young children take an innocent pride in their body parts. This is entirely normal and is part of growing up. Nonetheless, such youngsters need to learn, from an early age, which behaviors are appropriate and which aren't. In my opinion, dropping your drawers and publicly exposing yourself is an act that parents should discourage, even though it may be OK in the privacy of the home.


Clearly, some of these children may be learning their bad habits from their elders. Others may be victims of abuse. These are issues that should be properly addressed by parents. I acknowledge that this is a potential problem, but I do not believe that it plays a role in most instances of childhood enthusiasm and spontaneity.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Our well-respected, aging family doctor listens to our

hearts and lungs when we are fully clothed and feels for ankle edema through our winter boots. Three of us have congestive heart failure. What is your opinion of his technique?

DEAR READER: Your doctor is missing a lot. The methods you describe are more suited to ritual than to sound medical practice. I doubt your physician is so perceptive that he can diagnose ailments like congestive heart failure and edema through winter clothes, unless the afflictions are so advanced as to be unmistakable. In my opinion, you should find a doctor who is more attuned to the subtleties of disease — or who is at least willing to raise your



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WIN AT BRIDGE

The longer reign

Who reigned longer, Queen Victoria or Ramses II?

Today's deal is surprising. It's not often one picks up 11 winners. Still, rather than commit himself immediately, South opened two clubs, strong, artificial and forcing. Now West leapt to four hearts. This was automatic nonvulnerable, but would be the choice of most even vulnerable. North doubled for penalty. (How does four hearts doubled fare?) But South wasn't going to be denied. He went for the jackpot by jumping to six spades.

West led the heart king, of course. South was triply lucky. First, dummy had an ace. Second, South had the spade two. Third, South remembered the bidding. East was surely void in hearts. And if East ruffed away the

heart ace at trick one, declarer would need the diamond finesse. So, South called for the heart two. Also, when West continued with the heart queen, declarer again played low from the dummy and ruffed high in hand. After two rounds of trumps had been drawn, South led the spade two over to dummy's six, then discarded the diamond queen on the carefully retained heart ace.

That was nicely done. Perhaps South remembered the words of Queen Victoria: We are not interested in the possibilities of defeat.

It seems to me that West would have had difficulty scoring more than six trump tricks in four hearts doubled. So, the penalty would have been 800.

Although Queen Victoria reigned for 64 years, Ramses II (also known as Ramses the Great) ruled for 67 years. This is even more amazing when you think that he died c. 1237 B.C.
