**Ward Suit Judge Named To Bench By Roosevelt**

Sullivan Has Reputation For His Clarity And Independence

CHICAGO, Jan. 31, (AP)—Judge Philip L. Sullivan, who ruled that the government's seizure of Montgomery Ward & Co. was illegal, was appointed a judge of the United States Federal District Court for the Northern District of Illinois by President Roosevelt in 1943.

A life long Democrat, Judge Sullivan has long been noted in Chicago for the independence and clarity of his decisions. His reputation among newspaper men covering the Federal courts here is that of a judge who "calls them as he sees them."

Before his appointment to the Federal bench, he had served for 12 years as a judge of the Cook County Circuit Court. He became the youngest judge ever to serve on that court following his election in 1921 at the age of thirty-one.

Judge Sullivan, now 55 years old, was born and grew up on a 700-acre farm operated by his father near Maroon, Ill. He was the 13th of 17 children.

After finishing high school he enrolled at Loyola University in Chicago and obtained a part-time job in the Marshall Field & Co. department store to help finance his education. He was graduated from the Loyola Law School and admitted to the Illinois bar in 1911.

He became active immediately in Democratic politics and, after practicing in the offices of several law firms, was appointed master in chancery in 1916. He resigned the following year to enlist in the Army as a private and had risen to the rank of first lieutenant when he was mustered out of service in 1919.

Returning to Chicago after the war, he was again appointed master in chancery, a job he held until his election to the Cook County Circuit Court in 1921. A few months before his appointment by the President as a Federal judge in 1943 he was made chief justice of the Municipal Court of Cook County.

Judge Sullivan is married and has a 21 year old daughter, Miss Daisy Sullivan.

**Results Of Racing Shutdown Are Shown**

MIAMI, Jan. 31 (Special)—What the racing shutdown means financially to the state of Florida is revealed in a check of revenue derived from the pari-mutuels industry for its termination on the peninsula in 1944.

Twenty-nine and one-half million dollars has been contributed in racing taxes to Florida's 67 counties, the state treasury, and the old age funds in 14 years, according to figures recently released by the Florida State Racing Commission.

Of the \$29,469,591.80 total, 40 percent—or the amazing amount of 11 million-100-thousand dollars—was derived alone from horse racing at Miami's famed Hialeah Race Course. Actually, the figures tell only a part of the story for twice in three winters now horse racing has been curtailed and Hialeah unable to operate.

The state's racing receipts reached a peak during the 1943-44 season when \$5,824,272.72 was collected from two horse tracks, nine dog tracks and one jai alai fronton. Three-million-two-hundred-thousand dollars, or 48 percent of the total, was from 50 days of Hialeah's operations—the biggest increase in revenue was in 1941-42 when income jumped from \$2,402,773.99 to \$4,592,861.86 as a result of the increase of the state's "tax" on the tax on wagering is known, from three to eight percent by the 1941 legislature.

Attendance figures, interestingly enough, have failed to keep pace with the wagering rise. Where betting went up six times from 1931-32 through 1943-44, attendance was little more than double. Paid crowd the first year totaled 1,157,161, and last season was 2,458,993. Highmark was in 1940-41 when attendance at the horse tracks, dog parks and jai alai fronton was 2,699,484.

**New Ruling Made On Revenue Taxes**

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 31 (Special)—John L. Fahn, Collector of Internal Revenue for the District of Florida, today advised he had received notice from Washington that Collectors of Internal Revenue are now authorized to accept cash, United States postal bank express, and telegraph money orders, or cashier's and treasurer's checks drawn on National and State banks and trust companies, or certified checks in payment of stamps to be used in payment of Internal Revenue taxes.

If any other form of remittance is received in exchange for internal revenue stamps, it can be accepted only at the collector's risk and may be regarded as cash only after collection and receipt of the proceeds.

It is believed that this new ruling based on recent legislation will prove most helpful to taxpayers who are required to make large purchases of internal revenue stamps.

Danish Underground

The book business is booming in Denmark. Yet the best the dealers can expect is to get their money back, and they risk prison sentences or death.

All such business is underground. In this country of less than 4,000,000 people, more than a million books were published secretly in 1944. This word comes from the Danish Press Service in Stockholm. Editions of 20,000 copies are common. Like cigarettes in the United States, books are sold "from under the counter" to regular customers.

Underground newspapers also flourish. There are at least 35, one with a circulation of 50,000, and there is great confidence in them. Naturally the Nazis hunt desperately for these papers. Often German soldiers are ordered to empty all the mail boxes in an entire district to trace an underground newspaper.

Profits from these secret publications are used to finance more. Yet so conscientious are the Danes that, despite desperate need, they have even offered to set aside royalties for foreign authors whose works they have translated. Such is the spirit that has kept Denmark alive under nearly five years of Nazi rule.

Harder Beds

The wonderful modern mattresses with the springs inside have been so popular that it was with a start that the eye caught an ad the other day for "Slumber Boards."

It was interesting not so much for itself—for sleeping comfortably on hard beds or soft is largely a matter of habit—as for the implication it seemed to provide of a change in a general point of view. Luxury was the word in the twenties after the last war. There couldn't be anything too soft or comfortable for that period.

Now there comes again, as in the early days, the attitude that thrift is virtue and that a little hardness of life is good for body and soul both. People are surprised to find that plain living never hurt anyone.

If to the plain living can be added that high thinking which accompanied it as an ideal of the American nineteenth century, it might be found that a little austerity for the body, together with a good book and a bit of hard thought for the mind to grow strong on, can lead to a beauty of soul not yet commonly experienced.

THE BROWN OUT

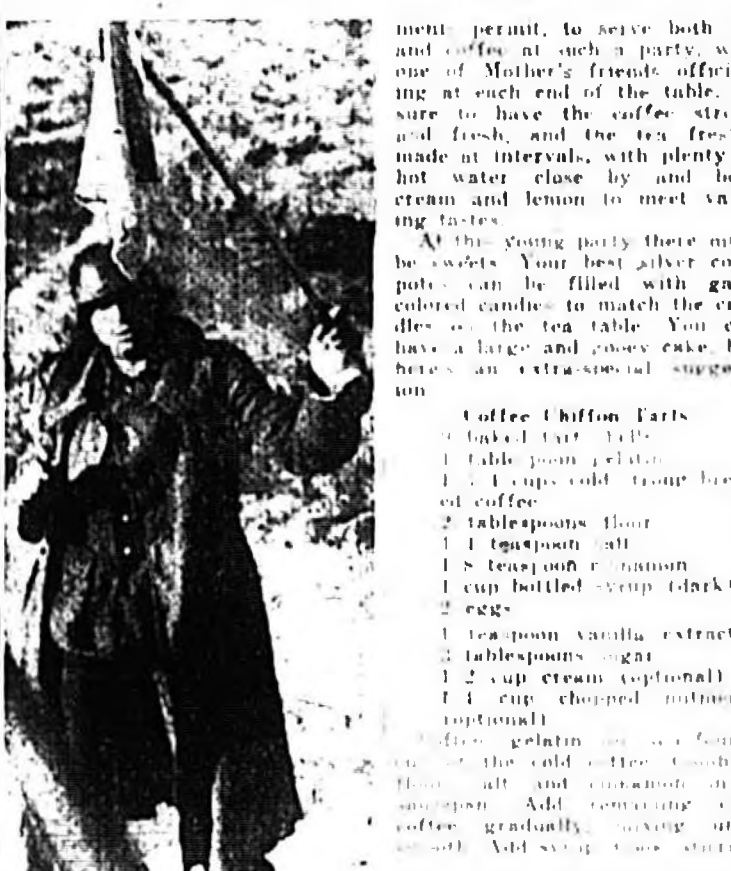

### U. S. Retraining Rear-Line Men For Battle Duty

**Learn Says 6,000 Have Been read in Europe For Use In Infantry**

PARIS, Feb. 2. (AP)—A number of men now serving in the rear areas of the European theater of operations are being retrained and sent into the infantry as replacements for combat duty.

Major General Ben Lear, deputy commander of the theater, said here recently. These men are being replaced by "limited service" men and by French civilians.

More than 6,000 men already have been released for retraining and more will follow them, the general said. He arrived here a few days ago to take charge of a major center in the European theater. He has been studying the situation since his arrival. He did not confirm previous reports that up to 80 per cent of the service men in the rear eventually would be sent to the front. No high-classification technicians would be removed from their posts, the general said.

An officer candidate school will be started in this theater for retraining men who have been in combat. The school, he explained, eventually would train more than 1,000 new officers a month. The courses for men with fighting experience, he added, would be shorter than for men trained in candidate schools in the United States. Eight to ten weeks might be sufficient, he said.

The general emphasized that General Dwight D. Eisenhower was much concerned over the welfare of all his men and had delegated to him some of his duties in this respect. He said that some of the deficiencies in supplies at the front would be corrected, but that soldiers also were expected to take good care of their equipment. Proper training, inspection and good discipline should remedy the situation, he said.

The general said he was not alarmed by the fact there were many men in this theater absent without leave. "Many of these will go back to duty by itself," he said. "Young men are apt to wander away. But measures are being taken to take care of them, too."



**Nurses Are Honored  
At Camp Blanding**

CAMP BLANDING, Feb. 2 (Special)—Nurses of the Army Service Forces Regional Hospital will be honored at Camp Blanding's bi-monthly Army Service Forces retreat parade on the 44th anniversary of the Army Nurse Corps, Maj. W. E. Runge, director of training, announced yesterday.

Major Freida A. V. Brandiger, chief nurse at the local institution will stand on the immediate left of the Post Commander, Col. E. C. Roese, a platoon of nurses will view the troops marching past.

At the same time in celebration of the anniversary, a window display decoration was prepared in Cohen's Department Store in Jacksonville, showing nurse uniforms and field medical equipment. A transcribed broadcast by

Adding the critical situation here are several civilian nurses who are generally not qualified for the Army-Nurse Corps, as well as one Nurse's Aid. WAC medical technicians are likewise utilized for many non-specialized jobs, as nurses handle groups of wards.

Five chief nurses have served the hospital in four and a half years, including Lt. Mae K. Ames, Capt. Catherine Sinitz, Maj. Inez H. Maley, Lt. Col. Agnes A. Maley and Major Brandiger.

Of the 103 assigned to Blanding hospital, 59 are overseas veterans nurses, and two have received citations. Lt. Eugenia I. Holzknecht was awarded the Bronze Star in New Guinea, and Lt. Regina C. Monaghan won a Battle Star in Burma-India.

**Training Of Colts  
To Be Continued  
Despite Race Ban**

MIAMI, Feb. 2 (Special)—Thoroughbred racing has been suspended in this country, but the education of the Whirlwinds, the Seabiscuits and the Twilight Tears of the future is being continued at Hialeah Race Course.

Shutdown of racing has left a record "nursery" of 198 leggy racers—who officially became two years of age Jan. 1, although many are actually only 16 and 18 months old—in the Hialeah barns.

These 1946 Kentucky Derby hopefuls and prospective handicap champions of 1947-48 were well along with their AICB classes of racing, and so the kindergarten classes are being carried on by skeleton staffs to properly educate the animals.

The schooling of a race horse, it might be explained, begins before he is a year and a half old. He is litted and broken to saddle; by Fall he is galloping well and is allowed to stride along first for a furlong, and then for two furlongs every other day or maybe every third day.

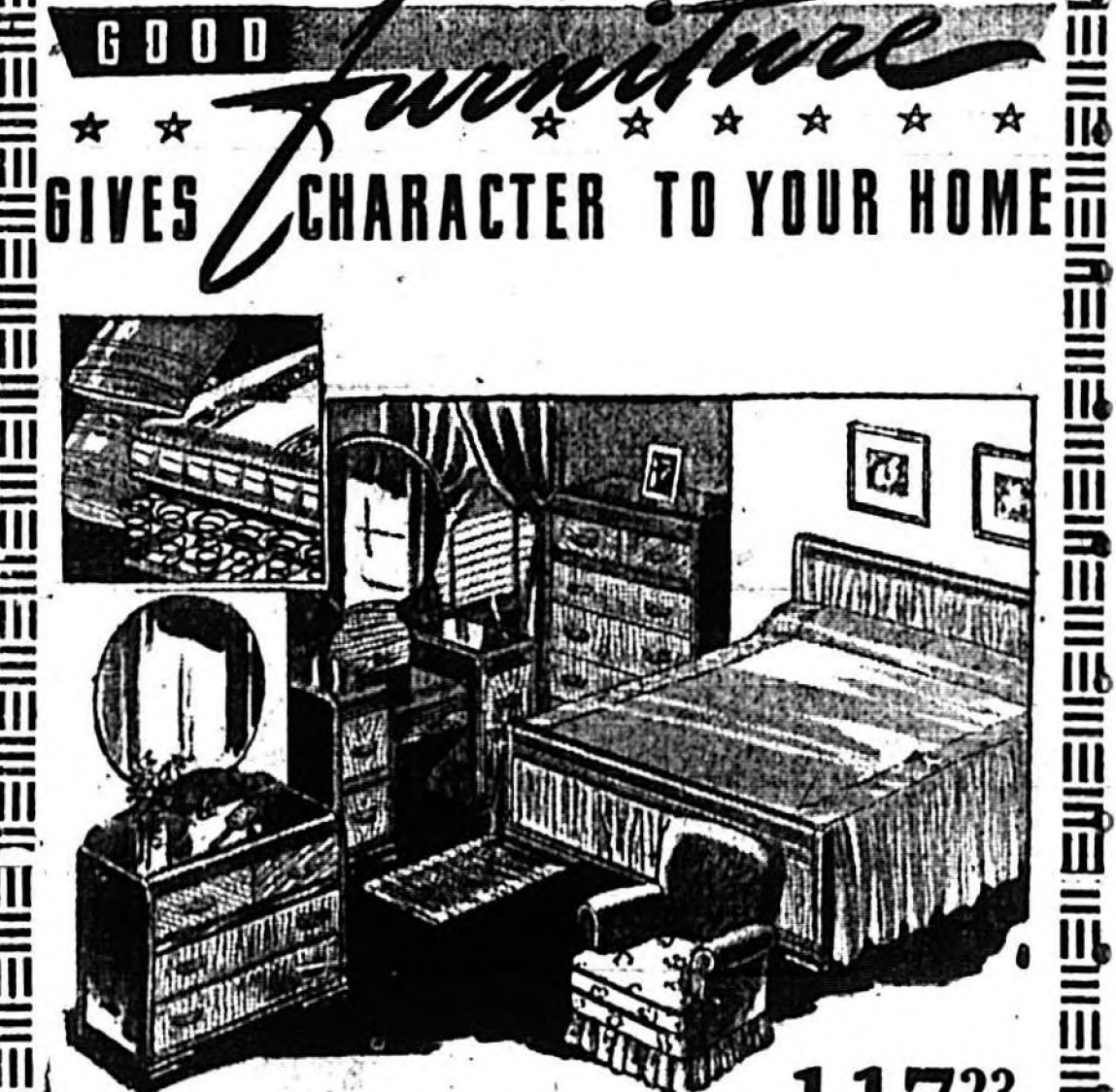
When he arrives at Hialeah in the later Fall the easier canter are changed to gallops with older horses to give him confidence. The leader of the set (the group of thoroughbreds being exercised together in the morning work-outs) usually a stall, old seller, plater, is appropriately called the schoolmaster.

Later the youngster learns to stand quietly in the stall gate, and to jump away from it at top speed when a bell rings and the gates swing open. This is really the most difficult part of a young racer's education; for the starting gate looks like a railway signal bridge on wheels, and must be a pretty fearsome sight to a nervous, impressionable animal.

"You just can't suddenly stop the schooling and training of the young horses," says Trainer W. E. (Red) Wingfield of Circle M Ranch in a typical comment. "We'd just begun to teach our 2-year-olds in breaking from the gate."

The size of the Hialeah nursery isn't surprising to owners and trainers have become keenly conscious the last few years of the benefits of wintering young horses, who, like humans, do better under Miami's magical sun. They can be exercised daily outside without fear of colds, where weather in the North is uncertain, and snow may keep the animals in the barns for weeks.

## Russians Threaten To Outflank Berlin

### Barwalde Is Captured 38 Miles Northeast Of Capital As Reds Advance In South

German and Russian guns duelled across the Oder River today as Marshal Zhukov moved Russian tanks and infantry to the river line along the 140-mile front, threatening to outflank Berlin through North Germany as well as in the South.

The Nazi command reported violent Russian attacks were being made against the fortress of Kustrin, 40 miles east of Berlin while Moscow announced the capture of Barwalde, 38 miles northeast of the capital, in an 18-mile advance outflanking Kustrin on the North. Fighting Soviet spearheads within 46 miles of the Baltic Port of Stettin.

Berlin reported violent Russian penetrations to the area in Schwerdt, 28 miles south of Stettin. The Reds in the Frankfurt bridge southward flanking the threat by taking Ziebingen. Moscow failed to confirm Nazi reports that the German garrisons had already been made to cross the Oder in the Frankfurt-Kustrin area.

An order of the day by Marshal Stalin announced earlier the capture of the East Prussian towns of Landsberg and Barthenstein, south of the capital, Koenigsberg, where Gen. Ivan Chernikhovskiy's Third White Russian army is squeezing tighter its ring around the last trapped Nazi defenders.

The communique added that Soviet troops had completely cleared the enemy from the Kurische Nehrung, the strip of land separating the Kurisches Haff (bay) from the Baltic sea which extends northward from Gdansk also captured today.

The Russians also took more than 70 other towns and, with the fall of Gdansk, occupied an eight-mile stretch of the Baltic coast, extending southwest from Gdansk to Altkoenigs.

Of East Prussia's 14,283 square miles, the Germans now hold only 800 square miles west and southwest of Koenigsberg.

Frontline dispatches reaching Moscow from the West reported fighting already underway in Kustrin and that Frankfurt, 10 miles to the south, was in Soviet artillery range.

At Barwalde, the Russians cut a railroad between Kustrin and Stettin, and at Neudamm the rail line from Kustrin to Soldin, nearest Russian approach to Stettin officially reported, was severed. At Ziebingen, the railroad from Frankfurt southward was cut, hampering German communications with the Silesia front.

Both Barwalde and Ziebingen are approximately four miles from the east bank of the Oder and there was no indication from Moscow that the Russians had crossed the river in either sector, despite German reports that attempts to force the river northward from Kustrin had been repulsed.

### Capt. Howard Introduces Florida Wild Flowers To Table

Jungle survival was the subject presented at the Rotary luncheon today by Capt. (Richard A. Howard) of the Jungle Survival School at the Orlando Air Base, who emphasized his remarks on what to eat in the wild by referring an entire menu of wild assortment of dishes prepared from plants and animals found in the Florida woods which he said were very similar to those found in the South Pacific.

On the menu were fresh oysters, marine conch, sea mussel, brook, alligator steak, shark steak, Florida palm cabbage, marsh elder, hibiscus flowers, broiled sea purslane, baked turnip, green beans, wild turkey, fresh coconut meat, coco, soyab, and coconut juice.

Capt. Howard who was introduced by Gordon Brown who had charge of the program, said that the Jungle Survival School was organized in 1942 to teach men how to survive in the jungles after a number of American troops were killed while trying to "get over the hump" in Burma.

As part of the school, he said that the island of Hypolux, south of Palm Beach, peculiarly appropriate for such work, had been taken over by the Army as a training ground for men ultimately destined for the Pacific.

## Big Three Meet On Battleship

### Radio Reports Move To Get Russia In War Against Japan

LONDON, Feb. 5. (AP) — The Berlin radio reported a four in Tokyo today that Russia may enter the war against Japan as a result of the Big Three conference, now generally believed to be under way. The Nazi news agency said there are indications the conference is being held on a battleship in the Black Sea or at a Black Sea port.

American and Russian broadcasts called last (Sunday) night on the German army to Surrender, with Moscow sounding the theme "Hitler has lost the war."

The U. S. Army broadcast to German troops on the western front asserted Nazi leaders had gambled on a hopeless venture with the stake "our lives."

Moscow radio, as heard by CBS, declared there was no escape from the ring closing on Germany and asserted "Hitler has lost the war. Five million Germans are dead. Today Hitler is throwing 16 and 14-year-old children into the futile fight. Old men and women, cripples have to save Germany. Refugees stream into Berlin, but Hitler welcomes them with hunting squads, and Volksturm battalions."

Nazi leaders, it added, insist that the war must go on "so that the bloody skins of the Nazi bench men survive one more week or one more month."

"There is just one choice left, between national catastrophe or inevitable German war goes on. The rescue from total catastrophe lies in surrender."

**Pvt. William Pulver Wounded In Action**  
Pvt. William S. Pulver of the Army Air Force, who was wounded in the Philippine campaign, has been flown across the Pacific to California in an Army hospital plane with a nurse in attendance, he recently wrote his wife, Mrs. Neppis Pulver, 615 Park Avenue.

Suffering from arm and leg wounds he wrote: "It will be some time before I walk; still can't use my right arm much—can't raise it up at all, but will be up all right soon. Eats are good here at the hospital and am getting good care. He added that he was feeling much better, "but had a rough trip across—ran into a sleet storm 8,500 feet up."

Prior to entering the service Pvt. Pulver operated a produce truck between Florida and northern cities.

**TAX REPEALED**  
ATLANTA, Feb. 5. (AP) — The Georgia Senate today passed 41-3, without debate, a bill repealing the State's 1 1/2 per cent tax. It now goes to Governor Ellis Arnall for signature. The controversial measure has already been approved by the House and abolishes the levy, specifically prohibiting its application as a penalty for voting. ## U.S. First Army Cuts Siegfried Near Aachen

### Third Army Also Hits Near Prum Fortress As 9th Army Masses On Roer River

(By Associated Press) — The American First Army today pierced the Siegfried Line southeast of Aachen, and east of Monechau, advancing to within 28 miles of Bonn of the Rhine and reached a lake formed by the Uff River Dam, outflanking the Nazi Roer River defenses to the north. To the south, the Third Army expanded a wedge into the Siegfried Line near the Fortress of Prum.

The Ninth Army massed along the Roer on the eastern flank, the French and Americans have reduced German corridor between Colmar and Mulhouse to eight miles.

In Italy, the Fifth Army recaptured Galliano in the Serchio Valley, regaining ground lost to the Germans in a counter-attack, while the Germans claimed their U-Boats sank 10 Allied supply ships, one troop transport and three escort vessels off England.

The U.S. First Army tipped a wedge all the way through the west-southwest of Aachen and 25 miles from the Rhine yesterday, heading back the south flank of the enemy's powerful Roer river defenses which block an Allied drive to the Ruhr and the Rhine. The north wing of our assaulting divisions swung east four and a half miles, knifing through two villages—one of them a mile and a half from the vital Roer river bridge, the west wing, where the enemy has been opening gates, flooding the valley and (Continued on Page 3)

## Lieut. Joseph Hunt Tennis Champion, Killed In Crash

A fighter pilot training at the Daytona Beach Naval Air Station, Lieut. Hunt had flown to Orlando for the matches with a Marine officer aboard a Navy ship.

He was a graduate of the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md. and had transferred to the Naval Air arm after serving a year on destroyers duty in the Pacific theater and a year in the Atlantic. He was born in Los Angeles, where he attended high school and the University of California before entering the service. In 1943 he won the national men's singles title by defeating Jack Kramer.

Navy officials reported that Hunt's P-51 Grumman Hellcat went into a spin from 10,000 feet while he was making a "run" on a target being towed by another plane. Hunt never left the spin and his plane crashed and sank immediately.

Rescue and crash boats were immediately sent to the scene, but the plane sank before they reached the vicinity of the crash. Parts of the plane have been recovered.
